# Mule-O-Rama snowballing

Mule-O-Rama, the Chamber of Commerce directors were advised Monday, is surpassing all estimates of the interest the three day program, Oct. 8-10, would generate.

Promoted as a "fun time", Mule-O-Rama will be the highlight of Ruidoso's Aspencade celebration Oct. 8-10.

"Letters and phone calls about Mule-O-Rama are coming in from all over the United States," Ray Reed said to the Chamber directors. "We have something unique and fantastic for this community."

The first year is going to be more terrific and impressive than I ever dreamed it would be. Everything we're doing is for fun.

"Quarter horse racing has become so serious and for such big money, that the fun is being taken out of it. With mules, every one has equal advantages and nobody has the market cornered."

Chamber manager Richard Cothrun said, "I am really surprised at the response we're getting to Mule-O-Rama. Entries for the races and the mule sale are coming in very well. This will amount to another industry in the fall of each year. We figure there will be at least 30 mules in the sale and over 200 in the races. The

Village of Ruidoso Downs is cooperating very well with us and helping with the grading and weed removal at the race site. The three fastest mules in the country will be here for the Mule-O-Rama."

C-C directors and the Ambassadors will launch the Chamber's membership drive Friday at 8:30 a.m. "There are 357 current members," Cothrun said, "as well as 67 new businesses to contact."

Cothrun also discussed a fund-raising project the Chamber will share with any organization in the area on a 50-50 basis. He said interested people may contact the Chamber office for details and that the project will end by October 9.

In other action, the board of directors:

- Discussed naming the parade marshal and three judges.
- Agreed to present cash prizes rather than trophies to winning parade entries.
- Will offer the concession at the motorcycle trials Oct. 2 to the Ruidoso High School band boosters.
- Initiated a policy to withdraw a Chamber membership if payment of dues becomes 90 days delinquent.
- Discussed a tentative compromise proposal on the WATS line fee schedule and agreed to try and "bridge the gap in communications" between the Chamber and a few local motel owners.
- Approved proceeding with this season's ski package.

## Jury finds two guilty

Gary Thomas, 26, formerly of Ruidoso, and Larry Vaughn, 24, of Crossville, Tennessee, went on trial in District Court Tuesday for distribution and possession of a controlled substance.

The pair were found guilty late Wednesday and sentencing is set for today.

Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr. said the two men sold a controlled substance to a sheriff's deputy working as an undercover agent in February and they were subsequently indicted by the Lincoln County grand jury.

Vaughn, a second offender, was arrested May 7 in Tennessee, waived extradition and was returned to Carrizozo. Thomas, a first offender, was arrested in the Ruidoso area July 30, according to Vega.

## Trinity Site tour Oct. 2

A free tour of Trinity Site, the scene of the first atomic bomb explosion July 16, 1945, will be conducted by Military Police Oct. 2.

The caravan will have no limit to the number of cars, will leave from Stallion Range Camp gate on U.S. 380, 53 miles west of Carrizozo, at 10:15 a.m.

Rigid rules, due to security regulations, will be enforced.

All cars must be at the gate entrances promptly at 10:15 a.m. Oct. 2.

No one will be permitted to enter the gates after the caravan has passed through.

The tour group will leave Trinity Site at 1:15 p.m.

No departure will be allowed on an individual basis.

Visitors are encouraged to bring a picnic lunch and drinking water, but food and cold drinks may be purchased at the Post Exchange mobile food service van, which will be at the site.

Non-iced water and restroom facilities will be provided, courtesy of the White Sands Missile Range.

Pets, outside of guide dogs, are prohibited.

Motorcycles will not be permitted.

Though the degree of radiation is less than that of a radium dial watch, pregnant women and parents of babies in arms are advised that the visit to the actual detonation site is their personal responsibility.

Further restrictions include:

- No weapons or alcohol of any kind may be taken on the tour.
- Photographs are not permitted and cameras must be locked in the glove compartment or trunk of cars.
- Trinitite may not be dug or picked up, and any type of digging at the site is prohibited.

— Refuse must be placed in containers at the site.

— Visitors must drive on the marked roads.

— Only 90 minutes will be allotted for viewing at the site.

The first atomic test operation, known as Project Trinity, took place at 5:30 a.m., July 16, 1945, in the north central portion of the Alamogordo Bombing and Gunnery Range.

This site for the explosion of the bomb, code name "Fat Man", was chosen for safety and secrecy.

Observers said that the brilliance of the light from the explosion arrived a few seconds afterwards.

