

# Crucial 'Good Sam' meeting Tuesday

The advisory committee of the proposed Good Samaritan Society Nursing Home, to be located atop Dude Mesa in Ruidoso, has scheduled a public meeting at 7 p.m., Nov. 16 in the Lincoln County Senior Citizens Center.

Attending this crucial meeting will be Mel Risting and Richard Sullivan of the Good Samaritan Society. Charlotte Jarratt, chairman of the Home's advisory committee, said today: "It is expected that at this meeting the

advisory committee, upon recommendation from the fund raising committee, will determine whether to continue with the drive through December 31, 1978, ask for an extension into 1977, or close the drive right now.

"Although such a drive should have been a total community effort, it has not proven to be so in this area. While several individuals, organizations and businesses have contributed, there has not been the proper input, interest, and concern, to

make the project a success thus far. Even with the donation of fifteen acres of beautiful, valuable land, by Camelot of Ruidoso, the drive remains at an impasse.

"The public is invited to attend the meeting Tuesday, November 16, so that it may be correctly informed regarding the project. We do not want to leave questions unanswered.

"Perhaps you all, and the general public, have the 'key' to a continued drive which might prove successful. We urge

you to please share your thoughts, and time, and money with us.

"There is a critical need for nursing home and sheltered care beds in our community. The Good Samaritan Society's new facility in Alamogordo is completely full, and St. Mary's in Roswell no longer maintains such facilities. Where can the people from our community go when they need nursing home care? How can we turn a deaf ear to such a worthwhile challenge?

"Perhaps the people in our community

have been waiting until a 'better' time. Believe me, there could be no 'better' time than right now. Time is of the essence.

"Over and over again, committee members have heard - 'I intend to give, but I don't know how much yet,' - or - 'The drive will be successful. Ruidoso's going to come through. They always do!'

"Surely 250 persons could pledge \$1,000.00 each over a period of three years. That's such a small amount really for an individual, and such contributions would ensure our having this outstanding and

much needed facility right here at home.

"We would like to point out, also, that any private business enterprise considering operating a nursing home, or boarding home, in this area will charge higher rates than those proposed by the Good Samaritan Society, and therefore make the facility unavailable to those who need it the most.

"If the people of this community really care, they still have time to pledge their support and money! But, do they really care?"

# Suspects held in shooting death of Los Lunas man

Two suspects are being held in investigative custody in the Valencia County Jail, Los Lunas, in connection with the shooting death Sunday of a Los Lunas man 11 miles south of Corona on US Highway 54. Lincoln County Undersheriff Ralph Romero told The Ruidoso News Tuesday.

"The names of the two are being withheld," Romero said, "pending results of the investigation."

Eloy Gurle, 25, Los Lunas, was taken by ambulance to the Medical Health Center in Carrizozo where, at 8:10 p.m., he was pronounced dead by the attending

physician, Dr. Ravi Bhasker, M.D. Death was attributed, Romero said, to a single bullet fired from a .30-06 rifle. The suspected weapon is being kept by Romero.

Romero, and other officers, located the shooting scene at 3:30 a.m., Monday and secured it until daylight when they located "blood spatters and clothing items, positively setting the site."

A statewide radio alert for the two suspects was issued and they were located in Valencia County by officers of the sheriff's department.

Romero and Deputy Charles Treadwell

drove to Los Lunas Monday and interviewed the suspects.

Gurle's body was dispatched to the office of the NM Medical Examiner in Albuquerque for autopsy, with, Romero said, "trace evidence" to be submitted to the NM State Police Crime Laboratory.

The bullet, Romero said, "entered the body near the right shoulder, close to the clavicle and exited on the right side of the back between the shoulder blade and waist."

Romero said: "The reason for the shooting has not been determined but the investigation is continuing with future

developments pending results of the autopsy and information received from the crime lab."

Speedy action in apprehending the suspects and locating evidence, Romero said, was "due to the immediate cooperation given by NM Game and Fish officers Dan Sutcliffe, Jack McDowell, Gary Dollahan and members of the Valencia County Sheriff's office and NM State Police."

Romero said that results of the autopsy and tests are expected to be available by Nov. 17.

The Warriors battled their way into the semi-finals by defeating Jal last Thursday 13-6 to claim the bi-district championship in Districts 3 and 4 AA.

