

LeAnne Straley named Miss Lincoln County

LeAnne Straley of Carrizozo was crowned Miss Lincoln County 1976 here Saturday night by Jan Schooley, Miss New Mexico 1975.

She will also receive a \$400 scholarship to the school of her choice.

The daughter of Lee and Dorothy Straley, the 20-year-old, five-foot seven-inch brunette will represent the county at the Miss New Mexico Pageant July 15-17 in Hobbs.

Ms. Straley, a sophomore at New Mexico State University majoring in accounting, was valedictorian of her high school class and Carrizozo's Sun Duchess in 1975-76.

Her hobbies are reading, horseback riding and western dancing. Having studied piano for seven years, Ms. Straley selected the classical selection "Norwegian Concerto" for her talent presentation.

First runner-up and recipient of a \$200 scholarship, was Susie Abercrombie of Capitan. The 5'6" blonde sang Kris Kristofferson's "Help Me", while accompanying herself on the piano, for her talent exhibition.

Second runner-up was Cathy Wilson of Ruidoso, who performed a jazz dance to the tune of "That's Entertainment." She received a \$100 scholarship.

Miss New Mexico 1975 opened the pageant with a presentation of the seven contestants in denim skirts and red and white checked blouses, followed by the swimsuit and talent competitions and the final presentation in formal attire.

Bugs flunks drug test; trainer banned

Bugs Alive in 75 flunked a routine urine drug test after winning the \$30,040 West Texas Derby at Sunland Park April 11, resulting in the suspension of trainer J. B. Montgomery by track stewards.

The immediate reaction of local fans of Bugs varied from "I can't believe it", to "Bugs could have taken that field running on only three legs".

The stewards' action denies Montgomery race track privileges in New Mexico as well as denying entry in future races to all horses owned or trained by him until the mounts are transferred to a trainer or trainers meeting the stewards' approval.

After the announcement that the drug Niekthimide or choramine had been detected in the test, the stewards ruled that Bugs, the third richest quarter horse winner in history, would be able to compete again "only upon written report from an official track veterinarian that he is capable of racing without medication."

The colt has been a favorite to win the Kansas Derby, All American Derby and Rainbow Derby at Ruidoso Downs during the 1976 meeting. Bugs, with present earnings of \$539,611 had been given an excellent chance to surpass Easy Date and Timeto Thinkrich and amass \$1 million in winnings to become history's richest quarter horse.

"A dual sample," Ron Bessara, executive secretary of the NM Racing Commission, said Monday, "has been sent to Dr.

Francis Oozo of Industrial Laboratory in Denver" for verification of the positive test from the first sample.

"Montgomery has requested a hearing before the racing commission, but no date has been set."

In a statement to The Ruidoso News Monday, Al Rosa, general manager of Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs, said:

"The incident is now in the hands of the authorities, the New Mexico State Racing Commission. They are going to, I believe, react as they would react with any other situation of this type and, after an investigation, come up with a decision. That decision, I'm sure, will be fair.

"If indeed this has happened, I feel it is an unfortunate situation and it is difficult for me to realize that anything like this would even happen.

"If something positive can come of something negative, I would have to say the public can rest assured we (Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs) have and will continue to abide by the very strict rules and regulations of the racing commission.

"It has always been my policy to have the cleanest racing anywhere in the United States and we will continue to strive to achieve that end."

In two years of racing the speedy colt has won 12 starts out of 16 and failed to be in the money in just one race. During 1975, while trained by Montgomery, Bugs won 10 of 13 races.

Should the racing commission uphold the disqualification of Bugs, the first place money from the West Texas Derby, \$15,420, will go to Savannason, second-place finisher.

Vega defends deputy in Corona complaint

Lincoln County Sheriff Leandro Vega Jr., Tuesday defended his action in stationing Dale Tunnel as deputy sheriff to serve Corona, and Tunnel's performance of his duties, in an appearance before the

county commissioners. Corona mayor Ken Fuller has accused the sheriff's department of charging the village for inadequate law enforcement services at the last commission meeting.

According to Fuller, the county agreed to provide a deputy for Corona if the village would provide half of his salary (\$275 a month).

