# Courthouse heating quits

Lincoln County Commissioners met in emergency session Friday after the heating system quit functioning and the courthouse and jail were shut down.

After touring the boiler room and spending several hours trying to secure telephone estimates from heating contractors, the commissioners gave county manager Les Olson "authority to make the best deal not to exceed \$15,000." Should the new boiler and accessories cost more than the \$15,000, another special meeting will be called.

A minimum of ten days to two weeks will be required to remove the old heating equipment and install the new. In the interim, the county clerk's office will be open daily from 8-10 a.m. She may be contacted on an emergency basis through the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

Olson said a temporary electrical heating system would be set up in the treasurer and assessors' offices and that the two departments would observe regular business hours. Olson said, "I personally will be here during normal hours although my secretary will probably come in for just an hour or so a day."

Temperature in the commission

chambers was 60 degrees and falling before the meeting adjourned. Decision was made to leave water taps "trickling" to prevent frozen pipes while the heating system is being replaced.

Present and future prisoners will be transported to the jail in Alamogordo.

The heating system was installed in 1964 when the courthouse complex was built. It is a steam converter system using steam to heat water which is then channeled through a maze of pipes to heat individual offices. Olson said the system had never adequately heated the departments on the end of the channels and that the baffles had rusted and pipes had corroded due to the hard water. When the backup boiler is used to increase heat, the temperature is intense enough to burn through the pipes.

Commission chairman R. C. Nunez said, "Every time I come in here, I'm signing more checks for repairs and maintenance on this system. When they bring in new equipment, I want it all replaced and not have new pipes and valves connected to the corroded equipment."

A new 10-section boiler, approximately one million BTU's, will replace the two burned out boilers. Due to the narrow confines of the boiler room, the new boiler

will be assembled within the basement. The existing equipment will be disassembled with a cutting torch and brought up the stairwell by winch, according to Olson, who said members of the road crew will assist with the removal of the old equipment.

In addition to a heating system that has apparently never properly functioned, the hard water in Carrizozo has increased the problem. In 1972, a \$8,000 water treatment system was installed to provide soft water. According to Olson, the system was not serviced and was not hooked up on a permanent basis until about six months ago. By that time, corrosion had adversely affected the heating system.

The new boiler will be on a straight hot water pumping system — comparable to a giant hot water heater — and will bypass the steam conversion.

Olson said the water softener is a computer-type which measures the hardness of the water and completely flushes out and replenishes the system each night.

"Johnson Control of El Paso," Olson said, "has made a valiant effort to keep the system alive and has worked against deterioration from our hard water, but the boilers are completely gone."

COURTHOUSE BOILER ROOM houses corroded heating equipment and water seepage. The system completely failed Friday and the courthouse will be operating with a skeleton crew until new machinery can be installed.

## Commissioner's Report

(Editor's note: This is the first of a series of weekly reports from the Lincoln County Commissioners' office, prepared by Les Olson, county manager. The column, designed, Olson said, to "keep the public informed," will report on county operations, activities, problems and issues. Future columns will appear on an inside page of The News.)

Since it is tax paying time again some information on procedures in paying those taxes may be in order. If you have not paid your first half taxes by November 30 you will be penalized \$5.00, a half percent for the month of December and one and one half percent per month for every month thereafter. That adds up fast so don't delay.

Your second half taxes are due April 1st, 1977 and can be paid until April 30th without penalty. Again failure to pay your taxes by April 30th will result in a five dollar penalty plus 1 1/2 percent per month.

If you believe your taxes are too high, based on last year's assessment, you may file a petition of correction in District Court. The fee for that is \$20.00. The State Property Tax Department and the District Judge will ultimately decide your case. Obvious clerical errors in computation address, and property description can be corrected by the assessor without filing a petition. But, if you are protesting the amount of the assessment for reasons other than clerical errors, then you have to

file a petition and pay your taxes "under protest" by December 15th. After that you can't protest.

If you don't pay your property taxes you may find your property listed for auction a year or so later. Once your property is listed for auction you may still pay the taxes, but an additional 2% penalty will apply plus back interest.

The new Notice of Valuation will be coming out in late February and early March. We'll discuss again what you should do to correct errors and protest the amount of the assessment at that time.

In other areas, the currently elected officials and the officials-elect and their deputies attended the Mid-Winter New Mexico Association of Counties Conference in Santa Fe December 9th and 10th. New information on procedures and new ideas on getting the job done easier are usually provided to help smooth the transition from one official to another.

