## Miss Thermolark wins Rainbow

Miss Thermolark, the 6-5 favorite, led all the way in Sunday's 14th running of the Rainbow Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly, owned by Ronny Schliep of Miami, Florida, clocked the 400 yards in 20.23 seconds — which wasn't especially outstanding. But she did an impressive job of hamstringing the competition right from the first jump.

It was clearly a one-horse race, although the 7-1 shot, Jun Jun Ni, gave a valiant effort in the second half of the sprint and made up much ground in a driving attack. But the public choice was a half-length on top when she reached the wire.

The Rainbow Futurity, the second leg of quarter horse racing's Triple Crown, packed a gross purse of \$442,600. Miss Thermolark's share came out to a hefty \$153,160. In addition, the filly stretched her brilliant record to eight straight wins, against no defeats.

Miss Thermolark is trained by Leo Craighead. Jackie Hopkins was the man in the saddle. The mutual payoffs were \$4.40, \$3.40 and \$3.20.


Jun Jun Ni, piloted by Jerry Burgless for Bill Brooks of Blanchard, Oklahoma, collected a runnerup paycheck of \$70,016. The tote returns were \$5.40 and \$4.00. Jun Jun Ni carried odds of 7-1.

Oh Savannah, an 11-1 shot directed by Willie Lovell, sailed in third and earned \$35,883. The colt is owned by G. S. and Guy S. Pettigrew of Houston, Texas. The show price was \$4.60.

It was clear sailing for Miss Thermolark right from the start. The filly came out of the gate like a bullet and quickly found plenty of airspace on both sides. So the possibility of any bumping from her gate mates was quickly ruled out.

Jun Jun Ni, away perhaps a tick slowly on the outside, made up terrain steadily with each jump. But it was apparent he'd have to turn in a super effort in order to catch the high-flying public favorite. At the half-way point, Miss Thermolark was still moving with enormous authority.

In the final 100 yards, Jun Jun Ni found himself about 1 1/2 lengths off the pace. He whittled away the deficit with powerful strides, but Miss Thermolark, although appearing to coast in the final strides, showed no signs of weakening.


A Saturday 6 a.m., breakfast at White

Oaks sets the stage for the Pony Express Race, starting at 8. The riders, with three changes of horses, travel 41 miles to arrive in Lincoln — carrying genuine Pony Express mail — about 10. Prize money for the race has been pegged by Ralph Dunlap at about \$1,000. Presentations will be made at 11.

Saturday the arts and crafts fair is open and a parade of antique cars is scheduled for 2 o'clock.

Booths will be open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday and Sunday.

## Three die in car wreck



A 6:50 P.M. SUNDAY car accident one mile west of the Highway 37/70 intersection resulted in the death of three persons. Ruidoso police identified one driver as Socorro M. Juarez, 37, Alamogordo, who was alone. The names of a man, 27, driving, and a woman, 25, both of El Paso, were being withheld this morning pending

notification of next of kin. Officers allege the rear of the Juarez car, middle of road, struck the rear of a car legally parked on the shoulder of the road and veered across the center line to meet, nearly head-on, the east bound car, bottom, and on left in top photo.

## Jury indicts local couple

The Lincoln County Grand Jury Wednesday indicted Jerry Ray James, 38, Hollywood Station, and Shirley Sue James, 37, Ruidoso Downs, on charges of receiving stolen property valued at over \$2,500.

The pair is charged with receiving, on or about June 16, 1977, jewelry, diamonds, pearls, a reptile belt and leather coat valued at more than \$2,500 and that they knew the items were stolen or believed them to be.

Shirley Sue James was arrested Saturday at 9:30 a.m., at her home by Ruidoso Criminal Investigation Division and Lincoln County Sheriff's officers, on a warrant following the grand jury indictment.

She is at liberty under a \$5,000 bond pending arraignment in district court before Judge George L. Zimmerman at 1 p.m., August 4.

Jerry James has been held without bond in Lea County Jail, Lovington, since June 17 as a suspect in the jewelry robbery at

the home of Dessie Sawyer in Tatum. He was arrested in Ruidoso.

Shirley James was arrested at her home July 14 on charges of receiving stolen property valued at more than \$100 and under \$2,500. At that time it was alleged that merchandise seized at her home was part of the loot from a series of armed robberies in a four-state area. She appeared before Judge Jim Wheeler in Magistrate's Court, Ruidoso, on the charges and was released from custody upon posting \$5,000 cash bond.

