Downs trustees are asking bids on All American Park

Village of Ruidoso Downs trustees agreed Monday to call for bids on the multi-purpose court, perimeter fence, portable bleachers and playground equipment for the proposed All American Park "in keeping with State purchasing laws."

Village clerk Virginia Spall said, "We will bid all items over \$1,250." The park, to be completed by April 1, 1977, has been funded through the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation and the State Planning Department. The \$32,000 proposed project includes \$4,000 cash funds to be paid by the Village and \$4,000 force account — village employees to contribute that amount in labor.

An assistant attorney general had recently cautioned the governing body, by letter, on their move to name Wally Hjalmsquist as supervisor of the turn-key job without apparently securing the required bids. Mayor Norman Wheeler said Hjalmsquist will still serve in a supervisory capacity for the park project.

In other action, occupation license tax structure was discussed. Mayor Wheeler said the Village currently collects \$1 per \$1,000 gross receipts for an occupation license from businesses within the corporate limits. There has been some controversy over this structure and "to go to a flat rate would cost the Village \$2600 to \$3000 in revenue. Being in the situation it's in, the Village needs all the revenue it can get."

Mayor Wheeler said some of the "bigger businessmen" have complained about having to pay the \$1 per thousand when the

Village doesn't collect tax from Ruidoso Downs Race Track. "I've contacted senators and legislators in this area," Wheeler said, "to get our fair share from the race track and it sounds promising. The way I understand it, we can get it (the tax) from reserved seats, admissions, the Jockey Club, concessions, cafeteria and the feed stores."

Council agreed to table action on changing the occupational tax structure until the December 27 meeting "in hopes of having a full council." Trustees Don Clark and Albert Richardson were absent at Monday night's meeting. Trustee M.H. "Boots" Nelson expressed concern that "people will criticize us if only the three of us make a major decision of this kind."

The trustees agreed to close village hall December 31 in observance of the New Year. Mayor Wheeler said, "All the city employees have done a terrific job, worked alot of overtime and a day off for them would be great." He also commended trustee W.R. "Pappy" Johnson: "Pappy plowed every street in this town the night of the big storm and didn't get paid a dime. He worked from eight that night until two the next morning and did a tremendous job getting at least a foot of snow off our streets."

The council also:

- Adopted Ordinance 76-5 regulating trash containers.
- Passed Resolution 76-11, budgeting an increase for anti-recession funds "to be used in the street operating fund".
- Passed Resolution 76-12 to include the park grant in the budget.

- Accepted Meleton Sanchez's bid of \$115 for a 1954 Dodge dump truck.
- Agreed to purchase snow tires for the garbage truck on state contract.
- Approved purchase of copy paper from a salesman in Atlanta who "has to

relocate the paper after the county cancelled its order."

Next regular meeting of Village of Ruidoso Downs governing body will be at 7 p.m., Monday, December 27 in council chambers.

February school election to fill two board of education vacancies

Ruidoso Municipal School board confirmed Tuesday that an election will be held February 1, 1977 to elect two board members to serve terms of six years each. Terms are expiring for board president Dave Parks and Dr. Howard Tate. Neither of the incumbents indicated Tuesday evening whether or not he would be running for re-election.

Deadline for registering to vote in the election is 5 p.m., Tuesday, December 21. Those wishing to have their names placed on the ballot must declare their candidacy with the Ruidoso Municipal Board of Education at the office of the Superintendent of Schools no later than 5 p.m., Tuesday, December 28. The election will be held at the Home

Economics building located on the high school campus and polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Absentee voting will be allowed for the first time for this election and any registered voter residing in the school district is entitled to vote.

Boundaries for the voting district are: bounded on the south by Otero County, on the east by Hondo School District No. 2, on the north by Capitan School District No. 28 and on the west by Capitan School District and Otero County.

In other action the board "accepted with regret" Sam Pilgreen's resignation due to relocation. Pilgreen is the junior high and high school art teacher. The board unanimously agreed to hire Kim Tezak as the new art teacher.

Secretary Stormy Edwards said that the board had mailed invitations to bid auto fleet insurance to five agents, in addition to publicly advertising for bids. He said the agencies had either ignored the invitations or refused to bid. Pertee-Parks & Associates submitted an option from Western Insurance Co. that "if no bids can be obtained, we will provide standard coverage."

Parks said, "Most companies have withdrawn from the market and the standard coverage will be at a higher premium than before — I can't say in what amount."

Bid on board members' liability is a \$500 deductible, \$1 million limit, at a premium of \$1,067 through St. Paul Insurance Co., Pertee-Parks & Associates, agent. The board unanimously agreed to accept the option through Western Insurance and the bid from Pertee-Parks.

The board also:

- Approved the school ski program.
- Approved 1977 meeting dates.
- Was introduced to the high school staff.
- Approved budget increase and transfer.

