

# Webb sets state 880 dash mark

Harla Webb, Ruidoso High School sophomore, set a record in the 880-yard dash, running a 2:21.8, at the state track meet this weekend in Albuquerque.

She also came in fourth in the 220-yard dash, to be the only state winner from the girls' track team.

At the district track meet this weekend in Silver City, six members of the boys' team qualified for the state meet Friday and Saturday in Albuquerque.

Qualifying were Mark Dutton, first, high jump; Joe Almager, first, mile run; Mark Anderson, first, 440-yard dash; Shane Goodrum, second, pole vault; Jovian Smith, second, two mile run, and Alex Padilla, second, 880-yard dash.

Lordsburg was overall winner of the meet followed by Animas, Hatch and Ruidoso.

"We didn't have the depth to win it," athletic director Doyle Howell said Monday.

"The team of Hector Aguilar, Kevin Anderson, Mark Dutton and Josh Ensor was second in the 880 relay, but they were

## New sanitary landfill opening planned today

The new 280 acre sanitary landfill, to serve Lincoln County, opened today, at the site six miles from the crest of Alto Hill on the road to Ft. Stanton.

This is the only landfill available to Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and area residents. The general public may haul trash there, using the open pit to discard it.

Only Village of Ruidoso garbage trucks will be permitted to use the old landfill.

"The decision to open the new site," village manager Jim Hine said today, "ahead of schedule was necessary because of the large deposits of trash at the old landfill, that will take village crews several weeks to cover."

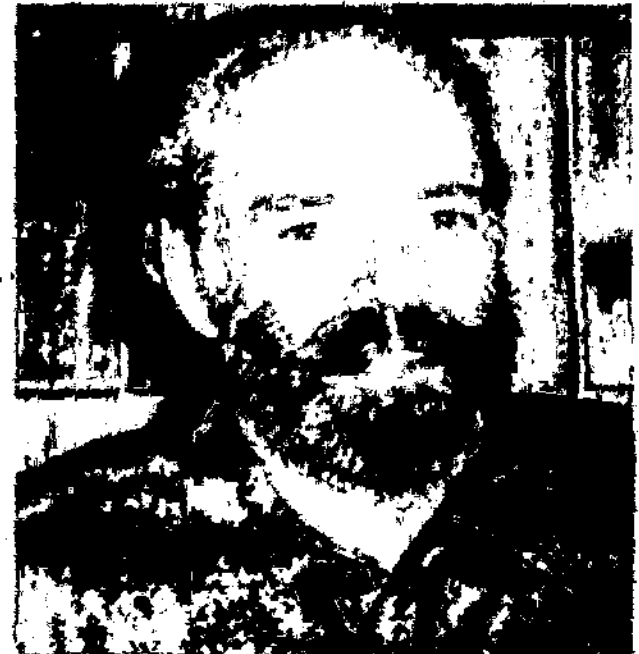

"People just came by and threw things off into the forest and it just ruins the beauty of our woods," Mrs. Haden said.

Drivers for the Service Club Council promised to stop by Second street Saturday, the last day of the drive, and haul the piles off to the sanitary landfill.

## P&Z starts new meeting format

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Wednesday voted to change procedures pertaining to the acceptance of agenda items for regular meetings from local citizens and the status of the commission's work session meetings.

Under the new provisions, which were accepted unanimously, the commission will limit the agenda to those items submitted seven days before a regular meeting. The new rule will require anyone having business with the P&Z to submit all articles including proposed plat sketches, maps, architectural renderings, etc., to the Village's planning department by the Wednesday preceding the commission's usual Wednesday meeting date.

The action was instituted by previous P&Z chairman Betty Patton who said she would be in favor of receiving a particular meeting's agenda before the meeting to allow her time to visit the physical site of a particular agenda item.

"We, as a commission, ought to know what's coming up so we can go out and look at it," Patton said.

Village Building Inspector Chuck Brown, who works closely with the P&Z by virtue of his position, said he would have agendas prepared for mailing or to be picked up on the Thursday preceding the Commission's Wednesday meetings.

Part of the commission's reorganization will include an invitation to the public to attend P&Z work sessions. The commission, according to chairman Mike Waldron, will meet in quorum for the work sessions in an effort to dispense with routine matters, hold public hearings and consider the merits of previously introduced planning and zoning matters.

Waldron said the commission will not receive any new business from the floor during a work session, but will accept public comment.

He added, in the past, the commission has assembled, in non-quorum, for the work sessions, and has not acted on

public matters.

In regular business the commission reflected a negative attitude toward a proposal by a representative of the Camelot subdivision to construct a road from the top of Camelot mountain to a point on Sudderth Drive between the Sitzmark Motel and the Old Mill.

