Dr. Howard Tate, retiring from the Ruidoso Board of Education after twelve years of service, was presented with a Gary Myers print by the Ruidoso Education Association during a Thursday afternoon meeting.

Sandy Gladden, president of the association, handed Dr. Tate the large framed print, depicting an Apache mountain spirit dancer. Pat Valliant, superintendent of schools, praised Dr. Tate's services to the village and school district. Tate will leave office following the Feb. 1 election.

# Pro and pro/am ski races set Wednesday, Thursday

The Southwest Pro Ski Tour opens Wednesday, with championship runs Thursday, on Sierra Blanca Ski Area's challenging Capitán run.

"I expect to have a field of between 70 and 100 pros here to qualify for the \$1,500 plus in prize monies," registrar Ray Held said, "in addition to an anticipated registration of more than 150 amateurs."

The action begins Tuesday evening at a Nolsy Waters Lodge party at which the

teams will be announced and competitors paired for the opening races Wednesday.

"Bill Hedger of Albuquerque, one of the best racers in the state, will be here," Held said. "Bill, like Shane Watts, lost a leg to blood poisoning and he skis competitively on one leg. I hope that everyone interested in skiing comes to the slopes to watch Bill in action."

All proceeds from Tuesday's party and from the races will be deposited to the Shane Watts fund

at Security Bank, Held said. "We can't think of a better place to put this money as Shane needs all of the help and encouragement he can get. Being his interest is centered in athletics, this just might be the spark that will help him to continue in competitive sports whether it is skiing or something else. Everyone at the party, as well as at the races, will have an opportunity to contribute to Shane's fund."

All runs will be on the right side of Capitán, Held said, "offering spectators an excellent view from the lodge or ski area."

The Pro/Am races will be on the lower portion of the run, which is negotiable by intermediate skiers, Held said.

Thursday's races, starting at the top, will have jumps midway with the pros going over them at the same time. "This will be spectacular," Held said.

All registrations are to be made at Ray Held's Ski Shop on Sudderth.

# School candidates air views at open forum

The six candidates for two seats on the Ruidoso school board, in the Feb. 1 election, appeared before 25 members of the senior and junior high school faculty Friday noon in an open forum question and answer session.

Those running for position 1 are William "Dub" Holt, Lamar Osbourn, Don E. Dale and Marchand "Mac" McDougal. Seeking the six-year term on position 2 are incumbent Dave Parks and Benny Coulston. The teachers gave the candidates a list of questions to answer, or, as an alternative, they could speak on a topic of their choice with a five minute limit.

Included on the free choice topics were innovative programs, student-teacher ratio, administration, athletics, school finances and discipline.

William "Dub" Holt said, concerning innovative programs in Ruidoso, "I think we're in pretty good shape with the staff that we have."

He said that he has three areas of interest: creation of programs for special or handicapped students, for gifted students, and for those who desire a vocational course of study.

In regard to special education, Holt said he was teaching in Texas when those classes were added there. "I feel that a child should be educated at home, though here in New Mexico we tend to institutionalize the programs."

Concerning vocational education, Holt

said students should have "the opportunity to take courses that might lead to becoming plumbers, electricians, motel operators — skills we need desperately in New Mexico."

"My point is not to have licensed plumbers coming out of high school because an apprentice plumber can make good money."

Holt said that gifted students should have more challenges to maintain their interest in learning.

On discipline, Holt said he has "no qualms" about the present enforcement of discipline in the Ruidoso schools.

Concerning athletics, Holt said that he has coached and that he believes there should be more emphasis placed on participation and less on winning.

As far as the present teacher-student ratio goes, Holt said, "I don't think we're in bad shape. But I wouldn't want to see it grow larger."

He expressed "no qualms" about administrators in the system and added that in his view firing and hiring of staff is not the job of school board members, but rather of principals and the superintendent of schools.

Finally, Holt said that he is "not up to date" on school finances, and "begged off" the question.

Holt and his wife operate Ruidoso Playland Nursery.

Lamar Osbourn was the second can-

didate for position 1 to speak.

"My reasons for running are nothing more than interest," Osbourn said. "I've attended athletic events and seen a closeness between students and teachers that I haven't seen in the other places I've lived."

He praised the existing school system in the village, saying that "the State Department of Education has a pretty good view of us. I haven't heard any serious complaints."

"The only thing I'd like to do is to have a chance to serve to maintain the good system that you have."

