## Hobbs visits travel agents in Mexico

Chamber manager John Hobbs returned Tuesday from a five-day promotional trip to Mexico, bearing an impressive fistful of business cards obtained from Mexican directors of tourism and travel agents who are now aware of the beauties of the Sierra Blanca Ski Resort.

The tour was organized by Foremost West, a promotional organization serving New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, Utah and Nevada. "The village Lodgers Tax Committee felt it was essential that Ruidoso be represented," Hobbs said to The News.

Other New Mexicans along for the trip were from Las Cruces, Albuquerque and the state's Department of Development. "The purpose of the trip," Hobbs said, "was to establish a working relationship with the directors of tourism and travel agents in those Mexican cities and states we visited."

"I was very fortunate — in Guadalajara I had a personal audience with the Secretaria de Turismo (Minister of Tourism), Senor Alvaro G. Preciado Coronado.

"He has a dual function, in that he is an official of the federal government of Mexico, as well as an official for the state of Jalisco," in which both Guadalajara and Puerto Vallarta are located.

Puerto Vallarta is a coastal city and the second most popular resort in Mexico, after Acapulco. Its development parallels that of Ruidoso in some respects, and Hobbs said he and Alvaro discussed "the possibility of having Ruidoso and Puerto Vallarta be sister cities."

He emphasized that this plan is only an idea, at this stage.

"The most productive part of the trip as far as Ruidoso is concerned was the part that took us to Chihuahua City. It's a sprawling, booming city with a population

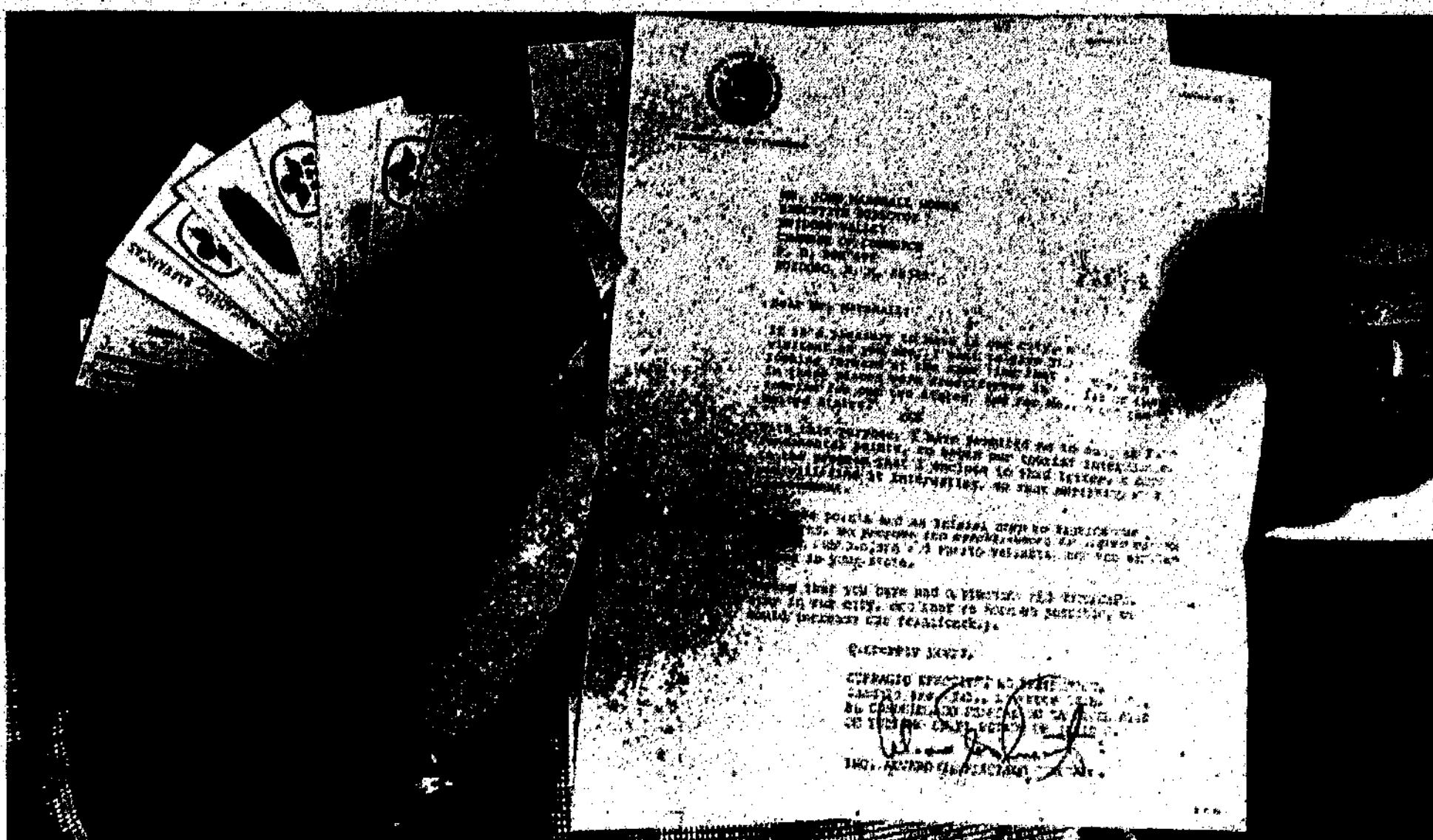
of 450,000, and it represents potentially a very large market for Ruidoso.

