Downs eyes updating plan

Ivan Hall of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District recommended participation of Ruidoso Downs in the updating of a Comprehensive Community Plan.

Schools supported by DAR described

Aileen Lindamood reports that, in a talk to Sierra Blanca Chapter of DAR, in Ruidoso, October 16, Marge Bodwell, State Vice-Regent of New Mexico DAR, described the aims and ideals of the organization in establishing and supporting schools in mountain areas. Schools owned and approved by DAR are Tamassee, Tamassee, S.C.; Kate Duncan Smith, Grant, Alabama; Berry College, Mt. Berry, California; Crossmore, Crossmore, N.C.; and Hillside School, Marlborough, Massachusetts.

Quoting George Washington as urging the American people "To promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge"; and Thomas Jefferson, "No other sure foundation can be devised for the preservation of freedom and happiness," Mrs. Bodwell said the objectives of DAR are to provide schools offering students the opportunity to work, study and play together, and to practice patriotism, understand law and order, respect authority, love their country and its flag, and to become good citizens.

Children in these schools are taught responsibility. Each has a job to do without compensation. The smallest do things like brushing off steps or straightening chairs. Older boys work on the farm and in the shops, while the girls are taught sewing and household tasks. They attend church, say grace at meals and say bedtime prayers.

According to Mrs. Bodwell, an exhaustive research has shown that no graduate of one of these schools has ever been in conflict with the law. She says this is especially remarkable since many of their children come from a background of violence, superstition and ignorance. She warned of the dangers of putting three year olds in State supported schools, not to mention the terrific cost to the taxpayer; and the idea of some that American History should be replaced with "presentism".



Two-Wheeled Traveler

The "Alpine Shifters" took to the road last Thursday for their first scheduled overnight campout. The wind promised to make the forty-five mile trip to Valley of Fires State Park a real challenge for Brian Cupp, David Hoffer, Jim McGarvey, Richard Bradley, and myself. Our bikes were loaded with the

necessary gear and we rolled out of Ruidoso at 10 a.m. Jim, who had started the trip with an immediate handicap—a lack of a front deralleur, found the method of attaching his rack to the bicycle to be ineffective as we approached Capitan. The rack had become so loose as to be dangerous with its swaying load so we stopped at the hardware store to make a brace and buy the necessary parts to give the rack the rigid support it needed.

After explaining our problem to a young man at the store, we were promptly led to the shop where all tools and scrap steel were ours for free use! We made the brace, spent twelve cents for some parts,

ashed Jim's gear onto the rack, and rode off into the wind for lunch at the Smoky the Bear restaurant.

Cresting the hill about six miles out of Capitan we eagerly anticipated a relatively easy ride down to the flatlands. Mother Nature had other ideas as she buffeted us around with ever stronger headwinds and side gusts which would occasionally nearly blow us off of the road.

Attacking the fierce wind together we made good time while on the flats for those last eight miles into Carrizozo where we had a well deserved early dinner before riding the last four miles to the park.

We arrived at the park at about 5:30 and none too soon! Richard was to become the first victim of Nature's "goathead wrath", more commonly called thorns.

Richard had the first of TWENTY punctures to be shared between himself, David, and Brian. Before the ride was to be over, two patch kits and three NEW inner tubes were to be used to the fullest extent! Jim and I luckily avoided the "puncture plague"; someone upstairs likes us. I believe every conceivable tube/patch/tire failure was experienced in a fifteen hour period—everything from thorn holes to patches that wouldn't stick to

tubes that split at their seams. After a light in-camp meal, Brian and I pitched our tents while the others found a windfree corner in the picnic area to bed down. As the moon came up in the East, the wind died and all looked good for a peaceful sleep until Chris (she drove in before our camp dinner as a spur of the moment decision) woke me with "there's a horse outside!" And sure enough there stood, looking into our "front door" was a stray horse who now started munching on our tent! A few harsh words and he walked over to where the others were. Afraid he might walk on them I chased him halfway across the park. Next morning "Muncher" was no where to be found.