Local engineer Tim Collins submitted the proposal for P&Z discussion, saying the road would simplify the subdivision's desire to construct a sewer line in the same area. He said the area, because of its natural contour, would be a logical location for the sewer line.

After hearing that the road would include some 18 percent grades and would be able to be seen in town, the commission vetoed the proposal.

Commissioner George Shoemaker said the road would leave an unsightly and permanent scar on the hill, which overlooks Sudderth.

Brown said that in the winter, firetrucks would not be able to negotiate the steep grades and the village would have difficulty maintaining the road.

Waldron said he could see no reason why the citizens of Ruidoso should have to be saddled with the scar because the subdivision had not fully planned the contingency for the road and sewer line.

Addressing Collins, Waldron said: "Please advise the (developer) that we have nothing against the subdivision, we think it's a beautiful subdivision. It's just that everytime we turn around they're asking us for something that's diametrically opposed to what we're trying to do."

In other routine business the commission:

— Conditionally approved a zoning change from residential-1 to commercial for block 15, Palmer Gateway. Under the terms of the change, only professional offices will be allowed in the area.

— Approved the preliminary plat for Lost Mountain Estates, Section 28, T-11 2.

— Approved the final plat for Warwick Place, Camelot Unit 1, subject to the plat being signed by appropriate officials.

— Approved the final plat for Aspen Run 4, subject to reception of appropriate signatures.

— Voted to allow the replat of Blocks I, K and M, Middle Cedar.

— Approved the final replat of Lot 3, Block 4, First Addition to Cree Meadows Heights.

— Accepted the request for a change in zoning for Lots 25 and 28, Block 9, Carter's Park from residential to commercial. Final action will be seen at a future P&Z public hearing on the matter.

## Escapees jailed in Oregon

Three prisoners who escaped Wednesday from the Lincoln County jail in Carrizozo were in custody this morning, Sheriff Bill Elliott said.

Fred Aragon, 68, Capitan, was apprehended Friday in an El Paso motel and Gregory Woods, 28, Alamogordo, and Albert Simpson, 47, Ruidoso, were in custody in Medford, Oregon, this morning.

Shortly after Aragon turned himself in Friday to the El Paso Police Department, Elliott and undersheriff Red Meador were in El Paso to investigate.

"While we were down there, we found they had ditched jailer Alton Talley's vehicle in which they escaped and that among them, they had enough money to buy an old car," Elliott said Monday.

"In the motel room, we found a stub or taxi receipt and from that we found where they had gone, to buy the old car."

"We got a complete description of the car, but didn't know which direction they'd gone, so we sent out an all points bulletin to the east and west ... and teletyped to various states."

"We had a call this morning that Woods and Simpson were incarcerated in Medford, Oregon, but have no details," Elliott said the state "definitely is

planning to extradite the two, pending a waiver of extradition from Oregon."

"It should take about a week to get it together. If they don't sign a waiver of extradition, then we'll have to get a governor's warrant."

Aragon, who is back in custody at the Lincoln County jail, Woods and Simpson, all face charges of escape plus "additional charges," Elliott said.

The three escaped Wednesday when jail trustee Woods apparently took a pistol from the jail's evidence room and forced jailer Talley to release Simpson and Aragon.

Talley and two bystanders were locked in a cell about 3 a.m., and the three prisoners escaped in Talley's vehicle, apparently with the pistol, and a shotgun and a kilo of marijuana, also taken from the evidence room.

The jailer and two bystanders were discovered about 7 a.m.

Simpson was imprisoned in the county jail on charges of embezzling over \$2,500. Woods was serving time for armed robbery and Aragon was being held for the Department of Corrections for alleged parole violation.

