Travis has been a delegate to the state ESC for two years.


In other business Tuesday evening, the organization:

COMMISSION INVOKES THREE STIPULATIONS Sheriff's budget passes muster

In approving a record high budget of \$245,273 for the Lincoln County Sheriff's department, the Lincoln Board of County Commissioners Monday issued three orders aimed at keeping the sheriff's department solvent.

During the special budget session, chairman John Sudderth said he would approve the sheriff's budget with three

provisos: 1 — That as board chairman, Sudderth said he would not sign any "in-the-red

warrants." 2 — That all vehicle equipment purchase orders be recalled and all future purchases

be cleared by the board. 3 - That four surplus sheriff's vehicles, currently used periodically by sheriff's department volunteers, be parked and sold at auction.

Commissioners George L. "Lee" Straley and G. H. "Shorty" Stoneman agreed with Sudderth and voted to issue the three

"I think the sheriff's doing a fine job," Sudderth said, "but, just like the rest of us, he's got to live within his budget."

While surpassing the current fiscal year mark of \$191,431, the figure falls \$23,695 short of the sheriff's requested budget of

Tentative approval was given to the remainder of the county budget which will probably be about \$819,398 for 26 county programs. According to county manager Les Olsen, the budget should be firm, but it is subject to state approval.

Other Monday board action included: — Formal approval for purchase of the building from Johnson Stearns to house the proposed Lincoln County — Carrizozo Medical Center. Three payments totaling \$28,000 will be made for the building which is located north of the current Carrizozo health facility.



Master plan survey mailed to area township residents

Fire prevention practices urged on area visitors

With the present hot, dry weather conditions the fire prevention steering committee warned visitors and residents to be cautious with ashes, charcoal and campfires.

"The area is drying out fast and we're back into fire danger," a committee member said Tuesday.

"We've been fortunate this year. Fire occurrence has been very low in the Ruidoso area."

The committee also encouraged visitors planning a spring clean up to consider fire hazard reduction including removing pine needles from roofs and gutters, clearing out undergrowth and small trees and checking fireplaces for soot build up and structural defects and, if necessary, install

spark arrestors. The sanitary landfill on the old Fort Stanton Road is open daily for dumping of all debris, including fire fuels.

Owners of property located in the eight township area between Ruidoso and Capitan are receiving a Lincoln County sponsored survey form, the results of which will be used for the development of a master plan for the area.

According to county manager Les Olsen, the survey is an attempt to glean what land owners feel are the chief problems facing development of the eight township area.

Following completion of the survey, the newly formed Extra Territorial Planning

hearings centered on the results of the survey, and the findings of the county, Olsen said.

Following the adoption of the master plan by ETPC the survey states, new regulations will be applied in coordination with existing subdivision regulations and will be enforced by the county.

The survey states that planners have too often not included land owners in the plan formulation state.

"The primary intent of this planning Commission (ETPC) will conduct public effort is to accommodate the demand for

residential development in a manner which will not disturb the natural beauty which makes this part of New Mexico so very desirable to travelers and natives alike," the survey states.

A cover letter attached to the survey says the idea for the formulation of a master plan originated out of a concern for preservation of forest and agricultural land, pollution problems, junk yards, animal pens, transportation problems, water availability and a number of other, undefined, problems.

The letter further states: "Some of the issues which this (master) plan will deal with include: Regulations for hillside development; enforcement of covenant restrictions which are being violated in some existing developments; enforcement of appropriate design standards for subdivision roads: designation and preservation of farm, ranch and scenic lands; contact of land uses along highways, (and) much more."

Olsen said he may be contacted at 643-2313, Carrizozo, regarding any questions which might arise concerning the survey.

Proposed four lane probably years away

Persons waiting for the start of construction on a proposed four-lane, limitedto-full access highway linking Amarillo. Texas with Las Cruces, New Mexico had best not hold their breath, according to state and federal highway officials, three U. S. senators and a past chairman of the New Mexico state highway commission.

