RUIDOSO'S SIERRA TEAM SWEEPS SKI MEET

Guy Stuart wins world handicapped ski crown

Headed by Guy Stuart's world championship performance on the slopes at Kelowna, British Columbia, last week, the six contestants from Ruidoso's Sierra Handicapped Skiers Association (SHSA) won four divisions and picked up a second place in slalom and giant slalom races, against a field of 82 skiers from Japan, Canada, England and the United States in the international meet.

The individual achievements include: Guy, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Stuart of Ruidoso and a student at Alamogordo's School for the Visually Handicapped (SVH), registered the meet's best total time.

Marcie Thompson, Ft. Stanton, first, mentally retarded division.

In addition the team received the first special award given at the international meet for "a large contingent that was best organized, trained and disciplined."

"Our team's winning record," Diana Grover, SHSA director, said, "more than justifies the wholehearted and volunteer support given by the community, whose \$7,000-plus in contributions made this trip possible."

Dr. Lynn Willard heads New Mexico veterinarians

F. Lynn Willard, Doctor of Veterinary Medicine, Ruidoso, has been elected president of the New Mexico Veterinary Medical Association at the annual meeting of the association in Albuquerque April 12.

Dr. Willard will be president elect for the coming year and will assume his duties as president next April.

Willard said as president he will conduct meetings of the association and provide leadership.

"It's quite an honor," Willard said. "I feel privileged that my fellow veterinarians think enough of me to elect me to this position."

Willard has been in practice for five years following his graduation from Kansas State University in 1969 and a two-year stint in the Air Force.

While stationed at Kirtland Air Force Base, Willard's main duties were in the field of health and disease prevention. He conducted rabies clinics, food inspection and sentry dog examinations.

Willard and his wife Donna have three children, Lance, age eight; Cody, age five, and Lindsay, six months.

While at the meeting of the New Mexico Veterinary Association Dr. Willard received 12 hours of continuing education. While there he heard Dr. Don Evans, Escondido, California, speak on upper respiratory diseases and immunity

problems in horses, and Dr. James Biggart, Berkeley, California, speak on orthopedic problems in small animals.

Mook's fire prevention pamphlet earns award

Charlie Mook, fire prevention officer with the Lincoln National Forest, recently received a \$500 cash award and a certificate in recognition of his development of, and concept for, a fire prevention pamphlet which is now enjoying national distribution.

For graphic design and layouts of the pamphlet Ms. Barbara Hirsch received a \$200 cash award.

The awards came from the Lincoln National Forest division of the United States Forest Service.

The 12 page pamphlet printed by the Government Printing Office saw life first as a Lincoln National Forest publication. During the fall of 1976 the pamphlet was submitted for consideration by the Interagency Wildfire Coordinating Committee. The committee is made up of representatives of the Forest Service, The Bureau of Indian Affairs, the Bureau of Land Management, the United States Park Service, and the New Mexico and Arizona State Divisions of Forestry.

It was then distributed through the wildfire committee in the fall of 1977.

"It's a nation-wide publication now," Ray Page, Smokey Bear District Ranger said.

Page added that the Boy Scouts have used the publication in connection with their fire prevention activities. He said the publication has seen local distribution

Woodland Dr. (K 5 Woodland Ridge) to Woodland Trail or Wingfield Court.
Juniper Circle end or Grove (Ponderosa Heights) change or remain the same?


Diana L. Lancaster, Clovis, order to attend DWI school in Clovis and fined \$110 for driving 100 miles per hour in a 55 zone.

skill with which Hilde Strobel guided Guy, Lesley Lazar guided DeeAnn and Carl Mori guided Albert. The guide's ability to give the right command at the right moment, coupled with our kids' ability, made the tremendous showing of our blind students possible.

"All of us were extremely nervous and three of our skiers had never raced before. The kids were under a lot of pressure and performed extremely well. And I must add, their achievements reflect on the ability of their instructors.

"We were extremely well treated in Canada. The meet was run on a beautiful, very large, mountain ideal for skiing.

"Adding to the pleasure of our victories, was the fact that the kids raced every day in blizzard conditions, making the slopes not only difficult but very hazardous."

Grover said that the surplus above the \$8,500 needed for the trip, "will be spent on special equipment for the use, and training, of handicapped skiers next year and in the years to come."

Nogal road set for '79 paving

The pavement project for State Road 37 (SR-37) will go to bid no later than March, 1979, according to K. E. Bower Jr., deputy design engineer for the State Highway Department.

