## Aspencade Parade beautiful to watch

Another Aspencade has come and gone, leaving behind its many memories, and the aspens yet to turn their blazing gold below 9,000 feet.

Saturday's parade was a triumph, and probably had more people marching along Sudderth Drive than make their home in this scenic mountain spot, year-round . . . and some say ten times that many watching from the sidelines.

Parade highlights include, in rough order —

— Scores of motorcycles started off the march. There were plain and simple bikes, bikes as fancy as they come and a fair sampling of much that falls between. There were motorcycles with sidecars — camper trailers — one rider — five riders — a handmade wooden, windowed dog cart complete with plume-tailed Peks within — a bigger dog cart, slatted near the roof, with the shiny black nose of a Lab poking in and out — flags — horns that blared "La Cucaracha" — black bikes — white ones — rainbow ones.

— The riders came in more shapes and sizes than the machines and included uniformed club members, "ma and pa" combinations, solos and groupies, "younguns" and grandpas.

— The next division, led by police chiefs

Paul Lukens and Lynn Martin with two state patrol cars beside them, started off with a waving grand marshal in the form of Grizzly Adams . . . It was actor Dan Haggerty underneath the coonskin, followed in the next Cadillac by the co-stars of his show.

Then came Tammy Lester, clad in her traditional Mescalero dress and wearing the beaded crown she received when she was named Miss Mescalero Apache 1977.

Miss Lincoln County, Pam Bookout, followed the group of Mescalero children who accompanied Tammy in their colorful dancing feathers and dresses. Pam wore a deep pink gown and rainbow scarf.

"It's cool, so get on down to your school," yelled the next contingent, the Ruidoso varsity cheerleaders . . . the first of many such groups from schools across southern New Mexico.

A half-dozen marching bands from area high schools, as well as Ruidoso's newest Middle School, were interspersed with other marchers.

— Ruidoso fire fighters aboard an engine, Lincoln County Senior Citizens in their van and the Bonito Fire Department all waved hands at the thousands of viewers packed along the sides of Sudderth.

— Some 30 floats made their way along the marching course, all showing the skill

and creativity of their originators . . . There was Dr. Ron Annala riding the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital entry, in the guise of an injured skier, with nurse Jean Hegley waving at all and sundry behind her patient's wheelchair . . . Security Bank had a display of junior athletes riding its enormous crepe paper creation . . . The Rotary Club float was ridden by over a dozen foreign exchange students, each with a sign showing his or her country, with pleasant music playing beside them. "Gifts from the Mountains of the World" was the name of that entry.

— The Lions' Teen Center drive got its measure of attention from viewers, first with a give-away car, trimmed for the occasion with the Lion logo. Later came a duly costumed Lion pushing along a wheelbarrow, ready to be rolled up to anyone who cared to contribute a few coins.

— The Shriners Motor Patrol displayed some fancy wheelwork, with uniformed motorcyclists weaving neatly in patterns back and forth across the road.

Not to be outdone, the wee small four-wheel machines of the El Malda Lizzie Patrol whirred back and forth with dizzying speed, drivers waving and saluting one another as they moved between other miniature "tin Lizzies."

— New Mexico's Cinderella Tot, Kateri

Sanchez, waved from atop a car along with three of her friends, followed by Melinda Sidwell, New Mexico Cinderella Miss.

— The "rolliest" float in the parade had to be the Skateland entry, since at each halt in the march the Rollerettes leaped from the truck they were riding and roller skated in circles around the vehicle until it was time to move on again.

— The last float of the day was by the Ruidoso CBers, and it was suitably decked with long waving antennae . . . followed by a van blaring out CB messages . . . followed by a pony wearing a ribbon proclaiming that it was with the CB Club, even though it lacked an antenna.

And close on the heels of that final pony there came another parade of sorts . . . all the people who'd been waiting for the march to make its one hour-twenty minute way along Sudderth . . . And they made traffic enough for an East Coast rush hour, except they weren't moving at 60 miles an hour in their bumper-to-bumper condition.

People didn't seem to mind the crush. It was a good excuse for motorcyclists from diverse parts of the country to sit side by side and compare their adventures and views on their common hobby, and for parade viewers to mingle . . . Making for some more pleasant memories.

## Ruidoso man arrested; aircraft sale charged

A Ruidoso man was arrested here early Friday morning in connection with the arrest of 32 other suspects in a fencing operation involving allegedly stolen property in Albuquerque.

Arrested here, on a search warrant issued by Magistrate Jim Wheeler of Division III, was Erwin Howard "Moon" Mullins, 52, on a federal arrest warrant charging conspiracy and sale of a stolen aircraft.

