## County lowers mill rate on all property

The three Lincoln County commissioners voted during their Monday meeting to lower taxes for all property tax payers by 1.918 mills, the equivalent of \$130,000, effective with 1977 taxes.

John Suddeth, commission chairman, said the amount shaved off the county mill levy represented about 25 percent of total county taxes.

The commissioners will use federal "payment in lieu of taxes" funds in place of the tax revenues. The lowering of the rate has already been approved by the state's Department of Finance and Administration (DFA).

The Certificate of Tax Levies issued recently for Lincoln County by the DFA shows that without exception, all school districts and villages within the county have lower tax rates than in fiscal 1976.

The bottom line of the certificate, showing totals for each village and school district for state, county, municipal and school district levies, indicates that the overall tax rate will be lower for everyone this fiscal year.

A breakdown of the changes in levies shows:

— The state rate is up from 4.104 mills to 4.152.

— The county levy is down from 7.918 to 6.000.

— In the villages, mill rates are: Ruidoso, up from 25.017 to 26.533; Ruidoso Downs, down from 12.190 to 10.533; Carrizozo, down from 23.722 to 8.902; Corona, no change from last year's 2.225; Capitan, down from 19.803 to 15.476.

— In school districts, mill rates are: Ruidoso, down from 17.884 to 17.199; Carrizozo, up from 15.924 to 17.120; Corona, down from 11.631 to 11.517; Hondo, up from 13.693 to 14.070; and Capitan, down from 10.946 to 10.226.

Also down is the county-wide predatory control district levy, paid by ranchers, from 17.074 to 12.528 mills.

In other business, the commissioners tabled for the time being action on participation in the National Flood Insurance

Program, after consideration of potential pitfalls.

To qualify for the insurance, the county would have to adopt a strict set of construction standards — so strict, county manager Les Olson said, that in the Hondo Valley "future construction would be absurd. . . You'd have basements sticking up above the ground."

County participation in the federal program was first proposed to the commissioners by Hondo Valley residents.

Olson said, "There have been objections to the standards developed by the United States Corps of Engineers, because they are so stringent. They have refused to lift them."

The standards include that all basements or first floors of newly constructed buildings be above the base flood line, that floodproof materials be used in construction and that all mobile homes be firmly anchored — as well as that evacuation procedures be developed. These and other details, commissioners felt, would result in construction delays.

"I think we ought to approach this very cautiously," Suddeth said, and asked commissioner George "Shorty" Stoneman to consult the Valley residents, including Ken Noaker, who brought the idea forward.

Commissioner Lee Straley said, concerning the program, "I think it's a step in the right direction, but —"

The proposal will be considered again when Stoneman brings back a report.

Other action included —

— Awarding to Clark Fire Apparatus of Albuquerque, low bidder, a contract to supply the Hondo Fire Department with a fire engine on a lease-purchase plan. The total cost of the engine will be \$56,452.

The Thunderbird Sales Corporation, Albuquerque, was the low bidder on an engine for the Bonito Fire Department, and their \$46,122 lease-purchase bid was accepted at the recommendation of Bonito fire chief John Hall and his engine purchase committee.

Clark and Thunderbird were the only bidders on both engines.

— Voting to award to Perrett-Parks & Associates, Ruidoso, the contract to supply the county with workmen's compensation insurance for a year, at a cost of \$8,606.25. Perrett-Parks was the sole bidder. Olson said there is little change in the cost from last year, as rates have remained the same.

— Approving a contract earmarking \$26,000 for the Farm and Range Improvement Fund, with the United States Department of the Interior, the state's Fish and Wildlife Service's Division of Animal Control and the state's Department of Agriculture.

## Inn names new general manager

John Dettloff, formerly of Albuquerque, has assumed his duties as general manager of the Inn of the Mountain Gods, Wendell Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache Tribe (MAT), has announced.

He succeeds Walt Lindborg, general manager of the Inn since its opening, who tendered his resignation to Chino effective this month. "I will be remaining in Ruidoso," Lindborg said, "as I am interested in this area and in being a part of the community."

Dettloff has 16 years experience in the hotel and resort management field, starting at the Brown Palace Hotel in Denver, Colorado.

In 1965 he joined American Factors Limited, one of the world's largest operators of hotel and resort properties, and with this company he managed several hotels in Hawaii, including the luxury Kaanapali Beach Hotel complex on the island of Maui.

As resident manager of the Silverado Resort and Country Club in Napa, California, he operated a hotel, two golf courses, an eight-court tennis complex and five swimming pools.

Since 1975, he has served as general manager of the Airport Marina Hotel in

Albuquerque.

Dettloff was born in Illinois, and grew up in Colorado Springs and Denver. He studied hotel and resort management at Denver University.

About the Inn, Dettloff said, "This place is magnificent. . . It has the location and the amenities to become one of the prime resorts in the country."

"With our many sports facilities, I would hope that we can set up tournaments for the spring and fall season, in skeet and trap shooting, golf and riding events."

The internationally known Inn holds the prestigious Mobil Four-Star rating.

"The Mescalero Apache Tribe is in the recreation business in a big way," Chino said. "We are proud of our facilities and determined that they shall continue to be second to none."

Dettloff, who will make his home in Ruidoso, served until his move to the Inn as president of the Albuquerque Innkeepers Association, is a member of the Association Internationale des Skis Clubs and of the Hotel Sales Management Association, and is involved with the New Mexico Hotel-Motel Association and with the New Mexico Special Olympic Program.

## Airport jammed over weekend

The Ruidoso Municipal Airport, manager Tim Morris told The News Wednesday, "was closed to all incoming traffic at 2 p.m., Labor Day and aircraft would return to Roswell and then fly to Ruidoso on a space available basis."

From September 1-6 710 operations were

logged here.

A total of 102 airplanes were parked at one time.

"It was," Morris said, "a brisk weekend at the gas pumps as we delivered 5,192 gallons of 100 octane and 3,617 gallons of jet fuel, totaling 8,809 gallons to set a record."

## Artesia youth safe after lightning killed his horse

George Winkley Jr., 16, Artesia, was reported as "going fine" Tuesday morning in an El Paso hospital after suffering burns at the time a bolt of lightning struck and killed the horse he was riding Sunday afternoon on the O Bar O Ranch east of Carrizozo, Lincoln County Sheriff Bill Elliott announced Wednesday.