Though all agree the upgrading of U.S. 70 and U.S. 60 between the two cities would be economically beneficial to southwestern New Mexico and a logical route. no one has been able to venture even a tentative guess on when the project will make the final drawing board.

According to John Sudderth, past long time member of the highway commission and past chairman of the commission, the proposal to link the two cities with a four lane highway has been batted around since

Currently Lincoln County Commission chairman, Sudderth said every election year someone has come out with a push for the project; so far with little results.

An official with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) said, "Really there just hasn't much happened; it's cleared a senate committee, but has a long ways to go before it becomes a reality."

The official, who declined to be identified, said the New Mexico division of the FHWA has not to his knowledge, received any word to proceed with any type of programming on the project. He was unsure if plans existed for the con-

struction project but said he doubted it. State highway Roswell District engineer J. J. "Buddy" Hewitt has said he was not aware of any active programming on the U.S. 70 project, which he said was a requisite preceding any proposed con-

struction. A Washington D. C. spokesman for New Mexico's U.S. Senator Pete Domenici said Tuesday the legislation enabling funding for the project could sit on the senate floor for quite some time following approval by the senate's Committee on Environment and Public Works.

That approval was given last Thursday by way of committee passage of a more than \$8 billion public highway bill for the construction of primary highways nationwide.

Members of the senate committee questioned provisions of the bill which reportedly would draw money from the nation's interstate highway fund for use by the states on a 90-10 matching basis.

A compromise was reportedly drawn up, establishing the Amarillo-Las Cruces route as a demonstration of the new funding concept for primary road con-

Hewitt said past primary road funding has been on a 70-30 basis with the federal government paying for 70 percent of a up the remaining 30 percent tab.

A spokesman for Texas' U.S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen, sponsor of the bill, agreed last Friday that the bill could sit in the

senate for some time. He said the senator would push for prompt passage, adding the senator felt the project would be an economic boon to the panhandle of Texas and southwestern New Mexico.

Bentsen's spokesman elaborated by adding that aside from relieving the twin states of 20 percent of the funding for the project, the upgrading would help relieve traffic pressure on the current mostly two lane U.S. 70 and would enhance the route as a major trucking lane.

Roswell and Albuquerque based spokesmen for New Mexico U.S. Senator Harrison "Jack" Schmitt said Friday that their offices were unaware of the proposed project. Several hours later the Albuquerque spokesman informed The project and the individual states picking News by telephone that the senator would push for passage of the bill following his review of the economic and environmental impact on southwestern New Mexico.

The Schmitt spokesman said she could not make an official statement regarding a tentative timetable, but she agreed project initiation was probably "several years down the road," assuming the enabling bill was promptly passed.

Even after funding is approved and basic design features are revealed the Ruidoso area itself may hold up the project.

Hewitt said the state is looking at alignment and right-of-way problems through the Hondo Valley and particularly through the canyon leading to Apache Summit. He indicated there have been problems securing right-of-way from the Mescalero Apache nation in the past.
Tribal President Wendell Chino has been

unavailable for comment. According to a 1973 survey, about 4,000

Employment found for area workers

Employment was found for 54 persons by the Ruldoso Job Service during the first half of fiscal year 1978, exceeding expectations of the employment services division, New Mexico Department of Human Resources.

Twenty seven youth, 14 unemployment insurance claimants and 15 veterans were found jobs between October and March.

"The Ruldoso office staff placed 10 percent more people than originally expected," a department spokesman said.

Elephant Butte receiving bass

New Mexico Game and Fish Department crews were in Uvalde, Texas, this week, picking up the final load of a scheduled planting of about one million baby bass for Elephant Butte Lake.

Approximatley 600,000 of the largemouthed bass fingerlings, averaging one to two inches in length, were put in the lake last week to supplement existing populations and natural reproduction. according to Dick McCleskey, assistant chief of the Fisheries Division.