The search warrant for Mullins included attempts to locate "master keys fitting most makes and models of light aircraft

and documents". Keys and documents, a Ruidoso Criminal Investigation Division (CID) detective who accompanied a Federal Bureau of Investigation officer and an Albuquerque policeman to the Mullins home at 115 Raymond Backner Drive said, "were seized."

The warrant also referred to the alleged sale of a stolen aircraft June 25, 1977, to an Albuquerque undercover officer.

The Mullins home, the CID spokesman said, "was under surveillance all last week" and "the investigation is continuing into other stolen property and drug charges."











**SANTA FE** — The powerful Legislative Finance Committee strongly supports putting lay members on 20 all-professional state licensing boards to provide public input.

Some LFC members favor taxpayer money-paying mergers of related boards — for example, the Barber Examiners and Cosmetology Boards and several health care boards. The LFC noted minimum prices set by some boards are meaningless because current prices far exceed the minimums.

While the LFC will likely call for revision of some boards there is little present sentiment to recommend wiping them out. A recommendation for a central state licensing boards' clearinghouse for public convenience is likely.

These are indications stemming from the LFC's two-day hearing under the new Sunset Law on the 20 state licensing boards, mostly tiny operations. The boards are scattered over as many locations in five New Mexico cities now — Santa Fe, 11; Albuquerque, 6, and one each in Socorro (embalmers and funeral directors), Carlsbad (nursing home administrators) and Las Vegas (psychologists).

Most board budgets are minuscule. Examples: Podiatry Board, \$1,400 annually; Massage Board, \$2,600; Hearing Aid Dealers and Fitters, \$2,600; Nursing Home Administrators and Psychologists, \$4,500 each; Embalmers-Funeral Directors, \$5,800; Employment Agency, \$5,900; Polygraphy, \$7,800; Dry Cleaning, \$31,400, and Barber Examiners, \$34,100.

The 20 licensing boards will be abolished next July 1 unless the 1978 Legislature continues them for up to six years. The LFC will recommend continued life or death for the boards to the legislature.

Administrator Margaret Vigil of the Barber Examiners Board told the LFC the three professional board members "spend a lot of time on their duties at no expense to

the state." LFC Chairman Edward Lopez, D-Santa Fe, asked: "Is their attitude based on protecting their profession or protecting the public?" Mrs. Vigil said: "Both."

Barber Examiners Board Vice President Reynaldo (Sonny) Rivera, Albuquerque, opposed a proposal to put public members on the board "because they would not have the background to perform the job."

Mrs. Vigil said the board-set haircut minimum price is 75 cents in Mora County and \$1.75 in Eddy County. Present actual prices are \$2.75 to \$3. LFC Vice Chairman Tom Brown Jr., D-Artesia, said the minimums are meaningless. "The legislature could abolish the minimum haircut charge without damaging the profession," he said.

Senate Finance Chairman Aubrey Dunn, D-Alamogordo, underscored the 50 percent failure rate of those taking the Architects Board licensing test. Last fiscal year only 13 passed and 11 failed the architects' professional examination. Eleven passed and 11 flunked the design test.

Sen. Dunn said: "I'd like to know whether New Mexico or other states' schools are failing to train architectural students properly." Dunn asked Architects Board Chairman Jess Holmes, Albuquerque, for data on licensing applicants' training.

Sen. John Trick, R-Albuquerque, cited a foulup this year that made Architects Board test grades months late arriving in New Mexico from California.

Licensing board members without exception told the LFC understandably that the legislature should continue their boards.

Architects Board Secretary Robert G. Maitory, Albuquerque architect, explained: "Due to the need for high architects' standards our board feels it should be retained to keep those standards."

The Architects Board piled up a \$30,000

or 100 percent surplus last fiscal year although expenditures totaled only \$25,980. Fees were hiked sharply to \$38 a year for resident architects and \$50 for non-residents. Holmes said the relatively husky surplus was accumulated because the legislature set the board budget at \$24,706 in fiscal 1977.

The Architects Board administered only 46 licensing tests last fiscal year. The LFC will explore possibilities to centralize testing by boards to cut costs of the tiny agencies, supported almost wholly with licensing and test fees.

New Mexico Mountain Bell customers are paying through the nose for phone service. The Santa Fe monthly basic rate with tax for one-party residential service for two standard phones is \$10.34. It is only \$8.00 in Austin, Texas, from Southwestern Bell, Mountain Bell's affiliate. The Santa Fe monthly charge for two Touchtone phones for one-party residential service is \$12.74, compared with \$9.95 in Austin.