"We're still the closest ski area to any place in old Mexico and there's a lot of interest in Ruidoso as a winter playground for people from the Chihuahua area. Chihuahua is one of the more financially sound states in the republic and as a consequence the people are well-traveled."

In Chihuahua City, Hobbs "was able to establish contact" with two travel directors — Raymundo Rojo, director general of the Rojo and Casavantes Travel Agency, and Eugenio Villarreal, director of the Economic Development Association of the State of Chihuahua.

"This will establish communication, as well as provide for an organized exchange of visitors," Hobbs said.

He noted that the New Mexico delegation was the only one to make the trip to Chihuahua City.

## Knights' cage tournament set

The White Mountain Middle School girls' and boys' basketball teams will host a regional tournament sponsored by the Ruidoso Knights of Columbus December 1 through 3 in the gymnasium.

Area schools planning to participate include Carrizozo, Capitan, Hondo, Tularosa, Alamogordo, Holloman and Weed.

Coach Tom Culbertson said the Braves "are going out to win and will give it their best shot."

The team, which has not scrimmaged

yet, will be hampered by the late start of basketball practice and possibly by players who have had no basketball experience.

The girls' team also may be hampered by inexperience, Culbertson said.

"Only two or three girls have played basketball," he said. "Many have never picked up a ball."

"But they are working hard, training and getting into shape."

Admission to the tournament will be \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children.

## Penalties high for causing forest fire

With the recent rash of fires within the village and on Lincoln National Forest land, The News Friday asked Smokey Bear District Ranger Ray Page what constituted a citable violation and what the subsequent penalties would be.

Violations range from unintentional to willful misuse of fire and the penalties "depend on the circumstances and involve a judgement factor," Page said.

"If it's a fire which escapes un-

intentionally, we would consider that a petty offense and write a citation with a predetermined fine of \$25.

"The offender would mail the fine to the central violations bureau or ask for a hearing with a United States Magistrate."

Page said "A more serious violation would be if in our judgement the person should have known better."

"For instance a camper who was warned his campfire was unsafe, ignored the warning and the fire escapes (would be

a more serious offender).

"In such a case we would ask for a complaint and contact our attorney which would result in mandatory appearance before a magistrate and could result in a fine of \$500 or six months in jail."

Page said the most serious violation was willfully allowing a fire to escape, or setting a fire, which would be "subject to a fine of \$5,000 or five years imprisonment."

In addition to the fines, a violator also is responsible for the costs of suppression

and loss of resources, such as timber, grazing or forage.

"That's what hurts," Page said. "The \$25 fine doesn't hurt most persons; but, for example the cost of suppressing last spring's Moon Mountain fire would be about \$80,000."

Page said a high percentage of man-caused fires result from improper campfires. Occasionally the rangers will know who was camped by the fire but often "it's hard to tell."

## Chamber will distribute new Ruidoso street maps

A colorful, new and informative street map of Ruidoso, including Ruidoso Downs, Alto and Sierra Blanca Ski Resort road, is now available at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce office, 666 Sudruth Drive.

The map features a bird's eye view of the Ruidoso area with pencil work by Cyrus Thiebault and watercolor by Gary

Myers, adapted from an aerial photograph.