Osborn is a vice president of the Ruidoso State Bank.

Don E. Dale, the third position 1 candidate to speak, also commended the school operation. "Parents and kids are real fortunate to have our school system."

Dale is running, he said, "to see that the kids get the best quality education."

"Communication is the healthiest thing for any school board and system. And if there's any way, I'd like to see that we get a Parent-Teacher Association of some kind." He felt that such an organization would serve to increase communication.

On athletics, Dale said, "It's real good for both boys and girls to have that competition. But quality of education and teaching comes first, athletics second. I'm glad that seems to be the policy in Ruidoso."

Dale said he favors a form of "follow-up" of Ruidoso High School graduates to "see what kind of product we've come out with."

He stressed that his main concern is communication. "From the outside, it looks like communication is the most important thing, with the kids caught in the middle between teachers and parents."

As for teacher salaries, Dale said that "teaching is probably the most important, most underpaid profession around."

Dale owns and operates Dale's Furniture.

The fourth and final position 1 candidate to speak was Marchand "Mac" McDougal.

"I think the educational process is the answer, the best way to solve our social problems," McDougal said. "I feel that character development is an integral part of education."

"We sit back and let inertia take over. There's a need to speak out."

McDougal said he is concerned with several areas of the Ruidoso program, but praised the teachers for the successes they have achieved, in his view.

Needed, according to McDougal, is more emphasis on fundamentals, such as reading, writing and arithmetic; also needed, he said, is a straight-forward approach "to teaching responsibility, character building, moral and ethical conduct and disciplined behavior."

McDougal felt that vocational programs should be increased, and that high school graduates should either be prepared to go to college or to get jobs.

On athletics, he said, "The physical condition they bring is good." Discipline

## Wrestlers win championships

Coach Phil Yost's Warrior grapplers won three championships and two runner up trophies Saturday in competition against junior varsity wrestlers from Carlsbad, Roswell, Goddard and NMMI at Roswell.

Winning championships were Wes Atkinson, sophomore at 95 pounds, Mark Strassburg, senior at 145 and Sterling Rehmer, junior at 155. Second place trophies were won by Dirk Strassburg, sophomore at 105 and Chuck Burgess, sophomore at 145. Bob Wagenfehr, freshman at 98 and Darrell Candiana, sophomore at 105, won fourth place medals.

Ruidoso placed fourth in the match, tallying 96 points, just four points down from third place.

Mark Strassburg, winning his championship in the 145 pound class, was chosen as the outstanding wrestler of the tournament by the coaches. The trophy presentation will be made at a later date, Yost said.

"I'm pleased over the excellent showing our wrestlers made at Roswell," Yost said. "We were matched against boys with much more experience and against teams with several entrants in each weight class. I'm looking forward to some outstanding seasons from our freshman and sophomore wrestlers as they are benefitting from the experience they are getting now from boys who have been wrestling against some of the toughest competition around."

Downs and the Mescalero Apache Tribe.

— Distribution of planning documents concerning airport development.  
The committee may be dissolved at this meeting as all of the duties it was formed to perform have been completed.

## Village councils set meetings

The Ruidoso Downs trustees will meet at 7:00 this evening in village hall and the Ruidoso trustees will meet at 7:30 Tuesday in the multi-purpose room of the Ruidoso Library.

The Ruidoso Downs agenda includes a

review of a new animal control agreement by Mike Hernandez Jr., a progress report on the All-American Park and a question raised about a water line in the Ruidoso Gardens subdivision by Kerry Evans, who has purchased the home formerly occupied by Jack DiPaolo.

The Ruidoso agenda includes reports on financing the proposed new refuse system and animal control agreements, a final hearing on Ordinance 77-1 on a new franchise for Cablevision of Lincoln County and receipt of plans for the proposed new water plant.

## Shane Watts improving

Shane Watts, the 11-year-old Little League football star who lost a leg as a result of blood poisoning, will be sent to Carrie Tingley Crippled Children's Hospital in Truth or Consequences under the auspices of the Crippled Children's Foundation.

The Security Bank Friday reported a total of \$1,652.30 has been deposited to the Shane Watts account, to help defray expenses incurred with his hospitalization, surgery and continuing treatment. Though several fund raising projects are underway here, contributors may make their donations to the "Shane Watts

Fund" at Security Bank of Ruidoso, on Sudderth.

