Careage plans 80-bed nursing home here

Approval of the proposal by the Careage Corporation, Bellevue, Washington to build an 80-bed Medicare certified nursing home in Ruidoso was given Wednesday night by the Sub-Area Health Council's project review committee.

A hearing on the plan, first of five reviews at the local through the federal levels, took place at the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital. Two representatives of Careage and one of Health Management Services, Incorporated, were present to explain the application.

Bill Ross, a consultant with Careage, said, "There really are no facilities certified for Medicare in this part of the state. People are eligible for services they are not receiving."

He said the facility, containing 80 beds — 24 Medicare-certified for skilled nursing care and 56 for intermediate care — would cost around \$1 million. Construction "will take around nine to ten months ... We hope to open by next July."

Unlike a previous nursing home proposal by the Good Samaritan organization, Ross said, "We're not asking the community to do anything except show their support. ... No funds will be collected and no funds other than private financing will be used ... We have received numerous letters of support."

Sub-Area Council member Harold Watson, administrator of the Sunset Villa Nursing Home in Roswell, said there is a problem of defining "skilled nursing care" for Medicare in New Mexico, and called it "a lost cause." Statistics were cited showing that most New Mexico nursing homes have done away with their skilled nursing care beds because of the difficulty in meeting the state's definition of patients requiring such care.

Eric Johnston, vice president of Health Management Services, Incorporated, which would operate the Ruidoso nursing home under lease, said Medicare "is a tough program ... We're doing battle in five facilities already, so we can handle one more."

Ross said, "If we do not have the Medicare certified facility available, people will not receive the service. We're willing to give it a try." He said the facility will be built to meet "all state and federal standards."

Mozelle Vinsant, Roswell, district nursing supervisor and director of Home Health Services, said, "I question the total

number of 80 beds and particularly the number of skilled nursing care beds ... We do need some ICF (intermediate care) beds in Lincoln County."

Other committee members asked if Careage would consider changing its proposal, possibly including a smaller number of beds.

Ross said, "We're looking at a million-dollar project. It's not the beds that cost, but it's the beds themselves that pay for the project ... With less than 80 beds we could not do it — 80 is our absolute minimum."

Fewer beds, Ross said, result in higher costs to patients. He noted that "We could pull back if services are not utilized."

Vinsant asked if Careage has considered offering boarding home services for elderly persons who are in Ruidoso for only part of the year, to be near their

vacationing families.

Ross said, "Basically we're developing it for Lincoln County, but it (visitors) is something we've taken into consideration."

Betty Howell, administrator of the Carrizozo Health Center, asked if Careage had given consideration to revamping the empty Carrizozo hospital to serve as a nursing home.

Roy Humphreys, development coordinator for Careage, said this would be only slightly less expensive than building a new facility, and the life expectancy of the remodeled hospital would not justify the expense.

Vinsant asked if Careage would import nurses to work at the home, or if they would try to recruit them locally.

James Burns, Council member and administrator of the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) said the hospital does not have trouble in hiring nurses locally, although he has had to seek other specialists (laboratory technicians, physical therapists) outside the Ruidoso area.

He noted that intermediate care beds in Alamogordo and Roswell nursing homes are full.

Mary Rich, council member, asked if Careage had considered an alternative to natural gas for heating, and Humphreys said solar heating is not being considered because there are no federal grants available for solar heated facilities for "private, profit making firms such as ourselves."

Rich asked if the seasonal fluctuations in the Ruidoso area population would pose a problem, and Ross said, "This does not affect nursing homes as directly as it does a hospital."

He added that Careage specializes in building nursing homes for "smaller communities," and has built almost 200 throughout the country.

The site of the nursing home would be two to two-and-a-half acres, the Careage representatives said.

The motion of Burns that the project be approved as presented was unanimously endorsed by members of the Sub-Area Health Council.

Friday's hearing on the proposal will be conducted in Roswell by the full membership of the Sub-Area Health Council, at 1:30 p.m., at the Industrial Air Center, Building 610.

Countess wins JC Stakes

Countess Blade, the superstar owned by Lorene Childers of Borger, Texas, ripped up Sunday's second division of the Jockey Club Stakes at Ruidoso Downs and set a track record for seven furlongs.

The filly, ridden by Gilbert Villegas as the public choice, cooked out the pacemaker Apostolic in the backstretch, then disilluioned the late-charging Zoretis Reval in the final furlong.

At the wire, the filly was still moving with tremendous momentum, a com-

fortable three lengths in front.

