'Good Sam' fund drive extending to businessmen to beat deadline

Local businessmen will be asked to support the proposed Good Samaritan Nursing Home in a fund-raising drive Wednesday and Thursday by project committeemen.

"Recent activities have boosted the fund more than \$5,000 and there is county-wide interest. It's beginning to be thought of as a project — not just a thing," Charlotte Jarratt, fund raising committee chairman, said.

Proceeds from benefits sponsored by the American Legion, Chamber of Commerce, Elks Club and Rotary Club to be held through September and October have been pledged to the Good Samaritan fund.

Various civic organizations, individuals and Sunday school classes are donating to the project on a continuing basis.

The road to the donated construction site in Camelot will be completed in approximately 45 days and plans are in the mill for outings and picnics on the site, according to Jarratt.

The next public meeting of the fund raising committee is set for Monday,

September 13 at 7 p.m.

Committee member Sarah Lee Beumer said, "There has been an upsurge of interest in this project. In order to reach the goal of \$350,000 by midnight December 31, the support of all Ruidoso and Lincoln County residents is needed. Pledges may be made and paid over a three-year period which will enable people to give without a hardship on their budget.

"If people allow this opportunity to pass by to get a non-profit, tax-free organization like Good Samaritan Society to establish a nursing care and living center here, it could never happen again at this price.

"The Good Samaritan Society has never had a failure in the operation of a home nor has a community they have proposed to build a home in failed to raise their share of the funds. The home is badly needed and it is for all to use who need its services, regardless of age.

"Do not wait any longer, make your gift or pledge now and help push the thermometer over the top."

Real Wind wins Futurity

Real Wind, launched as a 3-2 betting favorite, blazed to an impressive victory in Monday's 18th running of the \$1 million All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly, owned by Elsie and J.D. Kitchens of Ft. Sumner — both retired school teachers — ended the 440-yard thriller with a 1 1/4-length lead. Gary Sumpter was in the saddle.

As predicted by many observers, the filly took a slightly wayward course at the end, and was drifting in severely when she hit the wire. But she was obviously in control, and her crooked course in no way bothered the competition.

Real Wind now holds a perfect career record of seven wins from seven starts. Monday's tremendous victory was worth a paycheck of \$330,000 — the fastest in U.S. racing history. The sleek, brown filly zipped over the course in a stinging 21.70 seconds, and that was three one-hundredths better than the top qualifying time.

The winner handed out mutual prices of \$5, \$3 and \$2.60. Second went to the 2-1 second favorite, Lord Winslot. But the gelding had to really scramble at the end in order to get the runnerup slot. Mr. Glory Oh — the top qualifier who went into the Futurity with a perfect three-for-three mark — was really trucking at the end.

The difference between Lord Winslot and Mr. Glory Oh was a slim nose. A nose, in 'turn' was the difference between Mr. Glory Oh and the fourth-place horse, Divine Liz.

Lord Winslot was ridden by Jacky Martin for Jim Jay, owner of an oil distributing business in Arkoma, Okla. Lord Winslot had to be content with a paycheck of \$138,000. Fans who backed the gelding collected \$3.40 and \$2.80 in the betting.

Mr. Glory Oh, with Johnny Cox calling the shots, was well rewarded. He earned a thumping \$64,000. Mr. Glory Oh is the property of Ernest W. Carrigan Jr. of Pasadena, Texas.

The closing-day agenda was really a success at the betting windows. Total handle for the day was \$1,938,395 — an all-time one-day handle in New Mexico history. It was also the first time the coveted million-dollar plateau had been reached in the state.

The All-American, which was the last race on the 13-race program, put the day's handle over the top. The world's richest race recorded a handle of \$220,882. That was also the biggest single-race handle in the state.