Immediately after the test, two lead-

lined tanks were dispatched to explore the site with measuring instruments and to scoop up samples of material from the ground. The bomb tower had virtually disappeared and in its place was a crater about 400 yards in diameter and fifteen feet deep.

Sands in the crater were fused into a glass-like solid, the color of green jade. This substance is often referred to as trinitite, after the code name "Project Trinity".

This tour, sponsored by the Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce, will leave the K-Mart parking lot, north of Alamogordo, at 9:30 a.m., and from Tularosa at 8:45, continuing to Carrizozo and west to Stallion Camp Gate.

## Stoneman pled not guilty to all larceny charges

A plea of "not guilty" was entered by Sam C. Stoneman, former cattle inspector, who was arraigned in District Court Tuesday on three counts of larceny of livestock.

Judge George L. Zimmerman advised James Weldon, public defender representing Stoneman, that he has 20 days in which to file any motions. A trial date will be scheduled after the 20 days have passed.

Stoneman's bond was set at \$50,000 when he was arrested September 1 in Holsington, Kansas. He remains at the Lincoln County jail in Carrizozo.

## Lake Lucero caravan visitation set Sunday

An auto caravan to Lake Lucero, part of the area that is the source of the White Sands, is scheduled Sunday.

There is a limit of 30 cars and reservations must be made by calling White Sands Monument headquarters: 437-1058.

The tour begins at 10 a.m., at the Small Missile Range Road and U.S. Highway 70 intersection, 25 miles west of monument headquarters.

Park Rangers and Military Police will brief visitors on trip regulations.

The road to Lake Lucero is paved.

Two hours have been allotted at the lake for a one mile conducted walk, photography, sightseeing and lunch.

The caravan will return to Highway 70 by 2 p.m.

## Lake Lucero caravan visitation set Sunday

Restrictions include:

- No one may enter the gate after 10 a.m.
- Cameras may not be used while traveling through the missile range.

Tour members are advised to bring drinking water, lunch, sun-glasses, insect repellent, stout walking shoes and suitable clothing for the weather.

## Gavilan paving project okayed

Final confirmation was given last week by the New Mexico State Highway Commission on the \$105,609 Gavilan Canyon Road project in a cooperative agreement between the State Highway Department and Lincoln County, according to Les Olson, county manager.

Olson said, "We're very pleased that the commission approved this agreement because this assures the work will be completed. We expect the upper end of Gavilan Canyon will be completed by mid-October and paving will be done next spring or summer."

The county's portion of the work agreement for the 5.5 miles road includes grading at a cost of \$19,830 and con-

structing 2.4 miles of roadway with subgrade and base course at \$33,009. The State will be responsible for labor and equipment on chipping, asphalt, priming and sealing for a total of \$51,970. The State is to purchase the 5/8-inch chips from the county for \$11,450.

Olson said the next phase will be the interchange near the Ruidoso Downs race track and Highway 70 in which the Villages of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and the county will cooperate.

Construction of storage and acceleration lanes at the Gavilan Canyon-Highway 37 intersection will get underway in October, according to Olson, which will be done as a safety factor.

## TREASURER IRKED AT DFA STATEMENT

# Allen proves county funds well invested

Veta Allen, Lincoln County treasurer, this week took exception to a recent press statement regarding county investment revenues.

Allen said, "Mr. Al Ramero, chief of the Department of Finance and Administration, local government division, in a press statement to Fred Buckles, accused all county

treasurers of losing New Mexicans up to \$3.36 million per year by not properly investing property tax revenue. This statement does not apply to Lincoln County.

"Since taking office in January of 1975, we have earned for Lincoln County \$90,028.36 for an 18 month period, ending June 30, 1976. This, with a modest

projection for the final six months, will produce revenue in two years of more than the entire earnings for the previous five years. And this has been realized with interest rates extremely low.

"This represents more than three times the previous earnings and these figures are a matter of public record and speak for themselves."

# Petroglyphs record of a civilization

They shout warnings, whisper tragedies and talk about survival techniques, but we do not understand what they are saying.

Their once universal language is buried beneath centuries of time and a handful of 20th century people are attempting to resurrect it.

Three Rivers Petroglyph site is located less than 20 miles from Tularose, five miles east of Three Rivers, N.M., off Highway 54. It is one of the outstanding and accessible examples of early American Indian rock carvings. Archaeologists have determined the markings were made with stone tools throughout the years 900 to 1400 A.D. by the Jornada branch of the Mogollon Indians.

More than 500 petroglyphs are on the 50-acre site. A 1400-yard trail connects many of the more interesting and conspicuous carvings. Nearby hillocks also are rich with inscribed rocks.