As the filly returned to the main track, and started for the winner's circle, announcer Bob Dudich reported she had covered the distance in 1:24 3-5 seconds, clipping a tick off the standard established by First Impression last year.

The announcement brought a big round of applause from the fans.

In winning the Jockey Club, Countess Blade — originally purchased in last year's Ruidoso Summer Sale for a

bargain-basement \$10,000 — picked up her fifth win of the season. The set also includes three stakes.

Apostolic, packing the top load of 125 pounds, got off quickly and tried to outleg Countess Blade. But the latter, in with 120, stayed with Apostolic until the turn for home and helped him set stinging fractions of 22 3-5 for two furlongs, 45 flat for the half-mile. At the turn for home, Apostolic was obviously well used up, and began to

Pony Express Race time record broken Saturday

The team of Ted Clements and David Cunningham, Picacho, with a time of two hours, one minute and 52 seconds over the 41-mile Pony Express Race course from White Oaks to Lincoln Saturday shattered the 2:05:20 record set in 1976 by Benny Runnels of Bonito and Waddle Hobbs of Albuquerque.

Cunningham crossed the finish line riding a 16-year-old Arabian. During the race he and Clements rode a second 16-year-old, one nine and one six-year-old Arabians.

"Our goal," Clements said, "was exactly two hours, but guess we fell a couple of minutes short."

Coming in second was Jamil Hindi of Duran, who, though teamed with his father Braham Hindi, rode the race alone.

Finishing third was the team of Sheri Goodloe of Roswell and Capitan and Virgil Smith of Picacho. Sheri, 15, became the first woman to enter the race.

Clements and Cunningham shared the \$1,000 prize money and will share a bronze traveling trophy, created by Glenn Dennis of Lincoln and Roswell, depicting the Pony Express Mail carriers.

"The riders carried about 1,400 pieces of mail," Postmaster Ellen Fay Womach, Lincoln, said.

During the trophy ceremony, emcee Ralph Dunlap presented Truman Spencer Jr., Carrizozo, with a plaque honoring him as the originator of the Pony Express Race and for his years as official starter and timer of the event.

Billboard removal study is underway

A study of the economic impact the removal of billboards will have on New Mexico communities and businesses is now underway, according to Paul W. Zickfoose, senior research economist at New Mexico State University's Center for Business Services.

Zickfoose said a team of four student interviewers will spend a week in Ruidoso gathering information about billboards, and the extent to which tourist-related businesses depend on them.

No requests for exemption from the state's mandatory billboard-removal program will be considered until the economic study is complete, Zickfoose said.

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PLANNING AHEAD FOR YOUR FUTURE

Inside the Capital

SANTA FE — Human Rights Executive Director Frank Beserra says: "The majority of state employees know very little about State Personnel's rules and are confused by State Personnel's policies on testing, job evaluations and grievance options."

Beserra also said in a report July 25 to Gov. Jerry Apodaca: "They have not seen the agency's affirmative action plan and have no contact with the agency's Equal Employment Opportunity staff. They do not appreciate all the opportunities they can acquire for upward mobility."

Beserra's staff interviewed more than 1,000 state employees, using a standard questionnaire to identify attitudes on equal employment opportunity and affirmative action. He told Apodaca the staff "found midmanagement practices are very much lacking and little sensitivity by this group for equal employment values."

He said: "This problem is very serious in the particular circumstance of interviewing new hires and on promotional decisions."

In the last two years, Beserra said, four state agencies "have made a remarkable effort" to comply with state and federal equal employment opportunity guidelines — State Police and the Game and Fish, Corrections and Hospitals-Institutions Departments. He said the DEI gave its 2,000 employees copies of its affirmative action plan in English and Spanish.

Beserra says: "Our basic concern is that our state agencies wake up to the fact that we're going to lose our federal funds." Beserra says Carter administration officials gave clear indications at a conference July 28-30 in Corpus Christi, Texas, "that federal funds will be used to require compliance with affirmative action programs."

Beserra is still hassling with the big State Highway Department over the filing of an acceptable affirmative action plan. He wrote Chief Highway Engineer James Bird July 11: "In the course of our evaluation of your agency's affirmative action plan for 1977-78 we found several major deficiencies which, according to the governor's check points, cause the plan to be unacceptable."

Beserra told Bird: "We will be citing non-compliance by your agency, extending over two consecutive years" in a report to Gov. Apodaca. A 7-page letter last January from Bird to Beserra listed numerous exceptions to a summary of charges and findings of fact in a Highway Department discrimination case. Bird cited a host of alleged Human Rights Commission errors point-by-point.

