Downs Inaugural is another record setter

Strate Miss got off to a flying start under Leroy Coombs and led all the way for a sparkling upset in Saturday's Inaugural Purse at Ruidoso Downs.

The gelding was thoroughly in command in the six-furlong dash and held about a five-length lead when he approached the top of the homestretch.

Trall Driver, the second-favorite, made up terrain in hungry jumps but stood no chance of reaching the pacemaker. Strate Miss galloped across the finish with a 2 1/4-length lead and returned mutual prices of \$13 to win, \$5 to place, \$3.20 to show.

Strate Miss is owned and trained by Jimmy McClanahan of Berino, New Mexico. He toured the oval in 1:14 4-5 seconds and earned \$3,600 out of the six-grand purse.

Trall Driver, who stamped himself as a tough cookie in upcoming stakes races at Ruidoso, returned \$3.60 and \$2.80. The gelding was far back in the early going, but really came on like gangbusters at the end.

Third went to the recent import, Princely Song, who packed Jerry Nicodemus and odds of 8-5. The unaltered five-year-old took over, second early in the sprint, was unable to make much headway in the final furlong, and finally yielded second to the onrushing Trall Driver.

Backers of Princely Song collected \$2.80 on the show end. Saturday's season-opening card also

included the elimination trials for the \$125,000 (est.) Kansas Derby at 400 yards. Here's how they qualified: Shawne Bug, 20.66 seconds; Comin' Easy, 20.75; Etta Quest, 20.84; My Easy Credit, 20.88; Donna Dodad, 20.88; Double Te, 20.88; I'm Swinging, 20.90; Miss Folly Oh, 20.92; Kid's Rib, 20.94; Streaking Bug, 20.96.

It was the most successful opening in Ruidoso history as 6,070 patrons turned out and wagered \$400,955. Last year's opening day produced a handle of \$376,034.

Jet Pool came on with a powerful late charge and pulled out a head victory in Sunday's Top Deck Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.

The outcome was a stunning shocker since the fans were practically mesmerized by the racing background of the filly, Real Wind, and turned her loose as a 1-5 favorite in the 350-yard test.

But the All-American Futurity winner caved in when put to crunching pressure and finished fifth in a six-horse blanket. [SEE PAGE TWO]

McCoy sentenced to three years in prison

A Ruidoso woman who pleaded guilty to conspiracy to import marijuana was sentenced Friday to three years in federal prison and was fined \$15,000.


Of eight persons charged with the same crime, the term and fine imposed against Helena Guterman McCoy of Ruidoso was the most severe.

Last month, Charles D. Sullivan, of 2212 Lester NE in Albuquerque, who pleaded no contest to the same charge, received a three-year term, but no fine.

The other six either pleaded guilty to

lesser charges or charges were dismissed in plea agreements with the U.S. Attorney's office in Albuquerque.

The eight were charged with a March 1976 conspiracy that resulted in the importing of two loads of marijuana from Mexico. An investigation into the incidents was prompted in March when one of the defendants, Cathy S. Berry, 25, of Mesilla Park, N.M., was dropped off at a Hobbs hospital, her arm severed above the elbow. County's hospital mill levy, bond financing outlined

Lincoln County's 23-year-old hospital mill levy — now generating about \$44,000 a year — is the subject of controversy and some misunderstanding.

Why, say some taxpayers, is the mill levy divided equally between the struggling, but solvent, Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital and the empty Carrizozo facility, closed down for the past three years?

"And my pet peeve," Jim Hine, Ruidoso village manager, said, "is why can't some of the mill levy be used for ambulance services? Cities and counties are not in the medical business. Also, Ruidoso is paying more than half the levy."

About the first question, Les Olson, Lincoln County manager, said when the levy was first adopted in the 1954 general election, the Carrizozo hospital was open and half the funds were earmarked for each hospital.

"No one has raised the issue since the Carrizozo hospital closed," Olson said. "From the county commissioners' point of view, both hospitals belong to the county and they both have to be kept up."