The large-mouthed bass are part of New Mexico's requests for its share of warmwater fish from federal fish hatcheries, operated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, McCleskey said.

Requests are made two years in advance and may be honored in part or in all. depending on the variables of hatchery production, he added.

Requests this year include the one million largemouths planted in Elephant Butte, as well as more than a million more bass fingerlings for stocking in other waters.

The state has also requested approximately 360,000 channel cattish. 600,000 smallmouth bass, 40,000 striped bass and 135,000 bluegills for planting in various New Mexico waters.

Bass and other warm-water species, because diseases and other problems are greater at the higher water temperatures. are more difficult to raise to catchable size than trout are, McCleskey noted.

The large-mouthed bass will take from two to three years to grow to a size suitable to anglers, he said.

SANTA FE — One long-time Democratic official is seeking to go from a state-level position back to a county elected job, in a switch from the motion followed by most ambitious politicans.

He's Edward "Ted" Murphy, finishing up a four-year term as state treasurer.

Murphy, who maintained his family home in Albuquerque during his tenure in Santa Fe, is one of several candidates for Bernalillo county treasurer in the June 6 primary.

Not only did Murphy draw the "number one" ballot spot, but he's well-known politically in Bernalillo County. He served four terms as county assessor there. 1963-66 and 1971-74.

In recent years there's been a moratorium on the issuance of new Federal coal leases.

Now, the U.S. Department of the Interior is writing new proposed regulations for coal leasing operations. And, in a rare move, New Mexico and other states are being invited to help draft the regulations.

State officials in various agencies have issued from Washington, they are presented with an accomplished fact-and little input into the final version.

Meanwhile, the 1978 Legislature authorized creation of a Coal Surface Mining Bureau, which will receive funds from Washington for safety, reclamation and land use planning purposes.

There'll be narrowed jurisdiction under the new act, however. Indian reservations will have autonomy over mines on their lands, which will probably necessitate "joint powers agreements" between the state and tribes.

COPE, the Committee on Political Education of the AFL-CIO, didn't endorse State Rep. Frank Horan of Albuquerque, even though it supported most legislative Democrats this year.

COPE leaders became miffed at Horan over a disagreement during the 1978 Legislature, when industrial leaders were pushing for inclusion of an amendment to a State Labor Department bill strongly opposed by labor.

Horan, former city attorney of Albuquerque, generally is a pro-labor legislator. And COPE is possibly going to have to count votes carefully in January, when the "right-to-work" issue is expected to surface again.

Right-to-work passed the Senate two years ago and lost by a couple of votes in the House.

Although the odds at this point seem long complained that when regulations are against Bob Ferguson occupying the governor's chair then, if he is there'll be a strong push from the executive branch for right-to-work.

> Joe Skeen, the likely Republican nominee for governor, hasn't stressed right-to-work as strongly as Democrat Ferguson has, but he has said he'd sign such a bill if it cleared both houses of the Legislature.

> Officials at the El Rito campus of the Northern New Mexico Community College are now seeking to build new classroom buildings for plumbing and maintenance

WISE DECISION

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled recently that the White House tapes played at the 1974 Watergate cover-up trial may not be released for public broadcast or commercial reproduction. This was a wise decision and it merits attention.

The court rejected the contentions of several broadcasting networks and one recording company that they have a constitutional right to exploit the tapes. The plaintiffs based their claim to a constitutional right on the First and Sixth

amendemnts. The court dismissed the almost laughable Sixth Amendment appeal; the right to a public trial is the right of the accused, in this case the Watergate defendants, not that of broadcasters and recorders.

The First Amendment appeal had a superficial validity, because of the

guarantee of press freedom to circulate information. But here the court sensibly noted that "the contents of the tapes were given wide publicity by all elements of the media," and so "there is no question of a truncated flow of information to the

The tapes at issue contained 22 hours of conversations between former President Nixon and several of his top aides. Mr. Nixon had appealed the decision of a lower court that would have permitted the tapes to be broadcast and reproduced commercially, but it is important to note that executive privilege was not an argument advanced by Mr. Nixon's attorneys, nor did it figure in the court's decision. The court considered the arguments of the networks and recording company and found them insufficient.

