

# P&Z hearing on new plan October 20

Organized opposition by realtors Wednesday caused the Planning and Zoning Commission to postpone acceptance of the Village of Ruidoso Comprehensive Plan, 1976 and to set a hearing on the plan for Oct. 20 at 7:30 p.m., in the multi-purpose room of the Ruidoso Library.

The plan, drawn by Larry Shafkind of Boyle Engineering, covers future goals of public service, natural resources, economic development and ongoing planning; the plan elements of land use, annexation, circulation, open space (recreation), public utilities and housing; and plan implementation, which includes the Village of Ruidoso Downs.

Objections, from the estimated crowd of 150, centered around the open area land map and designations for use.

Bill Seelbach, as spokesman for the realtors, said: "Since the plans which Planning and Zoning were to approve had just arrived and were different from the first book of plans," that "this hearing be postponed until these plans could be studied by everyone."

Chuck Brown, Ruidoso village inspector, outlined the purpose of the Comprehensive Plan at the meeting's onset. "The purpose of the Comprehensive Plan," he said, "is to set up a guideline in the development of the two villages."

"The Village of Ruidoso has to have a comprehensive plan to have a zoning ordinance."

"This (Comprehensive Plan) is only a guideline and if it does not fit the village's plan, the village will go back to the original plan."

# Mule-O-Rama entry blanks at Chamber office

Entry blanks for the 1st Annual Lincoln County Mule-O-Rama are available at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the entry deadline is October 4.

The mule show and races begin October 8 and will highlight this year's Aspencade festivities October 8-10. A mule sale at the Chaparral Convention Center gets underway October 9.

Three days of mule races, from 50 yards to one mile, will offer a \$10,000 added purse.

In addition to the races, 12 events are on tap:

Reined Mule Contest will include judging on each mule's reining ability, turning to the left and right, backing and coming to a sliding stop upon the rider's command.

Pleasure Saddle Mules will be judged at the walk, trot and lope with conformation also being taken into consideration.

Trail Mules will be judged on the same basis as the saddle mules in addition to the

rider opening, passing through and closing a gate; riding over four logs; riding through a shallow pond or ditch; carrying a small log across the arena; putting on and removing a slicker; dismounting and leading the mule over the logs. Mules will be judged on appearance and conformation.

Model Saddle Mules will be shown at halter. The judge will be looking for a nice head, sound legs, good feet, back and hind quarters and a deep, stout chest.

The Cutting Event will be with turn back partner.

The Hide Race will be a timed event with the mule and rider at one end of the track, the partner at the other. The mule and rider will run to the partner, pick him up and rush to the finish line.

Another timed event is Steer Stopping. The object is to rope and stop the steer, catch as catch can, tie hard and fast or

# 'History's Richest Mule Races' running set during Aspencade

Should you be of the impression that past Aspencades offered the ultimate in excitement, color and performance, you — in the famous words of whoever it was that said it — "ain't seen nothin' yet!"

This is because — not to coin a phrase — the long-ears are coming and there may be hundreds of 'em.

What'll be adding to the excitement, color and performance are the 21 mule races, more or less, more than likely more, in store for mule race aficionados, Oct. 8-10 as final Aspencade action winds up.

These scheduled races, billed as "History's Richest Mule Races", offer \$10,000 added in purses, \$10,000 added in a quarter horse race might not cause a single lifted eyebrow — but when you have mules running from 50 yards to one mile, with that kind of money up for grabs, including entry fees which are added to the purse, you're talking mule money in bunches.

Due to the fact no one wants to be accused of causing confusion amongst the mules — which might or might not be easy — the starting procedures are a mite less rigid than for starting race horses.

Two men'll latch onto the loose ends of a hunk of rope long enough to reach across the track and a little to spare. They'll eye the mules eying them as the men walk toward said mules, holding the rope taught. As the men, and rope, approach the waiting to run mules, precisely at the starting point the rope will be dropped, the mules will be flagged — whatever that means — and the race begins.

The starting rope, Mule-O-Rama officials claim, is so small that there is "no way it can harm a mule" — just in case any of the racers would be suspicious that their mules might be harmed by a rope.

The riders will be given to understand that they dassn't apply the whip to their steeds behind the starting point. Which makes sense, 'cause why'd any racing mule rider want to start cracking the back end of a mule with a whip before he wanted said mule to start moving out at his top

racing speed?

There's one rule that might be a little confusing, though — to the mule riders. This rule states that there'll be "no fussing with the starters" — which could lead to misunderstanding, because assuming that those mule jockeys are mule skinners at heart, it'll sure put a crimp in their ability to make comments if they can't fuss at the starters.

