

GUNTER, WHITE EASILY WIN 4-YEAR RUIDOSO BOARD TERMS

Tie vote 'spices' Downs trustee election

An Attorney General's opinion Wednesday settled the question of the winner of the two-year term on the Ruidoso Downs board of trustees following a tie vote Tuesday—plus one vote that was challenged by the election board.

In the race for the two-year term, LaVerne Cole and Don Clark each polled 54 votes—with the deadlock's settlement hinging upon a paper ballot cast by Ms. Cole, the object of the challenge.

Ruidoso Downs village clerk Billie Surnick was advised by the Attorney General's office to declare Clark the winner "on a registration

technicality."

The election board, in questioning the ballot, acted because the Original Affidavit of Registration couldn't be located in the Registration Binder.

Further confusion resulted with the presentation by Ms. Cole of the "Triplicate Affidavit of Registration".

In the four-year term race, seats were won by N. D. Wheeler with 98 votes and M. H. Nelson with 70 against the 51 votes polled by W. D. McCutchen.

The total Ruidoso Downs vote was 124. "This is about 25% of the registered voters," Ms. Surnick said.

IN THE RUIDOSO ELECTION, Ab Gunter

was returned to another four-year term with 276 votes and George P. White polled 219 votes to unseat incumbent Don Riley who received 172 votes.

The total Ruidoso vote Tuesday was pegged at 366 plus eight absentee ballots.

"This is about 40% of our eligible voters," village manager Jim Hine said.

"Voter participation is an interesting thing. In 1962 338 votes was an excellent turnout of registered voters. In 1964 515 voters were attracted to the polls. The village's population was considerably lower those years.

"Then there was the 1974 election, with the mayor's office open, and 851 voters, or about 91% of those eligible, voted."

Undercover agent sets up drug busts

Surveillance of the drug traffic in Ruidoso over the past few weeks has culminated in the arrest of suspected traffickers in marijuana and further arrests for possession of a controlled substance [marijuana].

The undercover operation was conducted by Dale Tunnell, deputy sheriff of Lincoln County, under the supervision of Ralph Romero, undersheriff and Lincoln County criminal investigation officer.

Arrested over the past few days were:

Antonio Apodaca, and a juvenile both of Ruidoso, Saturday. Apodaca and the juvenile appeared before Judge Bill Payne in Carrizozo Wed-

nesday, charged with one count of distribution of a controlled substance, marijuana, and one count of possession of between 10 and 12 pounds of marijuana.

Apodaca was released under a \$3,000 personal recognizance bond, Romero said, with the juvenile being held in Lincoln County jail, after both were bound over to district court.

Apodaca and the juvenile are charged with selling three bricks of marijuana to Tunnell, arresting officer Romero said.

Don Boone of Ruidoso was arrested Tuesday by Sgt. J. A. Nesmith of Ruidoso on a bench warrant issued by District Judge George Zimmerman. He is charged with distribution of marijuana and the sale of

alcohol to a minor.

Boone, under an authorized bond of \$5,000 was being held in county jail Wednesday pending arraignment.

As a result of the investigation, Romero said, Boone is charged with selling a quantity of marijuana to Tunnell Feb. 13.

The indictment against Boone was returned by the Lincoln County Grand Jury upon receiving testimony by Tunnell and deputy sheriff Dennis Cleaver, after which the bench warrant was issued.

Six charges of possession of a controlled substance under one ounce have been filed with Magistrate W. A. Hart, with the cases to be heard at 4:30 Friday

afternoon. Charged by NM State Patrolman Kent Waller were Lonnie D. Bowman, Stephen T. Crye, James W. Pena, Daniel C. Black and James L. Forbes, of El Paso and Danny J. Sanchez of Las Cruces, in arrests made Sunday.

Officers participating in the overall investigation and the arrests were, Romero said, Tunnell, Cleaver, Waller, Nesmith, Lt. Jerry Russell of Ruidoso PD, Officer Mike Graham of Ruidoso Downs PD and deputy sheriff Lucas Gallegos.

"Several arrests are pending," Romero said, "as a result of this intensive undercover operations."

BLM land use hearing underway at the Inn

The fate of the 23,000 acre Fort Stanton Reservation hangs in the balance today and tomorrow as the New Mexico Multiple Use Advisory Board of the Bureau of Land Management begins public

hearings on the Fort's historic lands at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, three miles south of Ruidoso on Carrizo Creek.