The Road Department has now received the two new maintainers, one two-way loader and three pickups. Seven maintainers will be back in the field this week. The road crew, made up of four dump trucks, one bulldozer, one blade and one loader is presently improving the long school bus routes north of Capitán Mt. The road crew will be in the northern part of the County for about six months, barring bad weather.

If you discover a road repair that needs immediate attention, call Superintendent

Guy Henley at 354-2203 in Capitán between 7 and 8 A.M. so he can assign someone to the problem that day. For less immediate road repair needs write the County Manager at Box 711, Carrizozo or call 645-2313.

After working elsewhere for over a year top blademans Jack LaMay is back on a county blade. We're pleased to have him back. Good blademans are hard to come by.

Where's the asking done? At the Chamber of Commerce. At the village halls. At banks, realtors, business and professional people and of the man on the street.

The sticker is: No answer is entirely wrong and no answer is unequivocally right.

The 1970 census puts the count at 2216 in Ruidoso and 702 in Ruidoso Downs.

The only absolute fact about those figures is: They're wrong.

Another sticker is: No one can give a right answer.

There are statistics to prove there must be more people here.

For example:

In the immediate future, should you be asked: "What's your population?", whip out this report and, after the person has looked at it say: "Your guess is as good as mine."

You'll prove one thing: the 1970 census figures are wrong. There're more of us.

We can't count our second home owners even though, bias them, they pay taxes here, they can't vote — so they're not one of us.

We'll have an update in 1980 — and it'll probably be wrong before the tally is complete — but the new census will prove one thing: there're more of us.

## Fifth grade 'scientists' make eye-opening trip

Have you ever wondered why the sides of Baldy are scooped out? Do you know how the Capitán Mountains were formed? Why are many different kinds of rocks contained within one hillside?

Page Hubbard took his fifth grade science class on a field trip Wednesday to learn the answers to these questions and many more. The kids were patiently chaffered by Leon Farrar in his school bus down the Hondo Valley, over to Lincoln, through Capitán and back to Ruidoso.

First stop was near Agua Fria. Hubbard cautioned the group not to cross the fence, but to line up parallel to it, look at a hillside and "tell me if you see anything important."

Concurrent answers came piping from the 10 and 11 year old students: "Red and grey colors," "It's rocky," "I see ditches in the mountain."

Hubbard explained that it appeared to be rock, but it was actually "dirt, silt and sand." "And where did sand come from? It came from dead mountains. This young hillside you're looking at is in the process of dying. If you could come back in a million years from now, most of this hillside would be gone. Most every rock has tiny hairline cracks in it. When even a drop or two of snow or rain seeps into these cracks, it freezes causing the rock to eventually split. That process is killing Baldy right now."

The second stop was further down the valley. Kids piled out of the bus and swarmed over a sliced hillside to collect specimens. Hubbard asked why all the stone was slanting down, why a particular rock had ripples in it and does writing on the blackboard with a piece of rock prove that it's chalk? He simultaneously in-

structed, questioned and cautioned and could hardly, at times, be heard over the students shouting about their finds.

Just west of St. Anne's Episcopal church, the bus stopped again. Hubbard told them, "Look at this (mountainside) and think how it might have gotten there." The kids collected samples of granite, shale, gravel, quartzite and sandstone. One boy noticed that all the rocks' edges were rounded off. "Isn't it strange," Hubbard challenged, "that all these different kinds of rocks are all jumbled together in the same mountain?"

Everybody agreed it was strange, but nobody could figure out why.

Hubbard said, "This mountain used to be the bottom of a river. It piled layer upon layer and made this mountain. Next time you drive through here, you can tell your mom she's driving through a river and to watch out!"

He explained that gravel usually indicates water has once flowed through a particular site. "The river — possibly the Ruidoso River — then moved and changed its course and left this mountain."

While the kids consumed sack lunches and knowledge, the bus rolled on with Hubbard teaching and sketching in the mobile classroom. He told them the Capitán Mountains were formed by blisters of lava in the earth in a process known as "batholith" and pointed to outcroppings of volcanic rocks on the mountains.

One of the last stops was near Capitán where Sierra Blanca is in full view. Hubbard told his students the mountain used to be twice as tall as it is now and about 30 million years ago, it was a

they discovered the remains of a dead animal. This "find" brought shouts of excitement from the boys and squeals of disgust from the girls.

Farrar smiled, shook his head and said, "Aren't kids something? There's nothing else just like 'em."

