Downs trustees cut budget

Ruidoso Downs trustees slashed approximately \$18,000 from their 1977-78 budget during their Monday meeting, after the budget they had submitted to the state's Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) failed to receive approval.

Clerk-treasurer Virginia Spall said the DFA had instructed her to use last year's revenues in estimating this year's income. She had used larger estimates, based on projected growth and business income.

The figures the DFA told Spall to use, she said, represented "a drastic reduction" from the previous fiscal year.

"There's more people moving in all the time, and more businesses moving in than moving out, but our revenues keep going down," Police Chief Lynn Martin said. "The money must be going down a wrong hole somewhere."

Trustee Harrold Mansell said his business, as well as others he knew of,

have had a much better year so far than they were reporting last year at this time. He said the DFA's insistence on using last year's revenues to compute this year's "is absurd," as so much of the city revenue is generated by the gross receipts tax.

Spall proposed reducing the budget by \$1,500 by eliminating raises for the police chief and lieutenant. Mansell protested, saying he would rather have the trustees and mayor forfeit the \$1,200 they receive jointly per year.

No salaries or stipends were cut, however, as the trustees voted instead to reduce the year-end estimated cash reserve, by \$1,500 to \$2,037.

In other business, the trustees received a complaint from Jack DiPaolo, former Downs mayor, asking them to overturn a recent decision by the Planning and Zoning Commission denying water to DiPaolo's All American Estates subdivision.

Mayor Norman Wheeler, saying "I have no qualms whatever about turning the water on," said he wanted village attorney Jack Whorton present at the next trustees' meeting, as well as DiPaolo's attorney, Ron Harris, to see the decision "is done right."

Harris said Jack Parnell, chairman of Planning and Zoning, was "in error" when he ruled the All American Estates is "not a

Lincoln County Fair opens Friday

The 1977 Lincoln County Fair will be held in Capitan at the fair building tomorrow and Saturday.

Events get underway tomorrow at 8 a.m., with the judging of swine, beef cattle and sheep, followed at 10 a.m., by the judging of rabbits and poultry, junior home economics, open home economics, the flower show, art show, horticulture exhibits and junior horticulture exhibits.

Saturday a 7 a.m., breakfast will be served for all junior exhibitors in the fair building. At 8 a.m., the pet show will be held under the supervision of Carolyn Houck.

Pet show rules include — No species of animal shown in the fair may be entered.

Ribbons will be given for first through fifth place, with all other entries receiving honorable mention ribbons.

All pets must be restrained in some manner.

No unruly pets will be allowed. A determination of a pet's disposition will be made by Houck, and will be final. No

vicious, dangerous or poisonous animals will be allowed to enter.

Entries will be received starting at 7:45 a.m., Saturday in the show ring. The show begins at 8 a.m.

Ribbons will be awarded for: tallest dog, shortest dog, largest cat, smallest cat, pet with the longest tail, pet with the shortest tail, best groomed pet, pet that does the most tricks and most unusual pet.

Trophies will be given at 10:30 a.m.

At 11 a.m., Saturday, a special lead sheep class will be conducted, sponsored by "Sheep to Show." For both boys and girls of Lincoln County, this will be an event when the exhibitor will show at halter. Sheep can be of any age, breed or sex, and contestants will be judged as a pair on appearance and showmanship.

Prizes will be given for the first six places.

At 11:30 a.m., Saturday, the junior livestock sale will take place, with auctioneer Tom Filbin of Roswell. Dan Ware is chairman of the sale.

Rules are —

Exhibitors will be allowed to sell only two market animals, but under no circumstances can he or she sell more than one calf.

The sales committee may rule against an unworthy animal.

The sales committee will accept ad-

Exhibitors must decide to sell no later than 6 p.m., Friday if they wish to place their animal in the sale.

Animals not in sale between the following weights will be eligible for packer bids: Calves 900 to 1200 pounds, lambs 80 to 120 pounds and pigs 180 to 250 pounds.

The sales committee may accept or reject any or all packer bids. Packer bids will be stated before the sale and will apply to all sale animals.

All animals sold will remain the property of the exhibitor until delivered to the purchaser, and the exhibitor must assist with the delivery.

Animals may not be removed from the fair grounds until 4 p.m., Saturday, but packer animals will be released at 3 p.m.

The sales committee will be responsible for transporting sale animals to packers in Roswell and Glencoe.

Sales orders will be at the discretion

Brittons indicted

The Lincoln County Grand Jury Monday indicted Ronald Britton, 29, and his wife, Oralla Britton, 32, both of Ruidoso, on charges of abuse of a child resulting in the death of Ronald Britton's daughter Raquel, 18-months-old, August 12.

