# Sudderth 'paving' plagues town, NM road officials

"The main use of the material is to prevent the damage to the road surface caused by freeze-thaw cycles, oxidation of the pavement and traffic wear and tear."

So said Bill Frerichs of the Sahuaro Petroleum and Asphalt Co., of Arizona, to The Ruidoso News in September. Frerichs was speaking of the rubberized-asphalt resurfacing project on Highway 37 through Ruidoso's main business area.

The surface is now coming apart at a rate that is measurable on a day to day basis. Frank Potter, Administrative Assistant to the Village, says street crews are sweeping up chips from the deteriorating street surface at the rate of about three tons per day.

Jim Hine, Village Manager, observes that, although he appreciates the State Highway Department's effort to fix the main thoroughfare, about the only good that has come of it is a stockpile of free chips for the Village.

Why is the new road surface coming apart?

Nobody really seems to know yet. If you told the engineers in the Highway Department that it's the altitude, they'd probably be as ready to believe that theory as any other.

Worth Smelser, District Maintenance Engineer from the District 2 office of the State Highway Department in Roswell is asking Ruidosians and visitors to "bear with us."

"We thought we were doing the best job

# School completes bond sale

The remaining \$300,000 balance of the \$1.65 million in general obligation school bonds was sold Tuesday to Kirchner, Moore & Co. of Denver at an effective interest rate of 4.86 percent — the lowest rate at which any of the bonds had previously been sold.

The first \$700,000 were sold at 5.30 percent to United California on January 13. On September 14, \$650,000 were sold to

Quinn & Co. at 5.125 percent.

The school board unanimously accepted Kirchner-Moore's bid which was 4.90 percent on bonds maturing from 1978-1981; 4.75% on bonds maturing in 1982 and 4.90% on bonds maturing in 1983. Net interest cost amounts to \$61,245 with no premium allowed.

Other bidders were: Stern Bros. & Co. of Albuquerque who quoted 5.25% on bonds maturing from 1978-1983 with gross in-

terest cost of \$66,150 less \$48.50 premium for a net interest cost of \$66,101.50. Effective interest rate was 5.246%.

Quinn & Co. of Albuquerque quoted 5.75% on bonds maturing from 1978-1980; 5.50% for 1981; 5.10% for 1982 and 5.25% for 1983. No premium was allowed and net interest cost was \$67,792.50 with an effective interest rate of 5.380%.

Zahner & Co. of Kansas City bid 5.38% on bonds maturing 1978-1981; 5.0% for 1982

and 5.10% for 1983. Gross interest cost was \$65,415 less a premium of \$17.50 for a net interest cost of \$65,397.50. Effective interest rate was 5.190%.

Board president Dave Parks pointed out, "There was over \$600 difference in the high and low bidders and more than \$4000 difference between the lowest and next to lowest bidder. We saved almost a half a point compared to the other two bond sales."

## Downs man charged in knife attack

Ed Marshall, 72, of Ruidoso Downs has been charged with aggravated battery, a third degree felony, following a Tuesday night incident in which Merdith Tissnolthos, Mesalero, suffered a knife wound in the abdomen.

Magistrate Jim Wheeler set bail at \$1,000, cash, with no ten percent, at a first appearance hearing in his court Wednesday. Marshall was ordered held at Lincoln County jail, at the hearing, pending posting bail.

Tissnolthos was given emergency treatment at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital about midnight Tuesday and was then transferred to the Public Health Service Indian Hospital, Mesalero. He was reported as being treated on an out-patient basis Wednesday afternoon by a hospital spokesman.

The preliminary hearing for Marshall was set for Jan. 3, 1977, at 2 p.m., in Magistrate's Court, Ruidoso, by Wheeler.

## Jackie Spencer receives Department of Interior's 'Public Service Award'



# County to build, maintain subdivision road

In a special meeting Monday, the Lincoln County Commission apparently resolved the long-standing access road problem in Fort Stanton Ranchettes by agreeing to build a new road and low level crossing in exchange for the proper easements.