After falling hopelessly behind schedule repairing more punctures we decided to come back via Nogal to cut some miles. We were all ready for something to eat in Nogal as most of us had a very light breakfast. We therefore bought all available candy bars, rationed ourselves, and pushed upward.

The back road was virtually devoid of traffic—it was our personal bikeway and we loved every mile of it. The five miles of dirt took its toll by loosening three spokes in my rear wheel and denting front rim which eventually led to flat number twenty just

Inside The Capital

SANTA FE—An expected New Mexico propane and butane gas shortage this winter prompted the State Energy Resources Board staff to study methods of increasing supplies.

Colfax, Union, DeBaca, Guadalupe and Taos are among 13 counties with heavy propane and butane use. Shelley Kolbert says these methods of increasing supplies were weighed: Identify propane and butane supplies in this region that can be stored, probably in underground salt domes; increase production; take the state's one-eighth to one-sixth statutory royalty on propane-butane production from state land in kind instead of payment to the state.

New Mexico's average annual use is 2.4 million barrels of propane and 150,000 barrels of butane. The fuel is badly needed in small cities and rural areas.

DeBaca County and the DeBaca County Commission are among defendants in 30 suits for \$26 million damages, filed here under a new State Supreme Court decision opening the door to damage suits against state and local governments. The suits stem from deaths of 19 Texans in a school bus-cattle truck crash Dec. 26, 1972, on a narrow State Highway Department bridge near Fort Sumner. The SHD, Highway Commission and state highway engineer are also defendants.

The State Supreme Court ruled sovereign immunity is no longer a legal defense by state and local governments against damage suits. Previously courts had held public bodies could not be sued without their consent in damage actions.

Sen. Schlienz charged SHD Quay County hirings must be cleared with State Highway Commissioner Albert N. Sanchez. Las Vegas Democrat Sanchez denied hirings are political in SHD District 4—Union, Colfax, Quay, San Miguel, Mora, Harding and Guadalupe Counties. Sen. Ray Leger, D-DeBaca-Guadalupe-San Miguel, defended Sanchez. Leger said: "For six years the SHD district was represented by Roberto Armijo, a Las Vegas Republican, and hiring was Republican in that period."

Sen. Leger added: "Now in the Apodaca administration with Sanchez as commissioner they are sticking pretty close to SHD personal procedures. It's understandable that Republicans are a little unhappy about not getting some of their friends in the SHD."

Sen. John Morrow, D-Union-Colfax-San Miguel-Harding, sees "a continuing need for more highway money." Both Sen. Schlienz and Rep. Cliff Moreland, D-Union-Quay, oppose Gov. Jerry Apodaca's proposal to switch SHD financing from present earmarked road user taxes and fees to a flat state general fund appropriation. Both are oil company employees.

Schlienz says: "There are delays in Congress on the proposal." The project would

approve purchase of the electrical system in Unit 7, Elephant Butte Estates, by Sierra Electric Cooperative, Elephant Butte. A PSC hearing was held Sept. 30.

An estimated 100 to 150 residents live in the unit. The Sierra cooperative has previously sold power wholesale to the Elephant Butte Estates owner, S and F Corp. (formerly Falls Land and Development Co.).

In U.S. District Court at Albuquerque Mesalero Apache Tribe won a temporary injunction allowing liquor wholesalers to continue to deliver supplies to the tribe's liquor business at the Inn of the Mountain Gods near Ruidoso and Apache Summit.

The injunction will be in effect until final disposition of a pending landmark suit on the issue of state control of liquor licenses on Indian land. The suit stemmed from State Liquor Director Carlos Jaramillo's denial of Mesalero Apache Tribe's application to move its state liquor permit from Apache Summit to the Inn of the Mountain Gods in Ruidoso's 5-mile buffer zone. The state bans transfers into buffer zones.

