## AIRPORT COMMITTEE TO CONTINUE DEVELOPMENT PLANS

# Use Board 'denies' airport

The New Mexico Multiple Use Advisory Board Wednesday announced its denial of a jet-capable airport on Fort Stanton lands to the state director of the Bureau of Land Management in a meeting at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

"Use for such purpose would be incompatible with and too disruptive of other present and planned uses more beneficial to national public interests," the board stated.

Arthur Zimmerman, state BLM director, is expected to make the same recommendation to the federal BLM which, in turn, will make its recommendations to the Secretary of the Interior.

Although the \$60,000 feasibility study for the airport has not been completed and no application filed by any of the political

entities involved, Zimmerman requested and received the advisory board's advice.

Upon hearing the decision, Fred D'Antonio, owner of the major portion of Site A — not selected for the proposed airport — charged, "You people on the board are refuting recommendations of aviation experts."

Brant Calkin, board member representing natural and cultural values, said, "The Teton Dam was designed by experts, too."

Bill Darmitzel, representing mining interests as a board member, said, "We are not attempting to usurp authority, but were told no site is available beyond the 15-mile radius. Responses to our questions were not definitive. I have stressed to the board that it should check into other sites and not take the arbitrary word of others

that no site is available."

Paul Eaton, Roswell attorney, pointed out to the board that it should advise only the Director of the BLM, not the airport study committee or others.

The Sierra Blanca Airport Development Committee opened its study meeting as the Advisory Board meeting continued. Fred Heckman, chairman, prefaced the meeting, "Our purpose is to identify a feasible site, gather a mass of data on the 16-point program, examine it and present our findings to the respective governments, regardless of what's going on next door (BLM meeting). Ours is not an action committee. The recommendations we subsequently make to the entities will then call for a political decision on the part of the cities and their people."

Heckman is no longer associated with

the Mesalero Apache Tribe, but did agree to finish his work for them on the airport study, he said.

Volume IV, entitled Financial Plans, of the Airport Master Plan was presented by Earl Cook of Herkenhoff-Parsons, Albuquerque and Los Angeles. Committee members were advised by Cook that the three-phase development plan would cost an approximate \$30 million.

First phase of the plan, in response to actual, not projected, air traffic in the Ruidoso area, is the "most critical area of the entire project," according to Cook and carries a price tag of \$12.5 million over a two-year period. Figures are based on 1975 costs.

The second phase, including widening and lengthening runways, expanding parking area and terminal building along with NAV-AD additions will cost an estimated \$7.2 million.

Phase Three, projected up to 1995, calls for \$10.3 million.

"Phases will probably be realized in sub-phases, depending on demand," Cook said.

After hearing reports on projected operational costs, revenues and cash flow analysis, Heckman said, "Debt retirement is not a capacity of this airport or of most other airports. As a public facility, it can pay its own operating costs, but the capitalization costs must be paid with public monies."

Financial resources are four-fold: airport revenue, local funds, state and regional monies and federal revenues. It was stressed that sources of funding, at this point, are strictly potential.

"Ultimately, the public will make the final decision on whether or not it wants and needs an airport and if it will support the cost of building one," Heckman said.

# I'm Gorgeous grabs Rainbow Derby win

I'm Gorgeous, a 9-5 second favorite ridden by Ronald Banks, generated a willing stretch drive and swept to a three-quarter-length victory in Sunday's 12th running of the Rainbow Quarter Horse Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly, owned by Grafton Moore of Flint, Mich., hauled in one of racing's top prizes. First place was worth \$110,958. The gross purse in the 440-yard duel topped out at \$336,208.

Dash For Cash, the 4-5 public choice,

was foiled in his attempt at his sixth straight win. But he managed to save face by closing briskly for a second-place finish and a purse of \$53,313. Jerry Nicodemus was up.

Third went to A Zure Request, a 9-1 shot piloted by Terry Lipham. The chestnut colt earned \$27,556.

I'm Gorgeous clocked the distance in 22.24 seconds on a track labeled good. The mutual payoffs were \$5.00 to win, \$2.80 to place, \$2.60 to show. Backers of Dash For Cash had to be content with \$2.60 both to place and show. The latter is owned by Anne and B. F. Phillips, Jr. of Frisco, Texas. A Zure Request, the property of the Angelina Cattle Co. of Laredo, Texas, dished out a show price of \$3.20.

