Mule-O-Rama action ready

Mule-O-Rama, featuring history's richest mule races, according to nominations secretary Ray Reed, is scheduled to unfold Friday through Sunday at Gateway Meadows, Ruidoso Downs.

In addition to the racing, the action includes:

FIDDLE CONTEST — Thursday and Friday at the Chaparral. Divisions contesting, director Glen Ellison of Carrizozo has announced, include Junior Junior to age 12; Junior, 13-18 years; Novice, 19-59, not having won more than \$500 in prize money; Old Timers, 60 and over and the Open, to any person paying the \$25 entry fee. Competition, with free admission, begins Thursday at 9 a.m., and continues through Friday afternoon. The grand championship, from 7-9 p.m., Friday, has an admission price of \$2. A highlight of the

fiddle contest will be the appearance of Leon "Pappy" Selph, known as the Wandering Minstrel and Danny Drozd, the "Singing Czech".

MULE SHOW EVENTS — Morning action, Friday through Sunday at Gateway Meadows, includes reined mule contest, pleasure saddle mules, trail mule, model saddle mule, cutting, hide race, steer stopping, heading and heeling, relay race, barrel races, pole bending and jack and jenny class.

MULE RACING — Friday's card includes "For mules that have never started", "Maidens", Riders 12-16 years old with mules of 13½ hands or less, "Non-winners of two races in 1977", "Open to the world", "3's and up", "4's and up" and the "Chariot race". Saturday's lineup includes "Non-winners at meet", "Non-winners at the Meet", "Open to the

World", "3's and up", "Around the turn", "El Macho Y Mulas", "Non-winners at meet", "Non-winners at meet", "Chariot race" for mini-mules and "El Macho Grande". Sunday's action begins with two "Non-winners at meet", followed by "Around the turn", "Non-winners at meet", "Around the turn" for girls 16-21 years old, "The Ruidoso Downs", "El Machos Fuerte", "The Rancheros" and the finale, "Chariot Race".

Four stakes races will highlight the action. The "El Macho Y Mulas", "The Ruidoso Downs" and the "El Machos Fuerte", offer a \$1,250 estimated purse, Reed said, with "The Rancheros" having a purse estimated at \$1,800.

"When you deal with mules," Reed said, "the unexpected is what provides the entertainment. Now, some of the mules that are scheduled to perform don't make

mistakes, and I'm not saying that they might not do what they're supposed to, because mules do what they please.

"The Mule-O-Rama Association is trying to build this annual event into the biggest mule show, sale and racing schedule in the country. We have good purses for this year's races and some match races planned have attracted the interest of the owners of such famed racing mules as Ruby, Margaret, Homestead, Flip Wilson and Housecat.

"But the big thing about mules is watching them. When they take off on their own is when the fun begins. And that's what Mule-O-Rama's all about... fun.

"With the fiddling contest, the chuck wagon meals, the show classes, mule sale, the races and the dancing to western swing music there'll be something for everyone all weekend at Mule-O-Rama."

Teen Center Day Sunday

The current fund drive to raise a minimum of \$50,000 for a Teen Center to serve Ruidoso area youth and organizations will end Sunday with Teen Center Day activities at Gateway Meadows, in connection with the finale of Mule-O-Rama.

Highlights of Teen Center Day include the presentation of the Cougar XR-7 to be driven home by the new owner and the awarding of a residential building lot on Cedar Creek Road to a future homeowner. The project, launched by the Noon Lions Club, is being co-sponsored by member organizations of the Service Club Council. "We may settle the site Tuesday night," Noon Lions president Bill Morrison said, "when we meet with the Ruidoso trustees to discuss several possibilities on village property that provide easy access." Noon Lions members have been

studying building plans and obtaining cost estimates of the structure.

"The Teen Center," Morrison said, "will be a credit to our community and the decor will make it one of Ruidoso's most attractive buildings.

"Right now we're considering enlarging the building to 60 by 120 feet, instead of the 5,000 square feet we'd originally planned.

