Trustees approve hiring three to man ambulance

The Ruidoso trustees voted at their Tuesday night meeting to hire three full-time attendants at a cost of \$6,412, to operate a 24-hour ambulance service until July 1.

With the April 1 termination of the Ruidoso Ambulance Service operated by Philip Embury, the police department has transported emergency cases in an ambulance, loaned by the Traffic Safety Division of the Motor Vehicles Department, but they "are not in a position to run out of the police department, with police personnel," Chief Paul Lukens said.

Under present police personnel policy, 16 persons are needed to man two am-

bulances for 24 hour service, severely taxing the police budget.

But, Lukens said "the minimum personnel needed to operate an ambulance on a 24-hour basis is three full-time attendants."

"The only feasible method of operation is similar to a private ambulance service," he said.

At the meeting, Lukens also proposed an approximate \$80,000 budget for operation of an emergency transportation system for the 1977-78 fiscal year calling for six full-time attendants, heated barns for housing the ambulances, a 24-hour duty station and quarters. The trustees postponed acting on his proposal.

Lukens anticipated, if his income projections are accurate, a total revenue of about \$44,000 including \$15,000 net revenue based on an 80 percent collection rate and a monthly subsidy from the county.

He initially proposed the council seek a \$2,000 per month subsidy in funds from Lincoln county which has agreed to pay \$750 per month through July 1. Mayor Lloyd Davis proposed the council seek subsidies of \$3,000 from the county and \$1,000 from the village of Ruidoso Downs.

"The county has a hell of a lot of money and they can just start to shell it out," Davis said.

Trustee George White concurred, saying, if Ruidoso Downs "can subsidize dogs, then they should be able to subsidize

an ambulance."

Even with the payment of these subsidies, the village of Ruidoso must come up with roughly \$32,000.

"Needless to say, if the county and Ruidoso Downs give less money, the out-of-pocket cost increases," Lukens said.

Approximately 55 percent of the county's permanent population resides within the corporate limits of Ruidoso, he said, but, the ambulance service is to serve approximately 72.2 percent of the county.

Corona, Capitan and Carrizozo have emergency transportation systems of some sort, he said.


Approximately 70 percent of the total calls the ambulance service covers are within five miles of the post office, Lukens said. He suggested a flat rate of \$50 for five mile radius calls because the present rate system of \$20 for the first mile and \$1 for every mile thereafter, loses a great deal of money in short distance service.

"Outside the five mile limit, we come to a reasonable charge, but within the limit, using that rate, most calls would come to about \$25," he said.

Chief of Police Lukens also proposed the council construct on village land or leased land, heated barns for the vehicles, rooms for offices, a bunk room for duty crews and living quarters for personnel.

He has located land which has a building suitable for two married and two bachelor

Suspect jailed in Nelson murder

Roswell police earlier this week charged Michael R. Luna, 18, of 707 S. Plaza Drive, Roswell, with the murder of Mrs. Nina Nelson during a burglary of her home at 2612 Palomar Place the night of April 4.

for two to ten years.

The preliminary hearing was held Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning before the magistrate.

Luna had been indicted on charges of burglary and larceny and was free on a \$8,000 bond at the time of the Nelson burglary. He has been in custody since April 7 for violating bond conditions, and was one of several suspects subjected to a "detailed and wide-ranging investigation" by Roswell police, said assistant district attorney Jay Rosenthal.

A trial date is to be set following the

hearing.

Mrs. Nelson, who would have turned 81 in June, died of "blunt trauma to her head," said Dr. David LaMure, district medical examiner, who performed the autopsy.

He said she was stabbed "between 20 and 30 times" in the neck and chest, and that "there is presumption to believe she was sexually assaulted."

Police believe the weapon used to beat her over the head was a large glass vase in her bedroom. Her body was found early

April 5 by Sgt. John Homer of the Roswell Police Department, who had responded to a reported burglary next door. She was found in her bath robe in the bedroom.

Evidence found in the Nelson home is in the FBI national crime laboratory in Washington, D. C., and a spokesman for the Roswell police said the report is "expected in the next day or two."

Nina Nelson and her late husband, Ed, ranched in Tinnie for about 40 years, and several years after his death she moved to Roswell.

Forest Service imposes fire, smoking restrictions

Fire and smoking restrictions go into effect at 8 a.m., Friday, April 15, on the Lincoln National Forest and all state and federal land between Alamogordo and Carlsbad.

Cooperating agencies include the N.M. Department of State Forestry; U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service and Bureau of Indian Affairs.

The area affected is bound on the west by U. S. Highway 54 from Ancho south to Newman, east along the Texas line to U. S. Highway 62, north to Artesia, west on U. S. Highway 82 to the junction of State Highway 24, north to Picacho, Arabela and around Lincoln National Forest to Ancho.

Lincoln County commissioners, during their Monday meeting, adopted a resolution under which they will ask the N.M. Department of Finance and Administration to increase the county budget \$17,801 for the current fiscal year.

The increase will cover capital expenses not foreseen at the time the 1976-77 budget was approved, including purchase of a transmitter radio and repeater, a new boiler for the county courthouse and construction of a courthouse parking lot.

John Sudderth, commission chairman, said, "I think Al Romero, chief of the DFA's Local Government Division is so pleased with our operation here in Lincoln County he plans to approve our budget through the mail this year . . . We have good budget control here in Lincoln County. Not all counties do."

Commissioners George "Shorty" Stoveman, Lee Straley and Sudderth also approved a temporary cash transfer from the county's general fund to its revenue sharing fund, anticipating a delay in

receipt of the April revenue sharing check. — Les Olson, county manager, said about \$5,000 a week is paid out of the revenue sharing fund in salaries. The commissioners transferred \$20,000 into the fund to cover the payroll through the first of May.

"Hopefully one of these days we'll be able to use revenue sharing for non-recurring items," said Sudderth.

In another revenue sharing matter, the commissioners approved budget revisions in the revenue sharing trust fund, submitted to them by Olson.

"We anticipate an overrun of about \$24,000 in the road department by June 30," Olson said. Under the trust fund revision, the commissioners will spend revenue sharing money on the road department, rather than paying expenses from the road account.

Instead of ending the present fiscal cycle with a balance of \$4,676, the trust fund will end with an estimated \$625, because of the revisions.

In other action the commissioners: — Granted to Mitch Servin, owner of the Mountain Valley Nursery, permission to build four temporary plastic dome-shaped greenhouses in Lincoln's Zone A.

The site approved is a few feet from Zone B, the historic zone, where the commissioners last month refused Servin permission to erect greenhouses.

— Appointed James McSwane and Charles Treadwell commissioned deputy sheriffs.

— Received a complaint from Wayne Townley that a water crossing off Highway 48, leading to Townley's home, has not yet been repaired, and told him that the work will be done after the road department's next project, repair of the Transwestern road.

Al Cox, who lives near Hondo, lodged a similar complaint about water crossing south of Lincoln which was closed after a small dump truck fell through it.

Road department supervisor Guy Henley said he will get prices on a reflooring and a new crossing.

— Began work in the 1977-78 budget.

CB'ers in on cleanup

The Ruidoso CB'ers Club will sponsor a cleanup of Forest Lawn Cemetery Sunday beginning at 2 p.m., said Barbara Duff, coordinator of "Junk-It!", Ruidoso's spring clean-up campaign.

The CB'ers will pick up trash and fallen limbs, loose pipes, loose concrete form boards and other small pieces of litter, said club member Til Watts.

"The club decided it will not disturb any grave site, floral arrangements on these sites, nor attempt to improve the appearance of the sites," said Watts.

"Many grave sites of loved ones have been neglected," he said. "Plants have deteriorated, the beautiful imitation arrangements have become disarranged, branches of trees have fallen, markers of the small metal type fallen apart . . . So many things have been left to the village employees, who try to care for the cemetery, that there is no way, with the growing demands on village personnel, that they can keep the last resting places of our loved ones looking as they should."

"We urge all who have loved ones at our Forest Lawn Cemetery to participate in helping us beautify our cemetery by coming out and joining us on this one-day project . . . All of us in Ruidoso have friends, relatives, mother, father, daughter, son or others there . . . The CB'ers only ask that you spend an hour or two with us and let us show people that we

still do care."

The Ruidoso Board of Realtors will have volunteers at the cemetery, and Duff said all people wishing to help should meet at the cemetery at 2 p.m. Sunday.