It would seem, then, that the decision would have future application for Americans similarly situated as Mr. Nixon. That is to say, so long as there is no question that the flow of information is unblocked to the public, tape recordings used as evidence at public trial may not be disseminated through the networks or reproduced and sold by recording

Mr. Nixon did not obtain this legal victory because he once was president. His position was irrelevant, in the court's view, to the need for some restraint against the commercial exploitation of evidence in a court action. - Deming



The gate crew was astonished, and tried to flag him down, but he took off and ran down the straightaway."

parently didn't like the pickle he was getting into and tried to scale the outside rail. He missed on the first try, backed up. and sailed over the barrier on the second jump. Then he stumbled into the parking lot, and wearily climbed the mountains, and disappeared into the Ruidoso scenery - grateful for having survived his only day at the races.

Bob also recalls that time at Ruidoso when a little pooch sneaked onto the track between races. The little fellow took off and raced around the oval, and was really dragging his heels when he staggered into the winner's circle. One of the jockey valets went over to get him, and as soon as

he reached down, the little pup bit him -

to the delighted howls of the fans,

Speaking of dogs, it's incidents of this sort which have made the darling little things unwelcome at all tracks. The fear is they'll get underfoot during a race, cause the horses to shy, and trigger a spill. Before dogs were given the boot, they were used frequently by trainers in guard duty around the barn. About 10 years ago, steward John Phillips recalls, a young girl was bitten by a dog while going about her duties in the barn area at the New Mexico State fair, and that incident gave more reason for barring the canines.

A few years back, a skunk sauntered onto the race track at Ruidoso, and also made a big hit with the fans — but didn't contribute much, to a smooth running program. He finally took refuge in a drain ditch, and stayed there for the rest of the afternoon.

the time he used to call a variety of "exotic" races. The affair would be staged on a Sunday before the start of the regular Hollywood meeting, and was supposed to be a kind of family day at the track. So the animals running down the straightaway would include a donkey, a zebu, a gnu. some ostriches, camels, midget Shetland ponies. Even a baby elephant. The whole menagerie, as we get the picture, would fight it out in a heat or two. "The whole works in one race," Harry says. He admits the spectacle was "kind of silly," but

Over the years, Harry has had to call several ostrich races. The gawky animals would be asked to negotiate a furlong, hauling jockeys, but some of the ostriches wouldn't get into the spirit of things, and would buck their riders to the ground. "But they could run pretty well," Harry

allows that the fans seemed to go for it.

In earlier years, at the western Washington Fair (not far from Seattle) the nine day race meeting would include a variety of special shows. Among the most popular were riding contests with draft horses. The hefty beasts would go a half mile, with jockeys riding bareback.

"When they'd come down the stretch. the gound would shake so much, it'd feel like an earthquake," Harry recalls. "But it got to be quite a show. The people would come from all around."

We'll wrap up this little animal adventure by mentioning the best photo finish picture we ever saw. It was a Harry Henson, who announces at deadheat, alright. Two noses right on the Del Mar on the west coast, tells us about bred. The other belonged to a pigeon.

Social Security information

What some people called "back-pay" may no longer be paid by Social Security, according to Gordon Lunsford, field representative. This is due to one of many changes in the law enacted by Congress in TWIN THEATRE December,

"People who retire between age 62 and 65 get a permanently reduced amount each month. For years, applications could be retroactive for 12 months — the retiree had an option - and most people took it," Lunsford said. "For example, a man retiring at age 64 could start his checks at age 64 at \$300 per month, or if earnings were low enough, he could make his ap-



plication effective back 12 months and start his benefits back to age 63 at \$280 per

"No more! Now virtually no application can be retroactive if a reduced payment is involved. Payments will start the month an application is filed. This has caused problems. Our staff properly told some people in 1977 that they could wait until 1978 to file, after figuring the exact amount of 1977 earnings. This way, the retiree could best decide how far back to make his application retroactive. Now, that same person is told the application can't be retroactive because of the change in the law made in December and effective in January. Monthly payments will be higher but that 'back-pay' is a thing of the past to

"In cases where monthly payments are not reduced, such as payments to children and disabled workers, an application can still be retroactive up to 12 months."