"The response from organizations that will be using the new facility indicate that the larger size building is to be preferred."

Youth organizations, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, other Scout units, 4-H and others will be able to schedule their functions in the Teen Center. In addition, Morrison said, the facility will be available for other youth activities for which there is no existing facility.

"Sponsoring organizations will likewise be able to schedule activities in the Teen

Center," Morrison said.

"The Village, some months ago, approved hiring a youth director for organized activities. This director, Morrison said, "will not only supervise the use of the building by our youth, but will be in charge of scheduling all activities in the center, according to present plans."

The building is designed to provide, under present specifications, an auditorium to seat a minimum of 300 with kitchen facilities adequate for banquets for that number.

On a space available basis, private rooms will be assigned to youth organizations for the storage of equipment.

"The furnishings of the center," Morrison said, "are strictly dependent upon the amount of money raised.

"We'd like to be able to offer our youth

the finest facility in New Mexico, if not the southwest and this will be possible through tax deductible contributions. Donors may, if they choose, deposit their contributions in Ruidoso State Bank or Security Bank in the Teen Center fund.

"Tickets to Teen Center Day are available from any member of any service club in Ruidoso and will also be available Sunday at Mule-O-Rama.

"I thank everyone who has donated to date and I encourage everyone who is considering making a contribution to make it this week so that we can announce at Mule-O-Rama that our drive was a success and that the Teen Center will be built next spring.

"With your help, we can do it. "And what better way is there for us, as adults, to show our youth that we truly care for them and are interested in their welfare?"

DA files motion to drop charges on Ron Britton

The District Attorney's office Thursday morning filed a nolle prosequi motion in District Court, Carrizozo, to drop the prosecution of Ron D. Britton on child abuse charges.

Britton and his wife, Oralla, were indicted by the Lincoln County Grand Jury August 22 in connection with the death of Britton's 18-month-old daughter, Raquel.

Frank Wilson, assistant District Attorney, said the motion is based on the results of a polygraph test taken by Britton

September 26, which indicated "minimal, if any" involvement by Britton in the abuse of his daughter.

The nolle prosequi, Wilson said Thursday after filing the motion, "dismisses charges, without prejudice, and they can be refiled at a later date."

District Judge Tom Sandenaw has not yet ruled on an earlier motion by Wilson, to grant immunity to Ron Britton, but Wilson said his latest motion will not affect "the issue of immunity... That's still alive and viable."

No trial date has been set for Oralla Britton, who is free on a \$10,000 bond, ten percent allowed, granted by District Judge George Zimmerman, on condition that she remain in Roswell with her parents and her other children until her trial.

Scoffers learn bear fat predicts weather

Jars of rendered bear fat predict the weather more accurately than meteorologists, give warning of earthquakes and tell the skilled reader when an atomic blast has taken place.

This is the belief of G. Gordon Wimsatt of Cloudcroft, an old-timer to the area who has been following weather patterns for 40 years with his jars of oil and fat.

The bear is a special creature to Wimsatt — whose CB handle is "Bear 13," not too different from the CBer's call for road and weather conditions — "10-13."

But Wimsatt by no means credits the bear fat with powers unique in nature. He finds that fur seal, South American snapper turtle and human fat, properly rendered, will give the reader an accurate prediction of the weather, with patterns similar to those of bear fat.

Wimsatt told The News Thursday how

his interest developed, what his methods are, and what type of winter he is predicting.

He talked in the offices of his real estate company, the Twin Forks Ranch, located in Wimsatt — a scenic spot named for his father. Gusty winds outside tossed the boughs of his apple trees and a feisty Stellar's Jay flew in for nibbles under the trees. In a number of the office windows sat bottles and jars full of bear fat, some clear, some opaque and some golden.

"They're dormant today," Wimsatt said of his jars. "This can happen when the weather is varied."

And varied it was — the wind blew a little, stopped a little, the skies dribbled showers a little, then turned blue a little.