As to the weight limitations, there's a minimum of 150 pounds on the half-mile and mile races and 185 pounds on all others. Which has caused a bit of a flurry amongst racing mule devotees and the jockeys, but the problem will be worked out before race time, officials say. And there's a definite "out" because there'll be "special prearranged races" in which these weight limitations do not apply. Details of these "special prearranged races" will be available before post time — how much before isn't clear, which shouldn't matter. To the mules concerned. As to those races for the \$10,000 added.

The "meeting" — to borrow a phrase — extends from Oct. 8-10, and includes, in addition to whatever races may be added in order to settle any differences of opinion that might arise, the following:

Friday, October 8 —

First race: "For mules that have never started". Purse \$350, if 10 mules entered, \$100 added, 50 yards.


Second race: "Non-winners of a race in lifetime" (Maidens). Purse \$450, based on 10 mules, \$200 added, 200 yards.

Third race: "Non-winners in '76". Purse \$600, with 10 entries, \$350 added, 300 yards.

Fourth race: "Non-winners of two races in '76". Purse \$750, with 10 mules, \$500 added, 350 yards.

Fifth race: "Open to the world". Purse \$750, if 10 mules run, plus \$500 added, 400

# Real life A-A Futurity theme too 'outlandish' for film story version

The filming of "Casey's Shadow", concerning a down-on-heels Cajun trainer (Walter Matthau) who brings an unknown horse to Ruidoso Downs to win the \$1 million All-American Futurity, is on schedule and the cameras are turning out hundreds of feet of film every day at Ruidoso Downs Race Track and other area locations.

The script has the built in excitement of horse racing, with the element of suspense — and as much factual information as could be recorded in a fictional version of the A-A Futurity.

## Regular board meetings

Regular meetings of governing bodies are scheduled here tonight and tomorrow night.

The Ruidoso Downs trustees meet tonight at 7:30 in village hall with the proposed All American Park, Comprehensive Plan and report of the Municipal League convention on the agenda. Other business includes a progress report on recent abatements, rebidding a water department pickup truck and receipt of insurance bids.

The Ruidoso Board of Education meets Tuesday at 8 p.m., in the administration building. Agenda items include routine budget increases, awarding the bid on \$700,000 in General Obligation Bonds, approval of the lunch program and approval for the purchase of a new 66 passenger bus by Jack Kannady Jr.

The Ruidoso trustees meet at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday in the multi-purpose room of the Ruidoso Library. The agenda, due to attendance of trustees and village officials at the Municipal League convention, is being prepared today.

The actual "script" of this year's \$1 million race included:

— The race was won by Real Wind, a filly owned by retired school teachers J. D. and Elsie Kitchens of Ft. Sumner, who aren't exactly well seasoned in horse racing ventures, by virtue of tenure.

— Kitchens, who's suffered four heart attacks, was accompanied to the race by a trained nurse.

— Kitchens will use his \$330,000 purse to offset the expense of open-heart surgery.

— Jockey Gary Sumpter, plagued by injuries, missed most of the action at the '76 meeting at Downs and got the riding assignment on Real Wind just before the

trials when Kitchens, upon becoming disenchanted with how things were going, changed both trainer and jockey.

— Real Wind is the first New Mexico-bred to achieve super-star status. The filly boasts seven straight wins and no defeats and is now the sixth richest quarter horse of all time with \$456,274 in earnings.

When given the "script" of this year's All-American Futurity and asked how this would actually play on the screen, Matthau said: "Too outlandish. In the movie, we couldn't use it — it wouldn't be dramatic enough. There isn't enough conflict." And Matthau has recently undergone open-heart surgery.

# Fiddlers contest will highlight Aspencade fun

Strains of bluegrass, waltz and hoedown music will be heard during the Oldtime Fiddlers Contest at the Chaparral Convention Center October 8 and 9 during the annual six-day Aspencade.

Contestants in the Junior-Junior division, for ages one through 12, will tune up at 9 a.m., Friday, October 8. No entry fee is required and trophies for first, second and third places will be awarded.

The Junior division competition, ages 13-18, gets underway at 10:30 a.m. Entry fee is \$10. First place will receive \$100 and a trophy; second place, \$75 and trophy and third place, \$50 and trophy.


At 1 p.m., the Open division play begins for ages 19-00. Entry fee is \$25. Trophies will be presented to first through eighth

place winners. First place will receive \$600; second, \$450; third, \$300; fourth, \$175; fifth, \$125; sixth, \$100; seventh, \$50 and eighth, \$25.

The Senior division, for competitors over age 60, will begin at 4:30 p.m. Entry fee is \$15. Trophies and cash will be given for the first five place winners. First, \$150; second, \$100; third, \$75; fourth, \$50 and fifth, \$25.