The board will hear testimony from agencies and individuals about the advantages and

disadvantages of the different proposed uses for the Ft. Stanton land. The meetings will run from 8:30 a.m. until 4 p.m. each day.

The area surrounding the Fort is currently under a 20

year lease by New Mexico State University. NMSU is using the land as a research area for pinon/juniper, blue-grama-grass woodland eco-systems.

FD sets burning closure

All outside burning in Ruidoso is banned. The Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department issued the order due to the existing extreme fire danger. "The dry conditions," fire chief Red Farus said, "make the closure necessary now and it will be continued until further notice."

"The closure includes the burning of trash — any outside burning.

"We do not want to issue any citation but we also do not want any man-caused fires in Ruidoso."

The use of barbecue grills with charcoal will, under the ban, be permitted, but, Farus said, "We're advising extreme caution and asking everyone to make certain that their charcoal fire is put out—dead out—immediately following its use."

"All we're saying folks, is, please be careful and please cooperate with the closure."

Warrior cagers in regional play at Alamogordo

The Ruidoso Warriors enter the state regional cage tournament, underway today at Alamogordo, with a first round bye.

The local roundballers play their first game Friday at 8 p.m., meeting the winner of the Dexter-Hatch tilt today.

With a one-two punch last week the Warriors won the district by defeating Lordsburg Friday and then repeating the feat Saturday at the expense of the Hatch bears. This is the first district win for a Ruidoso basketball team since 1968.

favorites. It has been nineteen years since a team from Ruidoso has played in the state tournament.

When you visit the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital, whether as a patient or visitor, you will notice that among the nurses in white there are some ladies in pink. These are the Pink Ladies and they belong to the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital Auxiliary.

Their services include operating the lunch counter and gift shop, manning the information desk, acting as hostesses during the blood drives and donating funds to add needed facilities to the hospital.

The Auxiliary was organized in 1965 with twelve charter members and \$35. They started out in the old wing of the hospital with a small area about the size of a telephone booth

where they sold drug items. According to Isla McLeod, a charter member, they now have sixty-one regular and associate members. It costs \$2.50 to join the Pink Ladies. An associate membership is \$10.00 a year. The current project of the Auxiliary is to furnish an out patient surgery room for the hospital. This will be used for surgery not requiring overnight stay at the hospital and will free the regular surgery room for more serious operations.

A memorial fund is kept by the Auxiliary and all profits go to the hospital. Many of the gift items that are sold in the gift shop are hand made. The Auxiliary will be glad to furnish materials to anyone wishing to

make gifts to be sold by the Pink Ladies. Many unusual gift items are available in the shop.

One of the services that the Auxiliary would like to add is a book and magazine cart. They do not have enough volunteers to include this service at this time.

The lunch room and gift shop is open from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday. The Auxiliary would like to keep it open at least six hours on Sunday. They are badly in need of volunteers for that day.

In the last ten years the Auxiliary has given over \$30,000 to the hospital and many hours of volunteer service. Your help is needed to make the next ten years even more successful. If you can give three hours a week of your time call Isla McLeod, president, and join this worthy group of Pink Ladies.







Today's newspaper may be tomorrow's cattle feed

LAS CRUCES—Today's wastes may be tomorrow's resources—we just haven't learned how to use them yet. G. Stanley Smith, animal science professor at New Mexico State University, told almost 250 participants in the Livestock Research and Cattle Growers Short Course at NMSU. Smith spoke Monday (Feb. 16) concerning exotic livestock feeds of the future.

For years, livestock feeders have utilized "waste" crops, such as straws, corn stalks and crop stubbles. The NMSU researcher pointed out that as the price of grain and traditional feeds continue to go up, livestock producers may begin to value other "wastes"

which presently require expensive disposal processes. Recently, "exotic" feedstuffs, such as newsprint, waste paper and food processing by-products, have been used. However, Smith pointed out the importance of research before using these non-traditional substitutes.

For example, feeding newspaper and cardboard boxes to cattle was successful in terms of animal acceptance, digestibility and performance. However, some of the inks formerly used for newsprint contained chemicals which were undesirable in milk and meat. Research has shown that changes in printing inks can allow newspapers to be used for

some types of feed, thus saving millions of tons of presently wasted paper.

Presently the NMSU research program is studying the nutritive value of sewage solids that are processed in a way to kill the pathogens (germs). Smith's program involves extensive chemical analyses, trials with laboratory animals to check for all types of toxicity and feeding trials with sheep.