Fuller said Corona will refuse to pay the back salary of the current deputy, Dale Tunnel, because he is ineffective. He said since the deputy lives 10 miles out of town and is often gone on other county business, Corona isn't getting the protection it needs. The village has no police force.

Sheriff Vega told commissioners he believed Corona is receiving adequate police protection.

"Our objective is to have a deputy in the vicinity that can answer a call within ten minutes," Vega said. "Our man is situated in an ideal spot to protect both Corona and the numerous ranchers in the rural area surrounding the village.

"What Corona really wants is a town marshal and that's not the function of the sheriff's department. We have to cover the whole county and can't keep a deputy permanently stationed in one small area."

"It's impractical for a sheriff's deputy to act as full time constable for a city," county manager Les Olson said. "The deputy has to roam throughout the county to do his job."

According to Olson, the deputy's car (which Corona claims belongs to it), actually is the property of the county through a special grant and no funds ever came from the village to help finance it.

"Local police control isn't the job of the sheriff's department," commissioner John Sudderth said. "What Corona needs is a town marshal not a deputy."

The issue was tabled until the May 4 meeting of the commission.

In other matters the commissioners: —Approved without change the final draft of the 1976-77 fiscal year county budget. With the general fund budgeted within \$1,000 and a Revenue Sharing

surplus of \$4,534, the final budget will be sent to Santa Fe for review and then to a public hearing by the NM Department of Finance June 11 in Carrizozo.

—Approved a plat amendment for the third phase of the Alto Alps condominium complex. The amendment will add 28 units to the current 80 unit Planned Unit Development.

—Authorized the county manager to apply for a \$14,320 federal grant to provide funds for work in the road department, including signing, widening roads and bridges, graveling and removing roadside obstructions. If accepted, the grant will be matched with \$3,074 in county funds.

—Denied a request from the road department to switch from the regular five eight-hour day work week to a four ten-hour day week.

—Approved a request by the South Central Mountain Resource Association (SCM) to move its office to the top floor of the courthouse annex. The commission also authorized moving the county records from the basement to the upper level of the annex.

No burning

No outside burning of any kind is permitted within the village limits of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs. The use of barbecue grills, with charcoal, and fireplaces is permitted.

All outside fires are prohibited in the Bonito Fire District, including all property north of Ruidoso to Nogal and Capitan, bounded by Sierra Blanca and Nogal Peak on the west and Ft. Stanton and Goat Mountain on the east. Covered metal or stone barbecues may be used only in cleared areas.

Violators will be subject to prosecution.

Chamber of Commerce, in cooperation with promoter Til Thompson, a movie on motorcycle trials riding, featuring Gordon Farley who is also a film narrator, will be shown.

"The film and meeting," Thompson said, "is being held to acquaint Chamber directors, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs officials and anyone else interested in the conduct of a motorcycle Observed Trials run."

Thompson is seeking sanction for the event, to attract cyclists from southwestern states, to be held in Two Rivers

Park. The trials will be run over a prescribed course in the park with logs, rocks and other hazards placed along the route.

Spectators will be able to see the entire ride.

"Two Rivers Park," Thompson said, "is ideally situated and the layout of the grounds lends itself to designing a course that will meet all of the requirements for a sanctioned Observed Trials run."

The event is tentatively scheduled for the afternoon of Oct. 2.

"This is a country-wide pageant," director Ms. Fran Killen said, "and entries


may be made through May 5 by telephoning 336-4400, or by registering with me at the Ruidoso School of Dance on Sudderth."



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
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

religious services during the summer, with activities well advertised so that area visitors can attend the services.





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The SILVER LINING

This is being sent to you at high noon on April 19, Easter Monday, and the whole world is awakening with the joy of the Easter season. On this spring-time morning, the words from the prayer book for this day come to mind:

"Oh God, whose blessed son did manifest himself to his disciples in the breaking of bread; Open, we pray thee, the eyes of our faith, that we may behold thee in all thy works; through the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen."

And here is a verse from the Prophet, Isaiah that seems to have been written just for this day:

"For as the Earth bringeth forth her bud, and the garden causeth the things that are sown in it to spring forth; so the Lord God will cause righteousness and praise to spring forth before all the nations."