The commissioners unanimously agreed to build the approximate one-quarter mile road "right away" and "wait for warmer weather to install a slab at the creek crossing." In addition, the county will "take in the entire subdivision and maintain it to the best of our ability."

The about-face decision came in the wake of a road dispute involving J. J. Di Paolo, Jim Wimberly and various property owners. Up until the special

meeting, the commissioners had maintained a hands-off policy declaring it was a matter to be settled by the property owners.

The problem surfaced when Di Paolo erected a fence and gate across a "trail" that runs diagonally through his 49-acre tract in the subdivision. The road had been used by adjacent property owners for access to their homes. Di Paolo asked the commission to realign the road in exchange for an easement. They agreed to the road abandonment, then ascertained the county had no jurisdiction in the subdivision, thereby rejecting Di Paolo's easement offer. In the interim, some of the property owners were land-locked and attorneys were hired to represent Di Paolo and subdivision owner Jim Wimberly.

John Conway, representing Wimberly, said, "Di Paolo is stuck with the easement across the middle of his land whether he wants it or not. We're not pushing the easement — going around the property is fine. The county cannot abandon the easement, it's up to Ruidoso Land Sales (now defunct)."

Bill Payne, representing Di Paolo, maintained that, "Di Paolo, Bill Clear and Clear's predecessor are willing to give an easement around the land."

Commissioner Bud Payne said, "To build around the perimeter will create more of a problem due to the steep grade and it's up to Di Paolo to build the road. If the people accept it, then they can use the new road."

In response to Payne's statement, Di

Paolo said, "I don't need a road. I can get into my property, but I'm trying to help others. I don't want to make a hardship on anybody, but Di Paolo is not going to build a road. I decided the county two and a half acres and that's all I'm going to do."

Attorney Payne agreed saying, "Di Paolo has no obligation to build or maintain a road."

Wayne Townley, Di Paolo's neighbor who has been adversely affected by the road situation, said, "All I'm interested in is getting to the school bus and back home. I don't care how you do it. I walked for three weeks during the summer when it rained. I'm not a quarter of a mile off the highway, but my other neighbors won't agree to have a road go through their

property for me to reach the highway."

Commissioner John Sudderth said, "We've got to discuss this on economics as well as feasibility. We can put in a low water crossing for the water to run over, not under. We've got these all over the state and they're not the best answer, but they're the only answer. We can get technical as hell, research and name names, but it's a waste of time. In my opinion, we should make a new alignment around Di Paolo's property, put in a slab crossing, do as much grade, drain and graveling as we can and take in the entire subdivision on the county system."

Townley agreed to donate a cattle guard to be placed where Di Paolo currently has his gate. Di Paolo said, "I've left that gate open ever since hunting season and all my

stock is loose."

According to Commissioner Payne, "We'll use four inches of gravel, it will take about a week of county employees' time, the road — depending on accessibility of gravel — will cost about \$2500 and the crossing another \$1500 to \$2000."

Chairman R. C. Nunez asked if the solution was agreeable to all concerned and Jim Wimberly said, "As long as it's up to county standards, we have no objections."

Attorney Payne said, "If everyone agrees the road can be re-routed, I'll get the correct easements and dedications."

Sudderth said the county can accept Di Paolo's easement at any time and "the present easement across his property can just die a New Mexico death."

possible. Now, with the winter weather, all we can do is watch it, get with the Sabuaro people out of Phoenix and see what they say about it, and see what it looks like next Spring."

Smelser assured The News that the Highway Department wouldn't abandon the Village. He said, "We came in with the intention of doing the best job possible, and we're not going to go away and leave it alone. We've got the same interests that Ruidosians have in the project, plus the fact that we've got a lot of money invested in it." Smelser also said some of the areas looked real good. He didn't specify which areas.

