Lynn and Claire Ayers love being foster parents

"There hasn't been a day in 35 years, we've been without kids in our home," foster parents Lynn and Claire Ayers of Nogal said Tuesday. The Ayers, who have had "nigh on to 60 different children" in their home during the 35 years, have one of the only two foster homes in Lincoln County. "It's a way of life with us, we've always had kids," Lynn said. "With no kids around, I can't even do my housework. I'm at loose ends," Claire said. "When they take all the kids away, then that's the day they call the undertaker for me!" Their present foster child is seven years old and they hope to have him until he becomes an adult. In the past the Ayers have had children stay in their home only three or four days to five or six years.

But "we practically raised two. One is a captain in the Air Force and the other is out on his own," Claire said.

Those children who stayed with the Ayers only briefly usually were returned to their parents.

"We hope to get the children straightened out while the (Social Services) agency gets the parents straightened out," Claire said. "But sometimes it's impractical to return the children to their parents."

As foster parents, Ayers work closely with James Montoya, the area social worker.

"Foster parents live with the child and know his feelings. Case workers don't know the child as well," he said.

Ayers have found 90 percent of the

children become well adjusted to their home. "Offhand, I can only think of four children who never could conform," Claire said.

"But they could never change our mind about having foster children. It's like any battle you get into, you can't win them all!"

Lynn said most children seemed to appreciate their foster parents when they become older.

"We had one kid come back all the time to visit on weekends" after he had been reunited with his mother in Albuquerque.

"They all miss home, and it's heart-rending when a child wants to go back home, but wants to stay with his foster parents."

The Ayers and Jackie and Kay Payne, the other foster parents in the county, are permanent placements, but Montoya said emergency and temporary placements also are needed.

"In this area, we have a high incidence of abuse and neglect of children, and we have a need for (emergency and temporary) homes," he said.

"Ten homes would be nice, but 20 would be even better."

Montoya said an example of an emergency placement would be "if there was a bad accident on the highway and children were involved. We'd need placements until they were picked up."

An example of a temporary placement might be a case of "parents who are having a problem in their home and the children need to be out of the home for a while," Montoya said.

Foster homes cover a wide scope

of people and financial backgrounds, he said. "We have had some retired military, some with children in their homes already, some single people, just a wide range of people who want to be foster parents and who have something to offer children in need.

"Basically we are looking for people willing to give of themselves to benefit a child in need," he said, adding some children placed had some sort of emotional problem or handicap.

Montoya said the procedure for becoming a foster parent begins with an interview where an application is given to determine suitability.

"The applicant is screened and then we go with a study which involves going into the home to check safety and to see if it fulfills all state licensing requirements. We then check the family background by interviewing family members and (collecting) letters of reference from neighbors," he said.

"Then we license them with the state of New Mexico as foster homes.

With this license they can have a maximum of six children including their own.

"After this, they work closely with the agencies and social workers to best benefit the child's needs."

Montoya, social worker from the Alamogordo Social Services Agency, has regular office hours from 1 to 2:30 p.m., Thursdays in the Ruidoso Police Department.

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
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

Wilderness Wisdom with Wayne Calloway

DEAR WAYNE — I am the mother of a 13 year old boy who is nuts about firearms. His father is an avid hunter and target shooter and indoctrinated him to firearms when very small. For the last several years he has accompanied his father shooting. He has permission to hunt alone with the shotgun and .22 rifle. Recently his father has allowed him to take the .22 pistol out alone and this concerns me very much. Do you think it is safe for a boy of his age to have a pistol alone? HELEN P., MONTANA

DEAR HELEN — Sometimes yes; many times no. I have seen 13 year old boys, who were properly trained and experienced with firearms, that were quite competent and very safety minded. On the other hand, there are many youngsters this age that should never be allowed to use firearms alone. There are many who are unable to take the responsibility seriously because of immaturity.

The safe handling of a pistol requires very careful attention that even a great many adults disregard. The short barrel of the pistol makes it potentially quite dangerous.

Whether your son can competently meet the challenge depends on his background and training with firearms and his ability to recognize and practice safety.

DEAR WAYNE — What are the important things to look for when picking a site for camp? SAM J. IN UTAH

DEAR SAM — If you are selecting a site outside of an established campground, you must look for a location that supplies your basic needs.