Proudly And Happily Down From The Hill

Every time I see a mother cow stepping down the rocky trail from the mountain leading her new-born calf, I can feel something like a little prayer and a song stirring in my heart. This is especially true when the young mother is being followed by her first calf. There is a dearly-loved spot on the place here we call "The Knoll." This knoll is a gathering place for the mother cows to show their calves to one another and for the calves to get acquainted and run races and play games and bed down together in the evening.

On the evening of Easter day there were four little new-born calves on the knoll, two of them first calves. They were in all stages between fast asleep and running with all their might. One little red first calf was curled up fast asleep on the lower end of the knoll while his mother grazed near by. His ears were standing up alert so that the calf was hearing even while he was asleep. He was listening to his mother's foot steps, ready to get up and follow when she got too far away. Half way across the knoll, a brown calf and a red one were standing together as if they were talking, resting from their running and jumping games. Then on the far side, next to the foot of Storm Mountain, a tiny black calf with a white face was running as fast as he could go. Back and forth, back and forth, a little black streak against the green mountain. He would rest a while and start racing with his shadow again.

The Calf Approaches A New World

When the calf comes down the trail following his mother for the first time, just as he gets to the bottom, he comes into a new world. The smell of the creek and the highway, the roaring of the trucks, the open spaces, the tall trees — all these stop him suddenly in his tracks, as if he had run into an invisible wall. He stands still as his mother walks a few steps, and if the calf waits too long, she stops.

The calf waits stiff-legged much as to say, "Just a minute here. What new kind of stampeding is this? Maybe his mother will turn her head back and give a soft lowing sound telling him everything is all right. Then he will walk on following his mother. Or maybe he will figure it out for himself that if it is all right for his mother it is all right for him, — all this new smells and sounds and sights.

Then often times — especially if the calf is very young and small — he will suddenly run

gun-shy of all the loud trucks, and the honking horns, the smell of gasoline and the great big rushing, stream of water. Where most of the calves never give all this a second thought, this little guy wants to be dead sure. That is why he stays close to his mother until he learns what he wants to know.

"I wonder what all this level country is here for?" Thinks the calf to himself. "It must be good for something."

Then maybe the smell of the creek reaches him filling his heart with joy, as it does with any child.

"I know," the calf says to himself. "This place is good for running." And with that he takes off, delighted to find a place where he can run full speed as far as he likes.

And as you watch the calves only five or six days old so at home in their new world, you see the work of God plainly before your eyes.

And the little prayers and songs of the new born calves are awakened within you bringing a lightness to your step and an abiding happiness to your heart:

"Down from the mountain top Stepping with pride She walks with her calf-baby Close by her side."



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

"If there had been any interest in the forum someone would have shown up at the first meeting April 13," McGuire said. "The three local people who volunteered to run the forum gave a lot of time and personal expense to this project and I don't feel like I want to waste anymore of their time."

"You know, it's easy to knock and criticize a system, but when it comes to taking some time to make constructive suggestions about how to improve it, most people back out," he said.




Cured meat additives under reconsideration

The process for curing your breakfast bacon may soon change. The use of nitrates and nitrites, the food additives which give cured meat its popular color, flavor and keeping quality, is being reconsidered by the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS). During a recent tour through New Mexico, Sara Beck, consumer specialist for APHIS, explained the current status of the additives to the Dona Ana County nutrition aids.

The APHIS representative explained that the Food and Drug Administration still lists the nitrates and nitrites as safe. However, the curing compounds have been implicated in the formation of cancer-producing substances (called nitrosamines) in meats under certain circumstances.

Therefore a highly specialized USDA panel has reviewed the current regulations concerning the additives and has developed a new proposal. The panel received comments from industry, researchers and consumers. Final approval of the proposal is still pending.

Miss Beck says that the proposal calls for the elimination of nitrates in all products except very dry cured meats, such as country hams, and fermented sausage, such as salami. In addition, the additives will be eliminated from all junior and toddler foods. APHIS is also hoping to decrease the initial amounts of

nitrates and nitrites used in all cured meats. In this way, the residual levels will be lowered, Miss Beck said.