McCurdy Mission won their bi-district crown by thumping Santa Rosa 43-20 Saturday.

"Our teams, offensive and defensive, are as physically ready as it is possible to be," head coach Doyle Howell said Wednesday.

"By scouting McCurdy Mission, we've learned that quarterback Bill Robinson, he's maybe 6-2, 198 pounds, is a tough competitor and a skilled ball handler.

"I still say of the Warriors, they've come a long way, they've put it all together, and I'm proud of the progress they've shown in their last two games . . . I'm real proud of

this team.

"It will take a tremendous team effort, but I know we can shake our offense loose against them and I know that our defense will be holding the line and breaking up those passes thrown by Robinson.

# Smokey Bear, national symbol, comes home

Smokey Bear has come home.

In 1950, he was discovered severely burned and desperately clinging to a smoldering tree trunk in the aftermath of a forest fire that burned 17,000 acres in the Capitan Mountains. The five-month-old cub became the national symbol for forest fire prevention and was flown to the Washington, D.C. zoo after he recuperated from his injuries. He died there Tuesday

morning at age 26 - comparable to more than 70 years in human age.

As old age and arthritis began to knit Smokey's shroud, Capitan Mayor Jay Johnston, his wife Dorothy and village clerk Doris Engelking started to work on getting Smokey returned to Capitan for his final resting place. The job was not an easy one.

Representatives from the Forest Service denied the request on the assumption returning Smokey's body would "take away" from the effectiveness of the new forest fire prevention bear who took over as the national symbol when Smokey

retired in May of 1975.

The citizens of Capitan took their request to state and national lawmakers. It finally took an act of congress to settle the question of Smokey's burial place.

H. Con. Res. 449, dated March 20, 1974 reads, "Whereas Smokey the Bear, America's most famous bear, is nearing the end of his important life; and

Whereas this extraordinary black bear was found by forest fire fighters nearly twenty-eight years ago in the Capitan Mountains of New Mexico clinging with burned paws to a tree, a cub only weeks old whose mother had been killed in a raging forest fire; and

Whereas this lonely, frightened cub was cared for and nursed back to health by a Capitan family in the New Mexico tradition of love and affection for all of God's creatures; and

Whereas this cub, first called Hot Foot Teddy, eventually took up residence in our Nation's Capital where he became world famous as the symbol of forest fire prevention for the United States Forest Service; and

Whereas this world famous Euaetios Americanus has come to be the most celebrated resident of the National Zoo in Washington, District of Columbia, has been immortalized in song and verse, and has earned a special place in the hearts of all Americans, young and old; and

Whereas the people of Capitan, New Mexico, have over the years contributed their time, their resources, and their efforts to the Smokey the Bear Museum and Park in honor of this renowned symbol of wildlife conservation; and

Whereas the children of Capitan and their Parents have begun a drive to have their bear returned to the Land of Enchantment;

Now, therefore, be it Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate concurring), That it is the sense of the Congress that when Smokey the Bear goes to that great honey tree in the sky, it is just and fitting that he shall be returned home to his place of birth, Capitan, New Mexico, for proper burial and a permanent memorial among the cool green mountains where he was born."

Smokey arrived at the Albuquerque Airport Tuesday evening by TWA airlines and was met by Ray Page, District Forest Ranger, who brought Smokey's body - packed in a pine box - back to Capitan.

Smokey was buried at 10:30 p.m. Tuesday in the northwest corner of the four-acre Smokey Bear State Park site behind the museum. His trip home was led by state police escort. The backhoe which

## Smokey Bear commemorative coins available




\$5. Sets, one silver and one bronze, in felt display cases, are also available in a limited quantity.

## Six injured in bus/truck mishap

Six persons were injured in a 5:30 a.m., Tuesday collision between a NM Transportation Department bus and a dump truck, loaded with gravel, about three miles west of Ruidoso on US Highway 70.

The injured, examined in the emergency room of Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital, included:

Harry Finck of Roswell, bus driver, transferred to St. Mary's Hospital, Roswell, about 8:30 a.m., suffering from multiple fractures of the left leg and multiple lacerations of the face.

Jean Paul Hammou, Brooklyn, N.Y., Jack Cochran, Detroit, MI and Ernest Roach, Empire, CA, passengers, admitted for observation.

