

The Doctors Beechie begin practice here

Home Health Services open to county residents

Home Health Services of Lincoln County (HHS), a new concept of home care in this area, is now available to all county residents, regardless of age, requiring skilled nursing care on an intermittent basis in the home.

Verna Stoltzfus, R.N., is the Team Leader for the county. She may be contacted by phoning 257-5189 from 8 a.m.-5 p.m., Monday through Friday or by writing Home Health Services of Lincoln County, P.O. Box 2276, Ruidoso NM 88345.

Requests for care may be made by the patient, friends, family or the consulting physician. Referrals other than by the physician are screened by Stoltzfus with the service to begin only upon approval of the physician.

To qualify for HHS the patient must be under the care of a physician and confined to the home. Services offered include physical, speech and occupational therapy and the ministrations of a Home Health Aide, the equivalent of a Nurse's Aide in a hospital.

The aide, under supervision of R.N. Stoltzfus, provides some medical care, personal care, blood pressure checks, and, if necessary, home health aid exercises as taught by a physical therapist.

"This service," Stoltzfus said, "is treatment designed to keep patients at home instead of in a hospital, once their condition is such that hospitalization and around the clock nursing care is no longer necessary for recovery from illness."

At present, ten patients are receiving HHS care in the Ruidoso area. "I want to stress," Stoltzfus said, "that no person has to subscribe to our service, it is strictly voluntary on the patient's part."

HHS of Lincoln County is operating under a \$37,500 Health, Education and Welfare grant, launching a three-year program. The organization has an estimated budget of \$62,000 per year, with the budgetary difference to be made up through payments from Medicare,

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Medicaid, veterans' programs, private insurance and direct payments from patients when the latter method is necessary. "As the program grows and we are serving more patients," Stoltzfus said, "more Registered Nurses and Home Health Aids will be added to our staff."

CABLEVISION SEEKS FCC REQUIRED FRANCHISE

Council approves refuse system

The Ruidoso trustees Tuesday accepted the low bid of EMCO of Plainview, Tex., in the amount of \$111,094 to install a new refuse collection system to serve business, trailer court and high population areas in the village.

The system is the one that was operated on a trial basis in selected areas last summer and one, comments to the trustees indicated, that was generally accepted.

The bid included two large chassis trucks at \$28,700; 1 1/2 and 3-yard containers at \$54,234 and two compactors, installed in the truck collection tanks, at \$28,160.

Village manager Jim Hine was instructed to investigate financing options to secure the equipment on a five year lease/purchase agreement.

The new system, according to present scheduling, is to be implemented before the 1977 racing season opens.

The system is designed for one man operation. The truck stops beside the container which is lifted hydraulically and dumped into the collection tank for compaction. One truck, at \$13,700, will pickup and empty from the left side only with the \$15,000 unit having dual controls for pickup from either side.

It is the intent of the trustees, upon demand, to offer the new service to residential areas in which the terrain is conducive to an efficient operation.

Carl Kelley, manager of Cablevision of Lincoln County, appeared before the

trustees to request speedy action on the granting of a new operational franchise which must, by Federal Communications Commission regulations, be implemented by March of 1977.

The franchise request will be considered at the Dec. 14 trustees' meeting.

According to Kelley the existing franchise will be modified to include changing the rate setting structure, providing for the addition of pay TV within two years and to add a clause covering complaints or delays in providing service.

The trustees, though no official action was taken, indicated positive reluctance to give up the right to determine cable rates within the village.

The Ruidoso News contacted Kelley Wednesday morning relative to Cablevision's plans, following issuance of the new franchise.

"We must have the new franchise by March," Kelley said, "because the FCC regulations now state that no franchise may be issued for periods longer than 15 years and our current franchise is for 25 years."

Kelley said that Cablevision has purchased, since last March, more than \$120,000 in equipment to install and maintain cable service. The equipment includes three backhoes, a motor patrol, a crawler backhoe and a "Ditch Witch" that installs cable eight inches into the ground and, if in a yard, forces the grass back into place. "You can't tell where the machine has been," Kelley said.

The new equipment permits, Kelley said, "Workmen to return streets, driveways, or land wherever cable is installed, to original condition. Since our new machines have been operating, we've virtually completed all of the cover and repair work excavating problems occurring during our installation of 55 miles of cable during eight months."

During the past year, Cablevision spent, Kelley said, "More than \$120,000 to rebuild our lines and during 1977 we'll spend \$250,000 for feeder line installation from our main cable, both in replacement and extensions."

The firm will no longer, Kelley said, cut across streets to install cable. "We have a machine that will tunnel under streets, through which the cable is threaded."

Kelley noted that the optional pay TV service would provide non-commercial sports coverage and first run uncut movies.

Hine noted that Cablevision now pays the village three percent of their gross receipts as compared to two percent for

other franchise holders in the village.