Casey's Shadow action based on real horse

It was toward the end of summer 1975 when a whiz kid quarter horse called Rocket's Magic came booming out of Louisiana and landed at Ruidoso Downs with both fists swinging.

Rocket's Magic had picked off a hundred-grander or two in his homestate, and had shipped to Ruidoso licking his chops over the \$1 million All-American Futurity.

It all made a good story. The trainer, L. J. Romero, was a likeable fellow who submitted willingly to press interviews, spotted his conversation with homespun Louisiana lingo, and talked through an accent as thick as a mangrove and as pleasantly tangled as a coastal swam-

Romero's son, Randy, was the rider of Rocket's Magic, and the colt was owned by a neophyte horseman who ran a fish market in New Iberia. So Rocket's Magic went out and set the top qualifying time for the All-American, and was picked as the favorite in the Labor Day epic.

Mix all these ingredients into a pungent gumbo, stir frequently, let it sit overnight. and what you have is the germinal tissue of a Hollywood movie. Of course, the ending might need to be re-written, since Rocket's Magic took his first defeat in the All-American (he ran third) and has since dissolved into the pages of quarter horse

But in March of this year the saga of Rocket's Magic was revived to some degree. And before it's over and done with, American movie goers might be as enamored with quarter horse racing and Ruldoso Downs and the All-American Futurity as they are with sharks, and mafia mobsters, space shootouts and galaxies far, far away.

It's a big time Hollywood movie, airight. or to parrot our west coast pals, it's a "major motion picture." That means, we expect, reviews in Time and Newsweek, an advertising budget (we presume) of several million, a lot of TV hype. Even Rona Barrett will be called upon to do her share. Maybe Johnny Carson, too, and Mike Douglas, and the whole panoply of media machinery.

No, this isn't hot air. It's not even the over stressed workings of some under achieving publicity hack. It just sounds that way. What we're talking about is "Casey's Shadow," an engrossing PG blend of message and story, racing realism, and top drawer acting. We can hammer this home by noting that the director is the distinguished Martin Ritt ("The Spy Who Came In From The Cold," "The Great White Hope," and a list of other box office bell ringers as long as your arm), and the photographer is John Alonzo and when you see his credit on the Dismissed Fines Assesse. Alonzo, and when you see his credit on the screen, he gets the whole Cinemascopic frame to himself.

The star is everyman's favorite, Walter Matthau. And when you see Mr. Matthau on the screen, he'll be talking in that Louisiana accent.

Nobody out there in Hollywood has told me any secrets, and this is my own guess - and I'm as good as the next man when it comes to putting two and two together and coming up with five. But when I read the shooting script the summer before last, the character played by Matthau suggested trainer Romero. Next, I was led to assume Casey's Shadow (that's a horse) might have found his counterpart in Rocket's

Anyway, I might point out that Rocket's Magic and Romero were only the starting points in the creative process which leads to a movie. You read over the script and many real life racing figures come to mind
— such as Harriett Peckham, B. F. Phillips and Walter Merrick (each being big monied, big time quarter horse owners' of enormous standing). One also gets the essence of trainers Bubba Cascio and Bubba Werner.