I'm Gorgeous came out of the No. 10 post and was well off the early-dueling. Maryon's Rocket, a 40-1 outsider, went flashing into the lead. But before the filly really got underway, she glided inward a bit, made contact with Dendra's Uh Oh, and the latter engaged in some slight nudging with Dash For Cash.

Dash For Cash appeared to have some difficulty getting his footing. Jockey Nicodemus quickly went to the whip and the colt dug in, but he soon found himself almost desperately out of range.

Native Creek, a 7-2 shot, also had solid early luck. The early chase was also taken

up by Jet Charger 2, a 50-1 pick, and Southern Gentlemen, who packed odds of 30-1.

Ironically, none of the early pace-makers were able to keep their power going after the halfway point. Maryon's Rocket appeared to be pretty well spent at that point, but she courageously held the lead until about 50 yards from the wire. By then, she had no more to give and sunk

back into the pack.

I'm Gorgeous, on the other hand, really picked up momentum as she neared the wire. When Maryon's Rocket tossed in the towel, I'm Gorgeous zipped into the clear. In the final yards, she was wheeling with great authority.

## Sewer system check nearing completion

An inspection of Ruidoso's sewer system is expected to be completed by July 23, Bud Decker, foreman for the Southern Line Cleaning Co., of Casselberry, Fla., said today.

The testing and inspection of the system is necessary to enable the village to apply for an Environmental Protection Agency grant, which must be obtained in connection with the Regional Wastewater Plan to serve Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

"The present system can be rated in fair condition," Decker said, "which means that repairs and line replacement are needed in some of the mains."

Smoke has been used in the mains to detect leaks, and dye has also been employed in the testing to determine the extent of infiltration of surface water into the sewage system.

The smoke and dye tests have been completed and the next step is to inspect the entire system with a television probe to detect leaks not visible to the eye, or discovered with smoke or dye.

The village trustees, upon receipt of the final report in August, will determine if the cost of repairing the system extensively is advisable, compared to the cost of treating excessive gallonage now infiltrating the lines.

## Two rattlers killed here

Two rattlesnakes met their demise near here over the Bicentennial weekend.

One had his head squashed under the heel of a tad . . . the other perished of lead poisoning . . . and in both instances, never let it be said that all concerned weren't complaining about life being dull . . . read on.

"I knew he was bad so I stomped him," said six-year-old Lance Willard, son of Dr. and Mrs. Lynn Willard, after he killed a rattlesnake near their home in Agua Fria over the weekend.

Mrs. Willard said their son was walking from his fort back to their home when he heard a "hissing" noise . . . Lance took the

rattler home to Mom. "I sure was glad it was dead," Mrs. Willard said. "Lance wouldn't let us throw it away so we saved the rattles, froze the snake and took it to the (Ruidoso Animal) clinic."

The snake was about a foot long, had three rattles and was identified as a brown diamond back.

Lance's mother said, "Our neighbors killed a three-foot rattler in the same vicinity two summers ago."

In a second incident Monday, Francis Knowland of Palo Verde Slopes said, "I heard a hissing noise in the backyard, the dogs were acting strange and I thought the butane tank was leaking. I went charging

out the door and discovered a snake."

Bob Arnett, Knowland's neighbor, shot the snake which measured some three-feet long.

Mrs. Knowland said the snake was "greenish in color" and was bloody and bruised where the rattles had been torn off. She expressed her appreciation of Mike Graham's, Ruidoso Downs patrolman, coming to verify the snake being dead. "We're not even in their jurisdiction," she said.

"I think they might be coming in with the hay. In this hot weather, I'll watch very carefully from now on as I understand they travel in pairs," Mrs. Knowland said.

## Select horse sale opens here Friday

The fourth annual Select Summer Sale of Thoroughbreds and Quarter Horses gets underway Friday in the All-American Sales Arena at Ruidoso Downs.

represents the best quality in the history of the Summer Sale. "We're especially strong in the area of horses-in-training and thoroughbred mares," Thompson said.

Ruidoso stakes winner, Requested Honor. Plead Away also produced the stakes-winning Danville Miss.

