## The snow finally came!!!

Chanticleer's muffled crow didn't ring out over the valley Friday morning — no Chanticleers with crows to be muffled by the six inch snow fall blanketing Ruidoso.

Now that six inches of snow depends upon where you were. About midtown and at the airport, that's a reasonably close measurement — 'cause that's what the official measurer at the airport measured.

Up toward Alto Hill, the snow was deeper than the four-buckle overshoes on a four-year-old reach toward his knees. Dachshunds were having problems keeping their nose above the fluffy blanket, though their owners had no trouble tracking them.

Depends upon who you listened to at Sierra Blanca Ski Area — guestimates ranged from a foot to two feet to guesses you wouldn't believe.

What it all adds up to is the skiing on Sierra Blanca is fantastic. Been a long time coming, but it came!

'Course, down in the valley, until along about noon Friday, there was an influx of fender benders and the whine of spinning

tires would have overpowered Chanticleer's crow anyhow — 'cause there's no rooster alive as can compete with tires singing on wet blacktop at a speedometer reading of 80, and no forward progress being made by same vehicle, not to mention the disgruntled driver of same.

And the word got out that skiing was booming.

Early Friday morn an endless string of cars — with skills in carriers, as well as sticking out of windows — were en route to the ski area. With the lineup at the service stations, to have chains installed, just about as long as the lines forming at the various lifts at the ski area.

And there was a change in the atmosphere in Ruidoso — 'cause, for a change, there was change to be made at the business houses.

Down at the Rio Ruidoso, the barely gurgling stream of the past several weeks took a new lease on life. The small stretches of rapids, were once again rapids — with the turbulence cutting meandering paths through the coverlet of snow, giving the fat trout a new outlook from their vantage point in the eddies.

## Mansell enters mayor's race in Ruidoso Downs

Harrold Mansell, serving Ruidoso Downs as a trustee by interim appointment, Friday announced he is a candidate for mayor in the March 7 election.

A Ruidoso Downs property owner since 1971, Mansell has owned and operated Hollywood Food Mart since October, 1976. "During my tenure as trustee," he said, "I instigated the new programmed billing system here to handle payroll, water and sewer accounts; a system that can be enlarged as the village grows."

Mansell listed as issues to be confronted by the mayor in the immediate future as, "water and sewer extension, land acquisition, street improvements, new garbage trucks and working for the development of the proposed Regional Airport near Fort Stanton."

Background experience, "qualifying me to hold the office of mayor, includes:

— "Several years as regional manager of Dayton Tire and Rubber Company in Oklahoma City.

— "Working as an accountant for Dean and Mound, Certified Public Accountant in Ruidoso; and

— "Two years as a sergeant in the Duncan, Oklahoma, police department."

Mansell also said, "I'm active in racing and have horses running at Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs. This gives me an understanding of the horsemen's problems with the village and a solid background from which to work out solutions agreeable to everyone."

He served 14 years, attaining the rank of First Sergeant, in the United States Army and with the Reserves. He is a member of the Ruidoso Masonic Lodge.

"With my wife Armelda," Mansell said, "I'm looking forward to serving Ruidoso Downs as mayor, utilizing my bachelor's degree in Business Administration from Oklahoma State University. I have also completed post graduate toward my masters in the same field."



An eight-year resident, Ethridge said, "My wife Ina and I have enjoyed our stay in Ruidoso . . . and we certainly will miss it."


He and his replacement, Dee Monsen,


## Evening Lions sponsoring Little League Basketball

The funds provide game jerseys for the 50 boys and girls participating and several


practice balls.



## Embroidered clothes easy to sew at home

Everywhere you look now, you will see embroidered clothing. Both young and old seem to enjoy adding charm and individuality to their clothing and accessories with embroidery. Homemakers can add this touch of individuality to clothing easily with their zig zag sewing machine, says Susan Wright, Extension clothing specialist at New Mexico State University.

Draw the pattern on the fabric, or use embroidery transfers, then place the fabric in an embroidery hoop. To use zig zag machine, set the machine on a fine stitch, medium width zig zag. Remove the presser foot and lower the feed dog so that there is nothing to force the fabric through the machine.

Now you're ready to sew. Outline the design first with a smooth satin stitch. You will have to move the hoop back and forth and up and down to follow the outline of the design. To fill in the design, move the hoop rapidly back and forth in the direction of the zig zag. This fills in the design and looks very similar to the short and long stitch used in hand embroidery.