John Sudderth, county commissioner, regards the money raised by the levy as an incentive. The Presbyterian Hospital Center of Albuquerque has leased the Ruidoso building since 1972 and "they're losing money," he said. "The county has to have something to offer."

"We've got to have at least one hospital in the county — it would be nice to have two," Sudderth said.

"The levy just squeaked by in the last election." The county-wide vote was 1,343

in favor and 1,046 opposed. The vote to continue the 3/4 mill levy must be renewed in a general election every four years.

For several months, the county has been negotiating a lease of the Carrizozo building to the state-operated Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center, which would use it for the care of long-term patients.

If the lease is signed, Olson said the county will use mill levy money to install a sprinkler system in the Carrizozo facility. Since the hospital closed its doors in August, 1974, the mill levy funds allotted to it have gone into the building in the form of repairs and a boiler. Revenue sharing money has also gone into it.

State law forbids the use of public tax money for private enterprise, Olson said. Since the Ruidoso hospital is privately operated, the mill levy money can be used for the only part of the operation which is county-owned — the building.

James Burns, RHVH administrator, said when the Presbyterian Hospital Center of Albuquerque leased the Ruidoso building from the county in 1972, "We agreed to take on the \$135,000 debt incurred by the county in 1971" for a 12-bed addition.

He said the approximately \$22,000 of mill levy funds allocated to the RHVH does not pay the entire annual installment on the debt but "it comes awfully close."

When the loan is paid up in three years, he said the levy funds will go to "improve the building," since "a legal decision by the New Mexico attorney general was that public funds can only be used for equipment or construction" in this case.

Does Burns foresee the reopening of the Carrizozo facility as a general hospital? "There's not enough population in the Corona and Carrizozo areas to support a

hospital," he said. "Lincoln County has a real problem with health-care distribution."

Concerning Hine's point — which is shared to some extent by others — Olson said, "The ambulance is already paid for out of the county budget. If we were to use mill levy funds for ambulance service, we'd have to replace them some other way."

About the point that Ruidoso taxpayers are supplying a disproportionate number of tax dollars to the 50 percent they get back for the RHVH, county officials said that within the civil limits of the village is 42 percent of Lincoln County's total assessed valuation.

Within the Ruidoso school district is 52 percent of the taxable total.

Olson said, "It's a principal of taxation that tax money does not have to be distributed on the basis of benefit received."

"If we put it on the basis of ability to pay and need to receive, we'd probably be basing it on a Marxist philosophy, and we know it doesn't work anyway."

Bonds are the principal means of obtaining financing for major capital improvements, and they are also used to gain a small amount of interest money in times of surplus funds.

In Lincoln County, the only form of bond used for financing capital improvements is the general obligation bond. Revenue bonds, which carry a higher interest rate but do not affect the tax rate, are becoming more popular nationally than they have been in the past, but they are not used within the county.

"I don't like them," Sudderth said. General obligation bonds must always

be approved in a general election by the voters whose tax rate the bonds will affect. Revenue bonds are used in other parts of the country to finance projects that can pay off the bonds out of some type of income the project will generate — such as tolls on a bridge or tickets at a football stadium.

Certificates of deposit, a shorter term form of investment, with a high interest rate, are used by administrators to gain interest money through investment of funds. County treasurer Mike Kimbrell, Ruidoso superintendent of schools P. T. Valliant, Ruidoso village officials and others commonly invest in "CD's" which mature at regular intervals. Since government income is erratic — high at certain times of the year, negligible at others — CD's can be obtained during the high income periods to mature during the low income times.

The best investment of all, Sudderth said, is treasury bonds, but because they are very short term, they are not used at all by governments.

In presenting capital projects which will

Very expensive trout

Three Carlsbad trout fishermen found the angling so good at Bonito Lake that they caught 72 trout before Game and Fish officer Tim Barraclough caught them with their catch.

In an appearance before Magistrate H. H. "Bud" Lynaway in Carlsbad, the total cost of the 72 trout amounted to \$728.