Caldwell also serves as the auctioneer for the upcoming All-American Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs. That's the largest and most prestigious quarter horse sale in the world. He's also the director of auctions at Keeneland, Ky., and handles all four sales there — including the Summer Sale, which is the largest horse sale in the world. The last edition grossed over \$17 million, averaging about \$54,000 per head.

The two-session venue extends into Saturday, starting at 7:30 p.m. each day. A total of 171 head have been catalogued, and that represents quite a hike over last year when 137 horses were sold.

A highpoint of the '76 edition is a 36-head partial disbursement by Gordon B. Howell of Sunland Park, N.M. The group includes quarter horses and thoroughbreds.

Jockey Jerry Nicodemus entered Fairly Irish, a mare who could possibly emerge as the sale topper. Fairly Irish is the dam of the thoroughbred Barlaris. A winner of \$36,836 in his career, Barlaris is now gaining stature as a quarter horse sire. Fairly Irish's value figures to be enhanced considerably by the fact she's in foal to the 1976 All-American Futurity winner, Rocket Wrangler.

In addition, Caldwell is also the man at the gavel for the world's two largest standardbred sales — the Harrisburg Sale in Pennsylvania and the Tattersalls Sale in Lexington, Ky.

The Summer Sale is open to horses of all ages, with the exception of quarter horse yearlings. According to sale manager Richard Thompson, this year's stock

Dash For Cash, much to his credit, reclaimed plenty of lost terrain but simply couldn't fight off I'm Gorgeous' crushing attack. A Zure Request was also rolling powerfully at the end, and slipped through between horses. The difference between Dash For Cash and A Zure Request was a slim nose.

I'm Gorgeous, trained by D. Don Farris, boosted her '76 record to 3-0-0 from five starts. Her sophomore scorecard now shows earnings of \$118,059. Her career bank account is now up to \$140,650.

Here's the way the rest of the field checked in: 4th—Maryon's Rocket (owned by Dr. Joe and Sue Neff of Big Spring, Texas), earning \$14,601; 5th—Dedra's Uh Oh (Redmac Leases, Inc., of Pleasanton, Texas), \$13,328; 6th—Miss Hay Bug (W. D. Barnett and Robert Ballenger of Paoli, Okla.), \$12,995; 7th—Southern Gentlemen (Ethel Bird Estate and Charles A. Bird of Midland, Texas), \$12,861; 8th—Hyjonjet (Louie Allen of Allen, Texas), \$12,328; 9th—Jet Charger 2 (Gordon W. and Juanita Crone of Lakin, Kans.), \$11,995; 10th—Native Creek (Tom Roden of Odessa, Texas), \$11,329.

Immediately after the running of the Derby, J. C. Wiley, the jockey of Dedra's Uh Oh, lodged a charge of interference against Maryon's Rocket. The stewards reviewed the video tapes of the race and promptly rejected the plea.

Dash For Cash, who earned his favorite's role by setting the top qualifying time last week in a brilliant five-length win, still managed to add more luster to his reputation. His runner-up prize of \$53,313 beefed his career income up to \$223,614.

Lord Winslot, the \$5,000 bargain horse who won the recent \$413,130 Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, returns to action in Thursday's early-starting card.

The gelding will be going after the \$300,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity—the second leg of quarter horse racing's coveted Triple Crown.

Thursday's agenda, which gets moving at 12 noon, will consist of 17 400-yard trials. On Friday, another 17 elimination trials will be offered. The starting time, once again, is 12 noon.

The two-day slate, which puts a total of 325 youngsters in action, comprises the first elimination round. Those chalking up the top 25 times on Thursday will join the top 25 survivors from Friday in the second-elimination stanza booked for Saturday, July 17.

The July 17 runoff will determine the field for the regionally-televised finale on Aug. 1.

Lord Winslot, owned by Jim Jay of Arkoma, Okla., looms as a giant in the current two-year-old crop. He'll go in the 16th race on Thursday. Jackie Martin, his regular rider, will be back in the driver's seat.

Owner Jay purchased Lord Winslot as a yearling, eight unsees. He paid \$5,000, and acquired one of the best bargains in quarter horse history. The gelding has been to the post nine times so far, and racked up six wins and two seconds.

Ole Sport, a winner of \$101,018 so far, puts his money-hungry appetite back in action on Friday's program at Ruidoso Downs.