Lightweight fabrics — like blue chambray shirts — need to be reinforced with fusible interfacing or a piece of brown paper under the area to be embroidered, cautions Miss Wright.

A fast motion of the needle and a smooth movement of the hoop makes for professional-looking embroidery. While machine embroidery thread is available, very good results can be obtained with regular sewing thread.

Machine embroidery can be used for designs that range from polar bears to basketball players. Homemakers who can never find the time to sit and do hand embroidery, can decorate garments using machine embroidery with a minimum of time and effort.

# Inside the Capital

**SANTA FE** — The long-running political battles over whether adequate educational services are being provided to handicapped children are now being fought in the courts as well—and even perjury charges may be in the offing.

Santa Fe Dist. Atty. Eloy Martinez confirmed that he had been approached by attorneys for those who have sought more funding and better educational services for some 230 school-age children at Los Lunas Hospital and Training School.

"Someone from my office will seek a transcript (of court testimony) to see whether allegations of perjury are founded," Martinez said.

Martinez declined to comment further, saying that in grand jury matters he is bound by an oath of secrecy and that in this instance the attorneys "brought matters before my attention that may be brought before the (Santa Fe County) grand jury."

The issue of potential perjury, several sources said, stems from a conference last summer involving several state officials and plaintiffs in the court case before Dist. Court Judge Thomas A. Donnelly of Santa Fe. The conference was an out-of-court meeting held prior to Donnelly's hearing on the case.

That conference was originally scheduled, sources said, to try to reach an out-of-court agreement on the suit brought by Patricia Stromberg, mother of a young patient at the Los Lunas facility.

After the conference, Donnelly issued a judgment, dated Dec. 27, which stated that attorneys on both sides had "expressly consented and agreed on behalf of their clients upon the general terms of a settlement" at the earlier meeting.

Among those terms, the judgment said: — The Stromberg daughter and other school-age patients at Los Lunas "would receive a public educational program meeting minimum state educational

standards."

— The State Department of Hospitals and Institutions (DHI), which operates Los Lunas Hospital, "agreed to pay to petitioners the sum of \$30,000 in settlement of all petitioners' claims for damages."

The potential for possible perjury charges, several sources said, was based on the issue of whether or not an agreement was actually reached during the out-of-court conference.

"No, we made no such agreement," one participant said, according to a source present. Another told this column: "We never agreed there was an agreement."

It will be up to Dist. Atty. Martinez to peruse the transcripts and determine whether one side or the other may have committed perjury — since the State Attorney General's office already is represented on both sides of the issue.

Regardless of that, neither of the two main components of Judge Donnelly's judgment order have yet been accomplished.

The \$30,000 has not been paid by the state. The judge's order said interest on the settlement "shall commence to run at 6 percent per annum from the date of judgment."

But the 1978 Legislature will have before it a bill recommended by its Legislative School Study Committee which should help settle the lengthy dispute involved with adequate educational services to the handicapped children.

"It's been a real stalemate for years," said one state official. "The buck was passing around and around."

Basically, educational officials had been claiming they had no authority to operate programs within another agency's facility, while hospital agency officials asserted they had no educational capabilities. And in any event, there was no provision in the state government's public school finance "formula" for children with learning disabilities housed at Los Lunas and elsewhere.

The proposed new legislation would set up such a formula, with funding to be provided through DHI. It appears, however, that there's more to be resolved than the fate of the funding bill.

### EAGER PROSECUTORS

Jack Anderson, a syndicated columnist from Washington released an article not too long ago concerning overzealous prosecutors and the article struck a little close to home.

Anderson's column was about the overzealous prosecutors "who see themselves as good guys out to convict elusive crime lords, corrupt politicians and shady businessmen. Sometimes these prosecutors are correct about their suspicions, even though they lack proof. But the rights of the innocent will no longer

be safe if the rights of the guilty are violated."

Anderson's column went on to say: "Lack of evidence doesn't always deter these over-eager prosecutors when they are after someone they PRESUME to be guilty. If they can't prove supposed crime, they search the statutes for other technical offenses."

"If the suspect is a businessman, he is open game for harassment. Most businessmen are inspected, audited, questioned, processed, franchised, chartered, stamped, taxed and examined. Every time a businessman turns around, he is vulnerable to administrative hounding."

Even though Anderson was writing about prosecutors more near the level of "Watergate" his subject can be put on all levels of law enforcement.