The Ruidoso Garden Club will landscape and plant the garden which is just behind the cemetery gate and is visible from the highway, said club member Shirley Neuhaus.

The project is being coordinated through the Cemetery Committee.

quarters, and could be leased for \$250 per month within 45 days. The owner has agreed to construct the car barns. The council failed to vote on this although one trustee warned the "high rental season" was approaching.

Also in the budget proposal, Lukens calls for salaries of \$500 per month for six persons. "To get quality personnel, we must be competitive. In most places the attendants get \$500 and quarters. We will offer \$600 and charge rent of \$125 for married quarters and \$85 for single quarters as a condition of employment."

The council postponed voting on all parts of the budget until a later meeting.

The village council also voted to accept the proposed agreement with Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Supply Association, pending investigation by the village attorney.

The mutual agreement calls for Eagle Creek to convey any lands needed for the construction of the dam to Ruidoso provided the lands will revert to the association when Ruidoso has recovered their costs for construction, operation and maintenance of the dam.

In the proposal Ruidoso and Capitan are asked to agree to pay 30 cents per \$1,000 gallons of water, but Ruidoso will not be charged until all costs of building the dam are worked out.

In other business the council: — Passed an ordinance adding \$.50 to sewer charges to bring in additional revenue. Originally the increase was to be \$.25 but that figure would only generate \$9,500, according to Jim Hine, village manager.

— Discussed scheduling another 1/4 percent gross receipts tax vote. The council decided to continue with necessary contacts and procedures for scheduling the election on the tax.

— Heard a report on a binder on tort liability insurance. Blochberger-Wuest of Clovis has issued a binder, pending investigation by the village attorney. Mayor Lloyd Davis proposed the policy be sent to the state commission on insurance for comparison and rating.

— Agreed to pay \$111 in yearly dues to SENMEDD, an increase from \$100, for their services.

— Commended Ray Page of the U.S. Forest Service for his help on the Eagle Creek project.

— Was introduced to Ron Harris, an attorney who will be recommended as supplemental legal council for the village. He will work with the village attorney, John W. Thompson, who has requested he be phased out as village attorney.

— Heard the report that Magistrate Court, Div. III, could not meet the rent increase on their office in village hall. The court, which is on a tight budget this year, will pay \$115 per month, an increase of \$15.

— Approved the request of Forrest Smith from Burke Collins Associates, to vacate a plat in the Cedar Creek area.

— Refused a request by Jim Hine on behalf of Jack Kannady, that the village vacate a plat in the Cree Meadows Country Club subdivision.

— Was advised by village administrative assistant Frank Potter that the NM Highway Department and the village are studying cooperative agreements to resurface about 10.3 miles of village streets, starting in September of 1977. The area involved would include portions of Carrizo Canyon, Paradise Canyon, Hull Road, White Mountain School Road, Upper Canyon and streets from the skating rink past Cree Meadows Country Club to Hwy. 37.

Baird loses manslaughter appeal

Montaine McNatt Baird of Ruidoso faces a sentence of 1-5 years in the state penitentiary, which may begin within five to 20 days, since her appeal of the sentence was rejected Tuesday by the N.M. Court of Appeals.

Baird was sentenced Feb. 24 by District Judge George Zimmerman after she pleaded nolo contendere to a charge of involuntary manslaughter in the July 30, 1976 shooting death of her husband, James W. Baird. She filed an appeal immediately.

She was indicted Aug. 9, 1976 by a Lincoln County grand jury on a charge of second degree murder. That charge was reduced through plea bargaining to involuntary manslaughter. Lincoln County assistant district attorney Frank Wilson said Baird "does have the right to seek certiorari by the Supreme Court of New Mexico."

Unless she and her attorney, Anthony Avalone of Las Cruces, do seek the writ of certiorari, the appeals court will direct the

district court to impose the sentence. If the supreme court refuses discretionary review or if it hears her case and upholds the decision of the appeals court and Judge Zimmerman, a mandate will be sent to the district court to impose the sentence, Wilson said.

Baird, in her appeal, charged that the

employee of the district court clerk's office who operated a tape recorder during the testimony before the grand jury was not an official court recorder, authorized to be present during the grand jury proceedings by law.

The appeals court said the person in charge of the tape recorder was acting as

an official court reporter, and rejected the charge.

The body of James Willie Baird was found in the Fleeta Courts Motel in Ruidoso last July 30 by Ruidoso police. He died as a result of one .22 calibre bullet.

Baird has been free since her Feb. 24 sentencing on a \$5,000 bond.

Abercrombie loses Lincoln school bid

The state Board of Finance Tuesday rejected the high bid of \$45,600 submitted by Howard Abercrombie of Capitan on the old Lincoln school and adopted a motion by Vincent Montoya, state finance director, that The Lincoln County Heritage Trust (LCHT) be allowed 90 days to raise \$48,000 to top Abercrombie's bid and purchase the building.

The Capitan school board recommended that Abercrombie's bid be accepted. Abercrombie, who said after the meet-

ing he may file an injunction against the Department of Finance and Capitan's school board and may institute legal proceedings in the matter, announced intentions to convert the property into two residences, one to live in and the other to be sold.

LCHT is proposing to obtain a 30-year lease on the school from the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission (LCMC) and to restore and maintain the building for its historic value.

Members of LCHT, San Patricio, include artist John Meigs, author Paul Horgan, artist Peter Hurd, industrialist Robert O. Anderson and Joe Lackey, Roswell civic leader.

The Board of Finance was advised by Lloyd Davis Jr. of Ruidoso, LCMC member, that the commission anticipates receiving a LCHT grant of \$48,000 within 30 days to buy the school.

Meigs told the Board of Finance that LCHT intends to transform the old school into a tri-cultural museum.

Texas Aggie muster in Ruidoso April 21

Wayne Dacy of Ruidoso, chairman of the 1977 annual Texas Aggie Muster, said muster activities will begin at the Dacy home at 7 p.m. April 21.

The muster is open to all former students at Texas A&M University, their families, parents of students and friends of the university.

Aggie musters, Dacy said, have been

held "wherever Texas A&M former students live or work" since the mid-1880's, on a yearly basis. Upon occasion, the musters were held in medical hospitals, aboard ships, on airplanes and in foxholes. One was held, he said, on Corregidor just before the Japanese captured the island during World War II. Over 350 musters will be held this year in different parts of the world, Dacy said.

Under the terms of the restriction, smoking and campfires will be permitted in the Smokey Bear District of Lincoln National Forest only in developed campgrounds and posted designated camp areas.

Campgrounds include installations at Cedar Creek and the South Fork of Bonito. Designated camp areas are at the head of Cedar Creek, below the gravel pit on Monjeau Road, the mouths of Mills Canyon and Philadelphia Canyon, around Bonito Dam, the head of Argentina Canyon, the mouth of Pennsylvania Canyon, around Nogal Lake, the Baca Campsite and Pine Lodge.

In all wilderness areas only USFS approved gasoline, propane or alcohol burning stoves may be used for cooking or in camps.

Charcoal, USFS personnel warn, is considered to be a campfire.

Downs trustees miss a session; to meet tonight



Female Ensign's life interesting

"I'll never have experiences like these in an ordinary job," Ensign Cathy Hine, U. S. Naval Reserve, said.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Hine of Ruidoso, Cathy is home on leave this week, returning home from duties in Australia.

She completed the five-month Navy Officer Candidate School and was commissioned as an officer because she wanted to travel and because "my dad and uncle said their best years were spent in the service."

She chose Navy because she worked with Pat Thompson of Ruidoso who had been a WAVE. "She really influenced me a lot," Cathy said.

But, because of her college degree in business education from Eastern New Mexico University and her OCS training, Cathy is a naval officer not a WAVE.

She also has been stationed in Hawaii and will soon travel to Newport, R.I. where she will conduct military orientation classes for newly commissioned nurses, doctors, dentists and lawyers.

Before she goes to Newport, however, Cathy will attend two weeks of classes in Norfolk, Va., and three months of classes in Memphis, Tenn.

As a naval line officer, Cathy is subject to vacancy replacements and has had a variety of experiences.

While stationed in Australia, Cathy was the senior ensign in charge of 25 male officers in a remote receiver communications base which maintained contact with submarines.