Clicking on his tape recorder, Wimsatt — who has a thick scrapbook full of interviews he has given to newspaper reporters over the years — recounted the development of his bizarre hobby.

A few decades ago George Hightower was the game warden and Wimsatt was running a general store in Cloudcroft. Hightower told Wimsatt that the Apaches used the fat of bear to predict the weather, and said he would bring Wimsatt some fat when the hunting season opened.

"I didn't buy it at all... For one thing, the Indians didn't have glass... I started researching with some of the older Indians at Mescalero."

Henry Treas helped him a lot, Dan Morgan "knew the most" and Solon Sombrero did the translating.

Using the bottle of rendered fat Hightower had given him, Wimsatt had already seen that the substance would move in changing patterns. He learned that the Indians "took the bladder of a large animal and scraped it thin... They could see the changing patterns" through

Animals playing major roles in 'Grizzly Adams'

Animals, ranging from ferrets to foxes and from weasels to wolverines, are essential to the production of "The Life and Times of Grizzly Adams" television series presently filming in the Bonito Lake area, Rej Jackson, location manager for Schick-Sunn Classic Productions, said Wednesday.

"The animals have a function in the show — to carry the continuity. They are actors in their own right."

During the 12 weeks of filming, executive producer Charles E. Sellier and producer James Simmons will require over 60 animals, which are provided by Lloyd Bebe's Olympic Game Farm from Sequim, Washington.

Along with starlet Hoko, who plays Ben in the series, the game farm provides bear cubs, bobcats and cougars of various ages, red and blue foxes, deer, a red tailed hawk, ducks and geese, wolves and coyotes, a porcupine and others.

Most of the animals, which are trained by Ken Bebe, Marinho Correia and Gary Kenwood, are pretrained to respond to signals, thus performing on cue.

"Special action is written into the script for the animals," Jackson said. "They don't perform haphazardly." Hoko or "Ben" has been trained to "do

incredible tricks," Jackson said, including sitting on a stump, sitting with her elbows on the stump and praying.

She also has been taught to simply open her mouth on cue so a roar may be dubbed in.

Following each trick, Hoko and her daughter Bozo, who acts as a stand-in, are rewarded with a marshmallow.

"She'll go through about two to three bags a day," Ken Bebe said.

Another animal which is repeatedly shown in the series is the red tailed hawk, named "Hawk," who is seen sitting on Grizzly Adams' wilderness cabin.

One of the most appealing animals is "Tuffy," a bobcat kitten, who was found clinging to a tree and was adopted by Correia's wife.

"She is high spirited and I have to curb her which is difficult to do and not break her spirit," Kenwood said.

The animals are kept in an immaculate compound which is inspected regularly by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

"They take care of the animals, they don't overwork them. If they are tired, they rest," Jackson said. "It adds to the wholesomeness of the show." (See additional pictures on page two.)

the clear walls.

Following the patterns in the fat and linking them with the weather was something Wimsatt did with a lot of patience, "by trial and error."

He said, "I've found out more in the past ten years than in the previous 30," and credits part of this to his second wife, Clara, whom he married a few years back.

She is "more careful" than he is with the rendering and had more hours to spend observing the changing patterns. Although she said that she knows little about her husband's hobby, Wimsatt said it was Clara who first figured out the earthquake pattern — large globes floating in the oil.

People began to hear about Wimsatt's avocation and jokingly would inquire, "What's the bear grease say today?" But he won his first believers when he advised a lumber company to move their trucks or rails would cause them to get stuck. The rains came — the trucks had been moved in time — and the company began to check in with Wimsatt every day.

Over the years he has had failures — and many successes. One year not too far back Wimsatt announced that snow would fall October 17, and the local aficionados began wagering. As October 17 rolled along, not a flake fell. The wagers began making good on their bets. . . . Until just before midnight when the heavens opened and sent down many inches.