The material, called "Overflex," is a mixture of 75 percent paving asphalt and 25 percent ground rubber, obtained from old tires. The mixture is heated to 400 degrees and sprayed on the old street surface. Precast aggregate is then rolled into the asphalt-rubber mixture to complete the resurfacing.

According to Sheldon Bennett, Director of Engineering Maintenance, State Highway Department, Santa Fe, the process was developed in California. He says it has been used most extensively, and with good results, in the Phoenix area.

Bennett also said that the only previous experience the State Highway Department had with the process was two small test areas in the north and south ends of the State in 1970. Bennett said he "thinks the tests were successful."

Bennett indicated that the test areas were a five mile stretch of Interstate 25 south of Raton and on Hudson Street in Silver City. That area of I-25 is under the jurisdiction of the Highway Department's Las Vegas District. Ernest Apodaca, District Engineer there said that to his knowledge "Overflex" had not been used anywhere on I-25. He said all he knew about the process was that it was a new product, only a couple of years old, and as far as he knew, untried.

Cecil Gilbert, District Construction Engineer for the Roswell District Office of the State Highway Department, told The News there was no prior experience with the "Overflex" process in the Roswell District. He said he thought the process had been used at the Roswell Airport.

Gilbert's boss is C. D. Rickman. Rickman is on vacation for two weeks in Hawaii and couldn't be reached by The News for comment. It is understood, however, that the final decision to use the

"Overflex" process in Ruidoso was Rickman's.

Smelser acknowledged that he had "a lot to do" with the decision to use "Overflex" in Ruidoso. He said that the company (Sabuaro) had "shown us some films" and the process looked like the answer. "Mr. Rickman wanted to try it."

Gilbert says that one of the considerations in using the process was the ease with which it could be applied. He said there are no problems with "Overflex" on a community roadway because of curbs and gutters and manhole covers. With a conventional 2-inch overlay, such obstacles pose special problems.

The State Highway Department personnel contacted by The News concurred that by their mathematics the "Overflex" is less expensive than an overlay — about \$1.29 per square yard for "Overflex" as opposed to \$1.73 for overlay.

One of the biggest problems posed by the "Overflex" surface is what to do with it if it doesn't all come up this winter. Any remaining "Overflex" will almost certainly have to be removed before any other surface can be put on the street.

The problem lies in how to remove it. Scarfing — the process by which an old surface is scarred by mechanical rakes and heated to high temperatures in preparation for a new overlay — probably

can't be used. With a 25 percent rubber content in the "Overflex," any one who has ever seen an old tire burn can imagine what the results of scarfing "Overflex" would be.

So, Ruidosians and visitors are stuck with "Overflex" until spring, or at least as long as "Overflex" sticks. The Highway Department assures Ruidoso that they are watching the material and that they won't leave the street in the shape that it's in come spring.

Whether Ruidoso was subjected to premature experiments with a process generally untried and unknown in our area remains unanswered.

Highway Department personnel admit that although their intentions were good, from the advantage of hindsight, perhaps a test site more remote than the Village's main street would have been better.

Village Manager Hine, although disappointed with the results, remains happy that the department at least tried to do something to Sudderth Drive. "It hadn't been touched since 1961, and was getting in 'bad shape,'" he said.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. thinks the community has suffered enough and just hopes the problem is solved as quickly as possible.

And the Highway Department is studying the situation.

dress, two counts, bond \$10,000.

Early Wednesday evening Aupperle posted cash bond with Brown and McCoy posting surety bonds and they were released from Lea County jail at Lovington.

## Commissioners budget anti-recession funding

Lincoln County Commissioners Tuesday handled routine matters in one of their last meetings before newly elected commissioners are sworn in January 3.

The last regular meeting of the present commission is tentatively scheduled for 10 a.m., December 28.

The commissioners agreed to budget anti-recession funds of \$8,113 for a mechanic's assistant at \$560 a month for four months. The balance of the funds had previously been set aside to hire Jack LaMay for six months in the road department.