"Cablevision is now equipped," Kelley said, "to fulfill all of our franchise commitments and in the future, barring equipment failure, we'll restore areas to original condition as soon as installations are completed."

The trustees set Jan. 18, 1977, as the date for a village election to authorize an additional one-quarter percent tax to be levied upon gross receipts. Ordinance 76-8 was introduced by trustee Sherman Atwood, with trustee Don Driver moving that the ordinance be passed and seconded by trustee George White. On roll call all trustees voted "aye" with mayor Davis recording an "in favor" vote. By council action last summer one-quarter percent will be added to gross receipts tax effective Jan. 1, 1977. If passed, the second one-quarter percent would be effective July 1, 1977. As a revenue producing measure, based upon the tax return of \$340,700 to the village for fiscal 1975-1976, the total of one-half percent would have produced an additional \$170,350 in village income.

In other action the trustees: — Approved the nominations of mayor

Lloyd L. Davis Jr., naming L. Ray Nunley to the Planning and Zoning Commission and David L. Travis to the Ruidoso Library Board.

— Authorized a call for bids to complete furnishings inside the library.

— Authorized the street department to handle snow problems on the street at their discretion and to advise the trustees of action taken. It was noted that the village has neither the manpower nor equipment for snow removal and that traffic would be less hindered if snow wasn't bladed into the middle of Sudderth and Mechem and onto the sides of residential areas. In the event of exceedingly heavy snow falls, emergency measures would be instituted to provide for traffic flow.

— Authorized village attorney John W. Thompson, upon request of municipal judge Sam Nunnally, to prepare an ordinance prohibiting the drinking of alcoholic beverages in public and to present it for action at the Dec. 14 meeting.

— Were advised that Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Association will publish legal notices of meetings at least four days prior to such meetings. — Noted that the village's share of the \$235,354 contract price for taxiway and ramp improvements at Municipal Airport totaled \$7,383 instead of the projected \$20,000.

Christmas decoration ideas being solicited

The suggestion was made at the Ruidoso trustees' meeting Tuesday that some changes in Christmas decorations might be in order — to have village decorations designed to enhance the natural beauty of this mountain valley — and to do away with the garish motif that has been used some years.

The suggestion was two-fold — the present decorations are shabby and there are always installation problems — putting appropriate lighting designs on water tanks or other elevated locations could enhance their aesthetic value.

Ideas on Yule decorations for the village are being solicited from the general public, all clubs and organizations, the Chamber of Commerce — any and everyone — with the suggestions to be mailed to: Village Trustees, PO Drawer 68, Ruidoso, NM 88345, not later than Dec. 13.

"We hope to come up with some fresh ideas," village manager Jim Hine said, "that could become permanent on vantage points and also that would encourage decorating by the business houses to enhance the festive Yule spirit."

Fire destroys Mallory home

The mobile home of the Bob Mallory family in Ruidoso Downs was totally destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon.

Six members of the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department responded to the blaze at 1:51 p.m. They were able to rescue one of two cats — the only occupants in the home at the time of the fire. Only the porch was left standing. At 8:50 p.m., firemen responded to a fire that destroyed the porch.

Anita and Bob Mallory have four teenage children and are in need of clothing for them since the fire burned everything they owned. Donations may be left at the Ruidoso Downs Police Department at City Hall or at the Fire Station next door to City Hall, according to Fire Chief Ray Walker.

Burglars pull big home heist

An estimated \$8,200 in home furnishings and personal belongings were reported taken from the Franklin B. Stalker residence on Davis Drive sometime after late afternoon Nov. 24.

The Criminal Investigation Division of the Ruidoso Police Department opened the investigation Thanksgiving Day upon being notified by Jim Burns, a neighbor, that a door to the Stalker residence was ajar. A window, above the kitchen sink, had been broken from the outside; officers said.

Mr. and Mrs. Stalker included in the list of items taken a Packard-Bell 19-inch color TV, a Marant Quadrophonic Receiver with numerous accessories, 283 albums, five cases of Maxwell C90 cassette tapes, 40 Quadrophonic eight track tapes, wood working tools, 50-pound Bear Bow, .30-06 and 308 rifles, 12 gauge shotgun and quantities of ammunition, a Singer sewing machine, Adler typewriter, turquoise ring with silver leaf, a turquoise belt buckle with silver leaf, a leather coat, lizard skin belt and miscellaneous items.

Skiers warned to observe all traffic signs

With the opening of Sierra Blanca Ski Resort Friday, Officer Kent Waller of the NM State Police, warns all drivers on Ski Run Road that traffic signs, posted as safety measures, will be enforced.

The signs, located on Sudderth, Mechem and on Ski Run Road, will be current. Condition posting includes:

— Chains Required. This applies to all vehicles, including four-wheel drive, even when equipped with studded snow tires.

— No uphill traffic between 3 and 6 p.m.