To date, the data confirm that considerable nutrient value is available and that "hazards" are not necessarily prohibitive to animal feeding. Smith stressed, however, that extensive research is needed before any practical applications can be planned.

School meals price under new plan

New federal guidelines will allow more New Mexico children to receive reduced price school meals, according to the State director of School Food Services.

Gretchen Plagge of the New Mexico Department of Education said the revised regulations raise the maximum levels of family income at which children are eligible to pay the lower rates for breakfast and lunch.

The most that schools can

charge for a "reduced price" meal is 20 cents for lunch and 10 cents for breakfast.

Under the new income tables issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, a family of four with an income of \$9,770 or less would be eligible for the reduced price rate.

Families also may be eligible for free or reduced meals because of:

- added expenses due to unusually high medical expenses,
- shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income,
- special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child,
- disaster or casualty losses,
- temporary unemployment or unexpected layoff.

Contest entries will be judged by the NMSU chapter of National Press Photographers Association, one of six collegiate chapters of the national organization.

Dr. Don Martin, NMSU professor of photojournalism, said contest winners in all divisions automatically will

become eligible to enter Young America Showcase, sponsored by Photographic Society of America, the nation's largest photographic organization.

Winners in the national competition will receive cash prizes and wide recognition.

Martin said all entries will be returned to students with a short critique.

Winner of Best of Show honors will receive a traveling trophy for the winning student's school and the student will receive a plaque.

All entries must be black and white prints taken of a school-related activity since Jan. 1, 1975.

Photographs may be printed 5x7 or 8x10 inches, but must be mounted vertically on 11x14-

inch photo mounting board or stiff cardboard.

Entries must be taken by the entrant, but may be processed commercially.

Students may not enter more than three photos in any category—sports, portrait, classroom activity and miscellaneous—but may enter all four categories.

All entries will be displayed at Furr's Family Center in Las Cruces and in all high schools participating.

Three place ribbons will be awarded in all categories.

Entries for the contest should be mailed to High School Photo Contest, P. O. Box 3J NMSU, Las Cruces, New Mexico 88003, and postmarked no later than April 1.

Check plants for pests

Just because you keep your house plants indoors doesn't mean that insects and spider mites can't find them. Some pests, such as spider mites, may be more of a problem in winter than at other times. Unless you have a humidifier, the environment in your house becomes quite dry which makes conditions ideal for spider mites, says John J. Durkin, Extension entomologist at New Mexico State University.

Besides spider mites, some of the most common pests are aphids, mealybugs, scales and whiteflies. All of these are quite small so you have to look closely to find a light infestation. So be sure to look for signs as these pests as well.

Spider mites cause very small yellow, red or bronze spots at first and often cover their feeding area on the undersides of leaves with web. Aphids, mealybugs, scales and whiteflies produce honeydew. A few small, shiny spots on the upper surface of leaves could mean some of the pests are at work.


Control is often difficult if the infestation becomes well established. Heavy infestations often require removing the plants from the house so they can be thoroughly sprayed with a good general garden spray mixture.

Light infestations can often be controlled by washing infested plant parts with soapy water and a soft brush or cloth. Use two teaspoons of mild detergent to one gallon of water. Rubbing alcohol on a cotton swab is another way of controlling light infestations on a few plants.

Aerosol or pushbutton sprays are also effective. However, read the label carefully before use and be sure it can be used on plant foliage. Your ant and roach bomb or flying insect spray may contain a recommended insecticide but the carrier may burn or completely kill plant foliage.



76 MEETING OPENS MAY 15

1,308 yearlings in 1977 A-A Futurity

A total of 1,308 yearlings have been nominated to next year's \$1 million All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, according to General Manager Al Rosa.

Nominations for the '77 edition of the world's richest race closed on January 15. The nominating fee was \$50.

The list of hopefuls, as usual, is deep in quality. But one nominee stands out. That's an unnamed youngster by Rocket Wrangler out of Decketta. The owners are J. R. Adams of Guymon, Okla., and G. R. Russell of El Paso.

What makes the nominee so promising is the fact both the mama and papa are All-American Futurity winners. Rocket Wrangler won in 1970. Decketta got her trophy in 1964.

The "biggest" nominators to the '77 All-American were Anne and B. F. Phillips Jr. of Frisco, Texas. They entered 20 head.

Next is Gordon Howell of Sunland Park, N.M., who checked in with 19 nominees.

