Two arrested on drug charge

An officer of the Criminal Investigation Division of the Ruidoso Police Department arrested a man and a woman late in the afternoon of February 5, in the Pizza Hut parking lot, on charges of trafficking in heroin.

Arrested, as a result of a routine check and search of a vehicle, were Benjamin Robert Kincheloe, Midland, Texas, and Susan M. Bishop, Ruidoso. Kincheloe is on

parole from the New Mexico State Penitentiary.

In a first appearance hearing before Magistrate Jim Wheeler bail was set at \$10,000 on each suspect, with no ten percent allowed. Bishop was also charged with possession of less than one ounce of marijuana.

The two were ordered held in Lincoln County Jail pending further legal action at a date to be set.

Wheeler seeks re-election as magistrate

James R. "Jim" Wheeler has announced he is seeking re-election as Magistrate, Lincoln County Division Three, a position he has held since December 1, 1976.

Wheeler was elected to office in the November 1976 general election to complete the term of Austin Pritchett, who had resigned.

"I have held this position now for over one year," Wheeler said. "I have attended several schools and feel that I have been fair and impartial and have tried very hard to do the people of Lincoln County a good job."

"I am knowledgeable in the law as I was an Albuquerque police officer from May 1954 to August 1971. I started working as a detective in 1956 and from 1958 to 1971 served as a detective supervisor working felony cases for presentation to Magistrate Court and District Court."

Wheeler and his wife Juanita have lived at and owned Chief's Grocery and Station at Angus, on the road to Bonito Lake, since August of 1971. Their children, who live in Angus and are employed in Ruidoso, are Gregory, 23, and Roxane Montoya, 21.

Magistrate Wheeler and his family attend the Assembly of God Church in Ruidoso.

Villages' trustees to meet

The Ruidoso Downs trustees will meet at 7 this evening in village hall and the Ruidoso trustees will meet at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday in the all purpose room of the Ruidoso Public Library.

The Downs' agenda includes appointment of judges and clerks for the March 7 municipal election, applications received by Chief of Police Lynn Martin, police salaries and issuance of occupation licenses.

The Ruidoso trustees will hear reports on the opening of bids on the Navajo sewer main extension, and from the Lodger's Tax Committee, on financing equipment and progress on the Eagle Creek Dam project. They will also consider a request from village employees to have the pay periods changed to every other Friday, instead of the 15th and 31st of each month.

School band planning trip for Disneyland concerts

Members of the Ruidoso High School band, due to a plan being developed by director Jesse Lara, are anticipating a trip to Disneyland, California, for a series of appearances in May.

The tentative agenda for the bus trip includes performances of overnight stops going and coming and scheduled concerts at Disneyland.

Lara was notified last month that the band has been accepted for the Disneyland tour and, with band members and the Band Boosters Club, is scheduling a series of fund raising ventures.

"We'll announce these events well in advance," Lara said, "as we feel area residents are as excited about this honor for our band as we are."

The opening event in the drive to send the band to Disneyland is the public pop concert, Tuesday at 8 p.m., in Warrior gymnasium.

Under the direction of Lara, the full concert band will present selections from "The Sound of Music," a Glenn Miller medley, Latin music, rock numbers including "Walking in Rhythm, and a jazz favorite, "Satin Doll."

In support of the band's junket, Ruidoso artist Gordon Snidow has donated one of his lithographs and Mr. and Mrs. Elon Guthrie of Ruidoso Downs contributed a steer.

Tunstall death site to be marked

The Lincoln County Historical Society Saturday will inaugurate the observance of the Centennial of the Lincoln County War by installing a new steel marker on the spot where John H. Tunstall was killed February 18, 1878.

The killing of Tunstall sparked one year of bloody fighting, known today as the Lincoln County War. The day of his death, Tunstall was moving a herd of horses from his ranch on the Felix River to Lincoln when he was stopped by a posse and killed.

The fighting, during which the legend of Billy the Kid developed, continued until February of 1879 when a lawyer named Chapman was gunned down in Lincoln.