Petroglyphs were once thought to be crude drawings recording the hunt, maps and directional locators important only to the original artists themselves. Those who continue the study today are discovering the carvings record actual historical events, man's tribulations, emotions and thoughts. The carvings were early man's telephone, radio, television and telegraph.

Ancient man was no different than contemporary man in his desire to record his civilization.

Rock carvings are patterned after both the sign language and the written symbol. They appear to be one of the most abbreviated visual languages ever used due to the difficulty of carving on hard stone. Markings on wood and leather are more artistically detailed, but pictography all over the world bears a basic similarity.

The hieroglyphic system is a mysterious one. Certain reappearing symbols can be de-coded as in cryptology. Depending on

the way it is drawn and situated, a simple dot and circle has dimensions of meaning from "water available" and "a good place" to "pinned down" or "out of reach". Animals such as the sheep can represent a literal portrayal of a sheep or can be used to express action or direction.

To the casual observer, a spiral connected to a small circle looks like a snake. Investigators have ascertained this type drawing to mean a coming into or going out of and they are used to tell of floods or other natural events.

To add to the complicated mystery, the same rock can be inscribed with faded carvings, dated hundreds of years ago, along with adjacent markings of fairly recent origin.

Markings etched as late as the early 1900's have been discovered depicting railroads or train wrecks which occurred after the turn of the century. The symbology is the same as people used thousands of years ago. As with all history, early man also recorded events which he considered unusual or humorous. Most present day Indians seem as awed and perplexed by the lost language of rock writings as the white man.

Gordon Bigger who signed on as a recreation aid with the Bureau of Land Management two years ago oversees the Three Rivers Petroglyph site. When asked if he can interpret the writings, he said, "No, but I know somebody who can." He told of the recent visit of La Van Martineau from Arizona who has written one in-depth book on petroglyphs and is in the process of writing another. Bigger said, "I walked the entire area with him. He would show me a sign or locator and tell me what he would find ahead. He did this several times and convinced me he can read the rocks."

Bigger greets visitors to the site with a warm hospitality and interest as though inviting them into his own home. He generously shares his time telling of the site and explaining his work there. He estimates the number of visitors last year passed the

12,000 mark and concludes that, at the present rate, this year's total will be greater.

He supervises the vast, sun-drenched location often inhabited only by numerous lizards and an occasional snake or rabbit. We asked if he has a hobby to help fill the hours. Bigger said, "There's enough work around here to keep me busy. We had a big rain last week and I check all the trails to see if they're washed out. I'm responsible for maintaining all of the site. I meet a lot of interesting people from all over the world who come to see the petroglyphs. I hear first hand about their circumstances, lives and economies and don't have to depend on someone else's interpretation."

When visitors leave, Bigger invites them to come back for another stay and to tell the others about the petroglyphs.

Last summer the Youth Corps excavated pit houses near the petroglyphs where the early Indians once lived. The group reconstructed a pit house and a new trail leads to the house and digging site. The reconstructed pit house is made of sod and is shored with branches. Entering the cool interior is a welcome relief from the sun and the visitor discovers the inside has been dug out several feet deep. It offers an accurate portrayal and atmosphere of the ancient Indian home. Scattered bits of broken pottery cover the ground and provide evidence of the dwellings buried underground.

We asked Bigger when the petroglyphs were discovered. He said "The civilization around here is very old. Some of these families have lived here over the past 200 years and they always knew about these rocks. The park was not established, however, until 1967."

Modern civilization and progress have surrounded and encroached upon this ancient dwelling place, but it is also protected and preserved. The messages are as real today as when they were first inscribed. Perhaps one day we will understand what the rocks are trying to tell us.

DESIGNS ARE SIMILAR TO THOSE FOUND IN MEXICO THE PEOPLE WHO MADE THESE PETROGLYPHS MOVED INTO THIS AREA FROM THE WEST AND REMAINED UNTIL THE LATE 1300'S WHY THEY LEFT THIS SITE IS UNKNOWN PERHAPS IT WAS A RELIGIOUS SHRINE, OR A GOOD CAMPSITE ON A WELL TRAVELED TRADE ROUTE OF THE TIME PERHAPS THE HILLTOP OFFERED A GOOD LOOKOUT TO LOCATE GAME OR TO WATCH FOR ENEMIES.


Pope was in the livestock business for







# Mr. Peck... a very unusual mule

"Mr. Peck is a very unusual mule." And that's the unbiased opinion of Wayne Rupe — another of Ruidoso's mule fanciers and trainers — who, incidentally, owns Mr. Peck.