James Laing, Roswell, passenger, treated and released.

Lloyd Ward, Portales, dump truck driver, treated and released.

Bus passenger Casey Leasure of Ruidoso was not injured.

Investigating officer Kent Waller, NM State Police, said the bus struck the dump truck while both were eastbound on the highway.

An eye witness told Waller that the dump truck made a left turn into the traffic lane in front of the oncoming bus. The left front of the bus struck the right rear of the truck, with the impact causing the truck to turn over "several times" the witness said. The bus veered off the highway, to

the south, and stopped in a cluster of pine trees.

The truck is owned by Ward, who was operating, Waller said, under a contract with the state.

Citations against Ward were pending Tuesday, Waller said.

Sale of these bonds will complete the \$1.6 million bond issue approved by Ruidoso area property owners in October, 1975 to finance construction of classrooms, a gymnasium and an addition to White Mountain Elementary School.

dug his grave was kept on top of the burial site until daylight to "prevent possible skullduggery", according to Mrs. Johnston.

Memorial services, open to the public, will be held Wednesday, November 17, beginning at 1 p.m. at the gravesite.

"This is the finalization of plans that I, the governing body and the people of Capitan have worked long and hard to accomplish," said mayor Johnston. "that when his inevitable time came, we did bring Smokey home. This probably wouldn't have been possible without the efforts of the honorable and good Congressman Harold Runnels who introduced the resolution to the House and got congressional action on Smokey's burial."

The grave will be marked with a bronze plaque set in a large boulder taken from Capitan Gap by Gerald Keeton and Johnston. When the park is completed, a

trail will lead past the gravesite. A playground, tennis courts, a new information center and the old museum will be included in the park.

"The people of Capitan went out and cut logs and built this museum out of love for Smokey," said Mrs. Johnston, "and it was one of our requirements to the Park Department that this museum be left as it is. Otherwise, the new park will be just another park with no meaning to it."

Twenty-six years ago, former game warden L. S. Simmons was credited with rescuing Smokey from that burning tree. Ray Bell flew him to a veterinarian hospital in Santa Fe where he received medical attention and the Bell family and friends took care of Smokey until his burns were healed.

Elliott Barker, former State game warden, gave Smokey to the Forest Service stipulating that "his life be dedicated to fire prevention and wildlife conservation." Barker's assistant, Homer Pickens, accompanied Smokey on the flight to Washington, D.C.

The first national forest fire prevention

campaign began in 1942 and was war oriented. In 1944, a Walt Disney animal character in old jeans and an old fashioned ranger's hat was used as an emblem. The symbol came to life when Smokey was found in 1950.


There were 201,511 reported forest fires in 1942. By 1972, that figure had been cut in half, in spite of a continuous population increase.

Forest area burned annually dropped from 31 million acres to 3 million acres—a 90 percent reduction—from 1942 to 1972.

During the course of his life, Smokey had five million visitors a year. He had his own large office staff in Washington. His volume of mail was so large he was given his own special zip code.

Wednesday a steady stream of people were visiting the Smokey Bear Museum and area floral shops were already receiving floral offering orders to be placed on his grave.

He was beloved by people across the nation, especially the children. If love can be marked in degrees, let it be said that the people of Capitan loved Smokey the most.

### A Friend Gives A Name To The Wandering Dog.

When I told my lifelong friend, Mike Gonzales, about how the black dog came to the house shivering and starving in the snow storm, and how the animal showed its gratefulness for food by just the look in its eyes — when I told about this, Mike's green Spanish eyes filled with tears. Like all of us, Mike has a soft spot in his heart for animals.

His wife, Crencenciana, said, "Your brother, Miguel, is like you. He cannot see an animal go hungry."

"Pobrecito. Pobrecito. Pobrecito perito," said Mike. (Poor little thing. Poor little thing. Poor little dog.)

We talked on about what good friends our dogs are, and how they never forget a kindness, and how our soul is uplifted every time we do an act of mercy.

A few days later, Mike said, "Hermano, como se llama tu perro nuevo, 'Solovino'?" (Brother, what is the name of your new dog, 'Solovino'?)

The name is made up of two words, Solo (Alone) and Vino (He came). Like so much of the Spanish language, it has a musical sound, pronounced "So-lo-VEEN-o."