Here's how the also-rans checked in: 4th — Divine Liz, earning \$45,000, owned by D. D. Ledford and Ted Wells of Alex, Okla.; 5th — Megahertz, \$36,000 (Larry Brumbaugh of Ft. Worth, Texas); 6th — Louton's Angel, \$34,000 (Charles R. Weik Jr. of San Antonio, Texas); 7th — Comingforth, \$32,000 (J. L. Perkins of Houston, Texas); 8th — Pass Your Glass, \$31,000 (Joe McDermott of Madisonville, Texas); 9th — Topless Dancer, \$29,000 (R. E. Wise of Madisonville, Texas).

Downs with a 1 1/4 length lead. Gary Sumpter is up. The winner collected \$330,000 out of the gross

purse of \$1,030,000. Lord Winslot, the second favorite, (on the rail) took the runnerup slot by a nose over Mr. Glory Oh.

Comin' Easy, owned by the Rose Ranch of Hondo, was a late scratch. But she collected \$27,000 nonetheless.

Pass Your Glass, a 22-1 outsider, got off to a flying start in the All-American and appeared to have quite a stranglehold. Real Wind also got away winging, and was a half-length in arrears at the first call. Lord Winslot didn't have an excuse, but he didn't seem to show his customary early lick. But after getting about 100 yards down the track, he settled down and began pouring it on.

At the halfway point of the dash, Pass Your Glass had about all she could stand and was swallowed up by the pack. Real Wind took control, but started drifting in. Jockey Sumpter switched to left handed whipping in an effort to straighten her out. But Real Wind kept right on drifting in.

Lord Winslot made a big move as he neared the wire, but Mr. Glory Oh was moving at even faster clip. Lord Winslot was pounding for all he was worth in order to salvage second-place money. Considering the ground he had to make up, it was remarkable he did as well as he did.


Real Wind, who captured the Rainbow Futurity earlier in the meeting, came out of the All-American with career earnings of \$456,224. That made her the sixth-richest quarter horse of all time. The filly is trained by T. A. Walker.

Lord Winslot now holds a career record of 8-3-0 from 13 starts. He's earned \$333,054, and rates as a super bargain horse. His original price was only \$5,000. Ironically, the gelding was purchased — as a yearling — for tax writeoff purposes.

larger bids. The crowd was thoroughly entertained by the antics of the auctioneers and floormen, often to the point where there was a lull in the bidding.





Water fowl seasons set

The State Game Commission set waterfowl and upland bird seasons during a meeting in Silver City Friday, increasing the goose bag limit in the Central Flyway and establishing a statewide quail season.

The increased bag limit is in effect for snow geese, according to Game Management Division Chief Walt Snyder, and is part of a management plan aimed at alleviating severe crop depredations the geese caused in the lower Pecos Valley last winter.

Snyder said the other part of the plan involved closing the waterfowl season 10 days and the sandhill crane season 14 days early on the Artesia Refuge owned by the Game and Fish Department. The move should conserve feed for snow geese and also help attract them away from private lands where they could still be hunted, he said.

In other action, the commission created a new Barbary sheep hunt area near

Hondo, west of Roswell, with a stratified season of three hunt periods of five days each for the particular area, designated U-5. The hunt periods will be Jan. 22-26; Jan. 29-Feb. 2; and Feb. 5-9. Thirty-five public licenses will be available for the first two hunts, and 34 for the third. Application procedures are the same as for the earlier, regular season, which is set for Jan. 15-23 in the Canadian and Largo canyons and in the Guadalupe Mountains.

The bird seasons and bag limits, in brief:

Unless otherwise noted, shooting hours on all species are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

DUCKS

In the Pacific Flyway, the season on ducks and mergansers is Oct. 2-Jan. 2, with a limit of seven ducks per day and 14 in possession, with no more than two canvasbacks and/or redheads in the daily and no more than four in the possession

limit. The limit is five mergansers per day and 10 in possession; the daily bag limit can include no more than one hooded

merganser and the possession limit can include no more than two hooded mergansers.