Rae Watts of Silver City, Shane's grandmother, said that "When the doctors get him in good enough shape, he'll be sent." Carrie Tingley, though a new facility, is renowned for its work with crippled children, she said.

Commenting on Shane's progress at the Presbyterian Hospital Center in Albuquerque, Mrs. Watts said, "They have just done a fantastic job, and they're real pleased at the way he's accepted it all. The doctors say they can't believe how well he's come along."

Shane took his first solid food in several weeks Thursday, his grandmother said. Some bandages have been removed, and

some intravenous feeding has been stopped, she said, but Shane is still in the intensive care unit where doctors "are taking more precautions than usual — this was an unusual case."

Mrs. Watts, together with Shane's parents, Judy and Tommy Watts, are still living in the ICU near Shane. But Wayne, Shane's seven-year-old brother, was to return to Ruidoso over the weekend with his maternal grandparents, Jack and Ronnie Orin of Colorado.

"Tommy and Judy are very thankful and grateful for all their friends have been doing, the prayers they've been saying and the support they've offered — and so is Shane," Rae Watts said. "We really want all the kind people to know that."

## Nursing home possible for area

The feasibility of building a 80 to 100 bed nursing home in Ruidoso, to serve this immediate area, is being investigated by The Careage Corporation of Bellevue, Wash.

"We will not require the community to provide any financial support," B. W. Ross, planning consultant with Careage,

said. The planned home would offer skilled nursing beds for Medicare and care beds for Medicaid patients with the possibility of sheltered care services.

"The facility will be certified for both Medicare and Medicaid services," Ross said. The rates for our services will be similar to those proposed by other nursing

homes in the past with only adjustments made for inflationary effects."

Careage will conduct a survey here to determine if the need, and support for, the planned facility exists.

Should Careage build the nursing home in Ruidoso, it would be owned by them and leased to Health Management Services, Inc., of Tucson, Ariz., to operate.

Anyhow, by the time the dust settled, and that took a spell 'cause those mules were running flat out down that old dry dirt track, the Mule-O-Rama officials



and school spirit were other plusses which McDougal accredited to the athletic program.

"I want to see a new track and an investigation into the feasibility of a baseball program. It's a shame that there is no more after Little League baseball. And I'd like to see more girls' sports, golf, tennis."

Concerning discipline, McDougal said, "I think it's that students respect teachers that respect students." He has taught school in the past, he said, "for eight or nine years, and I believe that the teachers have to set the example."

On administration, he said that administrators must serve as leaders. In regard to innovative programs, he said, "Let kids be free only in terms of their sense of responsibility."

The teacher-student ratio, McDougal felt, "is good, but that needs to be worked out. I've seen a teacher with 40 kids in a room, doing a great job, and I've seen a teacher with 25 who couldn't handle it."

Finally, on school finances, McDougal said, "I'm no expert," adding that the school board obtains outside help in preparing its budgets.

McDougal owns and operates Sierra Blanca Cabins. Benny Coulston, candidate for position 2, stated that he had been a school teacher, counselor and counseling department head for 12 years in Odessa, Tex.

On innovative programs, Coulston said, "They always need testing. Public schools either need to do more or give them a place where they can be tried. In my past experience, if one didn't work, you'd go on to something else." He said he felt that it was possible to give up on a program too early.

Discipline, Coulston said, "is the most important thing on here (the list of

suggested topics). It's always a problem you can work on, and the force with which you're going to work on it comes from your school board."

On school finances, he said, "I'm not an authority; if elected, it would be my position to become knowledgeable."

On salaries, Coulston said he left the teaching profession three years ago because "I was earning \$12,000 a year and it wasn't enough. The community must feel a responsibility to you, to see that you are able to keep a decent standard of living. You are all specialists and there is no reason you cannot hold your head as high as anybody in the community."

Coulston has been with the Bill Pippin Real Estate Agency since moving to Ruidoso three years ago.

Dave Parks, the only incumbent candidate, is also running for position 2.

"I very strongly believe that it's the job of the school board to form policies corresponding to what the people in the community want, and to have administrators to carry them out."

He said that when State Board of Education members were in Ruidoso last year, in the process of renewing the system's accreditation, the officials said they had "never been in a school where the genuine love and concern between students and teachers was so high. And I feel that this is 90 percent of our job."

Concerning Don Dale's interest in having a PTA formed, Parks said that one did function in the village in the 1950's, but it disbanded because the teachers far outnumbered the parents in attendance.