Here are the other major nominators (in terms of numbers): 15 head—Joe Modermott of Madisonville, Texas; 14 head—Brough Ranches of Riviera, Texas; Jimmy Millar of Morton, Texas; Sam C. Van Ness of

Alvin, Texas; 13 head—Burnett Estate of Ft. Worth, Texas; 12 head—Walter Merrick of Sayre, Okla.; 11 head—Valton Cox of Lubbock, Texas; S. F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas; 10 head—Citation Farms of Jenks, Okla.; 9 head—Duncan Farms of Plano, Texas; Johnnie Hoffman of Metairie, La.; Robert Moore and Newton Keck of Grapevine, Texas; Myron Sammons of Missoula, Mont.; 8 head—Forrest Beauford of Claremore, Okla.; Dr. Jack Frost of Centralia, Ill.; Z. Wayne Griffin of Los Angeles; A. R. Lewis of Tucson, Ariz.; Mickles Valley View Farm of Pasadena, Texas; Lamar Miller of Tulsa, Okla.; Clifton Throneberry, Jr. of Pryor, Okla.; and Paul Travis of Metamora, Mich.

In order to remain eligible for the '77 All-American Futurity, the following payments must be made: \$100 by March 15; \$150 by June 15; \$250 by Oct. 1; \$300 by March 15, 1977; \$500 by June 15, 1977; and \$750 to pass the entry box for the trials.

That comes out to a total investment of \$2,500.

Supplemental nominations can be made by June 15, 1977, at a cost of \$6,250, or at the time of entry to the trials the tab in this case is a steep \$15,000.

The pace for the 1976 All-American Futurity is also moving at a rapid clip, Rosa pointed out. "At this point, 671 head are still eligible," he said. "The amount of money already on deposit is \$718,875. At the same time last year, 619 two-year-olds were eligible, and this represented \$674,450."

Last year, the All-American eventually generated a cash total of \$1,476,000. Of that amount, \$1,030,000 went into the All-American Futurity purse, and \$446,000 was held over to be channeled into this year's \$500,000 (est.) All-American Derby.

The current figures, which are now \$44,425 ahead of last year's clip, means the '77 Derby will most likely far surpass the half-million dollar plateau.

The 1976 season will get rolling on Saturday, May 15, and cover 68 race days through Labor Day (Sept. 6). The basic pattern will be Thursday-through-Sunday racing, as usual. There are two Monday dates—May 31, (Memorial Day) and Sept. 6 (Labor Day). First post is 1:30 p.m.

The remarkable Ruidoso stakes schedule will again offer a number of super-sized races in addition to the \$1 million All-American Futurity and the

\$500,000 All-American Derby.


The brilliant two-year-old quarter horse division offers two All-American stepping stones: the \$375,000 Kansas Futurity and the \$300,000 Rainbow Futurity.

The main pathways to the All-American are the \$75,000 Kansas Derby and the \$350,000 Rainbow Derby.

In the thoroughbred division, two glittering events are the \$75,000 (est.) Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity and the \$25,000 Ruidoso Derby.

The '76 meeting was the best, by far, in the track's 29-year history. Total handle for the 63-day campaign reached \$23,168,555, which boiled down to a daily average of \$367,755.

BLM land hearing

[FROM PAGE ONE] The administration of the BLM since 1950, the 23,000 acres astraddle the Rio Bonito in Lincoln County (a few miles east of Capitan) have increasingly become the object of a number of land use requests.

One of the largest and most controversial land use proposals for the area is for the construction of a large, jet-capable, general aviation airport.

Although no formal request has been made by the municipalities involved in the airport plans, the Lincoln County-Mescalero Airport Study Committee has recommended two sites for the jetport, both of which are on Fort Stanton land.

"The two proposed sites are really the only feasible locations for a large airport in this area," Fred Heckman, chairman of the Airport Study Committee said.

However, NMSU representatives feel the airport would disrupt research and the University's Board of Regents has voted to oppose such a proposal.

Other suggestions for land use include opening the area to commercial ventures and industry, allowing the colorful caves on the land to be developed by concessionaires, subdividing the land for summer homes and parceling it out among surrounding ranchers.

However, the biggest question to be answered is whether or not

the BLM has the authority and jurisdiction to disperse the lands in the first place.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe claims the land legally belongs to it under aboriginal title. A decision by the Department of the Interior in the 1950's apparently ruled MAT was to have jurisdiction over the property.

According to the Heckman, the issue may have to be taken to court or the legislature to be settled satisfactorily.

Today's meeting began with a briefing on the area, followed during the afternoon and throughout tomorrow by a period devoted entirely to receiving statements in writing or, on a time-available basis, oral statements pertaining to the issues.


