'Good Sam' fund drive enters final all-out stage

The fund drive to raise \$350,000 to insure the location of a Good Samaritan home on Dude Mesa, to serve all Lincoln County residents, is now in, the Advisory Committee decided Wednesday, the "final all-

out stage", with the appeal to end Nov. 15. of almost \$80,000.

The site, valued at \$150,000 and donated by Camelot of Ruidoso, is required to be provided and is not included in the \$350,000 the community must raise.

The Good Samaritan Society, Sloux Falls, S.D., will provide the difference, amounting to some \$700,000, or more, to build and equip the home.

The plan calls for 60 nursing and 20 extended care beds in the original facility. Once the home is operating, the addition of rental living quarters, for those not requiring nursing or extended care, but desiring apartment living with the convenience of meals and recreation at the

The home, operating at the 80-bed level, would produce an annual payroll of \$250,000 with an additional \$200,000 added to the economy of the community through local purchases for home operation.

main building, is scheduled.

Employment, initially, would be 40 area people. The administrator, and nursing staff, depending upon availability locally, would be the only personnel hired from out of this vicinity.

The proposed home is geared to operate resulted in contributions, cash or pledges, residents. Apartment rentals would be open on an availability basis.

To wind up the drive, the advisory committee is issuing a direct appeal to area residents, chairman Charlotte Jarratt said, "Who are in need of a good, solid tax write-off, a contribution that would be of inestimable value to the community's economy as well as prov-

iding a much needed facility." Options for contributions include: \$50,000 or more, naming the facility for

\$10,000 providing the large solarium.

\$10,000 would provide furnishings, or a dining room. * \$7.500 would furnish a recreational and

activities room. "We must have the money by Nov. 15," Jarratt said, "and this is the reason for launching our all-out drive at this time."

Jarratt noted that the Golden Age Club has met their pledge of \$20,000 to provide a chapel and furnishings. This does not include a piano or organ.

"In the event a contributor can't for any The 'Good Sam' drive, to date, has with private-pay as well as Medicaid reason, make a large donation by Nov. 15, but could after Jan. 1.," Jarratt said, "we

do offer the option of signing a pledge card. "All we have to be able to do is tell the Good Samaritan Society that Ruidoso has met their obligation and by spring construction will be underway."

The site atop Dude Mesa is ready for the development and the road leading to the proposed location will be completed this fall, according to Camelot officials. The all-weather road puts the distance from the Good Sam home to the Ruldoso Hondo Valley General Hospital at one and one-

half miles.

The U.S. Energy Research and Development Administration (ERDA) is providing \$35 million toward the project to confirm that the control-rod safety system performs reliably. The facility will be at the Advanced Reactor Division at Waltz Mill, Pa.

Breeder reactors derive their name from their ability to produce more nuclear fuel than they consume.

"When breeder reactors begin commercial operation, they will assure the U.S. of a supply of nuclear fuel that is almost unlimited," according to John J. Taylor, vice president, Advanced Nuclear Systems, quoted in Westinghouse News.

LOVINGTON — U.S. Rep. Harold Runnels, D-Lovington, is running on tested conservative themes in his fourth term bid in House District 2.

His opponent, Portales Republican Don Trubey. attacks Runnels and the Democratic Congress in a wide range of charges. Runnels beat Trubey, 90,127 to 43,045, in 1974. Runnels carried all of the 18 District 2 counties. The district is conservative and 3-1 Democratic.

In an interview Runnels said: "The No. 1 problem in this country is inflation. Since I serve in Congress I'm trying to attack it. The No. 1 reason for high inflation is the huge deficit spending by the federal government."

Rep. Runnels says: "In the fiscal year that ended June 30 we spent approximately \$69 billion more than we took in. For the fiscal year that started Oct. 1 it is projected that the federal government will spend \$50 billion that we do not have."

Runnels says: "I will not be satisfied until we have a balanced budget. In the last six months of President Johnson's administration and the first six months of President Nixon's first administration the federal government ended with a \$1.3 billion surplus in fiscal 1969. We were fighting a war in Vietnam plus all of the Great Society programs."

Runnels says: "Congress cannot continue to cut taxes in the magnitude of \$20 to \$22 billion a year without cutting our spending habits. I will continue to fight for fiscal responsibility in government." Runnels adds: "Another reason for inflation is our energy shortage because today we are 43 per cent dependent on foreign oil imports. We have talked of energy conservation and other steps but our energy situation is getting worse."

He said: "It is the fault of Congress because Congress has done all it can to throw stumbling blocks in front of those seeking to find additional oil and gas in this country by taking away the depletion allowance and intangibles on drilling costs." Runnels says the price of 'old' oil — oil from wells drilled before Jan. 1, 1973 — is still \$5.25 a barrel. He says 70 per cent of U.S. production is 'old' oil. But he notes the foreign oil price is \$12 a barrel.

Runnels, who is in the well drilling mud business, hammers at "continued price

Runnels says 92 first term Congressmen seek reelection and 68 incumbent House members did not try for another term. He says more than half of the 435 House members have served only since 1970.

Trubey charges Runnels with "twofaced bungling." Trubey cites the divestiture issue and what he calls "Congressional procrastination" in meeting the continuing energy crisis. Runnels strongly opposes divestiture of major oil companies himself.

Trubey, a speech therapy professor at Eastern New Mexico University, says he is "fed up with the activity of Congress in facing today's problems." Trubey told a Clovis audience: "The energy bill took 30 months to get through Congress. The pay raise bill took 30 hours, I understand."

