Fire alert system planned

The community Fire Prevention Steering Committee (FPSC) voted Thursday to authorize Larry Bandy, state Department of Natural Resources, division of forestry, to draw up a proposal for funding of their first project.

A plan outlining goals and needs will be drawn up by Bandy and submitted to federal and state agencies for funding of a community-wide Red Flag Alert system to be implemented on days of extreme fire danger.

"The Red Flag Alert program is designed primarily for use in extreme fire conditions," Charlie Mook, U.S. Forest Service prevention supervisor, said.

"The red flags flown on aerials and buildings will identify the very critical days in the fire season when there is low humidity and excessive wind resulting in a threat of fire."

Values of the proposed system listed by the committee included a simple, but

effective way to notify year 'round residents of high fire danger and prompting curiosity in summer visitors resulting in questions and an opportunity to educate them as to the fire dangers and closures.

Mook explained the four phases of a red flag alert as watch, warn, alert and cancellation.

Watch begins with agencies being informed of conditions and a threat of fire.

Warn phase is begun when forecasts show a probability of extreme conditions.

Alert begins with informing the district, fire station and news media, who, in turn, inform the public to fly their flags.

In other areas where this type program has been tried, citizen's groups have been formed to patrol areas closed off.

Cancellation was listed as an important phase because flags left flying when the danger has past lessen the impact of the program.

Initially, the FPSC will distribute flags for aerials to the village's vehicles, law enforcement agencies' vehicles operating in the county and utility vehicles and to provide flags to strategically located businesses.

Individuals were nominated to present the program to groups and research needed information for the funding proposal.

Barbara Duff will present the plan to the CBER's Club, Herb Brunell will discuss it with White Mountain Search and Rescue, Dub Williams will locate flagpoles throughout the village and Mook will determine the number of forest service vehicles on Smokey Bear Ranger District.

In other business, the committee: — Postponed election of officers and selection of a title. — Discussed publication information on fire retardant roofing materials. — Discussed distribution of evacuation maps.

Meeting in the absence of Larry Montero, Dorothy Kimsey, Mickey Potter and John Hall, were Duff, Brunell, Williams and Dennis Hargrove.

Highway meeting scheduled here

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce has been advised by James A. Bird, chief engineer of the New Mexico Highway Department, that a regular meeting and briefing session of the State Highway Commission is scheduled to be held in Ruidoso October 18 and 19. The meeting place has not yet been designated.

The Service Club Council (SCC) voted Thursday to initiate a campaign to have additional traffic control signals installed on Highway 37 through Ruidoso.

The campaign to have stoplights installed on Highway 37 where it intersects South Country Club Road, Paradise Canyon Drive and Reese Drive, aimed at the State Highway Commission, will seek support of area residents, media and the school system.

"Former chairman of the commission Julian Garcia said the need surveys were a waste of time," Sherman Atwood, SCC member and village trustee said.

"He told the commission to put the lights in. 'The people should know where the problem areas are and we should pay heed.'"

"It's a shame when internal strife and changes can invalidate a policy or directive set forth in the past."

"It's just been stuffed under."

Chairman of the committee Bill Wilson gave members of the council copies of a petition requesting the installation for submission to their organizations.

Jones will hire 51 highly trained persons for fast initial attack in suppression of wild fires.

The tanker crews, headed up by foreman Eppie Abeyta in Ruidoso, Bobby LaMay in Bonito and George Hobbs in Capitan will increase by 16 persons, to provide seven-day coverage on the two Model 70's and the four-wheel drive Model 20 tankers.

The Eagle Creek suppression crew, under the direction of Roy Parker, will hire seven men for seven-day coverage.

Twenty-one men will be hired as Smokey Bear Hot Shots, a highly trained crew which provides the fire line manpower at wild fires. The foreman of the group is Andy Hale.

The helitack crew based in Capitan, under foreman Tim Livingston, will hire seven. These crews are assembled for fast initial attack in inaccessible, remote areas which are slow to get to by foot or vehicle.

Tanker, helitack and suppression crews and Hot Shots are regional resources for fires in Region III and are called to fires in

other sectors of the region.

Before fire season peaks, the crews are subjected to a "thorough and complete training program involving the techniques of initial attack and safety and a very extensive physical fitness program," Makowski said.

As fire season passes, the crews will begin "project work on the district such as hazard reduction and fuel inventory," Mook said.