Arraignment for the Brittons was set for 1 p.m., today before Judge Thomas A. Sandenaw in District Court in Carrizozo.


Britton has been free after posting \$500 cash bond while Mrs. Britton has remained in Lincoln County jail in lieu of a \$50,000 bond.

The Grand Jury indictment charged that the defendants "did commit the offense of

abuse of a child resulting in death, in that (they) did knowingly, intentionally or negligently, and without justifiable cause, cause or permit Raquel Britton, a child, to be placed in a situation that endangered the child's life or health, or tortured, cruelly confined or cruelly punished the child, resulting in the death of the child . . ."

Testifying before the Grand Jury were Dr. W. D. Horton, Jack Valliant, Hugh Siles, Mrs. Robert Rankin, Shawn Rankin and Ronald Britton.

Autopsy results, from the state Office of the Medical Investigator, said, "death was due to child abuse."

A-A Derby set Sunday

Should Harold Burford's colt, My Easy Credit win Sunday's \$750,000 All-American Derby, he'll become the first horse in the history of Ruidoso Downs to win the triple crown for three-year-olds. Aside from having won seven of his nine starts this year, My Easy Credit has already knocked off the Kansas and Rainbow Derbies, the first two legs of the prestigious never before reached crown.

The chestnut colt, trained by Walter Merrick, one of the pillars of quarter horse racing, has not only earned over \$249,000 in his two year career, he is in solid contention for national honors as three-year-old of the year. If he can win the Derby he will probably be the undisputed favorite for the title.

My Easy Credit went into the All-American Derby trials last week coming off an astonishing ninth place finish in the World's Championship Classic July 24. The colt seemed to take forever to leave the starting gate and by the time he did it was

all over. Undaunted, he went off at less than even odds in the trials and raced nose to nose with Shawne Bug, down to the wire. In an exciting photo finish, Shawne Bug came out victorious, by less than a nose, and set the fastest qualifying time of 22.01 for the 440 yard distance. My Easy Credit set the second fastest time at 22.02 1/2.

My Easy Credit has now won 13 of his 19 career starts, has placed twice, and shown once. Going into the World's Championship Classic, he was undefeated in seven starts and had not lost a race since a year ago August.

The colt will go into the finale of the Derby as the probable public choice, but may have some stiff competition from Shawne Bug, Azure Three or Double Knit. Shawne Bug, owned by Arthur Levis of Tucson, Arizona, is by no means poor himself. The colt has earned \$145,855 while putting together a lifetime record of 15-1-5 from 22 outings. This year he's been to the starting gate 10 times, has won 8 of those

starts and placed third twice.

Frustrated in both the Kansas and the Rainbow Derbies, Shawne Bug looks bent on revenge in the All-American. In both previous derbies, Shawne Bug ran third to My Easy Credit. He's had little problem in knocking off all his trials and picked up a derby win at Centennial Racetrack in Colorado. The speedy colt, who'll probably be ridden by regular jockey Richard Vaughn, will have to share public sentiment with My Easy Credit when the mutual windows open Sunday.

Double Knit, a filly, is no slouch when it comes to making money either. Owned by Henry Griffin of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, she's earned over \$61,000 and this year has won four of her five starts, three of those straight wins at Delta Downs in Louisiana. Double Knit set the fifth fastest time in the trials at 22.28. She was ridden by Harold Romero.

Another imported contender is Azure Three, a gelding who's been winning in

Derby circles at Los Alamitos in California. He's owned by C. L. Slewert of Lubbock, Texas, and has earned a very respectable \$89,287 and has not finished out of the money in his eight starts this year.

Azure Three ran third in the World's Championship Classic and knocked off the Los Alamitos Derby May 28. He also ran second to Real Wind in the West Texas Derby at Sunland Park. His record now stands at 5-1-2 from 8 starts.

Jerry Nicodemus, who rode Azure Three to the win in the Los Alamitos Derby was the qualifying jockey. He also qualified Easy Dandy Dan and it is not known at this time which finalist he will ride.

The purse for the All-American Derby is an unprecedented \$750,000 with \$253,000 slated for the winner. The Derby is also now the undisputed second richest horse race in the world, second only to its sister race, the million dollar All-American Futurity.

Ruidoso policeman charged in shooting

Robert B. McMillin, 29, a Ruidoso police patrolman since May of 1976, was charged with aggravated battery by the Criminal Investigation Division (CID) of the Ruidoso Police Department Wednesday, following an early Wednesday morning incident in which Sam Sanchez, 31, Ruidoso, was shot in the right hand.