The legally posted "Chains Required" is under the state law: "Disobedience to a traffic sign" and, Waller said, "It must be obeyed."

Regardless of road conditions when driving to Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, Waller said, "It is strongly recommended that you carry chains in your vehicle, because conditions on that mountain can change so fast that you can be skiing in sunshine and trying to drive down the road in a howling blizzard through rapidly

forming drifts."

Mornings, following a snow fall or other conditions affecting the ski area road, a NM State Highway employee inspects the road and decides if chains will be required.

Information to the skiing public, on road conditions, is: — Broadcast over KRRR 1360 several

times daily, and the chains required warning as well as other road information and snow conditions are included in the announcement.



Kodiak Fortuna merger in doubt

Although stockholders recently voted to merge Kodiak Industries and Fortuna Corporation — owner of Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park race tracks — a restraining order filed by Attorney General Toney Anaya to prohibit consummation of the merger has been continued by Third Dist. Judge Garnett R. Burks, Jr.

Judge Burks further ordered at a hearing in Las Cruces Monday that he will vacate the order unless by December 6, either the individual plaintiffs post a \$25,000 bond or Anaya will agree that his office will not use the absence of a bond as a defense against a damage action in case the restraining order was wrongfully granted.

Kodiak, which is now Fortuna's majority stockholder, is owned solely by Al Rosa, Dominic Alessio and Anthony Alessio. The controversial merger has been called, "a fraudulent scheme to utilize corporate funds for strictly personal benefit" by attorney John Eaves representing shareholders and horsemen.

Opponents say the merger could jeopardize horse racing at both Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park because Kodiak did not file an application and has not obtained a license or approval for the plan of merger.

Anaya's suit contends "upon completion of consummation, Kodiak will become an

unlicensed operator of public horse races and the New Mexico Racing Commission must undertake action to close the race tracks then owned by Kodiak in the state of New Mexico. Fortuna's license cannot be transferred to Kodiak."

Kodiak is allegedly \$7 million in debt and claims assets of \$10,000-\$30,000.

A hearing "on the merits of the case" will be set by Christmas, according to Judge Burks.

Arizona woman highway fatality

A Nogales, Arizona woman died of internal injuries Saturday afternoon when the eastbound car driven by her husband spun out of control on icy roads and crashed into a westbound car 13 miles east of Ruidoso Downs on Highway 70.

The traffic victim was identified as Socorro Calixtro, age 44.

Five persons were admitted to the hospital for observation after a second westbound car crashed into the vehicle the Calixtro car had hit.

Kent Waller, N.M. State Highway patrolman who investigated the fatal accident, said, "It was a matter of Calixtro locking the brakes when he hit a patch of ice."

Cody Browning receives high baseball honor

Cody Browning, 14-year-old son of Duke and Jeannette Browning, Ruidoso Downs, has been selected by the Southwestern Baseball Clinics to participate in the 1976 Fiesta Bowl International Youth Baseball Games in Tempe, Arizona December 26-30.

Cody played in the local Little League for four years and following last summer's baseball clinic in Ruidoso, went to Mexico City for tournament play. He plays outfielder and third baseman.

Each of the players on the 15 All-Star teams is chosen for his desire, attitude, baseball skills and dedication to the game.

Highlights of the ballplayers' visit to Tempe will include attending the 1976 Fiesta Bowl football game, a Christmas breakfast, tours in the Phoenix area and an awards presentation.

Cody's mother said Friday, "Even though the parents are responsible for the transportation and all expenses, it's a wonderful opportunity for the boys. I hope Ruidoso can get a Pony League together and eventually have baseball in high school."



NOTICE OF BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING NOTICE OF BOND SALE RUIDOSO MUNICIPAL SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 3 GENERAL OBLIGATION SCHOOL BONDS SERIES 1976-B \$300,000.00

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Board of Education of Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3, County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, on the 7th day of December, 1976, at 2:00 P.M., at the Office of the Superintendent of Schools, Ruidoso, New Mexico, will receive sealed bids and publicly open the same for the purchase of the District's General Obligation School Bonds, Series 1976-B, in the principal amount of \$300,000.00, and at the same time the Board of Education, in a special meeting, will consider the adoption of a resolution authorizing the issuance and sale of Ruidoso Municipal School District General Obligation Bonds, Series 1976-B, in the aggregate principal amount of \$300,000.00.

THE BONDS will be dated December 15, 1976, will be payable to bearer, will be in the denomination of \$5,000 each, will be numbered consecutively in regular numerical order from one upward, and will mature serially on the 15th day of June in each of the years and in the amounts hereinafter designated as follows:

BOTH PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST shall be payable at a bank located in Ruidoso, New Mexico, to be selected by the successful purchaser within 24 hours from the time of the sale of the bonds. If the purchaser does not make the selection of the paying agent within the 24-hour period after the sale of the bonds, the Board of Education shall select the paying agent.