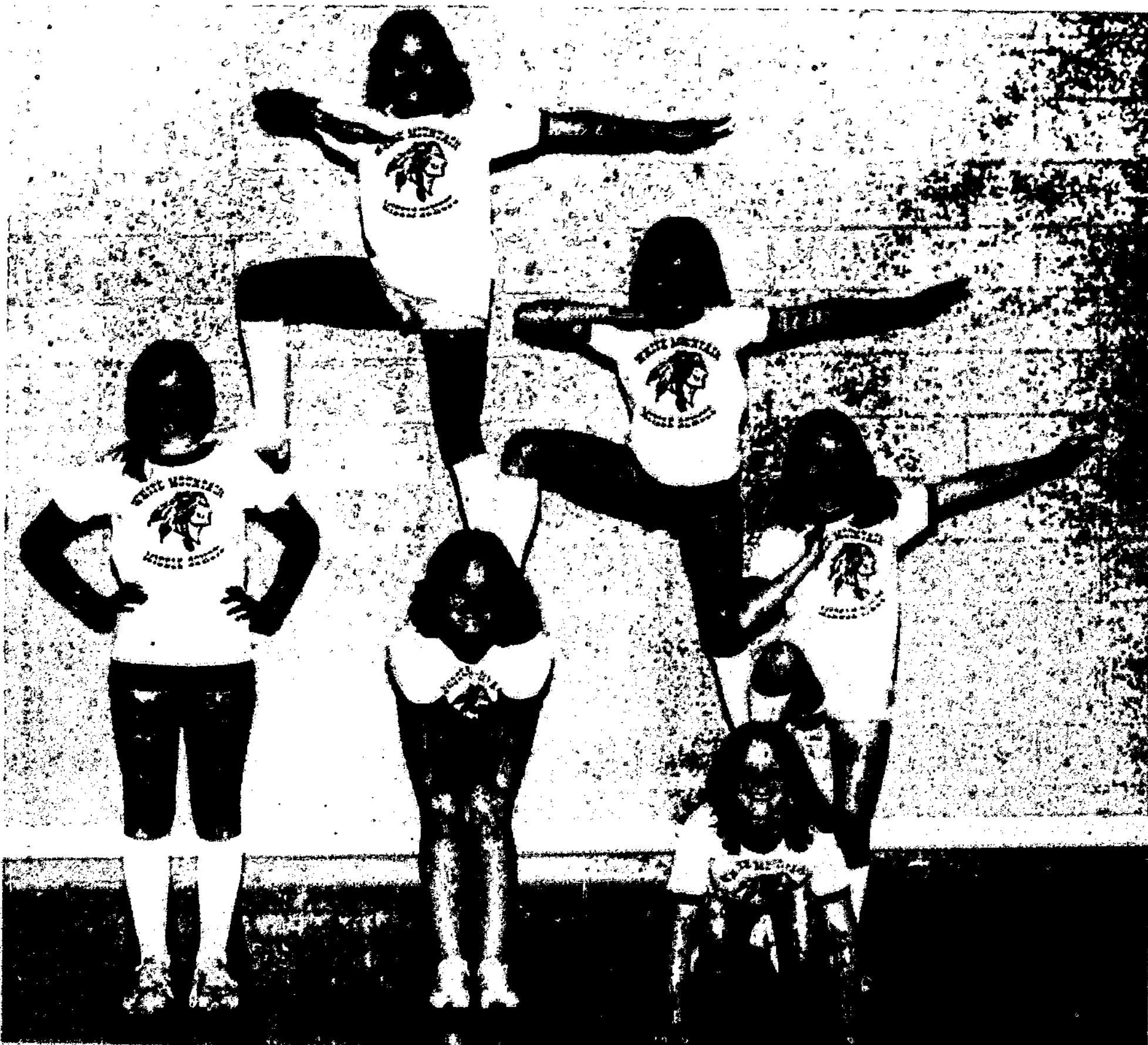

## Department of Human Services offering toll-free telephone help

The Department of Human Services (DHS) has established a toll-free telephone number — 1-800-432-6217 to respond to questions about its activities from anywhere in the state.

"Since our functions cover such a broad range, we felt we needed to make access to DHS as simple and speedy as possible," Fernando E. C. De Baca, secretary for human services, said.

A call to that number will connect the caller to the DHS information and referral office in Santa Fe. "Our people there know all phases of our operation," C. De Baca said. "They are prepared to answer questions and get answers on such topics as welfare, food stamps, unemployment insurance, adoptions, Medicaid, child support enforcement, discrimination, labor relations and the problems of children, youth and the aging."

The toll-free number is serviced by bilingual operators, under direction of Charlet Poltevin. Aim of the installation is "to allow New Mexico citizens to get the answers they need with a minimum of confusion and run-around," C. De Baca said.

Under state reorganization, the Department of Human Services includes the former Employment Security Com-

mission (now the Employment Services Division), the old State Welfare Agency (now the Income Support Division) and the former Social Services Agency (now the Social Services Division), as well as the old Veterans' Services Commission, the Committee on Children and Youth, and the Human Resources Division and the Commission on Aging. The former Labor and Industrial Commission is now part of

the Employment Services Division.

"Troubled people sometimes do not know where to turn," C. De Baca said. "They frequently have little or no money and are too disturbed to begin a logical and methodical hunt for assistance. That's why we have installed this no-cost, one-stop phone connection. If they'll call us, we'll tell them what help is available and where to go to get it."