Publishers of the map, Community Publishing of Ruidoso, used engineering maps of the area with all roads being verified from aerial photographs, or, when necessary, by actually driving them.

The updating of street names was handled by Janelle Coate with Mary Pierson and Tim Dalton in charge of art

and pasteup and typesetting and photostats by Ruidoso Printing.

"The new map is a Chamber of Commerce endorsed project to," executive director John Hobbs said, "offer our visitors as well as our residents the finest possible street map of Ruidoso and the area."

"The street guide is the most accurate of any map previously endorsed by the

Chamber. There are a few discrepancies, due to the deadline for publishing the map, but they are minor and will pose no problem for anyone desiring to find a specific location on any street."

"We are grateful for the cooperation received from village officials who made engineering maps and aerial photographs available to the publishers of the new Ruidoso street map."

## Revised Ski-Pak plan announced

The Ski-Pak plan previously announced has undergone some changes, Chamber of Commerce manager John Hobbs said.

Instead of \$28, the cost of the package will be \$17.50, and it will include one all-day lift ticket at the Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, rental of skis, boots, poles and tax on all services included.

In addition, participating motels will offer discounted rates to mid-week skiers, Hobbs said.

"We have nearly universal participation by the ski shops within Ruidoso," Hobbs said, noting that Ski-Paks will not be available for use on weekends and holidays.

One change from last season is that the 1977-78 Ski-Paks will not include a \$5 meal allowance.

Ski-Paks may be obtained at the Chamber during regular business hours.

## Grade students learn fire use for survival

In a unique class offered at White Mountain Middle School, thirty students participated Tuesday in a fire building contest.

As part of the outdoor living skills class on wilderness survival taught by Bob Palko, the students, ranging in age from 12 to 14, have studied fuels and starting fires with flint and steel in two practical sessions.

"Last week the class began fires with tinder using flint and steel," Palko said. "The kids were in pairs with one striking the steel with flint and the other piling on the tinder (fine fuels such as dried grass)."

"They all got their fires started."

In another practical session held last week at Cedar Creek rifle range, the students had a fire building contest.

String was tied to stakes at 12 and 24 inch intervals over each student's fire.

Each pair was allowed to pile the fuels they thought appropriate to the 12 inch mark and then given two matches.

"Most got their fires started with the two matches and then increased their fuels to get the fires going and build the flames," Palko said.

The winners, whose fires burned through the 24-inch marker first, were Ed Ludlow and Stuart Bass in the morning class and Tammy Blackwelder and Jim Uhllein in the afternoon.

As a result of the contest, the students learned "which fuels burn best and not to smother their fire," Palko said.

"They particularly learned to take the wind into consideration" as most built their fires directly under the string marker instead of offset to where the wind

could blow the flames into the marker, he said.

For both practical courses on fire building, Palko emphasized safety.

"The day before the contest, the class saw a film from the forest service on fire safety," he said. "We also chose the rifle range because there is a fire break completely around the area."

Shovels and adequate water also were on hand.

The outdoor living skills class offered for the first time in the Ruidoso Municipal Schools system discusses several other aspects of wilderness survival in addition to fire building.

"The class teaches self management by knowing how to take care of your body by understanding heat and cold," Palko said.

"They've learned to recognize hypothermia or cold weather exhaustion in themselves and they know what to do to take care of their bodies."

"Also, they know how to ventilate and cool their bodies down in extreme heat."

Other outdoor living skills discussed in the class include:

— Equipment, cooking and eating outdoors.

— Sleeping and shelter. "We may build a snow tunnel later in the class," he said.

— Finding adequate water, including construction of a sun still which distills water from the atmosphere.

— Wilderness navigation or telling direction by the sun, stars or vegetation. Palko said navigation by vegetation is particularly important in Ruidoso. "The north facing slope doesn't get sun, but it does get moisture."

— Response to emergency situations. "This stresses psychological preparedness," he said. "If they have to stay out all night, (this part of the class) teaches them to think about what they are doing, so they will do it right and not panic."

— First aid.

The purpose of the class, which will be offered again this spring at the mid school, is to teach self reliance, independence and enjoyment of the outdoors, he said.

"It makes kids aware of the different things they can do in their environment and exposes them to the different types of activities they can do on their own for lifetime enjoyment."