In the Central Flyway portion, the season is Nov. 6-Jan. 23 on ducks and mergansers, and the point system remains in effect with the change that redheads are now valued at 70, rather than 100 points. The point values: canvasbacks, 100; redheads, hen mallards, wood ducks, and hooded mergansers, 70; teal, scaup, pintails, gadwalls, shovelers and common mergansers, 10; all other ducks, 20.

COOTS & GALLINULES

In the Pacific Flyway, the coot and gallinule season is Oct. 2-Jan. 2, with a bag limit of 25 per day or in possession, coots and gallinules combined.

In the Central Flyway, the coot season is Nov. 6-Jan. 23, with a bag limit of 15 and possession limit of 30 coots. The gallinule season is Nov. 6-Jan. 14, with a bag and possession limit of 15 and 30.

GEESE

In the Pacific Flyway, goose hunting is allowed only south of U.S. 66-1-25, and the limits are two geese per day and two in possession; the season is Oct. 2-Dec. 5.

In the Central Flyway, special regulations are in effect for Sandoval, Sierra, Bernalillo and Socorro counties and Valencia County east of the Con-

tinental Divide. The season on dark (Canada and white-fronted) geese is Oct. 23-Jan. 23. Limits are five geese per day and five in possession, no more than one of which can be a dark goose.

Special regulations are also in effect at Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge where, from Nov. 20 through Dec. 19, shooting will be allowed on Tuesday,

Thursday, Saturdays and Sundays, with a limit of five geese per day; only snow, blue and Ross's geese may be taken. Shooting hours are from sunrise to 10 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. to sunset.

In the remainder of the Central Flyway, the season is Oct. 23-Jan. 23. The limits are five geese per day and five in possession; no more than two dark geese can be taken daily, no more than four held in possession.

SANDHILL CRANE

The lesser sandhill crane season is Oct. 30-Jan. 30 and is held only in the counties of Chaves, Curry, DeBaca, Eddy, Lea, Quay and Roosevelt, with a daily bag limit of three and possession limit of six. Sandhill crane hunters must have, in addition to a license, a permit that can be obtained free from the Department of Game and Fish. Applicants must submit their names, address and the number of their hunting license.

SNIFE

In the Pacific Flyway, the snipe season is Oct. 2-Jan. 2, and in the Central Flyway is Nov. 8-Jan. 23; limits are eight per day and 16 in possession.

QUAIL

The quail season is the same statewide Oct. 30-Jan. 23, with a daily bag limit of 1 and a possession limit of 30.



PHEASANTS

The statewide pheasant season is Dec. 11-14, with a bag limit of three cocks per day.


PRAIRIE CHICKEN

The prairie chicken season, open only in a small area in east-central New Mexico is Dec. 4-8; the bag limit is three per day.


The Game and Fish Department's bird hunting proclamation is at the printer and will be available soon. Bird hunters are urged to study it closely and also to study waterfowl identification manuals to prevent violations of the point system.



One of Lynn's many strong points is alertness and quickness of action in an emergency. I had these powers borrowed from Lynn during his birthday month and they saved my life. Our Old Friend The Apple
The apple has been with us a long time. It is in a close race with the orange for the world's most numerous fruit tree. But the apple has the orange beat, I think, when it comes to different varieties.

The Encyclopedia Britannica says there are thirty-five thousand kinds of apples the world over, counting all kinds like wild varieties of the apple.

There used to be two hundred or more popular varieties of apples in the United States, but these have simmered down mostly to a few varieties nation-wide.

In our local orchards these varieties are the Red Delicious, Golden Delicious, Jonathan, Winesap and Rome Beauty. There are several kinds of Winesaps, the most popular being Staymen Winesap or a later variety, Stamared.

The Golden Delicious and the Red Delicious are late arrivals in the apple clan which is thousands of years old. These two were developed by the famous Starks Brothers Nurseries of Louisiana and Missouri within the last sixty or so years.