He has predicted earthquakes — gone so far as to announce the dates to an El Paso TV station — and been proven right. The Menaul, Nicaragua, quakes were amongst those he forecast right on target.

Wimsatt's method of reading weather begins in his kitchen, where he renders the fat. Not a hunter himself ("I've only killed one bear in my life, and unless I get very hungry, I won't kill another"), Wimsatt depends on hunters to keep him in supply.

He has experimented with temperatures for the rendering, and finds that the best results come from "as cool as possible." Once it is rendered, he pours the clear oil into the bottle where it will stay, having discovered that it will cease to work if he later pours a little into a jar from a larger receptacle.

He caps the jars "to keep the dirt out" and sets them in the window, claiming that the oil must have an exposure to the outdoors or it will "give you an accurate picture of what your air conditioning is doing."

The fat and oil separate, forming patterns. Some of these are:

— Small sharp peaks forming on the bottom indicate a storm coming, and they appear on the side of the jar which the storm is approaching from.

— Flakes in the oil mean wind, and their

density shows how high a wind it is. — More than one pattern at a time — varied weather.

— Globes of fat in the oil indicate earthquake activity, and the size of the globes shows the nearness and the seriousness of the quake.

— Atomic blasts in the Aleutian Islands, in China and in the Soviet Union have shown up in the changing patterns.

— The presence of chemicals in the atmosphere — particularly those used in cloud seeding — give a series of false readings which Wimsatt has learned to interpret for what they are. He said he can tell now if any cloud seeding is going on in the state.

— A sort of twisted column in the center of the oil indicates a tornado. Careful interpretation of this pattern has kept the Wimsatts out of trouble in their travelling.

Wimsatt feels his hobby has tremendous potential. "If it (the oil) could be monitored 24 hours a day, I think it would be extremely accurate. . . . The bear grease doesn't lie — I just misread it" from time to time.

Wimsatt doesn't mind being wrong. He gave The News a test. His bear fat is showing that it will turn cold by the beginning of this week, he said, and readers of The News will be able to tell for themselves if this has happened between Thursday, today or tomorrow.

He keeps between 70 and 100 jars of rendered oil in the windows of his home at all times, and claims that shaking or moving the jars will destroy the oil's effectiveness for hours or even days, depending on how much shaking it receives.

Every morning he makes a record of what the oil is showing, and going over the past few months on his charts, Wimsatt comes up with the basis for a long range prediction.

"I look for a cold, wet winter ahead. . . . More moisture and little colder than last year. . . . I think it will be a rough winter for us," Wimsatt said.

What kind of animal oil works the best? Wimsatt started out thinking it had to be bear oil, due to the bear's habits as a semi-hibernator. But he has rendered just about every type of oil he can obtain. Through a doctor in El Paso and with the consent of a living patient, he even tried human oil, and found it good.

Chicken oil has clear patterns, but some are not like the bear patterns, fat taken from porcupine and armadillo road kills never did anything, and beef and pork fat have been of no use at all. Mountain lion oil is "so heavy it doesn't work all the time. . . . It does make patterns."

Got any exotic animal fat, anyone? Gordon Wimsatt welcomes new samples, fresh or frozen. He's ever ready for a new discovery.

Warriors down Hatch 27-0

The Ruidoso Warriors won their second district game defeating the Hatch Bears 27-0 in Friday evening's action in Hatch.

"This puts us in good shape district-wise," coach Doyle Howell said. Scoring for the Friday's game began with a touchdown by Josh Ensor followed by an extra point kicked by Brad Maddox. In the second quarter, Ensor got another touchdown and Maddox kicked the extra

point gain, making the score 14-0 at the half.

In the third quarter Alex Padilla recovered a fumble in the endzone and went for a touchdown. The team tried for a two-point conversion but failed.

Then, in the fourth quarter, Borde Williams went in for a touchdown on a one yard quarterback sneak. Maddox kicked the extra point making the final score 27-0.