Bower moderated a panel presentation by four other members of the highway department and a public hearing held for discussion of the project Thursday night, at White Mountain Elementary School.

He told the assemblage that the preliminary design for the project, location surveying and environmental studies had been completed.

With bids let in March, construction activities could start early next summer.

Bower said the only possible conditions that might hold up the project would involve design changes or withdrawal of federal funds. However, he said state and federal funds currently exist for the project.

State legislators in attendance at the meeting, including Representative Maurice Hobson, Senator John Conway and Representative John Bigbee, inquired as to the hold up of the project which they said had been pending for years. They thanked the officials for finally securing the project.

Bower said that the reasons the project had taken so long for initiation included environmental constraints and difficult design features.

He thanked the legislators for their concern and asked them to remember the highway department next January.

According to Technical Services Engineer Luis Duffy, the project will cost about \$2.25 million with a share paid by the Federal Highway Administration and partial funding by the state.

He said the road will consist of two 11-foot driving lanes designed for 45 mile per hour travel. He added that projections by the highway department indicated that the road would be used by about 125 vehicles per day and about 625 vehicles per day 20 years from now.

Duffy said existing bridges will be

replaced by concrete box culverts or pipes. The access to the highway will be partially controlled by fences with turnouts built where they currently exist, he added.

He said utilities lines will be moved where necessary, but the Crockett Canyon water line will be avoided by shifting the project to the east.

B. C. Gardner, highway department assistant right-of-way manager, said that some land would have to be acquired for the right of way. He outlined the methods used for condemnation and said anyone affected by the property acquisitions could contact the department for a full explanation of their rights.

Bill Taylor, department environmentalist, said the new project would cut down on the degree of air and water pollution currently caused by the unpaved condition of the existing road. He said that the road would continue to be a hazard for migrating deer. He added that the project area contained several archaeological sites that would be properly excavated under a contract with the Museum of New Mexico before construction activities began. He said the area would be revegetated following construction activities.

Before calling for questions from the audience, Bower told the group that the highway department's policy for the replacement of existing fences, turnouts, bridges, driveways, etc., was they are replaced in kind.

"If you have a gate now," Bower said, "we replace a gate."

He added that anyone desiring additional construction could work with the contractor or secure a construction permit at the highway department's district office in Roswell.

He concluded the program by calling for any additional comments and saying anyone that has a statement to make may do so before April 28, 1978, in writing to The New Mexico Highway Department, Technical Services Section, P. O. Box 1149, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87503.

Status of Border Drive determined by trustees

Village officials, acting on a request by Ted Bennett to open Border Drive to traffic made at the April 13 trustees meeting, have determined that the street was closed by resolution of the Ruidoso trustees October 2, 1953.

In part, the unanimously passed resolution reads:

"All of that certain street or alley previously known as Border Drive, as set forth and described on the amended plat of McCarty Subdivision, Lincoln County, New Mexico, filed for record on the 5th day of May, 1942, in Book 5 at Page 175, of the records of Lincoln County, New Mexico, said property being adjacent to the Eastern boundary of Lots 9 through 15 of Block 10 of McCarty Subdivision, and running southerly from Alto Road to the Northeast corner of Lot 8 in Block 10, of

McCarty Subdivision, Lincoln County, New Mexico.

"Now, therefore, be it resolved by this Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, that the Village of Ruidoso has no use for the street previously known as Border Drive (as said street is not necessary for the servicing of lots adjacent thereto); therefore, said street should be, and the same hereby is, vacated."

In the same resolution of the Village of Ruidoso authorized the execution of a quit-claim deed to the property described to S. K. Kuykendall and Genevieve Rebecca Kuykendall.

Bennett, a village spokesman said Friday, has been notified by letter of the findings concerning the status of Border Drive.





Postmaster Baber encountered many mail delivery problems

"Neither rain, nor snow, nor sleet, nor night shall keep this postman from his appointed rounds."

Switch the "his" to "hers", add fires, floods and beauracracies and you have Louise Babers, postmaster at San Patricio the last 34 years.

The traditional motto of postal employees does not, however, cover retirement and retire is what Mrs. Babers recently did. Her decision to devote time to herself, her family and her garden five years ahead of the mandatory postal retirement age of 70 is overshadowed by 34 years of service to her portion of the Hondo Valley.