Sometimes it takes several words to translate just one or two words in Spanish. In this ancient and colorful language, there are often what you might call overtones and echoes to a word so that two or three words fit together can have several meanings.

"Solo Vino" means: He came alone. He came by himself. He came of his own accord, in the sense that no one brought him. Or it means, "He brings himself as a free gift."

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



# Kodiak-Fortuna merger okayed by stockholders

The proposed merger between Kodiak Industries and Fortuna Corporation passed during Monday's annual shareholders' meeting of Fortuna Corporation at the Sunland Park clubhouse. Fortuna Corp. is the owner and operator of Sunland Park Race Track and Ruidoso Downs Race Track. The majority of stock in Fortuna Corp. is held by Kodiak Industries of San Diego.

# Driver Ed . . . tough course

"My goal is to teach kids how to drive, how to drive safely and keep them from killing themselves or somebody else," said Darrel Stierwalt, Ruidoso High School driver education instructor.

Stierwalt didn't start teaching driver ed seven years ago because he's just a competent driver. He completed a six-hour college course in drivers' training, in addition to his degree, and took various other classes in audio visual training, first aid and safety.

"The toughest thing to overcome is the students' nervousness. They're scared to death their first time behind the wheel. Some of them just don't think and the hardest ones to teach are the ones who have already driven before they come to this class. It's a matter of correcting their bad driving habits," Stierwalt said.

The course is 18 weeks long and offers one-half credit. Requirements include 30 hours of classroom instruction, six hours behind the wheel and 18 hours of observation.

"We use a textbook, have daily assignments and supplement the text with a workbook and pamphlets from the Department of Transportation, New Mexico State Police, insurance, auto and tire companies. It's hard to get in six hours driving time for each student — at 20 minutes each time — so we drive on the weekends or after school in addition to the time during the school week. I take one student driver at a time with two other students who observe from the back seat," Stierwalt said.

The school has a 1956 Chevrolet with a standard shift and leases a new Cutlass from Sierra Blanca Motors each year. The Chevy is equipped with dual brakes and clutches and the Cutlass has dual brakes. The cars are driven 15-16 thousand miles a year by approximately 180 students. A State of New Mexico credit card is used at local service stations for gasoline and the school is reimbursed four or five cents per gallon from the state, according to Stierwalt.


"If a student driver has a flat," Stierwalt said, "he or she has to change it. Oil changes and general maintenance, including washing the cars, are done by the driver ed students. Major work is covered in the lease agreement with Sierra Blanca Motors."

Students spend four to six weeks in the classroom before they are allowed behind the wheel. Films from the New Mexico State Police are used as teaching aids. "Everybody thinks it can't happen to them," Stierwalt said, "and these films are scare tactics in a way, but they show the kids what can happen. It's just like when any of us is driving down the road knowing we are being careless or doing something wrong, then we come across a bad accident and it makes us realize what can happen."

"I emphasize the use of seat belts in my classes. I look for their use to soon become a law. The new speed laws and seat belts will very definitely reduce death rates."

"This course is not required for graduation and the students are more or less on an honor system. When I take a few out to drive, the rest stay in the classroom to work and discipline is not a problem. Getting a driver's license is a prestige thing for most of them and when they're certified in this course, they can get a license at age 15 instead of having to wait until they're 16. The insurance rates for students who have successfully completed driver ed are about 15 to 20 percent lower."

The course, although only one semester long, is comprehensive. In addition to guest lecturers, films and the text book, Stierwalt teaches the students career awareness in all automobile related jobs — salesmen, mechanics, factory workers

and designers. The text covers safety standards, basic car control, turning, parking, laws, signs, signals, perceiving and communicating, maintaining, buying and insuring a car.

Test questions range from listing five symptoms of steering trouble to watch for, to describing two right-lane problems commonly found at intersections and what factors affect a car on a curve. Effects of emotions, illness, drugs and alcohol are also taught.

Stierwalt takes the first-time drivers to Gavilan Canyon road. "It's wide enough out there and not crowded. I sometimes have to grab the wheel and it makes the kids mad and they puff up, but they learn. I think girls are generally easier to teach than boys. Girls have a healthy fear and respect for the vehicle while boys, with

this male ego thing, tend to show off and want to hot rod. Some of the kids have to repeat the course, especially those who think they know it all and don't have to learn a thing.