NO PROVISION shall be made for the registration of bonds for payment. The bonds of said issue shall be subject to the District's General Obligation School Bonds, and shall be payable from general (ad valorem) taxes levied against all taxable property in the District, without limitation as to rate or amount.

BIDDERS ARE REQUIRED to submit an unconditional written bid for all of the bonds of said issue, specifying (a) the lowest rate of interest and premium, if any, above par at which such bidder will purchase the bonds; or (b) the lowest rate of interest at which the bidder will purchase the bonds at par. All bids must be submitted in the Official Bid Form, copies of which may be obtained from the District's Secretary, Stern Brothers & Co., P.O. Box 470, Albuquerque, New Mexico, 87103. Proposals should be enclosed in a sealed envelope, marked on the outside, "Proposal for Purchase of Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3 General Obligation School Bonds", and addressed to W. S. Edwards, Secretary, Board of Education, Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3, Ruidoso, New Mexico, 86345.

THE BONDS will be awarded to the highest and best bidder considering the interest rate or rates specified and the premium offered, if any, and subject to the right of the District to reject any and all bids and re-advertise. The best bid for said issue will be determined by deducting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total amount of interest which the District would be required to pay from the date of the bonds to the respective maturity dates at the interest rate or rates specified in the proposal, and the award will be made on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the District.

The purchaser must pay accrued interest from the date of the bonds to the date of delivery. None of the bonds will be sold for less than par and accrued interest, and no discount or commission will be allowed or paid on the sale of the bonds. The District reserves the privilege of waiving any irregularity or informality in any bid.

ALL BIDS shall be sealed and except for the bid of the State of New Mexico, if one is received, shall be accompanied by a deposit of 3% of the amount of the bid. If the principal amount of the bonds, being \$5,000, is either cash, cashier's check, treasurer's check, or a certified check drawn on a solvent bank or trust company in the United States, which shall be returned if the bid is not accepted. If the successful bidder for said issue shall fail or neglect to complete the purchase within 30 days following the acceptance of the bid, or within 10 days after the bonds are offered for delivery, whichever is later, the amount of the deposit by the purchaser shall be forfeited to the District for failure of the purchaser to pay the purchase price for the bonds. In that event, the Board of Education may accept the bid of the one making the next best bid, or if all bids are rejected, the Board of Education of said District shall re-advertise said bonds for sale. If there be two or more equal bids for said issue and such bids are the best bids received and for not less than par and accrued interest, the Board of Education shall determine which bid shall be accepted.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION shall take action awarding the bonds or rejecting all bids for said issue not later than 24 hours after the expiration of the time herein prescribed for the receipt of bids. Delivery of the bonds of said issue will be made to the successful bidder at a bank in Albuquerque, New Mexico, or at the successful bidder's request and at his expense, delivery shall be made elsewhere as requested. The successful bidder will not be required to accept delivery of the bonds if they are not tendered for delivery within 40 days from the date herein stated for opening bids, and the good faith deposit will thereafter be returned to the successful bidder upon his request.

SUBSTANTIAL INFORMATION concerning the District and said bonds may be obtained from the District's Financial Advisers, Stern Brothers & Co., P.O. Box 470, Albuquerque, New Mexico, 87103. The District will furnish to the successful purchaser a complete transcript of proceedings had incident to the authorization and issuance of the bonds, including a certificate stating that no litigation affecting the validity of the bonds is pending as of the date of the delivery of the bonds to the purchaser together with an opinion of the Attorney General of the State of New Mexico and a legal opinion of McCull, Parkhurst & Horton, Bond Counsel, Dallas, Texas. Messrs. McCull, Parkhurst & Horton were not requested to participate, and did not take part, in the preparation of the Official Statement, Offering Circular, or Bidding Document, and such facts are not assumed by the District with respect thereto or undertaken independently to verify any of the information contained therein, except that, in its capacity as bond counsel, such firm has reviewed the information contained in the Official Statement and Official Statement to verify that such description conforms to the provisions of the bond resolution. The legal fees to be paid Messrs. McCull, Parkhurst & Horton for services rendered in connection with the issuance of the bonds are contingent on the sale and delivery of the bonds.



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

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CLOVIS — Rep. Tom Brown Jr., D-Chaves-Eddy, says energy legislation and proposed coal and uranium tax increases will headline the legislative session opening Jan. 18.

Brown is co-chairman of the Interim Legislative Revenue Stabilization Committee. The tax-writing committee voted final decisions this week in Santa Fe on legislation that lawmakers will receive. Energy bills will consume much lawmaker time. Senate Finance Chairman Aubrey Dunn, D-Alamogordo, says the legislature should cut taxes to help consumers to pay rising energy bills. Dunn would boost coal and uranium taxes.