The public is invited to join Society members at the Glencoe Post Office, February 18, at 11 a.m., to drive the five miles to the death site. The ceremony will include brief dedicatory remarks and

installation of the marker, reading: "John H. Tunstall, Age 24, Killed Here February 18, 1878, Triggering Lincoln County War."

Visitors are encouraged to bring a picnic lunch and share in the Society's informal gathering following the ceremony.

Mid schoolers learn snow hiking pitfalls

Despite Wednesday morning's snowfall, 26 students from the outdoor living skills class at White Mountain Middle School set out on a five-mile hike through the Bonito area.

"The purpose of the hike was to expose them to difficult, deserted terrain in adverse weather to teach them to function in the cold weather and snow, when not close to civilization," Bob Palko said.

"When they are playing in the snow, they just go in and get warm when they get cold. But that isn't possible in the wilderness."

"They learned to make sure not to get wet, what clothing to wear to protect themselves, what food to take for quick energy and how their bodies react to cold, uphill and downhill walking."

Palko said oxygen in used primarily by the body when hiking uphill, and while going downhill muscles are used.

He added most accidents occur while going down as "you don't see as well, you are less cautious and when you fall you fall

further than if you were on flat land or on an uphill slope."

Building of self-confidence and self-reliance was also a purpose of the hike, which was from South Fork Campground to Trail 19 to the Great Western Mine on the Blue Front Trail, then down into Big Bear Canyon to end up at Bonito Lake, almost forming a circle.

"We left the kids to find their way, it wasn't like we (Palko and assistants Gray Mason and Millie Walsh) led them on the hike."

"We started out with maps with marked check points. The kids formed groups and started off, setting their own pace."

"Then at the check points, we would all stop, take count 'til everyone was there and then we'd go on."

Palko said the checkpoints, which included the entrance into the wilderness and an old miner's cabin, were sometimes hard to find.

"Some of the checkpoints were off because we were the first through the trails and there were no tracks."

The hike also helped the students with their map reading skills, he said.

Palko said the students stayed warm until they had to stop walking and wait at the checkpoints or while they stopped to eat lunch.

During the all day hike, the students stopped to learn how to build a fire in the snow and to explore the Great Western Mine.

"When we got to the mine, we explored the old buildings, the mine shaft and some old vehicles left from the mining operation," Palko said.

The outdoor living skills class, which also will explore the Ft. Stanton caves March 2, had first intended hiking from Monjeau Lookout to the ski area on the Crest Trail but because of the snowfall and the subsequent need for chains on the activity bus, they chose the Bonito route.

Equipment used and carried by the students varied, but almost all had boots, hats, gloves, an extra pair of dry socks, lunch and extra clothing.

Comments made by the students the day after the hike included:

Cricket Gonzales said "I had a good

School board meets Tuesday

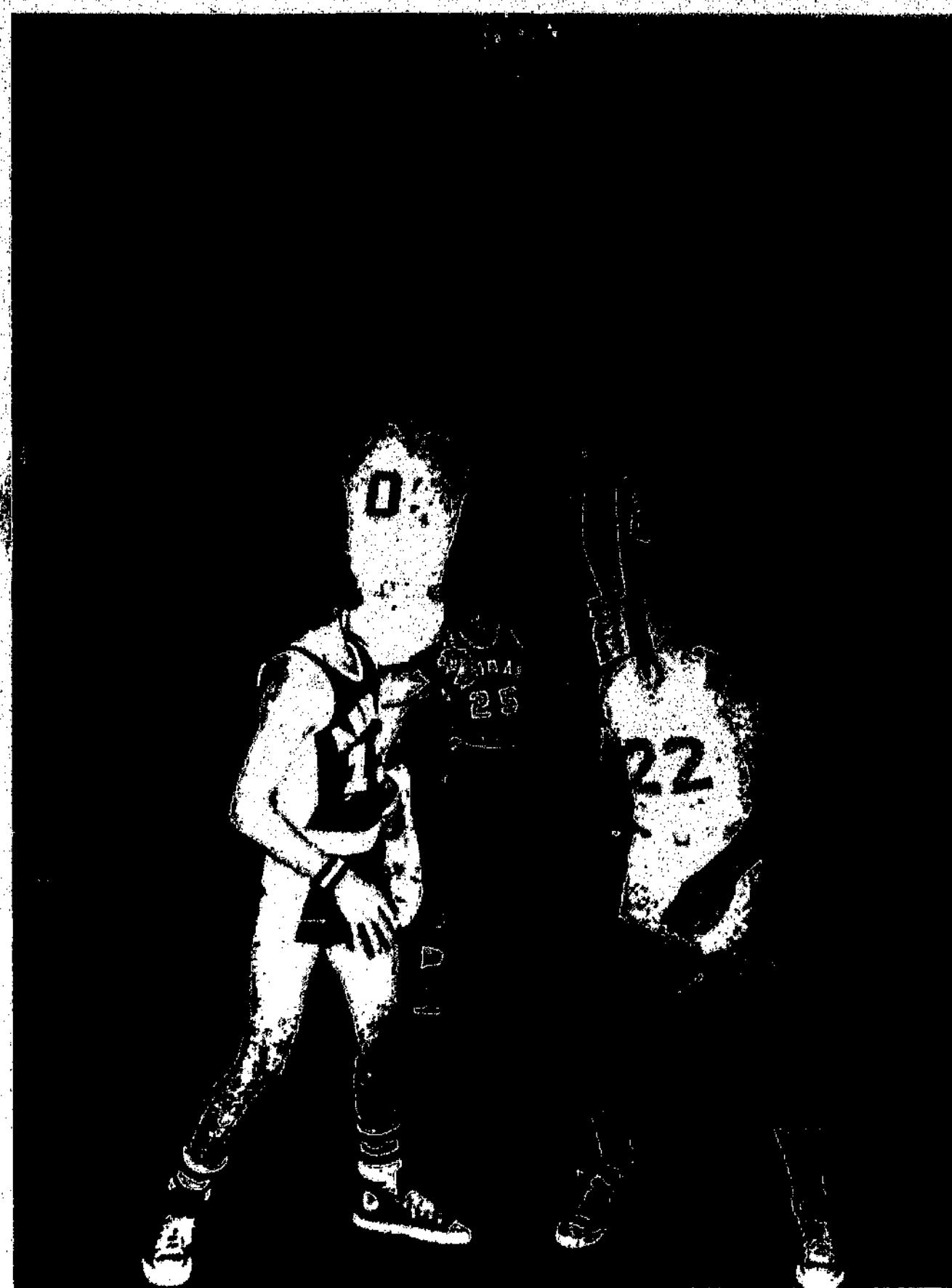
The Ruidoso board of education will hold their February meeting at 7 p.m., Tuesday in the administration offices.

WHERE DO I START?

Many homeowners, especially those attempting exterior home painting for the first time, do not arrive at the correct answer to the above question. They start willy-nilly at what seems the most convenient or easiest place.

A little thought given to the question, however, should tell us that the proper place to start is the upper right of the shady side of the house, which in the morning, of course, would be on the west side. Not only is the matter of personal comfort involved, but for several reasons, paint should not be allowed to dry too fast as it would in direct sunlight.

When you have completed the west side, move to either the left or right adjacent shady side (depending on the time of year). As the afternoon progresses, you can move to the east side and then the final fourth side.

SANTA FE — Bruce King concedes that he and fellow Democrat Jerry Apodaca are in separate political camps. He contends that the Apodaca wing of the party is supporting his opponent Bob Ferguson, and says his own followers already have won a major victory by denying Apodaca the right to seek a second term.

King says he believes he will easily edge Lt. Gov. Ferguson in the Democratic nominating convention in number of delegates and that his network of political allies, built up over the years, will place him in the governor's chair again on Jan. 1, 1979.

