## Local voter turnout heavy

Voter turnout, in Tuesday's primary election, just exceeded 50 percent in Ruidoso and 48 percent in Ruidoso Downs.

In Ruidoso 645 of the 1,280 registered voters went to the polls with 181 of the 378 eligible voters casting their vote in Ruidoso Downs.

By precincts, the vote was 139 in 11, 214 in 13 and 292 in 14.

Countywide, 37 percent, 2,070 of the 5,550 registered voters, 852 Republicans and 1,218 Democrats voted.

In Lincoln County races:

— S.M. Ortiz polled 516 votes for Division I Magistrate to the 412 received by Lee Jacquelin Martin.

— Jim McEuen received 476 votes for Division II Magistrate to the 441 polled by incumbent Gertrude Huey on the Democrat ticket. Alfred Montes, Republican, received 415 votes.

— George Stoneman, in the District I county commissioner's race, polled 654 votes in his reelection bid, with challenger R.C. Nunez getting 380. On the Republican ballot the vote was 410 for Thomas McKnight to 317 for Michael Hernandez.

— In the Republican contest for nomination for county commissioner,

## Fire department commended

Following a surprise inspection of the facilities of the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department recently, by Tom C. Langhorst, of the State Fire Marshal's Office, Langhorst submitted the following general comments to Chief Bill Seelbach:

"This is a very well run department. It demonstrates what a volunteer department can do with proper direction.

"Their preplanning program is very well implemented. They use their resources to good advantage."

Langhorst, accompanied by Seelbach and fireman Danny Garcia, visited all fire stations and inspected the equipment.

"This surprise inspection," Seelbach said, "proved that our paid firemen are doing their job in maintaining the trucks and equipment and that the hours spent cleaning, inspecting and keeping our equipment in repair by our volunteers resulted in this commendation from the state inspector."

"It is a source of satisfaction to me and will prove to be an inspiration to all of our

firemen, to have the inspector determine that every fire truck was ready to roll and that all of our equipment was in first class condition.

"I congratulate all of our firemen for their efforts resulting in the excellent status report we received."

"It also proves what our department has long contended, that we offer the best fire protection possible with our small operation."

"Then there was the lowering of the fire rate last year from seven to six, meaning that the protection our department is

providing our village justified a more favorable fire insurance premium."

Seelbach added that completion of remodeling at the main fire station and "putting our new pumper truck on the line will enable us to provide even better service."

## Forest Service launches informational broadcasts

An informational radio station operated by Smokey Bear District of Lincoln National Forest began broadcasting this week, Charlie Mook, Forest Service fire prevention officer, said Monday.

The station, at 1610 on the AM band, is currently broadcasting fire prevention information and campground reports on a 24 hour basis. In the future, depending on the season, broadcast information will include fire and weather conditions, where to go and how to harvest fuel wood, wilderness trail information and condition reports, Christmas tree cutting policies, road information, scenic areas and points of interest.

Administered by the Forest Service offices, the station will have a two to five mile range depending on terrain.

The project, which cost an estimated \$4,000 was begun because "there is a need to get this information out to the public," district ranger Ray Page said.

He added, the station would be used in conjunction with the Fire Prevention Steering Committee's red flag fire danger alert program.

Initially the tapes to be broadcast on the station will be made by members of the district staff, but in the future "we may consider professional help in recording the tapes," Page said.

The station was arranged and will be maintained by a Forest Service radio technician with the possible assistance of Ed Hyman, owner of KRRR, Ruidoso.


The daughter of Sue Reaves of Ruidoso, she is a 1978 graduate of Ruidoso High School and a former Little Miss pageant contestant.

## Trustees reject bond refunding

The Ruidoso trustees, in a special meeting Monday afternoon, rejected two proposals to refund \$4 million in General Obligation Water Bonds to finance construction of Eagle Creek Dam submitted by Stern Brothers of Albuquerque and Bosworth Sullivan and Company of Denver, Colorado.