"That can be particularly important in

this area; there's so much available outdoors," he said. "But people and kids in the area don't use it to the full extent."

Palko was assisted with the fire building sessions by instructional aide Gray Mason. Palko's class on technical rock climbing, which was first publicized in an October 27

article in The News, has received international media coverage.

In addition to an FM station in Halifax, Nova Scotia, contacting Palko, articles have appeared in newspapers in Minnesota, Illinois, Albuquerque, Artesia, Roswell, Alamogordo among others.

## 'Chamber Talk'

What is a Chamber of Commerce to you? What purposes do you expect it to serve? What functions does our Chamber have in the day to day life of this community? The result of this "long, hard look" was the board's decision to adopt an ambitious program of work designed to also make the Chamber the

The Chamber has assumed a whole new set of responsibilities and, in so doing, has really taken on a new and different character. In addition to our traditional advertising and promotional role, in the future we will also be an integral part of representing Ruidoso and Lincoln County in such matters of concern as: (1) improving and expanding the transportation system in the area; (2) initiating an economic development program for the area which would serve to expand the scope of our commercial enterprise and work toward diversifying our local economic base; (3) establishing a "Women's Division" within the Chamber; (4) setting up a Governmental Affairs Committee to provide a liaison between Ruidoso and Carrizozo, Santa Fe, Washington, D.C., etc.; (5) having a "Professionals Committee" whose purpose would be to respond to the needs of the pharmacists, attorneys, educators, doctors, clerics, etc., and to recruit additional professionals to service in Ruidoso as the need arises; (6) institute a "Finance Committee" to insure that through sound money management and well-planned fiscal policy the Chamber will always be on a solid financial footing, and so on.

What all of the above means to us is this: Ruidoso's Chamber of Commerce wants to have a really important role in every part of Ruidoso's future. The Chamber has taken significant steps toward meeting the challenges of our future. 



## A word from Jack Frost

However, I am bringing a little wind and cold nights so that the snow that follows the cold will not be too sudden. When we do bring some snow there will be a few warm days in between so you may get used to the cold gradually.

There is one thing I want all of you to remember. This warm weather so late into the Autumn (Autumn lasts up until December 20) this warm weather in late Autumn — do not let it catch you off guard.

A late snow can come very suddenly. So when you are out away from the house, be prepared for a snow fall. Have warm clothing, something to eat, a flash light, some water, and matches. Be very careful with the matches in the dry windy weather, but keep them so you can make a fire if you get caught in a blizzard. And tell this to all your friends who are in your country for the first time.

As times goes on and winter approaches, there are a number of things to remember about improving your health through the winter. Winter time is a very healthful time if you remember certain things.

On warm sunny winter days, have an extra pair of socks with you to put on when the sun goes down and the cold begins to settle down. Our feet are faithful friends, and we often take them for granted. They will reward us richly for any kindness: the right kind of shoes (these should be loose enough so there will be air inside and circulation for the feet); dry socks, and insoles in the cold weather. When you get in at night it is good to take your shoes off and warm your feet by the fire.

Aside from care of the feet you need to eat right. I say eat as many things as you can raw: apples, oranges, lemons, avocados, cabbage, carrots, milk, honey, watercress, and so on. Cooked things are great too, of course.

Getting back to shoes, Indian moccasins are great. You will notice in the last few years shoe manufacturers are making a lot of the shoes like moccasins.

As for food, always be thankful for something to eat. Be thankful for all God's blessings. This will keep you in a Cheerful spirit, come what may.

The ridge runner was showing me a book all about color and how important it is. Colors have a lot to do with our life. This time of year the colors of the sunset and sunrise are very cheerful.

Red and black, and dark colors of all kinds are warm colors. And white and light blue and light green are cool colors. You should remember this in your clothes for winter and summer.

I saw the Ridge Runner out the other day running with his dog Solo Vito, and taking care of his little pet calf, Impo.

I miss his little dog who stayed with him fourteen years, Shady Logan. Never have I seen a little dog like this. A little spirit dog. And his good little spirit comes to visit us often when we get lonesome.

Well, a blessed Thanksgiving season to you all.

# Inside the Capital

**SANTA FE** — State Sen. Gladys Hansen, D-Las Cruces, will campaign for nomination for lieutenant governor at the Democratic convention next spring, she says. An official announcement will come in mid-December.