The fines assessed:

John Cain, \$200 and \$10 costs, plus \$54 civil damages.

Phillip Dobson, \$200 and \$10 costs, plus \$24 civil damages.

Mike Rutherford, \$200 and \$10 costs, plus \$18 civil damages.

Civil damages were \$2 per trout for each fish over the limit.

And they didn't even have a fish fry.

Road surfacing starts Monday

Resurfacing of Highway 37 (Sudderth and Mechem) through Ruidoso began this morning.

The 54-foot Cutler Repaving machine will move at 16 feet per minute on a ten foot swath.

The project will be geared to complete six 10-foot strips daily, with minimum traffic disruption.

The project is slated for completion within about three weeks.

Temporary traffic lane marking will be installed as the work progresses.

Parking will be limited and parking in curb lanes will be restricted.

Traffic flow will not be blocked except for a few minutes if it is necessary to turn the repaving machine around.

Two way traffic will be maintained beside the actual working area.

The hot mix, applied at about 370 degrees, requires a few minutes of cooling and rolling after which traffic may use the completed sections. There are no lengthy delays between rolling and when the new section is open to traffic.

Final lane striping will be done after the project is completed.

Safety measures will be stressed and drivers will be expected to heed all signing in the work areas.

Wayne Gee charged with kidnapping wife

Wayne Gee of Ruidoso Downs was ordered held in Lincoln County Jail Thursday, in a first appearance hearing before Magistrate Jim Wheeler, in lieu of posting a cash bond of \$10,100, with no ten percent allowed, on charges of kidnapping his wife, Judy Gee, and charges of reckless driving.

The complaint, filed by Chief of Police Lynn Martin of Ruidoso Downs, stated: "by force or deception with intent that she be held or confined against her will", in the kidnapping charge.

The incident was reported to authorities by Patti Malone, driver of the car Gee allegedly forced off the road prior to the alleged kidnapping.

Chief Martin told The News Thursday that the reckless

driving charges resulted from Gee's alleged action in forcing the Malone car to stop.

The investigation revealed that Judy Gee had instituted divorce proceedings Wednesday.

Gee was apprehended at his home by Ruidoso Downs police and other officers, after neighbors telephoned the police to report a disturbance.

Martin also said that other charges may be filed, pending completion of the investigation of the case.

The charge of kidnapping, Judge Wheeler said, is a second degree felony punishable by ten to 50 years in the state penitentiary.

require general obligation bond issues to voters, officials generally exercise caution. If a project is rejected by voters, another election on the question cannot be held for at least a year, and if it is approved at that point, investors are not as eager to pick up the bonds as they would be if the project received hearty endorsement.

"This is why I say we've got to be so careful about our timing if the Sierra Blanca airport proposal goes to the voters," Sudderth said. "You've heard me say we county commissioners wouldn't go along with a bond election unless we were sure it would pass."

A bond peccadillo — in the eyes of Ruidoso's Jim Hine, at least — was the timing of the Ruidoso school district's bond election for construction of classrooms and the middle school, since it came right on the heels of the Eagle Creek dam bond election.

Both issues were approved by the voters, and property owners were hit with a \$5 tax hike in 1976 as a result.

"This really hurt our taxpayers," Hine said. "What gets me is when people come in here and complain that their CITY taxes

went up and forget about the school taxes."

Nearly 90 of the increase was due to the municipal bonds and approximately \$5.20 to the school issue.

But, Valliant said, school officials considered the need for new classrooms, decided it was there, put it to the voters and it passed. "We put it off as long as we can," he said.

Olson said when voters are considering a bond issue, they should "weigh what it means to the family," considering the number of issues still on the tax rate and the number being contemplated, what they will get out of the proposal and act accordingly.

The conspiracy charge against Mrs. Berry and another woman, Susan D. Brown of El Paso, was dropped in the plea agreements with the other defendants.