The Bosworth Sullivan offer, submitted by Steve Jeffers, would have given an overall interest rate of 6.82 percent on the refunded bonds. The Stern Brothers proposal tendered a 6.368 interest rate. The present rate of interest, on outstanding bonds, is 6.92 percent.

The savings, to the village, under either plan would have approximated \$100,000, based on interest rates available through refunding and present money value.

In speaking of both plans, Darrel Fowler of Stern Brothers said: "Neither plan is worth a damn," should the need for ad-

ditional financing to complete the dam project arise.

After consideration of both refunding plans, trustee George White said: "I move to forget the whole thing (the idea of refunding the \$4 million bond issue) and that we do not enter into a refunding issue." The motion was seconded by trustee Ab Gunter.

Prior to the vote, the trustees said:

— White: "I'm against refunding. I believe the village would lose its credibility," in referring to future bond issues.

— Gunter: "I agree, generally, with trustee White. Also, I have no preference for either company," concerning the proposals.

— Trustee Frank Sayner: "We should enter into refunding as it offers a saving,

plus the fact that a call feature (both plans offered the opportunity to pay off the outstanding bonds in the 1980s) could provide a cushion," should the interest rate drop appreciably after the date the bonds could be called. "I believe refunding would save the taxpayers money now and in the future, due to the refunding option available in the future and because of about \$100,000 in net savings (under either plan) to the village and taxpayers."

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., in calling for the vote, instructed village manager Jim Hine to poll the council. The individual votes: White and Gunter "aye" and Sayner "nay."

District III, Ben Hall polled 449 votes to 198 for Patricia French.

Incumbent Marian Schlarb received 459 votes to win Republican nomination for county assessor, with challenger Charles Neel polling 249.

Incumbent sheriff Bill Elliott turned back the challenge of Democrat M.H. Nelson, 733 to 321. On the Republican ticket former sheriff Ernest Sanchez defeated the bid of James McSwane, 520 to 282.

The 2,070 votes registered in Tuesday's primary election was 74 less than the 2,144 going to the polls in the 1976 primary.

**IN CONTESTED STATE RACES** with 1,172 of the state's 1,190 precincts reporting, the winners of Tuesday's primary election were:

In the governor's race, Democrat Bruce King captured 61 percent of the vote. In the fall he will face Joe Skeen who walked away with 80 percent of the Republican votes to record his second landslide Republican primary victory for New Mexico's top executive position. King received 92,360 votes, and Skeen 37,595 with two percent of the state's precincts still not counted.

In the lieutenant governor race, Republican Leo Dow received his party's nomination by garnering 20,401 votes. Democrat Roberto Mondragon received 51,757 votes. The two men will face each other in the fall.

For secretary of state, Shirley Hooper, Democrat from Santa Fe, received 62,296 votes. In November she will face Republican Nila A. Baer who ran unopposed in the primary.

For the state auditor's position, Democrat Alvin Castillo received 62,943. He will face Republican C. Jack Emmons in November. Emmons ran unopposed in the primary.

In the Attorney general's race Democrat Jeff Bingaman received 69,058 votes to take his party's primary nomination. Republican John D. Donnell ran unopposed in the Republican primary.

In the district 39 state senate race, which includes portions of Otero and Lincoln counties, Bobby Dan Crenshaw received 1,384 votes to edge out Charlotte Crumley Jarratt to capture the Democrat primary. Jarratt received 1,112 votes. Crenshaw will face incumbent John Conway, Republican, in the November general election.

In the 12th judicial District Judge race, Division II, Billy Gene Payne received 3,414 Democrat votes while incumbent

Thomas A. Sandenaw Jr. received 1,392 Republican votes. Both men ran unopposed in the primary.

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



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

## Willie Dean, 12, handicaps horses

Racing fans take note! There's a new handicapper in town. Willie Dean, a very mature 12-year-old, who's batting about 70 percent on his horse selections.