Besides Brown, among legislators on the interim tax-writing panel are Sens. John Morrow, D-Union-Colfax-Harding-San Miguel, and Bob Wood, D-Chaves-Roosevelt, and Rep. Murray Ryan, R-Sierra-Grant. Gov. Jerry Apodaca recommended a 25 percent boost in coal and uranium taxes. Apodaca said: "We are on the verge of a tremendous expansion of production on coal and uranium and their prices are increasing very rapidly. Yet, on the basis of our existing tax structure, the revenues derived by the state will be negligible."

Extractive industry lobbyists are already registering for the legislative session. Among them are representatives of Gulf Oil Corp., New Mexico Oil and Gas Association and other natural resources companies. Sen. Donald Thompson, D-Albuquerque, proposes to hand the Public Service Commission power to regulate intrastate natural gas prices in New Mexico. Gov. Apodaca says he will submit similar legislation if necessary. Atty. Gen. Toney Anaya plunged into a cost of adjustment increase sought by Gas Company of New Mexico from the PSC. Anaya strongly opposed a 90-cent per 1,000 cubic feet monthly increase sought by GCNM.

Santa Fe Industries Inc. said the proposed 25 percent coal tax hike is too high. John J. Schmidt said a 25 percent boost will make Santa Fe Industries' coal uneconomical and non-competitive with most other markets. The firm seeks to sell 850 million tons of coal in the San Juan Basin to utilities for \$1.5 billion. The State Park and Recreation Commission approved a \$263,000 U.S. Bureau of Reclamation contract to develop recreation facilities at Heron Lake State Park, Rio Arriba County. The proposed development: Visitors center completion; a second boat launching ramp, extension of utilities, improvements to access roads in the park.

The commission approved a contract with Donald Clark to operate elephant facilities at the Old Butte area of Elephant Butte Lake State Park and Caballo Lake

State Park near Truth or Consequences. The Caballo Lake concession was transferred from Elephant Butte Marinas Inc., owned by Kenneth Johnston and William Galloway. The commission approved a land value appraisal for proposed Belen Valley State Park. The commission staff was ordered to make a fair market value offer to buy 5.5 acres near the Rio Grande at Belen.

Johnny Taylor of Truth or Consequences rejoined the Legislative Finance Committee staff at Santa Fe. Taylor was formerly president of a bank at Truth or Consequences. He is a former LFC analyst, Motor Transportation Department director and a State Banking Department administrator.

The Legislative Health and Aging Committee will vote decisions Dec. 15-16 in Santa Fe on proposed legislation. Sen. Ray Leger, D-Guadalupe-DeBaca-San Miguel, is committee chairman. Among committee members are Sens. Willie Chavez, R-Belen, and Matt Chacon, D-Espanola, and Reps. Bobby Duran, D-Taos, and H.B. Barnard, D-Clovis. An insurance agent, Barnard is pushing a Sunset Law. It would require each state agency to justify its existence in all of its functions before it could continue.

The committee heard reports at a recent Clovis meeting on Eastern New Mexico hospital, aging, mental health, rehabilitation and alcoholic treatment services. Possibility of expansion of the perinatology center at Bernalillo County Medical Center in Albuquerque is on the panel's December meeting agenda.

David MacLaughlin, 46, Taos, reported his experiences as a Republican candidate for district attorney in the Eighth Judicial (Taos-Colfax-Union): "Four dog bites, one bite in my right leg in Springer that required a tetanus shot, two falls over a wire fence between homes that caused bruises on my upper legs in Raton and stone bruises from walking and climbing." MacLaughlin lost his race.

New Environmental Improvement Agency Director Thomas E. Baca, 35, is a Belen native. Baca's status was changed from acting to regular director.

Two Clovis firms were incorporated in Santa Fe: Mesa Real Estate Inc., Mark Hall and William A. Smith, Clovis, incorporators, and Optometric Clinic Inc., Elwyn Crume, Clovis, incorporator. J&M Aviation Inc., Clovis, was also incorporated. Mennell Mullins, Clovis, was the incorporator. Dr. James I. Weiss, a Belen dentist, was incorporated as James I. Weiss, D.D.S., P.A.

Union Oil Company of California, Midland, Tex., was highest bidder in regular sale oral bidding at a State Land Office sale. The firm paid \$121,000 for a 640-acre tract about 12 miles southwest of

Unice. Exxon Corp., Midland, was high bidder in regular sale sealed bidding with a bid of \$78,106.33 on a 480-acre tract 12 miles southeast of Artesia.

A hearing was set in Las Cruces this week on a restraining order and injunction sought by Atty. Gen. Toney Anaya to stop a proposed merger between Kodiak Industries and Fortuna Corp., owner of Sunland Park race track. Approved by

stockholders Nov. 8 at a meeting at Sunland Park, the merger has been delayed by Anaya's suit.

The Legislative Finance Committee will meet Dec. 13-14 to hear budget requests of the state's largest agencies — the Health-Social Services Department, public schools and higher education. Sen. C.B. Trujillo, D-Taos, is LFC vice chairman.