Anti-recession funds are awarded to the county through Title II of the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, based on revenue sharing, and are used to alleviate the unemployment problem by hiring employees. The funds are not to be used to create new positions. The \$8,113 represents first quarter funding.

Les Olson, county manager, said the current county unemployment rate is 4.8% compared to a national average of 8.1%.

He said that the comparatively low figure is in fact, "artificial because Lincoln County is not an urban type county and there is the tourist element in Ruidoso. What we're faced with is more people working, but working for much lower wages. We have many unskilled laborers and families who, with both parents working, are barely existing."

"Funding based on unemployment rates is a contradictory thing. Cities qualify for the grants, then people from rural areas move into the cities seeking employment, thereby creating more problems."

New Mexico this week moved from 48th to 49th on the scale of per capita income. The latest figures available state that the average annual income for Lincoln County families (based on four persons) is \$8,522 or less. Families headed by a female have an average annual income of \$3,899. Bureau of Labor statistics state "a family

of four needs \$14,500 a year to live adequately."

The commissioners agreed to use \$8,000, provided by the Forest Patrol, toward the purchase of a four-wheel drive vehicle for the Sheriff's Department. The Forest Service gives the County the funds in exchange for extra patrol in forest areas by sheriff's deputies. The commissioners said what type vehicle and when to let bids would come before the new commission.

There was some discussion of a \$500 bill from the medical examiner for an autopsy performed on a deer hunter who was recently shot to death near Corona. The commissioners agreed to leave approval of the bill to Sheriff Leandro Vega and payment up to the new commission.

"On buck passing day," as commissioner John Sudderth called it, the commission also agreed to once again table the joint powers agreement for a mental health board and "let the new commissioners decide whether they want to enter into this agreement."

In other action, the commissioners:

— Approved acting treasurer Flora Vega's request for an audit as routine during the officials' transition and authorized her to hire temporary help, as needed, until January 1.

— Agreed to install a cattle guard on a county road near the Ralph Dunlap property after hearing a request from Mrs. Ralph Dunlap.

— Appointed Bill Hirschfeld to replace Hazel English on the Health Systems Agency Sub-area Council to meet requirements of three lay and two professional persons to serve.

— Heard an appeal from Tammy Horrigan, Carrizozo high school student, who was selling luminarias for the school speech team. Sudderth personally bought 150 to be placed around the courthouse in Carrizozo.





# Inside the Capital *by Fred Buckles*

ALBUQUERQUE - Conflict of interest laws for county officials and school board members will be a top priority for Rep. Pat Hath, R-Belen, in the legislative session opening Jan. 18.

She says: "One reason the public has no confidence in government is that we don't have laws to prevent public officials from 'using' their offices. There are laws but they have no teeth in them. The laws conflict so they are meaningless." As Valencia County clerk she was a leader in a fight against irregularities in Valencia County government. She will push in the legislature for laws requiring accountability by local public officials, especially in sheriff's offices.

She says: "One of the Valencia County problems was that we didn't have any accountability in county government. When laws are written to prevent the use of power of offices a kicker is always put in for those who want to get around them." She will end her second term as county clerk in January. She favors some type of coal and uranium tax increase. "I know that will be unpopular with the industrial power groups in my county," she says. "I feel it is necessary. I'm in favor of some of the industrial giants outside the state helping to carry some of our tax burden because they are taking away something that cannot be replaced - our natural resources."

In Republican legislators' caucuses here top leaders were re-elected. Rep. Hoyt Pattison, Curry-Lea-Roosevelt, a House member 14 years, was renamed as GOP House leader 17-4 over Rep. James Caudell, Albuquerque. Rep. Maurice Hobson, Lincoln-Otero, was renamed as GOP House whip without opposition. Sen. John Conway, Lincoln-Otero, was re-elected as GOP Senate leader. Conway has been a senator six years. Sen. Willie Chavez, Belen, was elected as Senate GOP caucus chairman unopposed. He replaced Sen. Leo Dow, Albuquerque, beaten Nov. 2 for re-election to the Senate. Sen. Conway was also unopposed.