Regarding innovative programs, he said, "I think we've been doing a good job in this area," and that the teachers do well with self-evaluation.

Discipline, Parks said, should be "firm

but compassionate."

Athletics, he said, are "an integral part of the school. But they must be a separate program from physical education, because in physical education everyone should be able to compete at some level." Ruidoso's present teacher-student ratio, Parks said, "is not as good as I'd like to see it. We're working to cure it with the middle school."

He said he regrets that "we can't hire ten new teachers and give everyone a 25 percent raise." Concerning teacher salaries more specifically, he said, "If you're going to have high quality, you have to reward it. You teachers are the heart and soul of our schools."

Parks is a co-owner of Pertect-Parks and Associates.

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# Inside the Capital *by Fred Buckles*

SANTA FE — "Lobbyists should report everything they spend on lobbying — all food and drinks they buy and anything else," says Rep. Lenton Malry, D-Albuquerque.

Mixed legislators' reactions greeted Democratic Gov. Jerry Apodaca's call in his State of the State message for stiffer lobby controls. Among basic reforms recommended by Apodaca were "the way in which lobbying activities are conducted."

Rep. John Bigbee, R-Encino, said of Apodaca's recommendation: "It's absolutely ridiculous, impractical and unenforceable. Any citizen or lobbyist should feel free to buy me a cup of coffee, hamburger or anything else." Bigbee is a conservative rancher. Malry, the only black legislator, is an Albuquerque Public Schools administrator and liberal.

Conservative Rep. Collin McMillan, R-Roswell, said: "If there are significant amounts of money being spent by lobbyists on legislation on individual legislators or individual state administrators, we need to know about it. A lobbyist taking somebody to lunch isn't important. We need to know about people taking trips with lobbying groups."

Rep. Leo Watchman, D-McKinley - San Juan, a Navajo, said: "Lobbyist expenditure reports should be on the same basis as the present required public official campaign expenditure reports, including legislative candidates." Rep. Watchman added: "Strong lobbyist controls are needed. Lobbyists should be required to report expenditures on elected officials on legislation. For example, lobbyists sponsoring a dinner to make their views known." But Rep. Watchman, a House member eight years, said: "Lobbyists perform a service as a third party to a debate."

Rep. Malry's views are stronger. Malry says: "Lobbyists should be required to report their salaries and any other remuneration they receive for lobbying." He adds: "I'm for more open government so taxpayers will know what's going on up here."

Two hundred lobbyists have registered so far for the new legislative session. Among them were about 100 on Tuesday alone. New Mexico's weak lobbyist law requires registration only. Lobbyists record their names, names of companies or organizations they represent and the subject of legislation for their lobbying. Registration is required for each lawmaking session or annually. The present 1967 law calls for no accounting of expenditures.

Gov. Apodaca advocated basic reforms

in political campaign regulation, voter participation in the election process and updating of the primary election procedure. He proposed a law allowing registered independents to vote in one party's primary.

Rep. McMillan, who managed President Gerald Ford's successful New Mexico 1976 general election campaign, said: "I support campaign reform and, to a limited extent, financial disclosure. Financial disclosure makes sense for elected, salaried public officials. The federal expenditure and contribution reporting law was a healthy thing last year in the presidential and U.S. Senate campaigns. It should be applied at the state level." McMillan, a geophysicist in the oil business and a representative six years, is a 1978 GOP primary governor prospect. Rep. Bigbee, whose vast House District 50 is in Lincoln, Guadalupe, DeBaca and Torrance Counties, says of the state lobby law: "I don't see how we can straighten it without limiting citizen participation. I've never seen legislators accept favors that were out of line. Lobbyists play an important part up here. Citizens should try to elect legislators influenced for the good of the state and not necessarily by what a lobbyist tells them."

Common Causes's numerous troops are pushing here for stiff lobby controls and other campaign and election reforms. The House Privileges - Elections Committee shredded a lobbyist controls bill by Rep. Tom Horan, D-Albuquerque, in the 1976 Legislature. Rep. Louis Romero, D-Gallup, is HPEC chairman.

Rep. Dan Berry, D-Eunice, says: "I received a mailed Motor Vehicle Department re-registration form for one vehicle but I own three — a car, a pickup and a trailer." Berry said Mrs. Barbara McAdams, wife of Sen. Harry McAdams, D-Hobbs, received two mailed MVD re-registration forms for the same car. An oilman, Berry added: "Person after person has called me and said they didn't receive a mailed re-registration form for their cars."