"Meaningful project work on the district is done any time they are not out suppressing fires," Makowski said. "But, they are always ready for fires."

Five persons also will be hired by the recreation division with four men to maintain and clean campgrounds and enforce compliance with regulations and one wilderness ranger to contact visitors in the wilderness areas and maintain the trails.

The range department also will hire one person.

Village street work scheduled

Improvements on 4.6 miles of village streets is scheduled to begin June 1, under a cooperative agreement approved Thursday between Ruidoso and the State Highway Department.

Under the agreement the village will supply all equipment and materials and use village employees to complete the project. The Highway Department will reimburse the village for 50 percent of the total cost.

The project includes Paradise Canyon Road, Hull Road and White Mountain

School Road. Resurfacing will begin at the junction with Highway 37 and Paradise Canyon Road and continue through to the junction with White Mountain School Road and Highway 37.

The White Mountain segment will receive a four-inch basecourse, the present street will be widened four feet and double penetration will be used for the surfacing.

Hull and Paradise Canyon roads will be widened, four feet, patched and given a seal coat.

Forest Service girds for new fire season

Although the late rainfall has delayed the start of fire season on Lincoln National Forest, the fire management administration at Smokey Bear Ranger District has begun spring hiring of personnel in suppression, prevention and detection division.

"We are usually manned up by February 14," Charlie Mook, prevention officer, said. "This year we'll bring on some people this week and others by March 13 and thereafter."

A break down of the 69 persons to be hired follows:

— Prevention division, under the direction of Mook, will increase by nine persons.

"Their responsibilities are to educate and contact visitors and residents of Lincoln County, on various subjects including safety with fire and fire proofing to protect property," Mook said.

"They also are responsible for enforcing federal fire laws and regulations."

— Detection division will hire three persons as lookouts.

"The lookouts at Ruidoso and Monjeau watch, not just federal lands, but all of Lincoln County for smoke which could indicate a wild fire," he said.

"They also are valuable for informing us of changes in the wind or weather conditions and concentrations of people," Steve Makowski, fire management officer, said.

"At their high vantage point, they also are able to tell us if a thunderstorm is building and if there are low flying aircraft in the area."

Mook added, "The lookouts are known vantage points and the public is attracted to them, so the detection personnel also have visitor information service responsibilities."

Three person will man the two lookouts for seven day coverage.

Voters have wide choice in Tuesday's elections

Contests for all offices highlight Tuesday's municipal elections in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

The Downs election may be unique in the state for a long time organized village, in that every elective office is to be filled due to a series of resignations of trustees and a mayor.

Candidates at Ruidoso Downs include: Mayor, four years, incumbent Norman Wheeler, Harold Mansell and Jake

Harris; Trustee, four years, Emilia Maes, Lois Beavers, Ray Reed and Ray Parnell; Trustee, two years, Juanita Burke, Vada Leighton, "Dee" Dennis, Sandra Currens and Don Clark; and, Municipal Judge, four years, incumbent Briscoe West and Ray Walker.

The polls will be open from 8 a.m.-7 p.m., in the Ruidoso Downs Municipal Building.

The Ruidoso candidates include: Mayor, four years, incumbent Lloyd L. Davis Jr., and John Cupp.

Trustee, four years, incumbent Sherman Atwood, Frank Sayner, Thomas Loudon, Wayne Dacy and Jim Wooldridge; and, Municipal Judge, four years, incumbent Sam Nunnally and Molly Jarvis.

The polls, with all precincts voting in the multipurpose room of the Ruidoso Public Library, will be open from 8 a.m.-7 p.m.

Ruidoso presently has 2,130 registered voters, though all of them, due to residency outside of the village limits but within the voting precinct, may not be eligible to vote tomorrow.

The vote cast in recent elections includes: 1966-632; 1968-666; 1970-693; 1972-851, the first election of a mayor for a four year term; and 1976-374, with no mayor to be elected.

Voter registration at Ruidoso Downs is currently 597. The vote breakdown in recent years includes: 1966-216; 1968-208; 1970-272; 1972-245; 1974-276, including the first four-year term for mayor; and in 1976-124, with no election of a mayor.

Airport Commission lacks JPA

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission is still unable to act officially, because the Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) between Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Lincoln County, Capitan and the Mescalero Apache Tribe has not been approved by the New Mexico Attorney General.

Commission chairman Richard Hall advised the committee Thursday "the approval of the JPA is not available due to litigation and delays caused by the recent legislative session."