Publisher, accountant and head handicapper for Will's Tips, he officially began the project during the second week of racing.

"The first week I kinda tested the system. We went to the races with some friends and relatives and (my predictions) came out about 72 percent correct," Will said.

After about a month of races, he's hitting about "66 to 68 percent, which is pretty good. It's not as good as some sheets, but then it's better than some others."

"I'm kinda in between (on accuracy)." Last Sunday, Will hit the daily double,

exacta, fifth and seventh race quinellas and several assorted wins, places and shows.

"I think it's easier to pick the older horses," he said. "The young 2-year-olds are unpredictable. Like Gentlemen's Feature which won the Kansas Futurity Sunday, he was a long shot."

The son of Mr. and Mrs. William Dean of Ruidoso, Will became interested in handicapping the horses because his mother worked at Ruidoso Downs Racetrack.

"For the past two or three summers, I've been at the track about every day. Back then, when I was a little kid, I just looked at the program and picked which horse I thought would win and I'd tell friends which one would be a pretty good bet," Will said.

"Then last summer, I asked my parents if I could write a tip sheet. Since it was midsummer, they said let's wait and see."

"This year I asked again."

They said "yes," with the condition he must manage the project himself.

The \$1 he receives per sheet goes for cost of printing and commissions for the eight area businesses selling the sheet.

Any profit from the venture will be used to purchase a new trumpet he will play in the White Mountain Middle School band this fall.

"Hopefully, I'll continue through the summer with the project," Will said. "But sometimes it takes years to get established."

"The sheets have been selling OK so far. They're only \$1; some sheets cost more."

The News asked Will for an explanation of his handicapping system, but he said, "I couldn't tell. That'd be like giving away a trade secret."

When pressed for just one hot tip for today's races, Will smiled and said, "You'll have to go buy a sheet!"

A seventh grader at White Mountain Middle School, he was the school spelling champ and placed 38 in a field of 116 regional spelling competitors.

## Pink Ladies unveil new plans at annual meeting

Also, new programs started in the period include a volunteer service, refreshment and gift cart service, gifts of blue or pink ojas for parents of new babies, serving steak and champagne dinners to new parents, assistance in the cancer detection clinics and a scholarship program.

"This is not my report, but a report of what you have accomplished," Miss Johnson told the members.

— State election procedures and necessary qualifications were discussed.


— A letter from Hazel Kennedy was read.

## Creative alternatives to traditional salad greens

"Summer tossed salads certainly do not have to be limited to a small number of traditional ingredients," said Mae Martha Johnson, Extension food specialist at New Mexico State University. "In fact, the occasional poor quality and high cost of the more popular salad greens may make alternatives even more desirable."

For example, cabbage or carrots can make a high quality and inexpensive base for a salad. But don't overlook other greens, such as iceberg, bibb or leaf lettuce, romaine, endive, spinach, Chinese cabbage or celery tops.

When you mention a cabbage salad, many people immediately think of cole slaw. But why not try a new twist — a cabbage orange salad. Mix two cups of shredded cabbage with one cup of finely chopped carrots and one cup diced orange sections. Sprinkle the salad with a tablespoon of sugar and top with a mixture of one-half cup, sour cream and one-half cup mayonnaise.

You can also make a colorful cabbage salad by marinating one cup of shredded beets in one tablespoon of French dressing. This will keep the beets from bleeding. Then combine the beets with two

cups of shredded cabbage and one tablespoon of minced onions. Top with a creamy dressing.

For other cabbage ideas, experiment with mixtures of shredded cabbage, chopped onions, sliced pimiento and chopped peanuts. Or maybe you would like cabbage with raw chopped spinach, quartered tomatoes and shredded cheese. And don't overlook an even easier combination of cabbage, carrots and green peppers.