Seems, according to Rupe, that this particular 1,000 pounds of mule has "the disposition of a collie" and further, "he does several things by voice command" and, "all you have to do is point him, uphill or down, and that's where he goes, with no argument, but you'd better hang on, because he's going."

Mr. Peck has other traits. "He points big game," Rupe said. Rupe'll be riding Mr. Peck through the hills in search of elk, deer or bear. "I keep an eye on him. When he spots game he stops and points, with his ears, to the elk or whatever he's noticed. Just like a pointer freezing on a covey of quail."

Up until recently, Mr. Peck hasn't demonstrated any fondness for women. "In fact, he'd let any woman trying to get close to him know that he didn't like her," Rupe said.

Then DiAnn Ennis came along. DiAnn's

been, "in the saddle, on and off, all of my life, riding regular saddle horses, never mules." Since DiAnn's appearance, Mr. Peck's outlook on women has changed — but only so far as DiAnn is concerned.

"Any other woman'd better keep her distance," Rupe said, "because Mr. Peck just doesn't like them."

DiAnn wears two hats — veterinary assistant and nurse with Dr. Donna Harper, DVM, of Ruidoso mornings and Wayne's office manager afternoons.

"We plan to enter him in the short distances," Rupe said, "and may put him in the half-mile, depends on how he performs and how DiAnn does as a jockey."

Rupe will also enter Mr. Peck in log stepping and packing events during Mule-O-Rama and other events. "He's a real trail mule," he said, "and I think he can hold his own with any mule in the country."

Mr. Peck was 14 months old when Rupe, with 25 years of experience in mule training, bought him. "I got him broke," Rupe said, "but he almost broke me before I broke him."

Rupe, after a big game kill, will load the animal on Mr. Peck and "He'll pack the game into camp on his own."

Mr. Peck has had his filing in "pasture races and play days," Rupe said, "and he's undefeated, but, he's never been in any professional races, such as he'll be in during Mule-O-Rama."

The docility of Mr. Peck, aided, perhaps, by the fact that he's gelded — an asset Rupe is quick to tout — has, in Rupe's opinion, "made him one of the easiest handling and most dependable mules you'll find anywhere."

One thing you have to say about Rupe — he is extremely reticent when it comes to bragging up Mr. Peck.

## Plucky teenager fights bone cancer operation

When Diana Garcia returns home this time, there'll be a difference. The fourteen year old Ribera, N.M. resident underwent surgery for removal of her leg recently at Bernalillo County Medical Center. The reason: bone cancer.

However, Diana's prognosis is good. She has chosen to fight her battle against cancer in a medically advanced way — amputation of the limb followed by an extensive chemotherapy drug program which will bring her back to BCMC at least once every three weeks for the next 15 months. She will be treated by members of the Pediatric Oncology Program at the University of New Mexico medical center.

Diana was admitted to BCMC August 12. During the summer she had experienced swelling in her leg and weight loss. Doctors at a clinic near her home referred the young patient to BCMC.

The week of testing following her admittance was one of the most difficult times for Diana and her parents. They remember the uncertainty and the fear that the worst might happen — a diagnosis of cancer. And when the cancer was confirmed, there was the battle of facing it.

"Diana's been so brave about the whole thing," says her mother, Mrs. Jose L. Garcia. "Prior to this she had never even been in a hospital."

Doctors in the Orthopedic Department of the University of New Mexico's School of Medicine performed the surgery. And afterwards, even before Diana was put in the wheelchair, she was up trying to walk with the aid of crutches.

Diana's father has been away from his job as a highway construction worker since Diana entered the hospital. He has no hospitalization insurance.

Karen Bommelaere, social worker with the Leukemia-Lymphoma Society of New Mexico, said that Diana will be on a treatment plan through the Southwest Oncology Group. This is a group of major medical centers, including UNM and the M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston, which cooperates in comparing patient treatment and the results obtained.

The treatment plan provides funds for part of the expenses Diana will incur when she begins her 15-month program of chemotherapy. Under the plan, the drugs are free. Ms. Bommelaere estimates that some of the drugs used would cost up to \$1000 per visit.

Even with the help from the treatment plan and the out-of-county indigent fund granted to BCMC by the state legislature, Diana's cancer is a very expensive illness. The family must pay the travel costs involved in the chemotherapy program, as well as other unusual family expenses, and expenses for out-patient care.

Diana has been admitted to the out-of-county indigent fund program as a patient from San Miguel County. The fund already has paid for medical care for 21 patients from outside Bernalillo County since July 1, and 47 additional cases are pending approval, BCMC officials said.