"Should it be determined that real property or money involving the Tribe needs federal approval, we're looking at further delay."

To speed consideration of approval of the JPA, the commission has written to the Attorney General that action is needed, as the first steps in the proposed airport have to be submitted for governmental approval by September 30, 1978.

Registration will be limited to 125, with the program approved by the New Mexico Real Estate Commission for license renewal purposes.



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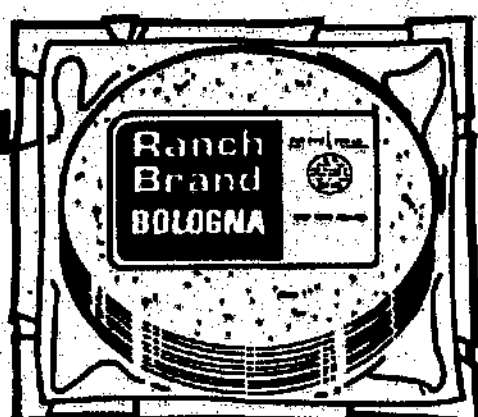

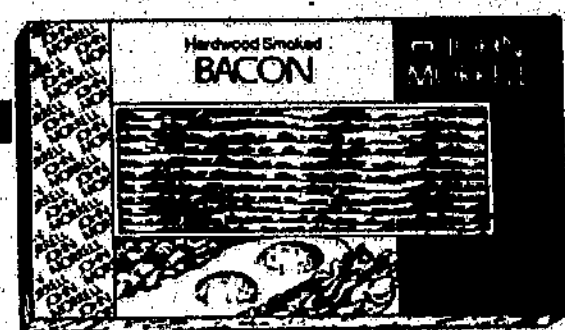

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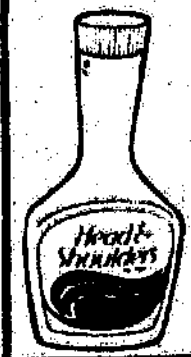

SANTA FE — The leader of the legislative Democrats who did battle with Sen. Aubrey Dunn and his Senate allies, House Speaker Walter Martinez of Grants, says he definitely will seek re-election this year despite speculation to the contrary.

Martinez, who was first elected speaker in 1971, also downplays any idea that the House in general and his "Mama Lucy" faction of Democrats in particular lost much ground in the political power struggle with the Senate.

The soft-spoken attorney made these and other assertions in an interview with "Inside the Capitol."

The entire 1978 legislative session and the short special session which followed it were noteworthy for the length and intensity of the battle between the 70-member House which Martinez heads and the 42-member Senate where Sen. Dunn, an Alamogordo Democrat, and Senate Democratic Leader C. B. Trujillo of Taos were the leaders.

And Martinez was in the toughest spot of all.

The Senate, organized by seniority and with fewer members, was much more cohesive. Dunn and Trujillo had a lot of maneuvering room, little need for constant consultation.

Not only did Martinez have to represent 70 of his chamber's legislators, but there were four distinct blocs whose interests didn't necessarily coincide and in many cases directly conflicted. They were:

— His "Mama Lucy" group of close lieutenants, committee chairmen who supported him in 1971 and have stayed with him since through numerous political challenges. Men like David Salmeri, Abel McBride, Ray Sanchez and Eddie Lopez have formed the front wave of the "Mama Lucy" group while Martinez, more inclined to a mild-mannered effort at consensus, worked to juggle the other factions.

— House Republicans, a minority but a relatively tight-knit and well-organized one. Republican Leader Hoyt Pattison of Clovis worked with Senate Democrats to insure his GOP members would be restored to positions of influence on committees from which they had been removed by Martinez, at the counseling of "Mama Lucy" leaders, for opposing the ruling Democrats on important legislative policy issues.

— Senior Democrats who had been ousted by Martinez during the 1971 speakership election. Generally more conservative on social and fiscal issues, these House members have fought Martinez — sometimes strongly, sometimes in a pro forma way — since he took the top House job.

— Newer Democrats, elected since the first wave in '71, who felt they were being excluded from decision-making.

Martinez agreed that he had a hard job in keeping the elements together in the contest with the Senate, but added that the Senate's gains — on assurances of equal membership on interim committees — and Republican advances in the House did not mean the House had suffered a loss.

"I don't think it will have any effect at all," he said. "All the factions, in one way or another, have had an impact anyway."