"We've had only one accident and that was when a man backed out of his driveway without looking and ran into the student driver car. If the girl driving hadn't accelerated, he would have hit us broadside. Nobody was injured, but the kids were shook up. After it was all over, the student driver was very cool and followed the accident report procedures perfectly."

In expressing how they felt the first time they ever drove, the students agreed on "nervous". One boy said, "It was a new experience for me and sure was different from the horse I'd ridden all my

life." Other descriptions were "stiff, weird, scared, no big deal and excited."

We waited until Stierwalt was out of the room and asked the students what, if anything, were they learning in driver ed. We promised we'd accept their responses and use no individual names. Here's what they had to say: "It teaches me how to drive right and why." "You learn to think about what you're doing besides just turning the wheel and pushing the pedals." "I thought I knew everything about driving, but I'm learning the details on safety and conditions." "I'm learning how to deal with the dangers."

Given anonymity and a no-holds-barred chance to answer, it appears the students are fulfilling Stierwalt's goal with their interest and sincerity in wanting to "drive right".




DRIVER ED students at Ruidoso High School are taught to "drive right" by Darrel Stierwalt.

# Inside the Capital *by Fred Buckles*

**SANTA FE** — Voters raised the curtain on a new era in New Mexico politics by retiring Democratic U.S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya by a landslide.

Voters said they wanted a change by electing moderate-conservative Silver City Republican Harrison Schmitt, 41, an ex-astronaut, over Sen. Montoya in Schmitt's first try for public office. Santa Fean Montoya, 61, a 40-year veteran public official, won only nine of 32 counties — Guadalupe, McKinley, Mora, Rio Arriba, San Miguel, Sandoval, Santa Fe, Socorro and Taos. It was only the second defeat of Montoya's long career. He lost a 1950 U.S. House primary run.

Schmitt said he will seek assignment to the Senate Interior or Foreign Relations Committees. The Interior Committee is crucial to New Mexico interests. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-Albuquerque, will move to the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy. Montoya was on the atomic panel, U.S. Rep. Manuel Lujan Jr., R-Albuquerque, is also on the joint committee.

Lujan swamped his general election opponent 3-1 and carried 13 of 14 U.S. House District 1 counties. Lujan defeated Albuquerque Democrat Raymond Garcia, formerly of Penasco.

Voters adopted a constitutional amendment sponsored by State Rep. John Bigbee, R-Torrance - Guadalupe - DeBaca - Lincoln. Amendment 6 freezes into the constitution the present severance tax permanent fund. Under terms of Bigbee's amendment the legislature can spend the growing principal of the fund only by a three-fourths vote of each House. Income only from the fund's investments can be appropriated by lawmakers as other general operating revenue is appropriated. The fund is composed of tax receipts on New Mexico natural resources.

Voters killed five of seven proposed constitutional amendments. Among them they rejected Constitutional Amendment 2 and made Gov. Jerry Apodaca a lame duck. CA 2 would have allowed Apodaca and six other Democratic elected state officials to seek second four-year terms in 1978.

Lt. Gov. Bob Ferguson, 50, Artesia, said he will probably seek the Democratic nomination for governor in 1978. Under the state constitution Ferguson, an insurance and real estate business owner, is the only state official who can run for state office in 1978 and he can run only for governor. Other early 1978 Democratic governor prospects are ex-Gov. Bruce King, 52, Stanley; State Sen. Aubrey Dunn, Alamogordo; Ben Alexander, Hobbs, and State Rep. Raymond Sanchez, Albuquerque. Alexander was New Mexico Jimmy Carter campaign chairman. He is a former state Democratic Party chairman.

Lincoln County rancher Joe Skeen said he is weighing another try for governor in 1978. Skeen, the 1974 Republican governor

candidate, lost narrowly to Apodaca by 3,742 votes. Congressman Lujan is also

regarded as a 1978 GOP governor prospect. U.S. Rep. Harold Runnels, D-Lovington, may try in 1978 for the Democratic governor or U.S. Senate nomination. Gov. Apodaca, Las Cruces Democrat, is viewed as a prime prospect to run for the Senate in 1978 to try to oust Domenici. Assessing general election results, Gov. Apodaca said: "Elections are won by ticket splitters." Republican Gerald Ford won New Mexico over Democrat Jimmy Carter by about 8,500 votes and Schmitt won by some 57,000.

