Juvenile laws change July 1

Laws pertaining to the jailing of juveniles effective in New Mexico July 1 will, Jane Parnell, Lincoln County Children's Probation Officer, said Friday, "not drastically change the methods now employed by my office."

Parnell outlined the new procedures:

JUVENILE OFFENDERS— Non-delinquents, including runaways, truants, kids kicked out of their homes and other non-criminal offenses will be placed in volunteer Shelterbed program homes in Lincoln County.

These juveniles will remain in the Shelterbed homes pending disposition of their cases, such as returning runaways to their homes.

JUVENILE CRIMES

This category includes juvenile activities coming under the Children in Need of Supervision (CHINS) laws. Offenders, when possible, will be released to their parents or guardians. "These offenses are not serious ones," Parnell said, "and are mainly petty misdemeanors, such as loitering, trespassing and disorderly conduct, that would be crimes if committed by an adult."

CRIMES OF VIOLENCE

Jailing is required for violent crimes and major felonies, or where there is

probability of the juvenile doing bodily harm to himself, Parnell said.

"Contrary to reports being circulated," she said, "Lincoln County Jail, Carrizozo, will be certified to hold juveniles after July 1, following certain modifications that will be completed before then."

THE MAJOR CHANGE in the new law, Parnell said, concerns runaways from out of state.

"At the present time we must assign these runaways to Shelterbed homes, where they can't, obviously, be restrained," she said. "After July 1 we will be able to detain these runaways in county jail until they are released to their parents or guardian."

"After July 1 we will not be able to jail a juvenile for crime, unless that juvenile has committed a delinquent act considered a crime of violence."

The list of crimes for which a juvenile may be held after July 1, without danger of the offender filing a lawsuit for being held in jail, include violent crimes, robbery, burglary, shoplifting or possession of drugs, Parnell said, "according to interpretations of the law now available."

Parnell said that the Ruidoso case load of detained juveniles "averages about 50 a year," and that "about 6,700 are detained in the state each year."

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Easy Move, 13 to 1 shot, winner of Kansas Derby

Easy Move, off at nearly 13-1, mowed down some classy competition while flashing to a decisive victory in Sunday's fourth edition of the Kansas Quarter Horse Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The first leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-olds packed a gross purse of \$139,100. The winner's slice came out to \$87,050.

Easy Move is owned by Richard Barrie of New York, president of Faberge. Jackie Martin does the riding.

The trainer of Easy Move — and the man who gets the biggest share of the credit for the Kansas conquest — is Gene Tefertiller. Tefertiller also happens to be the genius behind Hot Idea, the winner of last year's \$1 million All-American Futurity at Ruidoso.

Easy Move was bumped slightly by Bunny Mackay at the start of the Derby, but the block didn't impair his movement much. He settled down quickly and took off. In the early going, the people's choice, Real Easy Jet, was zipping along in command.

Buffy Pass, the top qualifier, was about a neck off the pace. The rest of the field was pretty well within range. As the field reached the midway point of the 400-yard thriller, it was apparent Real Easy Jet couldn't hang onto the stinging pace.

The classy colt gradually relinquished his position as Easy Move picked up momentum. The latter was full of run in the final 100 yards and went flying into the lead. Real Easy Jet gave up without much argument and sunk back into the pack.

Buffy Pass, getting stronger with each stride, had no trouble putting away the favorite. But the filly had no chance of catching the high-flying Easy Move.

The Dreamer

Wind in May

This is being sent to you on the seventeenth of May, and it is a little like March with the west wind coming down the vale. There are a number of unusual things about the weather this year, and one of them is this wind in the month of May. We wonder oftentimes why we need the wind; and especially right at this time when Mother Earth is trying to hold on to her moisture.

Dry, warm weather is normal for this month for many reasons. We need lots of sun for the new leaves and the grass and all the other growing things. Then too, all the song birds have flown in from many places in the world to make their nests and raise their young here in the trees of their favorite summer home.

High up in the walnut and oak trees along the river, you can see the robin nests if you look closely. They will be in the forks of the limbs up near the top. I used to worry about the young birds in these nests when the wind was blowing. However the birds know from long experience how to build their nests in the right place. The robin's nest is secure from the strongest blasts of wind.

The blue bird likes to build in a hollow tree or some other sheltered place. They appreciate bird houses that you build for them. And they love to be near your home, knowing that they are the birds of happiness.

Sometimes, though, you will see a bird nest away out near the end of a limb high up on an oak or walnut tree. You wonder if the birds who build these nests are sure of the weather and know that there is not going to be any wind. For generally, the time of the nesting of birds is still, warm and dry. You can understand why the very young birds need this kind of weather.

So now on a day like today with the west wind blowing about one-fourth of its speed, and some times in gusts a little faster, — you wonder if this will endanger some of those bird nests that are out toward the ends of the limbs.