School superintendent Pat Vaillant announced that the administration office will be closed December 24, 30 and 31. It will remain open during the rest of the regular holiday vacation.

Next meeting of the school board will be at the administration office at 7 p.m., Tuesday, January 11. All meetings are open to the public.

Courthouse boilers will be repaired

"The consensus of consultants, experts and insurance investigators is to repair, not replace the heating system at the county courthouse and we should be open for business today," said county manager Les Olson.

The ailing boilers quit functioning last week and the courthouse shut down, for all practical purposes, due to no heat throughout the building. During the emergency commission meeting Friday, tentative plans were made to tear out the old equipment and replace it with a new 10-section boiler.

"Boiler number two," Olson said, "was determined to have had a catastrophe,

which means it is covered by insurance. There was a malfunction of the low water cutoff and the automatic control failed to shut off the furnace.

"American Boiler Corporation out of Albuquerque can repair both boilers for \$2,550 and have at least one functioning today. Then the insurance company will review the figures and determine how much of the cost is to be covered.

"I'm still advising people who have business at the courthouse to call before they make a trip over here."

Olson said these repairs on the equipment will buy time until the next fiscal year and "perhaps avoid a hasty decision to replace the boilers."

Grand Jury indicts two

The Lincoln County Grand Jury Tuesday indicted two men on charges filed with Magistrate Jim Wheeler recently. Indicted for possession of controlled substances was Barney Earl Sawyer, 19, of Silver City.

Sawyer was arrested about 3:45 p.m., Dec. 8 after being stopped for a routine traffic check by NM State Policemen Tim Sharpe and Jeff Darden on US Highway 70 at Hondo.

At a first appearance hearing Dec. 9, before Magistrate Wheeler, Sawyer was charged with possession of controlled substances, to-wit: six pounds, six ounces of marijuana, in bricks, with a street value of \$3,150 and 229 barbiturate capsules with a street value of \$1,145; and with intent to distribute. Bond was set at \$10,000 and Sawyer was held at Lincoln County jail until his indictment. The marijuana charge is a fourth degree felony, the barbiturate charge a third degree felony.

Ed Marshall, 72, Ruidoso Downs, had bail set at \$1,000 cash, in a Dec. 8 first appearance hearing before Magistrate Wheeler on charges of aggravated battery. He was ordered held at Lincoln County jail pending posting bond.

The Grand Jury Tuesday indicted Marshall on charges of aggravated bat-

tery and he is free on a \$1,000 bond. Marshall was charged in a Dec. 7 incident in which Meredith Tissnolhtos, Mesalero, suffered a knife wound in his abdomen. Tissnolhtos was not seriously injured.

Cady facing charges on conspiracy

Gerald Cady, 40, Alto, manager of the Artesia Municipal Airport pleaded innocent to charges of conspiracy to distribute a controlled substance during arraignment in Carlsbad Tuesday.

He is free under a \$2,000 bond with no trial date being set.

Cady's arrest took place Monday at the Artesia airport when he was served with a warrant following the handing down of a Grand Jury indictment in Eddy County last Thursday.

The alleged conspiracy is said to have occurred about Oct. 2, 1975.

Student ski program set January 18

If the "Think Snow" incantations work, Ruidoso school kids will head for the Sierra Blanca slopes January 18 because the school board, "in cooperation with the management of Sierra Blanca Ski Enterprises, has approved the continuance of the ski program for this year."

Although school won't be dismissed, students in grades four through twelve

who wish to participate in the ski program will be excused from Tuesday afternoon classes. The program will run from January 18 through February 22, 1977.

First timers will be required to take instruction at the ski course the first two times out — at \$1 per lesson. Ski fee is \$2 and ski rental, at most shops, is \$2 — up \$1 from last year. The rental increase is due

to extra employees the shops hire to assist hundreds of students with their ski needs.

Transportation to and from the ski area is the responsibility of the individual student. The Board of Education and Sierra Blanca accept no responsibility for accidents "of any nature."

After the ski course opened in 1961, superintendent Pat Vaillant and former teacher Ken Newton approached the

Sierra Blanca management about a ski program from which the kids could benefit and at a price they could afford. Getting the go-ahead there, they went to various ski shops with the same request. The villagers then donated their time to transport students and the community effort is still going strong.

Approximately 500 students a year participate in the school ski program.

The trustees decided not to install the old Christmas decorations downtown to encourage "individuals to decorate their homes and businesses". Village manager Jim Hine said, "The idea is to get away from the garish lighting giving Christmas season in other localities a strictly commercial aspect." Hine noted that the village has already "installed a cross, a Noel sign, and halo effects on water tanks and other locations," in an effort to encourage individuals to decorate, "in the theme of Christmas, not strictly as a business promotion."

In other action the trustees:

— Directed that EMCO devise a financing plan for the lease/purchase of trucks and containers for the new refuse system and submit it to the council for action. State law prevents the village from financing the system from unencumbered funds or from borrowing money to make lease-purchase payments.