During her tour of duty, Cathy was the guest of honor at a dinner given for the governor general of Australia, Sir John Kerr, the queen's official representative to England's commonwealth nation.

"We were sent long instructions on how to act," including directions to how to Sir Kerr and curtsy to Lady Kerr, Cathy said.

The communication base, which was located 30 miles from the military base on the western coast of Australia, was self-sufficient, maintaining a power plant, water purifier and a galley.

This self-sufficiency was necessary because "a cyclone could completely cut

us off from the base by washing out the roads," she said.

During this time Cathy "fell in love with the koala bears and kangaroos."

"One family of kangaroos lived in my backyard. They weren't entirely tame, but they would come up and eat out of my hand," she said.

Cathy also said shell collecting is one of the major hobbies at the communications base.

"There were pukas by the million, and at low tides we could pick up live shells," she said. The live shells would retain their color, but dead ones which had washed up on the beach would fade. She sent many shells home to her parents along with two "official" boomerangs.

"Australia is a nice place. The people are ecology minded and they have the greatest respect for the United States," she said.

During her tour of duty in Hawaii, Cathy was stationed in a guarded, highly secret installation which was located under a pineapple field. She was the assistant to the captain, who was commander of fleet operations control in the Pacific, as a general military specialist.

"Hawaii was beautiful. There's no place in the world like it," she said. "Once you get away from Honolulu and find undiscovered and uncommercialized spots, it's beautiful."

"I didn't spend much time in Honolulu. It's a crowded, concrete jungle geared for tourists,"

She was stationed in Hawaii from June

to November in 1975. Her parents were able to visit her briefly in October of 1975.

Cathy likes the Navy because "there are equal rights in the service. There's equal pay and no discrimination."

"Also there's no male resentment from my experience. The people I work with are very open, men and women both," she said.

She has agreed to stay in the service until May 1979 which is a four-year stint. "I don't know if I'll stay in after that. I'm undecided," she said.

Cathy probably will be promoted to a lieutenant junior grade this May.

She has been trained in leadership management, engineering, damage control, piloting in water, celestial navigation, seamanship, communications, rifles and physical training. She qualified as an expert with a .45 pistol by hitting targets in rapid and slow fire and by hitting a moving target.

An honor graduate of ENMU in 1974, Cathy did her student teaching in business education in Ruidoso under Jean Spurlock. In college she was a member of Alpha Delta Pi, social sorority, Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities for 1974, a member of the homecoming court, third runner-up for Miss New Mexico and Miss Central New Mexico in 1973, a candidate for rodeo queen and the choreographer for the annual Swanee production at ENMU.

Cathy is a 1970 graduate of Ruidoso High School where she was a member of band and National Honor Society.

A Pen Mightier Than Arthritis

Back in the 1930s, on the day Tobias Kaplan opened his first menswear store in Cleveland, Mississippi, four banks closed in the county.

"I've always been a positive thinker," Mr. Kaplan told a writer from The National Council on the Aging.

Whether it was Kaplan's attitude or good business sense, his business thrived, expanding to three stores which he ran until 1964 when he sold them and went into a new venture.

The new business was the designing, manufacturing and distributing of special pens for people with arthritis.

"Several members of my family have arthritis and I thought there must be a way to design a pen that would make it easier for them to write," Kaplan said.

He immersed himself in the project, working with designers until he came up with what he wanted—the Kontour pen, which has been made the official pen of the American Arthritis Society.

After obtaining a patent on the Kontour pen, Kaplan turned what had started as a hobby into an ever-expanding business, traveling over 100,000 miles by airplane last year to carry out his business affairs.

"My business is basically fund raising," he said. "I help various groups raise

money and I make some myself."

What Kaplan does is supply numerous youth organizations with pens on consignment. The groups pay Kaplan for the pens they use and return the rest.

"It's a great way for the kids to raise money with no investment," he said, "and I like it just as much for the satisfaction it gives me as I do for the income it brings me."

At present, Kaplan is faced with a dilemma most businessmen would relish.

"I've gotten to the point where I either have to expand a great deal or cut back," he said. "Part of me wants to cut back but another part of me says that if I don't expand I'll probably die."

"I came from a poor family and they taught me to work at an early age," Kaplan went on. "I guess something like that never leaves you. I'm more active now at 74 than I was when I was 25, if you can believe that."

Then, after a thoughtful pause, Kaplan said, "I've been thinking that as an alternative I could use the telephone instead of spending so much time traveling."

If a person listened carefully, he could hear Tobias Kaplan figuring out a way to expand.

THE GREATER PHILADELPHIA Action Alliance of Senior Citizens is a

coalition of 250 clubs which advocates legislation of benefit to older persons. In its three years of existence, the Action Alliance has gotten a 20-percent reduction in municipal sewage, gas and water rates; free transportation during off-peak hours; federal funding for 17 senior centers; a halt in an increase in electricity rates; and a low-cost drug plan.

Current projects include the abolition of the means test, a reduction in real estate taxes and the establishment of a State Department on Aging. The Action Alliance is a fine example of how to effectively achieve social change and can serve as a model for other communities and groups interested in improving the lives of older persons.

MORE PEOPLE 65 and older live in California than any other state. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, California passed New York in 1975 as the state with the most older Americans, with 2,036,000 people over 65 compared to New York's 2,030,000.

Although California has the largest number of older persons, Florida has the highest percentage. One of every six persons in Florida is 65 or over. Nationwide in 1975 there were 22.4 million older persons in America. Persons 65 and over now represent 10.5 percent of the population.



Nitrogen free natural fertilizer

All over the world, solar energy is beginning to replace fossil fuels. Likewise, natural nitrogen is replacing manufactured fertilizers more and more each day, and it is free! All you have to do to get free nitrogen is grow a crop or two.

As nitrogen is required in relatively large amounts for high crop yields, the New Mexico State University Agricultural Experiment Station has begun research to increase natural nitrogen production. Drs. Arden Baltensperger and Bill Melton, NMSU agronomists, say the research is important for the conservation of fossil fuel as well as for food and feed production.

Nitrogen, which is essential to plant growth, is one of the elements that most limits crop production in the United States. To increase crop production, the agronomists say farmers must apply manufactured fertilizers or obtain natural fertilizer from legumes for their sources of nitrogen.

Legumes are plants capable of taking nitrogen from the air and "fixing" it into a usable form. The better legumes, Baltensperger explains, fix nitrogen to fertilize themselves, and have enough nitrogen left over to fertilize succeeding crops. This is called nitrogen-fixation, Baltensperger says.

Melton and Baltensperger state the major objective of the Experiment Station research is to develop alfalfa varieties with more nitrogen-fixation capabilities. They hope this alfalfa would fix nitrogen to fertilize its own crop and subsequent crops, thereby reducing the necessity of manufactured fertilizer. In addition to this, NMSU is initiating research on nitrogen-fixation of other legumes and plants, particularly some of the drought-tolerant species adapted to New Mexico.

The interest in nitrogen-fixation research began several years ago with the threat of an energy crisis. The costs of nitrogen fertilizer had skyrocketed, causing national research studies to place nitrogen fixation among the top priority needs for research. This is not surprising, as it takes the energy equivalent of 20

gallons of gasoline to manufacture just 100 pounds of nitrogen fertilizer.

At the present time, a full healthy stand of alfalfa can supply 100 to 300 pounds of nitrogen. To develop a stand of alfalfa which can produce even more nitrogen has obvious advantages. The major advantage would be the saving of fossil fuel by reducing the need for manufactured nitrogen. And the value of alfalfa with such increased nitrogen-fixation potential would be even greater for many third-world countries where cash for nitrogen to fertilize grasslands is not available, Melton notes.

Alfalfa is one legume that produces the highest yield of protein per acre of any crop grown for either food or feed. It occupies about 200 thousand acres in New Mexico and is presently the state's leading cash crop. Therefore, alfalfa was chosen as the first legume to be experimented with at NMSU, the agronomists say.

Already results from the research indicate that it may be possible to substantially increase amounts of nitrogen-fixation. Alfalfa has an existing capability to fix 250 to 530 pounds of nitrogen per acre, depending on environmental factors and nutrient balances. Melton says that this may be doubled through careful plant breeding.

The major problem is that much of the fixed nitrogen in alfalfa is harvested as feeding for livestock. The emphasis, therefore, is on increasing the residual amount available in the soil following the removal of alfalfa, Baltensperger says.