The youth was riding with his father and a brother at the time of the incident.

Elliott stated that, following notification of the accident at 5:46 p.m., Sunday, he "commanded the rescue from the Ruidoso Sheriff's office via radio," and that the "tense nightmare ended" at 12:30 a.m., Sunday.

Details of the operation, released by Elliott, involved the cooperation of several law enforcement officers, MAST personnel and individuals, "all of whom I commend highly."

Sequences of the rescue, related by Elliott, included:

— Organization of the MAST operation by New Mexico State Patrolman (NMSP) Kent Waller, district coordinator of Search and Rescue in Lincoln County.

— Guided by Bill Willmeat, Forest Service technician Tim Livingston, deputy sheriffs Jay McSwane and Dan Watson and Robert Whinnery, a Mounted

Patrolman of Hobbs, traveled by four-wheel drive vehicle and on foot to reach Winkley and administer first aid.

— Information on progress was relayed to the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital and Air Traffic Control in Alamogordo by Ross Schwarz, Ruidoso Emergency Medical Technician.

— On the scene communication with Sheriff Elliott was maintained through radio contact by Forest Service

technicians Jim Paxon, Ruidoso, and Livingston.

— Lighting to guide the rescue team was provided by NMSP Dale Housley, ambulances and patrol cars.


— The helicopter landing site and ambulance area was established by Bud Payne and Bill Miller of the Carrizozo Ambulance Service with deputy sheriff Dave Vermillion manning the radio.

— The MAST helicopter, unable to land

in Ruidoso to refuel due to a severe rain storm, landed at Carrizozo and relayed rescue procedures to the men at the scene. After refueling at Holloman Air Force Base, the helicopter returned and, utilizing a litter, raised the youth into the machine for the flight to El Paso.

A tense moment, Elliott said, was at the time Forest Service personnel "had one flare left to mark the spot to lift the victim" into the hovering helicopter.

## Hot Idea grabs All-American handily



HOT IDEA WINNING 1977 All-American Futurity with solid lead.

Hot Idea, a filly who'd brought an unbelievably low \$4,000 in last year's All-American Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs, now ranks as one of the great bargain horses in turf history.

The filly paid off like a broken slot machine Labor Day by roaring down 440 yards of straightaway at Ruidoso and finishing first by 1 1/4 lengths in the \$1,030,000 All-American Futurity.

The victory slice of the world's richest purse came out to \$330,000, thus wrapping up a remarkable longshot success story.

"I just had a feeling we were going to win this one," explained a highly-elated Floyd Jackson of Lockney, Texas. "Before the race, I said to myself: 'This just might be the time'."

Jackson, in partnership with his son-in-law, Ted Bruce of Estelline, Texas, are the owners of Hot Idea. Jackson farms about 4,500 acres and Bruce oversees 1,600 acres. The most they'd ever spent for a racehorse was \$9,000.

Adding to the rags-to-riches aspect is the fact Hot Idea went through the sale arena with a crooked front leg — a deformity which undoubtedly contributed to her depressed price. But Jackson noted the real reason she didn't bring any huge

figure was because "she was so small, she looked like a sparrow."

But they went for the filly, anyway, strictly on the urging of trainer Gene Tefertiller. "Before the sale, I looked at this filly, and I looked at her again, and there was something about her that just got my attention," a nearly overwhelmed Tefertiller recalled after that stunning All-American win. "I could see she had that crooked leg, but it didn't bother me. There was something about the look in her eye. And I was very much impressed by her dam, Coquette. That's what really sold me on her."

So Tefertiller sweet-talked and arm-twisted for all he was worth, and Jackson and Bruce tossed in the winning bid. After the hammer fell, Jackson turned to his partner, and quipped sarcastically: "Well, we just blew \$4,000."

In winning the All-American, Hot Idea proved that crooked leg was no impediment. (Earlier this year, a cast was placed on her leg to straighten out the limb, but all that did was leave a long and readily-apparent "scar.") The filly, in all likelihood, will go down in the history books as having won the All-American with the least imposing record and the

skimpiest money line of any previous winner.

The filly, who is by Aforethought (sire of Timeto Thinkrich, the '73 All-American winner), went into the All-American with only two previous outs. She won both — including her All-American trial heat. She polished off the latter by three lengths. Her money line, prior to her Labor Day win, was a paltry \$2,460.

But despite her ostensibly lackluster credentials, the filly was no outsider in the All-American. The overflow throng of 15,600 — one of the biggest in Ruidoso history — made the filly a 7-2 shot.

Here's the way they drew into the race (post position order, followed by odds): 1 — Kita Bar None (\$31.50-1); 2 — Town Policy (\$2.60-1); 3 — Stoa Minga (\$3.10-1); 4 — Jun Jun Ni (\$6.40-1); 5 — Gambling Streak (\$24.20-1); 6 — Biffy Pass (\$5.10-1); 7 — Junes Feature (\$32.20-1); 8 — Medley Glass (-15.20-1); 9 — Hot Idea (\$3.60-1); 10 — Call Me Gotta (\$12.40-1).

# Easy Kiss wins by head in rich first consolation

They say great events cast their shadows before them and that certainly was the case in the first consolation of the All-American Futurity.


The first consolation was won by Easy Kiss. Terry Lipham was the rider. Gene Tefertiller was the trainer.

The following day, the same combination of Lipham and Tefertiller accounted for the stunning success of Hot Idea in the Labor Day grand finale of the world's richest horse race.

Easy Kiss, the property of the Gentry Brothers of Lubbock, Texas, collected \$21,000 out of the first consolation purse of \$136,000. The red roan filly was timed in 22.23 seconds for 440 yards on a "good" track. She paid \$20.80 to win. Easy Kiss is by Easy Jet out of Cute Kiss.

The second consolation, offering a gross of \$66,000, went to Bo Moon, also by a head. The track was muddy, and the time was 22.25. The chestnut gelding was piloted by Ronnie Banks for W. O. Moon Jr., of Chickasha, Oklahoma. First was worth \$8,700. Fans who backed the gelding to win collected \$13. The breeding line is Moon Is Sport out of Local Queen.

The \$32,000 third consolation was taken by Luck's Image Girl by three-quarter lengths. Benny Nelson was up. The bay filly (What Luck — Mackay's Image) is owned by the Travis Ranch of Norman, Oklahoma. First was worth \$4,100. The time was 22.35 and the win payoff was \$7.80.