Trubey told an audience of 300 farmers and ranchers: "The food stamp program takes more than half of the budget of the Department of Agriculture. There is a close tie to agriculture and defense.. We have been selling a lot of arms and giving away a lot of products."

Thumping Democrats, Trubey says: "It is the same Congress that has been on the beef producers' backs and has not done anything about export-import controls."

Responding to appeals by Democrats to return Democrats to Congress, Trubey says: "With Democrats controlling Congress for the last 40 years, why do you have the problems that you do?"

Runnels says: "If this nation is to remain strong and free, then agriculture must remain strong and free." Runnels notes he is in the oil industry, owns a farm and raises cattle. "When farmers do well, the country does well," Runnels says.

Runnels seldom mentions Democratic presidential candidate Jimmy Carter. But he strongly endorses U.S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya, Şanta Fe Democrat, in his speeches.

Trubey backs financial incentives for industry and a program to bring "American industry back home" as steps to cut the unemployment rate. He blasts the Democratic Party platform as "totally inadequate." Trubey wants less interference from the federal government. He would freeze the national debt immediately and repay the debt over the next 25 to 30 years.

Trubey would minimize regulation, encourage healthy competition, allow laws of supply and demand to work with optimum freedom and enforce anti-trust laws that protect consumers and fledgling businesses.



"INVESTIGATION" BEARS WATCHING

A team of 18 "investigative reporters" descended on Phoenix this week to try to determine exactly what happened in the bombing death of reporter Don Bolles.

The murder of the reporter has been attributed to various nefarious "land development" interests and even to the Mafia, as rumors run rampant through our sister state. A person has been arrested and charged with the actual crime, but the alleged gangsters behind him have not been named except in speculative magazine articles. Much remains to be determined.

In the first place, Bolles was no longer an investigative reporter at the time of his death. There was no reason to go after him, as he had turned his attention to covering the state's legislature, which is usually in a state of snoreful paralysis.

Most reconstructions of the sequence of events have a person or persons causing Bolles to be "set up" for the bombing as a consequence of past grudges against him for allegations made in the course of investigative reporting work.

As our readers know, The Independent does not find anything magical in the term "investigative reporting," which is all the rage these days. Neither do we think that much of the "investigative" reporting published by the Arizona Republic has been either very competent or very

stimulating. It has been a wretched newspaper throughout most of its history, so closely tied to Phoenix business interests that any serious "investigation" of said business interests has been unthinkable.

Real investigative reporting is no different than plain of reporting, except harder work. It involves tedious sifting of tons of documents, hundreds of interviews, in search of the thread which ties things together—if there is such a thread.

This investigative team in Phoenix, headed by a Pulitzer Prize winning Newsday reporter, is also backed heavily by the Pulliam interests, owners of the Phoenix and Indianapolis dailies.

Editor and Publisher erroneously stated that the Pulliam group includes the Arizona Star, which is a Tucson newspaper owned by other folks, and a better newspaper. Thus the investigative team is starting out clouded by association with the Pulliam papers.

This would seem to indicate that the "investigation" is starting out with preconceived notions about what it wants to find. If that is the case, then what it does find may or may not be relevant. We will follow the development of this peculiar case with interest and report to readers on how it appears to be going. — N. M. Independent



Early Cold Snap In October

On the night of October seven, Jack Frost brought us the earliest October cold snap that I can remember, here at the home place. Early next morning it was down to twenty-two above.

The walnut tree leaves were still green, mostly the day before; and in the morning when I drove under one of the giant walnut trees, here was a strange sight: almost all the leaves were under the tree, on the ground, and the branches above were almost bare. The early freeze caught the walnut leaves unaware so that they did not

get time to turn their bright yellow. So for a long ways along the Ruidoso

river, for the first time that I remember. the always-welcome sunshine color is missing from the October leaf pageant. It takes all the leaves to make the picture complete: woodbine, wild grape, box elder, Sumac, Oak, and mountain Maple, Aspen and others.

Up the way from the house, there was a wild grape vine climbing high in a tall Pinon tree. The vine was still green ready to turn golden, but the cold snap withered all these leaves.

Although some of the leaves are absent

this year from the autumn leaf parade, the other leaves are stepping in with an even brighter display trying their best to make up for their comrades.

The Box elder was hard hit, but it bounced back and is making a brave showing with its light orange and copperish pink. The sturdy oaks quickly sent out their golden bronze brighter than ever, and their little brothers high on the hillsides, the oak brush, form along the mountainsides all through the land a vast patch-work amongst the evergreens of pure crimson, marcon, orange, lemon yellow, deep purple — all blending one into

Just before you get to Fox cave, at the upper gateway of the parrows, you can have a close look at the oak tapestry. trimmed on the bottom with river trees in full autumn splendor. And from there on down for several miles you can see oak brush colors at their best.

Grapes Frozen Mrs. A. N. Runnels tells me that her concord grapes at her home on the Bonito were frozen in this cold snap. This is only the second time that this has happened in all the years she has lived here, Mrs. Runnels says.

The Concord is one of the very first grapes to be taken in from the wild and

cultivated in vinyards and around homes. I just had a look at their little brothers along the river. Amongst their withered leaves the little purple grapes are trying to turn into small wild raisins. Like their big brothers, the concord, they were not given time to ripen. Some, however, made it through the early blast and will be raisins for the birds, chipmunks and other

Each day our food should supply us with many different nutrients —

To round out meals and meet energy needs, almost everyone will use some foods not specified in the four food groups, Such foods include sugars, butter, margarine, other fats. These often are ingredients in a recipe, or are added to other foods during preparation or at the table...

Try to include some vegetable oil among the fats used.
