C-C finances brighter

Again in December disbursements at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce exceeded income, but accountant Donald Dorman told the board of directors at their noon luncheon meeting Wednesday he is optimistic about the Chamber's financial outlook.

In a comparison of finances at the Chamber for the previous two fiscal years with the present eight months of the fiscal year, Dorman said the Chamber has "effected a turnaround of sorts ... and reduced the downhill trend into a holding pattern."

Dorman said during the previous two fiscal years, the Chamber operated at a deficit which totaled \$46,800 by May 1, 1977, and that during this period of deficit spending the Chamber undertook remodeling of the office, purchase of new office equipment and the WATS line project increasing the total deficit to \$52,000.

During the two years, revenue generating projects brought an income of \$25,000 and Lodgers' Tax funds brought \$15,000.

This left a total operating deficit for the wo years of \$12,500.

The Chamber had some funds at the start of the fiscal year in 1976 but spent all of that and were still in debt \$4,500 at the start of the current fiscal year May 1, 1977. Dorman said "as a result of the eightmonth period of activity this fiscal year," the Chamber has generated \$2.800 in revenue, over their operating expenses, reducing the \$4,500 debt to \$1,700. One method the Chamber has employed

to increase revenue is to cut down on operating expenses.

On the average the monthly operating expenses at the Chamber for the previous two fiscal years was \$4,900. This fiscal year it has been cut to \$4,400.

Executive director of the Chamber John. Hobbs said he felt the monthly operating expenses could be cut to \$3,800, thus further increasing revenue and lowering the debt.

Recent cuts made at the Chamber include extending the lease on the Chamber vehicle to reduce payments, canceled lease on the postage meter (a reduction of about \$100), turned in the copying machine (a monthly expense of \$26) and canceled the \$55 monthly janitorial service.

"We are making every effort to eliminate expenses and I'm confident we can reduce our monthly operating expenses to \$3,800," Hobbs said.

spacing to help prevent disease, to reduce combustible ground cover and help in reducing fire danger."

Bandy said that there'd be "no wholesale" cutting of trees, but that this portion of the pilot program would be carefully studied to achieve "maximum fire protection, the highest possible quality of trees and to control the spread of disease."

Reforestation of burned areas will be a committee concern, Bandy said. "In these sections of the Ruidoso area it may, due to their rapid growth rate as compared to pines, be prudent to plant aspens and cedars, which would also be a colorful addition to the countryside, as well as providing stands of healthy trees."

This pilot program is designed to be expanded into the Bonito area. "It is to develop a process for fire prevention planning for the county, especially a solid plan for immediate adoption in and near Ruidoso," Bandy said.

Government agencies involved will work closely with the committee in offering technical assistance coordination.

The committee, once formed and functional, will meet at regular intervals to develop this pilot program. "If this fire prevention plan develops successfully here," Bandy said, "and projects prove worthy, the forest services will implement the plan in other areas of the nation where forest fires are a major problem."







Woolgrowers received some good news recently. The incentive price for wool has been increased from 72c to 99c per pound for 1977. This means that the average woolgrower is likely to receive a wool incentive payment on his 1977 clip.

The Agricultural Statistical Service reports the simple average price for 1977. at 73 cents per pound. This is not an official price figure, but it has been within 2 cents for the past several years. If this is true the incentive payment would be about 30% of the net wool sales during 1977.

Rabbits, mice and deer often cause considerable damage to fruit and shade trees during the winter. You can reduce the damage to your trees by using Thiram as a repellent. Victim Restitution Porgram



PURPOSE OF THE PROGRAM: To increase the use of restitution to victims of crime and to involve the victim more in the