Arrested at the tavern by Ruidoso PD Pfeffer was Randy Dutchover, recently of California. Following his

BICENTENNIAL NOTEBOOK

Wealth of Nations
 Two hundred years ago this week a most significant event occurred in England that would have a major impact on thought and economic policy in America and the rest of the world for the next two hundred years. On March 9, 1776, Adam Smith published his book, "An Inquiry Into the Nature and Cause of the Wealth of Nations."

Smith proposed a radical departure from the prevailing economic philosophy of the day. Mercantilism was a highly nationalistic policy in which business existed at the pleasure of government. There was, in truth, a very close relationship or partnership between government and commercial activity. Business existed to further the nationalistic goals.

Smith suggested that the government role in business should be eliminated. Instead of serving nationalistic interests the businessman should be totally free to pursue his own self-interest which, according to Smith, would be to make a profit. He argued that the nation's interest would be better served through free enterprise and competition than it was under mercantilism.

Smith argued that there were natural laws that governed economic activity. A major one was the law of supply and demand. If this law were allowed to function freely, it would provide all the necessary regulation of business. If the government interfered—either to help or hinder business activity—the law would not work.

Eventually, in the nineteenth century Smith's ideas were symbolized by the French phrase, "laissez faire." In the nineteenth century the United States became a leading and vocal proponent of laissez faire even though it never fully followed Smith's principles. American businessmen were ardent foes of government regulation, but the great majority of them continued to look to the government for various types of assistance.

The long-range impact of Smith's work can hardly be imagined or calculated. At the time of the book's publication, Americans took little notice since they were deeply involved in the events that soon led to

independence. It was not long, however, before Americans began to wrap themselves in Smith's philosophy and the history of the United States took a new course.

In the same way residents of the Spanish Southwest took little notice of Smith's work. They too lived in the grip of the Spanish mercantile system.

Few residents of New Mexico were entrepreneurs in the capitalistic sense. However, in time, especially after New Mexico became a United States possession, they too would feel the tremendous influence of Adam Smith. /Donald W. Whisenhunt, history professor, Eastern New Mexico University.

Tricentennial Century

THE FUTURE OF FREEDOM

Our most precious freedoms will be in growing danger through the next hundred years. This disturbing prediction is suggested by the theory of history and supported by the present trends of technology.

The historian Walter Prescott Webb wrote a revealing book called "The Great Frontier" in which he traces the origins of our political, economic, and religious freedoms back to the times of Columbus and Vasco de Gama. The end of the Middle Ages had left the peoples of Europe crowded, poor, and severely oppressed. There was a single church, which punished heresy with fire. Political rights scarcely existed.

Webb's thesis is that the opening of the new frontiers all around the world gave the Europeans a way of escape from all those oppressive controls. In the rich new lands of the Americas, Africa and Asia, they found room and resources to establish political democracy, private capitalism, and religious liberty.

But those frontiers are gone now, with alarming indications that all the freedoms they opened are doomed to vanish with them. To make the picture even darker, our advancing technology is putting new pressures of its own on economic and political liberty.


On the American frontier, as it was when my own forebearers were moving west from New Jersey to Ohio to Indiana to Minnesota and finally south to Texas, the isolated family was a nearly independent economic unit. Though life was sometimes pretty grim, the simple technologies of axe and rifle and

plow enabled the frontier family to produce its own food and clothing and shelter, to survive with very little social service of any sort.

Not so today. In our complex system, each of us depends on many thousand others. To glance at the simplest case, our cities would quickly die, with food or water or power cut off. In the long run, I think society will have to limit the power to stop such essential public services, which will be to limit the freedom of the people who perform them.

In coming columns, we will be looking at the grave dangers which the future seems to hold for political democracy, for the right to choose or change a job, even for a religion. We will find cause enough for alarm, but also a basis for hope.

There is a choice for us to make. All our essential liberties can be preserved and defended through the tricentennial century, if only we value them highly enough. They do not seem likely to be wrested away by any armed conquest. The greater danger is that they will be traded away, to the union and the corporation and the government, in return for job benefits and welfare payments. All we have won and defended through two centuries of war, we can lose at the ballot box. /Dr. Jack Williamson, English professor, Eastern New Mexico University.

Inside the Capital

SANTA FE — Sen. Bill Lee, D-Lovington, says: "The difference between expenditures and projected revenue is probably the closest it has been in many, many years."