# Nursing home public hearing Wednesday

A public hearing will be held Wednesday, at 7 p.m., at the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital on the application of the Careage Corporation, Bellevue, Washington to build an 80-bed nursing home in Ruidoso.

The hearing will be the first of five reviews of the proposal, and will be conducted by members of the project review committee of the Sub-Area Health Council. Members of the Sub-Area Health Council include James Burns and Bill Hirschfeld, Ruidoso, Mary Rich, Carrizozo, Dr. David Rouleau, Capitan and Geraldine Perkins, Corona.

John Hudson, health planner for District VI Health Systems Agency of New Mexico, said Careage filed the application April 1, and estimated the total project cost at "around \$1 million." No local money is involved.

Although he said he does not know the precise location, the facility "will be in Ruidoso serving Lincoln County and

surrounding areas."

Of the 80 beds, proposed, Hudson said 20 would be for patients requiring 24-hour attendance by registered nurses, while the remaining 60 would be for intermediate care patients.

"We have identified the need (for a nursing home)," he said, "and there will be an applicant there to answer all questions... it will definitely have an effect on the economy and health of the area."

Noting that the project proposal can be altered as it proceeds through the five levels of review, Hudson said once Careage builds the nursing home, it will turn it over to Health Management Services, Incorporated to operate. This is a nation-wide business, he said, and is a private corporation.

The Careage Corporation is also privately run, and has completed nearly 200 health-care facilities across the country. The bulk of them are in the

Washington area, with a less dense scattering of them in the Midwest.

The nearest project to New Mexico is in northern Arizona, the Green Valley Nursing Home.

The five review stages of the proposal are:

1. The project review committee of the Sub-Area Health Council, hearing set Wednesday.

2. The full Sub-Area Health Council, hearing Friday, August 5, in Roswell.

3. At the state level, the governing body of the Health Systems Agency.

4. The New Mexico Health Planning and Development Agency.

5. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare, which has "final sign off authority," Hudson said.

Although "it may seem strange to have a private corporation going to the federal government like this, they are proposing to use Medicare and Medicaid, and with federal dollars involved, this is necessary."

## Arts and Crafts Fair draws mixed reactions

Although the sixth annual Chamber of Commerce Arts and Crafts Fair brought a variety of crafts to Ruidoso this weekend, it also brought mixed reactions from the local merchants and the visiting artists.

The fair, which drew approximately 2,300 Friday and even more Saturday and Sunday, was termed a success by some artists and merchants and a disaster by others contacted.

"It's not an asset to Ruidoso," a merchant, whose business is in the Gateway Area where the fair was held, said.

"We don't handle that kind of merchandise, so it's no competition to us, but others in town do. Also, all the money is

going out of town because most of the exhibitors are not local."

Jane Deye, owner of Aspen Tree Gifts and Books, felt differently: "I thought it was a nice fair. It doesn't detract from our business. In fact, in past years when we've known an exhibitor, they have referred business to us and us to them. In our four summers, we've found it to be a good thing for the community."

Florence Wilson, Roadrunner Gifts, said: "I was in the first three fairs and I've seen both sides, but yesterday (Friday) we had a great day. I can't see that the fair has hurt our business at all and our shop is handicrafts."

"It's good for the community for a weekend and we should support it."

Another businessman said: "I went to the fair and enjoyed it, but frankly, it's hurt our business. I should have stayed home this weekend."

Larry Norman at Norman's Pizza said: "The arts and crafts fair has always helped our business."

The businessman in the Gateway area also said: "If they are going to have it, they shouldn't have it on a big race weekend. There's no place for anyone to stay and no place to park. People drive by and wave; there's no place to park and they can't stop in."

In contrast to the feelings of the businessmen, the artists attending had positive reactions to the Chamber of Commerce fair.

Lee Cable, artist from Tampa, Florida, said: "Ruidoso is a good show. The quality of the art is good, the booths are nice and the traffic flow good. I'd rate it as one of the best I've been to."

Walter Mohon, who has attended all six previous shows with his artist-wife Jane, said: "It definitely has gotten better. We certainly enjoy it."