The consumer specialist said that there are several beneficial aspects to nitrates and nitrites which should not be overlooked. For example, these food additives effectively inhibit the growth of Clostridium botulinum, the bacteria which causes botulism. The process which can be used to stop the formation of nitrosamines allows botulism to form in the meat.

Checking additives in meats is only one of the many services of APHIS. Miss Beck said that her organization strives to control and eradicate animal diseases, and fight plant disease by using inspections and quarantines.

In order to insure the safety and wholesomeness of meat and poultry products, APHIS inspectors check all aspects of meat processing. They inspect live animals to be sure they are not drugged, sick or diseased.

After the animals are slaughtered, APHIS inspectors oversee the processing to prevent adulteration of the meat. They check for potentially harmful residues from the animal's feed. The inspectors also see that only approved additives are used and that the formulas for the additives are correct. Sanitary conditions in the processing plants are also demanded.

Miss Beck reminded the nutrition aids that consumers

are also responsible for keeping food safe and wholesome. She pointed out that perishable foods should be quickly chilled and never left in a hot car.

In addition, all equipment and kitchen surfaces should be cleaned before food preparation begins. Miss Beck stressed to the nutrition aids the importance of washing hands and equipment after handling raw meats. These practices prevent bacteria on the raw meat from recontaminating the cooked food.

In her job as consumer specialist, Miss Beck travels across the country to inform consumers about food safety and good marketing practices. APHIS offers various consumer publications, concerning food safety, specific foods, such as hamburger and ham, and food preparation practices, such as making sack lunches and preparing foods during the summer.

Lectures were given during the past week in the Capitan, Corona, Carrizozo and Hondo schools to encourage 18-year-olds to register and vote. Mrs. Robert Beumer and Mrs. Coleta Elliott and Mrs. Lovelace conducted the sessions.

"We talked to these students," Mrs. Elliott said, "because only five per cent of the registered 18-year-olds voted in the last election."

Inside the Capital

SANTA FE—A range caterpillar infestation is indicated on rangeland in Lincoln, Chaves, San Juan, Colfax, Union, Harding and San Miguel Counties.

A rancher, Sen. John Morrow, D-Union-Cofax-Harding-San Miguel, also reported evidence of potential grasshopper infestation in Rio Arriba, Taos and San Juan Counties. North-eastern New Mexico ranchers will meet May 6 with state and federal officials at Gladstone, Union County, to consider a federal-state spraying program that would be started when range caterpillars hatch in early June. The potential infestation is regarded as the worst in New Mexico in three years.

A state review panel allotted \$160,000 to Espanola Schools for a cafeteria in emergency capital outlay money voted by the legislature. Clayton Schools received \$34,000 in state money to complete a junior high school and gymnasium. The \$34,000 will be coupled with a \$17,020 Clayton Schools cash balance with state approval to fund the project. Springer Schools received \$70,500 after a presentation by Springer Supt. Fred Pompeo supported by Sen. Morrow. Morrow also backed Clayton's request.

The Public School Emergency Capital Outlay Advisory Council rejected

requests for portables from Animas, Bloomfield, Lordsburg and Truth or Consequences Schools. A state survey showed only two of 67 portables now in use can be moved. They are at Cuba. In earlier action the state council approved \$940,000 for Penasco Schools and \$150,000 for Pojoaque Schools.

K. Barnett and Sons, Clovis, submitted the \$216,227 apparent low bid for 9.8 miles of overlay on US-70 in Roosevelt County from Portales north to the Curry County line in a State Highway Department bid opening. Other apparent low bids: Rio Arriba County; SEC Corp., Belen, \$50,893, on erosion control at Ghost Ranch Museum entrance on US-84, US-84 slide area east of Tierra Amarilla on US-84 one mile south of Colorado line; Lincoln County—Gardner Bridge Co., Albuquerque, \$131,051 on new bridge to replace span over the Rio Bonito on NM-37 south of NM-48 junction; Sandoval County—McReynolds Construction Co., Espanola, \$160,673, four miles of overlay on NM-4 west from Los Alamos-Sandoval County line.