A "super" alfalfa would take more nitrogen from the air, and fix it in the soil for future crops, the agronomists continue. The result would be a good forage and better soil. The best result, of course, would be the money saved with nature's application of nature's nitrogen, rather than tractor-applied manufactured nitrogen fertilizer.

Although much has been published on the biology of nitrogen fixation, little has been accomplished in actually increasing nitrogen fixation potential in crop plants, Baltensperger says. Proposed research at

NMSU will provide nitrogen fixation measurements for a wide variety of plant species. The outcome would therefore provide plant material from which to breed and select improved varieties. The major emphasis of further research will be on alfalfa. The agronomists agree that they also need to learn how to best utilize the nitrogen that is being fixed for subsequent crops. They will continue breeding alfalfa for increased nitrogen-fixation and

select bacteria best adapted to New Mexico.

"We will also screen other legumes and non-legumes" for nitrogen-fixation potential," Melton adds.

The NMSU Agricultural Experiment Station research for nitrogen-fixation is partially funded by a grant from the Rocky Mountain Forest and Range Experiment Station.

Repeatability guideline to beef pricing system

The New Mexico State University Agricultural Experiment Station initiated a study to estimate repeatability of herd traits to help ranchers accomplish a new beef cattle pricing system. The study suggests that measurements can be obtained on which a given her's offspring can be priced.

Repeatability of carcass traits in beef cattle may be responsible for instituting a formal pricing system for feeder calves. Dr. Earl Ray, NMSU animal scientist and one of the researchers of the study, says the beef cattle industry needs a new pricing system that can relay information about carcass characteristics and feeding efficiency back to the producer.

The overall analyses indicated that significant carcass trait differences existed between herds. It also indicated that these traits were highly repeatable. Two of the three data sets indicated no measurable repeatability for feed conversion ratio, while all data sets indicated moderate to high repeatability. Fifteen herds in southwestern states were used for the Experiment Station research. Quality grade, marbling score, yield grade, rib-eye area, actual backfat thickness, feed conversion ratio and average daily gain were evaluated. The study period covered three successive calf crops, but not all herds contributed cattle all three years. Therefore, the study was divided into three sets.

Researchers examined the repeatability of feedlot performance and carcass characteristics in beef cattle herds for

consecutive years. They reasoned that if the performance and characteristics were moderately to highly repeatable, then it might be possible to incorporate this information into a more efficient pricing system.

Instituting a new pricing system could encourage cattlemen to breed animals that produce the type of carcasses wanted by packers, retailers and consumers. Ray says a system such as this would allow financial rewards to those ranchers who produce superior cattle.

There are advantages in estimating repeatability of traits other than initiating a formal pricing system, Ray explains. For instance, ranchers whose cattle have superior carcass characteristics might be able to bargain for premium prices for their cattle.

Additionally, Ray says, a rancher's knowledge of the performance potential of his cattle could provide an important selection and management tool. Ranchers could then develop an objective basis for deciding when to sell their cattle. They could better determine whether to sell calves as feeders or to retain ownership through the feeding period and sell the cattle as railed carcass beef.

Complete results of the study have been published in a bulletin authored by Ray, William D. Gorman, Darrel A. Kuhl, N. Scott Urquart, William N. Capener, all of NMSU, and James A. Bennett of Utah State University. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE COUNTY OF LINCOLN, STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That there is hereby granted to the Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc., a New Mexico corporation, its successors, or assigns hereinafter called the "Cooperative," the right, privilege and franchise of erecting, constructing, maintaining and operating an electric transmission and distribution system consisting of poles, lines, wires, insulators, transformers, arms, brackets, anchors, or other suitable structures and appurtenances installed thereon, in, under or upon so many and in such parts of the public highways, streets, roads, and other public places in the County of Lincoln, as the Cooperative, its successors and assigns, may elect to use for the purpose hereinafter specified and using such electrical transmission and distribution system for the purpose of transmitting, conveying, distributing and supplying electricity to the membership and customers of the Cooperative for lights, heat, power and all other lawful purposes.

Section 2. All electric lines which shall be constructed and used under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be maintained in compliance with the laws and safety regulations of the National Electric Safety Code as amended from time to time and shall conform to all other applicable laws and regulations.

Section 3. Cooperative shall upon erecting, constructing, replacing or repairing electric lines, poles, highways, streets and alleys, and such other and so many as may have been damaged, in as good order and condition as

they were before being disturbed or excavated for the purpose of erecting, constructing, replacing or repairing electric lines or any part thereof.

Section 4. The owner of the franchise shall have the right to erect, construct, maintain, replace and repair any electric lines from time to time as may be necessary and proper.

Section 5. The term of this franchise shall commence with the effective date hereof and continue and remain in full force and effect, for a period of 25 years from this date unless the Cooperative, its successors or assigns shall surrender or abandon said franchise or unless the same shall be forfeited by the non-compliance of the franchisee.

Section 6. The grant of this franchise is under the provisions of the laws of the State of New Mexico and other provisions of the law of the State of New Mexico which relate to the granting of the privilege and franchise by the Counties of New Mexico.

Section 7. Cooperative agrees to furnish during the continuation of its franchise, adequate electric power and energy to the extent that the Cooperative has such power, energy and facilities available, to its consumers and members in the County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, under the tariff schedule as approved and on file with the New Mexico Public Service Commission or its successors.

Section 8. No franchise tax, occupation tax or similar tax shall be imposed on the Cooperative, its successors or assigns by the County of Lincoln for operation under this franchise.

Section 9. If any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or any part of the provisions hereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 10. This Ordinance shall be published in the Lincoln County News, a newspaper of general circulation in Lincoln County, New Mexico on April 14, 1977 and on April 21, 1977 and shall be submitted for final approval at the regular meeting of the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County, State of New Mexico, on May 2, 1977, 10:00 a.m., pursuant to the provisions of the Laws of Section 15-2A-7 of the New Mexico Statutes of 1953 Annotated.







Improvements are the solution

Finding that they are virtually priced out of the market for new and larger homes, American homeowners are turning to remodeling as the logical and most workable solution to their shelter needs.

There is no shortage of funds available for home improvements and homeowners are investing it in room additions, siding, roofing, flooring, plumbing, heating, air conditioning — and with the continuing concern about energy supplies and costs — many homeowners are investing substantial amounts of money in insulation.

According to the National Home Improvement Council, Americans spent a record breaking \$30 billion in 1976, as compared with \$26.6 billion in 1975.

Homeowners last year added well over four million rooms, the equivalent of 700,000 new six-room homes, while builders raised only 870,000 new one-family homes.

The addition of new living quarters accounted for \$1 of every \$5 of the home-care investment, according to the Census Bureau. Half the money spent on remodeling and maintenance went into do-it-yourself projects.

This increased activity among do-it-yourselfers is confirmed by a study by Frost & Sullivan which finds that within the last year or two more than half of all building materials for home renovation were purchased directly by homeowners rather than by contractors.

Even so, the National Home Improvement Council cautions would-be do-it-yourselfers to get some sound advice before tackling larger projects, especially plumbing and electrical work.

A homeowner contemplating a home improvement project usually asks the question: How much do improvements increase the value of your home? It varies according to the improvement, but in few cases should you expect the sales value of your house to rise dollar for dollar with the money spent for remodeling.

The value of a house will rise most — perhaps by 60 to 75 percent of improvement cost — for a new kitchen or bathroom and heating/air conditioning system.

A fourth bedroom or new family room are also desirable features home buyers

look for in houses and therefore the features they pay the most for.

Other improvements, while not increasing the value of the house substantially, will aid in speeding up the sale time.

The Council urges homeowners who are about to select a contractor in their community to consider a member of the National Home Improvement Council who displays the NHIC Membership Seal in his advertising. His membership means that he is a reputable, well-established professional contractor who subscribes to the Council's Code of Ethics.

The green thumb look

Plants have become the biggest "must" in home decor, and it's no wonder. Greenery adds a refreshing touch to any room and looks right with every style of furnishings, from contemporary to colonial.

If you are or would like to be a plant-lover, but lack a green thumb, have a home that's too dark or drafty for plants, or just want to fill in and brighten up hard-to-decorate areas, don't despair; you can spruce up your abode with beautiful artificial houseplants.

With a bit of ingenuity, your home can look like veritable Garden of Eden. And lifelike plants are not affected by heat, cold or the lack of light.