She kept the mail running in the tranquil little community despite a post office destroyed by fire in 1953, devastation of the valley by the 1965 flood and a one-time attempt by the postal service to close her tiny office.

It is tiny, by most people's standards. The post office at San Patricio is not the modern gleaming structure with banks of key-locked boxes and stamp dispensers that many are accustomed to.

It is an intimate facility housed in an old adobe building. The interior is complete with worn wooden floors and an ancient wood burning heater, gleaming from years of use. Mrs. Babers has seen a lot of that wear accumulate.

From her position behind the teller's cage she has seen the boots and shoes of countless persons — some famous and some not so famous. Her clientele has included such notables as Helen Hayes, Charles MacArthur, Paul Horgan, Linda Darnell, Andrew Wyeth and Mr. and Mrs. Peter Hurd, the Babers' close friends.

But then there were others — just plain friends. The daily routine of posting, stamp selling and general office running was broken by continuing conversations with friends and neighbors and a flyer for the children: their own mail.

She said she always knew what was going on in the valley, the fringe benefit of meeting neighbors daily.

Many residents of the valley have shared their hopes, dreams and sometimes fears with her, and in this respect she says she has grown into an amateur psychologist. She knew her patrons well enough to know she could count on them and they on her.

She and her husband Tom came to the valley from Tularosa during World War II. The couple opened up a little country store and took the postal duties of San Patricio over in 1943 from Mrs. Babers' father Roe McNatt.

After seven years their interest in the store waned, it was sold and Mrs. Babers discontinued being postmaster.

Her first "retirement" lasted about a year and a half before the postal service was able to convince her to return to duty. She cheerfully complied and hung in there until this year.

Over the years Mrs. Babers has seen many changes take place in the San Patricio community. During the war years many families moved away to better jobs and the young men left to serve their country. Mrs. Babers said only a few families have returned and the population has diminished from one of the largest communities in Lincoln County to certainly one of the smallest.

"Back then, everybody had a little farm growing carrots and cabbage," Mrs. Babers said. "Everybody worked; in the fall families would go to the Pecos Valley to pick cotton. Now nearly everyone has a job somewhere else. The young ones leave, and that's sad."

She has seen the postal service system grow and the service diminish. She looks back with some disdain on the day the system was changed in an attempt to make it a money generator.

"The post office is a service for communication and the dissemination of information," she said. "It was never, ever intended to be a money-making proposition."

"When it was changed to try to make money, we thought it was a good idea; we thought we might be able to make a little money."

She said everything was fine, but service seemed to be cut.

"Used to be we'd never leave the office without everything being posted. We were proud of it. Today there's not enough clerks to do it all."

She said the postal authorities call it "streamlining." She calls it a step toward poor service. But after 34 years perhaps she is a bit more dedicated than some.

Her dedication to duty has run her up against some sticky situations. When Mrs. Babers' first post office burned to the ground she and her son were on the scene.

"He saved the safe and I grabbed the cash book," she said. "That's about all we saved. Luckily almost all the mail was picked up that day and we didn't lose much."

It takes more than a cash book and a safe to run a post office, though. With proper esprit de corps, her fellow postmasters came through for her. "They lent me what I needed and we were back in business the next day," she said.

Lacking more formal quarters, she set the office up in the living room of her and Tom's home.

"We never missed a day," she added. One could tell she is proud of it.

While in Washington, D.C., on official duty as editor of the New Mexico Chapter of the National Association of Postmasters, she learned that her small office was slated for closure. Still in Washington, she contacted New Mexico's legislators and was able to win some strong support. She came home and contacted The News which ran an article on the plight of postal service for San Patricio. Before she knew it a Lubbock television station picked the story up.

"So far we have been able to keep it open," she said.

A retirement party given her by the residents of San Patricio, and a St. Patrick's mass said in her honor at San Patricio's namesake church, ushered her away from all postal activities. She recalls the affair as one of her fondest memories.

"It was just the grandest feeling I've known," she said, "to have that sincere affection shown to me."

For the future, Mrs. Babers plans to garden, play her piano, get caught up with her reading and keep house for Tom, her mother and herself.

"I hope to keep in contact with the people," she said. "This is home as far as I'm concerned."

Public swimming pools require operating permit

All public swimming pools, Ruidoso environmentalist Brown Edwards announces, must conform to regulations governing pools and public baths before an operating permit is issued.

"No person may operate a public pool or bath," Edwards said, "without a current operating permit as required under Section 1-103 of the regulations."