Then not many years ago a man in Washington, I think it was, saw a limb of Starks Red Delicious on a tree that was bright red away back in August. From this the Starks Brothers developed the Double Red varieties.

The Double Red Delicious is the king of apples, a favorite for eating out of the hand and in salads. When fully ripe it has a dark maroon color. And the aroma from the orchards is wonderfully appetizing. Once you have eaten a Double Red it has won you over for keeps.

The Golden Delicious is the queen of apples. This apple has everything you could want in an apple except the red color. It is good for applesauce, pies, cobbles, cider, baked or fried. This apple is certainly a picture in the orchard shining on the trees with its red cheeks. If I had to have just one apple in all the world it would be a Golden Delicious. But why worry about that, when there are so many good varieties here at the door step.

I could tell you about some other varieties, and will do so next time. But I see the clouds and the rain streaming down up the creek and the thunder is rattling, so maybe I had better get across the river while I can. But let me tell you a word about pears.

Pears
The most popular eating pear is the Bartlett, and that is the variety that grows most extensively in the local orchards. Then there is the Keiffer, Lincoln, Anjou, Duchess and others.

More about apples and pears next time or so.

SANTA FE — Employment Security Commission Director Rudy Ortiz hired sons of prominent Albuquerque Democrats Charlie Davis and William Marchiondo in ESC jobs in Albuquerque.

Ortiz, Davis and Marchiondo were active in Gov. Jerry Apodaca's successful 1974 campaign. Davis' son, Charles E. Davis, 32, was hired June 3, 1975, and resigned June 4 this year. He was first a utility worker at \$400 a month and was raised to \$422 when the state employee minimum pay was boosted July 1, 1975. He was reclassified Oct. 6 as an unemployment insurance processor at \$3.59 an hour.

His resignation form said he quit "for better pay with political campaign and insurance." He was married May 20. His father said he is operating an Albuquerque insecticide business.

Well-known attorney Marchiondo's son, William C. Marchiondo, 25, was hired at \$400 a month as an ESC utility worker June 2, 1975, also. He resigned Aug. 8, 1975, to return to college. He was hired June 10 this year by the State Scientific Laboratory in Albuquerque at \$2.43 an hour as a utility worker and resigned recently to return to college. For the ESC jobs both sons scored 84 in a possible 100 in oral ratings signed by ESC Personnel Director Rudy Castillo. For the HSSD job young Marchiondo scored 89 on a similar rating.

Ortiz said young Davis and young Marchiondo "asked me for a job when I was first appointed by Gov. Apodaca." Apodaca named Ortiz as ESC director in early February, 1975. Ortiz said: "I have known them forever." He said they were

not classified employees. "Their hours were determined by us depending on need for their work," he said.

Gabe Nava, 24, former University of New Mexico basketball star, was hired by Ortiz in an ESC job in Albuquerque during the 1975 summer. Nava was an active Apodaca supporter in the 1974 campaign. Nava was a utility worker at \$400 a month and was raised to \$422. He worked for the ESC from June 4 to Aug. 1 in 1975.

Ortiz said: "He came and asked me for a job. He was not classified. I tried to line him up for testing but there wasn't anything he could qualify for in the ESC. His background was in physical education. He worked with Ben Caine on a U.S. Savings Bond program." Caine is an ESC information representative. Ortiz said Nava quit to play basketball in Mexico.

Asked if he has recommended persons for ESC jobs, Charlie Davis said: "O sure. I've always been a great believer in helping kids if they need a job. I don't care if they're Democrats or Republicans. I've done it for 40 years and I'm not going to stop now." He says he phones Ortiz or sees him at Ortiz's office. "I did this when Louis Bachicha, Paul Cruz and others were ESC directors, too," Davis said. "It's mainly young people."

Ortiz said Charlie Davis "has come to me and asked if we have positions. Normally, I send whoever he recommends to the ESC personnel director. Charlie is a close friend of mine. He has never tried to shove anything down my throat. I'm too good a politician for that. If we can't help them here, we send them to our employment offices.