"I think the locals do more buying than the tourists. The tourists will buy a cheap little thing and the locals will buy the more expensive."

Leslie Zent, leathercraft, from Arkansas, came because: "I like the area, the mountains and the people. But, we mainly came for a vacation and hope to make enough on the fair to break even on our expenses."

"We came last year and feel like there are more here this year. Choosing this weekend for the fair to coincide with the big race was a good idea."

Artists Bus and Freddie Ellsworth, Beaville, Texas, have attended all but one of the fairs and said: "We love it. We enjoy it so much and do real well. Last year wasn't too great, but things are real good this year."

Freddie said "So many folks in Ruidoso seem glad to have the fair. It gives them something to do between races or if they don't want to go to the races."

"But the best thing is all the friends we've made and that we see again each year."

## Two charged with larceny of livestock

James Rodgers and Jack Rankin, both of Ruidoso, pleaded not guilty to a charge of larceny of livestock before Judge George Zimmerman in district court in Carrizozo Thursday.

The two were arrested July 9 in connection with the theft of a calf from Letoyne Peters of Capitan. A trial date has not been set.

## Indian cultural fair set at Mescalero Saturday

Demonstrations of traditional Indian arts ranging from basket weaving to beadwork to teepee making will be a part of the Culture Fair set Saturday, August 6 in Mescalero.

"We want to give all the public a chance to see the type of cultural art work we do here on the reservation," Freddie Kaydahzime, spokesman for the Mescalero Apache Tribe (MAT), said. Some of the crafts will be for sale, and

booths will feature painting, jewelry, beadwork, baskets, sculpture, wood-working and other handmade articles. Indian food will be served.

Wendell Chino, MAT president, will be master of ceremonies and throughout the day he will give explanations of tribal projects ranging from the Inn of the Mountain Gods and the ski area on Sierra Blanca to resource conservation. Beginning about 10 a.m., when the fair

will open, there will be dancing "every hour on the hour" by Mescalero dancers, and admission, Kaydahzime said, will be free.

The 40 booths will be at the cultural center (museum) and dance grounds, adjacent to the tribal offices on United States Highway 70.

"We're expecting a lot of people to come and spend a good day with us," Kaydahzime said.

## Range caterpillars cause county-wide emergency

A state of emergency has been declared in Lincoln County because of a heavy infestation of range caterpillars.

Acting Governor Bob Ferguson issued an executive order last week, declaring the emergency and thus releasing state funds to cover one-third of the cost of

coping with the caterpillars.

The total cost of spraying affected areas is pegged at \$100,500, with one-third to be born by the state, one-third by the United States Department of Agriculture and one-third by ranchers living in the infested region.

The pesticide to be used is Dyltox 1.5 oil, and it has been successful when used against the caterpillars in the past.

For information on the actual spraying, ranchers should contact Lincoln County extension agent Ralph Dunlap in Carrizozo at 648-2471.

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# Child abusing parents can be helped

"Child abusers want desperately to stop hurting their children and can be helped," Micky Zartman told the 585 persons attending Homemakers College at New Mexico State University. While addressing a special class on Friday, June 17, the former director of Parents Anonymous in Las Cruces said that in order to save the abused child, we must first save the parent.

"All parents have the potential to abuse their children. In fact, almost all parents have engaged in some form of abuse during their parenting years. When this abuse becomes a pattern rather than an isolated case, the parent has an abuse problem," Mrs. Zartman said. She explained that children can be blatantly abused physically, emotionally,

psychologically, verbally or sexually. Children are also abused through physical or emotional neglect.

Contrary to common belief, child abuse is not confined to a racial minority or to the poor. "Child abusers are really ordinary people, like ourselves, our neighbors or our relatives. These ordinary people have exhausted their inner resources in coping with their own conflicts," Mrs. Zartman continued that because of this, the parents are unable to respond appropriately to their children.

"Abusive parents feel intense guilt and often hate themselves for abusing their children. The problem becomes even worse when society labels these parents as sick maniacs. Research shows that only 10 percent of known child abusers have

psychological disorders," Mrs. Zartman said.

The "treatment" used in the past has done little to improve the situation, she said. Traditionally when child abuse was discovered, the child was removed from the home and the parents jailed.

"Today we are learning that removing the child often leads to the dissolution of the family. The emotional trauma the child suffers from the separation is often worse than the abuse," the speaker said.