First, pick a fairly level area in which to pitch your tent and conduct camp necessities. One evening of sleeping on an incline will convince you of this important point. The site should not be in a low bottom area that may become wet or

flooded during rainy periods.

Secondly, the site should have fairly easy access to water. Water is a camp necessity and spending much of your time looking for it and hauling over great distances is apt to become drudgery.

Thirdly, locate where you have easy access to wood. Wood is, of course, required for heat and cooking. It is also required to build the necessary implements and structures of a semi-permanent camp. Camp tables and seats may be considered a luxury, but they are almost a requirement for an outing of several days at the same site.

Naturally, the site should be consistent with your primary purpose. If you are hunting, it should be reasonably close to your game.

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Bicentennial Notebook

BATTLE OF BRANDYWINE CREEK
In his General Orders (discussed last week) General Washington stated that he believed a major objective of the British was the capture of Philadelphia. In this belief he was exactly correct.
Back in late July General William Howe had embarked from New York with 15,000

troops. He had sailed up the Chesapeake Bay and landed on the Maryland coast. Washington was aware that their objective was Philadelphia. Therefore, with about 10,500 men he fell back and took up a defensive position at Brandywine Creek. Since this barred the way to Philadelphia, he believed he could protect the city.

Since Howe could not reach Philadelphia any other way, he decided on a confrontation with Washington's forces. He attacked on September 11 using a carefully planned flanking action. A force of German (Hessian) mercenaries was thrown at the center of the American line. Lord Cornwallis attacked the right flank commanded by Colonel Sullivan and routed the American forces.

Fortunately for the Americans, General Nathaniel Greene was able to gain control of the right flank and organize an orderly retreat instead of a rout. Despite his efforts, the whole American force was

pushed back toward Philadelphia. The casualty rate in this hard-fought battle was very high. The American forces lost approximately 1,000 while British losses were almost 600.

A side note is that Lafayette, the French officer assisting American forces, was wounded in this battle.

The American defense of Philadelphia was not broken yet, but it had been seriously weakened. As a result, members of Congress became more nervous about the future. Some believed that if Congress

fled the city it would be a sign of weakness while others believed it would be much more harmful if Congress were to be captured by British forces. Therefore, Congress decided on September 14 that if it became necessary for the body to leave Philadelphia, it would move to Lancaster, Pennsylvania. The necessity of such a contingency action was repugnant to many Americans, but it was forced upon Congress by the circumstances of the day.

As noted before, the major military actions in the Spanish Southwest were the conflicts between the Spanish and the

native inhabitants. The nomadic plains Indians were the most unpredictable. There were many occasions when relations were good and the plains tribes would come into the settled towns and villages and be quite peaceable. In fact, reports are available revealing that on occasions they were real nuisances. However, the situation could change drastically without warning. As a result, the Spanish were usually quite ill-at-ease in such a situation. /Donald W. Whisenant, history professor, Eastern New Mexico University.

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

STUDENT LOANS

Something is rotten in the federally guaranteed student loan program. This well intended means of assuring a college education for students who could not otherwise afford it has thus far cost Uncle Sam more than 200 million dollars in defaulted loans.

From the time of the program's inception several years ago until the end of last September, \$4.6 billion in student loans had been made by banks, credit unions and savings and loan associations. The General Accounting Office reports that a whopping 17 percent of that total is in default.

Through September of 1976, lenders making claims for loans that went sour had collected \$287.7 million from the government. Only \$25.1 million of that has been recovered from the defaulting students. Among them are some, long out of school, who now have good incomes but still owe sums ranging up to several thousands of dollars.

The defaults continue at a high level; the GAO figures that by the end of this September the government will have collected only \$33.8 million but paid out \$436 million in lenders' claims. The GAO urges more vigorous collection attempts. To which taxpayers will say a hearty Amen! — Alamogordo Daily News

VANDALISM COSTLY

Good afternoon, taxpayers, you've just spent another \$30 to buy some glass, a coat of paint or paint remover, or some plaster. You paid for those items at the expense of books or other educational materials, or maybe a new roof for one of the school

buildings within the Mindoka School District.

You paid that \$30 to the school district to buy those items because someone maliciously broke a school building window somewhere. There was no rational reason for doing it, but it was done.