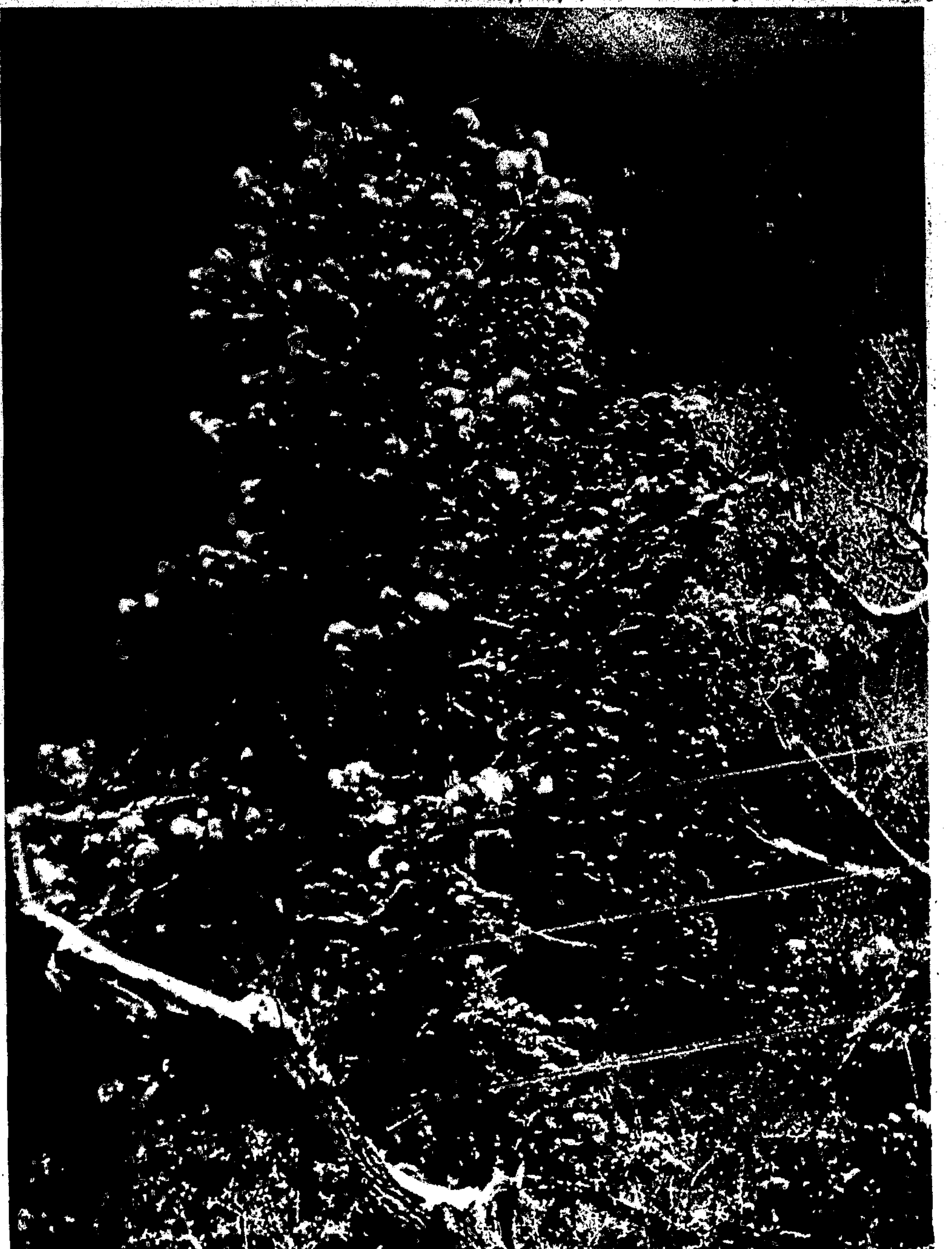

## Women at Work: Growing Group

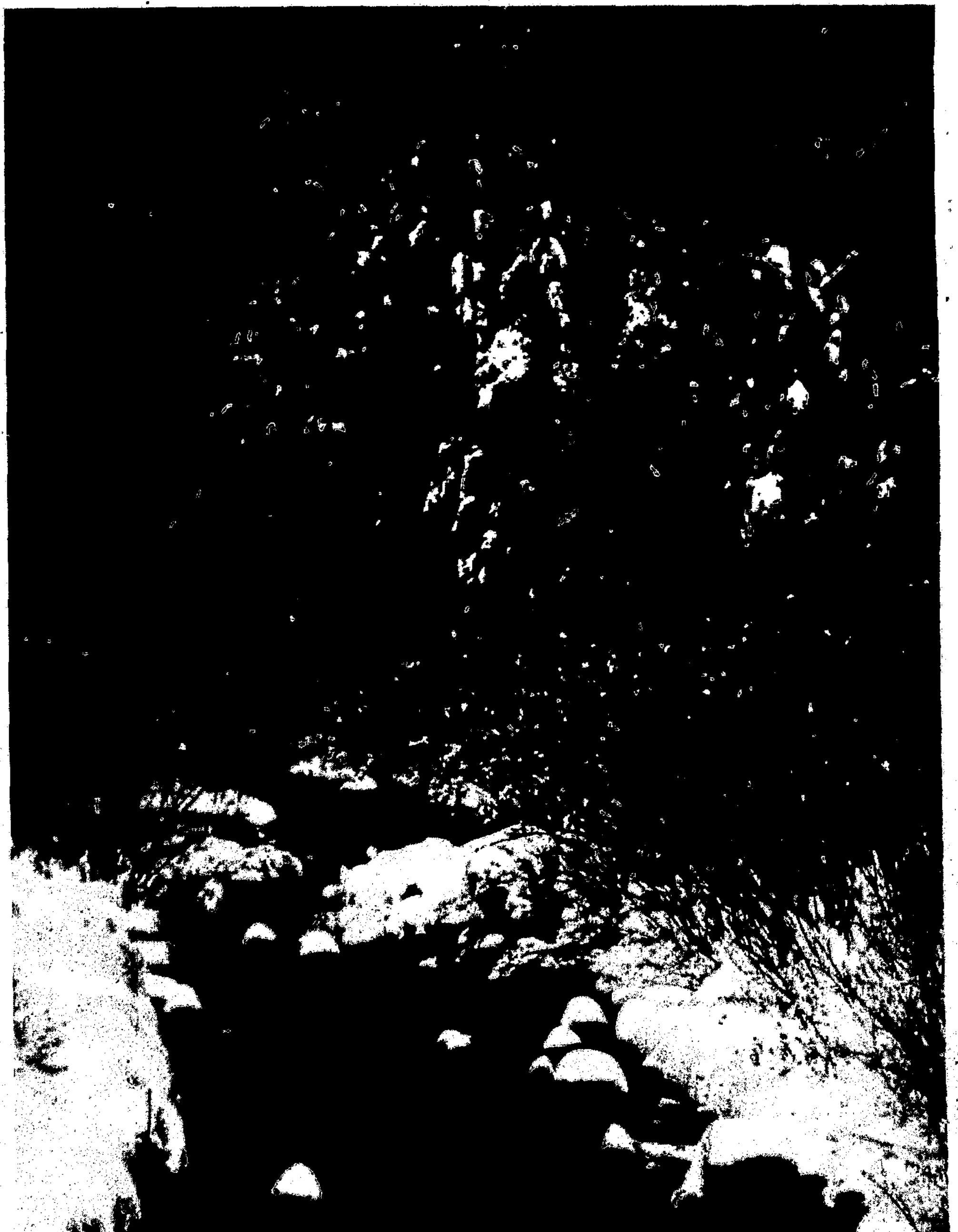

## Cancer victim's fund drive showing progress

A total of \$237.93 has been donated to the savings account set up at Security Bank for cancer victim Richard Devara and his family.

"So far the response has been pretty good," Guin Stone said.

"All the tellers at Security Bank have his account number (534803) at the windows. The bank has been great about it."

"We hope the contributions will supply food, utilities and trailer payments, the things he can't get elsewhere."

"We've been able to handle the funding for medication, but what he needs is for the community to pull together to help him pay for the essentials."

Mrs. Stone said, "The nature of the medication is such that he has plebitis in his arms" and "he is extremely ill after the treatments."

Unable to work, Richard receives minimal welfare payments which scarcely sustain him and his family.

Mrs. Stone said she hoped the contributions to the fund would enable Richard to keep up with his life and health insurance policies through the Ruidoso Municipal Schools.

Richard goes this week to the American Cancer Society Treatment Center in Albuquerque for an evaluation.

"They'll determine how much of the chemical he can take, stabilize and then send him back for the treatments."

"How they'll stabilize, I don't know. What the next treatment will be, I don't know."

Mrs. Stone said, "No major con-

tributions (to Richard's account) have been received, to my knowledge.

"It's just plain people coming in with \$5 or \$6 or \$7 dollars at a time; children with a few odd cents."

She said about \$120 may be donated through the school system somehow, and that half the proceeds of a movie recently shown at the mid school and two elementary schools will be given to Richard through the efforts of the three principals, Donny Weems, Sid Miller and Mike Gladden.

## You can gauge the sleep you need

Here's a riddle: what do a nurse in the ER, a patient recovering from surgery, and a healthy teenager have in common? The answer: they all need enough rest.