First to eighth place winners in all divisions will vie for the Championship Saturday night, October 9.

Judges will be Aaron Lowe, Spokane, Washington; Roy Thacherson, Ranger, Texas and Lloyd Wanzer, McCall, Idaho. All three judges have been in the top 20 in the Nationals.

Just exactly what races, over and above the 21 listed, will be, is not known by Mule-O-Rama promoters, though they indicate that there might be considerable excitement — perhaps limited to a few in the know — in some of them.

Besides the races, there's lots of other mulish things going on those three days — and a hilarious time is more than a passing possibility, even for non-afficionados of mules and their abilities and propensities.

These races, incidentally, are the first in a series — a series leading up to the proposed \$50,000 mule race in 1979. In fact, owners of mules are now in the process of being contacted, or actually ponying up — if ponying can apply to mules — entry monies to get their mules entered and registered and whatever, to which they'll add more next year and so it'll go until they lower the rope, or whatever, on that 1979 400 yard thriller.


Warrior backs.

dally.

Heading and Heeling will also be timed and either partner may head or heel, tie hard and fast or dally.

Each rider will have three mules in the Relay Race. He must dismount and change saddles at each station — a distance of one-half mile.

Timed Barrel Races require a mule to race around three barrels set in a clover leaf pattern.

Pole Bending starts on either side of six poles, placed 21 feet apart. The rider must make a straight run down, bend the poles back one way and down the other, then run a straight return to the finish line.

Mule Shoeing Contest requires the contestant to shoe all four feet of the mule, including rasping the hoof, shaping shoe to fit, nailing the shoe on with six or more nails and clinching the nails. Speed and quality of the work will determine the winner.


Entry fees range from \$5 to \$50 for each race and competitive events.

Then the clouds would move aside and the evening sun would shine across the bay onto the mountains above the town.

So, I was out rejoicing in the misty, cloudy morning and toward noon the anxious feeling began to increase. I have come to welcome this somber, heavy feeling in my spirits because I know it is nothing in the world but the weather spirit telling me it is going to rain.

Sure enough here it came just before high noon, a mass of purple grey moving down the vale.

**The Rome Beauty**


We have made a brief sketch of the Bartlett pear, Red Delicious, Golden Delicious, Jonathan and Winesap.

The Rome Beauty is a good all-around apple, serving well for pies, applesauce and cobblers. It is an old stand-by, a faithful member of the apple family.

Remember to spread the word that we have a heavy crop of good apples in the valleys leading down from the Sierra Blanca.

County Agent**

More efficient beef production from range land was the focus of a first-ever Field Day held September 3 at Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch near Capitan. Research at Fort Stanton has shown that the Black Baldy Cow will produce a higher per cent of calf drop than either the Hereford or Angus. Also they produce a heavier calf. Supplemental protein feeding is especially needed for the two year old cow whereas the mature cow needs a higher energy supplement.

The range management studies show that several weeds have shown up after a drought no matter the rate of grazing, yet if the range is properly stocked the grasses will again take over. Chemical spraying can control Broomweed but the present cost is too high to make it useable on most rangeland.

During the tour, participants saw the results of various research projects, such as the supplemental feeding studies and calving dates of beef cows. Range research projects — including rotational grazing, effects of drought on vegetation and deer habitat — were also inspected. A nutritive evaluation of fertilized ranges, vegetational responses to nitrogen and herbicidal treatment of golden eye and snakeweed were other plots reviewed.

Addressing over 225 participants, Dr. L. S. Pope, newly appointed dean and director of the NMSU College of Agriculture and Home Economics, said "We cannot afford to waste any time in today's fast-changing beef industry." He pledged NMSU's continued effort to increase beef production efficiency and called for producer input into future research designs.

Over 150 spelunkers spent the last weekend cleaning and fixing up the Fort Stanton Caves. They poured cement around the gates where people were trying to get into the caves without permission. They also took out several hundred pounds of trash and garbage people have left in the caves.

The records that they have been taking show that there has been more water in the caves for the past few years than there was in the 60's, yet not nearly as much as recorded years ago.

Calves and yearlings have been very slow to contract this year. The buyers are reluctant to make an offer and the owners are holding to see how prices develop. Several buyers have looked at calves in the area but no price has been mentioned. The calf prices may depend to some extent on the wheat pasture in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. If the pasture is good, prices will go up and if pastures are poor the prices will go down.

I have only heard of one contract for some 400 pound Hereford steer calves at 42 cents per pound.


The Montana-Wyoming area reports 400 to 425 pound steer calves bringing 45 cents per pound. Heifer contracts are reported at 35 cents per pound.