Room-by-room \$-saving tips!



KITCHEN:

Preheat your oven just long enough, bake several dishes at once, and remember to turn off all units when you're through cooking. 

WHAT ABOUT THIAMINE ... NIACIN ...?



Q. I'm reading a lot about the key nutrients such as proteins, carbohydrates, fats, calcium, vitamins A and C. But how about nutrients such as thiamine? What does thiamine do for me and what are its sources?
A. Thiamine helps body cells obtain energy from food and helps keep nerves in healthy condition. It also promotes good appetite and digestion. Some important sources are lean pork, heart, kidney, liver, dry beans and peas; whole grain and enriched cereals and breads, and some nuts.


Q. What can you tell me about the function of riboflavin?
A. Riboflavin helps cells use oxygen to release energy from food and helps keep eyes healthy. It also keeps skin around mouth and nose smooth. Important sources are milk, liver, kidney, heart, lean meat, eggs, and dark leafy greens.

Q. How about the importance of niacin?
A. Niacin helps maintain health of skin, tongue, digestive tract and nervous system. It also helps body cells use oxygen to produce energy. Important sources are liver, yeast, lean meat, poultry, fish, leafy greens, peanuts and peanut butter, beans and peas, and whole grain and enriched breads and cereals.

Q. How important is iron?
A. Iron combines with a specific body protein to make hemoglobin. Hemoglobin is the red substance of blood that carries oxygen from the lungs to muscles, brain and other parts of the body. Iron also helps cells use oxygen. Some important sources of iron are liver, kidney, heart, oysters, lean meat, egg yolk, dry beans; dark-green leafy vegetables; dried fruit; whole grain and enriched breads and cereals, and molasses.

director of the Peoples State Bank, and a member of the board of industry advisers at the University of Wisconsin at Stout.



Bicentennial Notebook

ANOTHER AMERICAN TRAITOR?
General Charles Lee was captured by the British at Basking Ridge, New Jersey, on December 13, 1776. To some this was a major blow to the American cause. The British obviously considered Lee a key figure in the American defense effort. According to one newspaper account, the British were saying that the Americans were unable to mount another campaign because of Lee's capture.

However, the point of view of the "Freeman's Journal" was clear. "Mistaken fools! to think the fate of America depended on one man. They will find ere long that it has no other effect than to urge us on to a noble revenge." Even so, his loss was considered to be major. Lee is one of the most contradictory figures of the Revolutionary period. An Englishman by birth, he had been a soldier of fortune in many parts of the world and was an officer in the British army until just before the war for independence began. According to one authority, when the hostilities began in 1775 "he was almost violently on the patriot side." Commissioned a major general in June 1775 he served in several important military confrontations. Personally, he was a difficult man. He had the tendency to criticize his superiors on all occasions. Following orders was also difficult for him. For example, when Washington was retreating across New Jersey in December 1776, Lee delayed in obeying orders to join Washington's forces until he was captured at Basking Ridge.

After his capture he remained a British prisoner until he was exchanged a year later. Because of his conduct at the battle of Monmouth in 1778 he was court-martialed and convicted of three counts of misconduct. He was so abusive of Washington that he was challenged to a duel and wounded. This prevented at least

one other person from extending a similar challenge. Lee's loyalty was never questioned until 1858 when a document was discovered that showed that during his year of imprisonment he had given General Howe information about how to defeat the Americans. Long after the fact historians concluded that he was a traitor in much the same way that Benedict Arnold was. Considering some of the men he had to deal with, it is difficult to understand how Washington was able to persevere. The "provincias internas" of Spain were now directly under the responsibility of Jose de Galvez. The term "internal" or "interior" provinces was often used to describe the northern frontier region of New Spain, including New Mexico and Texas. They were interior in relation to Mexico, City, the capital of New Spain. — Donald W. Whisenant, history professor, Eastern New Mexico University.



In selected cases, social security helps pay for vocational rehabilitation services provided by the State of New Mexico and the other states.

In fiscal year 1975, over 60,000 disabled people in the United States received vocational rehabilitation services that social security helped pay for. Over 11,000 were successfully rehabilitated.

Up to 1 1/2 percent of the total amount of social security disability benefits paid during the previous year may be made available for rehabilitation services.

Additional information about disability benefits may be secured from any social security office. The state Vocational Rehabilitation office nearest you should be contacted for information about rehabilitation.

Wanted by the FBI

GERHARDT JULIUS SCHWARTZ, also known as Bill Lally, William Lally, Al Schwartz, Jerry Schwartz, "Blackie"; Fugitive, Bank robbery; Conspiracy — "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives" Program.

Gerhardt Julius Schwartz, wanted on a Federal warrant for bank robbery and conspiracy, issued on July 29, 1976, at Rochester, New York, has been added to the FBI's list of "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives."