But Democrats retained firm control of the legislature. Democrats gained three Senate seats and lost three House members over-all. The GOP won some local races in Lea, Otero and Dona Ana Counties. Republicans won Valencia County courthouse control for the first time in 24 years. But, generally, Democrats kept a firm grip on most New Mexico courthouses, including Bernalillo.

State Sen. Kenneth Schlientz, R-Curry-Quay, suffered facial injuries when he was attacked in a Santa Fe parking lot. Schlientz said he was struck on his head and face four times while he was removing clothes from his truck at a Santa Fe motel. He suffered a cracked bone beneath an eye and facial cuts. His assailant fled when a car was driven into the motel parking lot with its lights operating. Schlientz was in Santa Fe for an interim lawmaker committee meeting.

A scrap between Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission and Capitan School District over an abandoned school at Lincoln was set to be aired before the Legislative Finance Committee at a commission budget hearing in Santa Fe. The state commission wants the former school to expand its operations. Ownership of the school property is in question. Lincoln County Commission deeded the property to Capitan Schools in 1974. Capitan Schools ordered the commission to vacate the school and claimed part of land that is on the site of Old Lincoln County Courthouse. The commission disputes the school district's claim and asked Atty. Gen. Toney Anaya to look into the problem. Asst. Atty. Gen. Jill Cooper was assigned to the controversy.

U.S. Sen.-elect Harrison Schmitt said he will hire Tony Payton, formerly of Clayton, as his administrative assistant in Washington. Tony Payton's mother, Mrs. Clyde Sowers, is co-publisher of the Union County Leader, Clayton. His father, Paul Payton, is publisher of the Lincoln County News. An ex-editor and publisher, Tony Payton is a Clayton High school graduate. He has been GOP National Committee Southwestern regional director for the last two years. He spent much time on Schmitt's successful campaign.

Gov. Apodaca recommended a 25 percent hike in coal and uranium taxes, aid to low income natural gas consumers and possible state controls over intra-state gas to the Legislative Energy Committee that met in Santa Fe this week.

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## Reflections . . .

The other night one of the kids at our house let out an unearthly screech that usually means "spider". This time it meant "algebra".

But nobody has ever accused the maitre d' at Horizon Country Club in Belen of being uncool. He welcomed me and four other Ruidosoans as though we were carrying members instead of stranded, dirty-jeaned, weary travelers.

And a big "Attaboy" to a fine Ruidoso freshman who kept his cool when he asked a New York waiter if there was an available table and got answered with, "How should I know, animal!"

No. 1-son Greg has settled in the Mile High City seeking his fame and fortune. Goblins broke into his home through a bathroom window Halloween night seeking his jewelry and stereo equipment. That leaves him with one material possession — an asthmatic Chevy van. Being on the receiving end of rip offs, poison pen letters and hit and run phone calls triggers about the same kind of emotions in each of us and they begin with RAGE.

A resident here, who wishes to remain unidentified, tells us he saw two of those Charity-Begins-At-Home types carefully select items from the Salvation Army box last week, then promptly take their finds to a local thrift shop for re-sale.

One's choice of friends is a statement about himself. Some choose only people from days and experiences long past. Others choose friends from lower or higher educational and economic backgrounds. A few choose friends who constantly criticize or cause unnecessary hassles. The saddest of all is the person who claims to have many friends, but who has exchanged little more with them throughout the years than a "How are you? I am fine". Fortunately is the person who has friends from a cross section of people he unconditionally accepts as they are and, in turn, is accepted for what he is. These mutually supportive friendships bring out the best in each person.

We aren't doing our kids any favors by trying to rear them in a hot house environment. It's painful to see them make the same mistakes or suffer the same hurts we did, but our concern should be for the child, not for peoples' judgment when our kids mess up. Each child is an individual in his own right and all the books on child rearing, psychology and behavioral science aren't going to change it. If there were some super blueprint to follow whereby everyone avoided mistakes, none of us would ever grow and develop.

### Clipped Comment

#### SOCIAL SECURITY PROBLEMS

There seems to be growing concern — and justly so — over the future of Social Security.