In a first appearance in Magistrate's Court, Division III, before Judge Jim

Wheeler Wednesday afternoon on the charges, McMillin's bond was set at \$10,000 with 10 percent allowed and McMillin is at liberty after posting \$1,000.

Judge Wheeler imposed the following conditions upon McMillin, under which he was permitted to post the 10 percent of the bond: McMillin is not to contact his wife, Beverly; he is not to contact Sanchez; he is not to leave the state of New Mexico and he

is to turn all firearms owned by him, or under his control, over to the CID.

McMillin filed an affidavit of indigency in Judge Wheeler's court, with the judge ruling that he was a "needy person."

McMillin is to appear in Magistrate's Court, Ruidoso, for a preliminary hearing within 21 days, Judge Wheeler said, "unless the matter is acted on by the Lincoln County Grand Jury."

The CID report of the shooting alleges

that shortly after 2 a.m., Wednesday Sanchez was reportedly shot in the right hand, at or near the McMillin residence in Ponderosa Heights, allegedly from a 9 m.m. Browning automatic weapon reportedly fired by McMillin. The number of shots fired had not been determined by the CID Wednesday.

McMillin was arrested at his residence by a Ruidoso police patrolman and was held in custody at the Ruidoso jail until

appearing before Judge Wheeler.

Sanchez was reported to be in satisfactory condition in Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital Wednesday afternoon, after being admitted early that morning.

The CID reported that Mrs. McMillin (Beverly), 29, was hospitalized for shock and observation and that she remained hospitalized Wednesday in satisfactory condition. The CID also reported that McMillin was treated at the emergency

room of the Ruidoso hospital Wednesday morning for migraine headache, nausea and vomiting.

The complaint of aggravated battery, filed by CID, is a third degree felony, punishable by from two to 10 years in the state penitentiary.

McMillin, Ruidoso Chief of Police Paul Lukens said late Wednesday, has been "suspended from duty until this matter has been resolved."

School registration schedules set

With September 6 and the start of school rapidly approaching, the Ruidoso School System principals have announced schedules, orientations and new teachers.

For grades nine through 12, a parents' meeting will be held at 7 p.m. tonight in the high school library to discuss graduation requirements, class schedules and school policies. Tom Hansen, principal, said "We are hoping for a big turnout."

He also requested all high school students be in the gym by 8:45 a.m., September 6 for a general meeting to discuss rule changes including the stricter attendance policy, registration procedures and to introduce new staff.

Immediately after the general meeting, seniors will register, followed by juniors at about 10:30, sophomores about 1 p.m., and freshmen around 2:30. Students will be allowed to leave after they have registered.

At White Mountain Middle School, grades six, seven and eight will be registered individually on separate days.

Eighth grade will register from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m., Tuesday, September 6, seventh grade will register from 8 a.m. to noon September 7 and sixth grade will register from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m., September 7, all in the gymnasium.

New students may register September 8 in the office.

Principal Sid Miller urged "all parents to accompany their children and take part in the registration."

Students will be allowed to go home after registering, but must arrange their own transportation.

A regular schedule of classes, and operation of bus routes, will be followed September 8.

Miller also said students who could not register at the assigned times could reschedule their registration by contacting his office.

"We have reorganized our school system in Ruidoso. As a result of this reorganization and with the new building

facilities at White Mountain, we are able to provide programs which may not have been possible in the past," Miller said.

"With fewer numbers of students and better facilities we can create a school which will excite and inspire students, one which will require them to learn and a curriculum which will challenge their intellect."

Kindergarten registration will continue through September 6 in the office of Nob Hill School, Don Weems, principal, announced. To register, the child must be five years of age before September 5, and at the time of registration must bring a birth certificate and shot record.

At White Mountain Elementary, principal Mike Gladden said supply lists will be published in the near future.

This year at the high school, all seniors will be required to take a six hour class schedule regardless of the hours needed to graduate.

"Even if they lack one credit, seniors will have to take a six hour schedule," Hansen said "Unless they are in Distributive Education or we can work out an arrangement with their parents."

Classes at the high school will begin September 7. New this year are social anthropology, applied English II and III, comparative politics and economics, humanities, music directed study (advanced vocal, instrument or individualized vocal, instrument), lifetime sports (coed PE), health and ecology, beginning guitar, conversational Spanish and jazz-rock band.

A choral program will be offered and Hansen encouraged parents "to channel kids with talent into the class."

legal subdivision.