Werner, in fact, is mentioned in some of the lines, and much of the stable side sequences where shot around his barn at Ruidoso Downs. There are references to such blue chip riders as Jerry Nicodemus, Bobby Adair, Danny Cardoza (as I recall). A number of Ruidoso staffers — such as

By way of indicating the commitment the producers have for the film, the following is adequate: early last year, as the final scene was being analyzed, the director and the producer were not completely satisfied with the way it worked out. They looked at it on the screen, and finally decided it didn't capture the exact motivation by the Matthau character and one of his movie sons. Another nuance was needed. So the final scene was re-written to give more force and conviction and purpose, and the whole crew was dispatched to Ruidoso last May to re-film this final sequence.

When you put a 50 man crew back on the road, you're talking about \$100,000 or so. But the final dialogue is now perfect, the bigwigs feel. Well worth the extra hundred-thousand bucks.

you'd have to do some fast talking just to case of this tale — with one twist. The horse we have in mind didn't metamorphasize into a brilliant stakes winner. But, equipped as he was with alacrity at the starting gate, he emerged into one of the great sires of quarter horses. The mention of his name is enough to make hair stand quarter horse, or thumbed through a sale catalogue, or daydreamed of success in the All-American Futurity,

This stallion is Three Bars, and a tracing of his bloodlines provides a shimmering road map through quarter horse history. Whenever you see a quarter horse with "bar" in his name and a tendency to run like well lubricated lightning, chances are the rich blood of Three Bars is doing its

And if so many sons and daughters and their respective offspring aren't enough to keep Three Bars on the great marquee in the sky, the grandeur of this fine stallion is celebrated each year at Ruidoso with the staging of the Three Bars Handicap at 400 yards. The average turf goer may recognize Three Bars as a foundation sire of some sort, but probably doesn't know much more about him.

Our curiosity was aroused by a recent issue of Horse And Pony, the Florida equine tabloid. Leaning heavily on this short piece, and magazine articles and massive computer printouts supplied by Don Essary of the American Quarter Horse Association, we'll sketch out the hard times and legendary success of Three

The story begins in 1939 when Jack Goode (later a steward at Churchill Downs and numerous midwest tracks) teamed up with two associates to purchase the mare Myrtle Dee. In foal to a stallion called Percentage, Myrtle Dee traced her ancestry back to the fabled Man O' War. In 1940, Myrtle Dee delivered a handsome chestnut colt, later called Three Bars.

But Three Bars was a flop in his early racing days. As the story goes, he was afflicted with bloodworms that badly affected his hindquarters. One day, he might run a bit. The next day, nothing. The condition wasn't treated properly until he was about five years old.

racing, Goode once described the colt this way: "He obviously had some speed, but whenever he turned it on he would come back to the barn with the muscle of a hind leg restricted and the flesh feeling cold as if the circulation were cut off. I tried everything but couldn't overcome the difficulty. We finally sold him to Beckham Stivers for \$300 to be paid if Three Bars

ever won." But Stivers had no better luck with Three Bars and finally gave him to Vernon Cloud. Goode goes on: "Somehow, trainer Cloud cured the malady or else it wore itself out. Anyway, the colt raced in 1944 for the first time and at four years old. He won three out of his four starts. He didn't start in 1945, but the next year garnered eight victories and three seconds in seventeen starts, earning \$16,940. At seven, he placed once and earned \$550 in six starts, and was retired the next year to

So in his racing days, he earned \$20,140. Goode goes on: "My partners and I each got \$100 out of him after putting in considerable money in training. But we used to laugh about it with Beckham Stivers, because he put in \$300 and training expenses on the horse and got absolutely nothing, because when the horse won it was for somebody else."

During his racing days, Three Bars had a knack of going from bad to worse. As a four-year-old, he stumbled coming out of the gate at Hot Springs, "burst open a knee and lost two teeth." That was the year in which he was sold for \$300, then later given away. After that, he changed hands once more in a claiming race.

The people who claimed him took him to the dry climate in Arizona, where he began to mend. At this point, Sidney Vail — a former cowpoke who'd done some rodeoing and guide duty in Yellowstone Park — offered \$10,000 for Three Bars, and went into debt to sew up the deal.

