## Commission adopts Alto franchise; by-passes DA

The Lincoln County Commission Friday, with an unanimous 'aye' vote, approved a motion by commissioner Bill Hart that "an ordinance granting the franchise be adopted" giving Alto Village Services Corporation (AVSC) the right to form and operate a water district.

Don Blaugren of AVSC said, "There is absolutely no possibility of duplication of services. Alto Village Services Corporation needs the franchise for water lines to operate the system. The water district can't conceivably duplicate services."

Chino will face Eldon Joseph Via, who polled 94 votes, for the office of tribal president in the general election Dec. 19 at the Community Center in Mescalero. The polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.



In other action the commission: — Approved resolution 75-19, asking for a cooperative agreement with the NM Highway Department to blacktop the helicopter landing pad that has been laid out at Ruidoso Hondo Valley General Hospital. The proposed county share of \$5,000 has been appropriated. — Authorized payment of \$1,394 to McCarty Construction of Ruidoso for hot mix on Carrizo Canyon Road. — Presented a letter of commendation to Chuck Rominger for attaining the rating of Appraiser IV, the highest level recognized by the State of NM, and obtained by passing a rigid examination. — Authorized culvert and concrete work on the Bob Stern road at Nogal, at an estimated cost of \$1,500. Commissioner Payne donated a 15-inch length of pipe for the project. — Approved the use of rocks, wire and concrete, and the removal of three large culverts, as a safety measure on the Mesa Verde school bus route road. — Authorized Olson to draft and submit a proposed resolution to the commission

establishing a Parks Commission. A public hearing will be set before adoption of the resolution.

— Received recommendations from Fred Volquardsen on updating the county Repeater Station equipment on the Capitans. Volquardsen estimated the cost of a one channel installation at \$3,600 plus \$2,400 for a second channel. "These units will reduce maintenance costs to one-tenth of present costs," he said. Olson was directed to investigate lease/rental proposals and conduct a study of alternate sites, including Carizzo Mountain, Buck Mountain and Capitan Mountain at the Dec. 19 commission meeting.

— Were advised by Doyle Hall, Farm Bureau Insurance representative, that the preliminary estimate of damage to the county truck, in a recent incident near Bonito, had been pegged at \$5,000. Further estimates and recommendations will be presented to the commission at an early date. — Directed Olson to negotiate an hourly rate for electrical maintenance and repairs at the court house. A contract proposal for this service, submitted by Stan's Electric of Tularosa, was rejected. — Authorized an educational leave for Mary Ellen Payne, county home economist, to attend a three weeks course at the University of Arizona this winter and then to attend NMSU for one semester next fall to complete work on her masters degree.

— Cancelled the Dec. 5 meeting and set the next meeting for Dec. 19, with the stipulation that a special meeting may be called.

main entrance, and concession and office areas, will be moved into this area, and the existing structure will be devoted completely to the actual sales activities. "Our plans also call for a substantial improvement of the acoustical system," Rosa said.

A new paddock will be constructed so that the buyers, and public, can more conveniently view the horses preparing to enter the sales ring.

Comfortable, vinyl-lined seating will be installed on ground level immediately surrounding the sales ring. The plans also call for the installation of "bucket" seats at ground level, and the erection of additional bleacher-type stands.

"These comprehensive improvements of the sales arena reflect the importance with which we hold our two sales," Rosa said.

He noted that the All-American Sale, which now ranks as the world's largest and most prestigious quarter horse sale, is vital to the quarter horse industry and the state of New Mexico, as well as Ruidoso Downs.

Architect for the entire project is the San Diego firm of Bird, Fujimoto and Fish. "This organization is the nation's most experienced architectural firm in the area of racetrack expansion and remodeling," Rosa said.

**Inside The Capital**

Santa Fe — Rep. Jerry Sandel, D-Farmington, says the 1976 Legislature should expand the low income tax credit.

Sandel says: "Low income people are being hurt the most by the current inflation." He adds: "If the state surplus is big enough, I would favor an across-the-board state income tax cut."

Rep. Murray Ryan, R-Silver City, is not as optimistic about tax relief prospects. Ryan says: "The state will have another substantial surplus but I predict the legislature will dissipate it by spending instead of granting tax relief."