Down by the river you look for one of these nests. At first you cannot find one. Surely the birds knew that the wind was going to blow during May a little bit. After a while sure enough you see one — a little nest in the forks of the branches away out toward the end of a walnut limb. The wind is blowing pretty lively, and yet the stout old walnut branches move very little.

The wind rocks the baby birds to sleep in their walnut tree cradle and hums them a lullaby through the bright new leaves all around.

Walnut Leaves Are Still Late

All along the winding course of the river, you can still see walnut trees with their branches almost bare; and when you look closely, you can see the new buds and small leaves. This is the first time I have seen some of the walnut trees so slow to leaf out.

All the other late leaves are out in full and growing fast. There is an old saying — "The Mesquite knows" meaning that the mesquite is the last to leaf out so as to be the first to drop its leaves.

Mesquite And Wild Grape

Over on the sunny side of the world there are some mesquite bushes on a little rocky bluff just up from the river. Every year I watch these bushes to be sure there will come no more frost. The mesquite has been out in its delicate new green, a delight to your eyesight every year in the late spring.

And along the river the wild grape blossom sends its delicate perfume — so welcome upon the dry air. The wild grape and wild cherry are the last to bloom of all the wild blossoms. And your heart gives a little leap of joy when their fragrance reaches you so pure and fresh in the warm air and on the gentle breeze. When you inhale the essence of the wild grape and the wild cherry it is a breath of happiness and new life more welcome each year.

The Wind Again

We know there are many reasons for this little wind in May. Surely it helps the walnut trees to bring out their leaves that are so late this year. It strengthens the limbs and branches of the trees and helps the running of the sap in the new growth.

And surely this time of year it brings a weather change. If the west wind keeps blowing for a while, then comes the east wind with some rain.

In just a few days the young of the birds and other creatures of the wild will be old enough to welcome a little rain. And maybe we will get some rain a little early this year thanks to the west wind.

Take care of yourself and enjoy the beautiful spring. Better and better days are ahead of us. So let us rejoice and thank God for all our blessings.

Buffy Pass, ridden by Bruce Pilkenton for E. Wayne and James Johnson of Lufkin, Texas, had to be content with the runnerup purse of \$22,797. The tote returns were \$4.20 and \$2.80. Real Easy Jet hit the wire a nose behind Buffy Pass and took home the third-place slice of \$13,410. The show payoff was \$3 even.

Gary Sumpter piloted Real Easy Jet for the well-known owner-trainer, Walter Merrick of Sayre, Oklahoma.

BLACK LINDISMA, an 18-1 longshot ridden by Salustio Burgos, came flying out of the pack and scored a surprise victory in

Saturday's feature sprint at Sunland Park. The filly was well out of the picture during most of the 5 1/2-furlong sprint on wet terrain.

With only about 50 yards to go, Nu And Crafty, a 26-1 shot, looked like a sure winner. But Black Lindisma closed with a sudden power burst and swept by Nu And Crafty to win convincingly by three-quarter lengths.

Fans who backed Black Lindisma collected a generous \$39.60 on a \$2 win ticket. The place price was \$20.20, the show return, \$10.80. Black Lindisma is owned by Carl Davidson of El Paso. The filly was clocked in 1:07 1/5 seconds in a track which remained fast despite a steady rain.

Nu And Crafty ended up second, returning \$20.40 and \$7.80. Smoothentangle got in third, paying \$8.80. The two favorites, Jimmilyn and Strate Miss, showed little.

SIX TE, A GELDING making the first start of his career, flashed to a length win in Friday's program at Ruidoso Downs and set the day's top qualifying time for the upcoming \$500,000 Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity.

Six Te ended his 350-yard trial dash with a length lead and stopped the clock in 18.11 seconds. The work automatically advanced Six Te into the June 4 Kansas finale.

Six Te is leased by Anne B. Tandy of Ft.

Worth. Jerry Nicodemus is the rider. Don Farris does the training.

Friday's program covered 15 elimination trials, with the clock deciding the five who'll go into the finale. These five will join the five survivors from Thursday's stanza in the June 4 showdown.

Also making the grade Friday were More Excuses, 18.13; Flying Passem, 18.16; Trucklin Moon, 18.17; and Bug Tuff Johnny, 18.24.

All five qualifiers Friday won their respective heats.

TRASHEY MAN went into Thursday's program at Ruidoso Downs with a humble money line of \$240 from two career starts.

He came out of the 15 race program as the leading qualifier in the first stanza of the elimination trials leading to the \$499,700 Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity.

The colt, ridden by J. C. Wiley, won the ninth race by a half-length and stopped the clock at 18.16 seconds for 350 yards. That clocking held up as the best of the day — and advanced Trashey Man into the regionally televised grand finale June 4.