Ole Sport, the property of the Ryan and Walling Stables of Pearland, Texas, drew into Friday's 16th race. Jeff Arritola will be back at the helm. Earlier this year, Ole Sport began making a big impression at Delta Downs in Louisiana, where he polished off the Ole South Futurity by a nose. The fans had him down as a 3-5 favorite.

Then he brought his growing reputation to Ruidoso Downs, where he easily swallowed up his first-round elimination try in the Kansas Futurity. In the second elimination round, he sailed in third to Lord Winslot as a 7-2 favorite. But that was good enough to send him into the \$413,130 grand finale.

Underestimated by the fans, Ole Sport got away as a 15-1 shot in the Kansas showdown, but closed steadily to finish second and haul in a whopping \$56,730. The colt's record now stands at 4-1-2 from eight starts.





# Inside the Capital

by Fred Buckles

(Legislation prescribing definite sentences would turn the criminal justice system "into another gigantic bureaucracy," the late ex-State Supreme Court Chief Justice David Carmody said seven weeks before his death April 25 at his retirement home in Florida. Retired newspaperman Lee Taylor of Santa Fe reports Carmody's views in an interview in this guest column for Fred Buckles.)

BRADENTON, FLA. — "There is simply not enough responsibility in partisan politics either to or assumed by

political parties," said Judge Carmody. "All candidates, even in general election, are engaged in personal politics based on performance and guidance of their own organizations. As a consequence, they feel no responsibility after election to their political party. "Our political life is being smothered by our burgeoning bureaucracy. We have entirely too much bureaucracy at all levels of government. We have operated on the theory that the solution to all problems is more money and more staff. We have not only failed to solve the problems of the

day, we have created a problem bureaucracy that has become our dominant political force." Concern with governmental reform, especially judicial system reform, was almost a Carmody lifetime objective. He resigned in April, 1969, as a Supreme Court justice to run successfully for delegate to the state constitutional convention held that year. He said his primary purpose was a concentrated effort to remove politics from the court system. "I failed," he sadly admitted, "because I was a little too idealistic. If I had it to do over again, I would take a different approach to take into account the political ties and ambitions of politicians who influence decisions affecting the judiciary." But he had already accomplished more



judicial reform than any man in New Mexico history. In the mid-1960's he was instrumental in organizing a citizens conference on New Mexico courts. He was a prime mover in obtaining legislative enactment of four or five reform measures recommended by the conference. Among his achievements in that field: A unified court system; establishment of an intermediate Court of Appeals; creation of a commission of discipline and retirement of judges; and abolition of the justice of the peace system. Although Judge Carmody gave major credit to former State Sen. Fabian Chavez, then chairman of the legislative Judicial Systems Study Committee, it was Carmody who supplied the ideas and impetus for the judicial reform movement. Before he became a Supreme Court

justice in 1959 he served 11 years as judge in the old First Judicial District — McKinley, San Juan, Santa Fe, Los Alamos and Rio Arriba Counties. Previously, he was a district attorney for another 11 years. He served New Mexico courts a total of more than 32 years. What was his reaction to efforts for legislation prescribing definite sentences? "I think the whole idea is ridiculous," Carmody snapped. "It would turn the entire criminal justice system, including the courts, into another gigantic bureaucracy." He said pre-determined sentences would require only an administrative function with plea bargaining assuming the major responsibilities of the judge and jury. He said the two chief duties of the judge are to insure fair presentation of evidence

and argument in a trial and to attempt to fit the sentence to the offense upon conviction of a crime. He readily admitted there are many cases with variation of sentences among judges. Much variation, he said, is due to circumstances peculiar to the case, but equally as much is due to a personal prejudice of the presiding judge. "My particular prejudice," he said, "was the hot check artist. I'm sure I gave stiffer sentences to paper hangers than any other judge in the state." He said some variation in sentences, perhaps a large percentage in some districts, is because the judge has to satisfy current public opinion to be re-elected. He based much of his effort to remove the judiciary from the election process on this point.





## Tricentennial Century

wild horse and crocodile, the dolphin and the whale, for space or food or sometimes just to kill. We are fighting one another for scraps of food, for standing room in the

crowded holds, or often just because we like to fight. Worst of all, we are now arming ourselves with clever new weapons for a final battle over the total command of the ship.