And one or two of the school district custodians had to take the time to make the repairs.

You bought the paint remover because the class of '77 wasn't quite through leaving its mark on one of the walls of one of the schools, or the class of '78 is a bit early. You bought the putty and paint because an infatuated student carved his initials and the initials of his girl friend on the bathroom wall.

Hopefully, you didn't mind paying that \$30 today because you paid it yesterday and more than likely it will have to be paid again tomorrow and the next day and so on for each working day of the year. That is how much money taxpayers spend to provide repairs or cosmetics for acts of vandalism within the school district.

So far, most people have been willing to put up with the vandalism. It has always been a part of the system and the district has always had the money to pay.

Now, as we sit back and watch the cost of running a school district climb, we should be asking whether the costs of repairs is a necessary expense taxpayers must bear.

We're all aware of increasing costs, and the school district feels the pinch on its budget very strongly. Money spent to repair acts of vandalism is money wasted. And yet there is nothing the district can do except pay the bills.

The burden lies with parents who must take the responsibility of training their children. It is up to them to impress upon the school students the lunacy of busting out windows for the joy of hearing tinkling glass, or carving initials in walls.

The burden also lies with the young people who see their peers toss the rocks through the windows or know who carved their initials in the wall. It's also up to them to stand up and help out.

Without young people willing to accept that kind of responsibility and without parents who are willing to make sure their kids know the difference between right and wrong, it will be up to the "system" to take corrective action.

That action could turn our schools into stone institutions both inside and out.

Meanwhile, the district could look at installing bullet-proof windows and staking guard dogs around all the buildings. That way the vandals could devote their energies to other ways of spending our \$30. —The News, Rupert, Idaho

START LOSING WEIGHT TODAY


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ALBUQUERQUE — Charles DiBona says the House-passed energy bill in Washington "does nothing to stimulate production."

DiBona, executive vice president of the American Petroleum Institute, addressed 300 at a New Mexico Oil and Gas Association steak luncheon here. The crowd was labeled a representative audience and a cross-section.

DiBona said the pending bill would disrupt intrastate natural gas supplies with federal controls. He lauded its conservation emphasis but said oil and gas production would be discouraged.

DiBona said the bill "will be reviewed very carefully in the Senate." But he refused to predict the final version. The U.S. oil industry is battling the bill with a broad campaign.

DiBona said: "We need to reduce the dependence on dangerous and insecure imports. We vitally need a new national energy policy. The House-passed bill concentrates on energy conservation."

"It is more of a tax bill than a comprehensive energy program," Peter Hanagan, executive director of New Mexico Oil and Gas Association, said heavy proposed federal taxes would preempt an area now reserved to states and curb states' opportunity to tax.

DiBona said the pending bill does not deal with the federal price control system enacted in 1975. He whacked the 1975 law and said: "Retention of that law would continue to discourage discovery and production of oil."

DiBona said the oil industry "is not trying to kill the pending bill." But he said the industry wants the bill altered to spur exploration incentives.

The industry favors a four-year phaseout of federal controls. Congress returned Wednesday from its summer recess. DiBona said: "Finding and producing new energy supplies will require a massive effort."

But he said the petroleum industry has the technology to develop new oil and gas supplies and other energy sources — coal, nuclear, solar and geothermal. For this reason, DiBona said, the industry strongly opposes oil company divestiture.

Multi-source oil companies are active in New Mexico in uranium and coal besides oil and gas development. DiBona said President Carter's goals would require a step-up in oil and gas exploration spending

from \$10 billion to \$20 billion before 1985.

At a press conference he said two-thirds of U.S. energy will be supplied by oil and gas until the year 2000 "and much of the rest will be coal." He especially criticized the proposed users' tax and said it would boost producers' costs so that they would not be competitive with the world market.

In an overview DiBona said: "The President has done exactly the right thing in alerting the public to the existence of this problem." But he said Carter's plan "completely ignores the necessity of domestic production."

DiBona conceded that votes of consumer state senators will be decisive on the energy legislation. New Mexico, a major oil and gas-producing state, consumes less than one percent of U.S. output. Republican U.S. Sens. Pete Domenici, Albuquerque, and Harrison Schmitt, Silver City, oppose the bill in present form.