"Children need desperately to believe that their parents are capable of loving them. Indeed abusive parents can and do relate to their children in healthy, loving ways," Mrs. Zartman said.

"Child abusers were generally victims of inadequate parenting. They are

frequently isolated from family and friends and have an extremely low self-esteem," Mrs. Zartman continued. "They often expect too much of their children."

Parents Anonymous tries to help the parents grow out of their isolated, trapped, helpless patterns of living by developing a sense of self-esteem. "We help the parents find enough gratification in the adult world so that they can become loving and giving to their children," the past director explained.

The no-fee group offers a 24 hour hot line and weekly support meetings. "Members of the group serve as a substitute family where parents can find alternatives to their anger and frustration. They share their problems as well as their successes," Mrs. Zartman said.

The group also has a buddy system. "Trained volunteers serve as models of healthy parents and most importantly become a listening friend," the speaker said.

In closing, Mrs. Zartman reminded the group that it was their legal responsibility to report suspected child abuse. "You can remain anonymous and will be legally protected from liability if you make the report in good faith."

"Early detection is vital if we are to protect and heal the family. Child abuse is predictable and preventable," Mrs. Zartman said. She challenged the group to care enough to get professional help for the abusing parent. "In addition, non-judgmental listening can start the healing process."

# Guayule on display at NMSU open house

If you've been wondering what guayule, the rubber-producing plant, looks like, you'll be able to see it firsthand at the New Mexico State University Plant Science Research Center Open House - Farm Day, Aug. 3.

NMSU will host the Open House - Farm Day from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. The research center is on the river levee east of Highway 24 (signs will be posted).

Regardless of all the recent headlines, guayule (pronounced wy-o-lee) isn't really the hottest item to hit the press, says Dr. J. Wayne Whitworth, agronomist for the NMSU Agricultural Experiment Station. As far back as 1810, guayule was supplying 10 per cent of the world's rubber supply. And during World War II, guayule was responsible for more than 50 per cent of the United States supply. But, when importing rubber became inexpensive again, guayule crops were plowed under and the Emergency Rubber Project was abandoned.

Currently, our nation imports about one million tons of natural rubber annually at a cost of one-half billion dollars. In case of a national emergency, that supply is extremely vulnerable. And even without any political emergency, it is estimated that natural rubber will be in short supply by the mid 1980's.

With proper research and development, guayule has the potential to make America self-sufficient in its rubber supply, Whitworth says. It is a warm-season crop, which limits its native habitat to the state to the southern one-quarter. However, research at NMSU is attempting to overcome that.

One possibility may be another strange sounding plant - mariola. Mariola is a related plant that produces little, if any, rubber, but is extremely tolerant to cold weather. If crossed with guayule, it may produce a cold-resistant rubber-bearing plant that might be grown statewide.

In various yield tests, 500 pounds per acre per year was one of the higher yields measured. Therefore, four acres would net one ton of rubber. To meet the nation's requirement of a million tons, "quite a few acres will be needed," Whitworth says.

Then, in order to turn the plant into rubber, factories will be needed. "Some people estimate that 10,000 acres are needed to justify building a rubber factory," Whitworth says. "I think at least

40,000 are needed." The agronomist reasons that guayule is harvested only at three-year intervals, and that the whole plant must be harvested since one-third of the rubber supply is in the plant's roots.

The process of getting rubber from guayule is relatively simple. The plant is defoliated, as the rubber is in the bark. It is then ground up to release the latex. When put in water, the latex coagulates and floats, while the debris sinks. The latex has a high resin content which must be removed. The leaves of the plant are coated with a shiny wax, which may possibly be an important by-product of guayule.

Whether guayule will prove to be economically feasible in New Mexico depends on several factors. NMSU's objectives are to determine if guayule will grow and produce rubber under New Mexico conditions at a level which will be economically competitive with conventional crops. They will also determine whether breeding and selection can extend guayule's limited habitat to include all of the state.

Researchers will also evaluate guayule against the potential of other rubber bearing crops such as milkweed and rabbit-brush. Weed control and the influence of growth regulations for in-

creasing rubber content will be examined.

Twenty-five varieties of guayule seed were saved from original research. With these, NMSU research will aim for higher rubber content in the plant and cultural methods to improve growth.