Ryan bases his forecast "on the way the last session went, announced goals for increased public schools spending and additional money the new higher education differential funding formula will require." A 30-day, limited legislative session will start Jan. 20.

The Democratic legislature hiked state spending a big \$66.1 million or 16 per cent to \$483.302 million in the session early this year. Ryan, an ex-state GOP chairman, says: "We began the 1975 legislative session with virtual certainty of reducing taxes and ended up with a tax increase — the one-fourth per cent gross receipts tax for cities."

Sandel and Ryan are on the Interim Legislative Revenue Stabilization Committee that heard the City of Albuquerque's plea for an additional .25 on one per cent gross receipts tax authority from the 1976 Legislature. Sandel said afterward lawmakers should vote the authority to Albuquerque. "It looks like Albuquerque definitely needs another one-fourth per cent of gross receipts tax," Sandel said.

Sandel added: "If other cities establish need, I would favor handing them the same authority. But if they do not, I would favor limiting it to Albuquerque." Sandel strongly opposes the help Albuquerque and other cities want badly — a share of state income tax.

Ryan says: "Albuquerque's willingness to go before legislators around the state with its case will create a more favorable climate when the legislature acts on Albuquerque's fiscal problems."

Ryan believes Lincoln County sheep rancher Joe Skeen "does not want to go to Washington." Skeen, a narrow loser to Gov. Jerry Apodaca in 1974 as the GOP candidate, is weighing a 1976 U.S. Senate race. Retired Defense Department administrator Orlando Gallegos of Albuquerque and ex-astronaut Harrison Schmitt of Silver City and Albuquerque are in the race for the GOP Senate nomination.

Rep. Ryan says: "I would think that in the next 60 days there will be a strong effort to identify a well-known, popular dark horse businessman with a conservative background as a Republican Senate candidate."

But Murray says he will not take part in a talent search. U.S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya, Santa Fe Democrat, is a hard running, unannounced re-election candidate. It is no coincidence that the 1963 Legislature created a pre-primary nominating convention and Sen. Montoya was elected to his first Senate term the next year. The unpopular pre-primary nominating convention was repealed in 1967. But it was resurrected by the legislature this year and Sen. Montoya will benefit greatly from it in his renomination bid in 1976.

Rep. Sandel, 33, says he will probably seek re-election next year in all-Farmington House District 1. A representative since 1971, Sandel is in the oil well servicing and drilling business.

Ryan, serving his fourth House term, also says he will seek re-election in 1978 from a Grant-Sierra County district that is top-heavily Democratic. Democrats plan to enter an opponent next year against popular Ryan who has been unopposed in some past elections.

rate is up 71 per cent. An HSSD legal unit was paying \$2.54 a square foot a year in Tower Plaza so its rental rate is up 293 per cent. ## Two sides against the middle

Sometimes the role of a newspaper appears to be to play two sides against the middle just for the heck of it. It occurs when a person (or group) is disgruntled with some action which is considered not fair play or according to the rules and wants to voice a public protest. And when the challenge is voiced, there is inevitably a response of injury from the opposing side stating that the facts were misrepresented.

Over and over again those challenged will say: "Why didn't you come to us before you printed the story and get our side?"

Because — as fair as it might be to the ones challenged publicly — there could always be the chance that both sides might decide their differences out of court, so to speak, and the public would be none the wiser. And the public would never be aware if the one side had just cause to question the other, or not.

More frequently than not, questioned issues involve the good of the community — either politically, economically, or as a threat to life and property.

Focusing a spotlight on a troubled area prevents continuing irregularities from becoming more serious offenses.

The same principal applies to the blow by blow account of crime stories. How does such publicity serve the public good?

There is the same answer. If people in a community remain unaware of violent acts which occur right under their own noses, they will be deluded into believing that everything is all right and will never seek to remedy the woes of others while the cancer of violence grows out of control until they are victimized themselves.

Frankly, such publicity does play two sides against the middle, but hanging out one's laundry in public is a pretty effective way of letting a little sunshine bleach out those gray areas of irregularities before they become permanent black blotches — or proving that there was no tattle-tale gray there in the first place which needed public attention.