Carries for the Warriors were Ensor, 15 for 76 yards; John Whitlock, 16 for 58; Bart Owen, 2 for 14; Steve Cox, 5 for 11; Borde Williams, 2 for 2, and Rick Mound, 3 for 3.

Other statistics for the Warriors include: penalties, 14 for 140 yards; three punts for an average of 41 yards; 16 first downs and four fumbles.

Bears' statistics include: total yardage of 70; five penalties for 35 yards; four

punts for 40 yard average; eight first downs and seven fumbles.

Quarterback for the Warriors, Josh Ensor, has scored a total of 80 points to this date, making him fourth ranked in the state for high scoring.

"We have a very tough nondistrict game coming up against Tularosa," Howell said. The game, which will be at 8 p.m., Friday instead of the usual 7:30, will be in Tularosa.

Child nutrition hearing set

A public hearing on child nutrition programs will be held in Dallas, Texas, November 2-4 to enable people in New Mexico and other southwest states to advise the U. S. Department of Agriculture of their concerns.

The hearing is scheduled from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. both days and will be held in Room 7A23 of the New Federal Building, 1100 Commerce Street. The Dallas hearing is one of eight being held throughout the country.

"We're holding these hearings to seek comment directly from people who are concerned with these programs," according to Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Carol Tucker Foreman. "We want to know how well our programs are serving people and how they can be improved. We're going to listen and to learn."

The child nutrition programs are the school lunch program, the school breakfast program, the child care food program, the summer food program and the non-food assistance program.

The hearings will consider, but will not be limited to, public comment on the following areas: proposed meal patterns for the school lunch program; meal quality and plate waste; school breakfast program; summer food program; child care food program; nutrition education; competitive foods; training and staffing needs; administrative workload; student, parent and community participation; and federal state and local relationships.

The child nutrition programs provide cash and food assistance to help support food services to children in public and nonprofit private schools, residential child care institutions, summer day camps, child care centers, and family and group day care homes. The programs are administered through state educational agencies and USDA's Food and Nutrition

Service (FNS) regional offices.

All the hearings will be held between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. on the dates and at the locations listed below:

October 25 and 26 - Chicago, Illinois and New York, New York.

October 27 and 28 - Denver, Colorado and Boston, Massachusetts.

November 1 and 2 - San Francisco, California and Atlanta, Georgia.

November 3 and 4 - Seattle, Washington and Dallas, Texas.

Persons interested in speaking at the Dallas hearings or submitting a written statement should contact Regional Information Staff, Food and Nutrition Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Room 5C30, 1100 Commerce Street, Dallas, Texas 75242. When contacting the FNS regional office, please indicate which hearing you plan to attend, the subject you will be speaking on and the approximate length of your testimony. Written comments may be submitted before November 7.

Limited funds will be available from FNS to enable low-income individuals to testify at the nearest hearing site. Funds will be made available on a first-come first-served basis to private citizens who might otherwise be unable to attend and testify because of financial hardships.

Toll-free telephone lines have been provided for the public to contact FNS about the hearings and will be available beginning October 15. The toll-free number for New Mexico is 800-527-7223.

Traffic records center planned

The Department of Motor Vehicles Traffic Safety Division released \$29,860 in federal monies to the New Mexico State Police for establishment of a state traffic records service center within the law enforcement agency. The center's duties will include compilation and computerization of the ap-

proximately 30,000 annual state traffic accident reports with the exception of the Albuquerque-Bernalillo County area.

The center's operation will be based on the success of the City of Albuquerque's Traffic Records system established in 1972. The Albuquerque multi-jurisdictional system annually compiles statistics on approximately 15,000 accidents in the Bernalillo County area.

To date, the state's traffic accident records system has been kept by several agencies whose needs for traffic accident statistics vary greatly.

As a result of the center, however, it is anticipated that state accident statistics will be more readily available for all agencies. In addition, a single source for accident records will provide a good data base for use by all agencies.