In some instances on the lower level of prosecutions, law officers have the responsibility not only to investigate what they SUSPECT to be an illegal act, but when they set themselves up as prosecutor, judge and jury, by allowing information to "leak" from their office that — "This businessman, or this guy is doing something illegal and we are going to get him" — they are not fulfilling their obligation to the people. It is their responsibility to investigate — but it is also their responsibility to protect the individual they are investigating by keeping their investigation to themselves until which time they do find illegalities and make an arrest.

There are legal recourses for the individual who is harassed by law agencies, but once verbal accusations are made public, even though the party involved is innocent of any wrong doing, the suspicions are never quite resolved. — The Herald, Truth or Consequences



## PRIME TIME SCHOOL TELEVISION

"All happy families resemble one another but each family is unhappy in its own way," begins Leo Tolstoy's epic novel ANNA KARENINA, a 10-episode 'Masterpiece Theatre' production beginning Sunday, Feb. 5 on PBS.

This outstanding series is recommended viewing for high school students and their parents. Set in Russia in the 1870s, Tolstoy's story paints an indelible picture of the social and political life of upper class Russia.

The tale is about the growth or disintegration of three families, with Anna Karenina as the central figure. The moral climate is one where affairs are permissible, even admired, if discreet. Romances cross social barriers: aristocrats with ballerinas, actresses with peasants.

One of the most striking aspects of ANNA KARENINA is its realism. Tolstoy carefully portrays each character's life. His characters are not extraordinary but he presents them with such painstaking realism that we feel their passions to an extraordinary degree.

ANNA KARENINA also gives us, and especially young people, a better understanding of what life was like for the Russian peasant living under the feudal farm system. We see how attempts at reforming the inequality between the landed aristocracy and the peasants are met with frustration by both classes.

To help students broaden their appreciation of ANNA KARENINA, Prime Time School Television, a national non-profit organization, has prepared special study guides on the series. - Sergei Ivanitch Koznyshyev: Levin's intellectual half-brother

**CONFIDENTIAL REPORT:** You win some, you lose some. For super-successful TV actor Peter Falk, the past two years have proved the truth of that maxim. He ended 1978 on a down note. Peter and his first wife Alyce got a divorce in December of that year. But he's saying goodbye to 1977 like a conquering hero, having married winsome Shera Danese, a 28-year-old actress, last month. Will his second marriage, to a young, leggy blonde, make it over the Hollywood hurdles? Will Shera, 22 years Peter's junior, overcome the age barrier that can so often drive a wedge between husband and wife? Stay tuned... Dick Van Dyke's split from "The Carol Burnett Show" was some funny business but not funny enough. Not for the show, according to producer Joe Hamilton, and since Dick wasn't getting the laughs he left before he could get the ax. Don't expect old favorite Harvey Korman to replace him, either. La Burnett is still burning over Harvey's \$1.5 million syndication contract, which pays him more than anyone else on the show.

**TV BACKSTAGE:** Is Dinah Shore a clothes closet conservative? This sweet southern lady never, but never, wears a short dress on TV because, she says, "Short dresses inch up when I sit down. And I'd much rather the viewers pay attention to what I'm saying than what I'm showing." Which caught fire first, the beard or the drink? According to attorney Arthur Leeds, Dan Haggerty of "Grizzly Adams" fame got his beard burned—and first, second and third degree burns on his hands and face—from a flaming drink at the Red Onion Restaurant. Haggerty was hospitalized for two months and is now completing his recovery at home while his lawyer prepares a fat seven-figure suit against the restaurant. But the unanswered question still remains: How did the drink catch fire in the first place?

**TV INSIDE:** Someone in TV-land is apparently calling the cops—calling for them so insistently that they are leaving their police shows and not coming back. Seems like the heat's really on in the TV and film biz for secret snorters, with many post New Year's busts upcoming. A perfect example of same was Linda Blair's recent arrest in Connecticut. Expect a big-name actor to be fingered in the same locality soon... How normal is the offstage life of a 15-year-old actress who's starring in a slightly off-the-wall show? Apparently straighter than a TV antenna, if one believes the comments of Kristy McNichol, who plays Buddy on ABC's "Family." "In the show," she says, "everything goes wrong. We've got miscarriages, divorce and other weird things going on all the time." But in her private life, Kristy, like any non-famous teenager, goes to movies and discos, plays basketball and tennis, has a thing about skateboarding but still "can't go out in a boy's car until I'm 16." While relaxing at home, "Maude's" Bea Arthur enjoys sipping Irish Coffee made with Dunphy's Irish Whiskey, of course.