If you are even more daring, try a spinach-orange-avocado salad. Trim and tear one quart of fresh spinach. Add 22 ounces of canned, drained Mandarin orange sections and one cup of diced fresh avocado. Top with French dressing.

For a mixed vegetable salad without lettuce, start with a 10 ounce package of mixed frozen vegetables. Mrs. Johnson said. Cook them until they are barely tender, then drain and chill. Finally add one cup of thinly sliced celery, one-fourth cup each of diced green pepper, chopped sweet pickle and diced cucumber and one tablespoon of finely chopped onion. Top with one-fourth cup of French dressing.

# Yours and Ours

SANTA FE — A State District Court has ruled that the complicated, often conflicting water rights along the entire Pecos River Valley can be sorted out in a single process.

The ruling came after the Water Resources Division of the State Natural Resources Department sought court approval for combined handling of individual water rights along the basin, one of New Mexico's richest agricultural areas.

The division asked for the ruling from District Court Judge James Sneed after Carlsbad-area irrigators contended that upper-valley pumpers around Artesia and Roswell were over-utilizing water for irrigation purposes.

The outcome will be important to farmers along the valley.

State water division officials say the adjudication of the additional 2,500 water users may take from two to five years. But an attorney for the Roswell-Artesia users, members of the Pecos Valley Artesian Conservancy District, says the process could take 20 years.

The rights of some 3,000 water users were adjudicated over a period of years, beginning in the Fifties, in what is known as the "Lewis case."

This involved the Roswell-Artesia underground basin and the Rio Hondo, Rio Ruidoso and Rio Bonito which re-charge the basin.

But there have been a number of court decrees up and down the Pecos River and its tributaries — what one official at the

state level called "a patchwork of different decrees but no decree putting them all into order."

What brought about the more recent district court ruling was the request for a "priority call" on water by the Carlsbad Irrigation District. The State Water Resources Division, in effect, took the side of the CID in asking for the court to rule so that it could begin administering the entire Pecos "according to the doctrine of prior appropriations."

Before the adjudication of the valley can begin, state officials say, a hydrographic survey will have to be completed.

But is there enough water in the valley for all the present users? Perhaps not — else there wouldn't be complaints bringing about the present court battles. Asked this question, one state water official said:

"I don't know." Then he paused and added, "There apparently is not."

The 1974 race for governor between Democrat Jerry Apodaca and Republican Joe Skeen was decided by 1.1 per cent of the ballots cast.

The Apodaca-Bob Ferguson slate edged out the Skeen-Virgil Rhodes ticket by 3,742 votes. In that general election, 504,197 New Mexicans were registered to vote and 339,974 actually voted for a percentage of 67.2 per cent.

This year, 567,783 New Mexicans are registered to vote. This includes 370,101 Democrats, 159,469 Republicans, 38,256 Independents and 1,957 members of minority parties.

Clearly there's little straight-party-line voting going on in the state because three of the four congressional seats are held by Republicans — and an increasing number of local and legislative seats.

But the Democrats have held onto the statehouse controls for eight years and the GOP is hungry for a win this year.

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## Clipped Comment

### TAXES

The White House staff is said to be urging President Carter to rally public opinion behind his tax reform proposals. The House Ways and Means Committee has been giving them rough treatment.

Mr. Carter may have presumed that the public would rally behind him with no further prompting when he announced his proposals last January to simplify the federal tax system and make it more fair. After all, his campaign crowds in 1976 always applauded when he talked about the "disgrace" of the tax laws.

But Democrats on the House Ways and Means Committee are defecting to join Republicans in discarding one after another of Mr. Carter's proposals. Why? The reason is that the President's reforms would do away with deductions that millions of Americans are using to whittle down their income taxes every year.

Mr. Carter's attack on the business deduction for the "three martini lunch" and other entertainment may have kept the majority applauding, but that was only one target. He would also eliminate the deduction for property taxes, and for state and local sales taxes. Millions of taxpayers would do away with the deduction for medical expenses, because only those expenses exceeding 10 percent of income, rather than the present 3 percent, would be deductible.