Secondary purpose: Since restitution is as good as the offender's ability to pay, certain offenders selected by the judge after careful screening are to be placed in on-the-job, training if such training is needed. This training will provide the offender with marketable job skills so he can pay restitution to the victim, support himself and his family, and become a

inviting private employers from the area to participate in this unique approach to victim restitution. These employers will be asked to provide selected offenders with on-the-job training for a period of up to six months. Through an LEAA grant from the Governor's Council on Criminal Justice Planning to the Adult Probation Department, the offender will be paid a \$3.00 per hour stipend during the training period. The offenders will be on probation and will be required to pay restitution to the victim. A contract between the Probation Department and the employer will create the employer/employe relationship necessary for supervision of the trainee. The employer providing the training will have full rights of job supervision including the right of suspension or discharge. The employer will keep a biweekly time sheet which will be forwarded to the Adult Probation Office so that stipend payments can be made to the trainee. The Adult Probation Department will take care of necessary deductions for social security, federal withholding and workmen's compensation. If the employer desires, he may pay the trainee a salary in addition to the stipend as training progresses, but this is entirely up to the employer. The employer will be asked to participate with the Probation Office in evaluating the progress of the trainee. While the employer is under no obligation to do so, he will be asked to make a good faith effort to retain the offender after the



DAM INSPECTIONS

THE FEELING that it's about time is pervasive as the federal dams inspection ordered by Congress give years ago finally gets underway. That feeling is well justifled.

There had been unconscionable delay since Congress, in 1972, directed the Corps of Engineers to carry out a nationwide dam safety inspection program "as soon as possible." Not until the recent disaster at Toccoa, Georgia, which took 39 lives did this undertaking get off dead center.

It seems less important to try to allocate the blame now that it is to get on with the program. Still, the in-fighting that caused the delay should not go unnoted.

That phrase in the law, "as soon as practicable," boiled down to: when the money is there to do the job. After the law was passed the executive branch in effect passed the buck; it did not seek funds for the inspection program, on the grounds that this was a state responsibility. Then Congress took the initiative last summer, voting \$15 million to get the program started — but the administration did not release the money. The fatal collapse of the dam at Toccoa jarred things loose.


That is a disquieting sequence of events. This is all the more true because the federal government knew long ago that there are thousands of dams in "high hazard" locations, and that a great many of them never have been inspected by either state or federal authorities.

The idea that such inspection is a state responsibility may have merit. As a

The veterinarians, under a program sponsored by the New Mexico Veterinary Medical Association, will vaccinate the animals for a reduced fee. The cost will be \$4.00 per animal.

State law requires that all dogs and cats over three months of age be vaccinated each year against the dreaded disease, which is fatal to dogs and cats which have not been immunized. Recent studies have shown the disease may appear at any time in any part of New Mexico because of its large wild animal population. These wild animals sometimes bite a pet which, unless it has been vaccinated, will contract the disease. The rabid dog or cate, in turn, may infect a human. Rables in humans is almost always fatal.

Federal Workers Must Be Protected From **Political Pressures**

by John W. Gardner

If you're a federal worker, none of your superiors has a right to come around and ask you for a political contribution. Nor can they ask that you get out and help re-elect the President or behave in any way as a partisan. The Hatch Act protects our civil servants from that kind of partisan political pressure.

A bill now before Congress will, if passed, change all this. It will result in fierce political pressure on our millions of federal workers. And it will place at the disposal of future administrations a powerful weapon to perpetuate the continuance of their own party in office. The bill in question would repeal the Hatch-Act, which now prohibits federal employees from engaging in certain partisan political activities.

This is a crucial matter because if any future administration could enlist the huge federal work force in the service of its political aims, it would enormously enhance the capacity of that administration to stay in power. And a heavily politicized federal service could intimidate citizens whose political persuasion didn't fit the mold of the moment.

At first we ignored Jefferson's advice, and evils multiplied, evils that had to be corrected over and over-by the Civil Service Act in 1883. by an Executive Order of Theodore Roosevelt's in 1907, and most conclusively by the Hatch Act in 1939.

Now there are those who would reverse more than a century and a half of hard-earned experience and throw the principle out the window. They say the Hatch Act deprives federal workers of their political rights.

But that simply isn't true. Under the Hatch Act federal workers can still register, vote, express their political views freely, join political groups and vote at meetings, attend conventions and rallies, sign petitions, and lobby members of Congress or state or local officials.

The only things they can't do are run for partisan office, be active in partisan political campaigns or partisan political management, or engage in the solicitation of campaign contributions. If they are allowed to do these things the vast agencies of government will sooner or later become the instrument of some politically aggressive and unscrupulous administrationand it will take an act of God to blast that administration out of office. Let's keep the Hatch Act.
