Chamber is broke!

A quorum of Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Directors Thursday advised The Ruidoso News that the Chamber has funds to operate "about two and one half weeks."

"The situation is desperate," the Rev. Ken Cole, board chairman said.

Director Larry Scarborough said, "We need money now, to buy time" to work the Chamber out of the present financial emergency.

Outstanding obligations include:

— \$5,548 for WATS service, with \$1,000 due from subscribers.

— \$5,000 building note, due next spring.

— \$1,400, approximately, in miscellaneous bills.

THE CONTROVERSIAL WATS service, operated by the Chamber was discontinued at 5 p.m., October 19.

The directors did not announce any "crash" measures to raise funds, but are contacting members to:

— Pay their current dues,

— Pay delinquent dues.

An appeal is to be made to former Chamber members to reinstate.

Current monthly operating costs were pegged by the directors at \$5,200 with income, from dues payments, standing at \$1,800.

"Sixty-seven new memberships at \$75 per year," Scarborough said, "would put us on a break-even basis."

The directors also noted that associate memberships at \$37.50 per year give the member "a share in the community," though there are no voting privileges.

"Annual dues," director Mike Mulholland said, "amount to 21 cents a day. What we need (above the present \$1,800 per month) is an additional \$116.67 per day to break even," which can be realized from new, full, memberships.

TWO ALTERNATIVES to the present operation were suggested as stopgap measures:

— A \$3,500 monthly budget which would provide a telephone answering service manned by one person.

"Either of these," executive director John Hobbs said, "fall far short of the obligation of the Chamber to serve the community."

The directors expressed optimism that the Chamber's financial problems "with the immediate support from members" would be solved and that "work is continuing" on plans to reorganize the Chamber and to institute a series of new tourist attractions in Ruidoso.

Fire protection survey set here

A survey of public fire protection facilities in Ruidoso will be conducted by Insurance Services Office (ISO) of New Mexico beginning November 7.

The surveys are made to determine a relative classification of public fire protection which is one of the factors used in determining rates for fire insurance coverage of many properties, ISO manager Thomas R. Rush advised village manager Jim Hine in announcing the survey.

Robert B. Lillie, ISO engineering representative, will first survey the village's water supply facilities, then analyze the water to determine its adequacy and reliability and conduct flow

tests in several parts of the village to determine the quantities of water available.

A comprehensive study of the fire department, including its organization, location of fire stations, manning, operation and training will be made and the fire communications system will be checked.

Lillie will also evaluate existing building construction regulations, fire prevention practices and electrical installations and will visit a number of buildings to determine the extent of enforcement of existing ordinances covering these situations.

The last ISO survey was conducted in Ruidoso during December of 1966.

Teachers attending national conference

Language arts teachers Jane Tully and Bonnie Coe will travel to Denver November 2 for the National Middle School Association Conference.

At the three-day conference, the two White Mountain Middle School teachers will attend a variety of courses in research, evaluation, teacher education,

reading, learning disabilities and administration.

"We're going to split up and try to go to all of them," Jane said.

They also will have an opportunity to "visit schools in the area which fit the pattern of schools in our particular area," Bonnie said.

New tourist activities planned by Chamber

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director John Hobbs, at a retreat for directors last week, unveiled plans for structural reorganization and an expanded promotional program to build tourism in the Ruidoso area, with emphasis on developing new attractions during April, October and November.

Hobbs' plan for the Chamber included naming functional committees and "providing community services to make the people aware of Chamber of Commerce functions."

Committees suggested by Hobbs included: governmental affairs, transportation, retail trade, education, communication and public relations, professions, motels and restaurants, real estate and finances, with emphasis, he said, on "a special events committee to run our existing programs and develop new ones."

He said that the Chamber should become involved with the construction industries and community planning and "develop a women's division."

New ventures proposed by Hobbs include:

— April: bicycle races and marathon races, advertised in national publications to attract participants from coast to coast.

— October: nationally advertised backpacking excursions and enlargement of Aspencade and Mule-O-Rama activities.

— November: Organized and possibly sanctioned skeet and trap tournaments as well as turkey shoots.

A one day spectacular, with the date for the first event to be Saturday, August 19, 1978, would be, Hobbs said, the "New Texican Fiesta, featuring special entertainment and an old fashioned Texas barbeque. This would be the Chamber's 'thank you' to the Texans as well as a Chamber fund raiser."

Additional winter tourist attractions proposed by Hobbs include:

— Promoting visitations by television, newspaper, periodical and radio personalities, to familiarize them with the skiing opportunities at Sierra Blanca Ski Area.

— Developing ski tours through travel agents and airlines to attract large groups at special rates with the package to include housing, meals, transportation and designed to provide maximum service.

— An advertising program reaching a greater audience.

— Publication of a new brochure to solicit new Chamber members, encourage renewals and develop interest in Chamber activities.

— Development of a classified membership directory, listing the members alphabetically as well as by business classification. "This would provide," Hobbs said, "greater coverage for Chamber members and offer more residuals."