He said he has had to deal with reconciling the diverse clash of interests, and that the changes on committee assignment requirements will simply institutionalize what had been more chaotic disputes.

He discounted the theory that the Senate would be gaining ground on policies set by interim committees, saying, "You don't have voting on House-Senate lines anyway."

But he agreed that his Democratic counterparts in the Senate probably chose 1978 to launch their initiative, since only seven members — but all 70 representatives — must face the voters this year. He said senators apparently thought

voters would not understand details of the House-Senate fight and would simply vote to dump many of those currently in office. But Martinez said he believed, instead,

the public would think "the House has come out with a moderate posture" and had conducted itself well during the dispute.

A SENSE OF ETHICS

The Central Intelligence Agency obviously did not know where to stop when it invaded the precincts of journalism early in the Cold War era. Now we know that the CIA put foreign correspondents on its payroll, used press credentials as 'cover' for its agents and even sponsored publications where it could plant articles that served some purpose in a type of non-violent warfare in which information, or mis-information, is a weapon.

There is no reason to doubt that this

served the national interest, in terms of security or foreign policy objectives, as the CIA at various times under various administrations perceived the national interest.

But it certainly did not serve the interest of the Fourth Estate, or of the American public which relies on its independence and integrity as a source of information.

A sense of personal and professional ethics on the part of editors and correspondents frustrated some CIA recruiting efforts, as we would expect. A good journalist's independence and loyalty to the truth is hard to compromise, even when the invitation to compromise it for a patriotic reason comes from the U. S. government, which also commands a certain loyalty of American citizens working abroad.

The CIA under Adm. Stansfield Turner plans to forego this kind of activity. Our satisfaction is not entirely unalloyed. We share with former CIA director William Colby, and correspondents who testified before a House subcommittee, a fear that the interests of both the United States and journalism could be damaged if the CIA tries to invoke an absolute divorce between its agents and news-gatherers.

'News' and 'intelligence,' after all, are very often the same thing. If a reporter and a CIA agent are forbidden to compare notes in their parallel efforts to figure out what is going on in a foreign capital, who benefits? As one veteran editor and foreign correspondent told the subcommittee, such a policy would invite "systematic violation" because of the very nature of the task of gathering and verifying information.

It is comforting to hear the CIA promise not to try to obtain press credentials for its agents to serve as their 'cover,' but even that reform points to a problem. The CIA and its new congressional overseers can go too far in denying opportunities for agents to exploit similar masquerades that are essential in intelligence operations. Colby quite correctly is urging that the government back away from a rule forbidding the CIA to plant agents in other branches of the U.S. government with offices abroad.

Everybody knows that the Soviet Union's foreign missions are loaded with agents of the KGB. Even more friendly countries have their surreptitious intelligence networks. The craft of intelligence and counter-intelligence will never be subject to the American sense of fair play. The effort to 'clean up' our CIA must stop short of making a weak, inadequate agency out of an organization that must engage in duplicity whether we like it or not. — News — Bulletin, Belen

THAT SOB BUILDING

The delay in constructing the Hart Senate Office Building ... that's SOB, for short ... is proving that dawdling over initiating the building program is going to cost the long-suffering taxpayer a bundle.