Me Gotta, 22.94; Medley Glass, 22.27; James Feature, 22.32; Jun Jun Ni, 22.33.

When starter Dean Turpitt pushed the button, Town Policy came flying out of the No. 2 slot. Jun Jun Ni also had big early punch and appeared ready to turn in a knockout performance.

Hot Idea also got away without incident and quickly shifted into high gear. Jockey Terry Lipham steered the filly slightly to the outside. As the field flashed over the initial hundred yards, it was Town Policy showing the way and moving with great desire. Jockey Ken Hart asked the people's lukewarm choice for all he had and the gelding obviously was eager to please.

Stoa Minga, a lightly-raced filly who was expected to give Town Policy a run for his money, may have gotten nudged slightly on the first jump. But the filly appeared to give in without much fight and quickly dissolved into the pack.

Town Policy flashed over the half-way point, still showing the way, and it began to appear he just might hit the finish line with his sixth straight win against no defeat. But that dream took a shaky turn when Hot Idea launched her main bid. The filly generated a ton of speed on the far outside, and with about 100 yards to go, it was apparent Town Policy stood no chance of holding her off. The filly caught the lead with that overpowering blitz, added another dose of octane, and went soaring into that 1 1/2-length victory gap.

The filly clocked the 440 yards in an excellent 21.75 seconds. The night before heavy rains had hit the track, so the running surface was listed as heavy.

In the post-race interview, Lipham had this observation: "This is the greatest feeling in the world. I've finished, second, third, fourth, fifth and last twice. You always dream about winning this one. It means so much to a jockey. I never got the feeling I got today when we crossed the finish line."

"I've won several \$100,000 and \$200,000 races but they're just like any other horse race. This one is special."

Lipham added that Hot Idea is "a beautiful horse to ride." He said all one has to do is "get her going in the right direction, then hang on."

The filly, when not racing, has quite a short fuse. "She can be pretty ornery," Jackson said. "She likes to bite. She likes to kick. You'll never get me in the stall with her."

Town Policy, owned by the well-known Idaho sportsman, Ivan Axzment, hung on gamely for second and earned \$138,000. The gelding hit the wire 1/4 lengths in front of Call Me Gotta. The latter, owned by Charles Mitchell of Mobile, Alabama, earned \$64,000.

The mutual payoffs: Hot Idea — \$9.20, \$4.80, \$3.80; Town Policy — \$4.80, \$3.20; Call Me Gotta — \$5.20.

Here's the remaining order of finish: 4th — Jun Jun Ni (owned by Bill R. Brooks of Blanchard, Oklahoma, earning \$45,000); 5th — Gambling Streak (John L. Arnold and Patty Alexander of Plano, Texas, \$36,000); 6th — Stoa Minga (C. L. Stewart and Sons, Incorporated, of Lubbock, Texas, \$34,000); 7th — Medley Glass (Lo-Pa, Incorporated, of Houston, Texas, \$32,000); 8th — James Feature (Gordon Howell of Sunland Park, \$31,000); 9th — Biffy Pass (E. Wayne and James H. Johnson of Lufkin, Texas, \$29,000); 10th — Kita Bar None (Gregory E. Huckins and H. M. Bastian of Wichita, Kansas, \$27,000).

Three of the finalists were late supplemental nominees (August 15) at a cost of \$14,250. They were Jun Jun Ni, Medley Glass and Town Policy. Two got in via a \$5,250 supplemental payment on June 15: Gambling Streak and Kita Bar None.

Besides Hot Idea, two finalists were graduates of the All-American Sale. Biffy Pass went for \$15,000. James Feature was a repurchase at \$17,000.

Wagering on the All-American reached \$202,624. That was the second-highest one-race handle in New Mexico history. The record of just over \$220,000 was set by the '76 All-American.

Sheriff lauds officers for quiet weekend

County law enforcement was beefed up for the Labor Day weekend. Sheriff Bill Elliott said, and he is crediting the fact there were no major incidents to "the cooperation of the citizens of Lincoln County and visitors in the area."

Traffic control, minor accidents and incidents took up most of the officers' time.

Elliott expressed his "thanks and appreciation" to the Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs Police Departments, the State Police, the Mounted Patrol, the United States Forest Service and his own department.

Plans were coordinated over the weekend by Elliott, Ruidoso police chief Paul Luken, Ruidoso Downs police chief Lynn Martin, Lieutenant Kenneth Shockey of the State Police, Jim Paxon, law enforcement officer with the United States Forest Service and Second Lieutenant George Sison of the New Mexico Mounted Patrol Troop Number 5 (Lincoln County).

Thirty-two members of the Mounted Patrol from Hobbs, Roswell, Bernalillo County, Alamogordo and Lincoln County volunteered 930 man-hours over the long weekend.

The Patrol is an auxiliary of the State Police. The chief of the New Mexico Mounted Patrol, Bud Bagley of Corona, was present.

— Voting to send commissioner Straley to Spokane, Washington, September 14-18 to attend the Interstate Association of Lands Convention.

— Approving salary adjustments for one employe in the county treasurer's office and one in the county assessor's office, to cover the employes' increased services in operating the county computer. Each will receive about \$290 extra over the balance of the 1977 fiscal year.

— Granting a one-year extension to the LeMay Ranch Estates, near Nogal, to complete roadwork within the subdivision. The commissioners refused to accept the dedication of a road in the subdivision, telling Estates salesman Fred Glover that the road needed more work.

— Hearing a complaint from Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Miller about the condition of the Nogal road. With one more heavy rainfall, the Millers said, portions of the roadway may become inaccessible, stranding residents of the area.

Sudderth said he and road supervisor Guy Henley would look at the road this week.

"We have had a tremendous amount of rain all over the county," he said. "There are other situations like yours... Yet we have a shortage of equipment and personnel."

— Conducting a hearing, attended by no one, on the proposed use of revenue sharing funds.

— Deciding to place on the agenda for their next meeting September 26 a report from Straley that the University of New Mexico is "ready to go" with financing for an assistant county extension agent.

# My Easy Credit, Countess Blade champions of '77 Ruidoso meeting

My Easy Credit was overwhelmingly voted Quarter Horse Champion of the 1977 meeting at Ruidoso Downs due to his conquest of the triple crown for three-year-olds, a feat never before accomplished.