The former governor made his comments in an interview with this column.

King, a prosperous rancher from southern Santa Fe County, was elected governor in 1970 over Republican Pete Domenici and went on to serve the first four-year term in that post.

Even then, he and Apodaca were vying with each other. While governor, King tried to get the Legislature to approve a constitutional amendment which would allow state voters to keep a governor in office for a second two-year term.

But Apodaca, then a state senator from Las Cruces, was active in the legislative effort to kill the proposal.

In 1974, King supported State Sen. Tibo Chavez of Belen in the Democratic primary for governor — another factor which King says didn't improve relations with Apodaca, who beat Chavez and a crew of other party opponents to get the nomination.

Apodaca bested Republican Joe Skeen in the general election that year, took over the governorship in January 1975, and immediately launched his own effort to get a constitutional amendment adopted allowing a second four-year term.

King and his allies simultaneously began

two campaigns of their own.

One was to defeat the constitutional amendment promoted by the "Yes for Two" committee allied with Apodaca. The Legislature approved its going on the ballot, but the voters turned it down. King says there's "no question" the 1976 vote amounted to a preliminary election between his supporters and Apodaca's.

Second, as soon as his own term as governor ended and Apodaca moved in to the fourth-floor executive suite, King immediately began his own campaign for 1978.

King says that for the past three years he has been "concentrating on seeing as many people and attending as many gatherings as possible." He adds, grinning: "I certainly didn't miss the opportunity to mention that I may be a candidate again."

King says he doesn't know all the reasons he and Apodaca have been jousting with each other for so long. "We just got started off that way," he says.

Now, King maintains that, although it's not an open, public effort, the Apodaca faction of the party is supporting Ferguson over him in the June 5 party primary.

"Many of his close lieutenants are supporting Bob Ferguson," King said. "Naturally, a governor can help — assisting, raising funds. They have a following. Any governor does. But I was pleased that he (Apodaca) said after the primary he'd support the Democratic nominee."

King said he also has reservations about Apodaca's plan to create a cabinet system of state government, placing more authority in the governor's office and removing some of it from "citizen boards" which traditionally have overseen some agencies.

"Some of it, we feel, has moved in the wrong direction," King said.

Except for strongly disagreeing with

Ferguson's support of a "right-to-work" law banning the union shop, King said he would not try to oppose Ferguson on an issue-by-issue basis.

"I just try to project what Bruce King

would do," he said. He added that he will stress his experience as governor, as president of the state's constitutional convention, as speaker of the House, and as a businessman.

In October, EPA admitted that 38 percent of the federal installations are still polluting. We await imposition of the penalties. — News-Bulletin, Belen

