"The hot mix the state is providing is not compatible with the joint operation of the

Cutler machine," Nail said.

The state's paving operation employs no heating device and will use a richer (higher oil content) mix than planned for the machine application.

"The state mix will be applied at 270 degrees," Nail said, "which is hot enough that it will melt the surface of the present road and bind it into a permanent sur-

Under the new plan, NMHD will complete resurfacing Highway 37 to the Ruidoso Municipal Airport turnoff.

Traffic lanes will be closed only during actual working time, Nail said, and the lanes will be open each night to traffic.

"We're asking all drivers to watch our operation carefully," Nail said, "and to avoid parking on the street where it is obvious the men and machines will be laying the mat in a short time."

The NMHD will lay a 10 foot strip, one mile long, daily. The schedule calls for completing half of the length of the south side of Sudderth then do the north side and continue that pattern until the job is completed.

Permanent steel markers will be buried in the exact center of the street, Nail said, to insure that striping will be in the middle of the street and that all traffic lanes will be of equal length the entire distance of the repaying.

Abercrombie will sue

him ownership. He is also asking the court to require the Finance Board to approve an agreement on the sale of the property between the Capitan School Board and

The News was advised by Abercrombie, following the announcement that his high bld of \$45,600 was rejected, that he had intended to convert the school into a private residence and rental property. The Lincoln County Heritage Trust,

under the terms of a 30 year lease at \$1 per year, has announced plans to convert the building into a museum.

The News, upon attempting to contact Abercrombie by telephone Wednesday, was advised that he could not be disturbed.

Chamber planning ski area promotion

The Ruldoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board of directors voted to "support to the extent of our resources" proposed advertising in the winter Consolidated Air Tour Manual (CATM) and the Skier's Directory.

Along with advertising in the nationally distributed directories, the directors tentatively have agreed to meet the CATM requirement to provide them with 200,000 brochures describing Sierra Blanca Ski Area for distribution to travel agencies throughout the United States and Mexico. First acceptance of the advertising and brochure proposals is contingent upon receiving sufficient monles from the

Lodgers Tax to pay for them. To emphasize the need to publicize Ruidego and Sierra Blanca Ski Area, Ray Heid of Ray Heid's Ski Shop, showed

examples of advertising in the Rocky Mountain Ski Annual and Continental Airlines brochures which stress Taos Ski Area but class Sierra Blanca with Clouderoft and Raton.

Held said Taos has three pages of advertising in the Skier's Directory while Sierra Blanca was mentioned only briefly, leading the reader to believe the only facilities available at Sierra Blanca Ski Area in Ruldoso were nine rental units at the area. He suggested a full page ad be run in the Skier's Directory stating there are 72 motels and condominiums here and stressing the fact there are no snow and ice covered roads to be driven to get to Ruidoso.

He also gave results of a recent Ski New Mexico survey which showed skiers at Sierra Blanca mostly arrive by car, heard of the area through word of mouth and that as many skiers at the area have incomes above \$100,000 as below \$15,000.

"So, skiers do have money," Held sald. The survey, taken one week day in the spring, polled every fourth person in the lift line for a total of 64 persons.

"If we are listed, we can undersell the other areas," Held said. "Even with an added travel agents' commission of 10 percent."

Because the CATM deadline is June and the Skier's Directory June 7, the board voted to support the proposal pending revenue from the Lodgers Tax. A special meeting or phone survey will be scheduled for final approval.

Treasurer Buz Browning said the proposal is "in essence another way to support Ski Pak."

In other business, the board: - Formally announced the new executive board members who are Earl Scott, president; the Rev. Ken Cole, first vice president; Sunny Hirschfeld, second vice president, and Buz Browning, treasurer.

-Selected a committee of Cole and Pat Healy to plan the August Cadillac Party. They are to select a date for the party at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, plan for a buffet dinner and a band and arrange for printing the tickets. The 165 tickets have tentatively been set to sell for \$125 each.







Capitan teacher to retire

retiring from a teaching career that began doer;" "was an exemplary 'lady' in all itsin Lincoln County in 1935. The following article is presented, as written, in tribute to her years of service to her students,) BY DOROTHY GUCK

"You are a born teacher and you should go into the teaching field. If you really sowant to go on to college, you can find a way." Those words of the late Ola Jones in 1 1934 to Ofelia Salas inspired her to a m.dedicated career in education. Ola Jones at that time was Lincoln County Superintendent of Schools, Mrs. Salas was a substitute teacher in Lincoln.

Ofelia Salas was born in Lincoln, New Mexico, attended elementary school in Las Cruces, and graduated from high school in Capitan. That was during the hard times of the great depression. Financially unable to go to college, she had all but given up hope of further education until Mrs. Jones' encouragement.