New Mexico Asst. Atty. Gen. David McArthur filed objections in a Tucson, Ariz., federal court to a proposed agreement in a land purchasers' class action suit against Horizon Corp. McArthur says the suit affects some 170,000 New Mexico lots sold by Horizon Corp. at Rio Communities and Rio del Oro near Belen and Paradise Hills near Albuquerque. TRICENTENNIAL CENTURY

BY JACK WILLIAMSON
The Future As Fact

HOW MANY OF US BY 2076?
We have been exploring ways to find space and food for the exploding population of the Earth. We have looked at greenhouse cities to cover the deserts, cities under the sea, and cities in space. Future science can surely support several times our present world population.

But there has to be a stopping point. All our efforts to make more room and grow more food can only postpone a huge and rather frightening question of how many people should there be?

For most of past history, Earth's population grew very slowly. Now, with the aid of modern medical science, it has suddenly begun to double with every generation. I can remember when the number was less than two billion and it is now four billion. In our bicentennial century, it could be eight billion, sixteen billion, or perhaps thirty-two billion.

The world must soon decide how this avalanche of life can be controlled with the dangerous choice between quality of life. That is a decision which entire nations have already made.

Advancing technology and public education has nearly always brought a drastic decrease in the birthrate. This has occurred in the United States, Western Europe, the Soviet Union, Japan, and apparently even in China.

But the old ways of life are hard to break. For many thousands of years, unlimited breeding was essential for human survival. Tradition and religion still support this and their injunctions were once useful, but fatal now. It is still upheld by leaders who see human numbers as sources of military or political or economic power. In most of

the world the people explosion still continues at a terrifying rate. Efforts of control are likely to bring cries of genocide.

This fateful conflict will reach its crisis before the end of our tricenennial century, but the outcome is hard to predict. The numerical odds are always against the nations and the social classes that do limit their rate of growth. Even in the United States, official policy still seems to encourage unrestricted breeding.

The battle against an unlimited human flood seems sure to get uglier than it already is, with greater famines, deadlier plagues, and wider wars. I think there is at least a fair chance that sanity and education can still outrun blind procreation.

The frightful plight of Bangladesh is one lesson that all the world should watch. Its birthrate is still among the world's highest, though the deathrate now threatens to eclipse it. There is a dreadful kind of assurance in the fact that such a nation, at the awful climax of its population explosion, can offer no military threat to anyone. /Dr. Jack Williamson, English professor, Eastern New Mexico University.





While some state legislators, but moreover, local public officials around the state, oppose New Mexico's open meeting law concept, Attorney General Toney Anaya says he takes a dim view of any public meeting being closed for any reason whatsoever. Anaya, who perhaps above all else has concentrated his office's efforts toward enforcing the open meeting statute (he has appointed a full-time member of his staff just to handle complaints of violation of the law) has even gone so far as to propose several amendments to the current law — amendments that on the surface appear to be headed in the right direction. These amendments, Anaya said, are designed to plug up the loopholes that many officials are now using to keep the public's business out of the press and away from public view. He said last week that the present law is being broadly interpreted by some officials, while he personally is continuing to give the statute the most narrow interpretation. Among his amendments, Anaya would attempt to better define "personnel" exemption, one loophole that can frequently be found in use as an excuse to meet behind closed doors but yet for consideration of matters other than those relating to personnel. Only restricted personnel matters can be discussed by public bodies in seclusion, Anaya said. These matters include questions of performance by employees, their pay and reasons for dismissal. He said his amendment will hopefully alleviate "hiring" — for the body's protection as much as for the public's. That's sensible, but then people, public officials included, are not always sensible when it comes to public welfare. The Artesia Daily Press





When the Comanches were at peace with those living in the area east of the Rio Grande, they would come to Taos for trading. Here they would barter and trade buffalo hides and meat, horses, mules, captive Indians, hatchets, and anything else they might possess. The Comanches were known as great traders, and they would continue to trade even though they usually kept losing as infamous tricks were played on them. Trading days were spirited times of much activity. Trade fairs became an annual occurrence which promoted commerce between the Comanches and those residing in the communities lying adjacent to the central high plains. Taos was easily reached, and for this reason became a renowned trading rendezvous.