Trashey Man is owned by W. L. Edwards of Ruidoso. The colt paid \$10 even to win. J. C. Wiley was up.

A total of five head qualified for the Kansas finale in Thursday's action. The others: Oh Jet Van, 18.22; Song of My Heart, 18.27; Gentlemen's Feature, 18.27; Mito Easy, 18.28.

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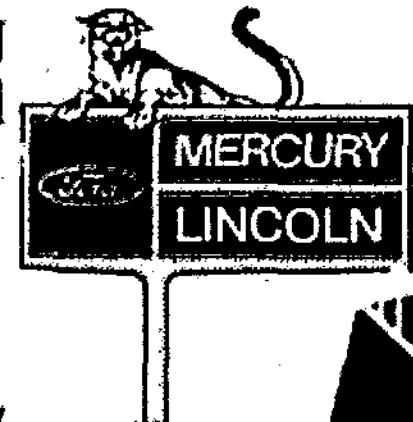


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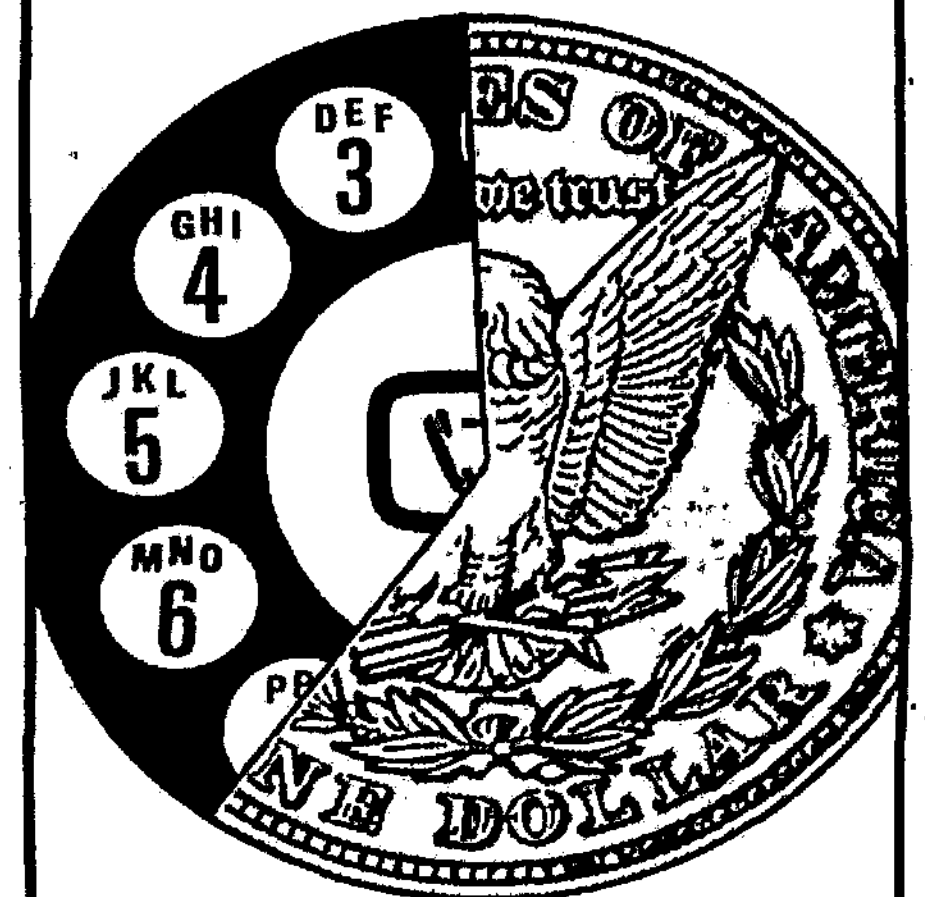
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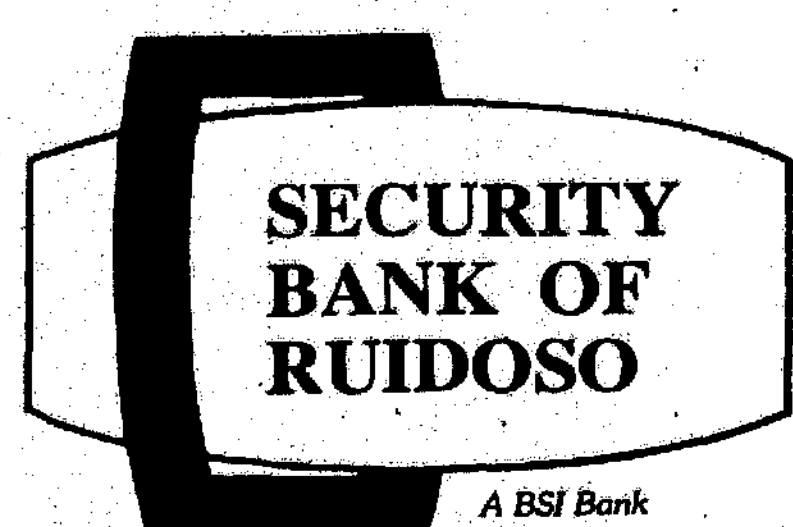
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Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE — Abortion. The state's politicians have found it's an issue seemingly with no middle ground and extremely strong feelings both ways. The issue, at the state capitol level, has been kicked and fumbled every which way and still is unresolved.