If you enjoy the look of foliage, some of these decorating tips may be just right for your home:

- Group imitation plants of various sizes and shapes to camouflage ugly radiators or exposed air conditioners.

- Tall artificial plants can brighten up dark corners. Install back-lighting to cast romantic shadows on the walls at night.

- Decorate unused fireplaces with beautiful imitation plant arrangements. These groupings also can be placed on the mantle, when the fireplace is in use.

- Use these lifelike plants to decorate your vacation home and never worry about watering while you're away.

- Create a garden effect in your spare room with artificial plant groupings, tall trees and hanging planters. These, combined with rattan and wicker furniture, create a year-round summery atmosphere.

Checklist helps detect possible roof troubles

Learning how to detect the early trouble signs of a "dying" roof can help homeowners save money and aggravation. According to a large manufacturer of fiber glass and conventional organic roofing shingles, a damaged roof that's left uncared for can sometimes cause serious problems beneath the roof surface and also in the attic. This often means costly repairs and related inconvenience.

Check the list
To help guard against such trouble, this simple checklist can help homeowners tell if their roof needs repair or replacement.

- Cracked or curled shingles may be an instant sign that a new roof is needed. But, never climb up on the roof. Inspect it from the ground or have a professional roofer give an on-the-roof inspection.

- Check for a heavy loss of the roof's protective mineral granules. Look for evidence in gutters and downspouts.

- If a leaking roof is suspected, inspect the attic the next time it rains. Minor leaks can usually be repaired, but a leak can mean the roof must be replaced.

- If a roof is relatively new and has suffered limited damage from a storm or falling objects, chances are it can be repaired easily. For example, individual shingles that are damaged or have blown away can be replaced. Loose shingles can be renailed, and leaks around flashing points can be patched.

Beyond repair?
When the roof is beyond repair, however, consult your local Better Business Bureau for a reputable roofing contractor who can install new shingles efficiently and for a fair price.

The serious do-it-yourselfer can install a new roof himself, providing he has proper "know-how" and follows the shingle manufacturer's method for application.

Be careful!
But installing a new roof or repairing an old one can be a dangerous job, which is

why simple precautions can make roofing safer.

- Never start roofing in cold (below 40 degrees Fahrenheit) or wet weather.

- Always secure the ladder firmly top and bottom.

- Never walk on a wet roof. Early morning dew can be slippery.

- Keep the roof surface clean.

- Wear heavy rubber-soled shoes for good footing.

- Don't touch power lines or conduits and never let a metal ladder contact one.

- Lift only easy loads.

- If the roof slopes more than a 6" rise for every 12" horizontal, use roof brackets and boards. Leave the bottom board at the eaves (edge) until that section of the roof is complete.

In addition to these tips for the roofer, it's critical to protect others in the area. To avoid danger, see that shingles and tools are placed where they will not slide off the roof. When roofing is being installed, others should be kept away from the area below.

Beware of overimproving your home

The National Home Improvement Council warns homeowners who are thinking about making improvements to their homes, to beware of overimproving a house for its neighborhood.

Don't, for example, pour \$75,000 into a house in a neighborhood of \$50,000 houses, unless you truly love your home, hope to stay in it a long time and don't care about getting your money back.

Beware also of spending money on improvements just to increase the resale value of your house. This seldom pays (except, sometimes, prior to selling when a house needs new paint).

No matter what the improvement or modernization, it will add top-dollar value only when it is appropriate for the house.

A \$15,000 kitchen is clearly inappropriate for a \$25,000 home, just as a Roman bath is for a Cape Cod cottage or an English Tudor wing for a Midwestern ranch.

Remodeling obviously should conform in price and style of the house.

Poor planning hampers the kitchen's revamp

With many families eating out less and entertaining at home more, homemakers are spending more time in the kitchen on meal preparation and clean. For them, "too much of a good thing" when it comes to cabinet space is incomprehensible.

Inadequate storage space is probably the major reason that kitchen remodeling continues to remain among the most popular home remodeling projects.

Since kitchen remodeling is among the most expensive projects in terms of cost per square foot, careful planning with the family budget in mind is a must.

The aim of many kitchen modernization efforts is to make it a more efficient work area. Planning the layout to allow sufficient space for work counters between

the three major appliances, says the National Kitchen Cabinet Association, is a prerequisite to successful kitchen remodeling.

It's best, for example, to locate the three major appliances at equidistant points of a triangle with the refrigerator at the point closest to the door where the groceries are brought in, the range at the point nearest the dining area and the sink and dishwasher at the point between.

Besides generous amounts of counter space, ample cabinet space is needed for storage. Logical storage patterns should help save time and effort. Cooking and cleaning items should be located at or near the work center where they are used most often.

The choice of kitchen cabinets is equally vital. Their selection shouldn't be based solely on appearance and cost. Just as important, says NKCA, is their day-to-day performance and durability.

The circular blue and white NKCA certification seal on new kitchen cabinets is an indication that the cabinets are designed to withstand at least 10 years of normal use structurally and at least five years' wear with respect to the cabinets' finish.

SANTA FE — Gov. Jerry Apodaca signed a bill limiting out-of-state travel by most lame duck New Mexico officials.

Sen. John Conway, R-Lincoln-Otero, sponsored the bill. It bans reimbursement for out-of-state travel to an elected public official who chooses not to seek re-election or who is defeated for re-election in a primary or general election. An exception permits lame duck legislators to be reimbursed for out-of-state travel with approval of three-fourths of members of the Legislative Council.

Also signed was a bill handing property owners of water and sanitation districts more authority over operation of districts. The legislation contained the emergency clause and was effective immediately. District owners and developers retained authority to improve streets and build park and recreation improvements. The new law directly affects Elephant Butte Estates and Lakeshore Water and Sanitation District near Truth or Consequences.

Gov. Apodaca signed a bill by Rep. Fred Luna, D-Los Lunas, requiring candidates to be a resident of a district they seek to represent on the date of the governor's proclamation for a primary election. The legislation is intended to prevent car-pooling, moving into a district the day before candidate filing and entering a race.

The State Highway Department will open bids April 22 on a 4.5-mile stretch of Interstate 40 nine miles east of Tucumcari. Estimated completion time is 425 working days. Also set for bid opening is construction at the Los Alamos-White Rock intersection on NM-4 and replacement of a bridge over Bontz Arroyo in Union County about 24 miles east of the NM-370-NM-325 junction south of the Colorado border.

Gov. Apodaca signed a bill by Sen. C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, tightening bidding requirements on lease-purchase contracts. Trujillo is vice chairman of the Legislative Finance Committee that sharply criticized lease-purchase agreements by Valencia, Rio Arriba, Santa Fe and other counties for road equipment last year. The bill requires competitive bidding on what are regarded as lease-purchase agreements.

The LFC found that sellers of equipment were selling the agreements to banks in a detailed study in 1976.

Also signed was a bill by freshman Sen. Caleb Chandler, D-Clovis, defining sexual penetration in assault cases. Chandler's bill corrected an omission in a 1976 law. Gov. Apodaca also signed a bill by Sen. Kenneth Schlienz, R-Quay-Curry, tightening marijuana distribution laws.

A bill by Rep. Colin McMillan, R-

DeBaca-Chaves, establishing a Committee on Concerns of the Handicapped in state law was also signed. A bill by Rep. Hoyt Pattison, R-Curry-Lea-Roosevelt, was signed. It allows a school district to annex part of another school district.

A bill by Rep. Nick Salazar, D-Rio Arriba, on the curriculum of Northern New Mexico State School was signed. Salazar's legislation is part of the merger of the state school with the University of New Mexico's Northern Branch at Espanola. Sen. Chandler's bill banning obscene drive-in movies was also signed. Community standards will be the yardstick to apply the law.

Apodaca also signed the El Rio Chama Scenic and Pastoral Act by Sen. Aubrey Dunn, D-Alamogordo. A bill by Rep. Von Rue Crawford, R-Hidalgo-Luna, banning industrial revenue bond projects for retail businesses was signed. Crawford's bill contains the emergency clause.

Rep. Luna's bill on child abuse reporting was signed. Lobbyists will be required to report expenditures for lobbying under provisions of another bill signed by the governor. New Mexico's 116 judges, ranging from magistrates to Supreme Court justices, received 8.5 percent salary raises under other bills approved by Gov. Apodaca. A few magistrates received larger pay hikes.