Other defendants sentenced earlier this week, and their pleas, were:

• Terry Glen Wade of Odessa, Tex., formerly of Ruidoso, who was sentenced to one year in prison and fined \$5,000. He had pleaded guilty to two counts of marijuana possession.

• James Harold Fuller, formerly of Lovington, who was fined \$3,000 in addition to a one-year term. He had pleaded guilty to one possession count.

Charges against Harvey Foster of Ruidoso were dropped because he pleaded guilty to a related state charge in Lea County.

Sentencing of the eighth defendant, William Lee Hurley, formerly of Hobbs, was postponed to Aug. 8 because he is recuperating from a February shooting accident. He pleaded guilty to one marijuana possession count.

finish. Real Wind was about a neck short of victory on the final jump.

Jet Pool, ridden by Johnny Cox for John Clark and Terry Wade of Baytown, Texas, was about a length off the lead in the early going. Real Wind, piloted by Gary Sumpter, got off alertly and took command.

The filly appeared to surge into a neck lead and appeared certain to go winging into another big triumph. But the competition began looming up at the halfway point and Real Wind was clearly in hot water as she neared the wire. For a few strides, she hung on for all she was worth. Suddenly, the dam broke and she was engulfed by an overpowering wave of horses.

Jet Pool, racing from the #10 post, steadily worked his way into contention during the first half of the race. At the end, he came on with a knockout wallop and snared the lead right on the wire.

Go Bixby Go, a 56-1 outsider ridden by Jackie Martin, also finished with a crushing late rush and missed overtaking the winner by a nose. Go Bixby Go, in turn, ended up a nose in front of the 28-1 outsider, Shadow Flash.

Shadow Flash, directed by Richard Vaughn, was another one who helped spring that booby trap on Real Wind in the final stages.

Jet Pool covered the distance in 18.07 seconds and refunded \$13 to win, \$5.40 to place, \$4.60 to show. His share of the \$3,750 gross purse came out to \$3,450.

Go Bixby Go collected \$1,265 and paid

mutuels of \$22.20 and \$10.40. Shadow Flash refunded \$9.60 on the show end.

Real Wind had to be content with a measly paycheck of \$115, which improved her career earning imperceptibly to \$490,856. The Top Deck Stakes marked the first time Real Wind had been pushed out of the money in her 15-race career.

Sunday's co-feature at six furlongs hooked up some of the top three-year-olds in the Southwest, and the victory went to

Countess Blade. Under skilled direction of Gilbert Villegas, Countess Blade stalked the pacemaking Strictly Proper in the early stages, then pulled ahead with ease when Villegas gave her the go-ahead signal.

Countess Blade, making her first start since December, returned \$7.20 as the second favorite.

NM cattlemen are changing their methods

The continued drought, very poor range conditions, high supplemental feed costs combined with low prices for cattle are causing most cattlemen great concern. Many will be forced to make changes in their normal operating procedures in order to stay in business, says William A. Ljungdahl, Extension Livestock specialist at New Mexico State University.

There is no simple answer that will fit all cow-calf operator's problems. Each situation must be studied on an individual basis.

Probably the most drastic solution is to liquidate the entire breeding herd, Ljungdahl says. This has several drawbacks. First when range conditions improve and you are ready to restock, undoubtedly many other cattlemen will be in the same position. This means that prices for replacements will be much higher.

Also, if you have had a constructive breeding program, the cattle that you can find when conditions improve may be of inferior quality to your present. They may not be as well adapted to your type operation.

If breeding herd reduction is imperative, there are several factors that should be considered, the specialist says.

In the case of a spring calving operation, ask yourself "Does the cow have a calf on the ground now or is she about to?" Cows that will be open until next year, should be prime candidates for immediate sale.

Where fall calving is practiced, all cows should be far enough along for easy pregnancy diagnosis. Don't keep cows all summer if they won't calve this fall.

If accurate production records have been maintained in the herd, they can be very valuable in this time of crisis. Records will clearly indicate your top producers which should be the nucleus that you keep until conditions warrant herd expansion.