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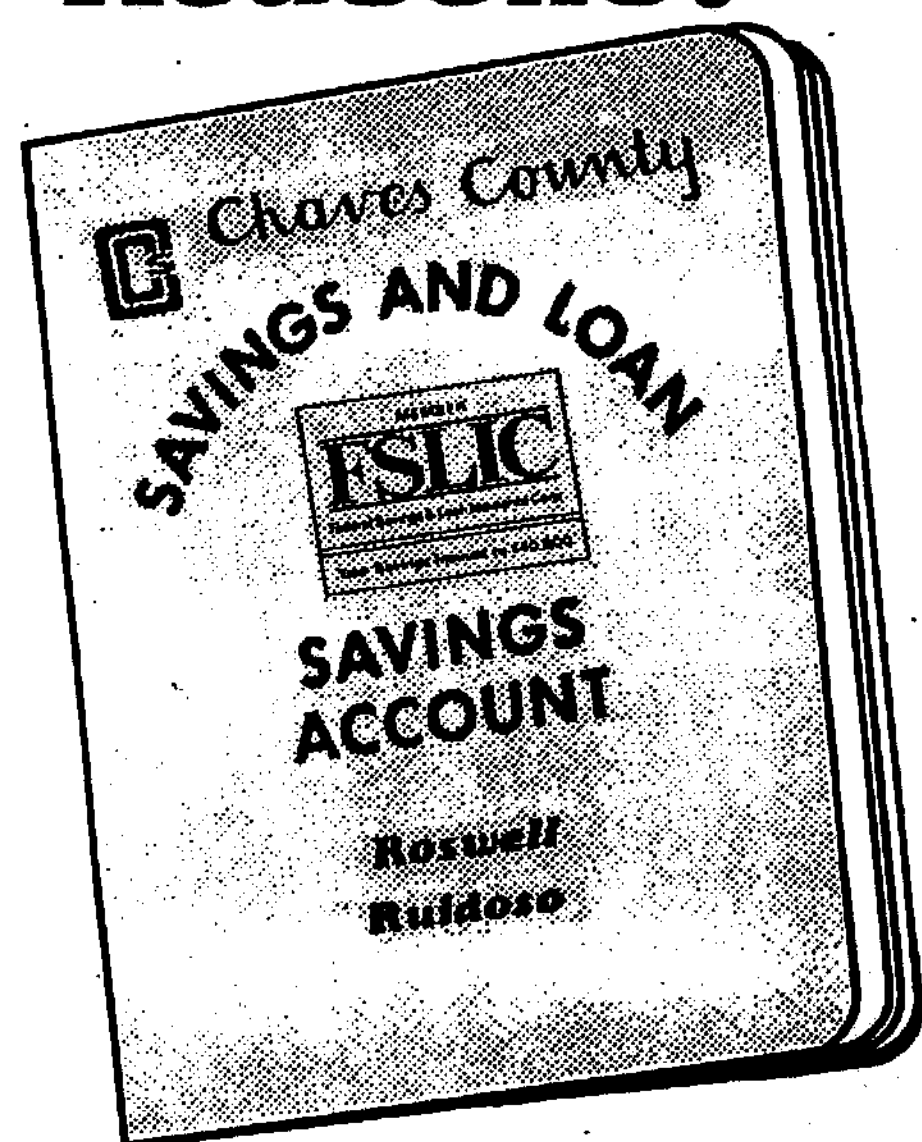

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# Inside the Capital

**SANTA FE** — New Mexico Employment Security Commission laid off 10 employees Monday in Albuquerque with a total of 136 years of service because it had overspent its salary budget.

A U.S. Department of Labor official in Dallas said a telegram was sent to the ESC Nov. 30 underlining the deficit situation. Marcos Salas, deputy associate regional administrator for New Mexico, said: "The wire just pointed out they were in a deficit situation. It asked for a corrective action plan from the agency so they will operate within their budget."

"That's all the money we have. We don't have any other money. There's no way to make it up. It's obvious that they were operating at a rate that would have them overspent at the end of each month, quarter and the end of the fiscal year next Sept. 30," Salas noted the federal fiscal year began Oct. 1, just over two months ago.

He said: "Based on the October salary level that they came up with, if they continued to spend at that level, they would be overspent at the end of the fiscal year," Salas said the New Mexico ESC budget for the current federal fiscal year is \$2,232,586. Within this total \$6.1 million is for salaries and \$1 million for job benefits — 87.5 percent of the budget. The ESC has more than 800 employees.