Harris said the plat for the Estates was automatically approved last year when the trustees failed to act on it within 30 days of receiving it for review, after Planning and Zoning had approved it. Wheeler was not aware that this had happened, and said he had seen only a preliminary plat.

DiPaolo said hydrants and water lines are in now. When Planning and Zoning considered action on the Estates August 1, they ruled it was not a legal subdivision for reasons including that streets and fire hydrants had not been installed.

DiPaolo said the lines will withstand 100 pounds of pressure, but Wheeler said Fire Chief Ray Walker had tested them and reported they would not hold enough pressure to fight a fire.

But, Wheeler, said, "We'll open the lines later this week and check it out... I see no reason why it (the subdivision) couldn't be accepted."

DiPaolo said he has had an engineering firm check the lines, that a state environmentalist has approved them, and that the Downs Water Department has seen and approved them.

"This delay is costing me money," DiPaolo said. "I'm not satisfied."

In other action, the three trustees present ("Boots" Nelson was absent)—

— Voted to adopt an ordinance approving the franchise by which Cablevision of Lincoln County operates within the village.

— Approved the appointment of Mrs. J. C. Florence Harris to the Planning and Zoning Commission. Wheeler immediately administered the oath of office.

— Received the resignation of John Brillante as garbage collector for the village.

— Approved an occupation license for Holiday Mobile Homes.

— Named assistant clerk Louise Meyer as village hall janitor, at a salary of \$125 a month.

— Voted to call for bids on workmen's compensation, as the present policy expires in November.

The resource experts will be starting their work in September. They would appreciate hearing from any persons or organizations interested in regional and local history and hope to be able to get in touch with as many as possible in order to share and coordinate information and ideas. Course on alcoholism at Mescalero

An introductory course on alcohol and alcoholism will be offered tonight at 7 by the Mescalero Apache Alcohol Education and Rehabilitation Center.

The class will take place in the activity hall at the Community Center.

Silas Cochise, director of the center, said the National Council on Alcoholism has estimated there are 2.5 million untreated alcoholics in the United States, and an estimated total of 10 million.

He said economic losses (lost production, medical and health expenses, criminal justice costs, welfare payments, motor vehicle accidents, alcohol programs and research) amount to over 25 billion dollars in a year, due to alcohol.

Alcoholism, he said, "has been variously described as an allergy, a physical disease, an addiction, a mental illness. There is uncertainty as to whether the disorder is an entity or if it is a symptom."

"It is important ... to know that the experts agree on one major point — alcoholism is not related to willful misconduct ... The alcoholic knows deeply that something much more complicated is the matter with him than just the fact of drinking."

The program is open to the public, including employers and families.

Church of the Holy Mount sets new aumery dedication Sunday

A handcarved walnut aumery, made by Walter Rawley, will be dedicated Sunday at the Episcopal Church of the Holy Mount.

The aumery, a wall cupboard in which the holy oils and consecrated bread and wine are kept, was commissioned about a year ago by William Davies of Waco, Texas, Father Delbert Achuff, pastor of the church, said.

The aumery unites two of Rawley's skills, woodcarving and bronze casting. Rawley, who has done numerous religious figures, crosses and other symbols, said he developed a new concept with the aumery.

Instead of cutting away the wood behind the cross in the usual manner, he dug the cross into the walnut several inches, then placed the bronze figure of Christ within the sunken cross.

Rawley said this represented, to him,

"The complete submission ... The sacrifice is contained within the total of Christianity."

It took him about a year to complete the aumery, although he had cast the figure earlier. Once the carving was finished,

June Rawley, the artist's wife, lined the aumery with linen and lace.

Mrs. Rawley is the chairman of the Alter Guild at the church.

Hospital laboratory services vital to patients

Well equipped and able to provide skilled services 24 hours a day, the laboratory at the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) plays a key role in the diagnosis and treatment of diseases.

Chris Schneider is the lab supervisor. A Nebraska native, he is a member of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists (ASCP) and is certified by the organization.

As far as equipment goes, he said, "For a small hospital we're pretty modern... We have automated machinery that does our blood counts and chemistries. We still do a small amount of hand testing.

"We probably are capable of doing 90 percent of the tests the doctors require to diagnose a patient's problems."

The remaining tests, Schneider said, "we send off to the reference labs," as the one at Presbyterian Hospital Center in Albuquerque. For infrequently used tests, this results in a savings — sometimes substantial — for the patient.

Equipment in the RHVH lab includes a cell counter, used in checking blood cell counts. There is an Abbott 50 blood chemistry machine, microscopes, incubators and special refrigerators to keep a constant temperature and sound a warning bell if it deviates.