That spring, she borrowed the money to go to New Mexico State Normal, a school for teachers in Las Vegas. Her secretarial training taken in high school helped tremendously to augment income. Teachers needed fewer credits then so she obtained her first assignment in the Lincoln School in 1935, Her salary was \$75.00 a month on a nine-month basis. That started a round of saving enough in the school term, or borrowing, for further

Mrs. Salas was married and transferred her studies to the closer-to-home New Mexico State University until earning her BS degree in 1954. Each summer until she graduated, her two sons attended the campus nursery while she went to classes.

Her beginning, life, and career saw fruition in New Mexico, yet her achievements were never provincial. At the end of this school year, Mrs. Salas will complete 40 years of service as an educator. She put in 16 years in the Lincoln School, 23 years for the Capitan Municipal Schools, and I year in a one-room school. She says, "During that time, I've enjoyed the experience of having taught classes to

students in grades 1 through 12."
For 3 years, Mrs. Salas served as principal of the Lincoln School, where besides her teaching duties, she also sponsored the Hot Lunch Program. That program was not subsidized by the government to the extent it is today, so many hours were spent organizing and sponsoring money-making projects to assure all the children a hot lunch.

During the Lincoln School days, she served as 4-H leader, Den Mother with Cub Scouts, and taught many Catechism classes in the Catholic Church.

The most memorable incident of those days occurred when a sixth grade basketball tournament was to be held in Capitan and her students begged to enter. "I sought the help of Bud Darling, the Capitan coach, which wasn't exactly cricket. Armed with his instructions, I would put the boys through their practices on the rough dirt court outside the school. The schools entered in the tournament were Capitan, Ruidoso, Hondo, Carrizozo, and Corona. My players won! That was in the early 50's. I still get a thrill when I remember."

. She actively supported all community projects. She served as secretarytreasurer for the Lincoln County Historical Society for many years. It was this organization that initiated the Billy the Kid Pageant in 1940 with Peter Hurd as Billy. She and her husband raised funds and saw them put into use in the Lincoln water system. She served as an officer in the county school association and as delegate to the state convention.

In the Capitan School, Mrs. Salas taught junior high grades and Spanish in the high school. She applied for a Foreign Language Institute Grant and was accepted as one of 52 from a field of 782 applicants. For 8 weeks, she attended the University of Tacoma in Washington, studying linguistics and furthering her exceptional abilities as a bi-lingual teacher.

Later, she was selected one of a team of four teachers from Capitan to attend a Reading Institute at New Mexico State University. Her summer travels have been concentrated on the sites and places of Spanish heritage.

"To Mrs. Ofelia Salas, for giving me something to live up to," wrote one of her former students, Don Crawford, when he graduated Magna Cum Laude from The College of the Ozarks. "At a time that was crucial in my life, when I needed it most, you believed in me and gave inspiration. If more teachers had your uncompromising integrity, I'm sure the future of many students who end as failures would be

Mrs. Salas has been a member of NEA-New Mexico for 40 years, serving in many offices, in the very active local chapter, county, and state. She is chairman of the Necrology Committee of SENMEA. She is a charter member of Eta Chapter of Alpha Delta Kappa, an honorary teacher's sorority, and a member of Sigma Delta Pi, a Foreign Language Sorority. Her husband has a disability retirement

from Fort Stanton. Son, Arthur, is Personnel Administrator at Los Lunas State Hospital. Son, Robert, in the jewelry business, has recently moved from New York to San Francisco.

May 12, a dinner was given for Mrs. Salas at the home of Mrs. Ray Provine, with teachers and former co-teachers. They included Ms. Pfingsten, Ferguson, Young, Perry, Pryor, Aldrich, Cozzens, Peters, Hall, and Guck, and the husbands. An engraved letter opener was presented. Some of the accolades voiced were, "She motivated their interest to such an extent, they learned without realizing that was the purpose of her interesting discourses;"
"she commanded not only respect, but deep affection;" "enriched the lives of all she touched;" "lent an intriguing essence

"I must constantly strive to improve and learn the newer approved methods and try to find more interesting ways of putting

across ideas and materials in this everchanging world.

"I have great faith, respect, and confidence in our young people and their great potential. I shall try to reach them, stimulate, motivate, and arouse their interest, then try to channel and guide them along with patience and understanding."

Her days of achievement are not over. She is enthused about new ventures into activities for which she previously never had the time. No one else can ever quite fill her shoes.



New Mexico's population on the upswing

Population and business growth are coming to New Mexico, says Robert Coppedge, Extension economist at New Mexico State University.

Even before the cold winter of 1978-77 and the "energy crisis," most economic observers were projecting increased growth rates for the "Sun Belt." Over a year ago, the University of New Mexico projected the state's growth rate by 1985 to more than double the national projection. We now have reasons to expect even more rapid growth in the Southwest, Coppedge

Growth will bring benefits. New industry means more jobs. We do not compare favorably with other states in the income statistics. However very real opportunities for improvement do exist, the economist

The real concern, according to Coppedge, is whether business and industrial expansion will mean improved economic status for low income current residents. and whether rural areas will share in the increased economic activity.