New activities for Chamber members would include, Hobbs said, an annual awards banquet, picnics, banquets and end-of-month parties.

"One activity that is possible," Hobbs said, "is to develop cross country ski races and snowmobile events, as this is a virtually untapped possibility for increasing winter tourism in this area."

Extraterritorial commission seeks joint powers agreement jurisdiction

Four members of the Lincoln County Extraterritorial Planning and Zoning Commission (EPZC) present for the Friday afternoon meeting at the Ruidoso Public Library instructed county manager Les Olson to draft a joint powers agreement, for consideration by the Lincoln County commissioners as well as the Ruidoso village council, granting jurisdiction over an eight-township area to the extraterritorial body.

The oblong area extends from north of Capitan to south of Ruidoso, as far east as Fort Stanton Mesa and west to the White Mountain Wilderness.

Approximately one-half the area in question is controlled by the United States Forest Service or by the New Mexico Bureau of Land Management, and therefore would not be included directly in the EPZC's jurisdictional district.

Olson said, "It won't be long until there will be a press for almost all that land to be subdivided . . . The growth corridor for Lincoln County is this eight-township area."

Committee members stressed to the group of observers present that the EPZC does not have the power to zone or otherwise control the land, but only to make recommendations concerning its use to the county and Ruidoso Planning &

Zoning Commissions. Those bodies will make all formal decisions, they said.

If approved, the joint powers agreement will place in the hands of one committee the responsibility for bringing about orderly planning in the growth corridor. Olson said, "The central question is what is the upper number of people who can live in the area . . . This is one thing the committee will have to take a look at, and it will take a lot of study."

Committee member and vice-chairman John Winniford said that planning of growth by one central body will help to ensure that mobile homes will not be placed in the middle of subdivisions, and to bring about "planned and orderly growth."

In response to questions raised by Mr. and Mrs. LaMoine Peters, Capitan, Ruidoso building inspector Chuck Brown said, "As far as I know, the Ruidoso city limits will never extend as far as Alto . . . but there will be more subdivisions."

Olson said that before the decision concerning the size of the EPZC's jurisdiction becomes final, public hearings will be held and all concerned residents and property owners will have a chance to voice their approval and objections.

The proposal will go before the county commissioners November 11 and before

the Ruidoso village council November 8. Legislation passed this year sets as the jurisdiction for all extraterritorial planning and zoning committees an area one

mile around city limits, unless this is modified by a joint powers agreement between the county and city. Last year, the

'Chamber Talk'

The Chamber of Commerce won't be able to pay its bills after November 15. That rude shock, which you found on the front page of this paper, came to those of us on the board of directors last Tuesday night as we assembled for a long-planned retreat. We knew things were bad, but not that bad.

It was not what we came to hear. The reason for our meeting was to lay the ground work for a revitalized Chamber, one that would reach out to its membership for involvement and would immerse itself in the sweeping human concerns that have come to our community as it has grown into a full-time town. Instead we found that our hopes for a new Chamber are in danger of sinking with the old one. Those of us who joined the board of directors this year came with a commitment to build a true Chamber of Commerce on the foundation of the tourist development function that has been the organization's historical focus. We want to expand active involvement in the Chamber from the select few on the board and to extend a meaningful invitation for activism to all of our members — not just token make-work, but true involvement in planning, decision-making and execution of a new role for the Chamber in the community.

We arrived at the retreat last Tuesday with a blueprint for that new Chamber in our hands and found that we held smoke as we saw our plans go up in financial flames. Somewhere in the confusion we did approve the plans, but we are confronted with a frustrating "Catch-22." We can't activate the plans without a stable Chamber, and we can't have a stable Chamber without activating the plans.

The Chamber is in trouble for several reasons:

1. The present board and the new executive director inherited a Chamber with expenditures exceeding revenues and with records that were inadequate to alert us to the impending crisis. One of our first actions upon hiring a new executive director was to make a complete assessment of finances. The final results of that assessment were what we heard Tuesday night.

2. The Chamber, for a variety of reasons, has been rapidly losing the confidence of its membership. Most of these reasons boil down to a lack of opportunities for membership involvement and input into the Chamber's programs. As a result, the Chamber's programs are not perceived as relevant to the needs and concerns of the membership.

3. The Chamber has not grown with the community. While Ruidoso has been experiencing her biggest boom in business and population, the Chamber has been losing membership. This resulted from the reasons cited above and because the community outgrew the Chamber's tourism focus. Let's face it, Ruidoso is no

longer a seasonal tourist town. It is a full-time community of permanent families that has at least as many businesses serving the local population as it has serving tourists.

4. The Chamber's image has become too closely linked to the personalities of the executive director and the members of the board. Personal differences and suspicions of motives will creep into this kind of situation in the best of circumstances, and this obviously was not the best of circumstances.

5. The Chamber has lost personal contact with its members.

The new Chamber we want to create would address all of these circumstances by making it truly an organization led by the membership. This would come about through the creation of standing committees, open to any member who wishes to join, to represent the special interests of the many complex parts of our community in the program planning and decision making that is presently the sole domain of the board of directors. The committees would be sources for ideas, for refinement of programs, for recommendations for action and for manpower. At the same time new communications processes and new opportunities for social and working contacts between members would be established to keep the organization in personal touch with its members throughout the year, not just at dues time.