— Acknowledged receipt of a letter from D. James, Ruidoso, requesting that the village continue to set Cable TV rates.

— Granted Co-Con an extension of 60 days to complete the Gavilan Canyon water lines, due to a delay in delivery of fixtures and parts for the pressure stations. Administrative assistant Frank Potter advised the trustees that the installation is virtually complete, except for the pressure stations with "perhaps 60 to 80 feet of pipe yet to be laid."

— Approved abandoning 15 inches and 18 inches of land on Lots 19-20, Block M, Ruidoso Pine Lodge, to make obtaining a clear title to the lots possible.

— Set the naming of two judges and two clerks for the Jan. 18 special election for Dec. 28.

— Set Dec. 28 as the date for adoption of Ordinance 76-9, "Declaring Drinking of Alcoholic Beverages in Public as being unlawful, and a Violation of Municipal Code".

— Were advised by Hine that \$3,687 in "anti-recession" funds would be used to continue the services of a mechanic's helper in the village vehicle/heavy equipment shop.

— Authorized airport manager Tim Morris and Potter to meet with a representative of Standard Airways, El Paso, Tex., concerning a proposal to provide daily flight service from Ruidoso to El Paso.




Bobo-Musick marriage set

Book Review

"I Ain't Well, But I Sure Am Better" takes the reader through another phase of positive psychology self development, aka author Jesse Lair.

Struck down in his early 30's by a massive coronary, Lair proceeded to re-evaluate his priorities and change his life style — from high pressure account executive to college professor and author.

He first wrote, "I Ain't Much Baby, But I'm All I Got" in his quest to "know thyself." In "I Ain't Well . . ." Lair reaches beyond himself to stress the value of close friendships. He questions why people spend so little time with others who are supportive and good friends.

Lair repeatedly points out in his writing that his ideas are not cure-alls for everyone, but they work for him. Each reader can most likely benefit and learn from portions — if not all of — Lair's viewpoints.

His philosophies bog down and become rather redundant in the latter part of the book and he doesn't say anything too earth-shatteringly new, but he says it with sincerity and gut level simplicity.

It's a book worth reading and is available in paperback. If the Ruidoso Library doesn't have it on hand, chances are they can order it for you.

The fire engine rolled Santa out of sight. He was gone, but in his place were wee faces shining with the awe and magic of his visit.




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


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

BLM proposes new mining claim rules

Persons who hold unpatented mining claims on federal land will have three years to register these claims with the U.S. Bureau of Land Management if regulations published last week are adopted. The recording is required by the Federal Land Policy & Management Act which became law in October 1976. The BLM has allowed a 30-day public comment period on the proposed regulations. Comments should be made directly to BLM, Department of the Interior, Washington, D.C. 20240.

Previously, holders of unpatented mining claims on federal lands were not required to record their claims with the federal government. The only record of a claim was usually filed in local county courthouses. The proposed rule making would enable the public and the Bureau of Land Management to know where claims are located and how many exist without

searching county land records or making an on-the-ground inspection.

Owners of existing unpatented mining claims, mill sites, or tunnel sites would be required under the proposed rule making to file a record of their claims with Bureau of Land Management by October 1979. Notice of new claims would have to be filed with the Bureau within 90 days. Proof of the annual assessment work also would be filed with BLM.

Claims within units of the National Park Service (NPS) would have to be recorded with NPS by September 28, 1977. Owners of a partial interest or owners by transfer also are required to record their claims.

Failure to record a claim constitutes abandonment of the claim under the new regulation.

Body, organ gifts sought

It's the gift of vision. It could be the gift of life. It is the donation of your corneas, your kidneys or other parts of your body after death.

If the subject of donation of organs for transplantation after death is something you have been thinking about, you might be interested in a new booklet prepared by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in cooperation with the American Medical Association. For a free copy of *Donation of Bodies or Organs for Transplantation and Medical Science*, send a postcard to Consumer Information Center, Dept. 556E, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

In our lifetime, we've seen transplantation become a medical reality. About 25 kinds of tissue and organs are being used with increasing frequency for transplantation. But, one of the reasons more can't be done is the shortage of enough suitable organs and tissues from human donors.

Each state and the District of Columbia now has an anatomical gift act which is law. Basically the law provides that any person at least 18 or 21, depending on the state, may donate all or part of his or her body after death for research, trans-

plantation or placement in a tissue bank.

If you decide you want to donate your body for these purposes, fill in and carry with you at all times a Uniform Donor Card. This is a special card with your name, birth date, and a statement of your wishes. You must sign it in the presence of two witnesses. You don't need to and shouldn't send the card to any other person or organization. And, if you change your mind about being a donor, you only need to tear up your card.

You may also want to mention your intention in your will. (This would become effective without having to wait for the will to go through probate.) If you change your mind about being a donor, you'll also want to remove it from your will.