A rancher and Senate Finance Committee member, Lee commented on the \$499,453 million general fund appropriation and projected \$500 million state revenue in fiscal 1977, a razor-thin difference of only 1.7 per cent. The legislature adjourned early Jan. 23 after a 3-day special session to complete its work. Sen. Lee said: "We are probably walking a very thin line."

Rep. Colin McMillan, R-DeBaca-Chaves, said: "Probably the biggest disappointment was the fact we didn't face up to the financial problems. The day after the 30-day session ended the governor said we had \$6 million more in the state general fund than we had the day before, an obvious dodge so we wouldn't have a tax cut."

Rep. John Bigbee, R-DeBaca-Lincoln-Guadalupe-Torrance, said a major legislative accomplishment was exemption of fractional interests on tax-exempt property from property tax—grazing and mineral leases, rights-of-way, easements and other interests. Bigbee is a rancher. But the same legislation left unanswered the question of state authority to collect taxes on improvements owned or used by non-Indians on Indian land. Indian leaders promised to test the issue in court.

Rep. Bigbee tacked on a significant amendment to a legislature-approved bill authorizing \$1,225 million in state severance tax bonds for development of a new Brantley Dam State Park in Eddy County. The Bigbee amendment: "None of these funds may be expended until the State Park and Recreation Commission has determined that Brantley Dam State Park will not jeopardize the state's investment in the existing state park facilities at Sumner Dam or adversely affect Los Esteros Reservoir."

Senate Majority Leader C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, said: "We did everything that had to be done, the major things like medical malpractice insurance and sovereign immunity. State government was funded at an adequate level. There is enough leeway on both the surplus and ongoing expenses, barring any unforeseen catastrophe, so the state is in solid fiscal condition." Gov. Apodaca signed the major medical malpractice bill.

Lawmakers noted \$2.5 million for public school capital outlay after a session-ending scrap. Specific projects tagging funds for school gymnasiums at Penasco, Pojoaque, Espanola and Belen were deleted in the revised bill. A state-level advisory committee will screen applications for the state money. Sen. Ray Leger, D-DeBaca-Guadalupe-San Miguel, sponsored the original bill.

Senate Majority Whip Odys Echols, D-Clovis, said: "We

could have adopted the 20 per cent state income tax cut for 1976 for a total of \$15 million in tax relief and still appropriated amounts actually appropriated." Sen. Trujillo concurred. The legislature passed no general tax decreases. Gov. Jerry Apodaca did not submit tax cut bills to the special session.

Sens. Trujillo and Echols will seek re-election this year. Both have been senators since 1967. Echols' Senate District 27 spans most of Clovis and five rural Curry County precincts. Trujillo's Senate District 6 is in Taos, Mora and San Miguel Counties.

The legislature passed a bill by Rep. Reynaldo Medina, D-Rio Arriba-Taos, abolishing the New Mexico Railroad Authority and moving its duties to the State Park and Recreation Commission.

Sen. Kenneth Schlientz, R-Curry-Quay, said: "In the public school finance formula compromise more leeway has been given back to the local level on how to spend school dollars. That was a major accomplishment." Sen. Schlientz also favored the additional authority for another 25 of one per cent municipal gross receipts tax handed cities by legislature. The added tax can be adopted only with voter approval.

Senate Republican Leader John Conway, Lincoln-Otero, said: "There's a total lack of direction from the fourth floor." Gov. Apodaca's office is on the capitol's fourth floor. Gov. Apodaca said Republican

senators were so unhappy with their leadership that a party caucus was held in the final days of the legislative session to oust Sen. Conway and Senate GOP Whip John Erick of Albuquerque from their leadership posts. Gov. Apodaca said: "It never developed but it showed a trend there."

The legislature created an additional district judgeship in the First Judicial District (Rio Arriba-Santa Fe-Los Alamos) and the Fifth Judicial District (Lea-Chaves-Eddy), effective next Jan. 1. Gov. Apodaca will appoint the new Fifth District judge. The new Fifth District judge will be elected this year.

The legislature voted \$900,000 for a New Mexico State University-operated livestock research center near Clayton. Sen. John Morrow, D-Cofax-Union-Harding-San Kiguel, sponsored the legislation. A bill by Rep. Von Rue Crawford, R-Hidalgo-Luna, extending 2 per cent lodger's tax authority to counties cleared the legislature. Rep. Crawford said a package of energy bills passed by the legislature "are vital to my area." He said Lordsburg, Deming and Las Cruces are under Federal Power Commission restrictions against new natural gas connections.