The votes were cast in a poll conducted among track officials and members of the press.

My Easy Credit, owned by Harold J. Burford of Milton, Kansas, scored six victories at the meeting, including the Kansas, Rainbow, and the All-American derbies. He picked up one allowance test and two derby trials while finishing second in the trials of the All-American Derby. His only out of the money finish came in the World's Championship Classic when he suffered gate problems, broke late and had to settle for ninth.

The exceptional colt, who will undoubtedly be voted national Three-Year-Old of the Year, has now earned \$602,503 and is the sixth winningest quarter horse of all time. His season record stands at 8-1-0 from 10 starts while his lifetime tally reads 14-2-1 out of 20 starts.

My Easy Credit was also voted Best Three-Year Old Colt. He's trained by Walter Merrick.

Thoroughbred-of-the-Meet honors went to Countess Blade, a filly owned by Lorene Childers of Borger, Texas. She was also named Best Three-Year-Old Filly.

Her credits include four stakes events. She knocked off the Aspen Stakes by 1 1/2 lengths, the Peter Hurd Handicap by a nose, the Jockey Club Stakes by three

lengths, and the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby by six lengths. The classy filly also set a track record for seven furlongs in her Jockey Club Stakes victory. She knocked 1/5 second from the old record. Her record stands at 1:24 3/5 seconds.

The filly, who was piloted by Gilbert Villegas and trained by J. Doyal Roberts also banged out two allowance wins to make her one of four horses with six victories at the meeting.

Jun Jun Ni, the colt who ran second in the Rainbow Futurity and fourth in the All-American took Best Two-Year-Old Colt or Gelding honors among quarter horses.

Best Two-Year-Old Filly was a tie between Hot Idea, the All-American Futurity winner, and Miss Thermolark, the Rainbow Futurity Champ.

In other categories for quarter horses Real Wind grabbed the Best Three-Year-Old Filly division and also was named Best New Mexico-Bred or Foaled. Lucky Stepper was the Best Older Filly Or Mare; Bar Houla was tagged as Best Older Colt or Gelding; Yogi Barre was singled out as the Most Improved Quarter Horse and Norgor, the "Iron horse" of Ruidoso was voted best 870 horse.

Norgor, a 10-year-old, was also voted Best Older Colt or Gelding the thoroughbred category after winning four of his six starts. The ageless gelding also became the first ten-year-old to win a stakes event this season. He won the Flying Charm Stakes for the third time in his career.

Countess Blade, a filly owned by Lorene Childers of Borger, Texas, grabbed four

Noble Kingdom, last year's Thoroughbred-of-the-Meet, was named Best Handicap Horse and Best Router. Best Sprinter of the Meet went to Strate Miss. Mr. Clyde picked up the Best Two-Year-Old Colt or Gelding crown while Butter 'Um Up was selected as best Two-Year-Old Filly.

In the three-year-old category, Rushing

Silver was named best Colt or Gelding. Best Older Filly or Mare honors went to Tamalie Pie. The best Claimer of the season was Coys Off Limits and the Most Improved Thoroughbred honors went to Matt's Alibi, a five-time winner at the meet.

The Best New Mexico foaled or Bred honor was picked up by Serene Princess.

Wilderness Wisdom with Wayne Calloway

DEAR WAYNE — What are the laws concerning entering Canada with firearms? LEON IN MISSOURI

DEAR LEON — Rifles and shotguns are allowed without a permit. A description of these must be given to the customs inspector upon entry into Canada. Such a description will make re-entry into the United States trouble free. Each person is allowed fifty rounds of ammunition, duty free.

Pistols and revolvers are prohibited. If necessary to transport such an arm through Canada into Alaska, they must be packed individually and sealed by customs. This seal is removed by customs at port of exit. If customs inspectors find the seal broken, the firearm will, in all probability be confiscated according to law.

DEAR ROYCE — Possibly, but many times they will simply work loose from heavy recoil. Try removing the screws and dipping the threads in shellac. Replace them and tighten the mount securely with a well fitting screwdriver. Give the shellac a chance to dry before fastening the scope to the mount. This should hold to scope solidly, but still allow you to remove the screws if necessary.

If the screws still work loose after this treatment, have a gunsmith check to be sure they are the right size.

# Four horses tied with six wins at end of meeting

My Easy Credit, Countess Blade, Dial Pepper and Yogi Barre ended up as the "winningest" horses of the 1977 meeting at Ruidoso Downs. All four ended up in the winner's circle six times.

My Easy Credit won the three legs of the Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter





## RHVV Unit Management personnel always at work

"There's quite a bit of tension, but I enjoy it," Mary Morris said about her job as Unit Management service secretary-coordinator at the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVV).

Mary, who has been at RHVV since 1969, heads up the department which serves as a liaison between most other departments in the hospital.

She is assisted by service secretaries Glenda Trolinger, Judy Padilla, Louise Hanson and relief secretary Goldie Stierwalt. The group is based at the nurses' station.

"Our main function," Mary said, "is transcribing doctors' orders, taking telephone messages and calls for patients and employees."

"Sound pretty tame? It isn't, according to Jean Morgan, director of nursing at RHVV. "It takes a special kind of person to be in that job," she said.

"You have the doctors, the nurses, the aids coming at you with questions, with sometimes all three phones ringing at once while someone is yelling in the background," Morris said serenely. With her years of practice at the post, she is definitely one of those "special people."

Unlike a number of departments at RHVV, Unit Management staff are on duty

around the clock.

The secretaries are not qualified to take doctors' orders directly, Morris explained. What happens routinely is that the doctors dictate their orders to either registered nurses or licensed practical nurses, who give them in written form to the secretaries — who then transcribe them.

The women fill out drug cards for Rogene Clee, drug room nurse. "They cannot make any mistakes," Jean Morgan said, with emphasis on the "not."

The secretaries enter the orders in the cardex, and make requisitions for laboratory or radiology work when the orders so indicate. This task frequently requires them to dash around the hospital on foot.

A function which can require considerable tact on the part of the secretaries is giving out information on patients' conditions. Each morning, the secretaries receive details, but at times Morris said she has to turn the telephone over to one of the nurses if she is not up to date on a particular patient.

"We also are in quite a bit of contact with the visitors," Morris said. "They come to us for room numbers, visiting hours and to know whether visitors are allowed."