What will be the end of our voyage? The ship cannot actually sink, because there is no water in space. It will move on through

the cosmos for billions of years, until some ultimate solar explosion consumes it. But, unless we soon begin to treat it with more regard for what it is, it will complete its





# Inside the Capital by Fred Buckles

**SANTA FE** — Costs are heavy for New Mexico legislators' out-of-state official travel, interim committee meetings and regular lawmaker sessions.

Last year the out-of-state travel bill was a big \$40,323. Lawmakers also received a whopping \$109,370 in 1975 for per diem and mileage for service on 13 interim committees.

Among the totals for out-of-state trips, interim committees and 64 days of legislative sessions in 1975: Rep. H. B. Barnard, D-Clovis, over-all total, \$3,625; interim committee compensation, \$1,022; sessions, \$1,603; Rep. Dan Berry, D-Eunice, total, \$4,152; interim committee, \$1,527; sessions, \$2,625; Rep. John Bigbee, R-Lincoln-DeBaca-Torrance-Guadalupe, total, \$3,530; interim committees, \$956; sessions, \$2,574; Rep. The State Supreme Court removed Santa Rosa Magistrate Robert Serrano, 46, from office June 30 on recommendation of the State Judicial Standards Commission. The commission reported Serrano converted \$1,200 in state money to his own use, failed to give proper receipt for fines, falsified records and failed to account for state money properly and timely. Serrano, a magistrate since the magistrate system was created in 1969, was salaried at \$11,550 a year. Magistrates' pay mounted to \$12,500 July 1. Serrano was re-elected to a 4-year term in 1974. Gov. Jerry Apodaca will appoint a successor who will be required to run in the general election Nov. 2 for the balance of the term ending in 1978. Both Democratic and Republican central

committees can pick nominees for the general election. Serrano's lawyer, Donald Martinez, Las Vegas, did not attend the hearing.

Santa Fe Municipal Judge Romualdo Chavez vacated a hearing until after July 15 for Sen. Matt Chacon on drunken and reckless driving charges because of a full docket. Chacon was booked after a Santa Fe accident.

The State Supreme Court upheld New Mexico's mandatory death penalty law. The state court decision allows the trial of Birt Edington, charged with murder in the May 4, 1974, shooting death of another man in Hidalgo County, to proceed. The U.S. Supreme Court upheld the death penalty, ruling on five cases in the South. But New Mexico Atty. Gen. Toney Anaya said the U.S. Supreme Court decision voids New Mexico's death penalty law because of its mandatory provision. He said the 1977 Legislature will review the piping hot issue.

Gov. Apodaca appointed Mrs. Totie Norton Williams, Truth or Consequences, as Sierra County magistrate, replacing the late George R. Schaaf. Mrs. Williams has been magistrate clerk for four years.

New Mexico Republicans re-elected Mrs. Frances Shipman of Pojoaque as national GOP committeewoman for four years, effective at the national powwow. In the all-Republican New Mexico national GOP get-together delegation are Mrs. Cobble McKinney, Clovis; Sam Laughlin, Artesia; Betsy Reimer, Belen; Fred Collins, Northern Eddy County rancher, and John L. Peters, Clovis.

Mrs. McKinney is on the national GOP convention permanent organization committee. For a 3-month March-May span the one-fourth per cent gross receipts municipal tax produced these big gains over the same 1975 months: Taos, up 75 per cent; Red River, 68; Cimarron, 67; Chama, 63, and Mesilla, 59.



The Labor Day telecast of the \$1 million All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs is already quite a success — at least so far as sponsorship is concerned. Thad Sandstrom, president of the All-American Network, reports the show is already sold out. The sponsors are Cadillac, Budweiser, Carnation-Albers Calf Manna, Radio Shack, Faberge and U.S. Tobacco. The show will be beamed to about 175 stations coast-to-coast, reaching an estimated 30 million viewers. On Aug. 1, the All-American Network will televise the Rainbow Futurity to about six million viewers in 13 western states, plus the West Indies.

Thomas Burr, 15, a groom for trainer

Jimmy Claridge, suffered a severe shock when he apparently touched a hot walker at Ruidoso Downs. The mechanical device had shorted out during the recent rains. Trainer S. Dean Brewer rushed to the boy's aid. There was no sign of respiration or pulse. He administered artificial respiration, got him breathing again and continued until the ambulance arrived. Burr was taken to Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital. Doctors report he is in stabilized condition and resting comfortably.