Age is an important consideration, Ljungdahl says. A cow that is probably good for only one more calf is not your best choice. Consider other factors such as unsound udders, prolapse, bad feet, faulty eyes, poor conformation or other undesirable characteristics.


If heifers calves were carried over last fall, consider retaining them for herd replacements, particularly if the cow herd is fairly old. The heifers will require much

less feed than a cow nursing a calf, and they will be ready to go into production when range conditions improve.

In case the cow herd is young and range forage is not too badly depleted, consider weaning your calves early. This enables the cow to avoid the stress of nursing the calf for a long period of time, thereby reducing the amount of feed she will need. When supplemental feeding is required, converting feed to milk is not the most economical method of beef production.

Another big advantage of early weaning is that it enables the cow to cycle and rebreed much earlier. This certainly is much better than skipping an entire calf crop, the specialist says.

In extreme cases, it may be necessary to liquidate the entire breeding herd and either go to a yearling operation or wait to restock until range conditions improve.

SANTA FE — Will U. S. Rep. Harold Runnels, D-Lovington, run for governor next year?

Runnels says: "I don't know yet. I still got my options." Runnels said in a phone interview in Washington: "I received the Napolitan Poll results last night. They're thick and I haven't studied them yet."

Conservative Runnels added: "The main part of the poll as far as I was concerned was to see how Democrats could get their story across in New Mexico. I'm the only surviving Democrat in the Congressional delegation on the Washington scene."

"I just keep watching the state. There has to be something to make a registration of about 2 1/2 to 1 continue to vote Republican in some areas rather than Democratic." New Mexico Democrats outnumber Republicans by a wide margin.

Rep. Runnels said: "When I came here (1971) there were three Democrats and one Republican." He says the new House code of ethics restriction of \$9,625 a year on members' outside income is not a problem for him. Runnels explains: "The salary I have been drawing has been for managerial duties in my business. It does not interfere with my service to constituents."

"In the House I can draw \$9,625. But in the Senate under its new code of ethics I could continue to draw what I'm drawing now." Runnels called the new House code "unconstitutional."

He predicted: "We're going to end up with two classes of people on the House side — the very wealthy with dead money, inherited money. Dead money is not limited — investments etc. Then there will be on the lower end of the scale a civil service employe who will serve in the Congress for the salary (\$37,500 a year) and the limitation of \$9,625 annual outside income."

"We're limiting the small businessman, the farmer, the rancher, people in those categories." Rep. Runnels added: "I can sell my business and invest the money and continue to serve in the House. But I've invested my life in my business."

Runnels looked at his April monthly salary check. The gross was \$4,791.06. Deductions totaled \$2,021.83. He itemized deductions: Federal withholding tax, \$1,333.80; retirement fund payment,

\$363.33; New Mexico state withholding tax, \$222.91; regular life insurance, \$46.14; optional life insurance, \$9.75; and group health insurance, \$25.90. The net was \$2,789.83.

Runnels, Gov. Jerry Apodaca, Las Cruces Democrat, and Lt. Gov. Bob Ferguson, D-Artesia, paid for the \$12,000 Napolitan poll. Runnels said he will try to meet with Apodaca and Ferguson this week-end in New Mexico to weigh poll results. Runnels is booked for three week-end speeches in New Mexico. Gov. Apodaca will leave Monday from Albuquerque for Japan. He will not return until May 31.

So the meeting is uncertain. Meanwhile, Apodaca and his top aides have seen poll results but they are tight-lipped about them. Ferguson, campaigning for governor, says the poll gave him 29 percent name identification with voters, a big jump over 13 percent in an earlier independent poll. Ferguson says: "I was very much encouraged over that as far as my race is concerned."

But Ferguson says he has not seen complete poll results.

A four-term House member, Rep. Runnels says of Congress despite recent committee revisions: "Seniority is still the name of the game for committee assignments, committee chairmanships, ranking members. It's still basically the seniority system."