Wilderness Wisdom

with **Wayne Calloway**

Dear Wayne — I canoe a bit with a friend and enjoy it, but the paddle he has is so comfortable short for me. Can't I get a longer one and how long should it be? Wallace in Oregon

Dear Wallace — You sure can get a longer paddle. Paddles are like people; they come in all shapes and sizes. I don't know if you are a bow or stern paddler and there should be a difference

in the two lengths. When you are standing, the bow paddle should come to your chin. The stern paddle should be between your eyes and the top of your head.
If you enjoy canoeing by all means get a paddle that fits you well. A wrong size paddle takes much of the pleasure from an outing and leaves you with a sore back and shoulders, as well as unnecessarily tired.
Dear Wayne — Wild animals in National Parks seem so tame. Are they really dangerous? Brenda P., Pennsylvania
Dear Brenda — They are indeed dangerous. Over a period of years, many of the animals have lost their fear of man and approach eagerly for the handout they

often receive from tourists. These animals often appear tame, but they are not less wild. They are interested only in food and are not concerned about the welfare of their donor.
Each year many people are injured, sometimes fatally, by "tame" park animals. People should be discouraged from feeding wild animals as it is not only dangerous, but it makes them lazy and dependent upon handouts and unwilling to forage for themselves.
Dear Wayne — How do you go about building a campfire when everything is wet? Bill of Michigan
Dear Bill — Fire building during wet conditions or light rain is easier than it

would seem.
Begin by building a foundation for the fire; if the ground is wet. This may be rock, slabs of bark, or limbs.
To gather firewood, look for standing dead trees. The limbs from such trees are usually dry enough to burn. The wood inside a dead tree will generally be quite dry. You can use dead limbs on live trees and snap small dead branch tips off live limbs.
After you have gathered the wood, arrange it as in normal firebuilding. Place tinder below kindling, ready for lighting.

You can generally find a dry place to strike a match somewhere on your person. If nothing else a fingernail will do.
As a last resort, to light the kindling, use the powder from a shotgun or bullet cartridge. Pull the bullet from the case or open the shotgun and dump the powder in a dry cloth or loosely wrapped paper. Place this in the kindling and light before it becomes wet.

Inside the Capital

SANTA FE — While county officials throughout the state were crying the blues over a new state law imposing a 10 percent ceiling on property assessments, they were receiving federal checks totaling \$10.25 million.

The federal money was fostered by the Federal Organic Act, a law that provides funds in lieu of taxes to counties with federally owned lands within their borders, excluding Indian and military reservations.

Most of the money came from lands controlled by the Bureau of Land Management and the U. S. Forest Service.

The only county to receive no funds was Curry County (Clovis) because there is no federally owned land in that division. Quay and Roosevelt counties were next lowest — Quay received only \$637, Roosevelt \$4,891 — because they too have little federal land within their boundaries.

Eddy County profited most from the giveaway — \$903,575. Otero County was next with a check for \$893,518.

The money has no strings attached on how it can be spent, according to the law. This payment was the first of annual payments, and according to one federal official was a little lower than anticipated. Future checks should be even more.

Here is a list of the counties and the amounts they received: Bernalillo \$84,612, Catron \$116,900, Chaves \$874,352, Colfax \$2,212, Curry none, De Baca \$24,241, Dona Ana \$884,030, Eddy \$903,575, Grant \$585,946, Guadalupe \$36,405, Harding \$43,569, Hidalgo \$258,634;

Lea \$306,805, Lincoln \$296,427, Los Alamos \$24,229, Luna \$421,285, McKinley \$314,806, Mora \$71,993, Otero \$893,518, Quay \$587, Rio Arriba \$375,099, Roosevelt \$4,891, San Juan \$736,409, San Miguel \$229,545, Sandoval \$546,338, Santa Fe \$219,107, Sierra \$303,619, Socorro \$309,458, Taos \$471,099, Torrance \$143,320, Union \$36,418, Valencia \$539,865.

Gov. Jerry Apodaca's reorganization package will come under legislative microscopes again in January when a cleanup package of more than 100 bills is introduced.