Beautiful Joe took an impressive step up to \$6,500 claiming ranks in Sunday's fourth race and made a shambles of the competition at seven furlongs. The gelding led wire to wire for a nine-length victory under Carlos Rivas. Whitey Nolen does the

conditioning.

Pine's Easter Jet would have made his papa proud Saturday. The four-year-old came from behind to notch a neck victory as a 7-1 shot in the 440-yard race named for his sire — the Jet Deck Stakes. A couple of others — Jet Comanche and Sompin Lika Jet — were also by Jet Deck but finished up the track.

The mud could have been the big factor, but there were two high payoffs on Friday. The fifth quinella returned \$378.00, thanks to Misty Will (10-1) and Miss Chomplon (34-1). Only two fans collected on the Big Q. A \$2-ticket combining McCoy's Regards (20-1) and I Have Heard (9-1) with Lela Barnes Bug (1-1) and Miss Taffy Jet (14-1) — paid \$8,942.

Jockey Tony Trujillo had some rough moments during Friday's 6 1/2-furlong Governor's Handicap. Trujillo made his move on the rail aboard Trail Driver just before the finish. The gelding lost his footing in the mud and almost hit the rail. Trujillo was thrown off balance, but Trail Driver regained his footing and won by 1 1/2 lengths.

There were some sharp claiming buys Thursday. In the 350-yard third race for Baitling Bar, the winner, and Billy Mack Calhoun claimed Top Pud, who ran second. In the 6 1/2-furlong sixth race for \$2,500 claimers Star Burner pulled in second and was claimed by Rex H. Hazard. Boo Boo Shoo finished third as the new property of Sam Coats. Bower's Misty, the winner of the 12th race at 5 1/2 furlongs, went to Charles Jackson for \$1,500.

Horses to Watch: Lockridge for a sharp two-length win at four furlongs from far off the pace as a 23-1 shot his first time out; Carhusian for some persistent wire-to-wire work under Willie Lovell and a two-length victory in Saturday's mile long eighth race for \$3,000 claimers; Freeway 77 for some strong moves to the outside to nab a two-length victory at 870 yards in Saturday's ninth race.

"Royal" blood proved overpowering in Friday's last race for \$2,500 claimers at four furlongs. Princess Quill notched the

2 1/4-length victory as a 17-1 shot. Princess Gossip was second at 27-1. Johnny Boone offspring took the top of the cake in Saturday's New Mexico Quarter Horse Association Stakes. Bonnie Boone won the 350-yard event by a length. Melody's Boone pulled in second. Another sired by Johnny — Rebecca Boone — finished further back.





In the trainer totals E. Jolly Driskill and H. Don Farris were deadlocked with four apiece. Farris took the crown with less work. He sent only seven horses trackward to Driskill's 13. But both had other things to crow about. Driskill walked off with the Futurity Prep Stakes. Farris took the main honors when his filly I'm Gorgeous notched a 3/4-length victory in the \$338,208 Rainbow Derby on Sunday.

Bob Arnett still leads with 19 wins.

Racing picks up on Thursday and continues through Sunday, Thursday and Friday programs kick off at an early 12 noon to accommodate 17 trials each day for the upcoming \$300,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity.

Saturday and Sunday first post is the regular 1:30 p.m. The highlight of the weekend is Sunday's Peter Hurd Handicap for three-year-olds. A \$6,500-added purse will be split up at the end of six furlongs.

# The Silver Lining

## The Mescalero Apache Reservation Fifty Years Later

On the Fourth of July I was thinking of you and hoping and praying you had a wonderful fourth. I was born under the lucky star, and Lady Luck has never turned her smiling face from me along the trail of life. So, of course, the "Luck of the Irish" was with me on the Bicentennial Fourth of July. In other words, I had a grand day all around on the fourth. And today, the fifth, I send up a prayer of thanks to God who brings us all blessings and watches over us so faithfully and kindly.

I have had a dream for several years of getting brothers Lynn and Mark and

maybe nephew Scott Joseph Storm and myself to drive into Mescalero, all of us in the 1917 Velle in which we all arrived on the reservation on July 2, 1926. This did not quite work out.