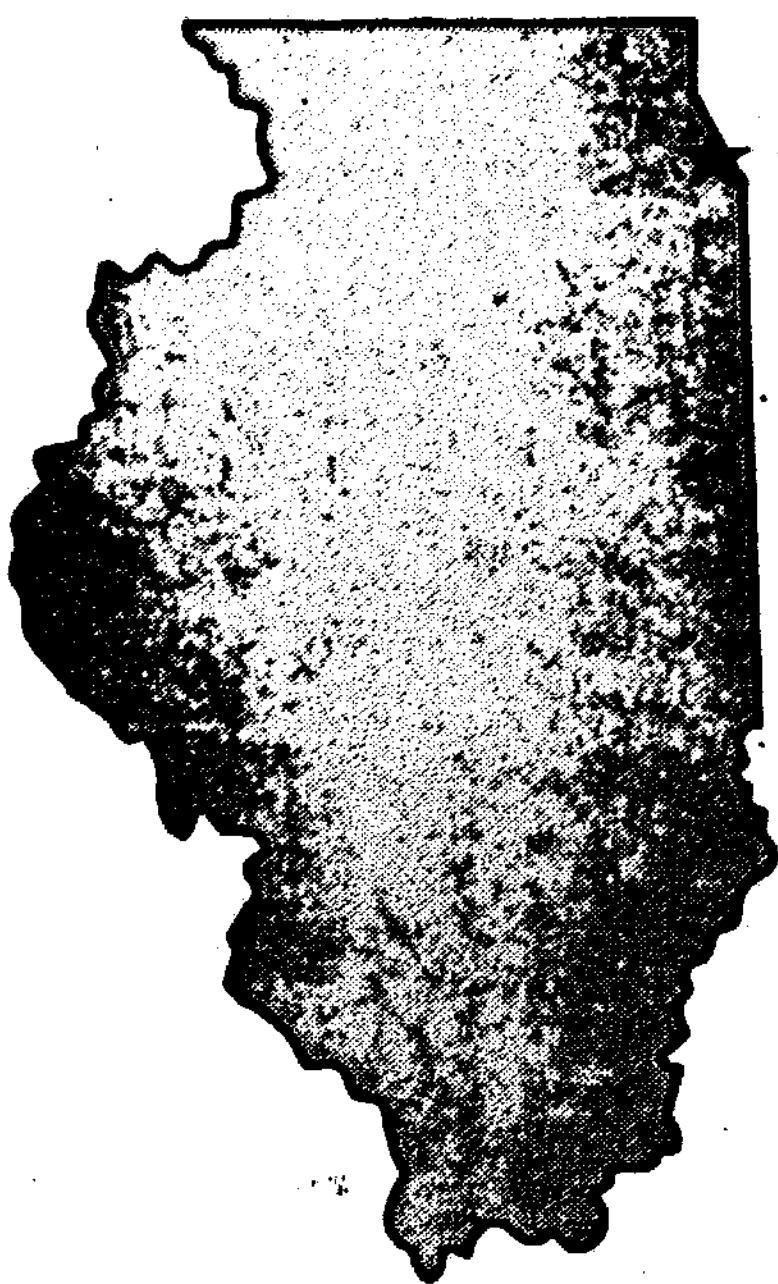

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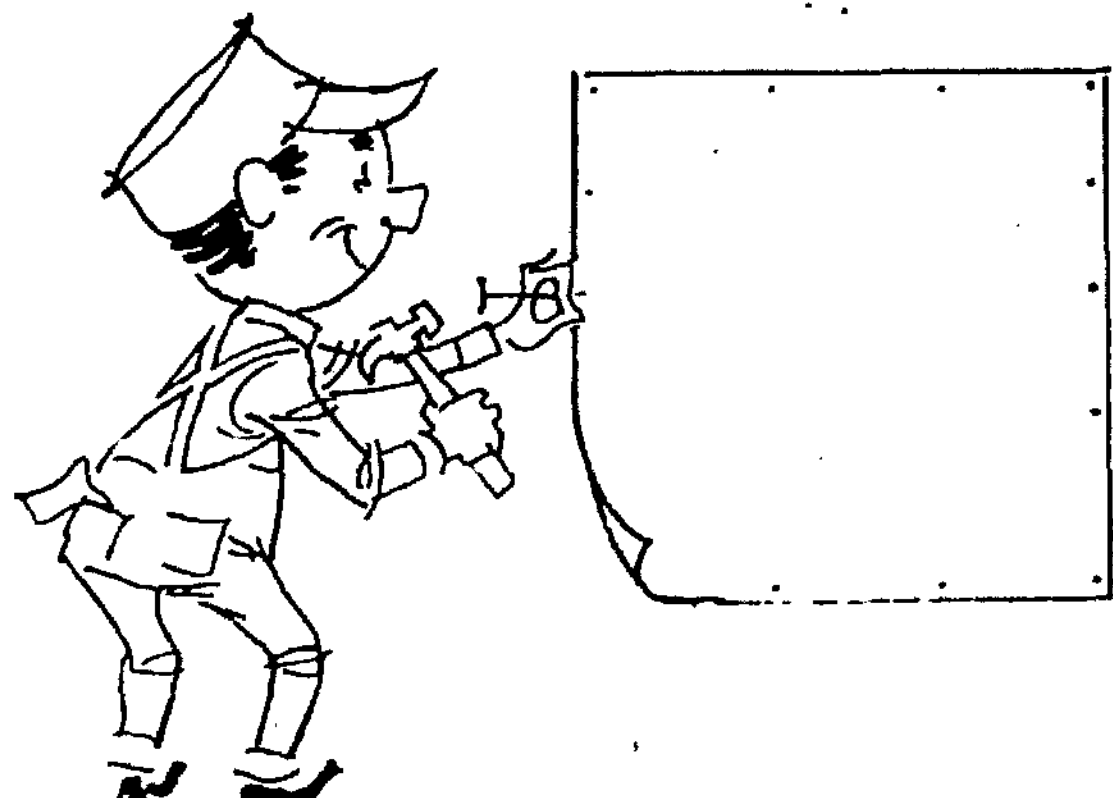