Often the secretaries assign patient

rooms, "when there's not a full house." Morris, as well as Glenda Trolinger, has worked in the past as a nursing assistant, experience which stands her in good stead when it comes to figuring which patients to place together.

"We don't put smokers and non-smokers together, and there are some conditions we wouldn't mix — pneumonia and burn victims, for instance."

She explained that when the hospital is getting full, the job of assigning rooms is turned over to the nursing staff.

"It is also our job, when we have anything involving the police or MAST (helicopter service airlifting patients to other hospitals) to notify the director or the head nurse (Jean Morgan and Ida Hobbs, respectively)."

This also goes for other "important things," such as patients with rare or especially contagious diseases.

Speaking of Ida Hobbs, Morris noted that the head nurse is her daughter, Morris, however, has been at RHVV longer.

"This is a very strenuous job," she finished, answering the telephone and a question from a hospital co-worker at the same time.

## Calories do count

There are some things blushing new dieters just aren't prepared to face when counting calories in New Mexico. And before they know it, there they are — face to face with enchiladas, tamales and sopapillas. So after wildly slipping through their calorie books in vain, they just make some usually far too low estimations and the feast begins.

Unfortunately, even if your calorie book doesn't know the caloric values of these foods, your body does and will count each and every calorie. So if you plan to win your battle of the bulge, jot down the caloric values of these popular New Mexican foods and start counting them realistically, says Mae Martha Johnson, Extension food specialist at New Mexico State University.

Of course the calorie number for each food is just a guide and will depend on how much cheese or meat you use. For example, enchiladas contain 415 calories. This rate is for enchiladas made with two corn tortillas fried in oil, three tablespoons of cheese, one ounce of ground meat, one-half cup of fresh or frozen chile sauce, chopped onion and shredded lettuce.

Tacos are rated at 280 calories each. This is for one taco shell fried in oil, two tablespoons of ground meat, grated onion, one tablespoon of cheese, shredded lettuce and two tablespoons of chile sauce.

One cup of beans with one tablespoon of oil is 245 calories. Three-fourths of a cup of refried beans fried in oil is 275 calories. A six inch flour tortilla will "cost" you 185 calories, Mrs. Johnson says.

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# Odds are against children in automobile accidents

"Safe as in your mother's arms" isn't all that safe — not for a baby or small child riding in a car. Young children need a heavily-padded, sturdy, well-anchored car seat to protect them against sudden stops and accidents.

It all happens too fast for a mother or anybody else to keep a child from being flung forward into the dashboard or right out of the car, says Kathryn Treat, Extension home economics program leader at New Mexico State University.

If a baby is under a seat belt with a grown-up or older child, the jolt or impact could cause injury from the belt itself. A baby is far safer when restrained by wide

padded straps and riding backwards in a car seat. The seat should be anchored to the car with a regular seat belt, Miss Treat says.

A toddler can use the same car seat facing forward. An older child can graduate to a bigger car seat, and finally to the regulation seat belt and shoulder strap.

There are also high-impact-plastic reclining bucket seats for babies only. These are secured with the regular seat belt. The baby rides backwards and is snugly restrained with wide car-seat straps.

# Bicentennial Notebook

## MILITARY COMMAND CHANGES

As the month of August began two hundred years ago, General Washington and other American leaders were extremely nervous. British General Burgoyne and his army were moving; Washington and Congress knew that a decisive battle was coming, but they were not sure the American forces were up to the task before them.

On August 1 Washington was in Philadelphia to confer with Congress. Although the record is not clear, it seems quite likely that they discussed with Washington the change in leadership that was in the works.

On the first of August General Philip John Schuyler was removed from command in the Northern District and was replaced on August 4 by General Horatio Gates. This was, in some ways, the culmination of conflict between Schuyler and Gates that had been simmering for over a year.

Schuyler was one of the first four major generals commissioned by Congress at the beginning of the war. He was from a very prominent New York family and seemed ideal for the appointment. Gates, on the other hand, had served in the British army until 1785, when he retired. He had become a friend of Washington in the French and

Indian War, and it was Washington who convinced him to settle in Virginia in 1772.

Trouble first developed between Schuyler and Gates when they were both sent to command positions in the New England area. Gates was a cunning man who was able to advance his position. Schuyler, unfortunately, was not very diplomatic and angered some of the New England residents.

Although Gates prevailed over Schuyler in this event, he would later be charged as a participant in the "Conway Cabal," apparently an effort to depose Washington from his command.

At this time, however, Gates' star was rising. In fact, Congress, probably fearing the worst from the approaching army of Burgoyne, gave Gates all the powers that

Schuyler had been requesting for months. Over Washington's objection, Congress even gave Gates power to regulate continental troops from the militias of New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania.

Although Schuyler was upset by this change, he graciously offered his services to Gates. He eventually justified the action of Congress in his own mind.

In Spanish New Mexico there was no doubt about who held military authority prior to the Bourbon reforms. The royal governor, Pedro Fermín de Mendivea, was the person to whom most New Mexicans looked for protection and for interpretation of Spanish law. After the changes brought by the Bourbon kings, there were some occasions when the power of the governor was not always clear. Donald W. Wilsenhunt, history professor, Eastern New Mexico University.

## Optometry's Answer to Ann Landers



When Dr. Felix Koetting, 83, of St. Louis, is not busy with his own patients, he's likely to be found in his office at the American Optometric Association's headquarters in downtown St. Louis.

From his office—little more than a cubbyhole, really—Dr. Koetting responds with an endless stream of people seeking information and advice about vision problems.

"Most people who write have problems requiring a technical answer, but I try to respond in a warm and human way," Dr. Koetting told a writer from The National Council on the Aging. Born in Sainte Genevieve, Missouri to German immigrant parents, Dr.

Koetting originally planned a career as a jeweler, but a serious loss of hearing when he was 18 forced a change in plans.

"I'll bet you never met a jeweler who can't hear a watch ticking, have you?" Dr. Koetting said.

With optometry as his second choice, Dr. Koetting enrolled in the Northern Illinois College of Optometry, graduating in 1912 and subsequently returning to school to study ophthalmology.

After more than 60 years of practicing optometry and raising two sons who are also optometrists — "it's their form of madness," he said — Dr. Koetting has eased the load of his private

practice somewhat. These days, much of his personal and professional satisfaction is derived from answering about a dozen letters a week.