Certainly they don't all need the same amount of rest — rest requirements vary considerably among individuals. But all of us must identify the amount of rest we need and be sure we get it.

This seems like a simple enough assignment. But many people still find they are too tired too much of the time. These people can generally be divided into two categories: those who can't sleep and those who won't.

Those who won't sleep generally feel that there are too many other important things to do to waste their time sleeping. When they have too much to do in a day, they borrow sleeping hours to get it all done. Now, some people don't need a lot of sleep, so no problems are caused. But when people simply ignore the warnings their bodies might give, they're starting an unfortunate cycle — fatigue, irritability, stress, inefficiency, loss of appetite, etc.

If the above description fits you, you should remember that enough sleep is just as necessary to your body as enough food or water. The body needs a rest period for physical repair.

Physiologically, during the first two hours of sleep the body slows down to a minimum rate of functioning. Muscular activity and voluntary thinking stop, heartbeat slows down, blood pressure and body temperature lower, kidneys excrete less urine.

During sleep, cells are replaced twice as fast as during waking hours. The body gets rid of skin waste products and circulates certain minerals, vitamins, and hormones

in the skin. As a very visible example, without sleep the skin lacks the normal solutions that refresh it during the night. Skin tissues begin to sag and collagen (a dark protein in the tissue) becomes increasingly apparent — thus creating dark circles under your eyes.

No one but you can gauge how much sleep you need in order to feel well, look well and function well. It is certain that babies require lots of sleep and that the need for sleep decreases with age. It also is certain that not everyone needs the proverbial eight hours a night. But it is important to establish a personal sleep requirement and stick with it. If you feel you get enough sleep, but are still tired frequently, see your doctor — your problem might be an underlying physical or emotional one.

On the other hand, are you one of those who wants to get enough sleep but has trouble sleeping? If so, your set of problems and solutions is quite different.

Most experts agree that the so-called "Insomniacs" among us probably get more sleep per night than they realize. People who complain of insomnia often underestimate the time it takes them to doze off, or, if they wake up for a brief period in the middle of the night, feel they have been up for hours.

Still, the feeling of going to bed and not being able to sleep is a frustrating one. Here are some simple remedies:

- \*don't go to bed until you're sleepy
- \*establish a regular bed-time routine

(this might include going to bed at the same time every night, having a snack first — preferably something high in calcium like milk)

- \*exercise more during the day
- \*avoid naps during the afternoon or early evening

\*one drink or glass of wine before bed can help induce sleep, overindulgence tends to result in waking in the middle of the night and having trouble getting back to sleep

\*if you're a problem sleeper, don't use your bed for working, telephoning, etc. — go to bed when you're ready to sleep

\*if you generally tend to be sensitive to your environment, make your sleep environment inviting

\*and if you still have trouble sleeping, don't just lie in bed worrying about it — get up and watch TV, read a not-too-suspenseful book, write letters.

Most sleep experts seem to agree that temporary sleeping problems clear up by themselves, and chronic problems should be investigated by a physician to be sure the person isn't suffering from an illness, physical or psychological, that needs treatment.

How much sleep you need will be determined by a variety of factors, among them your age, health, the amount of physical activity you normally get, mental stress, and your basic body rhythms. The easiest way to measure whether you're meeting your own sleep needs is to evaluate how easily you get tired.