Coppedge says the answer is "probably not," unless a conscious effort is made to

not," unless a conscious effort is made to include rural areas and lower income groups in increased economic activity.

Coppedge outlines two options. New industry relocating or expanding into the Southwest might be encouraged to locate in smaller population centers.

Second, businesses or industries currently located in Southwestern metropolites areas might be favorably

metropolitan areas might be favorably inclined towards a new, more rural location in the same geographic region.

SANTA FE - Defeat of Sen. C.B. Trujillo, D-Taos, for Legislative Finance Committee chairman by Rep. Edward Lopez, D-Santa Fe, worsened already poor relations between the Senate and House.

Rep. Lopez beat Sen. Trujillo 4-3 on a straight Senate-House vote. The vote broke a 20 year tradition that has rotated the chairmanship biennially between the House and Senate. Trujllo said afterward: "The problems that brought this to a head were House problems, the fact that they can't deliver when they make a commitment and envy the way the Senate operates."

Rep. Lopez fired back: "The House is run like a democracy while the Senate is run by a couple of individuals," Lopez did not name the senators. Rep. Murray Ryan. R-Sierra-Grant, nominated Sen. Trujillo for LFC vice chairman. But Trujillo rejected the nomination and the post is vacant. Trujillo was in line for LFC chairman.

The revamped LFC at its first meeting decided to implement the new Surset Law by Reps. H.B. Barnard, D-Clovis, and Hoyt Pattison, R-Curry-Lea-Roosevelt, in Its annual budget hearings. Under the Barmard-Pattison law 19 state professional and trade boards will be wiped out July 1, 1978, unless they can justify their continuation for up to six years before the

powerful LFC and the 1978 Legislature. The LFC also ordered a status report from its staff on Rep. Barnard's request for proposed legislation permitting all public employes to serve as legislators. Backed only by attorney general's opinions, public schools and county employes may serve as lawmakers now but state and state universities' employes are benned from serving.

Truth or Consequences lawyers Roy Hill and Leslie C. Smith and Socorro Magistrate Paul (Pablo) Marshall are prospects for appointment by Gov. Jerry Apodaca to a new judgeship in the Seventh Judicial District (Sierra-Torrance-Socorro-Catron Counties), effective July 1. The 1977 Legislature billed district judges'

The State Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission adopted a letter of intent to transfer management of historic stateowned buildings at Lincoln to Lincoln County Heritage Trust. Robert O. Anderson, Peter Hurd, Paul Horgan, Joe Lackey, Phil Heimig and John Meigs, the executive director, are the trust's organizers. State Museum Director George Ewing said September is the target to sign an agreement for the transfer.

Lincoln County Heritage Trust will manage the state owned Wortley Hotel, Tunstali Store, Old Lincoln County Courthouse Museum and other state buildings at Lincoln with private buildings the trust owns. The state would maintain and preserve its structures with state

appropriations. Under state government reorganization Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission is set to become a policy advisory unit of the State Museum March 31, 1978. Ewing said the private trust gave the state commission \$46,000 to buy an abandoned school building at Lincoln. The commission leased the school to the trust for \$1 a year. Ewing says the trust will establish a tri-cultural museum in the former school building and will buy and restore other Lincoln buildings as they were in the 1860-1880 period. He said the trust already owns three old Lincoln buildings. Among them is the old Montano Store, set for restoration as a Spanish-American style home of the 1860-1880

Jai Junior High School social studies teacher E.W. Aston, who was 65 May 12, asked National Education Association-New Mexico for aid to extend his contract. Jal Supt. Carl Martin said the Jal School Board policy requires a teacher to retire if he becomes 65 during a school year. The policy allows a teacher to request an extension. Aston's request for an extension was denied. Martin says an extension has

never been granted. The State Human Rights Act and a 1974 State Education Department opinion in a Loying case seem to support Aston, a teacher for 40 years. He has been a Jal teacher 17 years. A NEA-NM official said

Aston's request will be reviewed.

District Judge Santiago Campos of Santas Fe upheld State Liquor Chief Carlos Jaramillo's denial of a rural dispenser's license to Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Hatch, doing business as Cotton City Grocery, Cotton City, Hidalgo County. While their appeal was pending Mr. and Mrs. Hatch obtained a restraining order preventing Jaramillo from acting on the application of Jose V. Morelos, doing business as Cotton City Tavern. Jaramillo said the two proposed permit sites are less than a mile apart, Rural dispenser permits must be at least 10 miles from the nearest license. Jaramillo will set a hearing on the Morelos request after the restraining


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

Microscopic worms in state

Although their presence has been generally underestimated in New Mexico, nematodes can be found in soils almost everywhere. In fact, these microscopic worms are considered to be a serious pest on many of the crops grown in New Mexico, says Emroy Shannon, Extension plant pathologist at New Mexico State University.