Who can utilize the services of the lab? Schneider said the only test the lab can perform without a doctor's orders is a premarital blood test. But a doctor must review the results for the test to be legal.

Services are available to all patients in the hospital, with doctor's orders, as well as to outpatients with doctor's orders.

In the event a patient is bedridden or for some other reason cannot come to the lab to have a test, an arrangement can be made with Home Health Services through

Verna Stoltzfus, RN, to have the sample taken in the patient's home.

The test most commonly done at the lab, Schneider said, is the Complete Blood Count (CBC), routinely used for admission to the hospital as it is helpful in diagnosing numerous common ailments.

Urine analyses are also frequently performed, he said, to detect infection and sugar diabetes.

A variety of chemistry tests are regularly done, checking blood sugar levels, enzyme levels and electrolyte activity.

Less common — but still vital — is cross matching blood. In this procedure, technicians combine samples of blood from the patient and the donor to determine compatibility. "We have occasion to do this about one time a month... we probably cross match blood about three times more than they use it."

Bacterial cultures are not infrequent in the lab, and are done to discover what bacterium is causing infections, sore throats and other conditions.

Veterinarians also provide some work for the lab, "especially in the summer," Schneider said. Although animals are not often subject to the same diseases as humans, he said, "they do have a lot of the same pathogens."

The RHVH lab is normally open from 7 a.m. till 6 p.m., and has a staff of three, although at present Schneider is seeking a lab technician. He is assisted by Janice Bizzell, American medical technologist.

During periods when the lab is closed, the staff takes turns coming in for emergency calls, averaging "at least one call a night," Schneider said.

Getting children to bed is harder than you think

Getting children to bed and the lights out on time seems to be a never ending chore, observes Leo Yates, Extension family life specialist at New Mexico State University.

Sleep doesn't come easily to all children. An overtired child can be more restless and may need help relaxing, Yates says.

It's a good idea to have a definite bedtime for children and to stick to it. A youngster who has trouble getting to sleep may find it relaxing to look at a book or listen to quiet music just before bedtime.

If your child does not have an afternoon rest period, encourage quiet activities late in the afternoon. This might be reading or coloring. For a child who is especially tired of tense after school, a before-dinner bath can have a soothing effect.

Some young children go through a stage of being afraid of the dark. If your child has these fears, offer reassurance. Your attitude can be more important than what you say.

Don't be impatient, make fun or try to argue the child out of the fears. Instead, permit a night light if the child wants it. Allow the bedroom door to remain open so that the child can hear you and not feel alone. Assure the child that you understand and that nothing will happen.

This is a time to give extra attention and comfort, not reprimands, Yates says.

Also try to avoid letting younger children see frightening movies or violent television programs. Choose cheerful stories or programs so they have a healthy effect on the imagination.

Remember the child who attends a preschool or school has a scheduled and an active life. Demands are made on the child's time and energy. This requires adequate rest at the right time.

How much sleep should children have? A pre-kindergarten child generally needs 10-12 hours per day, plus an afternoon rest or quiet period. The six to nine-year-old can often get by on 10-11 hours of sleep. By the time children reach 12 years, they generally need only nine hours. Children do differ in their sleep requirements and your child may need more or less sleep each day.

If you think your child is getting enough sleep and rest, but still seems tired, irritable and listless, take him to the doctor for a medical check-up. Fatigue in children can be a sign of anemia. This condition can usually be corrected by better nutrition and medication prescribed by your doctor.

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



Senator Domenici drafts anti-retirement legislation

"Mandatory and discriminatory retirement for the elderly will soon become as unacceptable as any other form of discrimination," U.S. Senator Pete Domenici forecast Friday.

Speaking to a meeting of the Lovington Senior Citizens Center, Domenici, ranking minority member of the Senate Special Committee on Aging, also predicted that legislation ending mandatory retirement clauses would be passed before the end of 1978.

"Mandatory retirement is an idea long out of date and long rejected by those who know that age rarely has anything to do with a person's desire and need to accomplish and work," Domenici said.

Domenici is the author of legislation now pending before the Senate Human Resources Committee that would end mandatory retirement.

"Ten years ago, hardly anyone questioned mandatory retirement and you rarely saw legislation even given hearings if it dealt with this subject. Now, the Human Resources Committee has before it five major proposals to end mandatory retirement and the kind of discrimination it entails," he said.

"We have seen too many great and good citizens produce too much for this nation in their 70's and 80's to seriously believe that mandatory retirement is a worthwhile concept, and even the opposition of labor is tempered by the fact that George Meany, its chief spokesman, is 82 years old and still as vibrant and aggressive as ever."