Also signed was Sen. Trujillo's bill on the Cumbres and Toltec Scenic Railroad Commission relating to New Mexico-Colorado agreements. A bill by Sen. Bill Lee, D-Lovington, on the seizure and sale of oil and gas products was signed. Rep. Crawford's bill setting a \$10 registration fee for hot air balloons in New Mexico was signed.

Sen. Lee's bill appropriating \$2.5 million was signed — \$2 million for energy research and development allocated by the State Energy Resources Board and \$500,000 for solar energy research at New Mexico State University, Las Cruces.

The State Park and Recreation Commission will consider a lease agreement and contract for the lease area at Conchas Lake State Park near Tucumcari at a meeting at Hobbs today (Thursday). Also on the commission's agenda: A request from the American Red Cross for operation of a sailing camp this summer at Heron Lake State Park; a final offer for land acquisition for proposed Belen Valley State Park and an engineering contract for marina electrical work at several state parks.

State Savings and Loan Supervisor Snider Campbell said hopefully a decision will be made in two to three weeks on an application for proposed Taos Savings and

Loan Association, Taos. First Northern Savings and Loan Association of Taos and Santa Fe is protesting the application. The State Health-Social Services Department was set to get a pilot project for Children in

Need of Supervision (CHINS) in operation this week in the Lordsburg-Silver City-Deming area. Joe J. Hewett is new Southeastern New Mexico highway engineer.

Which leaves the dilemma of which method will leave the most money in the pocket of said taxpayer . . . no?







Don't go shopping for upholstered furniture without these hints

Since looks can be the most deceiving when shopping for upholstered furniture, the best way to tackle such a major investment is to come to the store armed with knowledge.

Know the four underlying construction details that indicate good quality and look for them in each piece you consider.

First telltale signs are the joining of seams and positioning of cushions. If the pattern is matched all over and there are

no dangling threads, test one has been pressed.

Frame construction is another good indicator. Look for well-seasoned hardwood frames built sturdily with dovetailed joints and screwed and glued corner blocks.

Quick frame tests include scanning the finish of exposed wood parts and lifting the piece. Heaviness denotes good quality hardwood.

Rub your hand over the surface where the wood frame stops to make sure there are no sharp edges that can work through the fabric. Any frame movement means hold on to your money — the joints are loose.

Today, most upholstery fabrics are entirely or partially made of synthetic fabrics and will stretch with use. Therefore, the third test point to look for is the inside of the cushion.

Better quality cushions are filled with down rather than with synthetics because leathers and down are loose within an envelope or partition, and they allow the cushions to spring back and to conform to the shape of the upholstery fabric as it stretches.

Down-filled cushions can expand to fill the extra space. Synthetic fillers, on the other hand, are inflexible and the piece will develop wrinkles and an unflattering look.

By checking the heading label you can find out if your chosen piece is down-filled. This simply means that it is filled with a blend of down and feathers in varying proportions.

Down-filled cushions are recognizable in two basic designs. One is an all-down cushion made with partitions and dividers to keep the down from shifting.

In the second type, the combination cushion, a down envelope surrounds

central cores of soft springs, polyester or polyform filled with coiled springs.

Construction of seat springs revealed under the cushions by the width of the deck, is fourth and final checkpoint. If you are unsure about them ask the salesperson.

You can expect to be living with furniture made of fine wood, down and good fabric for the next 10 to 20 years. Now that you know what to look for, have fun and shop with confidence.

Outdoor cooking is no longer just for summer

As any veteran barbecue chef will tell you, culinary artistry has moved out of doors and onto the backyard patio, with the odor of grilled foods wafting through the neighborhoods of America virtually year-round.

"Lately, we've been selling about as many grills in the autumn as we do in May," said the owner of one porch and patio outlet on the East Coast.

Many grills, in fact, are kept active all year. Brave cooks with aprons tied over their coats can be seen just outside their kitchen doors on dark, snowy evenings huddled over sizzling steaks and chops.

Changes are that the unit these hardy souls cook on is a gas or electric barbecue. More and more barbecue chefs are finding their cumbersome charcoal grills inadequate and are turning to sturdier, more durable gas or electric grills, which typically include a number of handy conveniences.

One barbecue manufacturer has introduced a number of innovations to make cooking outdoors more carefree and convenient, including the first electronic ignition system.

This system permits instant start-up of full-size gas grills without matches. The system is pilotless and operates for up to a full year on one "D" cell alkaline battery.

Another new feature is a side-mounted handle with adjustable lid settings for better cooking and smoking control.

If you're planning a sizzling barbecue cookout in your backyard, at the campsite or on the beach, here are some tips from home economists worth keeping in mind:

- Roasts, fowl and larger cuts of meat should always be brought to room temperature before barbecuing. Hamburgers, cube steaks, skinned trout and smaller cuts of meat may be barbecued directly from the freezer, but plan on grilling them longer when frozen.
- For maximum flavor, sear meat on both sides with the temperature set on high.
- Trim edges of fat from roasts so that drippings don't flare up, slashing fat on edges (at 3-inch intervals) prevents meat from curling.
- Meat is not ready to turn until you see little bubbles on top surface. Turn meat only one time, using tongs or pancake turner so you won't puncture it and let juices escape.
- Never salt steaks, burgers or chops until you turn them. Salt and pepper the browned side. Season other side when you remove meat from the barbecue.
- Occasional basting with your favorite

saucers will impart a special flavor to your barbecue foods. Keep basting sauce hot on the barbecue; never brush hot foods with cold sauce.

For broiling and most grilling, you will want to leave the grill open, but for roasting with or without a rotisserie, the lid may be closed.

The Song of the Dove
We are in that time of year so beautifully described in the Bible in the Song of Solomon:

"For, Lo! The winter is past; the rain is over and gone; the time of the singing of birds is come; and the voice of the turtle is heard in our land."

The turtle here means the dove whose complete name is Turtle Dove. This beloved bird is known to the Spanish as the "Tortola" and also "Paloma." The Dove is the symbol of peace and love. He figures in the life and the songs of the Spanish as a faithful messenger of everything that is sacred and good.

This is being sent to you at high noon on April eleven, Monday in Easter week.

The day before Easter there came quiet lull in the middle of the morning, allowing the sun to warm the world with its golden rays. For a moment, all was silent, and then up from the river through the still air came the notes of the dove, his first of the year and ever so welcome after the long winter.

He sang his message over several times in his soft yet far-carrying notes speaking to you in English and Spanish and his own language: "Tuwhoo. Cuuu. Cooo. Oh-you."

The Robin's song tells us that spring is beginning; and the dove's call says that the spring time is well on its way. The gentle notes fill your heart with pure contentment, setting your soul in tune with the joyful harmony of all the other charms of Spring. The message of the dove is sacred, telling us of God's love for all His creatures.

Snow Water In the River

On the same day the dove made his first call. The snows melting high on the slopes of the White Mountain came down the river in the form of extra water in the

stream, so that it was best to go around by the old road rather than cross at the crossing.

This wonderful snow water arrives at a good time when the fields and orchards will be glad to see them.

Now is the time to be out to see the blossom picture which is beginning to unfold with new pictures each day. The apple blossoms are already out down at Riverside at the lower end of the Hondo Valley, and farther up the way is the foamy white glory of the pear, which is a special sight because many of the trees are large and show themselves from a distance.

The snow white of the plum and the crystal pure white of the cherry blossoms are beginning to shine forth in Hondo and San Patricio. The Apple blooms, the glory of all the blossom parade, will begin blooming soon in this section of the valley.

Discharge reviewal underway

Secretary of Defense Harold Brown has announced detailed application procedures for the special discharge review program for certain former Vietnam era (Aug. 4, 1964, to March 28, 1973) service members.

Service members presently in a deserter status which commenced during this era may also be eligible upon return to military control and subsequent discharge.

A joint liaison office (JLO) has been established in St. Louis, Mo., for the purpose of responding to inquiries and processing telephonic and/or written applications. Former service members, other than those in deserter status, may apply for discharge review simply by contacting the JLO at 800-325-4040. Applications received by mail will be treated in a manner identical to telephone applications. Mail applications should be sent to: Joint Liaison Office, Attn: Army / Navy / USMC / Air Force Liaison Team, USARPAC, St. Louis, Missouri, 63132.