The Santa Fe monthly rate for three Touchtone phones for one-party residential service is \$14.11, Austin's compared with \$11.45.

The State Education Department told the Legislative School Study Committee: "High pupil mobility tends to exert an adverse effect on individual student learning and progress." The SED said New Mexico public schools' mobility rate jumped last fiscal year. Only 25 of 88 school districts showed a decrease in mobility from fiscal 1976.

The highest mobility rates last fiscal year in districts in order: House, 56.5 percent; Floyd, 45.3; Tatum, 44.2; Eunice, 40.8; Texico, 40.4; Quemado, 39.8. Mobility rates among big districts: Albuquerque, 26.9; Santa Fe, 19.7; Las Cruces, 23.1; Roswell, 24.3; Farmington, 36.2; Hobbs, 37.5; Grants, 34.3; Raton, 20.1; Silver City, 23.1; Carlsbad, 25.3; Portales, 31.8.

#### DEFENSE COSTS

The legal profession is expressing concern about a recent supreme court ruling that lawyers may advertise their services in a limited way. Bar Associations fear, as they have in the past, that advertising is unethical and degrading to the legal profession.

Recently a law suit was filed in Bernillo County by the parents of a youth who had been shot to death. The suit asks \$250,000 damages from a drug store from which the bullets that killed their son had been stolen.

They claim the bullets had been displayed in a careless manner in the store and thus the drug store was to blame for their son's death — not the person who stole the bullets and pulled the trigger of the gun that fired the fatal shots.

To us, this raises some questions about the ethics of the legal profession in even filing such a suit for damages.

There is no way, in our view, the parents can legitimately claim damages in such a suit, but it will cost the druggist at least several thousand dollars to defend himself and his business.

That such suits are allowed to be filed is part of our judicial system. Anyone who feels he has been wronged certainly may file suit in court, but such suits should be legitimate and not frivolous.

This case presents a good argument that when targets of frivolous suits are vindicated in court, the court should require that parties instigating the suit pay the cost of the defense.

This would go a long way toward cutting down on the number of civil suits clogging our courts. —The Rio Grande Sun, Espanola

#### ABOUT FOOD STAMPS

The negative aspect of well-intended and often-needed federal give-away programs is that they are abused by the shrewd operators.

Associate Professor John Tovey of the Delaware Law School recently wrote members of Congress his study of the food stamp program shows even the wealthy can qualify for food stamps if they arrange their personal economic affairs to meet requirements.

The easiest dodge, Tovey says, is to buy a very expensive home or mansion. One must rid himself of any securities owned in the process. Other money can be eliminated by buying jewelry or paintings (to be hung in the home.) Nice life insurance policies can be taken out. None of these expenditures counts in determining food stamp eligibility.

While net income must be low, huge payments on the mansion (not counted) could reduce it to a sufficient level to enable the owner to have the government pay his food bill. This method is but one of the legal methods to circumvent the spirit of the program. Many, of course, qualify through hidden money or income and false statements and allegations, never sufficiently checked.

The average, salaried tax-paying citizen, generally hard-pressed to meet bills, largely finances both the within-the-law needy and the chiselers. —News-Bulletin, Belen

## Final testing at Eagle Creek Dam

Television monitoring of test holes drilled into bed rock at the site of Tom Jones Lake on Eagle Creek is expected to be completed by the end of this week, according to project engineer Tom Mann of Mann Engineering, Roswell.

This visual examination of the underlying rock formations is expected to be the last testing requirement for final approval to clear the way for dam construction next spring. "These tests are being conducted," Mann said, "to determine the permeability and stability, as well as the status, of the base rocks."

Village officials anticipate receipt of the final Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) from the United States Forest Service (FS) about the middle of October. The issuance of this statement represents final approval of the dam project from the FS. "This approval," Smokey Bear District Ranger Ray Page said to The News, "will come from the Albuquerque office of the FS."

will be given by the Corps of Engineers (CE) and village officials expect this by the end of November.

Col. Richard E. Leonard, District Engineer with the Albuquerque office of the CE issued a statement September 22 on the EIS being prepared by the FS: "The District Engineer has determined that no significant adverse effect on the human environment will result from the construction and operation of the facility," indicating, to village officials, that CE approval of the Eagle Creek Dam will be routine.

CE figures on the dam note that approximately one million cubic yards of earth and rock will be excavated for use as impervious fill and that the total surface area of the dam at the spillway elevation of 7,485 feet will be 77 acres. Gross water storage, at spillway elevation, will be 3,562 acre feet or one billion, one hundred and sixty seven million gallons.

Mann said last week that his firm is completing arrangements to begin construction of the dam early next spring.