If there are those in the community who believe there is something going on which is wrong — to uncover the truth is more beneficial to the community than to let rumor and innuendo fragment the good will between neighbors and undermine their concern for the whole.

How much better to strive to be strong, than to wallow in weakness and self pity and hate. How much better to take charity from a neighbor who wants to help — than to demand it from the government — because that is impersonal. When charity is taken from a neighbor, both given and received in the right spirit, it helps the neighbor, too.

Compassion is something all of us should have. But, Lord save us from the kind of compassion that would say to a cattleman, for instance, "If you find an animal struggling in a mudhole, if you had the proper compassion, you would get in there with it, put your arm around it, and try to help it out." — while it kicks you.

All the cattlemen I know would stay on their horses, rope the struggling animal, and pull it out. Which, in the long run is a lot cleaner, quicker and better for both.




### TOO QUICK BILLS

In the waning weeks of the current congressional session, the pace of legislative activity will be picking up considerably. It happens every year. Bills which have been long dormant suddenly spring to life and whisk through the lawmaking process with a rapidity and in numbers which all but prevent serious study.

It is a technique some lawmakers use to push through controversial legislation which probably would not stand a chance of passage if subjected to the usual committee and floor scrutiny. In other cases it is a matter of clearing the legislative calendar of a large backlog so the legislators can look forward to a relaxing holiday season.

Whatever the reason it is not a good way to produce laws which can be far-reaching in their effect. Consider the measure overwhelmingly passed by the House which would wipe out much of the protection afforded federal employees of the government from participating in certain election processes, including running for office and campaigning for candidates.

A bill now on its way through Congress would lift most of these restrictions. If passed it would present a massive potential for political partisanship and abuse in the elective process, in the guise of restoring lost civil rights to public employees. Daily Sun News, Levelland, Tex.

## Thaw your turkey safely

Since most turkeys in New Mexico are sold frozen, chances are you will soon be thawing a bird for your Thanksgiving dinner. This can present a problem. Harmful bacteria which may be present on the turkey can grow rapidly if the bird is improperly prepared for the oven, says Mae Martha Johnson, Extension Nutrition Specialist at New Mexico State University.

Although several thawing methods can be used, remember that the surface of the bird must not become warm. The bird should thaw fairly uniformly and should stay cool until it goes into the oven.

Refrigerator thawing is the best method for thawing a turkey. Keep the frozen bird in its original wrapper and place it on a tray. Keep the bird in the refrigerator while it slowly defrosts.

You need to allow 24 hours of thawing time for each five pounds of turkey. When the bird is pliable, take the wrapper off and remove the giblets and neck. Cover the turkey with a damp towel and refrigerate it until roasting time. Although this method takes a little time, it is the safest, the specialist

The train whistled as it entered the town from the north, the far-carrying notes, unlike anything else on earth in casting a spell of happiness, echoing clearly up the gentle slope of the valley to the house. Day or night, this was an ever-welcome sound, recently more so because of the thought our Father would probably be on the train.

Instead of a train whistle, as I stood there, the deep fog-horn, bull-like town whistle turned on

full sound, a long unbroken giant-horn sound.

The screen door of the house flew open and out ran my mother, jumping up and down, her arms spread wide in a prayer of thanks, and her blue eyes bright with tears of joy.

"The War is over. The War is over. The War is over." She called again and again.

The town broke loose with shouting and cheering, and the honking of early-model cars. (Do you remember some of the early models?) Among the buggies and wagons and saddle horses, which still abounded in the town were: Metz, Chandler, Reo, Velle, Saxon, Hudson, Chalmers, and many others blowing their horns.

From all directions of the neighborhood came boys with shovels. And all of us fell in and covered up the play-like trenches. Was there ever so glad a nation and so glad a world over the end of this war! In the memory of mankind there had not been such a nightmare.

Would to God that trenches of the world over had been filled forever, as the play-like trenches of ours were covered up on that first armistice day!

Mankind must learn its lesson. This Armistice season let us pray to God that war and strife shall be gone from the world! Surely we have learned to get along together; and the time has come when we must.