The recent plight of the system is resulting in a long overdue scrutiny of the program and its future.

Our second District Congressman, Rep. Harold Runnels, is not optimistic either.

Hoping that positive action can be taken soon, Runnels warns that if Congress does not heed the call of reform, "it would seem to me that eventually federal money would have to be pumped into the system in order that it remain solvent."

"What this would do, in turn, is further delay this country in attaining a balanced budget and add to the already blistering federal deficit," Runnels declared.

There are approximately 32 million people who look to Social Security for more than \$70 billion of annual income — not to mention the 100 million workers who count on it for future benefits — 15 percent of the entire U.S. population.

Social Security was enacted in 1935. The Social Security Trust fund presently stands at \$44 billion, but last year it dropped by \$1.8 billion as tax collections fell behind benefits paid out.

This year, benefit payments of \$78.2 billion are expected to run \$4.4 billion ahead of income, pulling the trust fund down to less than \$40 billion. By 1981, according to projections in the President's budget, the trust fund will be depleted to \$23.4 billion.

Congress may take up reforms in the next session. Here are some of the proposals before the Congress:

1. Extend compulsory coverage to everyone, including the 2.5 million federal civil servants, who now escape Social Security taxes. Universal coverage would immediately increase revenues by \$7.7 billion a year and ease the system's short-term needs for cash. But this would only increase the long-range problem.

2. A less drastic alternative than mandatory coverage would prohibit public-employee groups from abandoning Social Security once they had joined the system.

Yet another alternative is preserving the present voluntary coverage for public employees, but penalizing those who pull out.

None of these proposals look on the surface like a long-range answer to the solvency of Social Security. — The News-Bulletin, Belen.

BRIEF BIT: If we only learned one thing from the presidential election it has to be that we must never speak disparagingly of peanuts again . . . CD



# Highway department funded to continue photologging highways

The Department of Motor Vehicles' Traffic Safety Division released information today on two recently approved grants which will continue operation of the State Highway Department's photologging equipment. The federal grants include \$40,000 to continue operation of the photologging equipment, and \$20,000 to

continue a county-road mapping program. Photologging equipment consists of a specialized vehicle with a sophisticated camera recording system mounted on the vehicle's frame, and a monitoring system. The sensitive camera system is capable of visually capturing approximately 50 feet of four-lane highway, and its surrounding

right-of-way per film frame. The photographs, identified by highway mile post signs, then become a photolog consisting of sequential pictures of the highway and its surrounding environment.

Photologging equipment was first used in Iowa in 1959 and is now employed by more than 25 states. Basically, the equipment allows traffic engineers the opportunity to view problem highway areas on a screen rather than having to physically visit the problem area. Photologging equipment is precise enough to allow corrective engineering measures to be formulated on the basis of the films alone.

The mapping program will enable the Highway Department to provide county highway officials the materials necessary to prepare local maps indicating high accident frequency locations. In the near future, the maps will be analyzed to determine which locations will be photologged. Engineers will then be able to design safer and more effective highway systems.

In addition to filming highway trouble spots, the photologging equipment will be used to inventory and evaluate traffic

control devices, collect visual data for special research studies, allow engineers to schedule highway maintenance crews (for highways), evaluate roadside lighting, help in the design of future highways, and aid in the evaluation of highway landscape designs.

The photologging equipment was initially purchased for the State Highway Department through a \$32,000 federal grant made available by the DMV's Traffic Safety Division.

## WE MUST BE DOING SOMETHING RIGHT

Of the world awards, the U.S. won all five. A sixth, the Nobel peace prize, was not awarded this year.

Saul Bellow, American novelist, completed the sweep by receiving the Nobel Prize for literature. Earlier six other Americans won the Nobel awards for economics, medicine, physics and chemistry.

It is the first time in history that one nation has won all the awards in one year. It is refreshing to receive these awards from a board of international jurors. — The News-Bulletin, Belem

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## Cold morning car starting

It's an icy morning and you're running behind schedule. You dash to your car to leave for work, only to find yourself grinding away on the starter button because the frigid weather has lessened the power your battery will deliver.

Added to the weaker battery power is the stiffer oil viscosity which puts an ad-

ditional strain on your battery. Because your vehicles react differently to cold weather, the family auto should be conditioned to meet New Mexico's occasional cold snap, says Charles Hohn, Extension agricultural engineer at New Mexico State University.

