

'Good Sam' fund drive about over

The Good Samaritan fund drive — intended to provide a nursing and extended care facility for Lincoln County and area residents — is about to be brought to an early conclusion.

The Advisory Committee — plagued by the lack of interest being evinced by area residents and lack of financial participation — is seriously considering ending the drive Nov. 15.

Rejuvenation of the "Good Sam" project requires an instant infusion of tax deductible and substantial cash contributions — before Nov. 15.

The Advisory Committee — in a final appeal to area residents — has outlined developments in the plan from its inception to its present state of stalemate.

It began about a year ago when a saucy little lady tossed a news clipping on Charlotte Jarratt's desk and asked, "What are you going to do about it?"

Jarratt, director of the Senior Citizens Center, said she was "aware the area needed a nursing home facility some day"; but Billie Clarke, long-time Ruidoso resident, brought the challenge to Ruidoso's doorstep with a copy of an article on the Good Samaritan nursing home in Alamogordo.

Clarke and Jarratt went to Alamogordo to attend the public hearing for the facility

there and met briefly with Good Samaritan Society representatives.

"Until that time," Jarratt said, "I had never heard of the Good Samaritan Society. But I knew if we were to have a nursing home in Lincoln County, it would have to be one qualified for Medicare or Medicaid. Otherwise, there might be no way to regulate it and possibly no recourse if it didn't meet the standards."

The Good Samaritan representatives told Clarke and Jarratt that "We never come into a community without a request" and suggested that if the citizens were

interested, they submit a written request to the Society.

Jarratt said she first became aware of Ruidoso's need for a nursing facility when the Senior Citizens Center provided transportation to Roswell for medical patients. She spoke of one elderly lady who had surgery on her foot. The lady became well enough to leave the hospital, but she lived alone and was unable to take care of all her personal needs such as preparing meals. Jarratt said the woman couldn't depend on relatives and friends because they couldn't always be with her due to

their own private situations. The alternatives were for the woman to be kept in the hospital long past the time she could have been released, and at great expense, or to be placed "in what I call a boarding home and some of them are atrocious. They can leave marks you can't see on a person, but they're worse than a physical beating. They can rob people of their hope and self respect."

Jarratt told of another area resident who spends half her small monthly income for

Winters draws 7-15 years on battery charge

Nathaniel (J.J.) Winters of Ruidoso pleaded guilty to charges of "aggravated battery with firearm enhancement" before District Judge Geo. Zimmerman in Carrizozo Oct. 28 and was sentenced to not less than seven and not more than 15 years in the New Mexico State Penitentiary.

The sentencing stemmed from an Oct. 3 incident in which Winters and two others were charged in the rifle shooting of Frankie Calderon of Robin Road at Two Rivers Park, occurring about 4:30 a.m.

Winters was given 24 days credit on his sentence, beginning Oct. 28, for presentencing confinement.

Charges against Bill Albert Fernandez, Ruidoso, were dismissed by Judge Zimmerman.

The third party, Bobby Roy Salas of Ruidoso Downs, will appear before a jury when he is tried on charges of aggravated battery, at a date to be determined.

The charges against the three men, filed in magistrate's court in Ruidoso Oct. 4, read: "Commit the offense of attempted murder in the first degree, in that he did, while acting in concert attempt to unlawfully, willfully and deliberately and with premeditation, kill a human being, to-wit: Frankie Calderon, with malice aforethought, by shooting him with a firearm."

Members of the Ruidoso Police Department arrested Salas at 5 a.m., Winters and Fernandez at 7:45 a.m., near the Hollywood Food Mart.

Dems win county power posts

Lincoln County's registered voters — 2,841 Democrat; 1,962 Republican and 240 Independent — Tuesday named six Democrats and two Republicans to county office, to give the Democrats the political power edge in county government for the first time in years.

The leading vote getter was Marian L. Schlarb, County Assessor elect, (R), with 2,014, followed by Bill Elliott, County Sheriff elect, (D), with 1,948. Schlarb defeated G. Truett Ball (D), 1,331 and Elliott defeated Ernest S. Sanchez, (R), 1,727. Sanchez is a veteran of 12 years in

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medication and "last summer this woman was trying to catch trout from the river just to live."

In speaking of another type situation requiring nursing home care, Jarratt said a Lincoln County couple had to place their young adult daughter in a home out of state because there are no facilities in Ruidoso. "St. Mary's in Roswell had reportedly closed their wing for convalescent patients and the home in Alamogordo has a long waiting list."

"One of the oldtimers here in town had an accident and was hospitalized for several months. She had to pay someone to stay around the clock with her elderly husband because he is not well."

"People in our youth-oriented society think it can't happen to them or that they will never place their loved ones in a nursing home. They don't realize that it is often physically impossible to provide care at home that a person might require."