At the beginning of his stallion career, the asking price was \$100, and not many mares sought his affections. By 1955, when his sons and daughters were making beautiful music, the fee went up to five grand, then later, \$10,000. In the 1950's, a bizarre kidnapping entered into the story. But going back to those early tries at A couple of bumblers swiped the stallion

with the idea of getting free matings to their mares. But the job was thoroughly muddled, and the two clubbed Three Bars and turned him loose, and the stallion, his nose broken, was found "wandering among old cars and appliances in a junk yard.

Recovering from that ordeal, Three Bars went on to lasting fame as a sire of quarter horses. If we understand the computer print out sheets. Three Bars sired 547 quarter horses who earned \$3.196,521. Daughters of Three Bars produced 1,466 foals who went on to amass **\$4**,639,856.

The potency of Three Bars blood is easily illustrated. One of his daughters was Lena's Bar, and when Lena's Bar (a thoroughbred) was mated to the flashy quarter horse, Jet Deck, the result was Easy Jet. The latter, a winner of \$445,721, is now turning into a sire of storied proportions (and commands a tidy \$10,000 stud fee, which is tantamount to a license to mint money).

In the mid-1950's, the Three Bars daughter, Bardella, set track records, earned \$35,981, and stirred up plenty of attention. Ditto for Barred, Miss Myrna Bar and War Chant. Another son, Mr. Bar None, ended his racing days in '58 with a big reputation and a money line of \$72,125.

There was Triple Lady, who ran out **\$**61.931.

Not to be overlooked were two All-American Futurity winners: Galobar, who took the maiden All-American in 1959, and Pokey Bar, who won it in 1961. The latter earned \$162,631 — awfully big potatoes in his day. Others of great standing: Alamitos Bar, \$58,037; Mr. Three Bars, \$34,746; Bar Depth, \$52,185; Little Chloe, \$56,240; Bunny's Bar Maid, \$72,289; Pistol Bar, \$53,242; Rapid Volley, \$146,918; Nippy Bars, \$90,406; Sompin Special, \$62,632; Miss Gold Angel, \$107,556; Velox Bar, \$63,891; Carlota II, \$67,685; Three Dreams, \$47,255.

Tracing the foals produced by the daughters of Three Bars is like following the Yellow Brick Road, but we must mention Azure Fair, \$87,641; Anna Dial, \$75,143; Duplicate Copy, \$81,056; Go Josie Go, \$152,511; Dial Three Bar, \$48,812; Bar Request, \$118,116; Nuther Brother, \$86,831; Anecdote, \$161,999; Miss Flicka Reb. \$61,127; Sompin Lika Jet, \$93,266; Final Kiss, \$44,059; and, of course, Sold Short who made \$182,371. To those we've

negligently omitted, our apologies. Three Bars, the great progenitor and the single most influential sire in quarter horse history, died at Paris, Kentucky, in






Great old-time "Roasting Ears"

Roast on your barbecue grill for approximately 1/2 hour, not too close to the coals.

Soak them in water for an hour or so, and drop them on the coals. Better yet, keep a bucket full of sodden twiglets ready at all times for your next barbecue.







Jockey/Trainer of the week

Salustio Burgos notched the third spot in the standings by scoring three victories and a third, all on Sunday. He took his final

bow in the last race aboard Hilltop's Native (\$9.20) in an 870-yard battle.

Trainer Lambert sent nine horses to the starting gate and four stopped at the winner's circle on their way back. The most impressive was Bea Lightning who led from wire to wire in a 51/2-furlong maiden bout to win by a nose and returned \$30.80. Lambert's tally stands at 4-0-2 for a 44.4 win percentage.

H. Don Farris notched a 3-4-1 record from nine starts to grab second-place with a 33.3 percentage. J. Doyal Roberts, whose star Countess Blade won the Inaugural Purse Saturday, finished third with a 2-0-1