Friends of Hansen last week said she had changed her original plans and intended to seek the nomination for secretary of state, but the report was wrong.

Her chances appeared strong to take the secretary's nomination because of her legislative contacts throughout the state and her special association with local officials from her county clerk days.

She would have cut deep into the other front runners for the secretary's post — Betty Florina and Shirley Hooper.

Her road to the lieutenant governor's office, however, may not be as smooth. She joins a top heavy crowd of office seekers, among them other lawmakers and well known personalities. The fact that she is the lone woman in the crowded field is an unknown factor.

With the addition of a \$30,000 per year salary, the list of candidates for lieutenant governor has reached proportions entirely out of line with the office's importance. Some candidates too believe the office is a stepping stone to the governor's chair.

The lieutenant governor is the only elected state official who can seek the governor's chair after serving one four-year term. Other officers are restricted from running for any other state office after their term is ended for a four year period.

Letters and calls from some National Guard officers run counter to information received from other officers that personnel problems exist in the Guard. The arguments are over interpretations of regulations generally and miss the point

on the subject — that many high ranking officers are unhappy.

The basic facts are that several officers in the Guard really are upset with promotion tactics used by Adj. Gen. Frank Miles. Whatever the motive behind the officers' gripes, the fact remains that they feel frustrated enough to complain and provide information on some activities of the Guard.

Miles has been called on to provide explanations for his actions, and he has agreed. Meanwhile, when high ranking officers or former officers say they are unhappy and disgruntled and then provide information on some doubtful activities of the Guard, that information will and should be used in and of itself.

Peter Kelly, an old wire service henchman of mine and formerly of Albuquerque and Santa Fe, died the other day up in Wyoming, and I couldn't have been more saddened. Kelly was only 38 years old. He was stricken with a heart attack.

Back further than I like to recall, Kelly showed up at my home here one day with his first new car — a little Ford Mustang with less than 200 miles on the speedometer. He took my family for a ride.

Pete then must have been about 25 years old, and it was his first car because he had been injured in a terrible auto accident years earlier while riding as a passenger. He had been afraid to drive since that time, and the new car was a lot bigger victory for him than simply saving up enough money for a down payment.

Kelly overcame many other little personal handicaps in a similar manner. He went on to become a much respected newsman in Colorado and Wyoming, something he forced out of a reluctant personality with a big heart that never should have been stopped.

### WRONG APPROACH

Something must be done to salvage the floundering Social Security program, but requiring employers to pay three-fourths of the tax instead of one-half is not the answer.

At present, employer and employee share the tax equally — the employer matching the employee's contribution. Among proposed changes now before Congress is one requiring employers to pay three-fourths of the tax and employees only one-fourth.

Such a move may save the program but could create an inflationary nightmare in the nation's economy. There is no way

employers would be able to do this without passing the increased business expense on to the customer.

Public utilities, such as natural gas companies, electrical firms and water utilities will all use this added expense as a logical argument for grants in rate increases. These increases will be passed on to users, who include the poor, the elderly and those on fixed incomes.