The toll-free telephone number at the JLO will be capable of receiving 50 calls simultaneously and will be operational between 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. CST. The office will be open seven days a week for the first 30 days of the program and Monday through Friday thereafter.

After their initial call, applicants will be advised by letter that they may submit additional data within 30 days for consideration by the board.

Provided there are no compelling reasons to the contrary, individuals who received undesirable discharges for service during the Vietnam era will have their discharges upgraded if they meet any one of these criteria:

- * Was wounded as a result of military action.

- * Received a U. S. military decoration, other than a service medal.

- * Successfully completed an assignment in Southeast Asia or in the Western Pacific in support of operations in Southeast Asia.

- * Completed alternative service or was excused from completion of alternative service under the clemency program instituted Sept. 16, 1974.

- * Received an honorable discharge from a previous tour of military service.

- * Had a record of satisfactory active military service for 24 months prior to discharge.

Former service members with general discharges also may apply for upgrading and will be considered by the board in the spirit of compassion and forgiveness in

which the President has sought to bind up the divisions of the Vietnam War.

Former service members eligible to participate in the program will have six months from April 5, 1977, to make application. Individuals who have current applications pending need not reapply. Their applications will automatically be considered under this program.

Applicants for the review process who are currently in a deserter status which commenced during the period Aug. 4, 1964 through March 28, 1973, must first return to discharge. Members whose only alleged misconduct is prolonged absence will be discharged expeditiously by the parent service.

It is anticipated that, if the member does not request a trial or board proceeding, this discharge will take place very soon after the service member arrives at the discharge point.







Home building loans obtainable

Should you decide to build a home, or to remodel the one you're living in, chances are you will want to see Ivan McGee at Chaves County Savings & Loan or Rod Adamson at Pioneer Savings and Trust about financing your venture.

To ascertain what steps you need to take to obtain a loan for purposes of building your house — or having it built for you — I consulted Ivan McGee, manager of the Roswell-based Chaves County Savings & Loan Assn.

"After you select your house plan and contractor," he said, "the first thing we need to know — after how much loan you want — is the cost of the house and lot."

The borrower must provide the loan institution with a financial statement — "how much you own and owe" — as well as with a loan application.

If the borrower is self-employed, McGee said, he must supply an audited profit and loss statement or the past two year's income tax statements.

The loan association then sets about verifying the information given them by the borrower — employers are contacted and the amount of money in the borrower's employers are contacted and the amount of money in the borrower's savings accounts is checked.

The next step is an evaluation of the information, McGee said, and for this several general guidelines are applied.

"Your house payments should not exceed 25% of your monthly income, and the total payments on your long-term debts should not exceed one-third of your monthly income," said McGee.

The "loan package" compiled in Ruidoso is sent to the Roswell offices of the company, where a loan committee reviews the application.

One of the factors the committee considers is "value for loan purposes," McGee said. The value is computed by weighing such variables as the present and proposed assessment of the property.

When the committee approves the loan, a "letter of commitment" is sent to the borrower, stating the loan association's commitment to lend him an amount of money.

McGee said no actual cash is given the borrower by the company. Instead, the borrower takes the letter of commitment to a bank for short-term financing of his building project.

"We give you six months to finish," McGee said. When the loan association is satisfied that the home is completed within the period agreed upon, it then pays the bank which loaned the money to the

borrower, who begins paying off his mortgage 30 days after the loan was finalized.

But if it isn't a house you want to build, but an addition to your present home, the steps are slightly different at Chaves County Savings and Loan.

"For an addition of up to \$5,000, what you want is a Title 1 FHA," McGee said. "We would give you the money and you would go ahead and build." Repayment of the loan begins 30 days after the loan is closed.

For additions over \$5,000, a refinance is required, and complete financial information, as well as a new loan application, must be filed.

Chaves County Savings & Loan will not lend you more than 90 percent of the cost of your new house, or of an addition of more than \$5,000. The reason, McGee said, is that so many Ruidoso houses are "secondary homes."

"We're generating enough up here at this time not to have to go any higher," he said, with \$13.4 million currently out in loans. Since the Ruidoso branch opened in March, 1972, it has loaned \$15 million.

I decided to delve into the question of obtaining financing for extensive remodeling a bit deeper by visiting with Rod Adamson, manager of the Ruidoso branch of Pioneer Savings & Trust. Adamson is also a vice president of the company. The company's name until a year or so ago was Roswell Savings & Loan.

"If we have your first mortgage, we can go ahead with a second mortgage — if the value is there," said Adamson. By "value," he said, he meant that a borrower should not "overbuild," or attempt to create a 20,000 square foot house in a neighborhood of 12,000 square foot dwellings. Nor should he plan to make an addition which would lessen the value of his home — such as a bedroom off the kitchen.

"We're a custom loaner and we try to model our loans to the individual needs," said Adamson.

"If you already have a loan with us, the first thing we need is a new loan application, a new financial statement and verification of income." The last step is done by the loan association.

"Next, we need a set of plans and specifications, primarily to determine what the value will be when it's finished." As a rule, Adamson personally inspects the property to form "a mental picture" of the proposed additions.

A credit report on the borrower is compiled, and the application goes to the loan committee in Roswell. What follows is

similar to what happens in the event of building a home — a letter of commitment to the borrower is taken by him to a bank for short term financing, he is "normally given six months to finish the addition" and then, after a final inspection upon completion, he begins repaying the loan.

The role of the abstract company in the transaction cannot be left out of any outline of the steps necessary to getting a loan for a second mortgage.

It is the abstract company that closes a second mortgage, Adamson said, by notifying the loan association that "we're okay to disburse."

An abstract compiled by an abstract company is a history of a piece of property, showing the dates on which it has changed hands and on which loans were paid up, as well as what liens have been placed on it.

Rather than issuing abstracts, however,

abstract companies now generally supply "title binders," a shorter method of showing the financial condition of the property.

To get a title binder, Adamson said, "odds are they (the borrower) will need to have a survey done." The borrower supplies a "lien waiver," stating that other than the first mortgage, there are no liens against his property.

The title binder, once issued, "shows us what steps must be taken to complete the whole transaction," Adamson said. This would include taking care of outstanding liens.

The second mortgage is recorded once the abstract company notifies the loan association to proceed.

If you already had a mortgage at one company, I asked, but for reasons of your own you wanted a second company to finance your addition or remodeling, how

would you go about it?

"It's our understanding we cannot make a second loan against somebody else's first," Adamson said. "You would have to go to the second company and arrange to have them pay off the remainder of your first mortgage with the first company, add the amount the second company paid for the first mortgage together with the amount you need for your remodeling and go from there."

Adamson said there are people who do switch mortgage holders, although "it would cost you a little."

Wondering how much you should spend on your house? Adamson said a good rule of thumb to keep in mind when choosing a home is that you can afford to spend two-and-a-half times the amount you earn in one year.


Few people wind up in the "house of their dreams" the first time they invest in

a home, he said. "Usually you plan on moving up each time you sell a house and buy a new one."

The factors involved in obtaining a loan are not hard and fast, he said. By consulting a loan company, you can come up with a practical package which is a sound long-term investment.


The Ruidoso branch of Pioneer Savings & Trust has been open several years. Adamson said "we loan out about \$250,000 in an average month, or \$3 million a year." The company began making construction loans within the last six months, and is financing condominiums as well as several single-family homes with that type of loan.

For a primary home — one you intend to live in all year round — financing is available for up to 90 percent of the cost, while for a secondary home, it is available up to 80 percent.

Historic preservation aim of new group

The Lincoln County Heritage Trust, a privately funded group with headquarters in San Patricio, New Mexico, has been formed to preserve historic properties in the Southwest.

Peter Hurd, well known artist and lifetime resident of New Mexico and Lincoln County has been joined by Paul Horgan, author and double recipient of the Pulitzer Prize for History with his books on the Rio Grande and Archbishop Lamy; Robert O. Anderson, rancher, conservationist and Lincoln County resident; Joe Lackey, Roswell civic leader, and John Meigs, artist, author and conservator, have joined the group concerned about the destruction of our rapidly dwindling early buildings and information sources in the Southwest. Conservation is another primary aim of the founders.

The purpose of the Lincoln County Heritage Trust is to investigate the possibilities of preservation and public

admission to these properties on a non-profit basis. Their interests are not confined to Lincoln County but cover the entire Southwest. State and national designation of such places as buildings worthy of recognition is a major aim.