Runnels was 63 March 17. What are his future plans? "I'm not going to stay in politics the rest of my life," he says. Runnels is wealthy. He formed Runnels Mud Co. and RunCo Acidizing and Fracturing Co., based in Lovington. He is a partner in Southland Supply Co. He is manager of Magnolia Amusement Co., Magnolia, Arkansas. He owns farms in Virginia and Lea County.

The 5-state Federation of Rocky Mountain States, the Western Governors' Regional Energy Policy Office (WGREPO) (10 states) and the Western Interstate Nuclear Board will be merged July 1 into a 16-state Western Governors' Policy Office. Apodaca top aide Nick Franklin has attended regional meetings over six months to reduce the number of organizations in the West with other governors' aides.

Franklin says the New Mexico bill for

organization memberships was cut in 1977 appropriations. But the state will still pay a whopping \$171,400 to 11 associations in fiscal 1978.

Franklin says the Western Interstate Commission on Higher Education

(WICHE) asked for \$39,000 from New Mexico but received \$28,900. He says the Council of State Governments' biennial New Mexico share was chopped down from \$35,900 to \$17,500.

PRIORITIES WRONG?

Espanola school administrators recently expressed considerable concern that high school students were graduating early by attending summer school. The resulting drop in enrollment cost the school \$905 per student in state funds.

In a day when the operation of any public school system is geared to federal grants and state money, one can appreciate the uneasiness budget people would feel at this potential monetary loss. To salvage this \$905 per student, the schools will limit summer school to those students needing it to make up work.

While we understand the administration's worry, have our school administrators lost sight of the reason we sent to children to school — to be educated? When the administration wants to keep students their senior year to collect \$905 from the state, rather than to see that they get the fullest education possible, our

priorities are getting a little out of kilter. — The Rio Grande Sun, Espanola.

WHO WAS LISTENING?

Governor Jerry Apodaca said recently that his proposed changes in the state's liquor laws failed in the legislature because the citizens did not want the changes, this feeling being reflected in the rejection of the changes by the legislature.

Many people, the Governor feels, believed if his proposals were adopted there would simply be more bars and liquor stores in the state and "even those who patronize them" didn't want this.

This is probably a true analysis of the public's feelings, but unfortunately it was not explained to them that over a period of several years things would level out and we would wind up with about the same number of establishments as we have now.

But what we don't understand is if the legislature listened so intently to the people on liquor legislation, why it turned a deaf ear to their feelings on right to work? — The Rio Grande Sun, Espanola





EXTENSIONS OF CERTAIN DEADLINES FOR TAX YEAR 1977

Pursuant to my authority under Section 72-31-25 NMSA (1953 Supp. 1975), I hereby extend the following deadlines found in the Property Tax Code with respect to the 1977 tax year only:

1. The deadline for county valuation protest boards to file protests which is found in subsection C of Section 72-31-27 NMSA 1953 (Supp. 1975) is hereby extended from one hundred and twenty days of the date the protest is filed to two hundred and ten days after the date the protest is filed. The effect of this Order is that all protests to 1977 notices of valuation filed with county assessors pursuant to the provisions of Section 72-31-24 NMSA 1953 (Supp. 1975) are required to be decided by the county valuation protest board sufficient time to comply with the procedural requirements set forth by the Court of Appeals of the State of New Mexico in the Matter of the Position of the First National Bank, et al., v. Bernalillo County Valuation Protest Board, No. 301.

2. The deadline for the Property Tax Department to mail notices of valuation for the 1977 tax year to property owners whose property is valued by the Property Tax Department, the deadline being found in subsection B of Section 72-31-20 NMSA 1953 (Supp. 1975) is hereby extended from May 1, 1977 to June 1, 1977. This extension is made to permit the Department to complete auditing of 1972 taxpayer reports made to the Department.

3. The deadline for the Department to complete auditing of 1972 taxpayer reports made to the Department, 1972-1976, this 6th day of April, 1977 in Santa Fe, New Mexico.