Along with letters asking for technical information, Dr. Koetting receives requests that range far afield. A school girl in Michigan, for instance, wrote to ask for information about a science fair project. The good doctor gathered the requested material and sent it to the youngster. Several weeks later he was delighted to receive a thank-you note informing him that the girl had received an "A" on her project.

Dr. Koetting smiled when asked what prompted him to take the time from a busy schedule to answer all the people who correspond with him.

"First of all I like people," he said. "If people are having vision problems, I think it's important to tell them—reassure them whenever it's possible—that there's something they can do about their problem."

"And can you think of anyone better than an 83-year-old doctor to do that?" Dr. Koetting continued. "If you live to be as old as I am, you'll learn a lot, too."

What good is knowledge if you don't share it?"

SEVENTY YEARS ago, Mrs. Cora Caldwell's family moved to a community which didn't have a high school. Now 92, Mrs. Caldwell recently earned her diploma at a high school in O'Neill, Nebraska.

Awarded a General Educational Development (GED) diploma, Mrs. Caldwell was tutored by her daughter, who is a retired teacher. In preparing for her examinations, Mrs. Caldwell studied math, English usage, literature and natural science.

James Kingsbury, adult education supervisor at the school, said, "Mrs. Caldwell is a tremendous inspiration. I tell my other students that if a 92-year-old lady can get her diploma, they certainly can."

Mrs. Caldwell was in the 10th grade when her family moved to a community without a high school. By taking a two-year training course at Nebraska Wesleyan University, Mrs. Caldwell was able to qualify for a third grade teacher's certificate. She taught in rural schools in Nebraska until 1911 when she began farming with her husband.

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# Last minute touches applied at State Fair

The banners and flags are being hung, the exhibits are going into place, the race horses are working out and last minute touches are being put on everything in preparation for the start of the 1977 New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque.

This is the 40th anniversary edition of "The Biggest Show in New Mexico" and it formally gets underway at 10 a.m., September 25. Four additional days of horse shows and pari-mutuel horse racing precede the formal opening, starting Saturday, September 10.

The fair this time around is truly a million-dollar show. That figure — one million — keeps bouncing around in discussions of the forthcoming exposition.

For one thing, purses in excess of a million dollars have been earmarked for the 16-day racing meet — for the first time in the fair's history. For another, the million-dollar renovation of the fair's Youth Hall will be ready for use this year.

Along the same lines and keeping with the magic million figure, manager Finlay MacGillivray comments: "It would be nice if we could have a gate of a million persons, although that figure may be just a trifle too high.

"Realistically — and with good weather — we should see attendance top the 950,000 mark," he said. "We're also expecting a pari-mutuel handle of at least 13 and a half-million dollars. Last year, we were blessed with fantastically good weather which really brought out the crowds and set all kinds of records."

Last year's gate attendance was 925,273, the racetrack attendance was 199,673 and the pari-mutuel handle, \$12,224,237. All were new highs in the history of the exposition.

Mac feels that all aspects of the annual exposition contribute to the overall success, but notes that some areas, naturally, have more public appeal.

He's particularly proud of the four major attractions — the rodeo, pari-mutuel racing, exhibits and the midway. "Our rodeo is always a big attraction," he says, "Last year we were the eighth

biggest in the world, on the strength of the purse money and contestants, and this year should be right up there in the top group again." He pointed out that some 500 top cowboys — including 21 past world champions — completed last year for \$86,525 in prize money.

Right along with the rodeo, he said the show business stars are equally as big an attraction.

He's especially proud of the star lineup this year for the ten-night rodeo, planned in Tingley Coliseum September 15 through 24.

Headliners booked are: Freddy Fender, Thursday through Saturday, September 15-17; Mel Tillis, Sunday through Tuesday, September 18-20; Crystal Gayle, Wednesday and Thursday, September 21-22, and New Mexico's own Spinning Wheel musical combo, Friday and Saturday, September 23-24.

For this year's Spanish Heritage Show, we're especially pleased to have the talented and pretty Anacani from the Lawrence Welk TV Show as the top attraction," he said. "She'll add a lot to that show, which is now in its 11th year."

The Spanish Heritage Show will be the opening entertainment in Tingley Coliseum Wednesday night, September 14. The show will feature a number of talented New Mexicans. There is no rodeo with the Spanish program.

The 16-day racing meet has always been one of the richest, but briefest, meets in the southwest, and this year is ever sweeter with total purse offerings of more than a million dollars. The fair also offers a minimum purse of \$3400 for every race. Twelve races are held daily starting at 1:15 p.m.

The big attraction for the younger crowd is the midway. Again this year, Frazier's World Fair Show will provide the rides and the games at the carnival.

Always a big attraction for fairgoers are the exhibits — whether they be competitive or commercial. The public wants to see the livestock and agricultural displays, the art shows and the 4-H and

FFA exhibits.

Mac said there have been many changes in the New Mexico State Fair since it started back in 1938, but in those four decades it has become an important part of the Land of Enchantment. He predicted it would continue to grow and improve in the future.

## Hearing aid sales change

Consumers will buy hearing aids only one of two ways as of August, 1977. A new Food and Drug Administration regulation encourages medical evaluation of hearing problems as a first step, says Jackie Pinson, Extension family finance specialist at New Mexico State University.

Now most consumers will present a physician's statement that a hearing aid may help their condition. Persons over age 18, who wish to waive a medical examination, can sign a statement saying they know why the exam is advisable, Miss Pinson says.

The FDA ruling also forbids a hearing aid dealer from encouraging prospective buyers to waive the medical evaluation.

Another requirement of the new regulation is that the dealer must let a prospective buyer read the brochure before the sale is completed. The brochure gives information on what hearing aids can do, how they work and how to use them.

For consumers who suspect they have a hearing problem, the best advice is to get a medical evaluation from a family doctor or ear, nose and throat specialist. Only a physician can find the cause of a hearing loss.

Medical or surgical treatment might help restore some or all of the hearing. About 40 percent of the people who now go directly to a hearing aid dealer before consulting a physician might be ignoring serious medical problems, warns the FDA.