A fully-charged battery will deliver all of its cranking power at 80 degrees Fahrenheit (F.) or 26 degrees Celsius (C.). The battery's power delivery capacity decreases with a drop in temperature. When the temperature drops to freezing, 32 degrees F. or 0 degrees C., this same fully-charged battery will deliver only 65 percent of its power.

This explains why battery sales increase the day the first really cold spell hits New Mexico, Hohn says. The freezing weather magnifies the problems of weak and marginal batteries which are probably due for replacement anyway.

As cold weather becomes more common, you should have your battery checked at the service station to determine

whether it will make it through the winter. If it will take a charge, get it fully charged for the cold days ahead. If the old battery

has trouble holding a charge, a new battery may be in order.

Clean around the battery mount and cables using baking soda and water. The soda neutralizes the acid accumulation and other corrosive elements, Hohn says.

Remove the cable clamp and clean all contact surfaces with a knife or steel brush. Firmly tighten cable clamps on battery terminals. Then apply a thin coat of grease to the surfaces of the terminals and avoid over-tightening, which could cause clamps to crack.

Finally, change the heavier summertime oil to a lighter oil in the winter, or use multiple-viscosity oil. A car tune-up, which includes new points, plugs and condenser, will also help make starting easier and avoid stalling when cold weather arrives.

 Many of today's diets are low in calcium because we don't use enough calcium-rich foods, such as milk and cheese, in our diets. Growing children need calcium to build bones and teeth, especially during teen years, when children are growing fast. Adults, too, need calcium even though they're not building bones and teeth. Each day, adults lose some calcium and must replace it. Calcium helps clot blood when you cut or injure yourself; it helps keep all your muscles in good shape so they can work for you... especially the heart muscles. Milk is our leading source of calcium. It also provides high-quality protein, riboflavin, vitamin A (if milk is whole or fortified), and other nutrients. Protein in milk builds and repairs body tissues, helps the body fight infection, and supplies energy. Eight ounces of fresh whole milk has about 160 calories; the same amount of skim milk has only 90 calories.  
 Foods Included in the Milk Group: Milk: fluid whole, evaporated, skim, dry, buttermilk. Cheese: cottage, cream, cheddar type, natural or processed. Ice cream. Yogurt.  
 Recommended Amounts: Some milk daily is urged for almost everyone. Recommended amounts in terms of 8-ounce cups (or glasses) of whole fluid milk are: children under 9, 2-3 cups; children 9-12, 3 or more cups; teenagers, 4 or more cups; adults, 2 or more cups; pregnant women, 3 or more; nursing mothers, 4 or more. Part of all the milk may be fluid skim milk, buttermilk, evaporated milk or dry milk.  
 Cheese, ice cream and yogurt can be used in place of part of the milk. The amount of any of these it will take to replace a given amount of milk is figured on the basis of calcium content. On this basis, examples are: 1-inch cube cheddar-type cheese equals 1/2 cup milk; 1/2 cup cottage cheese equals 1/2 cup milk; 2 tablespoons cream cheese equals 1 tablespoon milk; 1/2 cup ice cream equals 1/2 cup milk; 1 cup plain yogurt equals 1 cup milk; 1 cup fruit-flavored yogurt equals 3/4 cup milk.

Oryx released at White Sands

Thirty-eight head of oryx, a large African antelope, have been released into the desert wilds of White Sands Missile Range to join the other 150-200 animals already released or born there.

George Merrill, assistant chief of the Game Management Division and head of the game department's exotic animals introduction program, said the animals were the last of the breeding stock the department was holding at its Red Rock Experimental Wildlife Area.

The breeding herd had been held at Red Rock for possible establishment of a herd at a site other than White Sands. No other site was located, Merrill said, so the department decided to move the animals out.

The department first released the oryx on White Sands in 1969. If other suitable sites are located and approved, animals could be trapped from White Sands for introduction of a new herd, according to Merrill.

The animals were baited into corrals at Red Rock, then tranquilized for transportation to the missile range release site.

The antelope are large, some weighing as much as 500 pounds, with long spike horns running as long as 40 inches or more in length. They are also considered dangerous when wounded or cornered.