Beserra said the SHD and State Health-Social Services Department "don't seem to deviate from what they did in the past." He added: "We're up there at the HSSD conducting an affirmative action audit now. We're getting the views of HSSD employees on problems affecting the agency — morale, upward mobility, people's understanding of what exactly equal opportunity programs are, bidding on jobs."

Beserra says an adequate affirmative action program must contain 10 points. Among the points: "The state agency must indicate a positive attitude toward equal employment opportunity and indicate that decisions regarding recruitment, hiring, training and promotions will be made without regard to race, color, religion, national origin and physical or mental handicap, except when one of these criteria is a good faith qualification for the occupation involved."

The checklist also says: "The agency must identify those areas within the agency's work force in which minorities and women are being underutilized."

Beserra told Apodaca seven state agencies offered valid plans to the Human Rights Commission but were unable to justify a full-time equal employment officer. In the same two-year period, he said, "a number of agencies have demonstrated great difficulty in establishing a quality plan and making a commitment for a full-time equal employment opportunity staff."

He listed the Vocational Rehabilitation Division, State Education Department, Corporation Commission, Public Employees Retirement Association, Land Office, Employment Security Commission and Energy Resources Board.

In the two-year span Beserra's staff conducted internal audits in the Highway Department central office and District 4 (Las Vegas); State Museum; Game and Fish Department; Energy Resources Board; Motor Vehicle Department and HSSD central administration. Beserra said 15 agencies submitted acceptable plans and 35 are under current review.

Twelve agencies did not submit plans. Among them were the Arts Commission, Land Office, Development Department, ESC, FERR, Vocational Rehabilitation Department, Real Estate Commission, Racing Commission, State Auditor, Carrie Tingley Hospital for Crippled Children, Children and Youth Committee and Governor's Office on Manpower Administration. Eighteen agencies did not report grievances.

UNCERTAIN DRUG TREATY

The treaty with Mexico on prisoner exchange is heralded by many as the answer to reports of abuse of American citizens in Mexican jails and the legal system that put them there.

But deliberations in the Senate on ratification of the pact have revealed considerable doubt that it will become workable even if approved. The questions are constitutional in nature.

The treaty envisions return of Mexicans in American jails and Americans in Mexican jails to their own countries for completion of the terms to which they have been sentenced.

Can the U. S. government hold in prison, however, a person convicted in a foreign court that does not acknowledge the rights and freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution to accused American citizens?

Several senators, including New York Republican Jacob Javits, are skeptical.

"The government of Mexico," Javits said in hearings before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee which approved the agreement, "must understand that the Supreme Court is the final authority on the constitutional rights of American citizens."

A waiver of such rights as a condition of the voluntary exchange would almost certainly be challenged as invalid in American courts.

The humane objectives of the treaty are laudable. We hope that it can be proven feasible.

But the reservations of the lawmakers should warn the estimated 600 Americans held in Mexican jails not to pin too much hope on the treaty. — News-Bulletin, Belen.

JAWORSKI CATALYST

What the House Ethics Committee inquiry into alleged South Korean influence-buying in Congress required was a catalyst — something to change the chemistry of an investigation gone sour. The appointment of Leon Jaworski as counsel to the committee may be that catalyst.

It would be naive to expect miracles. Jaworski is not demonstrably more competent than his predecessor, Philip A. Lacovara; his reputation for probity is not greater. Each is an extremely capable attorney. Each could be relied upon, given supportive conditions, to dig up the facts for the committee charged with assembling them and then reporting to the House.

But Jaworski has two important things going for him, as the saying has it, that Lacovara lacked. Three, really. As a former American Bar Association president and chief Watergate prosecutor, he is nationally known and respected. He has an ironclad agreement giving him "full and complete independence in the fact-finding process of the investigation." Perhaps as important as anything, he comes to the task riding the crest of heightened public determination that this scandal shall be rigorously exposed.

Jaworski, in short, will be bolstered by those "supportive conditions" referred to above, Lacovara, embroiled in contention with Committee Chairman John J. Flynt Jr. because Flynt reined him in and retarded the investigation's progress, did not enjoy such conditions. Accordingly, with Jaworski as counsel there is a much better chance that the inquiry will now be pursued with the diligence and impartiality the public has a right to expect. — Alamogordo Daily News.

It takes plenty of cooperation to build spacious solar heated home

Three University of Texas at Austin students will receive college credit for their construction labor this summer in Ruidoso.

Architecture students Gerald Schmitz, Dana Hersey and Larry Schwab are assisting Austin designer David Smith in building a solar-adobe home for Mr. and Mrs. Dave Travis of Ruidoso.