The reorganization package won't change much, according to spokesmen for the governor, but already at least one more cabinet level post has been created.

Since the governor announced his intention to stay out of politics in the 1978 elections — at least, he won't be seeking a particular office at that time — most observers believe his power may be greatly reduced. That may affect his ability to hold the reorganization package together.

On the other hand, the governor may feel he has no political axes to grind in the coming session because he is a lame duck. That may provide him with a stronger hand than he would have had.

The Education Department and the Attorney General are still fussing over the control over attorneys hired by the department.

Although the matter was settled in the courts — the Education Department won the squabble when a court ruling said they could hire their own attorneys — now comes a fuss over the records of litigation and who shall pay court costs.

Supt. Leonard DeLayo previously offered to pay all costs of the litigation, but when he found that the records of the proceedings had been held up by the Attorney General, he held back the check.

The State School for the Deaf in Santa Fe will undergo a \$4.3 million facelift next year if a pending bond issue is approved by two state boards.

Regents for the school will go before the Board of Educational Finance and the State Finance Board next week for approval.

The school for the Deaf campus in Santa Fe is 90 years old.

BAKKE'S POSITION

The position of the Justice Department on the Bakke case, and therefore that of the White House, is as surprising as, in most ways, it is sensible. Earlier reports indicated that President Carter, because of his political obligations to the civil rights movement, would support the University of California in its defense of a quota system for minorities in admissions processes.

But the Justice Department is supporting the principal conclusion of the California Supreme Court by arguing that an admissions system that reserves a

certain number of places in each class for minorities should be found unconstitutional. That is the first thing right about the Justice brief.

The second thing right about the Justice brief is that it provides advice in the contingency that the Supreme Court renders a landmark decision. It is wise to provide for contingencies, in rainy climates for rain as in juridical ones for a torrent of wisdom. Unhappily, the Justice brief does not offer the best advice.

The example the brief cites, wherein a minority candidate and a white, middle-class candidate have the same grade point average, a 3.5, is too facile. "It would obviously be reasonable," says the brief, "for the faculty to conclude" that the minority applicant "has shown more motivation and determination to succeed" than the middle-class white applicant and "is therefore more deserving of admission." To the contrary, it is not obviously reasonable at all.

True, the minority applicant may have shown a great deal of motivation and determination to get his 3.5, but what if the white middle-class applicant had been orphaned as a youth and had worked his way through school and college? What then of his motivation and determination? Race ought not to be considered, any more than should be ethnicity or sex.

The question at issue here is whether a person who worked hard and earned his way into medical school should then be refused entry because although other applicants were less qualified, they were more suitable because of color, heritage or sex.

But the greater question is that rock-bottom quality — ability. Quotas not only violate the spirit and letter of constitutional law, but also rob our society of quality. We need bridges that will bear weight, surgical skill that will heal and businesses that will function smoothly and profitably. Whether the engineers, physicians and administrators who are responsible for these jobs are white, black, Spanish-surnamed, female or Moslem makes no difference.

One breathes more easily having knowledge of the Justice Department's position. It is not, after all, going to stick its and Jimmy Carter's neck out for the absurd, not to say, unconstitutional, sake of quota systems. For this, Justice and the President, for whom the alternative position would have been politically expedient, deserve applause. —News-Bulletin, Belen

HELP FOR THE STATE

Legislators told the New Mexico Municipal League last week municipalities can expect little, if any, financial help from the next legislature.

Rep. Tom Brown of Eddy County told city officials that what was a \$40 million state surplus two years ago will have dwindled to a mere \$4.9 million this year.

This depletion is due largely to tax rebates handed out by the legislature for no apparent sensible reason except to allow our lawmakers to go home and tell everyone about all the money they gave them back.

There certainly is little hope for cities receiving any financial aid and in fact, with the surplus in its present condition, the legislators may be looking around for ways for the cities to help the state. —The Rio Grande Sun, Espanola