Fed lamb prices are erratic, varying from 38 to 43 cents per pound. The feeder lamb prices are up to 47 cents per pound. Most of the lambs in this area contracted this spring for 50 to 53 cents per pound.

# VA developing energy bank

An energy bank that makes ice in winter to cool a hospital the next summer, solar energy to provide another hospital's hot water, and a university-spawned computer program to choose the optimum air conditioning system from among 30 possible methods — these are among the futuristic projects being developed by the Veterans Administration in an intensive drive to conserve the nation's vital energy.

In Wilmington, Delaware, a VA research laboratory is being equipped with solar panels to provide heating and cooling systems that will be linked to a computer feeding data to the agency's Washington, D.C. headquarters.

VA engineers there will compare the building's energy requirements with those over a four-year span when only conventional energy sources were used for heating and cooling.

In a separate project, a new 60-bed VA nursing home in Wilmington will be equipped with an energy bank that will convert waste energy from a heat pump into ice which will be stored in a huge, underground tank for use during the summer when it will provide chilled water for cooling the building.

VA engineers describe the system as unique and say it will achieve a significant energy savings from the beginning.

Under design for installation at the VA hospital in Buffalo, N.Y., is a system that will use the facility's incinerator in conjunction with a waste heat boiler to produce steam — burning 1,000 pounds of waste per hour — to recover an energy equivalent of 83,000 gallons of oil each year.

Solar energy will provide hot water for use in a VA nursing home in Palo Alto,

California; a new hospital in Augusta, Georgia, a clinic in Reno, Nevada and a research and education building in Miami, Florida.

In a joint effort with VA engineers, scientists at the University of Pittsburgh are designing for VA a computer program which will allow the agency to analyze over 30 different air conditioning systems for optimum energy consumption in VA hospitals.

And at the VA hospital in the nation's capital, a computer system that is the vanguard of others to come operates the hospital's environmental control system.

The computer optimizes air conditioning and heating equipment so that the most use is made of the required energy. It even schedules equipment maintenance. VA engineers say that they were also able to use the computer to determine that an

existing cooling plant had sufficient capacity to take care of a planned building addition.

Looking even further into the future, VA engineers are exploring the possibility of increasing the agency's efficient use of energy by installing what are known as "total energy systems" by which hospitals and other VA facilities generate their own energy and make the most efficient use of the waste by-products.

Assistant VA Administrator for Construction Viggo P. Miller said, "VA is using all known energy technology together with results from our research efforts in our current construction program and we intend to keep abreast of any, new developments in the energy conservation field in the years ahead."

cherry drinks, apple cider, honey and preserves, meet the food label requirements of State and Federal laws.

The greatest violation is in lack of any labels for these products. Currently, only a handful of vendors have labels on such home-produced products. In many cases, these labels are misleading and incorrect.

All vendors of record will have been notified of the food labeling requirements by September 17, 1976. They will be ex-

pected to comply by September 17/20. Copies of the State and Federal laws will be mailed to them as part of the notification procedure.

Inspection — enforcement operations are handled primarily by the Region VI office. This is located at 110 East Fourth Street, Roswell, New Mexico (Phone 623-6987). Any inquiries concerning such problems as lack of labels, incorrect labeling and consumer complaints should be directed to this office.



Edward Patrick Gullion, Jr., wanted on a Federal warrant for interstate transportation of explosive and incendiary devices, issued July 4, 1976, at Portland, Maine, has been added to the FBI's list of "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives."

Gullion is reported to be a member of a small revolutionary group responsible for a series of destructive bombings in Seabrook, New Hampshire, Augusta, Maine, and in the communities of East Boston, Dorchester and Newburyport, Massachusetts.

The group's destructive activities include explosions occurring at a power plant facility, United States Post Office, and county courthouse; and of a multi-passenger aircraft and National Guard truck. They have reportedly financed their terrorist methods by robbing banks and, thereafter, purchasing and stealing explosive materials.

Gullion has previous convictions for breaking and entering, carrying a revolver without a permit, robbery,

narcotics possession, and assault and battery.

Born October 19, 1948, in Cambridge, Massachusetts, Gullion is a white male American, who is 5'7" tall, weighs 170 to 180 pounds, and has a heavy build. He has black hair, blue eyes, a dark complexion and has a scar over left eye, scar on right shoulder, two scars on left forearm, scar on back of left hand and a scar on inner left index finger.

He has been employed as a cook, laborer and painter, using Social Security number 024-38-3292. Gullion, who has a tendency for violent action, may be in possession of a revolver or automatic rifle and should be considered armed and extremely dangerous.

Anyone with information concerning Gullion should take no action other than to contact the nearest office of the FBI, the telephone number of which may be found on the first page of most local telephone directories.