"I think every politician in the state has called me to hire somebody since I became director. If nothing else I give them the courtesy of an interview. That's the mark of a good politician and good businessman. I hadn't seen Charlie for four or five months until the Nino Trujillo dinner the other night."

The \$500-a-plate dinner at Trujillo's plush Bosque Farms home drew 250 persons to raise funds for the Yes for Two Committee. The committee is pushing a constitutional amendment that would allow seven elected Democratic state officials, including Gov. Apodaca, to run for a second four-year term.

Ortiz said: "I don't recall offhand that Bernalillo County Democratic Chairman Ed Romero has recommended anybody for an ESC job. He might have talked with Eppie Armijo." Mrs. Armijo, a top Ortiz aide, worked previously for Ortiz when Ortiz was Bernalillo County Democratic chairman and later for Romero.

As an ESC employe she received four pay raises in 16 months totaling \$8,136 or an 83 per cent boost. Her pay was raised to \$17,988 a year June 26 in a general state employe hike. Her starting ESC salary was \$9,652.

Romero says: "I have recommended a couple of people probably to the ESC, qualified people. I've called a couple of other state agencies and recommended people for jobs. That's part of my job as county chairman. I've been doing it for eight or ten years. I very seldom recommend anyone for jobs unless they are qualified. I recommended more people in

the Bruce King administration when Louis Bachicha was ESC director than I have to Rudy Ortiz in the Apodaca administration.

Desert Bighorns faring very well

An apparently healthy herd of bighorns was found during an intensive helicopter survey of the San Andres National Wildlife Refuge, according to Wain Evans, head of biological research projects for the N.M. Department of Game and Fish.

The surveys were flown after research teams found the remains of two dead rams last week and feared that a contagious disease might be harming the herd, Evans said.

"We found 32 sheep on Monday (Aug. 16) and 116 on Tuesday," he added. "All the sheep appeared to be acting in a healthy, normal manner, and we found no more dead sheep."

Over a period of a year, in four previous surveys made by the Game and Fish Department researcher Andrew Sandoval, from 108 to 118 sheep were found in that particular area, Evans said.

"When we only located 32 the first day, it

triggered the second day's search. That was much more productive, and the number found is normal for that particular area," according to Evans.

He said the researchers were especially appreciative of the loan of a U.S. Army helicopter and pilot, arranged for by White Sands Missile Range Facilities Engineer Felix Sedillo, which allowed the department to begin its surveys almost as soon as it learned of the possibility of a disease.

"We'll continue searching for a cause of death for the rams," Evans said. "But I believe that whatever it is is either not contagious or is due to death by natural accidents or stresses. At least for now,

there's no appearance of an emergency."

"I'm certainly relieved. I guess we all are."

When the first dead ram was found, on Aug. 12, tissue samples were sent to the Wildlife Disease Center at Colorado State University for testing, where several unsettling possibilities such as anthrax were quickly eliminated as causes.

Since then, Evans said, the search for pathogens has continued, but no indications of any bacterial infections have been found.

The San Andres herd probably numbers from around 250 to 300 head.

Channel cats being stocked

About a quarter million channel catfish will be put in suitable New Mexico lakes and streams during the next several weeks.

Bob Patterson, of the Game and Fish Department's Fisheries Division, said that 50,000 of them will be of catchable size, ranging from seven to nine inches at planting.

"We are planning on dividing them up between all the suitable waters in the state," he said.

"We'll do the same thing with the fingerlings."

The 200,000 fingerlings will about two inches long and should be keeper sized by next summer, he said.

The fish come from Inks Dam National Fish Hatchery in Texas, Patterson said, and will be brought here in six separate truckloads by Game and Fish Department hatcheries personnel.

The plantings will continue into September.

the training sessions. He urges all interested parties to attend and to come with questions or problems they have encountered in working with vehicle title and registration.