After a four-hour closed caucus House Republicans dropped the idea of forming a coalition with conservative House Democrats to oust newly renominated Speaker Walter Martinez, D-Grants. Rep. Pattison said: "We always hear talk every two years about coalitions. In 14 years I've never heard this get past the talking stage." Rep. Martinez beat Rep. Joe Kloepfel, D-Bernalillo, 27-21 for renomination as speaker Nov. 30 in a House Democratic caucus after a bitterly fought campaign. Rep. Kloepfel said afterward he will not lead a Democratic-Republican coalition to dump Martinez as speaker. Martinez has been speaker since 1971.

Rep. Pattison said a proposed coal and uranium tax hike "needs to be looked at very carefully." He said: "The oil and gas industry already pays more than its share compared to coal and uranium." With a \$87.7 million projected state surplus Rep.

Pattison favors a general tax cut by reducing state income or gross receipts taxes or adopting specific gross receipts tax exemptions.

Sen. Conway said the nine GOP senators weighed in their closed caucus state income tax relief by moving all tax brackets down one step or removing the gross receipts tax from groceries. Conway said decriminalization of marijuana was also discussed. But he added: "From a quick overview of our troops I don't think it's going to get off the ground." With young Democratic senators trying to wipe out the seniority system in committee appointments Conway looks for a split among Democratic senators. Even with reduced GOP Senate strength, Conway says, "We will probably be more effective than we have been in the past."

Rep. John Bigbee, R-Lincoln-Guadalupe-DeBaca-Torrance, says the Village of Ruidoso Downs is experiencing money problems providing services related to Ruidoso Downs race track. Rep. Bigbee would provide more money to pay for municipal services by dividing the track daily racing fee 50-50 between New Mexico cities and counties. Bigbee seeks reappointment to the powerful House Appropriations-Finance Committee. Bigbee favors a state income tax cut.

Sen. John Morrow, D-Unlon-Colefax-Mora-San Miguel, says information is insufficient to justify a tax increase on coal and uranium. Morrow is on the influential Senate Finance Committee and an interim tax committee. Morrow says: "There could very well be a tax cut when we get the whole picture. The surplus is quite a bit more money than is needed to run state government." He opposes public employee collective bargaining.

Gas Company of New Mexico asked the Public Service Commission to approve temporary removal of a moratorium on new natural gas connections in 10 New Mexico cities: Clovis, Tucuman, Truth or Consequences, Grants, Gallup, Portales, Kirtland, Silver City, Alamogordo and Anthony. GCNM said residential and commercial requests for gas could be filled.

Rep. Nick Salazar, D-Rio Arriba, said he favors an across-the-board gross receipts tax decrease. The State Highway Commission heard a request from Santa Clara Pueblo to help to fund a third bridge over the Rio Grande at the south end of Espanola. The SEC previously agreed to cooperate in building the proposed bridge with money from several sources. Since then a contract has been awarded to build a Rio Grande bridge at the north end of Espanola. Broce Construction Co., Inc., Tucuman, was apparent low bidder at \$218,454 on a bridge replacement in Quay County on NM-18 8.3 miles north of NM-86. A report showed defeated U.S. Sen. Joe Montoya's election day activities cost \$39,395. Included was \$7,500 to Rio Arriba County Democratic Chairman Emilio Naranjo.