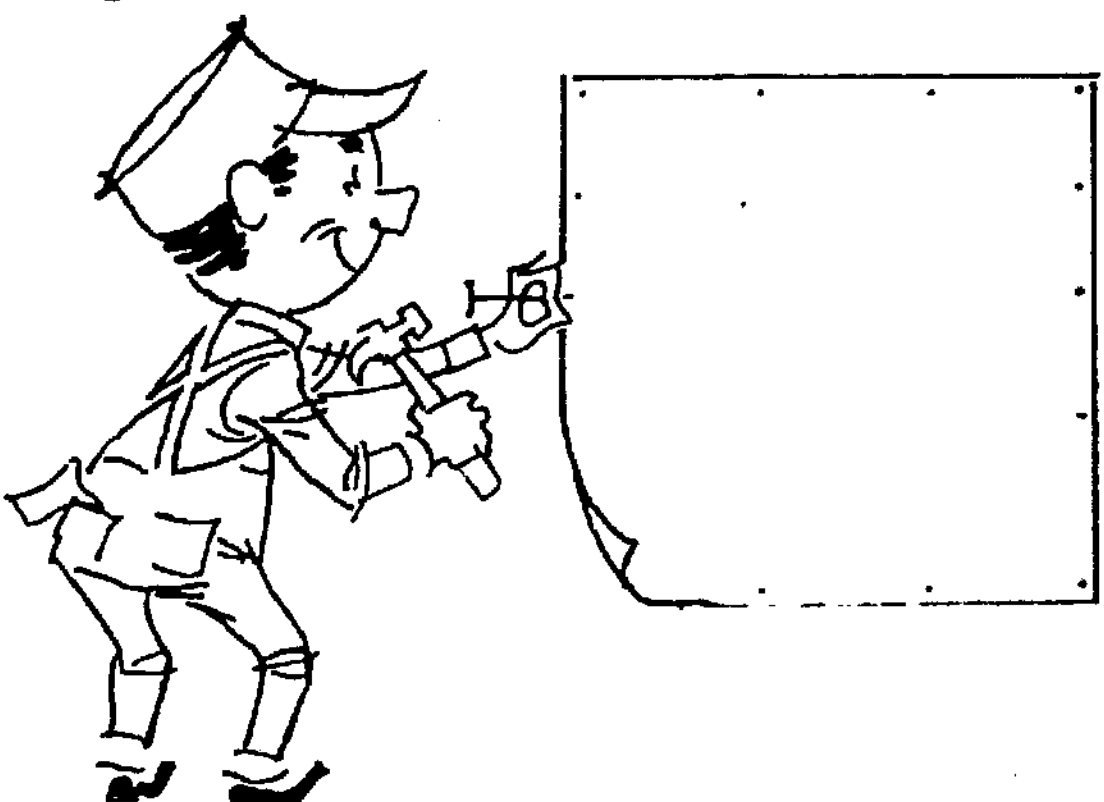

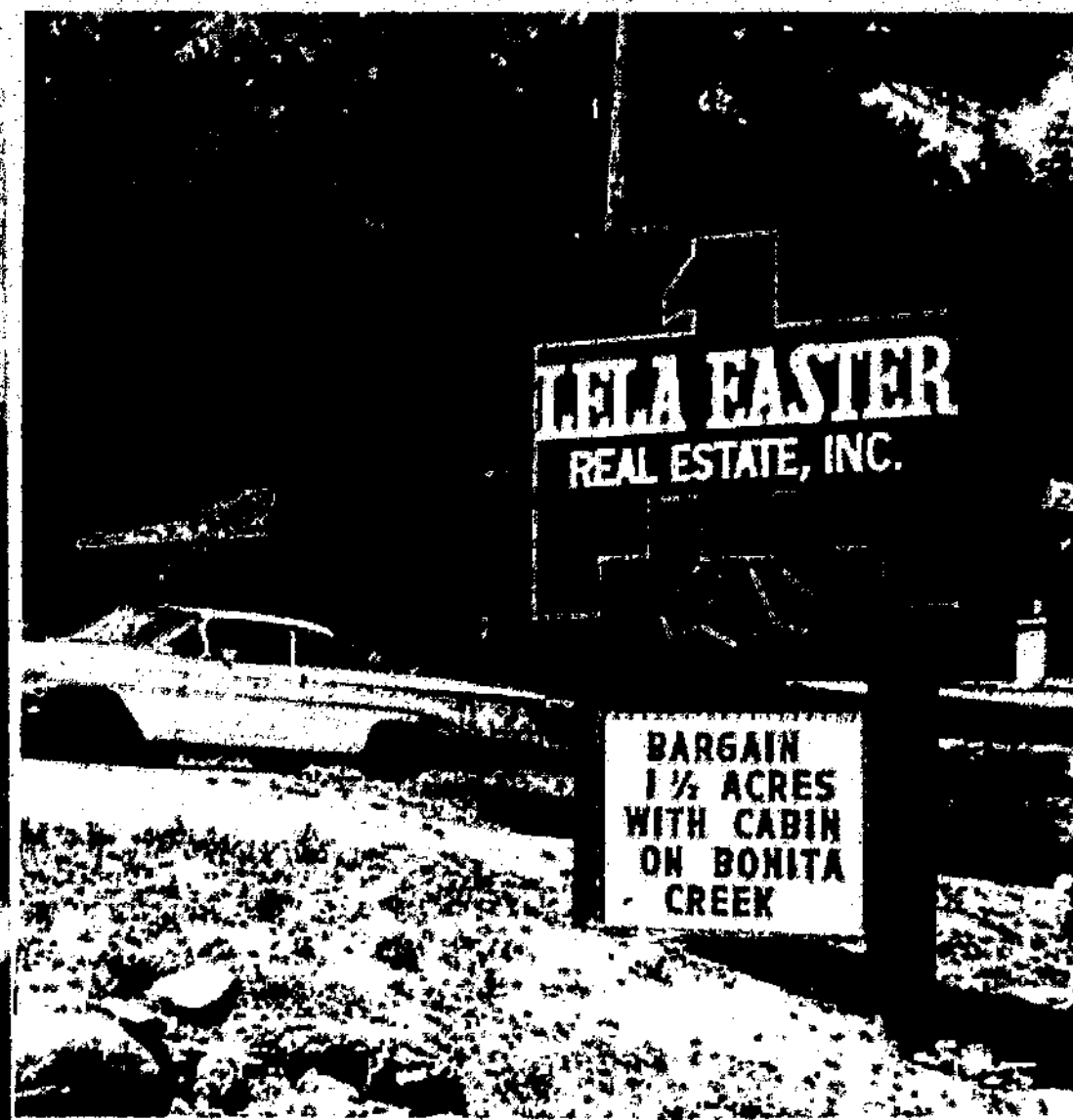

## Flood hazard study funded

The Federal Insurance Administration of the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has announced that under authority of the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (P.L. 90-448) as amended, and the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (P.L. 93-234), it will fund a detailed study of the flood hazard areas in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs. The study will be performed for the

Federal Insurance Administration by Boyle Engineering Corporation in their offices at 1721 Girard Blvd., NE, Albuquerque, New Mexico, 87106.

The purpose of this study is to examine and evaluate the flood hazard areas in the community which are developed, or which are likely to be developed, and to determine flood elevations for those areas. Flood elevations will be used by the

community to carry out the flood plain management objectives of the National Flood Insurance Program. They will also be used as the basis for determining the appropriate flood insurance premium rates, applicable for new buildings and their contents, as well as determining the rates to be used for the second layer of insurance on existing buildings and contents.

All interested persons will have an opportunity to bring any relevant facts and technical data concerning local flood hazards to the attention of the Federal Insurance Administration for consideration in the course of the study. Such information should be furnished to the mayor. Photos of flood in the community would be most helpful and will be returned. All data will be collected and considered in the compilation of the report.

**SANTA FE** — The race for U. S. Senate between incumbent Republican Pete Domenici and Democratic challenger Toney Anaya may be a controversial and noisy one by November.

Already, in an interview with "Inside the Capitol," Anaya, the current state attorney general, hinted that the Domenici campaign may be seeking to "buy votes," a practice which he called "repulsive and repugnant."

To which a spokesman for Domenici replied: "The last thing Pete Domenici is going to do is respond to dumb statements."

Anaya made his reference to "buying votes" in an interview last week in which he referred to financial statements which showed Domenici had raised more than \$400,000 while Anaya had raised \$5,500.