RHS slinks past Tuli



Clinton Baker in Antarctica

Navy Airman Clinton W. Baker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wyverne N. Baker of Box 3902, Ruidoso, is participating in "Operation Deep Freeze" in the Antarctic.

He is a member of Navy Antarctic Development Squadron Six (VXE-6), the air arm of the National Science Foundation. Operating with Navy Task Force 199 from the forward staging base at McMurdo Station, Antarctica, VXE-6 flies LC-130 "Hercules" ski-equipped transport

planes and UH-1N "Huey" helicopters. Their mission is to support scientific research in Antarctica by resupplying remote installations with personnel, food stuffs, equipment and mail during the austral summer.

This marks the 22nd year that the Navy, and his squadron, have supported the U.S. Antarctic Research Program conducted by the National Science Foundation. This year's major scientific project is the

physical, chemical and biological study of the Ross Ice Shelf. Another task will be the recovery of a "Hercules" which crashed during a previous "Deep Freeze" deployment.

Also joining the scientists and support personnel will be two Coast Guard icebreakers, U.S. Air Force transports, cargo and fuel ships from the Navy's Military Sealift Command, and units of the Royal New Zealand Army and Air Force. The combined forces, designated Task

Force 199, are under the command of Capt. Claude H. Nordhill, USN; a veteran of three prior "Deep Freeze" deployments. Operations at McMurdo Station are continuing until mid-February when the Antarctic winter begins. About 60 Navy personnel and a smaller number of civilian scientists and support personnel will "winter over" at McMurdo.

A 1976 graduate of Ruidoso High School, Baker joined the Navy in September 1975.

DMV's suggestions for snowdriving

The department of Motor Vehicles' Traffic Safety Division has released a list of precautionary measures that motorists should take when having to contend with driving in snow.

Reduced visibility and inadequate traction are going to make it more difficult for drivers to keep their eyes and their tires on the roads, said D.K. Kelly, Chief of the Traffic Safety Division.

Kelly said motorists should study the following tips for safe winter driving which have been urged by the National Safety Council's committee on Winter Driving Hazards and endorsed by leading police officials around the country:

— Avoid the dangerous habit of "peep hole" driving which is caused by only partially clearing the windshield, side windows and rear windshield obstructed by frozen moisture. Take the time to do a

complete cleaning job on all windows.

— Invest in a good, effective windshield scraper and brush device to keep in the car to clear off those parts of the windows not covered by automatic wipers. Keep this handy item clean and free of dirt, ice and snow.

— Clean off the headlights, parking lights, tail lights and even those tiny little side lights on the fenders if your car is so equipped, because dirty glass on these surfaces may reduce their illumination power by as much as 25 percent.

— Replace streaking wiper blades which have gone dead from exposure to sun, wind, and oily road film. Make sure there is an adequate amount of anti-freeze in the windshield washer solution and check to make sure that the blade tension against the windows is adequate.

— Carry a good supply of clean rags or reinforced absorbent paper towels to clean off fogged-up windows in the interior of the auto and consider the use of any of a

number of commercial chemical solutions which inhibit the condensation of moisture on glass.

"And never underestimate the hazard of bad weather driving at night," warned Kelly. "Rain or fog distort vision and cut down illumination. Driving into the swirling flakes of a snowstorm is one of the most dangerous of all motoring hazards." Kelly also urged motorists to put into practice the following tips for safe winter driving:

— Get the "feel the road" by accelerating carefully to see if the wheels spin and at what speed they do this. Then brake gently to see what, if any, skidding characteristics there are to the road surface. Reduce your speed accordingly.

— Increase your "following distance," the distance you allow for vehicles ahead of you. Remember that it takes three to nine times as far to stop on snow and ice as on dry pavement.

— "Pump" your brakes to slow down or

stop. Don't jam them on. An intermittent pumping action keeps the wheels rolling and helps you maintain steering control.

— Have good tires with good treads. Better yet, use snow tires which provide half again as much pulling power in snow as regular tires.

— Always carry reinforced tire chains in the trunk of your car for use during severe snow and ice conditions. Hang them up to dry after each use to prevent rusting.

— Check the windshield ventilator and defroster to make sure it directs the maximum amount of heated air over the interior surfaces of the windows to keep them fog free.

Kelly said that the first good pre-winter move for any motorists is to put your car in the hands of a competent mechanic for a complete checkup to make sure the car is able to give its best performance in any emergency.

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


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Try midget bulbs on Christmas trees

Christmas lights are beautiful, but can be expensive. Those tiny exterior Christmas lights, called midget lights, are also beautiful, but they use less energy than the larger ones, says Charles Hohn, Extension agricultural engineer at New Mexico State University.

Christmas lighting looks best if it's tasteful and well planned. Good planning means careful selection of the features to be highlighted, Hohn says. If the effect is difficult to plan, try experimenting with a special tree, around a front window or door.