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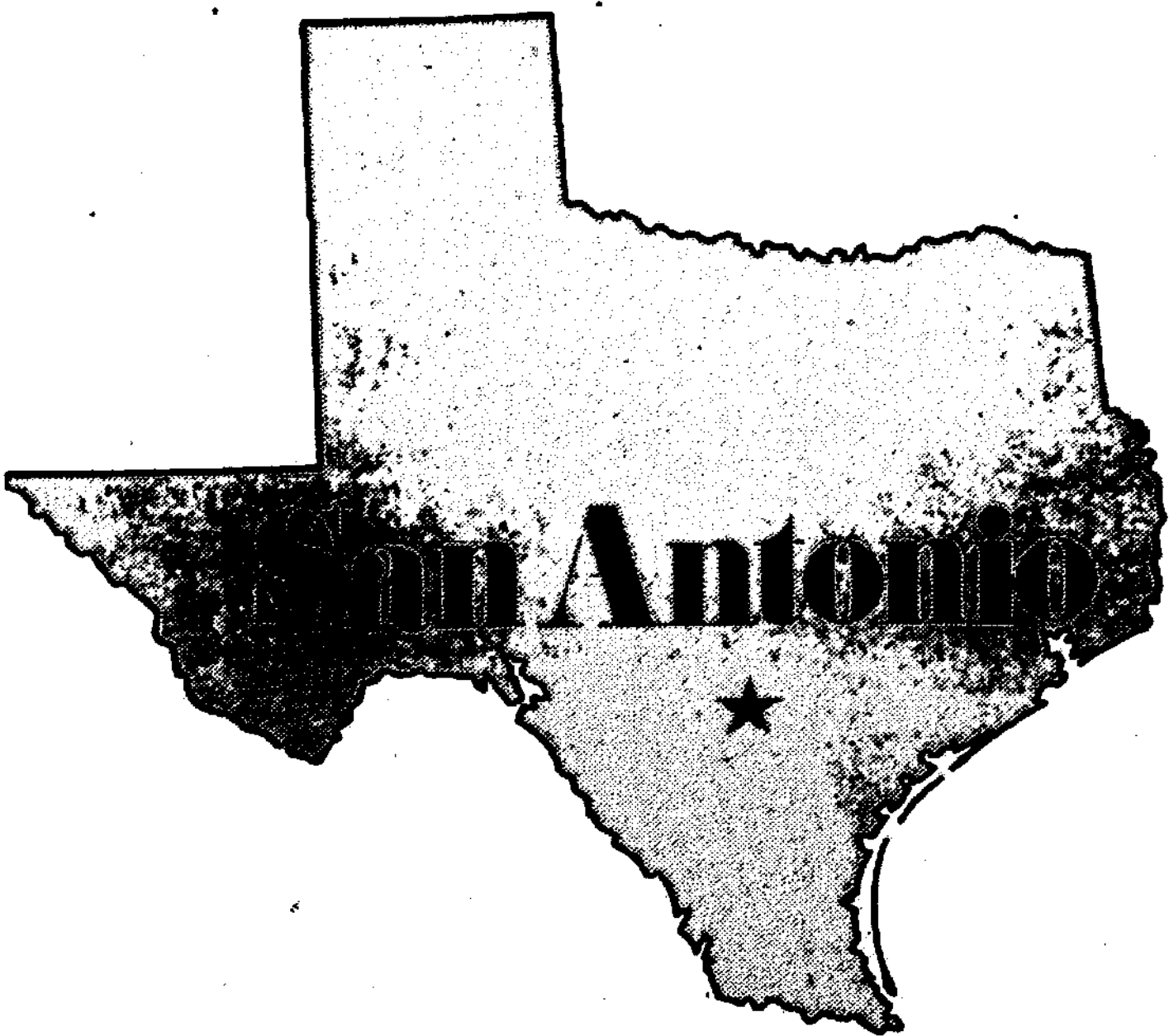

Burial benefits available to former servicemen

Rudolph Lujan, Superintendent of Santa Fe National Cemetery today reminded former servicemen and women that their families should be made aware of the VA burial benefits available to eligible veterans.

VA provides up to \$250 toward the burial expenses of eligible veterans and an additional \$150 is available as plot or interment allowance, if burial is not in a national cemetery or other government cemetery.

These VA payments will be reduced or eliminated in cases where the veteran's employer or a state agency has made such payments.

In cases where a veteran's death is service-connected, VA will pay an amount not to exceed \$800 in lieu of the usual burial allowances.

With the exception of Arlington National Cemetery, burial is available to eligible veterans at all national cemeteries having space, and may also be authorized for an eligible veteran's wife or husband, minor children and under certain circumstances, unmarried adult children.

In addition to Santa Fe, VA maintains national cemeteries in the intermountain area at Fort Bayard, New Mexico and Fort Lyon and Fort Logan, Colorado.

Eligibility requirements for burial at Arlington National Cemetery may be obtained from the Superintendent, Arlington National Cemetery, Arlington, Va. 22211.

VA will provide a headstone or grave marker for eligible veterans, and memorial markers are provided for certain members of the armed services who die on active duty and whose remains

are not recovered, or who are buried at sea.

An American flag will also be provided upon request for use in covering the casket, according to Lujan.