Dear Editor:

Re: The article, or letter written by Mrs. Sanchez concerning the Sierra Blanca Airport, etc.:

Approximately two thirds of the settlers in the Rio Ruidoso Stream system elected me chairman to represent them in their adjudication suit now pending in the courts. Altogether there are some 165 settlers who enjoy the sacred use of the waters of the Rio Ruidoso for irrigation purposes. This leaves about 100 users who voted for me. In the course of defending these water rights it has been necessary for me to contact personally some 100 members, and while doing so I brought up the subject of our proposed airport. These same one hundred settlers have stepped forward voluntarily and paid their assessments. For over two generations they have come forward aggressively, and voluntarily to protect their waters and voice their opinions on any worthwhile project that might need their help. In fact, it was they who salvaged the Ft. Stanton lands when they were up for grabs, and it is they who would like to see ten or twenty dollar an acre land turned into fantastic productivity of 12,000 dollars per acre land.

It might be news to Mrs. Sanchez and others, but the good things we enjoy in our area did not come easily, it has been a battle all the way. Our watershed is as intact as the day the Apaches walked in hundreds of years ago. As a result we present the fastest growing community in the State of New Mexico, a splendid school system, hospital facilities, banks, a beautiful recreational area probably second to none, the World's Richest Horse Race which has nowhere reached its true expansion. You name it, we got it! And through the efforts of these 100 settlers we have the waters to fully develop the entire area!

Certainly growth is painful! Perhaps we should turn back the clock and once again drive our livestock to the railroad, haul our freight via team and wagon, reopen our one-room school houses, tear up our paved roads, and other modern conveniences. Back to the outdoor tub and wash board, no running water in the house. Those of us who went through that particular era might miss some of the old west, but you better believe we don't miss that part of it. Whether we like it or not this is the jet age, just as in about the year 1915 we went into the machine age. We can no more deny our people a modern airport than we could have denied them power, running water, modern transportation facilities and other comforts. That is, unless we wish to become a second rate area. Negative thinking never got one pioneer worth his salt west of the Mississippi River, and it has no place in a modern America. Let the majority rule!

And even the best glass eye doesn't do a thing for your peripheral vision.

## Clipped Comment

### DEALING JUSTICE

One of the more neglected segments of our society is the juvenile offender, the young male or female who has violated the law but is too young to face adult court, or has committed a crime not deserving of harsh punishment.

Too often these people are shuffled through the process of the juvenile court system for minor offenses and humiliated by the impersonalization of the judicial process. This does absolutely nothing to help many of the young people who must face a degrading ordeal for a one-time offense.

Youth offenders usually are taken to court, placed on probation to the courts or sent to a correctional institution. None of these present alternatives serve to give positive direction to a first time offender.

Another problem with the existing means of dealing with the juvenile offender is that it takes three to four months before he or she makes it to court. This leaves many offenders in a position of living in fear for that period of time of what will happen. Often their imaginations run wild. It also means that the unaffected offender will have three to four months to repeat the crime or other crimes with the attitude that "there's nothing more they can do to me now."

Statistics indicate that adults who commit crimes have their roots in juvenile crimes. Those with a history of violating the law will continue to do so. If an offender can be dealt with in an affirmative manner, there is a better chance that

future offenses may be eliminated.

There is a way that the juvenile offender can be dealt with on a more positive level. A juvenile court conference committee.

This committee would involve volunteers from the community and cooperation from the courts, legal profession and county and city government. The committee would meet with each individual offender, make a more personal evaluation of the offense and the person involved and then meet with the parents or guardian. This committee would serve to gain a better understanding of the why of the situation and perhaps be in a position to recommend steps to help the offender rather than just merely punish. The committee, if it deemed appropriate, could send the child on to court, or could solve the matter among themselves.

The offender would be dealt with as an individual, as a real person who has committed a crime. It would help to unclutter the courts and expedite justice when it is needed, not when the system has a few moments to hear the case. Also, people of the community would have a more active part in meeting justice, knowing that the best interest of both the offended and the offender are met.

A first time shoplifter, for example, could work out his sentence by sweeping floors or cleaning sidewalks.

A conference committee would not serve to provide an easy way out for the offender but rather would offer a more useful, beneficial form of justice all around. - The News, Rupert, Idaho.