Domenici outlined the work of the Aging Committee and said that the addition of New Mexicans to the minority staff "will bring new action and a new vision to the committee's work."

Domenici has added New Mexicans Tony Arroyos and John Thompson to the staff and has made former New Mexico resident, Dr. Letitia Chambers, minority staff director.

"We have added men and women who understand the various complexities of aging problems and will bring a new interest in reform and oversight with them," Domenici noted.

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

SANTA FE — New Mexico district attorneys want consideration for a pay raise, Sen. Caleb Chandler, D-Clovis, told the Criminal Justice Study Committee.

Chairman J. M. Smalley, D-Hidalgo-Sierra-Luna, asked Chandler, Clovis assistant police chief, to look into district attorneys pay.

Charles Stockton and Charles Wade of Clovis were early recommendations for appointment by Gov. Jerry Apodaca to the Curry County commission to replace the late Dr. Ernest E. Kraus, D-Clovis, a retired veterinarian. Dr. Kraus suffered a fatal heart attack Aug. 15. Apodaca administrative assistant Robert Cooper said an appointment will not be made for a month, probably in September. The appointees will serve until the 1978 general election.

The State Park and Recreation Commission approved transfer of the Ute Lake State Park cafe concession from Arnold Wall, Logan, to Bill Hampton, Logan. The commission approved a request from a committee of Truth or Consequences and Sierra County representatives for the commission to lead an effort to locate water to replace 6,000 acre feet which evaporates annually from the permanent 60,000-acre feet pool at Elephant Butte Lake State Park.

The commission approved closing of Cochas Lake North Dock concession from Nov. 15 to Feb. 15. Closing will be for repairs, painting and maintenance. The north dock cafe will be closed after Labor Day weekend until Feb. 15. The commission approved transfer of the Cochas South Dock concession license from Cochas del Sur Ltd. to James A. Gilkenbeard, Anaheim, California. Approval was conditioned on both parties agreeing on sale terms.

The commission approved an amendment to a joint powers agreement between the commission and Air Force allowing moving of the Air Force training site at Elephant Butte Lake. A capital improvements program contract was awarded to Los Patios Inc., Corrales, for a new irrigation system, ball field, landscaping and water system at Kit Carson State Park, Taos.

Mimbres and Associates, Santa Fe, received an architectural contract at Ute Lake State Park to design a boat ramp, recreational vehicle camp site, roads and other improvements. The commission approved a \$3,000 soil and moisture conservation fund agreement between the state parks and U.S. Bureau of Reclamation for Heron Reservoir, Rio Arriba County, and a project plan for Northern Rio Grande Resource Conservation and Development District.

Dedication of Matias L. Chacon Memorial Visitors Center is set today (Thursday) at Heron Lake State Park. Gov. Jerry Apodaca was scheduled guest speaker. State Park Commission Chair-

man Phil Lovato, Taos, was set for welcoming remarks. The ceremony marked completion of a 2-year construction program. An Espanola attorney, Chacon was a legislator 17 years.

The Legislative School Study Committee heard a complaint from spokesman Jimmy Johnson of Santa Rosa against non-renewal of school bus driver contracts by the Santa Rosa School Board for Pat Quintana, Juan Tenorio, Luis Saiz and Frank Maestas. Quintana had been a school bus driver 18 years, Tenorio 20 years, Saiz 9 years and Maestas 11 years. State School Transportation Director Bill Loshbough said: "I have received numerous letters from parents and others in the Santa Rosa community supporting the services that these people had provided." Loshbough said: "Our office has not ratified any action of the local board at this point." Official notification of Santa Rosa board action had not been received. Loshbough said: "I was highly concerned when I read a newspaper account of the board's action, but on the advice of State Education Department counsel, I could take no action."

Arizona medical officials confirmed that a bobcat, killed by dogs on a ranch near Lordsburg, was rabid. The bobcat apparently attacked the dogs on the Cowan ranch. The head was taken to Sierra Vista Medical Center in Arizona and rabies was diagnosed.

Gov. Apodaca appointed Mrs. Mary Ann D. Gonzales of Questa as magistrate for Taos County Division 2. Her salary is \$5,425 a year. Mrs. Gonzales, a bookkeeper for Questa Lumber Co., replaced Felipe S. Ortega who resigned.