The President doesn't hide the fact that his reforms are designed to raise more federal revenue — some \$9 billion more. The idea is to combine that increase with \$34 billion in reductions in tax rates, thus producing the \$25 billion net tax cut which

the administration believes is necessary to keep the economy humming.

We won't quarrel with Mr. Carter's arithmetic, but we do question his tax theory. His proposed tax rate reductions, which are supposed to make up for the loss of deductible items, are not distributed equally. The benefits are greater for those in lower income brackets, and fade progressively in the higher brackets. Mr. Carter is also using his tax reform plan to increase the "progressivity" of the income tax.

But the progressive income tax is not the model of a "soak the rich" tax philosophy that it used to be. Inflation is pushing Americans into higher tax brackets — and bigger tax bites — while their extra dollars buy them nothing more, or even less. Because tax brackets are not indexed to inflation, it can be argued that the income tax should be made less progressive, not more so.

The complexity of tax forms may be a disgrace, but Mr. Carter is proposing to simplify them by eliminating deductions and juggling tax rates in a complicated maneuver of doubtful benefit to many taxpayers, especially in the hard-pressed middle class.

American workers are facing a staggering increase in Social Security taxes — another "progressive" tax rising with their cost-of-living pay increases. It's no wonder both Democrats and Republicans in the House are not eager to eliminate deductions from Form 1040 in this election year. Most taxpayers, we'd guess, want to hang on to as many as they can find. — Deming Headlight

## Parks camping booklet ready for use

A hundred areas of the nearly 300 within the National Park System provide camping facilities for people who wish to use them as a base for the enjoyment of the surrounding area.

And the best way to learn the details about these areas is with the 1978 edition of "Camping in the National Park System."

the most popular publication of the Interior Department's National Park Service.

The pocket-sized booklet offers information on fees, visitor regulations, safety, and back-country camping. It contains a tabular listing of the services and facilities found in more than 400 campgrounds in those 100 areas stretching from Alaska to the Virgin Islands.

A new feature this year is the listing of exact fees charged at each National Park Service-operated campground.

Most camping in park system areas is on a first-come, first-served basis. Information is included, however, on the four parks that use a reservation system — Acadia National Park in Maine, Chickasaw National Recreation area in Oklahoma, Grand Canyon in Arizona and Mount McKinley in Alaska. Many others require reservations for group camping or back-country camping.

The booklet, priced at \$1.40 per copy, is available from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402, under GPO stock number 024-005-00700-8. Payment should be made by check or money order payable to "Superintendent of Documents."

Another item available for purchase is the script of the play, "We've Come Back for a Little Look Around," a 35-minute play commissioned by the National Park Service for America's Bicentennial.

Schools, community groups and others can now produce their own version of the play, which toured the country in 1975 and 1976, making dozens of stops in the south and southwest.

The play is based on a "wish" by Benjamin Franklin, who, in 1773, while writing to a fellow scientist in France, expressed a desire to come back in 100 years or more to see what had become of the American spirit.

For America's Bicentennial, the NPS gave Franklin his wish by commissioning the play for indoor and outdoor presentation at parks throughout the country. It brings together a six-member cast, portraying Franklin, Mark Twain, Abraham Lincoln and John Adams (or, in an alternate version, Annie Oakley), who appear on the modern-day scene with a park ranger and maintenance worker to observe and comment on today's America.

Since its original production," said NPS regional director John E. Cook, "we have received numerous inquiries from schools and others for information about how they could produce a similar production."

The play requires no special lighting, amplification, scenery or props and can be presented in a small playing area.

Cook notes that while the play was designed for the Bicentennial, its message, "with minor script changes, is timeless."