The 2,400 square foot home, located in White Mountain II subdivision, incorporates both passive and active solar heating with the use of skylights and solar collector panels on the roof. Other energy innovations such as water heated in a fireplace grill, insulated shutters and double glass windows will also be used.

The 16 skylights with louvers are passive solar heating devices, allowing the sun to enter the house and warm a thick adobe wall. The wall will then release heat into the house at night.

Active solar energy, produced by five solar collectors, heats the hot water for the Travis' use and also helps heat the house.

Basically, forced air is circulated through the collector panels on the roof and heated. Then, the heat is stored in a 90

cubic foot rock bin, which "is the most efficient and least expensive heat storage device" for such a system, Larry Richardson, representative of the collector panel manufacturer, said.

The heat stored in the bin then can be transferred through vents and ducts, thus heating the house.

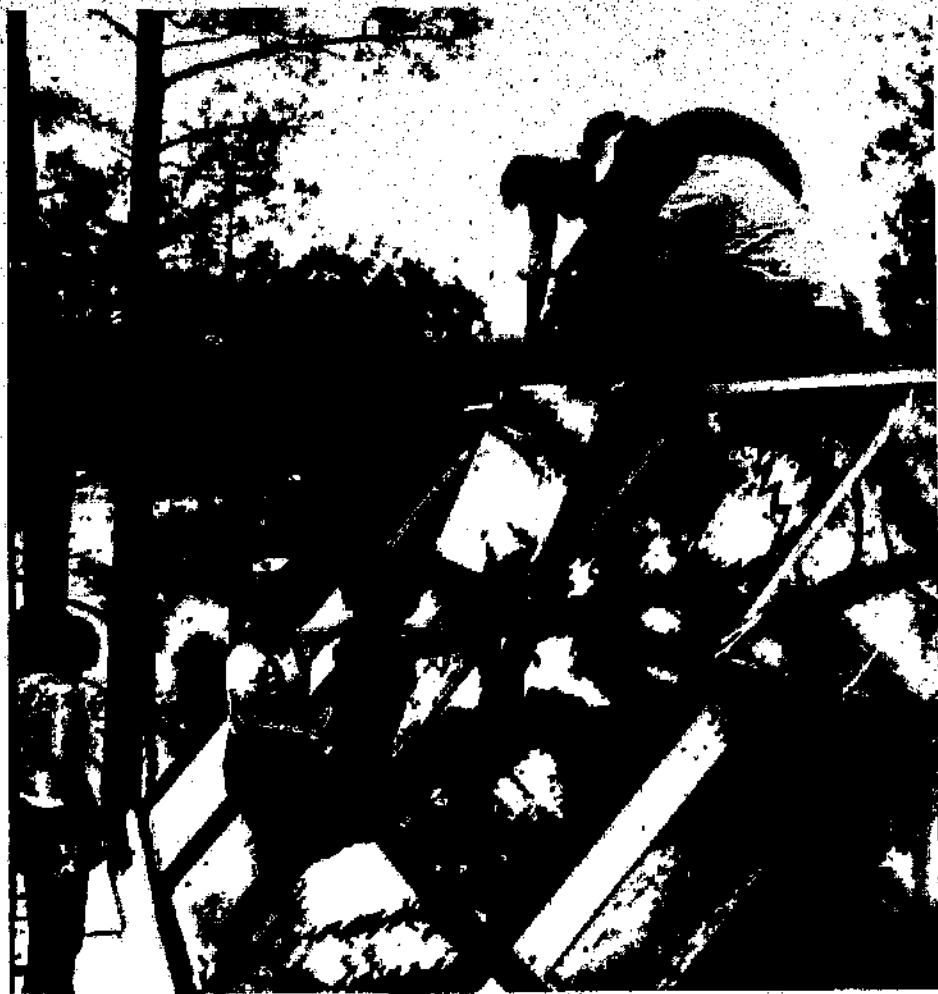
Another aspect of energy conservation which will be installed in Travis' three bedroom-two bath solar-adobe are windows with insulated shutters. These windows are similar to the regular crank-type, but have double glass to contain the heat, using the same principle as storm windows.

An electrical backup heating system for the periods when there is little sunshine will also be installed.

A system of pipes replacing the grill in Travis' fireplace will heat water which circulates through the flooring to warm the kitchen, dining area and living room.

Finally, polystyrene insulation was used in the slab floors and in the foundation.

Aesthetic features of the house include barn wood ceilings and walls plus red brick floors.