So Shady Logan, my little "spirit dog" and guardian, and I made a little after-fifty-years trip of our own on the Bicentennial Fourth of July.

Along in mid-afternoon we drove up through the reservation. On either side, the mountain forest was in its glory. Pine trees of all sizes were decorated with little spires of new growth, pointing like little ceremonial candles of light green and silver pointing to the blue sky. All amongst the "pines and pines and the shadow of pines" the ground was green and the wild flowers here and there smile their bright

colors. We saw the yarrow, tiger lily, wild wall flower and the Scotch blue bell and the blue fair flax, two of our Mother's favorites.

Shady loves the reservation. He knows the Indians like him and that many of them consider him a little Manatou or Medicine Dog. He knows I am writing about him now. He has crawled under the chair and is dozing just under the typewriter.

The Apache Summit has ever held a fond spot in my heart from the early days in the 1917 Velle car. We rejoiced that we had reached the summit on the journey from El Paso. For now we could laugh at car trouble because we could just about coast all the way on the dirt road to home in Glencoe.

We always stopped to "rest and be thankful" at the summit, going either way. I still stop when I reach the summit, to be thankful and to remember. So Shady and I stopped at the summit going up, and here waiting for us by the roadside was the pink wild rose, a sacred little flower blooming brightly in July. Here at the house they bloom in May. This little flower friend of many years brought the spirit of loved ones close around me, and we went on down to Mescalero. We went down a little ways on the new road to where we could see "Round Mountain", that beloved landmark of Apache land. I have never seen this table-topped butte more beautiful. Rain clouds were still lingering down toward Tularosa and Round Mountain was a glowing pink sentinel, an airy mustic guardian of the Indian country, seeming to rise in the air and look out over all the surrounding land.

The sight of this long-cherished enchanted mesa always brings a little jump of joy inside your heart. So now Shady and I had a good beginning for our fifty an-

niversary trip. With the spirits of Mother, Joe, Lynn and Mark close and fondly near us, we began the trip to Mescalero. As we drove, I tried to turn our memory back fifty years.

**The Natural Beauty Still The Same**  
The red-colored pinon and cedar hills high on either side on the way to Mescalero are little changed with time. There they stand a promise of the cool breath of pines later on. It was much the same as always until you got to Mescalero. The same inspiration as you rounded the bend and saw the pine trees loom in view.

The magnificent cathedral of Saint Joseph, the community center and the tribal store. All this was new. We stopped to reflect on this.

Fifty years back, there were many old time Indians who had figured in their colorful history, and could tell of hunting deer with stone-point arrows. There were teepees all over the reservation on the first trip up, no houses could be seen.

You could not help but wonder how these children of nature who had lived the idyllic life of hunting and wild food gathering, migrating over their beloved homeland with the seasons -- how could these people you thought, keep pace in this new strange world that had opened up to them.

The answer was everywhere plain at Mescalero. What marvelous institutions that have developed: a hospital, shopping center, community center and a museum. All a magnificent tribute to the greatness of these people.

Greater still is the care they have taken of their mountain homeland in all its natural splendor. From one end to another it is a wonderland of mountain loveliness.

**Beautiful Horses**  
Another thing that is the same as fifty

years ago are the green fields among the pines where the horses of all colors graze contentedly.

Along the way young Indians were riding their horses, native pride and the love of horses showing on their strikingly handsome Apache Indian features.

**On Up To The Ceremonial Grounds**  
We drove through the old part of Mescalero and on toward the ceremonial grounds. The teepees and long brush arbor were there on the high point.

Before you made the turn to go up there, just east lay the old celebration grounds where the rodeo, foot races, baseball and other games were held. There was the old pine tree still standing just behind home plate. Behind the pine tree is sloping ground, a natural bleachers or rustic stadium. I remember the good-natured joking of the players by the spectators. No one gets more fun out of any kind of game than a Mescalero Apache.

**Who Remembers This 1917 Car?**  
We started up to the ceremonial grounds when the sky let loose a down-pour of rain and hail. This soon cleared and the world was full of drifting mist and rainbows.

Sometime ago brother Lynn gave me a photograph of the old Velle which he now owns and with which he wins all the antique car prizes.