**Record mutual average set at \$417,198**

Total handle for the 1977 season at Ruidoso Downs ended up at \$28,811,293, an all-time record at the mountain track. The daily average for 69 race days (not counting one program limited to a single race due to a cancellation) was \$417,198. Last year, 67 race days produced a handle of \$26,539,332, an average of \$396,097. The current daily average — the best in Ruidoso history — represents a gain of 5.33 percent. Monday's handle of \$97,323 was the second-best ever at Ruidoso, and the \$292,624 bet on the All-American Futurity was also a second-high record. That All-American handle was also the second-best one-race handle in New Mexico history, surpassed only by the \$230,632 wagered on last year's All-American. Total attendance for the 1977 meeting was 496,529, an average of 6,761. Last year, 437,100 fans were attracted to Ruidoso Downs. The average was 6,542. The current average is a gain of 3.3 percent.

**Record purse disbursement established**

The total purse disbursement for the 1977 meeting at Ruidoso Downs topped out at \$6,253,515, smashing by more than \$1 million the previous record. General manager Al Ross noted the previous record, established in 1976, was \$4,995,323. The current figure, he added, consists of \$3,372,515 put up by the horsemen in nominating and sustaining fees, and \$2,881,001 tossed in by the racetrack. Those two figures, of course, also established new records. Here are recent gross purse distribution figures: 1975 — \$4,597,431; 1974 — \$4,326,356; 1973 — \$3,523,770; 1972 — \$3,237,154.

**Jockey/Trainer of the week**

Carlos Rivas closed the season by winning his last race and for the second year in a row picked up the jockey championship at the Ruidoso oval. Rivas closed the season by picking up

five winners from 31 outings over the All-American Weekend. He also recorded 4 seconds and 4 thirds. His efforts boosted his overall win record to 84, four more than his top effort of the 1976 season. That's the third best win

record ever recorded in the history of Ruidoso Downs. His total record stands at 84-58-49 from 347 starts with a win percentage of 24.2 and in-the-money percentage of 53.6.

Rivas also managed to record victories in three stakes events: the Mescalero Apache Handicap, the Governor's Handicap and the Brigand Handicap.

Willie Lovell added four wins to his record and once again maintained his runner-up position in the standings. His final tally shows 63 wins from 378 outings, including 60 seconds and 47 thirds.

Jackie Martin added two wins over the weekend to finish in third place with 44 wins from 275 attempts.

Charles Mueller came in with 8 wins over the final weekend and vaulted into fifth place with a 40-42-45 tally out of 367 starts.

Once again emerging on top in the trainer standings was H. C. Werner Jr. With four victories coming on the final weekend, Werner clinched the title with 43 victories after sending 245 starters to the gate. His record also included 32 seconds and 36 thirds for a win percentage of 17.5 and an in-the-money percentage of 46.1.

E. Jolly Driskill added three wins in the final five days to keep a solid grip on second place. He finished with a total record of 37-30-27 from 175 outings and the best in the money percentage of 53.7.

Bob Arnett wound up third with 30 winners from 189 starts, including 24 seconds and 23 thirds.

**State Fair shorts**

A total of \$10,600 in cash premiums is being offered to winners of the popular poultry show at the 1977 New Mexico State Fair.

Wednesday, Sept. 21, is scheduled to be Indian Day at the 1977 New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque.

One out of every three persons going to the annual New Mexico State Fair visits the exhibits, making them the most popular attraction at the exposition. Second most popular attraction is the carnival, rodeo is third and racing is fourth.

The New Mexico State Fair horse racing track is a one-mile oval.

Over the years, approximately 100 top stars of show business have appeared at the New Mexico State Fair. The 1977 headliners are Anacani, Freddy Fender, Mel Tillis, Crystal Gayle and The Spinning Wheel.

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

**SANTA FE**— Lt. Gov. Robert Ferguson, Artesia Democrat, said his survey of New Mexico city officials showed cities will need substantial new revenue sources in the near future.

New revenue is needed if cities continue present levels of services, Ferguson, a Democratic governor candidate, said. He reported 70 responses from 41 New Mexico municipalities as New Mexico Municipal League prepared for its annual conference in Santa Fe this week.

Conservative Ferguson will use survey replies and talks with city officials at the NMML pollwork to prepare suggested legislation on cities for Gov. Jerry Apodaca and the 1978 Legislature. Nearly half of survey respondents listed maintenance of service levels as the top problem facing their cities.

Racing Commission Chairman George Maloof said he will recommend that the commission revoke the racing license of Fortuna Properties Inc. at a meeting to be held early this week. Owner of Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park race tracks, Fortuna Properties has been the subject of a lengthy licensing hearing. It was begun after Fortuna Properties was created last January in a merger of Fortuna Corp. and Kodak Industries Inc. of California.

In March the commission granted Fortuna Properties a provisional license to operate Ruidoso Downs for the season that ended Monday. Provisional, tentative approval was given to Fortuna to plan for the Sunland Park season set to begin Oct. 8. If the Racing Commission revokes Fortuna Properties' license, a lengthy court fight is expected. Meanwhile, Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Parks tracks would continue.

Lt. Gov. Ferguson and Atty. Gen. Toney Anaya called for revocation of Fortuna Properties' New Mexico licenses.

The Public Service Commission granted Public Service Company of New Mexico a September fuel adjustment reflecting the effects of the San Juan generating station explosion July 7. PSCNM estimated the adjustment on monthly bills will be a 7 percent increase for most homes. PSCNM serves Belen, Los Lunas, White Rock, Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Las Vegas and Deming.

The State Human Rights Commission ordered Taos School District to reinstate Katherine Stoudt, a teacher who was fired because she was pregnant and unwed. The commission said she suffered illegal discrimination on the basis of her sex and her Anglo ancestry.

The commission ordered the Taos Board of Education and Taos School District to grant Ms. Stoudt a contract for the 1977-78 school year. It also ordered payment of \$1,000 damages to Ms. Stoudt; the maximum it can award. Ms. Stoudt was fired in September, 1976, on grounds of "immoral conduct." She was a girls gym

teacher and coach.

Gov. Apodaca appointed Charles B. Stockton, Clovis rancher-farmer, to the Curry County Commission. Stockton replaced the late Ernest E. Kraus, Clovis Democrat. Kraus was a retired veterinarian. Stockton will serve until the 1978 general election. Kraus was serving a 2-year term, ending in 1978.