The MVD is pushing mail vehicle registrations but Rep. Berry and many other motorists are irked by the multitude of foulups. Berry wants city-operated MVD field offices opened Jan. 1 for vehicle registrations. Because the MVD emphasizes mail registrations, he says, the state agency will not permit field offices to register vehicles until Feb. 15. The registration deadline is March 2.

Rep. Dan Lyon, D-Albuquerque, who backed Rep. Joe Kloepfel against Speaker Walter Martinez, was moved in the House from the front to the back row.

### VOTE AFTERMATH

Voters in the Jan. 18 election did ... I hear tell ... defeat for the first time in history, a proposed tax increase in Ruidoso ... and that vote might well result in a series of developments that could lead to the citizens petitioning the village trustees to again bring the matter of one-quarter cent on the dollar sales tax to a vote.

What the village dads wanted that one-quarter cent for was to insure the continuation of existing services ... and even expand them ... with their thought being there'd be no less painful way to keep more of the taxpayers happier more of the time. Without that paltry one-quarter cent, the trustees will be forced into taking a hard look at sorely needed services in the village ... and it don't look like they're gonna see much hope for improving things when they take that look.

Take police protection, as a fr instance ... ain't no way, now, more police personnel can be hired ... no way equipment can be upgraded ... or maybe even replaced. This means existing conditions ain't gonna improve ... and they'll possibly get a lot worse. So, like it or not, we'll have to live with what we got ... or what we'll get.

Then there's the problem of improving garbage pickup service ... without raising the present rates ... and that'll turn out to be just another busted bubble. It might also mean that that proposed bear/dog proof container system ... that could save the village enough money over five years to pay for itself, and then some ... will fall by the wayside. So what we got is maybe all we're gonna get ... unless we get even less ... and what we got now is considerably less than desirable.

Which brings up the possibility of the purchase of adequate acreage to use for a garbage disposal site ... and that's likely to develop into a real problem for the village dads ... 'cause they gotta get out of the present site ... and there just ain't no place they can go nohow without no money.

Then there's the little matter of that proposed animal control program ... complete with shelter, around-the-clock personnel, and other desirable features. Why, the village dads just might have to chuck the whole scheme ... and there goes aglimmer our hopes for keeping the stray animal population ... and the problems arising from no controls ... under control. But by jinkies, no controls ain't gonna cost us a bundle.

When it comes to street repairs ... that's a whole new hassle of sour plums. There's a crying need to have the paved streets leading onto Sudderth and Mechem improved ... even filling potholes'd help ... but there's no funds for the village to dip into to buy the mix to fix ... let alone pay men to do the fixing. And that's not even considering equipment rental ... or purchase.

Then there's the gravel streets ... or those the taxpayer'd like to see graveled if they can't be black topped ... and it's precious little gravel that'll be spread anywhere, anytime soon. Naturally most of those things that might not materialize are things that Ruidoso can get along without ... even if we have to learn to get along without them ... but it'll make life interesting for our year around citizens ... and maybe more than a little uninteresting for lots of those folks who live here at their convenience ... enjoying the convenience of services provided.

Yup ... could be quite a hue and a cry along about the time the village dads announce their budget expenditures for services for fiscal '77-78.

### SEAWAY PROPOSAL

In the 1950s the deepening of channels and locks on the St. Lawrence Seaway made it possible for oceangoing ships to penetrate into the heartland of America. Now a development of almost comparable significance is under discussion.

The United States and Canadian governments are collaborating in a six-year study to determine the environmental

impact of opening up a 125-mile stretch of the Seaway to winter commercial shipping. The study will focus on the river and its shoreline on the U.S. side from a point near St. Regis on the New York - Quebec border to the river's joining with Lake Ontario at Cape Vincent.

The commercial advantages of freeing this icebound section of the waterway are apparent. At present some industries must stockpile winter supplies or use more costly forms of transportation when the St. Lawrence freezes over.

Questions have been raised, however, about two possibilities: damage to the region's ecology, and a harmful impact on riverside communities. Serious environmental and economic problems — a blow to tourism, for example — are feared by some observers were the navigation season extended.

It is good that Washington and Ottawa have no intention of rushing into this enterprise. There is reason to hope that if seriously adverse findings result from the study now getting under way the project will not be undertaken. — Alamogordo Daily News