"I can't imagine where in the world a person would spend that kind of money," Anaya said. He went on to say it could be "to sell him (Domenici) as a commercial on TV" or to "try to buy votes."

The attorney general was asked at this point if he meant buying votes in a literal sense, as opposed to gaining media exposure.

"Literally buying votes from individuals," Anaya replied. Isn't this illegal? he was asked.

"It's illegal if it could be proven," Anaya said.

Anaya said it had been reported to him that "overtures" had been made to some Democratic leaders and that "financial rewards had been hinted at."

Later, in a telephone interview, Anaya conceded that he had no proof of any actual vote-buying. But he did say that "people are already approaching me now, wanting that kind of payoff." He said these people were "implying" they had been offered money by the opposing political camp.

"I would hope that Domenici would not stoop to that," Anaya said in the telephone interview.

The response from the Domenici staff came from Steve Bell, the press secretary in the senator's Washington office.

Bell noted that Domenici had spent \$590,000 in his first Senate race in 1972, that his opponent, Democrat Jack Daniels had spent almost that much, and that inflation during the past six years probably would cause the 1978 campaign, general and primary, to cost \$850,000.

"It's pretty simple where it's going to go," said Bell. "We're running a modern campaign. The expenses are absolutely outrageous. We don't have a Democratic party apparatus (to get out the vote)."

Bell added that the bulk of the funds would be spent on campaign material for door-to-door leaflet drops, etc.

"He'll say these outrageous things to get press (coverage) on it," Bell said of Anaya.

Bell also made these statements: "Everybody is going to know where every penny is spent in this campaign. (And) we disclose everybody who's contributed to us."

He said just the shooting and editing of commercials for television during the early stages of the campaign would cost \$35,000 — and that doesn't count purchase of air time.

"All the alligators out looking for money from the Domenici campaign are really going to be disappointed."

"If Toney doesn't know where to spend all the money after all the years with Dennis Chavez and Joe Montoya, I'm really surprised."

Bell added that the 1972 Federal campaign expense law has made it virtually impossible to spend funds that aren't specifically accounted for, and that strict audits are run of contributions and expenditures.