Midget lights are more energy efficient than standard sized Christmas bulbs. Most 20 and 50 light sets use only 18 watts. A sparkling display of 250 midget lights use less electricity than a single 100-watt light bulb, Hohn says.

To figure how many bulbs to use, try using 60 for each small bush. Fifty bulbs will give the bush a lacy effect. For larger shrubs and trees, try this formula — multiply the height of the tree by the width by three. Double that figure for midget bulbs.

For some people, part of the Christmas spirit is exterior lights. To give the best effect, plan the light display carefully. To save energy, use the lacy little midget bulbs, Hohn says.

Inside the Capital by Fred Buckles

SANTA FE — If even a substantial part of the huge \$82.5 million in proposed capital improvements are funded by the 1977 Legislature, your chances for a tax cut could go flying.

The projected unappropriated state surplus is \$87.7 million. It is subject to legislative action in the session opening Jan. 18. Among the proposed capital improvements are a Los Lunas minimum security, diagnostic and treatment center, \$21.6 million in state severance tax bonds; \$940,000 for a basic classroom complex for the University of New Mexico's Northern Branch at Espanola and \$625,000 for instructional facilities at Eastern New Mexico University's Clovis Branch.

The vast array of proposed capital improvements — some of them "Christmas Tree projects" — will be screened by the State Finance Department and Gov. Jerry Apodaca before recommendations are sent to legislators.

The State Environmental Improvement Agency received a permit application from James Hamilton Construction Co. for a new asphaltic paving mixer plant in Hidalgo County eight miles south of NM-9. The deadline for comments in Santa Fe is Dec. 31.

David Underwood, Truth or Consequences banker, is a director of newly chartered Southwestern State Bank, Alamogordo. State Banking Commissioner Herbert Hughes approved the new bank. Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation approval is also required.

An agreement for relocation services for implementation of land acquisition for Belen Valley State Park is on the State Park and Recreation Commission agenda Friday in Santa Fe. A joint powers agreement for a sanitary landfill between the commission and Taos County is also on the agenda.

District Judge Garnett Burks Jr. continued a temporary restraining order halting a merger between Kodak Industries of California and Fortuna Corporation of New Mexico. Fortuna owns Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs race tracks. Fortuna would become a part of Kodak and be relieved of its assets if the merger, approved by minority stockholders at a meeting at Sunland Park in November, is allowed to stand.

Asst. Supt. Gerry Washburn of Tucumcari Schools is set to ask the Legislative School Study Committee to weigh changes in standards for public schools emergency capital outlay Friday in Santa Fe.

Election campaign reports showed Rio Arriba County Republican Party spent \$2,339.37 and received \$2,188.42. Rio Arriba County GOP Chairman Tony J. Montoya, Espanola, signed the report. The Sedillo '76 for Sheriff Committee, Truth or Consequences, listed \$1,718.74 in expenditures

and receipts in the sheriff's campaign of Charlie M. Sedillo.

Robert McNeill, general counsel for the State Health-Social Services Department, said the state expects "some major progress" toward meeting terms of an informal agreement before Santa Maria El Mirador Home for Retarded Boys is relicensed at Alcalde, Rio Arriba County.

Cruz Trujillo, Tierra Amarilla, is a Ford elector for New Mexico. The four Republican electors met Monday in Santa Fe. The State Canvassing Board finally certified general election results. Republican Gerald Ford beat Democrat Jimmy Carter by 10,271 votes in New Mexico.

A one-fourth percent municipal gross receipts tax will be effective Jan. 1 in 17 New Mexico cities. Among them are — Capitan, Clayton, Clovis, Corona, Ruidoso, San Jon, Texico, Truth or Consequences, Tucumcari and Vaughn. Union County adopted a one-fourth per cent county gross receipts tax, effective Jan. 1. Revenue will help to pay indigent's hospital bills. Taos, Rio Arriba and Santa Fe Counties already impose a similar tax.

U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-Albuquerque, will be in Tucumcari and Clovis today. In separate Tucumcari meetings Sen. Domenici will talk with city officials and businessmen and ranchers. At Clovis Domenici will meet with area farmers and ranchers on water and agricultural problems. He will also address the annual Clovis Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Four Corners gas producers suggested a self-imposed price restriction to offset projected New Mexico natural gas price hikes. Four Corners Gas Producing Association, representing more than 200 Four Corners area gas producers, proposed the self-imposed price curbs. Farmington petroleum geologist Jack Cole offered the suggestion at a State Energy Resources Board hearing in Farmington on a state energy plan that Gov. Jerry Apodaca will send to the legislature in January.

The State Employment Security Commission said the five highest unemployment rates in New Mexico in October were Mora County, 19.1 percent; Rio Arriba, 16.7; Taos, 12.9; San Miguel, 9.3, and Torrance, 8.2.