The 46-page publication, complete with production notes, preface and photographs, is also available from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. ## Social Security information

"People often ask what happens to their claim after they apply for disability payments at our office," Gordon Lunsford, social security field representative, said today.

"After taking an application and getting information from the applicant about his or her disability, we send a teletyped request for his or her social security

earnings record to our central accounting office in Baltimore. This record will show if the person has worked long enough and recently enough to be eligible as a disabled worker.

"Once we determine that all 'non-disability' factors of eligibility are met, as ask a branch of the state vocational rehabilitation agency in Albuquerque to develop the medical evidence and make a decision concerning the disability. Then the claim is reviewed by a team of

specialists, one of whom is a doctor. This team will get medical reports from doctors and other places the applicant was treated or examined. In most cases, the claim can be decided on the basis of these reports. Occasionally, however, additional medical information will be needed for a decision.

"In this case, the team will arrange for the applicant to have an examination or test at Government expense.

### Yucca Especially Full Of Life

mid June. And now they are opening their blossoms quickly all through our mountain land, holding their pearl-white clusters high on their tall new green stalks, shining proudly, happy with the good rain.

On the way into the house there is a yucca plant that has been there since I came to this country as a boy. Through the days for more than half a century, I have passed this Yucca by, and I always feel a little thrill of joy. The yucca greets me for we are friends of many years. Sometimes the sharp leaves are showing through the snow; sometimes last year's seed pods on the stalk are tufted with a little crest of white snow.

On the new stalk, the cluster of blooms rose a foot and a half higher than last year's cluster. You could tell this because the dried stalk and the seed pods were still there side by side with the new stalk and cluster of blooms.

A few of the buds were out, and the recent rain drops that had settled on the flowers and buds were turned by the sun into round little jewels of gold and silver and all colors of the rainbow. Some of the blooms were half out forming a bell; and the buds were heart-shaped with a little rain drop Jewel shining on the tip.

The cluster of blooms was giant size, two feet tall and a foot wide. It spoke to you of how it loves this land — of how firmly and deep its roots are fastened in this beloved soil. How it clings to life, and clearly shows its gratefulness for the gift of life!

We stood there, this Yucca friend and I, and the pearl and rainbow flowers began making clear the sacred message. The blooms on the new stalk, resplendent with sun and rain drops, shone beside last year's stalk and seed pods, bringing to your heart a sudden flood of happiness.

The Yucca's message brings a voice from Heaven reminding you that our lives are eternal. Looking just past the celestial beauty of the Yucca in bloom I saw the foundation of the house where we lived when first we came to this country. My Mother's spirit and the spirits of all my loved ones in heaven were near, rejoicing with me.

The early Spaniards called the Yucca, "The Candles of God," showing that they had insight into the spiritual quality of the Yucca.

Other bright and cheerful flowers have come out with the rain, sending us their blessings. Next time we will have a few words about these beloved natives of our mountains.

The clouds are gathering for more rain. Let us be grateful to God for so many blessings.

## 'Living History' resumes at Fort Union

Fort Union was established as an army post in 1851 when Secretary of War C. M. Conrad decided that the troops in New Mexico were costing too much and weren't solving the "Indian problem."

So he directed Lt. Col. Edwin V. Sumner, First Dragoons, to take command in New Mexico and reorganize. Sumner did. His first action was to order department headquarters and the principal supply depot out of Santa Fe, which he called a "sink of vice and extravagance."

He moved them to the junction of the Santa Fe Trail where the Cimarron Cutoff and Mountain Branches met. From there Sumner and his men were better able to guard the Santa Fe Trail.

The fort remained active until 1891 when it passed out of existence along with the Santa Fe Trail. But its ruins can still be seen, just eight miles north of Interstate-

25, midway between Wagon Mound and Las Vegas, N.M.

And today's visitor to these ruins is likely to run into one of Sumner's First Dragoons, or at least a reasonable facsimile thereof.