"We're not talking about an old folks home, but a nursing care facility designed for all ages."

A public hearing was held in October, 1975 and the apparent need for a home was established by response from a capacity audience. In an unprecedented move, the State Planning District 6 Review Committee of New Mexico Comprehensive Health Planning Council — appointed by the Governor — unanimously approved the request for a nursing complex in Ruidoso to serve all of Lincoln County.

Advisory and fund-raising committees were formed and the next step was to raise \$350,000 of the \$1,130,800 estimated cost and to secure the land for the building site. Clarke had initially told Jarratt, "Ruidoso won't let you down. You may think they will, but they won't."

The fund drive got underway last December... some misconceptions about the facility began to surface and there was a split in the business community. Young couples could not afford to contribute substantially and those who could afford to contribute, did not donate to their capacity. The majority of the donations and pledges came from retired people or those ready to retire.

Response from the summer visitors was minimal. They appeared to have no hesitation in using this area for their vacation fun, but did not offer much in the way of a permanent investment in the

community.

The Good Samaritan Society eventually told the committee that due to spiraling construction costs, the fund drive would have to end by December 31. They explained that investors could not honor financial commitments past that date.

Camelot donated a 15-acre building site and the drive rallied briefly with contributions from individuals, civic, religious and fraternal organizations. The nucleus of committee workers continued to devote their time and energy to a cause they believe in.

"Some people," Jarratt said, "don't realize they can sign a pledge card and pay it over a three-year period. We're not asking for the cash right now. We merely need to show the people at Good Samaritan

that we will have the funds available when they are needed."

Preston Isaacs, committee treasurer, said, "From strictly a business viewpoint, the center would have an annual payroll of \$250,000 and that's pretty good for this area, particularly in lean times."

Today, the fund is \$270,000 short of its goal. In less than two months, the project will end. If full support is not given, the committee will face the unpleasant task next month of returning all identifiable donations. Billie Clarke's initial question has not yet been completely answered: "What are you going to do about it?"

Alessios out of race track deal

C. Arnholt Smith's attorneys, according to a federal judge, are considering a consent agreement signed by Alessio family members, to keep the former financier out of a race track merger in New Mexico.

U.S. District Court Judge Leland Nielsen disclosed Tuesday that he had approved the consent order signed by the Alessio's ending the Securities and Exchange Commission's civil action against them.

The SEC had filed the suit almost simultaneously with the agreement, and it alleged Smith used his position as head of the now defunct United States National Bank to set up circumstances allowing the Alessios to secretly gain control of the Fortuna Corporation which operates race tracks at Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs.

The SEC said Fortuna Corporation stockholders plan to meet next Monday to consider a merger with Kodiak Industries which is controlled by the Alessio family. In its suit the SEC said Fortuna shareholders would be cashed out at \$3.60 per share under the proposed merger.

Kodiak currently owns 87 percent of Fortuna but the consent decree signed by Nielsen said only those shareholders not connected with Kodiak or the Alessio family will be permitted to vote on the merger. As a publicly owned corporation, Fortuna is subject to SEC regulations.

The suit claimed control of Fortuna was acquired in stages by the Alessios and by Smith who was later named in federal and state charges of fraud and misapplication of bank funds.

Although his state trial is pending, the exfinancier pleaded no contest to federal

felonies and was placed on probation and fined.

Kodiak was formed May 4, 1972, to buy all the outstanding shares of Sunland and thereby obtained working control of Fortuna, SEC attorneys said.

The Alessio family signed the consent order without admitting or denying the SEC allegations.

Stoneman polled 1,869 votes to 1,608 for Paul Pacheco to win the District 1 nod. Unopposed were George Straley Jr., District 2, 2,082 and John Sudderth, District 3, 1,972. Sudderth is an incumbent, appointed earlier this year by Gov. Jerry

Apodaca to fill the unexpired term of W.A. Hart, who resigned to accept the position, also by the governor's appointment, of Magistrate Division III, following resignation of Austin Pritchett in December of 1975.

County Clerk: Jane McSwane, (R), 1,726 in the county's closest race, over Sunny Hirschfeld, 1,702.

County Treasurer: Michael Kimbrell, (D), 1,878, winning over Flora Vega, (R), 1,607.

Probate Judge: John Thompson, (D), 1,831, edging Kenneth Nosker, (R) 1,718. In other high interest races, James Wheeler, (R), polled a decisive 1,589 votes in defeating W.A. Hart, (D), 1,537 for District Magistrate, Division III. Political observers had given Hart an easy win in this contest. Thomas Sandenaw (R) polled 1,843 votes in Lincoln County and 5,932 in Otero County, to defeat Richard A. Stanley, (D), with 1,590 votes in Lincoln and 4,888 in Otero, for the new office of District Judge, 12th Judicial District, Division II. Sandenaw's total vote was 7,775 to 6,478, official, for Stanley.