Thinking about her release from BCMC, dark-haired Diana said she believes she has reached the point where she can answer the many questions about her amputation which will be posed by her curious brothers and sisters. They include Stephanie, 7, Dennis, 8, Karen, 11, Archie, 12, and James, 13. During Diana's illness her brothers and sisters have been staying at a grandmother's home in the Ribera area, leaving Mr. and Mrs. Garcia free to spend their nights and days at the hospital. Both parents have slept in the same room with Diana most nights.

Scheduled to be in ninth grade at Valley Junior High School in Pueblo, N.M., Diana is uncertain whether she will be able to attend school. It depends on the after-effects of the chemotherapy. Diana has played the clarinet in the school band for four years and likes baseball and swimming.

No one knows what causes bone cancer, but it's not contagious or hereditary. Increasing knowledge is being found through medical research, and the futures of children like Diana are becoming brighter as physicians and hospitals throughout New Mexico work together to combat the tragic disease.

### The Magic Time Of Fall Is Here

If you look at the date at the top of this page you will see that we are in the second day of Fall, the beginning of that glorious third quarter of the year that includes Fall, Autumn, and Indian Summer.

I am sending you this message on the twentieth, and there is hardly a sign of the approach of fall. Out south of the house, the oak brush is bright green amongst the soft darker shade of the pinon and cedar. Some of the fall flowers are blooming, it is true, yet the summer flowers are there amongst them. The rains extend the summer time into the season of the fall. Out across the fields there is that glowing radiance that is such a delight to your eyes. And as you walk across the little meadows you smell the sweetness that the grass sends up when it is growing rapidly.

Yet, there is a mysterious something in the air, as if the world is waiting and listening.

Let me go out and see if I can catch a message from somewhere.

**Have The Swallows Flown?**  
Our forefathers for ages past have always been close companions with the birds of the air.

They depended upon the birds for messages, especially about the weather. When the geese were flying south in their "V" shaped bands through the sky giving their far-carrying calls — like a boat-song of the heavens — then the Nomadic Indian, watching from the ground, knew it was time for him to take down his tents of buffalo hide and begin traveling south to the winter camp grounds.

The cries of the birds in the deep forest — or their sudden silence — these were clear messages of game animals, hostile animals, approaching friends or the presence of adversaries in war.

Through the years, birds have been looked upon as omens of good or evil, as bringers of good news or warnings, or guardians and agents of good fortune.

This companionship with our winged friends goes very deep in our nature. People in the great cities who have hardly ever been in the country have a love of birds, and look forward to their arrival in the spring and winter.

And the more you live close to nature, the more you come to depend upon the birds for any number of messages and signs.

Our forefathers, back in times when they lived as nomadic wanderers with the seasons, chose birds and animals as their totems. Your totem is your special comrade and friend in the bird and animal world. Later on, clans and tribes chose birds as their emblems to be painted on their coat of arms.

We are proud of our emblem on our own coat of arms, The American Eagle.

Birds such as the blue bird, mockingbird, robin, nightingale, spring sparrow, meadow lark are emblems of happiness. Shakespeare said, "Hark, Hark, the Lark at Heaven's gate sings". The birds have caught on long ago to their place in our lives and are the bringers of much joy with their songs and their friendly presence.

Many of us, often without being conscious of it, to this day pick a bird for our totem. Our mother's is the blue bird, mine is the snow bird, brother Lynn's is the pinon bird, I think. And I think Mark's is the meadow lark. Anyhow it rhymes. Maybe they have one bird totem up here and one down in Texas.

**The Last Swallow**  
I started out to tell you about the swallows leaving, and stepped off on a trail about all kinds of birds.

The swallow is one of the favorite birds of all time on account of their tameness,

and their intelligence. They arrive right at the first of spring and leave almost exactly on the first day of fall. So they have been called "The bird of summer."

There is a little empty feeling inside when I look all around the place and cannot see the swallows. When they first arrive they will all line up in front of the house on the REA wires. And much the same when they leave — except if it is very rainy weather or there is something unusual or sudden coming up.

Early this morning there was a lone little swallow on the closest wire he could find, just sitting there. I thought he was just the first one up and the rest would follow. Now it is about one o'clock and there are no swallows to be seen.

This little fellow must have stayed behind to say good bye, just one little advance guard comes to let me know the others are on the way.

Now I feel a cool blast of air out of the northeast. Surely the swallows must know something about the weather.

Maybe Jack Frost will make a little run by here and bring us a message. The message I bring you now is that we are going to have one of the most beautiful fall seasons you have ever seen.