Fort Union is now Fort Union National Monument, administered by the National Park Service and "Living History" demonstrations will be held daily at the site from early June through Labor Day.

"Living history" is the National Park Service's unique way of presenting the past so that visitors can smell, taste, touch, hear and feel it.

And members of the staff will shuck their Smokey Bear hats this summer in favor of the historic garb of the 19th century. Haunting the ruins will be Colorado Volunteers, Sixth Cavalry troopers, First Dragoons as well as

civilian laundresses, quartermaster employees and the like.

They'll be doing such historic tasks as making lye soap, cooking army chow, making adobe bricks, chopping wood, growing a post garden and firing small arms for the enjoyment of visitors.

Superintendent Ross Hopkins said the monument will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m., daily and he's inviting everyone to stop by for a bite of hard-tack and a whiff of gunpowder. "Travelers along Interstate 25 shouldn't miss it," Hopkins said. "The monument is only 10 minutes off the Interstate over a paved road and it's an excellent place to enjoy a picnic lunch."

In addition to the living history demonstrations, visitors can enjoy touring 70 acres of ruins and the visitor center museum.

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

## Retirement Brings Brand New Career

After three years of retirement, 67-year-old Louise Breen of Chenango, New York, had enough of the "good life." This former elementary school teacher decided to go back to work in an entirely different field.

But Mrs. Breen is much happier working in a job related to her second career.

"The people in the aging office try to match people with jobs they qualify for," Mrs. Breen said. "I had just completed a journalism course at the state univer-

At present her position consists primarily of writing news releases for the head of the station, but her duties may soon be expanded.

"There's been talk of putting me on the air," she said. "I don't know in what capacity or when, but I think it would be fun, don't you?"

In between meeting deadlines and writing releases, Mrs. Breen somehow finds time to work on a collection of trivia and a poetry anthology, both of which she'd like to publish when they've reached book length.

"I'm so busy now I don't have a moment to myself," Louise Breen says with a laugh, obviously enjoying the frantic pace of her post-retirement life. "But you know, I wouldn't change it for the world, I'm having too much fun."

A total of 66 percent of the greatest work of these outstanding men was done when they were 60 or older.

## Misfortune plagued ancient New Mexicans

The Four Horsemen rode across the Chupadera Mesa in central New Mexico 300 years ago, bringing to an end a language, a people and a way of life.

War, famine, pestilence and death were the villains in a stirring human drama set in the dusty, sun-baked villages of Gran Quivira, Abo and Quarai.

When the last act opened in the 1600s, these Pueblo villages were struggling against raids from mounted Apaches. By 1686 the misfortune of these Piro-speaking people was compounded by drought, and, as a result, in 1688, 450 Gran Quivira villagers died of starvation.

The drought may have contributed to a widespread epidemic in 1671 that brought still more death. The epidemic and increased Apache raiding finally led to the abandonment of the three pueblos between 1672 and 1676.

Many of the residents of Gran Quivira moved to the closely-related pueblo of Socorro on the Rio Grande. Soon many of the Pueblo Indians south of Albuquerque, including the Gran Quivira survivors, were driven south to the vicinity of El Paso during the Pueblo Rebellion of 1680. Their descendants lost their identity and by the late 1700s, the Piro language became extinct.

The memory of the people of Gran Quivira, Abo and Quarai is preserved in the ruins of the villages located around Mountainair, N.M. Gran Quivira is a national monument, administered by the National Park Service. Abo and Quarai are state monuments. Impressive ruins remain at all three sites.

Gran Quivira can be reached via NM-14, 26 miles south of Mountainair, the gateway

to the ancient cities located on east-west US-60. Dirt roads allow access from the south.

Abo and Quarai are located just west and north of Mountainair.

There are picnic tables at Gran Quivira and a trip to the monument offers clean air and serenity in a grassland area surrounded by pinon pine and juniper.