Wilderness Wisdom

Dear Wayne — I believe it is now mandatory in a number of states that an applicant for a hunting license pass a test before the license is granted. Do you think this procedure will substantially reduce hunting accidents? Vernon E., Pennsylvania

Dear Vernon — Several states have adopted licensing procedures that require a safety study course and/or test. This usually pertains to applicants who have never held a license before, and in some cases to hunters who did not purchase a license the previous year.

I am in favor of these safety courses. They should, without question, reduce the number of careless accidents. There are far too many people afield with only a casual acquaintance of their firearm and little knowledge of its mechanics.

Like the first time hunter I met in the woods a few years back. His borrowed rifle

had failed to fire while a big buck gazed curiously at him. An inspection revealed that he had jammed the bullet clip short of its stop. It did not seat because it was backward, bullets pointing rearward, yet, he had failed to diagnose the problem.

Dear Wayne — What is the best shot size to use for Canada geese? This may seem a foolish question, but I am just beginning to hunt them? Theodore J., Delaware

Dear Theodore — The most popular shot sizes for geese are No. 2 and No. 4. It depends a bit upon your blind location, range, and personal shooting habits.

Some hunters use No. 4 shot early in the season and switch to No. 2 as the season progresses.

Dear Wayne — For campfire or fireplace use, what wood burns best in regard to heat value? Jimmy R., Vermont

Dear Jimmy — Many times, what burns best is what you have the most of, however, if you have a choice some woods are certainly better than others.

In terms of heat value, shagbark hickory or white ash is probably best. Closely following is: oak, dogwood, apple, holly, maple, birch, locust, sycamore, and pine. The list continues in descending order but you should be able to lay your hands on at least one of the above group.

Some of these woods will burn well green while others will not. If you have a choice always use seasoned wood. When burning green logs much of the heat generated is used to dry the wood, resulting in less warmth to you.

Dear Wayne — I have heard and read conflicting reports concerning snakes in water. Can they or can they not bite underwater? Brad C., Tennessee

Dear Brad — They can, will, and do bite underwater.

Dear Wayne — What is the proper emergency treatment for frostbite? Is it true that rubbing the frostbitten area with ice helps? Lloyd O., Washington

Dear Lloyd — The best treatment is the one of prevention. When exposed to sub zero temperatures and chilling winds the face and other extremities should be adequately covered or wrapped.

If an area becomes frostbitten, do not rub the affected portion with ice as this merely contributes further to the problem. In fact, it should not be rubbed at all. Not even with the hands. Rubbing is likely to break the frozen skin, thereby opening the way for infection.

Gradually warm the frostbitten areas to restore circulation. Use a woolen blanket, a coat, the hands, or anything available.

I am aware that it is of utmost importance to most parents that their children be educated. I am not as convinced that these same parents perceive their own importance and role in that "education" they so desire for their children.

For example, a faction of concerned people along with the establishments of public schools and libraries have been instrumental in providing opportunities for all children to learn to read and write. Unfortunately, however, many children are suffering from "educational schizophrenia." They are often required to "live in two different worlds," so to speak, with regard to the quality and quantity of language and literature to which they are exposed at home as compared to that to which they are exposed at school.

The quality of talk executed during family activities, mealtimes and before bedtime are very important to the child's verbal growth. If experiences are shared in a variety of colorful and inventive speech the child is becoming prepared for the possibilities of language. Whereas just the opposite is true for the child surrounded by limited exchange of tonally and verbally narrow communication. This deprivation of language usually appears in the form of difficulty in learning to read and write.

Research reports confirm that children from homes where books are valued and the reading of them is shared tend to enjoy learning to read and often arrive at school already reading.