The U. S. Corps of Engineers scrapped plans to allow the City of Albuquerque to store its surplus San Juan-Chama water at Abiquiu Dam under the guise of a recreation project. The corps will move ahead with a long-term, Congress-ordered study to convert the earthfill flood control dam on the Chama River into a storage reservoir. The study could span eight years. The project would require Congressional action.

Democrat Rich Sims of Dexter and Santa Rosa, running for the 1978 lieutenant governor nomination, announced 18 persons who, he said, will coordinate his San Juan County campaign. Sims won 35 percent of the 1976 U. S. Senate Democratic primary vote against incumbent Joseph M. Montoya.

Gov. Apodaca endorsed the proposed Standard Oil of Ohio (SOHIO) crude oil pipeline from Long Beach, Calif., to Midland, Texas. The pipeline would pass through the Jal area. Apodaca told the Western Governors' Conference in Anchorage, Alaska: "The SOHIO project would require only 250 miles of new pipeline construction. The remaining 800 miles of pipeline were once used to ship natural gas from the interior to the West Coast but are no longer needed for this purpose." Project cost would be \$500 million.

Director Maralyn Budke of the Legislative Finance Committee and Rep. Nick Salazar, D-Rio Arriba, are new board members of Santa Maria El Mirador, a home at Alcalde for retarded young men. Ms. Budke is chairman. The controversial home's state license is subject to renewal this month by the State Health-Social Services Department. It was renewed in 1976 after controversial hearings. Rep. Salazar has long supported the home. He sponsored a \$80,000 appropriation to renovate a state-owned building at Alcalde.

Gov. Apodaca reappointed Sam Edmondson, Clayton, and Fred Robinson, Truth or Consequences, to the Regional Housing Authority. He appointed Mrs. Rena Rosequist, Taos, to the State Arts Commission, replacing Mrs. Barbara Ingram, Tucuman. Owner of Mission Gallery, Mrs. Rosequist will serve a term ending in 1980. Albuquerquean Jonathan Abrams replaced the late Emil Blistrum of Taos on the Arts Commission. Northeastern Dairy Inc. Clayton was chartered here with Donald A. Reil, Clayton, as incorporator.

### WHEN NOT TO USE

We have been told, "Don't be caught dead sitting on your seatbelt." An excellent slogan for adults, but it doesn't apply to small children. For those under four years old, or weighing less than 40 pounds, seatbelts are likely to do more harm than good.

In a crash, a child's undeveloped pelvic bone may allow the seatbelt to slip up to the abdomen. The force of impact can, in effect, multiply weight 10 to 20 times. Internal injuries are likely when a seatbelt is jerked across the abdomen with this amount of pressure.

The shoulder belt also should be used with caution. A child less than 55 inches tall would likely suffer neck injuries from such a restraint in a crash.

There is, happily, an alternative to restraining harness for children: the car seat. A sturdy one that offers good protection costs from \$25 to \$45, a small price to pay for relative security.

Safety experts favor a back seat installation, and in the center. This location is preferred because the rear seat is usually stronger than the front, placement in the center reduces the chance of the child hitting its head on either side, and the backs of most front seats are softer than dashboards.

The importance of such safety precautions for children is underscored by National Safety Council figures: 910 children under five were killed in car crashes in 1976, we are told, and 57,000 were injured. The proper use of car seats could substantially reduce the toll of injury and death.—Alamogordo Daily News

### REDWOOD PLAN

Sen. Alan Cranston's decision to support the Redwood National Park expansion plan is an important step, perhaps the key, to passage of this measure. It also is significant that the commitment by California's senior senator to ride herd on the bill comes on the heels of House Interior Committee approval.

The plan is to add 48,000 acres to the park. Cranston had balked, at first, deterred by industry claims that the proposed expansion would cost the area thousands of jobs. A federal study has shown that the job loss actually would be much less, and the bill embodies a \$40 million re-employment plan which will do much to ease the transition.

As matters stand, it now seems likely that the expansion plan measure will go through. That is good news for all who believe, as we do, that these stands of unique forest giants should be preserved for future generations.—Alamogordo Daily News

### \$1 MILLION SHOT

Congress has approved the expenditure of nearly \$1 million to conduct a study of the potential of bicycle transportation.

If congress will just make the investigators ride bicycles to work, and in their pursuits around Washington, D.C., and the rest of the country to conduct the study, they may quit before they blow the entire \$1 million.—The Rio Grande San, Espanola





# Bicentennial Notebook

## MURDER OF JENNY MCCREA

Tension was mounting in the summer of 1777 as General Burgoyne planned his attack south into the United States and as Americans tried to anticipate his next move. Stories of atrocities committed by the British and their allies filled the American newspapers. Since these papers were staunchly patriotic in their politics, one has

to realize that the points of view expressed were biased. Even so, the reports of cruelties are probably correct in their basic facts.

A good example of the kind of thing that was happening far too often was the death of Jenny McCrea on July 26, 1777. She was at Ft. Edward when the British attacked the picket guard. She and an old woman were taken by the Indians among the

British forces. According to the report in the "Pennsylvania Evening Post," she was "butchered" and scalped with the protection of some 300 British troops. A party of Americans witnessed the event but could do nothing to assist because of the British troops. Ironically, Jenny McCrea had a brother who was a Tory in New York, and she was leaning that way herself. In fact, she was engaged to be married to a Tory. The American newspaper put it this way: "Is not this sufficient to congeal the heart of humanity with horror...? Even Tories were not safe; 'thus they treat their

friends as well as their enemies." A major goal of the American press in printing such stories was to arouse the emotions of Americans and to prevent more of them from going over to the British. Obviously, this was an attempt to discredit the proclamation issued earlier by Burgoyne in which he promised to provide protection for all those who remained peaceful and loyal to the British. Obviously, Jenny McCrea had not benefited from that proclamation. Atrocities undoubtedly occurred in Spanish New Mexico in the relations between the Spanish settlers and native inhabitants. For historical purposes, we do not have records as extensive as on the

Atlantic Coast so that comparisons are difficult to make. The records that are available do reveal that the Spanish were willing to use cruel punishments against Indians for various infractions. Often these were meant to be examples to others to discourage them from the same actions. The cruelties imposed on the Spanish by the nomadic plains Indians do not seem to be much different from those that were imposed on any enemy. Unfortunately, hostilities often bring out the worst characteristics on both sides. Donald W. Whisenand, history professor, Eastern New Mexico University.