The process of politics tends to seek a general consensus on any issue where there's disagreement or the absence of a clear-cut majority for a specific course of action.

But that process really hasn't worked where abortion is concerned, on the national level or in New Mexico.

One part of the public believes plainly that abortion is murder of an as-yet-unborn child. They think the child, while still in the embryo, is the most defenseless of murder victims, and that killing is wrong no matter what the U.S. Supreme Court says about it.

Another part of the public believes that abortion is a form of birth control, or at least a regrettable but frequently necessary alternative to ruining the lives of women faced with bearing a child they can't love and properly care for.

The groups have had some noisy, intense confrontations, and there'll probably be more.

Gov. Jerry Apodaca heard bitter complaints from "right-to-life" people in his office suite a few weeks ago after he vetoed a portion of the state's General Appropriations Act limiting tax expenditures for abortions. There were hassles between pro- and anti-abortion groups during the 1978 Legislature.

Now, the question of state government's policy on funding of abortions for women who couldn't otherwise afford them remains unresolved.

Some background: The '78 session of the lawmaking Legislature put language in the General Appropriations Act similar to Federal restrictions issued by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW).

Last summer, HEW told the states they could use Federal dollars to help pay for abortions in three instances:

— If the attending physician says the life of the mother would be endangered by letting the pregnancy continue to term.

— If the pregnancy involves "out-of-uterus" formation of the baby.

— If the pregnancy were the result of rape or incest reported before the fact of pregnancy was established.

In February, HEW added a fourth provision which allowed use of Federal funds if it were determined that having the child or continuing the pregnancy would cause severe and long-lasting damage to the health of the mother.

Meanwhile, the Legislature was putting those first three restrictions in the General Appropriations Act, which supplies tax dollars to various agencies, including in this case the new Human Service Department. HSD has to follow Federal guidelines in order to receive Federal funds for various programs it operates — in this instance Medicaid, a medical payment program for the poor, and "Title 20," which includes provisions for payments of abortions under the "family planning" category. But HSD adopts state-level regulations as well, governing state tax dollars.

The no-longer-existent citizen board of the department which preceded HSD prior to government reorganization held its last meeting in March and declined to take further action on the issue. At that time, Apodaca hadn't yet vetoed the language in the Appropriations Act — which would've had more legal power than a board-adopted resolution anyway.

Now it's up to the cabinet-level secretary of HSD, Fernando C de Baca, to decide what the state restrictions on abortion funding should be. Hearings were held in various New Mexico cities, but not widely advertised or publicized.

C de Baca is not expected to make a decision until transcripts from those hearings are printed for him to study.

NEW CLOUD FOR OLD

Dismissal of charges against John Kearney, a New York FBI agent accused of illegal wiretappings and mail openings, have dispelled some of the gloom hanging over the bureau. However, federal grand jury indictments against former Acting Director L. Patrick Gray and two of his assistants have created a new cloud.

Kearney's plight had been blamed for deteriorating morale in the agency, since it was almost universally accepted that he had acted under orders.

The action against Gray and the other two, unprecedented in the history of the agency, have stirred new controversy and produced an unlikely event — a demonstration by about 100 agents, who stood silently on the steps of the federal cour-

thouse where Gray and the others were indicted. The agents were there to show their support for their former superiors.

The sticky point in all this is that the mood of the nation was far different in the late 1960s and early 1970s, when the alleged civil rights violations occurred, than it is today. Bombings by the Weatherman terrorists then were drawing public outrage, and the capture of members of the group was an FBI priority.

A spinoff problem of this divergence in public opinion and activity within the intelligence community is that recently several FBI agents have refused to implement wiretaps ordered by the office of Atty. Gen. Griffin Bell. It's alright now, the agents insist, because the attorney general wants the taps. But who will be around to protect them a few years hence when a different government in a different mood decides to prosecute them for this "illegal" activity?

Gray and his former aides do not believe they are guilty of misdeeds. They rejected plea-bargaining offers that would have allowed them to plead guilty to less serious charges than the conspiracy charge returned by the grand jury.

That is good, we believe, because it will give the defendants a chance to air all this business in the full glare of the news media.

New FBI Director William H. Webster summed the whole matter up rather aptly recently, when he said, "The sooner this is completed, the better it will be for all concerned, and certainly for the FBI as an organization." — News-Bulletin, Belea