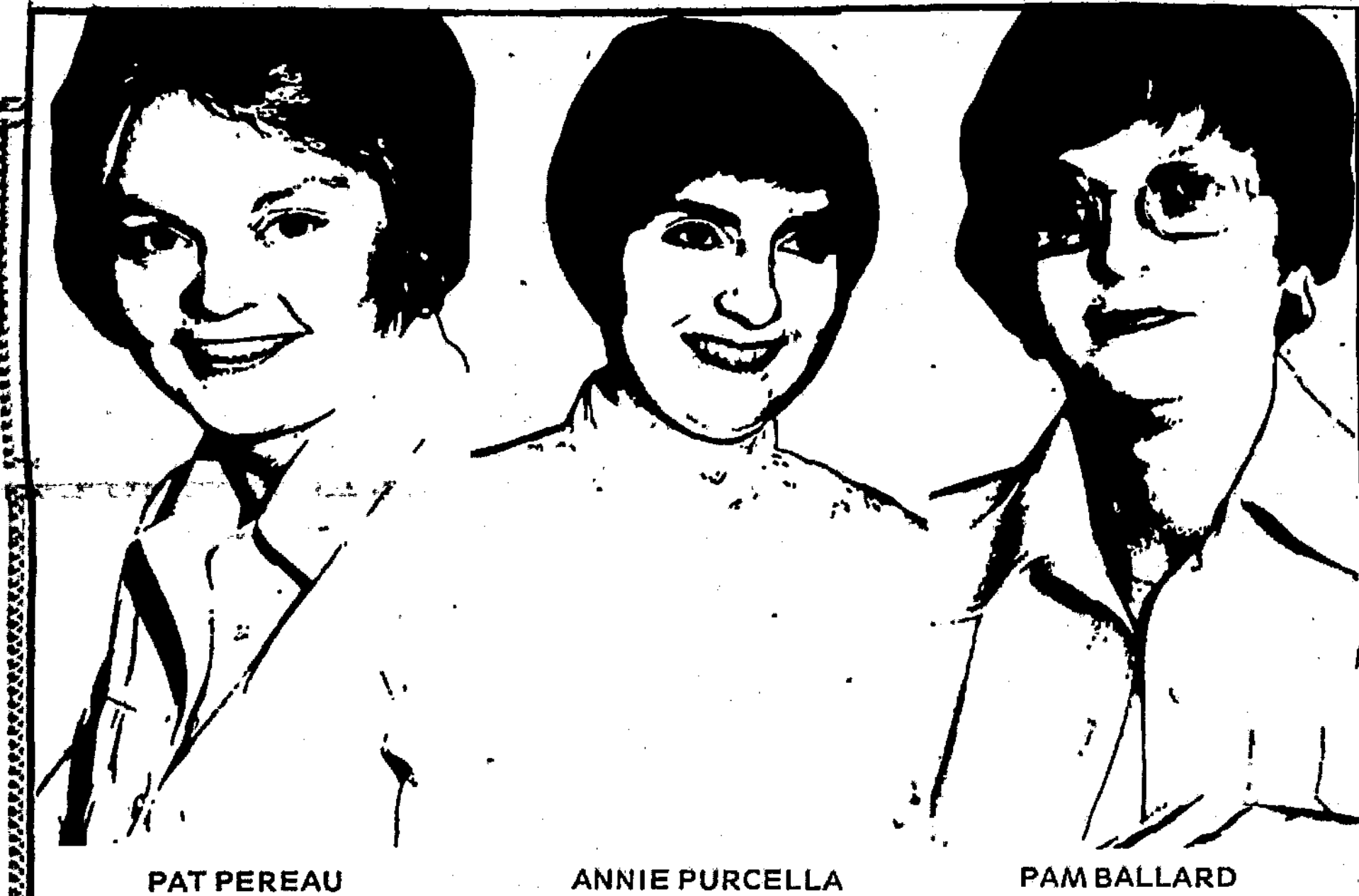
Such a move may solve the Social Security problem temporarily, but this will be more than offset by the negative effect on the economy. Our legislators must look for other solutions. —The Rio Grande Sun, Espanola

### TENTH PLANET?

Charles Kowal of the California Institute of Technology is an astronomer with a rare gift for spotting hitherto unidentified objects in the heavens. He has located 80 supernovas; he is the discoverer of the 13th and 14th moons of Jupiter. It may just turn out, however, that Kowal's place in the history of science will rest mainly on his discovery of the 10th solar planet.

If it is, indeed, a planet. The objects Kowal discerned while engaged in his long-term project of mapping the universe is minuscule by planetary standards, a mere 300 miles in diameter. That makes it only one-tenth the size of Mercury, the smallest of the known planets. This, coupled with such other criteria as the object's orbit and its gravitational effect on other bodies, will figure in determining whether it is a full-fledged member of Sol's family.

Meanwhile, it is intriguing to reflect on what the Caltech astronomer has achieved, and how he did it. Whatever it may be, the object he found had presumably been circling the sun since eons before the first progenitor of man appeared on Earth. Yet generations of astronomers had not seen it, or, if they had, did not suspect what it was, Kowal was the first.

The process is fascinating. Using a microscope to study photographs taken through Caltech's 48-inch telescope on consecutive nights, he found a tiny point of light that had moved far more rapidly on the plates than a distant star would. Further investigation, by means that baffle us, however familiar they are to astronomers, fleshed out the picture.

The object is a billion and a half miles from Earth. Because of its distance from the sun it takes about 115 years to make the grand circuit. Its orbit lies between Saturn and Uranus, and on the plane occupied by all other planets in the solar system.