I carried this photo with me and walked up to the feast grounds. There was the large ceremonial teepee made of large Douglass Fir, and over here was the long brush arbor, the kitchen, beside the fires by which I used to lie and listen to the all night singing to the beating of the drum. There was the wood pile, now neat cord wood, but in years past was just logs to be cut up with an axe. I remember how I had chopped the Indians some wood and they had given me the name "Chee-dyn-tse" (woodchopper). A few still call me this name, also "mule rider".

Suddenly a flood of memories hit me where I live and my heart came up in my mouth, as suddenly I went back fifty years.

I went up to the sound booth where announcer Clifford Williams let me talk over the mike. I made a brief little talk to the Indians saying I had first arrived amongst them fifty years ago and I was happy to be here today among my Indian friends.

Clifford Williams told the crowd, "Thank you, Mr. Storm. I hope you will be here on the Tricentennial Fourth of July."

Mingling among the Indians, I tried to find the oldest people there to see who could remember this 1917 Velle. I met many friends, among them descendants of early Indians I knew such as Willie Magooosh, Hugh Chee and Robert Geronimo.

In the sound booth I met my old friend, Alto Pésó, and a good friend, Stephen Gaetan.

George Martine, in his eighties, could not quite remember the car. Lizze Comanche could not be sure. Mac Bigmouth said he could not remember seeing the Velle.

**The Indian's Keen Sense of Humor**

Over in the long oak-branch arbor which was the kitchen, I began showing the picture with its wagon-spoke wheels and nickel plated exhaust pipes on the outside -- showing it around to various people, asking if they were old enough to remember this car. I began asking one after another, "How old are you?" With a perfectly straight face they would say, "I don't know."

There seems to be a little by-word on the

reservation among the Indians to tell you they do not know how old they are. Not a had idea after all. But there is something about the way they say it that hits your funny bone.

The Apache Indian has a highly developed sense of humor. This is supposed to be a sign of high intelligence. There is one thing about the Apache humor that has always struck me. His humor can be of all kinds: exaggeration, imitation, very broad and hilarious or very subtle. Their humor is always decent. And there is one thing about their joking and kidding that sets them apart in a class by themselves.

The Apaches are great kidders and jokers, but there is no sting or cruelty in their joking. They always give you a good laugh and make you feel better when they joke with you. There is an old saying: "If they don't like you, they won't kid you." The Indians must surely like me.

After I had asked almost a hundred people if they remembered the old car of fifty years ago, I could find no one who could be sure. I was over at the part of the arbor where the dancer were in costume getting ready to perform. I asked one elderly person and got a shake of the head. I must have looked terribly disappointed because a young fellow in dancer costume said to me in the even, clear and measured accents of the Apache, "I remember it."

He was about twenty years old and made the remark with a straight face, and when I looked at him he gave only the very faintest trace of a smile over his calm and pensive classic Apache countenance.

I burst out laughing at this boy's joking way of cheering me up. The whole world had brightened up with just three words from this young fellow. It is not only what they say, but the way they say it in a way all their own and the way they bring their jokes out of a clear sky, suddenly, at just the right time to make you laugh for thirty minutes.

So now my fifty-year visit to the Apache feast grounds was drawing to a close. And I went "on my way rejoicing". And the spirits of my Mother and brothers went rejoicing with me and Shady too.

**The Inn Of The Mountain Gods**  
I do not know why I put off going to see the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Maybe deep down I was saving it for my after-fifty years celebration. We drove off the highway, after passing the summit, through some of the most enchanting of Apache land. You would just as well be a thousand miles into the wilderness when like a dream here is the Sacred White Mountain and the lake and the arched point top of the Inn.

The evening sun had the sacred mount in partial shadow, and the hush of magic evening was drawing nigh. There was a feeling of reverence in the air. The main room of the Inn is arched and gives you a sacred emotion as you look out to the Holy Mount across the lake.

A spot fond to the hearts of the Indians was chosen. As you look out the window with evening colors showing in the sky and reflecting down on the lake, you feel the great power of this hallowed spot. Surely the Mountain Gods, looking down now in late evening, are proud of the Reverend Wendell Chino and his people and are grateful to them for building a mansion in the mountains so worthy of this beloved spot in the shadow of the sacred mountain.

The architect, Mr. French, is to be complimented for this inspiring design, and all who turned their hand or put their heart into this project of lasting good deserve thanks from us all.