Operators may obtain pre-opening inspection by contacting Edwards at 3768 Sudderth Drive, by writing him at Drawer 800, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345 or by

telephone 257-4005, to set an inspection date. All equipment must be functioning, Edwards said, for the inspection which must be held before the operating permit will be issued.

"We feel certain," Edwards said, "that many problems and conflicts can be avoided by setting the inspection date as early as is reasonably possible. Local personnel will be available prior to the pre-opening inspection to answer question concerning your operation."

In a recent research study, it was recorded that the majority of children view 5,000 hours of television before they enter first grade. "And in one-half hour show there is more excitement, adventure and violence than the average person experiences in a lifetime," so by comparison everyday life seems dull.

Nancy Larrick, former president of the International Reading Association, lists the following traits that characterize "children of television": (1) they have a shorter attention span; (2) they seem to thrive on noise, strife and confusion; (3) they come to school with little sleep; (4) they are more worldly in their attitudes and outlook; (5) they have little respect for adults including parents and teachers (they've seen too many cops who break laws, scientists who scheme, politicians who lie and swindle, sex perverts, drug pushers); (6) they regard school as irrelevant; society's sentence imposed on the innocent (many of the Saturday morning children's TV shows begin by congratulating the kids on being out of school and free for the weekend, implying that school is a juvenile jail); (7) children are filled with hostility and prone to settle things by violence.

According to Dr. Isidore Zifferstein, a fellow of the American Psychiatric Association television has presented children with "anti" values instead of

values with which they can identify positively. For example: (1) Anti-interpersonal-relations values (A niece/nephew or son/daughter killing their aunt/uncle, mother/father for insurance money); (2) anti-cooperation values (on television life is conflict, strife, war); (3) anti-democratic values (heroes operate outside the law).

There are of course, some excellent programs on television. However, as most of them are "one time specials" they are missed because people are addicted to continuing programs which I call "evening soap operas." Television can introduce new ideas and broaden interests if viewing is selective, not addictive and if follow-up activities including reading, are planned.

Unfortunately the bad features of television have grown worse during the past decade—more that is destructive, more cartoon commercials, more super heroes, more sadistic violence. The following materials are listed by Nancy Larrick as giving background information as well as suggestion for improvement: (1) the Family Guide to Children's Television Kave; (2) But First, This Message (film); (3) Understanding Media: The Extensions of Man, McLuhan; (4) Children's Television: The Economics of Exploration, Melody; (5) Television: How to Use It Wisely with Children, Frank.





She's Still Cooking on All Burners

People who start out with a great deal of energy and curiosity, usually sustain their vitality and enthusiasm throughout their lives. For most of us, lifelong habits are established at an early age.

Seventy-six-year-old Ann Leventhal of Ventnor City, New Jersey, is a good example. For instance, at the age of 61 most of her time was taken up weaving prayer shawls, but she managed to fit flying lessons into her schedule—a skill most of us find too daring at any age.

"I have a very simple philosophy I've always lived by," Mrs. Leventhal told a writer from The National Council on the Aging, "and that is, 'There is yet much more to be found in me.'"

Mrs. Leventhal has been finding out about herself—and acquiring expertise in a variety of areas for many years. Perhaps the accomplishment she's proudest of, is the 200-page book she wrote and published last year. Entitled "The Boardwalk ORT Cook and Story Book," it's a compilation of Jewish recipes, plus explanations of various holidays, helpful hints and a full measure of Mrs. Leventhal's philosophy for a happy life.

"It took me four years to compile the recipes and prepare the rest of the material," Mrs. Leventhal said. "After that, it was a year before the first edition of 1,000 copies came from the printer."

The ORT in the title

stands for Organization for Rehabilitation Through Training, a group which has trained hundreds of thousands of people in hand skills.

"The organization has meant a lot to me," Mrs. Leventhal said. "Without ORT, many of the people we've helped would've remained unproductive."

As an indication of her high regard for ORT, Mrs. Leventhal gave the first \$2,000 from book sales to the organization.

"I'd rather see the money well-spent by ORT than whatever I might do with it," she said.

Even with the book project completed, Mrs. Leventhal is busy every day. She's still very much involved with ORT as well as other civic groups. At home, she likes to weave and knit and do embroidery.

"I'm also a very good handwriting analyst," she said. "Don't ask me why, it's just something that always interested me."

And if that's not enough to keep Mrs. Leventhal busy, her 20 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren certainly will.