The question is: With these characteristics, and others that will come to light as inquiry continues, can the object be defined as a true planet, the 10th? Many astronomers are bending their minds to that question. But the discovery is Charles Kowal's, and we salute him.

## Wilderness Wisdom

Dear Wayne — I have seen advertisements of the so called, climbing tree stands. They are supposed to be completely portable. Do you know how well they work? Bobby F., Montana

Dear Bobby — Although I have never personally used one, I have seen them in action and they are quite impressive.

One of the best designs is fitted with straps on the platform, under which the climber hooks his toes.

The climber first selects a tree that is free of limbs to the height he wishes to climb. He then fits the loose bar lock around the tree. Standing on the platform, facing the tree, he inserts his toes under the toe straps. He now reaches high, hugs the tree and withdraws his legs, bringing the stand with him. When he again applies downward pressure to the platform it locks

into its new position, several inches above its previous location. This procedure is continued until the desired height is reached.

Most of these stands fold to be carried on the hunter's back.

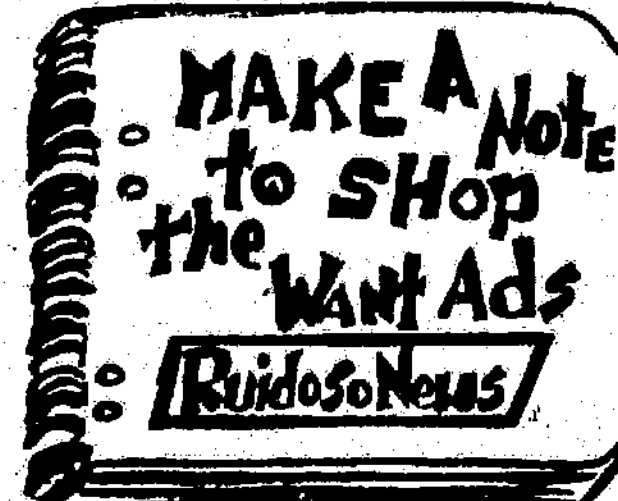
These stands should prove invaluable in areas that do not warrant permanent stands and on one day outings at different locations.

Waffle Plant [Hemigraphis 'Exotica'] — The richly puckered 2" to 4" heart shaped leaves are wine red undersides and cast a purplish tint to the metallic green leaves. It is a crackerjack choice for hanging in a low-light area. Keep it cozy with average to warm temperatures. Prefers moist soil at all times.

**6" Hanging Baskets — \$6<sup>50</sup>**

Boston Fern [Nephrolepis exaltata 'Bostoniensis'] — A fern with sword-shaped, graceful, green fronds. Prefers filtered light, good air circulation, cool night temperatures and should be kept evenly moist. The plant needs plenty of room to grow without being brushed or hit.

## The Merry Widow

Public television will present a new English-language production of Franz Lehar's zesty operetta "THE MERRY WIDOW" starring Beverly Sills Monday, Nov. 28 on PBS, taped as it was presented earlier this fall at the San Diego Civic Theater.

Appearing with Miss Sills in this all-new San Diego Opera Company production will be Alan Titus, Nolan Van Way, Glenys Fowles, Ryan Allen and David Rae Smith.

Miss Sills said the production, which was conceived and directed by Tito Capobianco, is "the most beautiful 'Merry Widow' production I've ever seen and will appeal to almost every taste."

A large part of that appeal, Miss Sills explained, will be the new English-language lyrics in the operetta. Pulitzer Prize-winning lyricist Sheldon Harnick, who wrote the lyrics for "Fiddler on the Roof," "Fiorello!" and other musicals, turned a new translation of "The Merry Widow" into the frothy and frequently funny operetta that was taped for the special.

"The operetta is delightful," executive producer David Prowitt said. "The sets are grand, the costumes delicious and the new English lyrics are genuinely funny."

Based on a French comedy by Henry Meilhac entitled "L'Attache," "The Merry Widow" is a classic love story and became the pattern for later operettas: In Act I he is ardent but she says no, in Act II the lovers' positions are reversed and in Act III, when they are both willing, the operetta ends.

Miss Sills, the first lady of American opera, made her first appearance in "The Merry Widow" when she was only 17 years old, while touring with an operetta company under the aegis of Broadway producer J.J. Shubert. She first appeared with the San Diego Opera Company in 1970 and has been featured with the company three times since then.