**KNOW YOUR FOOD**

**HOW MUCH MEAT TO BUY?**



Learning to estimate the number of servings various cuts of meat will provide comes only from experience... but the learning does pay off! Pieces of a single cut of meat may vary in the amount of gristle, fat and bone they contain so the exact amount to buy often must be determined at the meat counter. This is one of the reasons it's important to buy meat at a store that close-trims its meats. You'll get more meat and less waste for your money. Here are some guidelines that can help you estimate:

If average amounts of waste are assumed and 3 ounces of cooked lean meat is counted as one serving, a pound of meat will provide--

- 3 to 4 servings of cuts with little or no fat or bone: flank steak, boneless loin steaks, ground meat, round steak, lean stew meat, boned roast with little fat, liver, center cut of ham, veal cutlets, fish steaks and filllets.
- 2 to 3 servings of cuts with a medium amount of bone: most roasts, some chops and steaks, ham, poultry, dressed fish.
- 1 to 2 servings of cuts with much bone, gristle or fat: lamb, pork, or veal rib chops, plate and breast of lamb or veal, spareribs, shank, short ribs, chicken wings and backs.

You may want to serve more than 3 ounces or less than that amount depending on how much each person wants or the size of pieces, such as chicken parts, chops or steaks.







From immigrant to president of a multi-million dollar computer-based brain scanners firm is the story of the 1976 Missouri State Small Business Person of the Year.

Arne R. Roestel, 35, President of ARTRONIX, Inc., St. Louis, immigrated from Uruguay in the 1960's. In 1968, to pay his way through Washington University, he started a basement laboratory to design sophisticated instrumentation for the University's physics department. His

success in business soon won over school and he incorporated ARTRONIX the same year.

The firm's main product is the sales of total systems responsibility. It provides equipment, services and support for a variety of uses, ranging from computer-based medical systems and equipment such as the brain scanner, to data-based management and information systems. Hospitals, medical schools, universities and major companies comprise 90 percent of the firm's sales.

A few of ARTRONIX customers include: Strong Memorial Hospital, Rochester, New York; Ontario Cancer Foundation, London, Ontario, Canada; New York University Medical Center, New York City; Osaka University, Osaka, Japan; and Mallinckrodt Institute of Radiology.

One-third of the firm's business is exported to customers in Japan, Europe and the Middle East. Service, however, is the key word. If a client has a problem ARTRONIX has a man on site within 24 hours. The firm employs about 200 people. In 1975 the sales volume reached \$8 million.



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# Comprehensive planning helps entire community

Because of the increasing interest in the future and its challenges, laws now provide a framework within which communities may guide growth according to the people's desires, says Ricardo Pino, Extension community development specialist for New Mexico State University. The blueprint for this growth is called a comprehensive plan.

Not every planning activity may be termed comprehensive, Pino says. To be comprehensive, it must deal with a broad range of concerns simultaneously and

encourage understanding of the relationships among the elements of the plan.

A typical comprehensive plan might include a study and analysis of economic conditions, population, physical geography of an area, land use, natural resources, street and road networks, public facilities and utilities.

A comprehensive plan should contain a development section. This section includes a statement of objectives, and plans for land use, roadways and public facilities.

Also estimate the costs of major public expenditure and inventory of the revenue sources available or needed.

It's also important to prepare to implement the comprehensive development plan. Consider such items as zoning, control over land development, protection of roadway facilities and programs or priorities for public improvements.

Finally, good planning requires coordination and administration of planning activities with local, state and federal agencies. This means planning for ways to

face day-to-day community problems, to keep information current and to update the comprehensive development plan.

This kind of planning is truly comprehensive because it deals with a broad range of community concern and involves a broad spectrum of both lay and government people. Therefore, the planning process and its output becomes important to local government, to residents and to community investors.