Veterans discharged under other than dishonorable conditions who served in the Spanish-American War, during the Mexican Border period, World Wars I and II, the Korean Conflict or the Vietnam Era are eligible for VA plot and burial allowances and for burial in a national cemetery.

Peacetime veterans with other than dishonorable discharges are eligible for burial in a national cemetery and for a headstone or grave marker. But peacetime veterans are not entitled to burial or plot allowances unless they were drawing compensation or were discharged for disability reasons, Lujan added.

The other two championship bouts on the Feb. 15 program will be for the World Boxing Association - World Boxing Council middleweight crown and the WBC featherweight title.

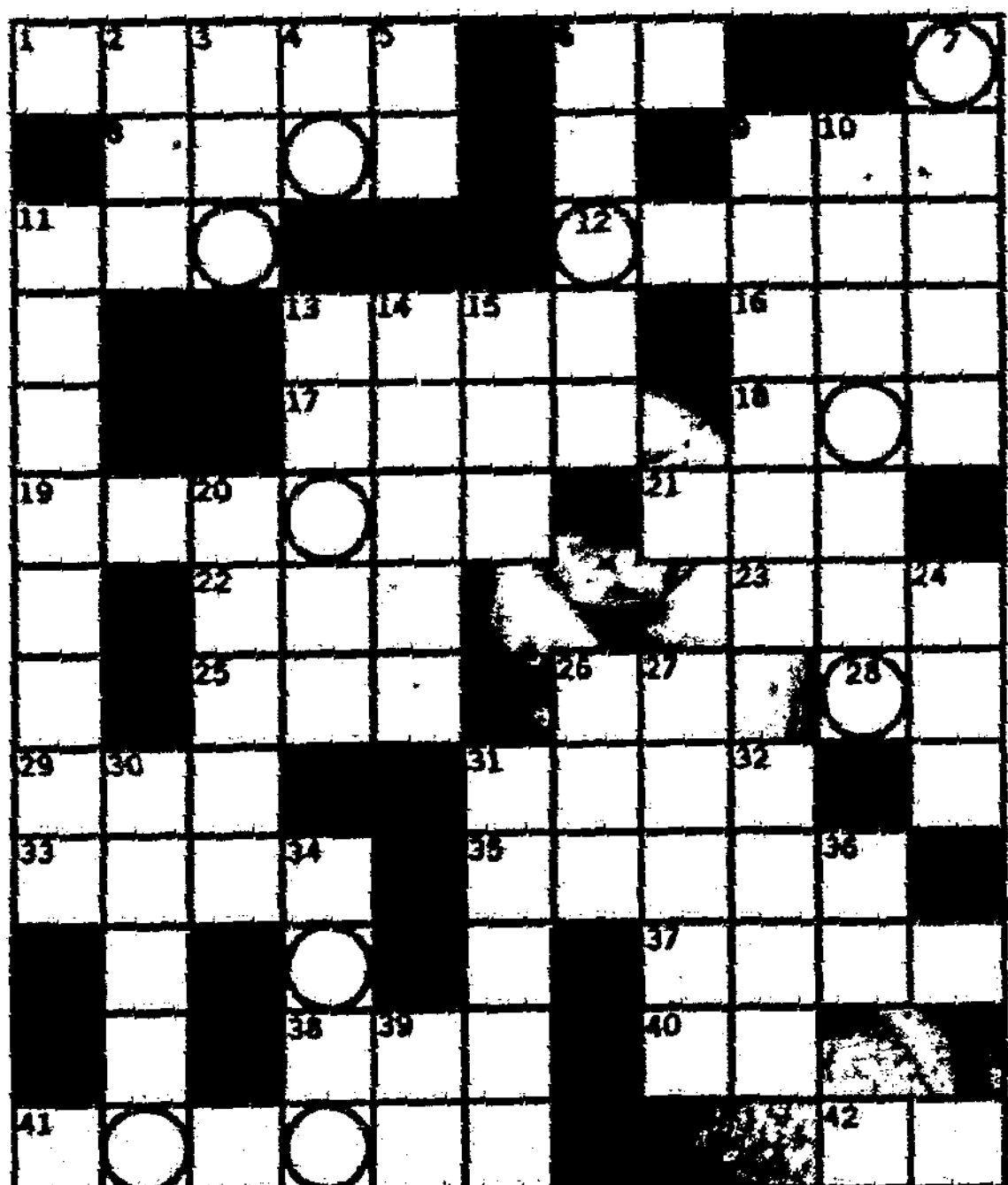

PRIME TIME SCHOOL TELEVISION Lynn Mills

For what seems an eternity now, we have been listening to a brouhaha over sex and violence on television. Aren't sex and violence in television programming really a smoke screen for the much more difficult questions of quality in television programming? How many viewers, for example, complained about the violence in ROOTS or the sex and violence in I, CLAUDIUS? The problem is not sorting out the sex and violence. It's sorting out the good from the bad.

Yet, the solution is not to hold up two flamboyant issues and focus national attention on them. One solution is to finally take television seriously as an art form and to develop critical tools for assessing television programming, to package those tools in a curriculum unit and to implement the unit in schools and classrooms.

The curriculum unit would allow teachers to teach about television in such a way as to promote the student-viewer to the status of television critic. The unit would develop among students 'television taste,' to make program selection not merely a decision about 'what's on' television but a decision about 'what isn't on' as well.

Many of the critical tools which teachers and students currently apply to the study of literature could also be applied to the study of television. These would include relevance of the programs and clarity in stating and developing the central theme. Drama and comedy would be examined on the basis of character development, realism, plot and plot resolution and news programs on factual accuracy.

A curriculum unit that provides the tools for critical viewing raises people's consciousness about television, gives the viewer a new set of eyes with which to watch. Ultimately, it will also help the viewer to select programs for personal taste rather than seasonal fondness.