The major limiting factor is the shortage of this seed, Whitworth notes. The supply is limited and it takes time to produce new seed. Additionally, the supply is old and therefore, the germination rate is only about 50 per cent. Researchers are careful not to use the seed for minor experiments until the supply is replenished.

Because guayule seed is so different from other ordinary crop or vegetable seed, special seed handling equipment will need to be built. During the Emergency Rubber Project, special equipment was developed and construction plans of most of the equipment still exist. Using these plans and new technology, new equipment will be designed and constructed.

All experimental guayule plants are grown in a greenhouse until they can safely be transplanted outdoors. For the Plant Science Research Center's open house, pots with different varieties of guayule plants will be placed outdoors for one of the tour stops. Participants may see the plants and discuss guayule with agronomists involved in the project.

# Drying preserves foods for camping

Drying is easy, inexpensive and is an ideal way to preserve food for back packing and camping, says Mae Martha Johnson, Extension food specialist at New Mexico State University. Fresh food weighs 4 to 10 times as much as dried food and takes up a lot more space.

Drying does not improve the quality of food so always start with garden fresh vegetables. Preparation for drying entails all of the same steps used in canning or freezing — such as washing, peeling and slicing.

Drying preserves vegetables by removing enough of the moisture to prevent growth of micro-organisms. Vegetables can also spoil because of enzyme action. Therefore you need to blanch most vegetables to inactivate the enzymes. Blanching with either steam or water also helps save the food's color and flavor. Onions, mushrooms and green peppers can be dried without treatment.

For steam blanching you will need a large kettle with a wire basket or colander to hold the vegetables above the boiling water. Put about two or three inches of water in the kettle and bring it to a boil. Place the basket with no more than two inches of vegetables in the kettle above the boiling water. Cover the kettle tightly until the vegetables are limp or wilted. Spread them on paper towels to cool and remove excess moisture.

For water blanching, fill a kettle with enough water to cover the vegetables. Add vegetables in small amounts so that the water does not stop boiling. Blanch only about one pound at a time. Reuse the water for several batches of the same vegetable. Closely time the blanching. Cool the vegetables by immersing them in cold water. Spread on paper towels to absorb

moisture.

These vegetables can be dried in a home oven, in a dehydrator or under the sun. The drying process takes from a few hours to several days, depending on the vegetable and drying process.

After drying the vegetables, put them in a heavy plastic bag. Seal it tightly and put in the refrigerator for one day. If the vegetables are limp or moist, they need more drying.

After this conditioning process, pack the dried vegetables in glass jars or coffee cans lined with plastic bags. Seal the container tightly to protect the food from air and moisture. Store them in a cool, dry place.

If you use glass jars, make sure the storage place is also dark. Light will cause loss of color and deterioration.

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## Energy policy mixed blessing

President Carter's energy proposals will have a mixed effect on New Mexico's economy, says Robert Coppedge, Extension economist at New Mexico State University. Increased production of coal and uranium, for example, will mean more income to the state.

However, we will also have to face boom towns and environmental problems, Coppedge says. In addition, natural gas provisions of the President's plan may result in more gas exports from New Mexico and a greater shortage in the state.

Higher energy prices will weigh heavily on New Mexicans because of their lower average incomes and the greater distances they must travel, relative to most other states.

The 1985 goals of the President's energy proposal cannot be met, according to Tom Stevens, assistant professor of agricultural economics at NMSU.

Drawing on the work of other University economists across the country, Stevens says the current lack of public awareness of the problem is a serious matter. He has written a fact sheet which details the demand-supply nature of the energy situation and discusses specific elements of the President's policy.

Stevens says that even if the United States reduces the growing energy demand, increases the use of nuclear power, and converts from oil and natural gas to coal, the country still could not reduce its current amount of oil imports. Substantial increases in the domestic petroleum supply or even more conservation would be required.

### ELECTION REFORM?

Congress is about to pass an election "reform" bill which may not be reform. It would allow easier voter registration, even on election day, and would provide that tax monies finance all senatorial and congressional election campaigns.

The fear of many is that the greatly broadened voter registration program will invite fraud, especially in large metropolitan areas, where identification papers cannot easily be checked.