At present, the Lincoln County Heritage Trust owns the Montano Store in Lincoln. Present plans call for its opening in early summer as a restored Spanish-American house of the 1880-1890 period. The Trust hopes to work with the State owned and operated properties in Lincoln so that visitors may enjoy Trust and State buildings as a unit. A suggested "one ticket" family admission to all properties has been proposed.

Other interests of the Lincoln County Heritage Trust are the recording and preservation of material of importance from local and regional sources. Working with the Lincoln County Historical Society, they hope to record interviews, collect

documents and early correspondence and copy related materials from other collections. Establishment of a Heritage Trust Press for the publishing of this material is envisioned in the future.

The Trust will actively solicit donations of written material and documents, period and historic furnishings, clothing and artifacts, reflecting the three cultures of the Southwest, Indian, Spanish and Anglo. These are planned for public exhibition.

The Lincoln County Heritage Trust has an extensive library of reference material which will be available to the public on completion of cataloging. This will include periodicals as well as books, 19th century periodicals of all types and 20th century magazines on art and architecture are sought. Several collections of Southwest interest, including Americana such as 19th century quilts and needlework, glass and china, Mexican and New Mexican religious art, paintings and graphics of prominent artists of all periods, including work of Peter Hurd and Henriette Wyeth will be on view in changing exhibitions when suitable housing is obtained. Parts of collections will be available for traveling to smaller communities in the Southwest as well as regional museums.

Public announcements of additional projects will be made as the Lincoln County Heritage Trust completes organization. An advisory committee will be formed to assist the Trust in carrying out its objectives. Rancher Gaylord Freeman of Capitan, is the first appointee selected by the Trust.







Ruidoso building boom continues

Should even the casual visitor to Ruidoso have reason to question the residential potential of the village, all that is needed to convince even the most skeptical person is a drive through the residential areas, including the newest subdivisions offering large lots and excellent views.

Homes — from basic units to near-mansions to those utilizing solar energy — are going up throughout the village with nearly 150 currently in various stages of construction.

Condominiums — with 48 units being built — are in popular demand. Virtually all of the major condominium housing sites are presently expanding, improving the existing facilities or planning to make the units more desirable, more serviceable.

The extent of the building, and the faith of the builders in the future of Ruidoso, is evident with the fact that building permits issued from July 1, 1976 to March 21, 1977 total \$4,454,659.

"That is a lot of building," village building inspector Chuck Brown said, "when you consider Ruidoso's official census is 2,200."

Contributing to this growth is the expansion of Ruidoso Downs Race Track and the improvements made, and to be made, at Sierra Blanca Ski Area.

While large numbers of homes built here in recent years have been second homes to residents of other areas in New Mexico and other states — a continuing trend — local people are also building homes in this valley, to enjoy the benefits of living in this

beautiful niche in The Land of Enchantment.

Contractors, builders, realtors and loan institutions are all cooperating to help permanent local residents build homes. Many of these are strictly family homes, two or three bedrooms, a garage or carport, but most are on lots of sufficient size that remodeling or enlarging can easily be done when occasion arises.

Statistics show that the current Ruidoso building boom isn't the flash in the pan associated with some resort/vacation areas not having the lasting attractions abounding here.

Recent building permit totals point up the huge dollar expenditure going into housing and commercial development. For fiscal 1970-71 permits totaled \$1,517,

728; 1971-72, \$2,645,523; 1972-73, \$4,380,000; 1973-74, \$7,021,103 and for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1975, \$5,188,191.

Building permits for fiscal 1975-76 totaled \$4,729,234 and, Brown said, "With \$4,454,659 issued so far this fiscal year, based on daily inquiries to my office on both residential and commercial building, it is highly possible we'll exceed last year's total by the time June 30 gets here."

During the two high years, 1972-74, a sizeable portion of the nearly \$13.5 million in building permits can be attributed to condominium construction.

The nearly \$10 million in permits for 1975-76 fiscal years represents a substantial amount of private housing, as does much of the present \$4.5 million in the current fiscal year.

The Ruidoso village trustees are striving to keep abreast of local developments, to insure an orderly growth. Their planning is geared towards an eventual maximum population of 25,000 and initial steps toward utilization of a comprehensive plan for controlled growth include a 1,100 million gallon water storage reservoir, new sewer facility and expansion of water use.


Everyone from the person who sells a building lot to the person who turns the key of a completed home over to the owner, is putting great importance on energy conservation and in preserving the natural beauty of this mountain area.

Take a drive around Ruidoso, get back off the main traveled streets, go up and down a few hills, around a few curves and you'll see enough building of residential facilities underway to show you that Ruidoso will one day be the major playground of the entire southwest.

Realtors saluting Private Property Week

Ruidoso Board of Realtors president John Winniford announced today that local members will be actively participating in the national Private Property Week activities April 17-23.

"We're saluting the precious right to acquire and own real property," Winniford said, "a right which is the envy of all people living in other parts of the world."

Ruidoso's realtors are also launching "Neighborhood Watch Program" beginning April 17. "This is the plan where

neighbors organize," Winniford said, "to watch each other's homes when that home is unoccupied."

Neighborhood Watch, he said, will be continued indefinitely and is being conducted with the cooperation of the Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs police departments and the Lincoln County Sheriff's office.

"We're encouraging all property owners," he said, "to report suspicious activity around anyone's home, with emphasis during the daylight hours."

"Statistics show that burglars tend to work when homes are not occupied. They know, by watching ahead of a break-in, when the residents are not home during the day. They learn their habits so they can commit a burglary, day or night, without any great danger of being caught."

In addition the local realtors are sponsoring "Operation Identification" through which home owners can mark their appliances, furniture and other

valuables with their Social Security number by using an electric pen. "These pens are available at each realtor's office," Winniford said, "and also at the local police departments."

To aid "Operation Identification," realtors will assist all residents with listing their property and preparing a file to be deposited at the local police departments.

"If everyone will mark their property," Winniford said, "and file a copy of their marked property with the police and then prominently display the identification sticker on their front door, we'll be taking

our first step toward really reducing burglaries in our area."

Architectural Committee works for harmony in building

Ruidoso's Architectural Committee is endeavoring to encourage builders to make use of locally available materials, the natural wood, stone, stucco and adobe that has contributed to much of the "flavor of this area," a committee spokesman said today.

The goal of the committee is to avoid the garish atmosphere generally associated with a resort community.

To aid in making Ruidoso more attractive to tourists, the committee is encouraging the use of subdued exterior lighting on all commercial buildings. Stress is put on the builder offering adequate off street parking, insuring the safety of ingress and egress to the parking lots as well as returning to the traffic pattern in the street.

Helping to preserve the natural beauty of the Ruidoso area, through preservation

of landmark trees, minimizing cutting into hillsides, siting buildings to take advantage of the natural slope and terrain and utilizing natural vegetation as much as possible, is one of the major committee goals.

Ruidoso's builders and general contractors are very energy conscious and are designing and building homes with maximum utilization of insulation and installation of thermal pane glass. Placement of houses is also of prime consideration to help the owner preserve the trees and keep landscape spillage at a minimum.

The Architectural Committee is working closely with Ruidoso's Planning and Zoning Commission to instill uniform designing of commercial properties to utilize local materials and protect the natural beauty of the trees and slopes.



Low maintenance
There are a number of reasons for this. Aluminum siding comes in durable baked-on finishes, is easy to clean and is light in weight — which makes it easier to work with than other metals. Probably its biggest selling point is its time-proven low maintenance.

New insulated aluminum siding can help to reduce heat loss through your walls, especially when they are uninsulated or partially insulated. The potential savings in fuel bills added to the maintenance saved in repainting wood siding can usually pay for residing in less than ten years.

The newest siding on the market is vinyl, a plastic material that has been used for floor tile and plumbing pipe for many years. Because vinyl plastic can become brittle when exposed to sunlight, it must be carefully formulated and is only available in pastel colors and white.

Normal weathering
Pre-finished hard board is available in various patterns and colors, but does not have the long-term low maintenance characteristics of aluminum.

The exposed edges of pre-finished steel siding are vulnerable to the elements and may deteriorate if protective coatings fail.

Each type of pre-finished siding has its advantages, but all will change somewhat in color over a period of time once they are on your home and exposed to sun, wind, water and temperature extremes. This is called normal weathering.