"I love being with children and other people younger than me," she said. "It keeps me in touch with the different generations."

It also keeps her outlook young and helps her continue to find out new things about herself. Ann Leventhal's philosophy sounds attractive for people of any age.

ACCORDING TO a Boston University study, a small but growing number of American women 65 and older are finding happiness in remarriage. Social Security information

"Social security offices have been getting questions about the legality and advisability of having dogs tattooed with the dog owner's social security number for identification purposes," Gordon Lunsford, social security field representative, said today. "Some individuals even have the mistaken belief that the Social Security Administration performed this service."

"Several dog registries have been set up in recent years to provide tattoo and registration services. These are private organizations with whom a dog owner can, for a fee, register his dog. The organization records the owner's name, address, social security number, and information identifying the dog. The owner then arranges through a local veterinarian or humane society to have the social security number tattooed on the dog, usually the inner right hind leg.

"These registries have arrangements with laboratories under which the registry will be informed if a dog with a tattoo, or evidence of having been tattooed, is sold to a laboratory for research purposes. These registries may also be able to help trace a lost dog. However, they rely on their own registry records only—not on the records of the SSA."

"The use of social security numbers for pet identification is not illegal, but the Social Security Administration has no connection with any of the registries and cannot help in bringing lost dogs and owners together."

I-N-S-I-D-E the Outdoors

Hunting and fishing is a privilege, not a right that is due to anyone by just claim. Hunting and fishing licenses are usually the primary requirements to allow persons to partake in such privileges. Unfortunately, the purpose for license requirements is often forgotten or misunderstood.

The signing of the Magna Charta in 1215 transferred the ownership of wildlife from the person of the king to the office of the king, to be held in sacred trust for the people.

As colonists settled America they carried with them the common law of England. After the Revolution, the newly independent colonies decided that the common law of England, plus English statutes in force prior to the Revolution, were still applicable where conditions permitted.

Therefore, it was believed that the state had in effect acquired the authority of the king, and thus, the state in its sovereign capacity held the game in trust for the people.

At the Constitutional Convention of 1787, the state delegates invested the Federal Government with certain powers, but they did not mention the control of wildlife. Therefore, control was believed to reside in the state except in the case of wildlife refuges, national parks and monuments, and migratory birds.

The right of states to govern the taking of fish and game was established in the famous court case of "Geer v Connecticut" in 1896. It allowed that the state had the right to regulate and control the manner in which wild game may be taken on the grounds of sovereign ownership of wild animals by the state, and the police power of the state.

As the state or the Federal Government owns the game in its wild state and in its sovereign capacity, an individual cannot obtain absolute property rights to game except by those conditions, restrictions, and limitations permitted by the proper authority.

The legislature alone, or the legislature and the state game and fish department (as authorized by the legislature) may impose conditions deemed necessary and suitable under which an individual may acquire property rights to wildlife. That is, so long as these conditions do not contravene any principle of the Constitution.

Therefore, a hunting or fishing license is only a permit that entitles the purchaser to engage in a privilege in which he may take game or fish under legal regulations and reduce it to his possession.

Such a license does not in any way guarantee the holder he will take game or fish.

In New Mexico, and most states, the license means much more than just the privilege to hunt or fish. It also serves as the major source for financing game and fish management and law enforcement efforts within the state.

Such a responsibility costs money and lots of it. The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish is presently operating on a yearly budget of approximately five million dollars.

The Department, with the exception of some federally funded projects and the Rare and Endangered Species program being funded from general appropriation, is funded from the sale of New Mexico hunting and fishing licenses.

License buyers, therefore, are actually supporting the wildlife of New Mexico.


Yet moans and groans are still heard too often from some individuals as they pay for their licenses. The licenses which entitle them to the opportunity to take game mammals, birds, and fish. The licenses from which the fees go back to support their wildlife and their opportunities.

When you pay that 25 dollars for a general hunting and fishing license you have requested the privilege of an opportunity to take a deer, bear, turkey, and some 10 species of game fish.

That license allows you to hunt and fish throughout the license year, April 1 thru March 31, during the designated seasons for about 7 cents a day.

The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish is neither embarrassed nor ashamed of their license fees. Instead, we are proud of the fact that we can still offer such a wide variety of opportunities for such a nominal fee. Some states and their departments are not so lucky.

So, next time you "shell-out" that \$25.00 for a big game license, or \$11.50 for a fishing license with trout validation, remember, it's your privilege and your wildlife.