U.S. Rep. Harold Runnels, D-Lovington, underscoring his concern for the nation's economic downturn, asked the House Democratic Caucus to endorse a third budget resolution. Runnels says the move would speed up adoption of a major tax cut early in 1977. U.S. Sen.-elect Harrison Schmitt, R-Silver City, met with agricultural community leaders at an information seminar in Las Cruces. Bureaucratic regulations, hampering food production were hit.

The time is irrelevant: Bishop Liberius of Rome, some 1600 years ago, decreed December 25 to be set aside for observance of Christ's Mass. Range bandits bite the dust

Like a black plague, the black grass bug swarmed across improved wheatgrass pastures of northwestern New Mexico last spring. These pests — more commonly known as Labops — sucked the life from the grass, robbing ranchers of much needed forage for their livestock. Often numbering over 250 bugs per square foot of forage, the Labops reduced grass production by 50 percent or more, says George Dickerson, crop specialist with New Mexico State University's Agricultural Services Department.

In an effort to combat this pest, Dickerson worked with Extension Agents Paul Trujillo and Lee Martinez, Rio Arriba County, and William Van Hess, Dulce. They applied several insecticides on the Don Berryman Ranch near Caholla and on the Jicarilla Apache Reservation.

Excellent kills were obtained using either Dyltox, malathion or methyl parathion. Significant increases in grass production were noted in some of the plots that were sprayed. Since these were all experimental chemical applications, ranchers should contact local Extension agents to determine what chemicals are registered for use on range land for this purpose.

Hatching in early spring after the snow melts, the Labop nymph goes through several stages in its life cycle (instars) before becoming an adult. The optimum time to apply an insecticide is in the nymph stage, after all the eggs have hatched. The nymphs should not be allowed to reach the egg-laying adult stage, Dickerson says.

The adult Labop is predominately black in color, with a white lateral stripe along the outer margin of the wings. About one-quarter inch long and one-sixteenth inch wide, a single Labop could be hard to detect. However, the Labop is gregarious in nature and hundreds of them may occupy a single clump of grass. The bug's bulging eyes also help the researcher identify it.

The Labop sucks sap from plants with its piercing-sucking mouthparts, leaving a yellowish or whitish irregular spot on the leaf blade. Heavy infestations may cause the plant leaves to dry up and die.

Due to forage reduction, root reserves may be depleted and the plant may die in periods of prolonged drought. Besides reducing feed supplies for livestock and wildlife, forage reduction can also damage the area's watershed holding capacity.

Because the pest lays its eggs mostly in the dry grass stems, close grazing to remove dry forage is helpful. Burning the dry straw in the spring may also offer a means of control.

A rancher may also consider leaving some stands of sage, pinon and juniper in newly seeded areas of wheatgrass. This environment tends to encourage natural predators such as spiders, lizards and snakes, Dickerson says.

1976 Small Business Person of the Year

It's still possible to realize the American dream of going into business and making a success of it.

Donald and Patricia Fullerton did it. They are two of the 1976 Small Business Persons of the Year selected by the U.S. Small Business Administration.

"If I hadn't tried to do this, I would always have been dissatisfied. I would always have wondered if I could have done it," Ron Fullerton says.

His words reflect his maverick spirit and a dream which led him from a secure job in Dallas, Texas from which he resigned, to a trailer in Anchorage, Alaska. He had always wanted to start his own paint manufacturing company and in 1971, he did.

The Fullerton-owned Alaskan Paint Manufacturing Company, the first in the state, began as a real family affair. Ron and Pat made the paint and their three children put on the labels. By tailoring the paint to the Alaska climate, they manufactured a high quality, but at necessarily higher prices. At first customers resisted, but when they saw how the paint held up, business picked up. Within a year after starting, they got their first large order and big break. By mid-1972 they had grossed \$142,000 and were really on their way.

In 1973 the Fullertons moved into their own building in Anchorage, conducting both a wholesale and retail operation. In 1975 they opened a retail outlet in Fairbanks. The company continues to grow. There are now seven full-time employees in addition to the Fullerton family. Construction is underway on the second expansion of their plant. Sales last year totalled over \$900,000.

The Fullertons have totally geared their products to the Alaskan environment. Labels depict typical Alaska scenes and product lines include colors such as Aleutian night, moose brown, glacier blue and Arctic Ivory.

"You can't divide your work from your life," the Fullertons say. In Alaska they have found their niche in life.



KNOW YOUR FOOD

MEAT COOKING KNOW HOW

Various kinds of meat...beef, pork, veal, lamb...can be grouped into two broad classifications of cooking methods. One group will be tender when prepared with dry heat, such as uncovered in an oven, on a broiler grill, over a charcoal fire, or in an uncovered frying pan. The other group will require moist cooking in order to be tender. Moist cooking includes braising, stewing, pot roasting and cooking in liquid. It's important to know which method of cooking is required for each cut of meat purchased. If you have any questions on the cooking method, just ask the meat man behind the counter. He'll be glad to tell you.