We think this is an exciting and meaningful package. We think we can make it work. We think the Chamber can be a vital force in making Ruidoso a better community — not just to visit, but to live in and to raise families in. There is a new spirit of dedication to this purpose in the board of directors and certainly in the new executive director. We can't do it alone, however.

As we confront our present financial crisis, therefore, we will be excusing for a new Chamber, not to make excuses for an old one that served its purpose in a different time. We hope that the people of Ruidoso will understand that this new direction and purpose is not a response to the present difficulties, but rather a response to the needs of the community. It is not a program thrown into the breach out of desperation, but rather it is a new organization being presented to meet a very real external need, a need that was already recognized and being responded to before we learned of our financial problems.

We, the members of the Chamber board, want desperately to install these programs for our members but we will only be able to do so with the support of the entire community as we confront our financial crisis. We are asking you please help us to help Ruidoso.

SANTA FE — Patrick A. Lee, an instructor at Navajo Community College, has a few well thought-out remarks on the Indian vs State sovereignty issue, and they are worth noting for the Indian viewpoint.

Lee, who teaches Indian law and government at the College's branch at Shiprock, says a simplification of the issue is dangerous. And it's usually detrimental to the Indian.

He believes, however, that Indian tribes have gained public and congressional support after long years of first extermination and finally paternalism.

"As I see it," he says, "Uncle Sam discovers an Indian youngster with a huge pie. He adopts the youngster and takes most of the pie in exchange for his promise to provide certain services and to let the youngster control the remaining portion."

"But that's where justice ends, Lee says, because Uncle Sam then distributes the pie to his own younger children. Eventually the new children want even more."

"By now the Indian youngster has become more mature, and it is not so easy to take from him as it was before," Lee says. "In fact, he takes people to court and tries to get back what was left to him in earlier treaties."

Lee believes the 13 Western states face more obstacles than did the 13 original colonies in dealing with the State vs. Indian sovereignty problem.

"First of all is the fact that New Mexico and other western states included in their state constitutions certain disclaimer clauses as a condition of statehood as required by enabling acts of Congress," Lee says.

These provisions disclaimed by the state all right and title to Indian lands and further exempted Indian lands and property on the reservation from state taxation, he says.

Lee also maintains that an 1832 Supreme Court decision concerning Georgia and the Cherokee nation recognized existing "quasi-sovereign" powers in the tribes. Lee says those powers have since been modified to mean a strict right of self-government.

"Public Law 280, which granted some states jurisdiction over Indians on the reservations in 1953, was not so much because Indians were voting in state elections as it was for the fact that those Indian reservations became urbanized as cities grew around them," Lee says.

Lee maintains it was more convenient for Congress to assimilate those Indian tribes under the current federal policy of Indian assimilation. But he maintains that a later law requires tribal consent to state jurisdiction over the reservations.

Concerning voting rights of Indians, Lee says, "Given a choice, I wonder what the Indians would rather lose — their state voting privilege or their land along with tribal voting rights in the absence of tribal government."

Lee believes President Carter's concern for human rights make it very unlikely that the Carter administration would repeal, rescind or amend the law giving Indians final say-so in sovereignty issues.

"The recent policy of Indian self-determination with emphasis on cultural retention ... makes it especially difficult for the Western states to oust tribal governments from their reservations," he says.

Human Rights Director Frank Eserra had to have his tongue in cheek when he took up the issue of the giant doors on the Capitol Building in Santa Fe.

Certainly everyone has complained about those heavy old doors, but there's little doubt that the most handicapped people in the state use them daily, especially during legislative sessions.

His threat of shutting down the capital should endear him to the hearts of most New Mexicans too. I wish I had thought of that.

FARM WORK

It's becoming unusual for the federal government to use common sense, but at least that seems to have happened on one U. S. Senate bill.

The Senate decided recently to permit children as young as 10 years old to work as farm hands and to harvest crops under limited conditions.

The issue came up on an amendment to the Fair Labor Standards Act sponsored by Sen. William Hathaway, D-Maine, and Bob Packwood, R-Ore. They said family

harvesting had long been a way of life in the potato fields of Maine and strawberry patches of Oregon. This isn't exploitation of child labor, just as the working of young people on farms in this area isn't exploitation. In fact, farm work is good for kids. Most senior citizens worked on farms because they grew up in an era when there were many more family farms. Hard work didn't hurt them. It gave them some real values about individual effort that last throughout life.

Yet Labor Secretary Ray Marshall called modern agriculture a "high-risk industry" and said, "children in the fields are dangerously exposed to toxic chemicals and power-driven machinery."

Hogwash. We agree with Sen. Packwood, who told the Senate farm work is "healthier than playing in the streets."

Congress passed a law in 1974 providing that children under 12 could not work on farms except those owned by their parents. It's a good area for government to stay out of. — Deming Headlight.