On April 9, 1976, Schwartz and two accomplices were allegedly involved in the robbery of the Columbia Banking Savings and Loan Association, Rochester, New York. During the course of the robbery, Schwartz was reported to have been armed with a sawed-off shotgun. The two accomplices are now in custody, one of whom was brutally stabbed by Schwartz and left for dead shortly following the July

5, 1976, armed robbery of a local supermarket. Schwartz has also been indicted in state court for attempted murder and armed robbery.

Born May 20, 1929, in New York, New York, Schwartz is a white male American, who is 5'10" tall, weighs 170 to 180 pounds and has a medium build. He has black, graying hair, brown eyes, and a medium complexion. Schwartz has tattoos of a heart with mother and a dagger on his right forearm; two hearts with "True love, Mom and Dad, 1948" on upper left arm.

Schwartz is reportedly a compulsive gambler, has been employed as a laborer and painter and has used Social Security Number 073-22-1994. He has previously been convicted of petty larceny, attempted robbery, and robbery and should be considered armed and extremely dangerous.

Anyone with information concerning Schwartz should take no action other than to contact the nearest office of the FBI, the telephone number of which may be found on the first page of most local telephone directories.

PROGRESS IN SOUTH AFRICA

When it comes to social progress, government officials often turn out to be behind the people they supposedly lead. A fresh illustration of this phenomenon is found in a poll of South African whites on the government's apartheid policies.

The Afrikaans-language newspaper Rapport, published in Johannesburg, commissioned a private firm to survey the minority white population on reactions to race laws. Surprisingly, more than half of those questioned said they would support a number of major changes.

Such changes, for example, as abolition of the law whereby certain job categories are reserved for whites only; 57 percent favored this. Almost 71 percent oppose the laws requiring all blacks to carry passes that show whether they are authorized to be in a given area. By percentages ranging from 53 to 65.6, whites favored desegregation of theatres, churches, universities, ambulances, and participation in team sports. Abolition of the Mixed Marriage Act and the Immorality Act forbidding interracial sex also was favored by a majority.

Not long before the current poll was taken, the West German newspaper Allgemeiner Zeitung had published another of related import, its survey indicated that whites would not quit support in South African Prime Minister John Vorster were he to announce radical liberalization of race policies. The poll results now published by Rapport in Johannesburg appear to bear out this conclusion. — The Valley Courier, Alamosa, Colo.

Cut off through the trees and get some of that powder that lies there for days after a fresh snowfall. Get in the moguls and do it to it like Wayne Wong. Back onto the wide open runs for some sweeping turns and listen to the skis sing.

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
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Ruidosoans believe in higher education for their kids — about 5,000 feet higher.

A continuing community effort provides a ski program for school students at a price kids can afford with money left over for a Coke.

The program spans approximately six weeks, beginning in late January, and participating students are allowed one-half day each week — usually Tuesday afternoon — to close their school books and head for the slopes.

The majority of ski shops in Ruidoso give the kids a break on rentals and the evening before ski day is a scene of skis and boots

being hauled out of the shops by kids.

The program is designed for




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

students in grades four through twelve, but first through third graders are welcome to participate if they are accompanied by their parents or guardians to assume responsibility. Beginners must take two sessions of ski instructions and instructors employed at Sierra Blanca volunteer their time.

The ski course opened in 1961 and shortly thereafter, Pat Valliant, superintendent of schools, and Ken Newton, former teacher, approached the management at Sierra Blanca about the idea of a student program. Getting the green light there, they went to ski shops with the same request. Then they asked the townspeople to provide transportation for the students. The program has been alive and well ever since then with ap-

proximately 500 students participating annually.

School is no longer dismissed, as in years past, but any and all students who wish to take part in the program are allowed to do so. Ruidoso educators say students who are not doing well scholastically are discouraged to participate in the ski program until such time as their grades are improved.

The teachers used to be ski instructors for the kids, but, "the kids were soon better skiers than the teachers," Valliant said, "and the school sends only a few teachers now to help direct traffic or to be used wherever they're needed."

Kids know a good thing when they see it and few take unfair advantage of this concerted plan to benefit them. If they break the rules, they're kicked off the course just like anyone else.



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



Sierra Blanca perfect for beginners, x-perts

"Even if you have never had a pair of skis on, the first day you put them on at Sierra Blanca Ski Area," general manager Roy Parker says, "we'll have you riding a lift and skiing down a run."

This guarantee is made possible by the some 50 instructors that cater to the beginning skier. To insure that a person's first experience on skis is enjoyable, the instructors are on hand to personally supervise beginners and

teach them correct procedures. And when a skier gets the go

ahead from an instructor, there are lifts specifically for beginners—and away you go.