Generally, meats that require moist cooking are the more thrifty cuts, such as chuck roast, stewing beef, round steak, flank steak, rump roast, short ribs, corned beef and beef shanks. Cooked properly, these meats are very flavorful and delicious. In preparing pork of any kind, always keep in mind that it should be cooked well done for safe eating. A good cookbook will list the method and time required for cooking the various cuts of meat.

Some basic meat cooking methods are explained here:

- ROASTING:** Season meat with salt and pepper; place fat side up on rack in open pan. Insert meat thermometer, if desired. Do not add water and do not cover. Roast in slow to moderate oven (300° to 350°F.)
- BROILING:** Set oven regulator to broil; place meat on grill about 2 to 5 inches from heat. Brown on one side; turn and brown other. Broil to desired doneness. Season after cooking to help retain meat juices.
- PAN-BROILING:** Season meat and cook uncovered in heavy, ungreased or lightly greased frying pan. Brown on both sides, pouring off fat as it accumulates.
- PAN-FRYING:** Season meat and cook in small amount of hot fat in skillet, turning to brown both sides. Do not cover.
- BRAISING:** Brown meat on both sides in small amount of hot fat in skillet. Season with salt and pepper. Add small amount of water or other liquid; cover and simmer on top of stove or in the oven till done.
- BOIL:** Brown meat first, if desired, in heavy pan. Season with salt, pepper, etc., cover with liquid. Bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer, covered, till tender.





Game and Fish counting eggs

The N.M. Department of Game and Fish is counting its eggs — fish eggs, that is — which will be hatching soon.

The department received 500,000 rainbow trout eggs from Montana this week, and has taken more than four million rainbow eggs from brood stock at Parkview Hatchery.

Dick McCleskey, assistant chief of the department's Fisheries Division, ex-

plained that the eggs from Montana were part of a trade — New Mexico walleye fry for Montana rainbow eggs. If the eggs were purchased commercially, McCleskey said, they would have cost more than \$2,500.

In addition, the department received the first shipment of what will total one million kokanee salmon from Colorado, with whom a trade was also made. McCleskey

added that in exchange for our state's walleye fry we will also be getting one million cutthroat trout eggs from Colorado.

Each year the department also takes eggs from brood stock at Parkview Hatchery, said McCleskey. He said indications are that Parkview will produce more than seven million eggs this year, setting a record for eggs taken from the hatchery.

The eggs being incubated now will probably be ready for planting as catfishes in the state's waters in about a year, McCleskey added.

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

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Game Commission accepts bond bids

The State Game Commission has accepted bids on \$2 million in Fish and Wildlife Conservation bonds to be used in capital improvements projects by the Department of Game and Fish during the next several years.

The bonds are to be retired in ten years at an interest rate of 4.82 percent, according to Game and Fish Department Director William Huey. One dollar from each hunting and fishing license sold by the department is set aside for bond retirement. None of the bond money has yet been earmarked for any special projects.

Meeting in Albuquerque on Wednesday, the commission also adopted a commercial fisheries regulation, a new falconry regulation conforming to federal guidelines, and regulations for a special antlerless-only deer hunt in Agua Chiquita Canyon in Otero County.

The Jan. 15-16 hunt, for which 400 licenses will be issued by public drawing, is limited to a small area and was proposed to alleviate crop depredation problems. Applications can be made on Form E, available from license vendors or game and fish offices, and must be received no later than 5 p.m. Dec. 30. Applications can be made in person at game and fish offices or by mail only to the Santa Fe office. Eligible applicants are those who have a 1976-1977 deer license with the tag still attached and who did not hold an entry permit during the 1975 and 1976 seasons.

Fisheries Division Chief R. L. Brashears told the commission the commercial fisheries regulation would allow the department to monitor commercial fishing operations closely and at the same time open up some new employment and in-

come opportunities in the state.

Brashears said fisheries biologists expect that removal of the larger rough fish in commercial quantities will provide more room and more food — in the form of smaller sizes of rough fish — for game fish species.

The commercial regulations include suckers, buffalo, bullheads, carp, carp-sucker and gizzard shad as commercial fish and allows the department to tailor permits to the conditions of each lake and its fish population.

No game fish can be kept under a commercial operator's permit, according to the regulation. Any game fish caught will be returned to the water if still alive or processed and turned over to the Department of Game and Fish for disposition if dead.

NMMI offering classes to area senior citizens

The New Mexico Military Institute of Roswell is offering classes in a Continuing Education Program of Study to a limited number of senior citizens of Lincoln County, under a tuition free plan.

The classes, to begin Jan. 12, continue for 15 weeks on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 7:15 to 10:15 p.m.

Tuesday classes include ceramics, jewelry, weaving, conversational Spanish and flower growing at NMMI.

Classes on the principles of bank operations, money and banking and installment credit will be conducted at the Ruidoso State Bank Tuesday evenings.