Before the days of public libraries it could be understood that many families, due to financial reasons, simply did not

have access to a wide variety of literature. It can no longer be said that education is only for the wealthy; so if you are a parent interested in the education of your child, reduce the possibility of "educational schizophrenia" by coming to the library and choosing stories, nursery rhymes and nonsense poems to read to and with him. You might find that simultaneously with creating a desire to read and write in your child you fulfill a sense of enjoyed duty in yourself.

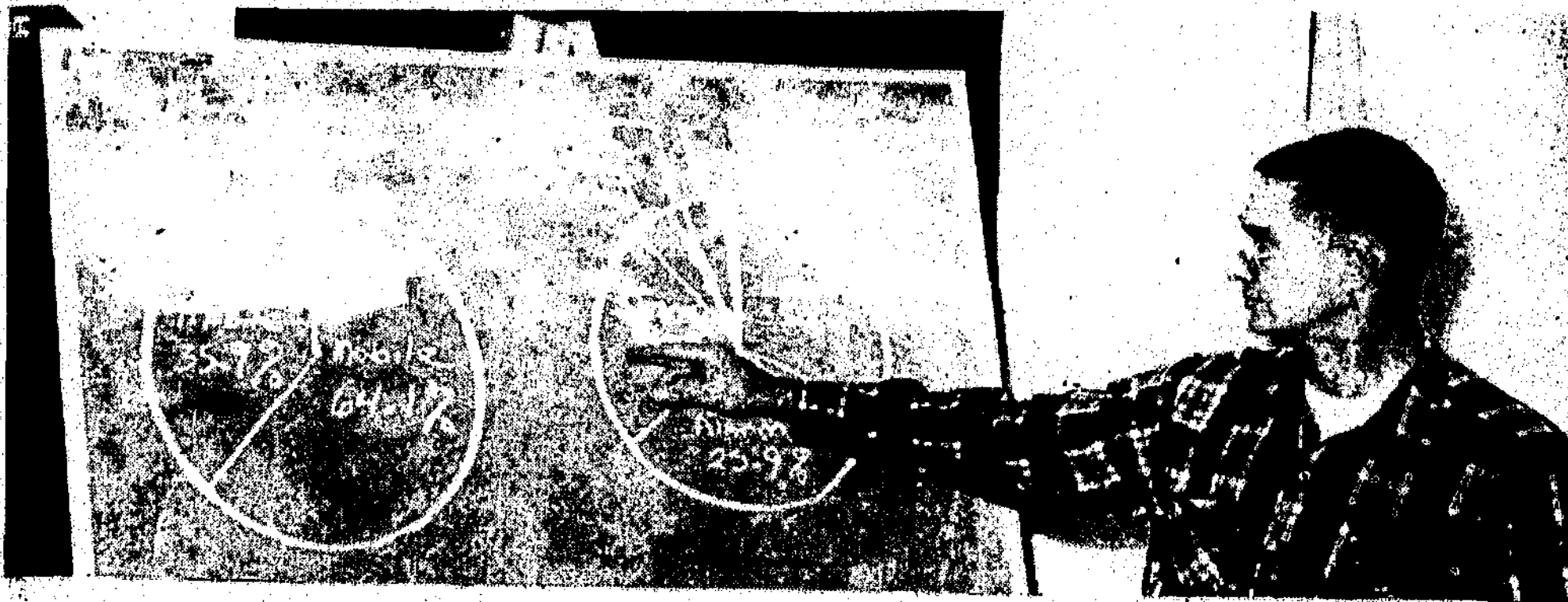

First the divers bring up bronze figures, then beautifully inlaid glassware, marble fragments, jewels and coins, each a long missing link to a people and way of life that existed about 100 years before the birth of Christ. One after another come clues from the sea that historians, scientists and archaeologists will sift through to solve mysteries of the past.

The discovery reinforces the belief of many scientists that the sea can preserve the very artifacts the earth destroys. Bronze, for example, is resistant to the corrosion of sea water, allowing many of the statues and inscriptions from the classical age of Greece to survive 2,000 years of watery interment.

Most exciting of all is the discovery of a small lump of coins, fused together by the chemical action of the sea. Once cleaned, scholars trace them to the city-state of Pergamum and the year, about 86 B.C. With proof of the time in history established, historians will now be able to piece together the new discoveries with what has already been uncovered from earth dug archaeological discoveries about early Greek life.

But who are these divers and scholars? Why have they picked this spot in the Aegean Sea for their exploration? Is it possible that the cargo of a ship that sunk 2,000 years ago would still be buried beneath the sea?