Few plants, including turf and or-namentals, are immune from these destructive pests that feed on roots.

lower yields on cotton, peaches, tomatoes, chile and other yegetables.

Nematodes differ tremendously in their effects on various plants. Often high populations of injurious nematodes may be found around the roots of plants that appear to be fairly healthy. In many cases, the buildup of the pest is so gradual that growers may not even suspect nematodes are at work beneath the soil. Some growers mistakenly blame poor yields and

plant vigor on low soil fertility or moisture.

damaging in New Mexico, Shannon says. Plant roots infested by root-knot nematodes may be galled or show brownish discoloration.

Chemical control methods are very useful and profitable under New Mexico conditions, but they seldom-if ever-kill

all the nematodes. You will get the most satisfactory control with soil fumigants called nematocides. Although there are many chemicals that can be purchased to control nematodes, the one most widely used in

New Mexico is referred to as DR((dibromochloropropane). DBCP is so under the trade names of Nemago Fumazone and Nema-Kill. The chemicals can be purchased at nurseri and agricultural supply stores. DBCP c be applied to the soil before planting shortly after plants have begun to gro

Other nematocides, such as D-D ar Telone, are also effective and a especially recommended where chile is be grown. They must be applied at least lays before planting. They generall require more soil moisture at applicatio time than does DBCP.

Proper dress important

If you're looking for a job in this job-tight economy, you need everything going for you. This means that your appearance may be as important as your ability, says

Susan Wright, Extension clothing specialist at New Mexico State University. When you go on an interview, dress and groom like you mean business. Your appearance can make or break you in an interview situation. The prospective employer is likely to equate your appearance with your seriousness or

capabilities. Dress conventionally and carefully. Of course, dress in keeping with the type of job you are seeking.

If the interview is for a professional or sales position, a suit or sports coat with tie is in order for men, a tailored dress or suit for women. But if you are applying for a job as a filling station attendant, a

waitress, or a grocery clerk, more casual clothing is fine.

Pant suits are acceptable attire for women seeking many kinds of jobs. A clean sport shirt and slacks may be suitable for men for some interviews. But don't go in for a mod look - unless you're seeking a job in a teen boutique.

Accessories must be chosen carefully. Hose and socks should coordinate with your outfit. Your handbag and shoes should go with your attire, too.

But whatever you wear, make sure it is in tip-top condition. Clothing should be clean and freshly pressed. Shoes should shine. And woe be to the job applicant who has runs in her stockings or holes in his

In addition, groom yourself as though it will make a difference - and it will. Make sure your nails are neatly scrubbed, your hair clean and trimmed, and your body fresh smelling.

When you have dressed carefully and groomed.yourself immaculately, you can he more confident during the interview. But, just to make sure, duck into a restroom before you step into the interviewer's office. Assure yourself that you look great, then forget about appearance, Miss Wright says.

Bicentennial Notebook

Most people have assumed that the merican Revolution was exclusively a ale activity and in many ways it was. Men were in positions of leadership and were quite unwilling to listen to the voices of the few women who demanded equal treatment. Even John Adams did not listen to the pleas of his activist wife, Abigail, to remember the ladies, and be more generous and favourable to them than your ancestors."

Certainly the world of the eighteenth centrury was male-dominated and few men were willing to listen to such demands. Most of them probably agreed with John Adams' statement in explaining why women should not be allowed to vote: "Their delicacy renders them unfil for practice and experience in the great businesses of life."

Despite this prevailing male opinion, the disruptions and dislocations caused by the war did cause many women to play a larger role than ever before. The shortage of labor, in particular, brought women into the work force. Women advertised in local newspapers the services they had to offer. There were women blacksmiths, gunsmiths, cobblers, butchers, barbers, and many with any other number of skills.

Of course, women had never been totally excluded from the world of commerce, From the beginning there had been women who violated the customs of the day and made careers for themselves. Fo example, several newspapers in Marylant had been printed by women, agricultura advances had been made by women or Southern plantations, and one woman Mother Ann Lee, had made a name for herself as a religious leader by founding the sect that eventually became known as the Shakers.

Some of the popular magazines of the day believed that women were becoming too assertive and should return to the

duties "for which they were best suited." The gains made by women during the Revolution were small indeed, but the step forward, however small, had been made. In years to come, other gains would be

In Spanish New Mexico, women played an even less active role in affairs outside the home. Spanish society in the New World was modeled as closely as local conditions would allow after society in Spain itself. Therefore, it was very much a masculine world.

Even though their activity was not open, women did have a very strong influence on the development of New Mexico. This came through their role in the home and their strong support of the church. 