DiBona said the oil industry is deeply interested in development of alternate energy sources. He cited Union Oil Co.'s geothermal exploration. It is centered in the Valle Grande area near Los Alamos.

DiBona said the breakup of integrated oil companies would reduce the availability of fuel. He said those pushing divestiture "are misinformed."

"We're not concerned about the ability to do the job," DiBona said. "We're concerned about government regulations to inhibit that." He emphasized: "We're now importing two or three times as much fuel from the embargo countries as we did before the 1973 embargo."

Because the House-passed bill would discourage exploration, he said, it would increase U.S. dependence on foreign oil, already at 6 million barrels per day in imports.

DiBona hammered heavy taxes in the energy bill. "Ultimately, these costs come out of every individual's pocket," he said. He said most of America's new petroleum sources lie in unexplored areas but exploration is banned in two-thirds of U.S. unexplored areas now.

"In the case of both coal and nuclear," DiBona said, "the energy is there, the technology is proven." But he said environmental and other obstacles deter development. Nuclear plant development is at a standstill, DiBona said. He said the pending legislation would add \$145 billion to the U.S. tax burden between now and 1985.





Including Me

Most of the more than eight million handicapped children in America today have been barred for years from the nation's classrooms. On Thursday, Sept. 15, a public television documentary, **INCLUDING ME**, ventures into the little understood perspective of these handicapped children with six compelling portraits—deaf, blind, paraplegic, emotionally disturbed and mentally retarded children and young adults—who have won the right to go to school. Today a new law, the Education for All Handicapped Children Act, guarantees all handicapped children, including the most severely handicapped, the right to a publicly supported, appropriate education.

INCLUDING ME is produced, directed, and written by Linda Janower, the mother of a hearing impaired child. The program is hosted by Patricia Neal (in photo), herself the victim of multiple disabling strokes, who provides insight into the social and physical obstacles handicapped children face. "Of the eight million handicapped children in the U.S., more than half are receiving an education which is not appropriate to their needs; one million are not in school at all. Without education, they are doubly handicapped," Ms. Neal explains.

INCLUDING ME tells how, in a healthy learning environment, even the most severely handicapped have revealed hidden capacities for growth. Lisa, physically handicapped and severely mentally retarded—eight years old but functioning only as a six-month-old—learns to eat from a spoon and responds to her teacher's stimulation and love in a special classroom of a regular public school.

INCLUDING ME introduces children who have had the benefit of quality education programs in public schools. Suzanne is a typical 16-year-old, and is deaf. She attends regular classes in a public junior high school, and with the help of specially trained teachers, improves her communication skills in a hearing world.

"Throughout this program, we meet special people who've had unique opportunities," Ms. Neal explains. "But don't think the job is over. We must all be committed to the idea that every one of us has the right to a public education, and that we all share a common goal in life—to have as dignified, full, and joyous a life as possible."

By now, the entire world—both music lovers and otherwise—is aware that the music kingdom's most enduring name is gone. Elvis Presley has been called the King of Rock n' Roll, the Top of Teenie Boppers, and a hundred other names.

Some critics called him country, others shunned the mention of Elvis as a country music artist.

But whether you liked Elvis, loved him, disliked his music, or otherwise, the fact remains that this one man did more to turn the entire world of recorded music around than any other single person. Any person who puts words about music and its people on paper had their own private opinion of Elvis.

My first introduction to Elvis was one of his early appearances—while still recording on Sun Records. Elvis, guitar man Scotty Moore, and bass man Bill Black, performed on the back of a flatbed truck on a high school



football field in a small town known as New Boston, Texas.

Elvis' recorded sound never made a greater impression on me than the sounds he made back in those days when the style was something not only new, but clean, with only his flatterp rhythm guitar, the bull bass fiddle and Scotty Moore's hot guitar licks. There was no over-dubbing of strings or backup voices. To me, no other Elvis records ever sounded as good as those early ones.

It is a waste of words to say that Elvis will live on through his music. Record pressing plants are still running around the clock to keep up with the demand for his albums.

He will remain not only one of RCA's best sellers, but will be remembered for being the one person who paved the way for a whole new era of music. The entire world of music is better for him having passed our way.

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
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