The average teacher salary increase was \$1,184 or 11 per cent in the first 10 annual school budget hearings. Among the teacher pay raises were Los Lunas, up \$976 or 9.3 per cent; Ruidoso, up \$1,929 or 18; Hondo, up \$1,956 or 10.1;

Capitan, up \$1,504 or 14.3; Carrizozo, up \$1,049 or 9.8, and Corona, up \$1,291 or 13.1. The Ruidoso boost was the biggest in the first 10 budget hearings.

Lively primary races developed for legislative nominations. Among them were: San Juan County Senate District 2: Democrats — incumbent Sen. George Pennington, Bloomfield retail grocer, and Mountain Bell career employe Don Childers; Republicans—Marion Farnsworth and John B. Hall; San Juan House District 3—Democrats—incumbent Rep. D. Polk Brown, Flora Vista farmer-rancher and Carol W. Cloer, Bloomfield. Longtime newspaper publisher Dwight Payton, Aztec, is unopposed for the GOP nomination. A House member since 1967, Pennington was appointed in January to the Senate and Polk Brown was named as Pennington's House successor.

For a new district judgeship in Judicial District 3 (San Juan-McKinley) Aztec Republican Joseph F. Burns and Farmington Democrat James L. Brown will meet in the main event Nov. 2. Both are unopposed in the primaries.

Arizona Rep. Morris Udall campaigned in New Mexico for this state's 18 National Democratic Convention delegates for president. Ex-California Gov. Ronald Reagan bid for New Mexico GOP

presidential support in an Albuquerque speech. The New Mexico Reagan organization named these Reagan county finance chairmen: A. C. Davis, Colfax; Barney Bocock, Curry; Helen Morgan, DeBaca; Mrs. Buddy Westbrook, Lea; Billye Fagerquist and Fran Marley, Taos; Mrs. L. C. Sowers, Union, and Bob Blickenstaff, Valencia.

The State Highway Department reported a sharp increase in Fort Sumner area vandalism of highway signs. The replacement cost will be \$955 for 36 signs vandalized on US-60, NM-212 and NM-252.

Smokey Bear Historical State Park will be dedicated at Capitan in an elaborate ceremony May 15. State Park and Recreation Department planner Bob Findling said demolition of outbuildings, excavation and stockpiling for the new park have been started by the state agency staff with aid from Village of Capitan crews.

Work will start this summer on \$54,000 of improvements at Kit Carson Memorial State Park, Taos, designed by the State Park and Recreation Department. The improvements: A new irrigation system, plantings, electrical system improvements; relocation of a baseball field.

Gov. Jerry Apodaca appointed Fidel Gutierrez Jr. of Velarde to the Interstate

Stream Commission. Gutierrez has been Espanola district soil and water conservation supervisor eight years. Gutierrez replaced Richard Cook of Espanola on the ISC for a term ending in 1981.

State Parks Director Sam Graft promoted Noe Villarreal from administrative assistant to assistant director of field operations. Villarreal was formerly superintendent of Caballo Lake State Park near Truth or Consequences.

U. S. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-Albuquerque, is set to confer

MY side of the mountain

"Grandma, how do you know when you're in love?"

We sat on the boulders stewn around the Santa Barbara beach watching my three younger sisters tumble in the waves . . . I, a baby-fat teenager in my first two-piece waist-high bathing suit, and she, a woman you somehow couldn't quite call old.

There was no answer for a long, long time as we watched a tiny sand crab wriggle into the damp sand. Then she looked up from under the broad-brimmed straw hat pulled firmly down over her clipped white hair with a gold sash.

"When the time comes, you'll know," she said and looked away, out into the ocean.

It wasn't the answer I'd expected from this unconventional woman who, at 85, still walked through puddles instead of going around them. It was vague and I wanted concrete guidelines.

After a few minutes she spoke again. "When I was 18 years old I left Philadelphia with my youngest brother George to marry a man in Florida who had proposed to me earlier that year."

"We went by train," remembered the woman who had been orphaned at age five and raised by a grandmother who resented the extra responsibility of three growing youngsters.

It was summer, 1925 and the air hung heavy and humid around the rows of identical red brick houses that led to the train station.

George, 16 and a head taller than his sister, was excited and boisterous . . . it was the first time either of them had been out of Pennsylvania. Edith, her thick rimmed glasses tucked away in her suitcase and her best black bloomers pressed and spotless, tried to look old and mature.