Salas said the New Mexico ESC submitted a corrective action plan that includes layoffs and reorganization. He said: "We're looking over the plan to see if it will get them out of deficit situation and also preserve necessary services." The New Mexico ESC laid off these employees: All of the five district directors — Severo Martinez, \$20,832 a year, 30 years, 6 months service; Milton Fox, \$21,876, 30 years, 6 months service; Lorenzo Polaco, \$19,836, 19 years, 3 months service; Cannon Visor, \$20,832, 20 years, 7 months service, and Lucy Sargent, \$19,836, 18 years, 9 months service.

Also laid off were Pete Duran, \$13,416, 5 years, 9 months service, a planner; Ray Sweazea, \$12,792, 5 years, one month service and Bob Olives, \$13,416, 5 years, one month service, both administrators; Don Starr, \$9,540, a computer operator with nine months of service; and George Hilly, \$10,524, a temporary unemployment insurance examiner. Hilly had been in the post only briefly. But he had worked for the ESC in different categories about five years with interrupted service.

An ESC spokesman in Albuquerque said: "We spent too much on salaries." The ESC will try to reinstate the employees when money is available. But Martinez, Polaco and others may be hired by other public agencies meanwhile. Kurt

Lohbeck of the ESC in Albuquerque said federal allotments are based on the number of job placements in the previous quarter. He said the method causes problems when ESC volume is heavier in a current quarter than in the previous period. New Mexico ESC Executive Director Rudy Ortiz refused to comment to us on the layoffs.

A state employee can retire at 50 percent of the average of the highest five years of salary with 30 years of service. Martinez and Fox are eligible for retirement with maximum benefits.

A proposal to create a mini-Federal Power Commission on the state level to set natural gas prices at the wellhead in New Mexico was soundly thumped by New Mexico Oil and Gas Association.

Executive Vice President Peter Hanagan said: "The proposal would prove a fatal disincentive to New Mexico producers. Duplication of this federal boondoggle by the state would only aggravate the gas shortage of New Mexicans. Without economic incentives the gas producer, large and small, will curtail activity in New Mexico and look elsewhere to his other drilling prospects which appear to assure a greater return on his high risk investment."

Hanagan said: "If a little FPC were imposed on New Mexico, New Mexico gas would be non-competitive with gas in other producing states and gas exploration and development activity in New Mexico would slow down. If a New Mexico little FPC attempted to roll back gas prices, there would be endless litigation over such matters as contract rights and confiscation of property. Instead of allowing the market forces of supply and demand to take their course, the little FPC proposal substitutes the shopworn idea that Big Brother government can do the job better."

The Senate Democratic caucus Sunday will likely produce few surprises. I. M. Smalley, Deming, is set for re-election as president pro tem and C. B. Trujillo, Taos, as majority leader. Sen. Bob Wood, Portales, appears to be the leader for majority whip over Sens. Ted Montoya, Bernalillo, and Ben Altamirano, Silver City. The new whip will replace lame duck Sen. Odie Echols, Clovis, defeated in the primary. Only one Senate committee chairmanship is open. Echols was Rules Committee chairman. The Rules vice chairman is Sen. Joe Fidel, D-Grants. A complaint by Sen. Manny M. Aragon, D-Albuquerque, holds that the only Albuquerqueans on the Senate Finance Committee are Republicans. Aragon is correct.

Please don't get suckered into giving money to such a misguided outfit as the American Parents Committee. — Hop Graham, Lovington Daily Leader

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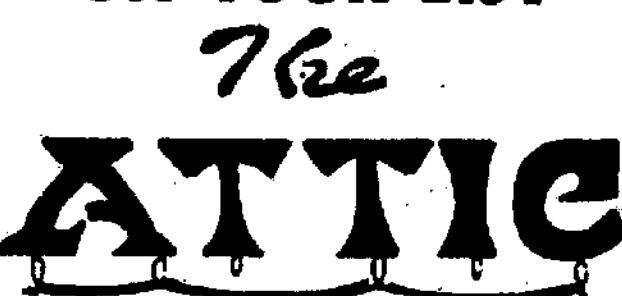

One cold and snowy night I put a tarp over the little Corvair, and with a long cord kept an electric stove going all night so that I could start out about five o'clock. One time the snow was so deep going up the hill that the car just ploughed a big bank of snow in front of it and stopped. Shady and I went running up the hill carrying guitar and banjo. We got there just in time and I was so out of breath I had

to plunk on the banjo quite a while before I could talk.