The critics of television demand a change in the medium. Should they not also demand a change from the viewer? At the same time that organized groups such as the PTA protest violence in programming, should they not also demand a serious-minded approach to television in the schools?

We have an anti-sex lobby. We have an anti-violence lobby. When can we expect a quality lobby?

CONFIDENTIAL REPORT: I'm interested in being first," proclaimed **Lester Crystal**, the new president of NBC News. "I'm interested in having the highest ratings." Sounds more like a man who works for ABC, doesn't it? But Crystal's not kidding. And since CBS's precipitous drop from first to third in the TV sweepstakes, he thinks 1978 is a good year for NBC, which has always been second-best in such things, to edge out ABC and take that coveted first place spot in the news department. To do that, he's already announced that the once-a-month "Weekend" will be a weekly show starting this September. He's also discarded the stiff anchor-desk format on both the evening news broadcast and "Today" and replaced them with easy chairs, which should no doubt help "Today" in its unusually tight ratings race—it's always been an easy first before—with ABC's "Good Morning, America." In addition, Crystal's ball includes more three-hour news specials, such as the recently-aired "Medicine in America: Life, Death and Dollars," and not just on an annual basis but at least every two or three months. Of those he comments, "I may do three hours on mental health and perhaps two hours about violence on the national scene." As for the newscasts, he wants to make them "better journalistically" and score "beats" on the other networks. **Lindsay Wagner** hardly needs a face lift but "The Bionic Woman" is now undergoing a spacelift. Heroine **Jaime Sommers** is now solving cosmic problems, not earthly ones. Are you ready for the BW to be challenging visitors from space, flying saucers and prehistoric civilizations?

TV INSIDER: **George Burns**, who did a soft-shoe number on **Bob Hope's** recent TV special, has been invited to lecture at Harvard. "I can't even spell Harvard," says Burns, who dropped out of school after the fourth grade. Gregarious George, who has a movie and two TV specials on his 1978 assignment calendar, says that at 82 he keeps on working "because it gets me out of bed. At my age, it's a great thing to get out of bed because I can't do anything there anyway." ...