However, the closer they got to Florida and her fiance, the less composed and more apprehensive she became. By the time the pair reached Washington, D.C. she'd hit on a marvelous plan . . . why not stop and visit the nation's capitol for a few days since they might never be back this way again?

The city was so fresh and new to them after squalid Philadelphia, they stayed a week, oblivious to what the vacation was doing to their meager savings. When Edith, got their motel bill she was

thunderstruck . . . it was so excessive, but there was nothing to do but pay it.

Although nearly penniless, Edith was determined not to return home to her bitter grandmother and so she came up with a daring idea . . . she would disguise herself as a boy and she and George would hitchhike the rest of the way to Florida.

They had been standing on the dusty, dirt road outside Washington for several hours before they flagged down a slow-moving Chevrolet touring car.

"Hop in boys," the man in the car shouted over his noisy engine in a definite Philadelphia accent. His name was Tom and he was a WWI veteran machinist who was on his first vacation in five years. He offered to drive the pair all the way to Florida.

"You should have seen his face when he found out I was a girl," my grandmother laughed, her blue eyes mischievously twinkling.

"We hit it off right away . . . he told me that he was 26 and I said I was 23," the memory made her smile again. "He was really 32."

"Two weeks later, after parts of the car falling off, spending the night in one of the country's first tourist camps and working at odd jobs to keep from going hungry, Tom asked me to marry him in Jacksonville, Florida," she said. "That man is your grandfather today."

One week after the small private wedding, she sent her former fiance a telegram telling him she'd married someone else.

"But grandmother, how did you know you'd made the right choice?" I asked unbelievably.

"I knew," she said firmly. "But Gran . . ."

She interrupted my protest. "We'd better get your sisters home, the wind's picking up," she said, standing up and brushing the sand off her long skirt. "Come on girls!" she hollered over the wind and the four of us followed her mountain goat climb back up the cliffs and to the car.

My grandmother died of cancer several years after that day at the beach, still married to the man she'd met while hitchhiking nearly 50 years earlier. I never got to tell her that she was right all along . . . when the time came, I knew.

SOFT ON CRIMINALS

Do the courts in the United States—a country renowned for its Constitutional guarantees to the right to life of its citizens—now consider human life to be so cheap and of such little value that thieves and murderers can destroy innocent lives, with little or no possibility that they will be punished for their crimes?

It is not an idle question. Consider:

—In Washington, D.C., a confessed murderer—who bragged, on tape and on camera, that he had committed murder as a paid "hit man"—was arrested and arraigned in the D.C. Superior Court early in March. Within hours after his arrest, the man was freed by the Court and back on the streets, having posted a mere \$1,000 bond. The judge cited a technicality in the law.

—On October 11, 1974, in Rockville, Maryland, a young hoodlum with a sawed-off shotgun blasted away the life of a young, 18-year-old, clean-cut Montgomery College student, Mahlon McCracken. Indicted for first-degree murder and three handgun felonies, the killer "plea bargained" and pled guilty to second-degree murder. For this cold-blooded crime, the killer was given a four-year prison sentence, which under liberal parole rules, means that he could be

released in a year or less.

—Frank Carrington, in his book, THE VICTIMS (Arlington House Publishers) tells of a hideous rape-murder in Iowa. The defendant had been advised of his "Miranda" rights three times. But, because he voluntarily told the police where the body of his victim was buried, he was released by a Federal Court judge.

Folks in the Washington, D.C., area were shocked by a mass murder which took place in early March of this year. Five innocent victims, including a Nigerian couple studying at Luther Rice College to prepare themselves for missionary service in their country, were slaughtered at a popular family restaurant by (at this writing) an unknown killer. But, why not? Surely, murderers are encouraged by the fact that convicted and confessed killers are being given prison sentences less than that which they might have received for cheating on their income tax.

District of Columbia Police Chief Maurice J. Cullinane calls our criminal justice system a "revolving door for criminals."

Isn't it about time that we begin to remove those judges from our courts, by impeachment or other means, whose sympathies are clearly with the criminals rather than with their victims?—Deming Graphic