The State Highway Commission awarded a drainage contract for .227 of one mile in Quay County on NM-158 11 miles west of the NM-158-NM-96 junction to K. Barnett and Sons Inc., Clovis, for an apparent low bid of \$91,506. The engineer's estimate was \$95,484. A crushing and stockpiling contract in the Chama and Dulce vicinity in Rio Arriba County was awarded to McReynolds Construction Co., Espanola, for an apparent low bid of \$226,512.50. A contract for 5,334 miles of construction on NM-21 from Hachita north in Grant County was awarded to K. Barnett and Sons Inc. for an apparent low bid of \$428,870.60. The engineer's estimate was \$415,121.

A state geologist's office report said there are potentially adequate geothermal reservoirs for use to heat and cool state buildings at Lordsburg, Truth or Consequences, Los Alamos, Socorro, Canones and Las Cruces and possibly Belen, Albuquerque, Las Vegas, Grants and Gallup. The report said a region 12 miles from Lordsburg called the "Animas Hot Spot" has good potential to heat and cool facilities in Lordsburg and to produce electricity. Private companies are test drilling in the region.

proclaimed so proudly a little over a year earlier, was now facing possible collapse. Its commander in chief had not been able to protect the seat of government, and the Congress was in exile and appeared to be on the run. If General Burgoyne were able to defeat American forces in New York, the future would probably be even more bleak.

In Spanish New Mexico Santa Fe had been the capital almost from the beginning of Spanish settlement. Except for the period when the Pueblo Indians rose in rebellion in 1680 and threw the Spanish out, the city had been constantly in the hands of the Spanish. Bicentennial Notebook

PHILADELPHIA FALLS
 On September 18, 1777, the unthinkable happened. British forces under Lord Cornwallis occupied Philadelphia, the seat of government of the new American nation.
 General Washington had tried to protect the city, but he had been pushed back at the battle of Brandywine Creek on September 11. Another attack by the British on September 21 had routed American forces under General Anthony "MAD Anthony" Wayne at Paoli. Then the way to Philadelphia was open.
 Congress had anticipated this earlier and decided on the fourteenth to move to Lancaster, Pennsylvania, if that became necessary. Following Washington's defeat at Brandywine, efforts began in earnest to move Congress. Some members wanted to stay and resist, but most of them agreed that the capture by the British of the guiding body of the new nation would prove disastrous.
 Thomas Burke, a member of Congress, probably said it best: "The movement was made not by a Vote but by universal Consent, for every Member Consulted his own particular Safety."
 Throughout the night of September 18 members began to filter out of the city until by the morning of the 19th only a few remained behind. On the 26th Lord Cornwallis and his forces moved into the city.
 The following day, the 27th, a quorum was present at Lancaster so that business could be conducted. One session was held where the members decided to move again, this time across the Susquehanna River to York, Pennsylvania. The reasons may have included more comfortable quarters, but historian E. C. Burnett was probably right when he said, "It was deemed the part of wisdom to put a good-sized river, in addition to miles, between them and the British army."
 This was obviously a dark period for the American cause. The new government,

Jockey/Trainer of the week

Carlos Rivas returned to his winning ways to once again pick up Jockey-of-the-Week honors at Ruidoso Downs. Rivas placed in seven winners over the weekend to up his winning total to 75. He is now within five wins of the total he racked up last year.

Rivas made 18 attempts over the weekend and also scored two seconds. His current marks now stand at 73-43-45 from 293 tries.

The record for most wins at Ruidoso Downs is 90, set by Larry Byers in 1971. At this point Rivas has a good chance of surpassing that total.

His first two wins of the week came Wednesday aboard Funny Money in the fourth race and Swap Out in the sixth. He knocked off one Thursday and two Friday, both for trainer Jolly Driskill. Rivas finished Saturday with two more, the first on Dealer's Delight in the seventh and the second on Innovator in the ninth.

Willie Lovell, who remains second in the standings, turned in four victories from 18 outings. He also notched two seconds and five thirds to up his season total to 51-50-35 out of 304 tries.

Jackie Martin also scored four wins over the weekend after going to the post 17 times. His effort moved him into third place in the jockey standings, two wins ahead of Gary Sumpter.

Trainer-of-the-Week honors were picked up by Billy Powell who recorded three wins from eight starts.

An early morning post time will be set for Friday to accommodate a large number of trials for the All-American Futurity. Action will probably get underway at 9 a.m.

Saturday the spotlight will be on the Ruidoso Sprint Championship, a \$10,000-added six furlong event for three-year-olds and up, plus the \$24,175 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby at 1-16th miles.