The three-fourths of one mill levy to maintain Lincoln County hospitals was approved by the official tally of 1,333 to 1,046.

In other races, Lincoln County voters joined the state trend in voting overwhelmingly for Ford, 2,320, and Carter 1,395; and approved Harrison Schmitt in the U.S. Senate race 2,456 to 1,258 for Sen. Joe Montoya.

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

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

SANTA FE—Look for major energy legislation, sweeping reorganization of state government and coal and uranium tax increases in the legislative session opening Jan. 18.

More efforts will be made to protect New Mexico energy reserves, especially natural gas, for in-state use. The state energy agency staff, headed by John O'Leary, is shaping a major energy legislation package. Gov. Jerry Apodaca will propose reorganization of state government to lawmakers. He cannot avoid stepping on sensitive toes and his plan will require delicate steering.

Rep. H.B. Barnard, D-Clovis, will offer a "Sunset Law" — automatic termination of state agencies unless the legislature continues them. An insurance agent, Rep. Barnard calls for termination of 19 present state agencies in 1978 and 16 others in 1979.

Court action will be filed by State Engineer Steve Reynolds relating to Carlsbad Irrigation District's call for enough Pecos River water to serve 25,055 acres. Reynolds says: "The court filings that I have asked for are still under preparation. Court authority is needed to administer the surface and ground water rights which are adjudicated in separate suits in a coordinated way." Reynolds says a ruling is needed because of conflicts stemming from the 1933 Hope decree on surface water rights and the 1966 Lewis decree on ground water priorities.

Reynolds says: "I have taken the position that I will not attempt to administer the priorities until there is a court adjudication coordinating the previous decrees. On a straight priority call on the Hope decree the CID could be hurt because of the effect in inhibiting the storage of water in Sumner Lake (formerly Alamogordo Lake), owned by Carlsbad Irrigation District."

A new, 38-member Citizens Association for Lawful Elections offered a \$1,000 cash reward to any person reporting and testifying leading to the arrest and conviction within one year of any person or group violating election laws. Bipartisan organizers are ex-Gov. Tom Bolack, a Republican, and former U.S. Rep. Tom Morris, a Democrat. Among committee members are ex-Gov. Bruce King, State Sen. I.M. Smalley, D-Hidalgo-Sierra-Launa; State Rep. Hoyt Pattison, R-Curry-Lea-Roosevelt; State Rep. Murray Ryan, R-Sierra-Grant; Dessie Sawyer, Tatum; Frank Tatsch, Silver City, and ex-

Highway Commissioner Reggie Espinoza. Election law violations should be reported to the FBI at Albuquerque.

Treasury Secretary William Simon said at Albuquerque that recent downward economic indicators reflect a pause in a stable economic recovery in the U.S.

Simon noted building permits and capital goods funds "were strongly upward." He said: "Tremendous economic illiteracy exists in our society." Simon insisted that "We're in the midst of a healthy, balanced expansion." Simon addressed a Republican fund-raising luncheon attended by 350 four days before the general election.

William Witter, assistant executive secretary of the State Board of Educational Finance, said efforts are under way to merge separate Espanola operations of the University of New Mexico's Northern Branch and New Mexico Technical-Vocational School. Witter said UNM's Northern Branch operates an instructional center at Los Alamos and offers courses in seven Northern New Mexico public school districts — Espanola, Penasco, Los Alamos, Questa, Ojo Caliente, Pojoaque and Chama. New Mexico Technical-Vocational School, headquartered at El Rito, offers courses at Taos, Santa Fe, Los Alamos, Espanola and El Rito. Witter said: "To build two campuses at Espanola is not economical in time and money."

New data released by the State Employment Security Commission shows Rio Arriba County with the second highest New Mexico unemployment rate at 16.9 per cent. Among unemployment rates in other counties: Chaves, 5.8; Curry, 4.8; DeBaca, 2.4; Guadalupe, 6.0; Hidalgo, 5.3; Lea, 3.2; Lincoln, 4.5; Los Alamos, 3.4.

Also, Sierra, 4.8; Union, 2.7, and Valencia, 5.9. Mora County has New Mexico's highest unemployment rate at 18.2 per cent.

The apparent low bidder on 2.5 miles of four-lane construction on NM-90 between Silver City and Tyrone was Armstrong and Armstrong, Roswell, at \$1,523,818. The Highway Department's estimate on the project was \$2,065,143.