The bad feature of federal financing of congressional elections is that it is merely another heavy cost saddled on the already overburdened taxpayer. Admittedly, it takes considerable money to finance a campaign today, but the solution is not in forcing taxpayers to pay costs for all those to be greatly encouraged (by the new reform) to run.

These reforms, somewhat modified to meet earlier objections, were thought dead for this session only two months ago. They have been revived and seem on their way to passage, a sop to undisciplined voters and to lawmakers themselves, who will not have to pay for their reelection campaigns under its provisions. — Santa Rosa News

### THE WRONG IDEA

The State of Connecticut decided to drop a suit against a woman killed in an accident, seeking \$34.15 from her estate to pay the cost of cleaning up oil spilled on the highway in the mishap.

Apparently, that state has a law requiring the person at fault to pay the costs if a cleanup crew is required after an accident. In Connecticut, they just don't understand the rules of the game.

In New Mexico, we are spending more than \$1 million of the taxpayers money paying more than 800 people to pick up beer cans along the highway.

True, there is a litter law on the books but it is enforced even less enthusiastically than the late and unlamented brake and light sticker law.

What Connecticut should do is forget the law requiring those responsible for an accident to cleanup after the mess and hire a couple hundred people on the state payroll to do the job. They'll remember you next election. —The Rio Grande Sun, Espanola

## Bicentennial Notebook

### GENERAL PRESCOTT CAPTURED

On the morning of July 10, 1777, Americans had much to celebrate. The night before, a band of American soldiers had slipped behind British lines in Rhode Island, captured the commanding general in his bed, and returned to American lines without being detected.

A major reason for this daring raid was the desire to capture a major British officer who could be exchanged for American General Charles Lee, who had been captured by the British a few weeks earlier. This was necessary since the rules required an officer of equal rank to be exchanged.

The leader of the American force was Colonel William Barton, who had distinguished himself in early campaigns but who had declined promotion and fame.

Barton decided on the Rhode Island expedition because of information provided by a British deserter.

Barton chose forty men to go with him. Included in this group was a black man, Prince Whipple (sometimes called Jack Sisson), who proved invaluable when they arrived at Prescott's headquarters. Since the trip was very dangerous, Barton took only volunteers.

The group went in five small boats and sailed between the shore and the British ships without being detected. Landing less than a mile from Prescott's house, they approached the one sentry and took him off guard. Prescott, awakened from sleep, was allowed only to put on his pants; the rest of his clothes were carried.

When Prescott objected to running because of his age, an American took him under each arm and literally carried him

to the boats. He was much discomfited when they carried him through a barley field and the stalks scratched his naked legs.

Prescott was quite surprised when they passed through the British lines without detection. He told Barton he had gone with them without resistance because he was sure they would be captured.

No such daring events were occurring in Spanish New Mexico in July 1777. Isolated as it was from the viceregal government in Mexico City, New Mexico was most concerned about survival. Relations with the Indians continued to be the most serious external force affecting survival. Just as important, however, was the constant struggle with the environment to provide the necessities of life.

## Green June beetles attack ripened fruit

As grapes and stone fruits, such as peaches, start to ripen, they are often attacked by a large, green beetle with bronze margins on its wing covers.

These green June beetles travel in groups, says John J. Durkin, Extension entomologist at New Mexico State University. Very often a dozen or more of them will congregate on a peach or a cluster of grapes and devour them in a matter of minutes.

Because the beetles attack fruit that is ready to eat, many home gardeners are reluctant to use a chemical spray. Carbaryl, commonly sold under the trade name Sevin, is highly effective against

green June beetles and can be used on ripening fruit, Durkin says.

Allow for a weathering period of 24 hours after treating peaches, plums and nectarines with carbaryl. Apricots should not be harvested for three days after treatment while grapes can be harvested the same day of treatment if necessary.

Carbaryl is also effective against peach twig borers, the small worms that attack late-ripening peaches and nectarines. On grapes, carbaryl will control western grape leaf skeletonizers and grape leafhoppers.

The green June beetle is destructive in both its adult and larval stage. The larvae — known as white grubs — feed underground on roots and can be very destructive to lawns. They also feed on rotting organic matter. Although the beetles are strong fliers, your new infestation of June beetles often comes from an infested lawn or compost pile.

To control the white grubs in lawns and compost, use chlordane spray, dust or granules as recommended on the label.