The highlight of the weekend will come Sunday with the rich \$760,000 All-American Derby. My Easy Credit, who's won the first two legs of the triple crown for three-year-olds, will be making his bid to become the first triple crown winner in the history of Ruidoso Downs.



AFTER 58 RACE DAYS and 726 races, the 1977 handle is \$23,213,250; daily average wagering \$393,445 and per race average \$31,606. Last year after 58 race days and 698 races, the handle was \$21,061,501, daily average \$303,474 and per race average \$30,203. The current daily wagering average is up 3.24 percent over 1976.

IN SATURDAY'S FIRST RACE, Miss Bold Bunny, with Darrel Blevins aboard, went down after crossing the finish line. The filly broke both legs after finishing fifth in the 400 yard dash and had to be destroyed. Darrel Blevins, who had been injured in a spill two months ago, was apparently not injured and walked back to the jockey room.

MATT'S ALIBHAL, a recent claiming acquisition of Barbara and Lionel Bevan and Emily Parker of Ft. Worth, became the third horse to win five outings at the Ruidoso meeting. He won Saturday's 10th race by a neck after turning on a tremendous stretch run. The gelding went off at 3-1 odds and paid \$3.20, \$3.60 and \$2.80. Ruben Bustamante was up.

ZIGANA AGAIN, a seven-year-old mare, won a mile route in Thursday's fourth race by an impressive four lengths as a 10-1 outsider. The mare led from start to finish and paid \$21.00, \$10.20 and \$4.20. She was ridden by apprentice jockey Michael Jackson.

THREE APPRENTICE JOCKEYS now riding at the Ruidoso oval have been faring exceptionally well. Don Howard has been out 27 times and has put together a 4-2-5 record. Michael Jackson who began riding July 28, has a 5-2-7 tally from 37 attempts, and Phil Urioste has put together a record of 6-12-3 out of 82 trips to the starting gate.

SNEAK ATTACK, who was disqualified from a win after the state chemist found traces of cocaine in his urine, has been declared fit and capable of performing without medication. Owner Steve Van Beber has been suspended and denied the privileges of the grounds for "sending a prohibited drug to the stable area of Ruidoso Downs." His case has been referred to the New Mexico State Racing Commission.

TRAINER TERRY ALLISON has been hit with a \$150 fine and put on probation for the balance of the meeting for "conduct unbecoming a trainer." Owner-trainer Charles Allison was tagged with a \$250 fine and put on probation for participating in an altercation. Jockey Richard Vaughn was fined \$50 for failure to maintain a straight course during the running of the third race August 17. Jockey Ruben Bustamante was hit with a \$50 tab for being the aggressor in an altercation which took place in the jockey quarter after the running of the 10th race, August 14.

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Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

Ruidoso Downs Publicity Department MY EASY CREDIT, the phenomenal colt who's won two legs of the triple crown for three-year-olds, proved that his loss in the World's Championship Classic was a fluke. Friday he set the second fastest qualifying time for the \$760,000 All-American Derby which will be run Sunday. My Easy Credit ran nose to nose with Shawne Bug down to the wire. Shawne Bug won the trial by less than a nose and set the fastest qualifying time for the 440 yard finale. His time was 22.01. My Easy Credit came in at 22.02 1/2.

Here's the field in order of qualifying times: 1 — Shawne Bug, 22.01; 2 — My Easy Credit, 22.02 1/2; 3 — Tinky Decketta, 22.12 1/2; 4 — Easy Dandy Dan, 22.25; 5 — Double Knit, 22.26; 6 — Moonmobile, 22.27; 7 — Roll A Coin, 22.28; 8 — Go Go Junior, 22.31 1/2; 9 — Good Old Joe, 22.32; 10 — Azure Three, 22.33.

REAL WIND, last year's All-American Futurity winner, won her trial for the All-American Derby but did not make the final due to a slow qualifying time. However, she won impressively against Megahertz who ran fifth in the All-American Futurity last year.

TINKY DECKETTA, who qualified for the finale with the third fastest time, won her trial by the widest margin. The filly finished 2 1/2 lengths in front of Southern Streaker at less than even odds. She was ridden by Dave Morris.

THE PURSE for the All-American Derby is an all-time high of \$760,000 making it the second richest race in the world, immediately behind the All-American Futurity which boasts a staggering purse of \$1,000,000. The winner of the Derby will receive a fat check for \$233,000. Last year the winner picked up \$188,000.

TEN 2-YEAR-OLD quarter horses have been "supplemented" to this Friday's elimination trials for the \$1 million All-American Futurity.

The cost of the nomination, at this late stage of the game, is \$14,250. Last year, the All-American drew seven late nominees.