Chaves County will receive \$528,624 in federal revenue sharing money in 1977 and \$726,029 in each of the next three years. Revenue sharing allotments for other counties: Curry, \$395,649 and \$543,396; Guadalupe, \$128,072 and \$170,011; Hidalgo, \$143,891 and \$197,624; Lea, \$952,300 and \$1,307,921; Lincoln, \$228,605 and \$313,971; Los Alamos, \$66,088 and \$90,767; Rio Arriba, \$633,301 and \$853,807; Sierra, \$104,710 and \$143,812; Taos, \$401,424 and \$539,433; Union, \$75,607 and \$103,842, and Valencia, \$712,279 and \$978,266.

Bidders paid a total of \$387,728 for New Mexico oil and gas leases at the latest State Land Office monthly sale. R.M. Young Jr., Santa Fe, was high bidder in regular sale sealed bidding with \$66,846 on a 160-acre tract about 21 miles southeast of Artesia.



This program is held to inform the students about academic programs.





Truly this year is a very spiritual time of year, and we all feel very close to our loved ones in this life and in the life in Heaven.



Indian Summer Pictures

Wildlife bond sale set

The State Game Commission approved issuance of \$2 million in Fish and Wildlife Conservation bonds to be used in capital improvement projects by the Department of Game and Fish.
Game and Fish Department Director William S. Huey said the bonds are to be issued within the next 30 days. He expects them to be retired within four to six years. The commission approved the issuance during a meeting held Tuesday in Albuquerque.
"None of the money has as yet been earmarked for any particular project,"

Huey said, "but we'll use it in much the same way we did our last bond issues, in large part as matching funds for federal aid grants and private donations."
The commission was first granted authority to issue \$1 million in bonds in 1964, and the legislature extended the authority by another \$1 million in 1968. The first \$2 million was matched with another \$3 million — most of it in federal aid funds administered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service — and used on 38 major projects.
The 1976 Legislature authorized the issuance of \$2 million in bonds this year; the last of the original issues was retired in 1974.

A portion of their license fees are being used in capital improvements of long-term benefit to them," Huey said. "These projects also provide habitat for nongame species, including in some cases refuges for endangered species."

The original issues, when matched with federal and private funds, resulted in construction of five fishing lakes; acquisition of eight wildlife areas containing 45,542 acres; reseeding of 6,855 acres of habitat; building of 32.5 miles of fence and 36.5 miles of roads; installation of 160 erosion control structures, 39 game watering units, almost four miles of cement irrigation ditches and more than a mile of irrigation pipelines, 4,600 feet of drainage canal and various other habitat improvements; leasing of 70,000 acres of big game habitat on the Costilla Grant for a period of 10 years; construction at the Rock Lake Rearing Station totaling \$332,547 and renovations there and at the Pecos, Parkview, Seven Springs and Glenwood hatcheries costing \$476,746; trapping, transplanting or introducing 17 desert and 46 Rocky Mountain bighorns, 318 elk, 586 antelope and 36 head of javelinas.

Bicentennial Notebook

WAR AND PEACE IN ASIA

While Americans were struggling for independence and the establishment of a new society two hundred years ago, events were occurring half way around the world that would have an impact on the United States far into the future.

In China, events were occurring to make that nation one of the largest and most populous in the world. Under the leadership of the Manchu Emperor Ch'ien-lung, mountainous tribes in remote areas were finally defeated after a five year struggle. These victories combined with earlier defeats of Mongolians and Tibetians had added some 600,000 square miles to the Emperor's domain.

The Emperor seemed unaware of a developing problem that would plague China far into the future — overpopulation. Since the beginning of the Manchu dynasty in 1644 the population had increased from around 100 million to about 300 million. This phenomenal increase had been possible partly because of the introduction of two American crops — maize (corn) and peanuts — that could be grown on marginal land.

More on the Emperor's mind in 1776 was cultural development. For example, he had 15,000 persons making 10,000 handwritten copies of books for the six major libraries in the country. In addition,

hundreds of painters and poets were in the employment of the government. The society of China was in a very high stage of development at this time.

Conditions were not as serene just to the south of China in Vietnam. There a three way civil war was underway that was tearing the country apart and would result in the loss of thousands of lives. The war had started when an attempt was made to reunify the country that had been divided between the north and south in 1613. The result was conflict between the governments of the north and south and the Tay Son family that was attempting to take control of the whole country. Much bloodshed was in the future of Vietnam.

Meanwhile, in Spanish New Mexico the problem of frontier defense remained paramount. In addition to the problems of manpower, the shortage of horses hampered the efforts of the troops who were stationed in New Mexico. The problem was so serious that Viceroy Bucareli was forced to appropriate money from the royal treasury to purchase 1,500 horses to replace those stolen from the soldiers and the citizens.

As long as a situation like this existed about the only defense available was little more than a holding action. — Donald W. Whisenant, history professor, Eastern New Mexico University.

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

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
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