Comprehensive planning helps local government insure adequate services and

facilities, an adequate roadway system and harmonious uses of various sections of the area. This should lead to more efficient use of tax money, Pino says.

To the resident, comprehensive planning helps insure the stability of area values. Therefore, an individual can plan for the future with reasonable certainty concerning his residence or his business.

For the local or foreign investor, the planning process sets the framework for

development. This helps him know what standards he must meet as well as what standards he can expect from the rest of the community.

Comprehensive planning may also maintain the agricultural economy of an area. This means that it maintains land in its highest productivity. Planning helps fulfill this aim by preventing premature urbanization of rural areas which would result in higher taxes to support increased demands for urban services and facilities.

### SCHOLARSHIP AND PANIC

Even in the midst of a war for survival students were not to be denied their pleasures. In several of the states, colleges had been disrupted by the Revolutionary War, some even to the point of closing their doors.

In Virginia, however, the College of William and Mary was still operating in a fashion more or less normal. It was there on December 5, 1776, while George Washington was retreating with his army across New Jersey, that five students gathered together and formed Phi Beta Kappa. This organization was a social fraternity, the first to be founded on any college campus.

These five students were not aware that their action would have any long-range results. They were interested only in social activities. Even so, in 1831 Phi Beta Kappa was changed to an honorary fraternity. Today, it is the most prestigious of all honor societies in American colleges and universities.

Far north in Philadelphia things were not so calm. Defenses for the city were virtually non-existent. News of the British army approaching Philadelphia created near panic among members of the Continental Congress. According to William Whipple, a member from New Hampshire, the news "struck such a panic in all orders of the people there, except Tories . . . that the contagion seized the nerves of some members."

Finally, almost in desperation, Congress decided to move on December 12 to Baltimore for safety. Even though they considered the move necessary to keep the government functioning, it was a very depressing experience for many members

to be associated with a government on the run.

Since the members could not be sure of their future situation, just before they left Philadelphia they passed a resolution "that, until the Congress shall otherwise order, General Washington be possessed of full power to order and direct all things relative to the department, and the operations of war." In truth, Congress had made Washington the virtual dictator of the United States.

The end of 1776 approached on a very dismal note for the new nation declared so eloquently less than five months earlier.

In New Mexico things looked brighter because Jose de Galvez had been appointed Minister General of the Indies, the highest office in Spain for dealing with colonial affairs. Galvez was responsible for many of the recommendations to reform the administration of the northern frontier. Now that he was in a position of authority he set out to put his own recommendations into practice. — Donald W. Whisenand, history professor, Eastern New Mexico University.

## Forest Service seeks seasonal employees

Applications for temporary seasonal employment in Lincoln National Forest will be accepted through Dec. 22, according to District Ranger Ray Page.

Summer employment applications will be accepted from Jan. 1 to Feb. 15, 1977.

The seasonal positions are mostly Forestry Aid or Forestry Technician in grades GS 2-5, with employment periods varying from one to nine months. Some positions will open in February.

Application forms, available from the

Smokey Bear Ranger District in Ruidoso, or any Lincoln National Forest office, must be mailed to: Temporary Employment Coordinator, USDA, Forest Service, 517 Gold Ave., S.W., Albuquerque, NM 87102. Applicants for seasonal employment may apply for work in only one national forest and duplicate applications will not be accepted.

Applicants must be 18 years old when they report for duty, have at least six months of job-related experience or be

high school graduates. GS 3, 4 and 5 positions require additional experience, with hiring to be on a merit basis of experience and education.

Successful applicants must pass a physical examination as well as a physical fitness test for fire related work before being employed. Most positions will involve wildland fire prevention and suppression duties, with some in isolated areas.

Candidates will be considered without regard to race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, politics, marital status or any other non-merit factor.

Persons desiring help in filling out the seasonal application forms may attend a meeting Dec. 10 at Smokey Bear Ranger Station from 10 a.m. - 12 noon and at the Captain Administration Site from 1-4 p.m.