Wednesday classes, at NMMI, include ceramics, jewelry and retirement living. The latter is a group counseling approach to adjustment to arranging leisure time activities, with enrollment open to all ages.

Lincoln County Senior Citizens director Charlotte Jarratt has announced that, due to a gift of gasoline from Ruidoso Energy Marketing, Inc., transportation to the

NMMI classes will be free. "The vans will leave the Senior Citizens Center in Ruidoso at 5 p.m.," Jarratt said, "and will schedule pickups of Hondo Valley students en route to NMMI. Cleanliness a must for holiday feasting

Although cleanliness procedures in the kitchen are a daily safeguard against foodborne illness, they are especially important during the holiday season. In order to maintain a healthy environment,

you should make plans to serve and store holiday foods in quantity, says Mae Martha Johnson, Extension food specialist at New Mexico State University.

Your major concern should be keeping

food cold or hot enough to prevent the growth and spread of harmful bacteria. Consider the number of guests, the menu and the quantity of food. Be sure you have adequate refrigerator space, heating units and hot serving aids to maintain correct temperatures.

Extend cold storage by cleaning out the refrigerator. Use or discard leftovers. If necessary, have a neighbor keep non-party needs temporarily. Insulated picnic hampers and cold chests, packed with ice, can keep foods cold for several hours, Mrs. Johnson says.

Perishable foods should not be allowed to stand at room temperature for more than two hours. These include cream pies, creamed vegetables, seafoods and dishes made with eggs, meat or poultry.

For example, a holiday favorite meal may include roast beef with pan drippings. If not served correctly, it can be a perfect medium for bacteria to grow and develop! The inside of the meat should be hot. Heat the pan drippings to the boiling point before serving. Don't let the meat stand at room temperature more than two hours; refrigerate leftovers promptly. If gravy or drippings are kept for a second meal, boil them a few minutes before serving.

Sanitary food handling is also important. Wash hands, utensils, countertops and

cutting boards with sudsy water before and after working with any food, especially raw meat or poultry.

Salmonella bacteria may spread when these items are prepared in conjunction with other foods. For instance, if a knife is used to cut raw meat, then used for chopping salad vegetables, the knife and cutting board should be washed thoroughly with hot water, soap and a scrub brush. If this is not done, the bacteria from the meat would transfer a team of Salmonella to the vegetables, though bacteria on the meat would be destroyed in cooking.

You should follow certain precautions when preparing a holiday turkey. The larger the bird, the longer it takes to defrost. It can be thawed in the refrigerator. If it must be thawed more quickly, seal in a water-tight plastic bag and immerse in cold water. Defrosting at room temperature invites possible bacteria growth.

Cook the turkey thoroughly and at one time, Mrs. Johnson says. Never partially cook poultry with the idea of finishing later. Bacteria may survive. Stuffing is especially vulnerable to bacteria growth. It is safest cooked separately. However, if it is cooked in the turkey cavity, be sure cooking is complete. Also, prepare the mixture and stuff the turkey just before

putting into the oven — never the night before. If using commercially frozen stuffed poultry, do not defrost before baking.

Clean chimneys prevent fires

With more fireplaces in use because of soaring fuel costs, chimney fires are becoming more common, says Charles Hohn, Extension agricultural engineer at New Mexico State University.

Chimney fires start when the soot on the chimney walls burns. When ignited, this soot burns like charcoal. The easiest way to prevent chimney fires is to stop burning soot-producing materials and to remove any soot already on the chimney walls.

Soot problems develop when homeowners burn plastic coated cartons, quick starter resins, leaves, plywood or gift wrapping. The top soot producer, however, is greenwood. It burns with a slow, smoldering fire which releases running sap. This sap causes glaze to form on the flue.

Green wood is heavier than dry wood. If you split a green log, the exposed wood will feel wet. It's best to gather your wood at least six months before the heating season begins. Remember to store the wood in a shed or covered stack so it can dry out.

Check your chimney for soot buildup. Because of their rough surfaces, brick and stone fireplaces will almost always have a buildup problem. However, smooth tile

liners are not immune.

To inspect the chimney, open the damper as wide as possible and look up the chimney. You may need a mirror to help you see. Soot accumulations will usually be heaviest at the lower end of the chimney. You should also use a flashlight from the roof and look down the chimney.

If your chimney has a buildup problem, clean it before you build any more fires. You can either do the job yourself or hire a professional chimney sweep.

Professionals use brushes and high-powered vacuums to remove the soot. Do-it-yourselfers can use an old-time solution — a small fir tree tied to a rope. Pull the tree up the chimney to remove the soot. If a fir tree is not available, substitute a burlap bag filled with straw. After weighting the bag with stones, drag it up the flue. You can also use a six-foot heavy chain looped to a rope. Lower the chain into the chimney and swish it against the sides.

When you are finished, put the fallen soot into paper bags and dispose of it. Checking the fireplace now will insure safe and comfortable fires all winter, Hohn says.