The gondola run, rising 1,700 feet above the base facility, may be tempting to the fledgling skier, but, Parker says, "The top of the mountain is no place for the first or second day skier, even though a snowplow, which all beginners

learn, will get you down Sierra Blanca Trail. Stick to what your instructor tells you and he'll let you know when it'll be safe for you to change from the beginner's slopes to those offering greater thrills and more challenge."

With a few days practice under the beginner's belt, to the point where those awkward boards are

doing what you want them to and getting you where you want to go, the ride up the gondola to take Sierra Blanca Trail (No. 5) offers

its own reward in scenery and skiing satisfaction. The trail crosses the wide expanse of Apache Bowl, eases across the north side of the mountain to



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
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Moonshine Gulch and from there, with the snowplow turns, it's downhill all the way to the base facilities.

The intermediate and expert skiers have the choice of many runs on the upper part of the north face of the mountain, and from mogul-bashers to powder-pigs, there's a trail that'll put their skills to the test. Trails 16 through 24 are not machine packed, so what nature and the skiers leave is what's there — and what's there offers challenge aplenty.

To get to where the action is, on 800 acres of mountainside with more than 30 miles of trails, there's the gondola's 1,700 foot vertical rise and the double chair, rising 1,300 feet vertical. Both lifts take you to the top of the mountain.

For the skier who knows what's going on, there's Apache Bowl that offers the finest in powder skiing after a fresh snowfall. Capitan Run has plenty of challenge and, from the base camp, there are always spectators to watch the hot-dogger go through his gymnastics.

For quick runs to the base area there's Moonshine Gulch, Lower Spruce and the tail end of Sierra Blanca.

From the top of the mountain, after a peek at the White Sands

glistening in the heat, a run down Chino, No. 14, will give you a fast change of pace.

If you're a bump-skier and moguls give you a thrill, your cup of tea will be Caliente, No. 22. It's straight down and it's narrow and it'll have your thighs aching. The best approach is not to look it over before you start your run, because you might miss out on real skiing thrills by deciding this slope can wait until another day.

An alternate run is down the Gondola Lift Line and this affords an opportunity to let the family watch you strut your stuff.

It's necessary to check on each lift to see if it's operational, because some of them don't operate after heavy snows. Lifts open at 9 a.m. The gondola and chair close at 3:30 and all other lifts at 4 p.m.

For refreshments, the main restaurant opens at 8:30 a.m., and during the skiing day the Broken Ski, Gazebo, Snack Bar and lounge are open offering warmth, food and cheer.

As to the slopes, they're machine packed by an experienced crew who have pioneered this type of effective maintenance for more than 20 years. And for the adventuresome there's trails 16 through 24, untouched except by skiers.

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
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Snow reporting policy

The only official ski reports from the Sierra Blanca Ski Resort are available 24 hours a day by telephoning 336-4351. Toll Free numbers are **OUT-OF-STATE: 1-800-545-4313** and **NEW MEXICO: 1-800-545-4325**. Note: Radio stations and newspapers will also be using this source to assure continuity and to avoid misunderstandings.

These recorded ski reports will normally be changed once daily, in the morning at approximately 9:30 a.m.

In the event that there is a change of skiing conditions during the day, i.e. additional snow fall, the recorded ski report will be so changed.

The recorded ski report will include the day and date; base snow depth in inches; skiing conditions rates as excellent, good, fair, or poor; new snow in either past 24 hours and/or past 10 days; and the weather at report time.

Ski report legend and policy:

EXCELLENT: Sufficient base to cover any and all obstacles on all trails, and some new snow within past 10 days.

GOOD: Sufficient base to cover all trails. No new snow within the past 10 days and surface conditions may vary to some extent, particularly from top of mountain to the base.

FAIR: Snow coverage not sufficient to cover all trails completely. Some obstacles may be showing on any or all trails. Surface conditions may vary greatly,

particularly from top of mountain to base.

POOR: Many obstacles (bare spots, stumps, rocks, etc.) showing on all trails. Some lifts and some trails may be closed due to insufficient snow.

There may be times when all trails do not have the same conditions, due to wind, sun etc., or the top of the mountain may not have the same conditions as the bottom. In this situation, the report will be issued on the management's best judgement of the average conditions.

Trails and/or lifts may be closed at any time at the discretion of the management due to insufficient snow, difficult and/or unsafe skiing conditions, or for any other reason the management deems necessary.

The Sierra Blanca Ski Resort packs, removes moguls and generally maintains the snow on the ski trails with five machines of the latest design for this purpose.

The New Mexico State Highway Department maintains the highway to the Ski Area with the finest snow removal equipment available

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
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
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
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Ski-Pak can't be beat

Ski shops, offering the best for skiers and winter visitors, dot both sides of the seven-mile Sudderth Drive in Ruidoso.

Skis, boots and poles rent for \$7.50 the first day and \$7 each day thereafter. Skis only are \$6 a day, boots only rent for \$4 a day and poles only for \$1.

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
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