The logical starting point for a Gran Quivira visit is the visitor center where there are artifacts and an audio-visual orientation program. Then there are 19 acres of ruins to walk.

The most impressive Franciscan structure is the mission of San Buenaventura. The church, constructed sometime after 1650, is 140 feet in length and the walls are five to six feet thick.

A smaller mission, 21 Pueblo house mounds and kivas will help you understand more about the people who lived at Grand Quivira.

For example, from an excavated 36-room unit, occupied by several families when the Spaniards first came, you will see that the rooms and doorways are small, making them easier to heat.

If you visit Gran Quivira in winter, you'll appreciate such facts and be able to empathize with the long-ago residents. Because winters on this windswept mesa must have been extremely difficult.

## Clean worn furniture for greater usage

If you've shopped for furniture lately, you know how expensive it is to replace a sofa or chair. That's why it's well worth your while to stretch the life of the furniture you have with proper care, says Suzi Holder, Extension housing specialist at New Mexico State University.

Furniture upkeep can be easier if you learn the fiber content of all your upholstered pieces. Ms. Holder says some fabrics containing rayon shrink if cleaned with water. Other may lose color or bleed.

Upholstery made with synthetic fibers such as nylon and olefin are naturally stain repellent since these fibers do not absorb

moisture. On cotton and linen fibers, a stain repellent finish is in order, the specialist says.

Keep an upholstery stain removal chart with your cleaning supplies. Test the most common cleaners, water and detergent solutions, on a hidden area of each piece of furniture to see if colors bleed or the fabric shrinks. Then when that spill occurs, you'll be ready with the antidote.

If you use a solvent other than water, use it sparingly, especially if your furniture is foam filled. Some solvents can destroy the foam filling if they penetrate the fabric, Ms. Holder says. When cleaning zippered cushions, slip a terry cloth towel between the fabric and the filling.

The best care instructions for furniture are those on the label of the piece of furniture. It's a good idea to keep the tags on the individual pieces of furniture. Glue them to the underside. Use a clear plastic cover to protect the label.

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


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# Jockey/Trainer of the week

Jockey Gary Sumpter scored with five winners over the racing weekend at Ruidoso Downs to take Jockey-of-the-Week honors. Trainer Bob Arnett also had five victories to his credit to take the Trainer-of-the-Week title.

Sumpter began his score of triumphs Friday by guiding Real Ease, a full brother to Real Easy Jet who was making his first career start, to a dead heat finish in a 350 yard test.

He came back Saturday to chalk up three more wins including a victory aboard stakes star She Is My Native who got off as the heavy favorite in the seventh race and scored by 1 3/4 lengths at 400 yards. Sunday, he toured the winner's circle in the first race to round out his total to five.

The experienced rider also notched two seconds and five thirds from nineteen trips to the post and moved up to third place in the overall standings. His record now stands at 11-10-14 for a win percentage of 15.3.

John Cushing, jockey champion at the recent Sunland Park meeting, also turned in a fine performance over the three day weekend with four wins and three seconds from fourteen starts to move up to sixth place in the standings.

J. C. Wiley maintained the top spot with an overall record of 12-9-7 from 55 starts for a win percentage of 21.8.

Trainer Bob Arnett sent a total of 13 charges to the starting gate and notched the top spot with two wins Friday, one Saturday and two more Sunday. His overall record of 7-4-5 put him at third place in the standings with a win percentage of 17.9.

J. B. Montgomery, who scored with Tarlo in a dead heat in the first consolation of the Kansas Futurity, also had a highly successful weekend nabbing three other victories and a third to take sixth place on the trainers' roster.

H. C. Werner Jr., who sent out the victor of the Kansas Futurity, Gentlemen's Feature, remains at the top of the list with a 12-9-7 record and a win percentage of 19.7.

Turf action resumed today with 12 races beginning at 1:30 p.m. Post time Friday and Saturday is also at 1:30, while things get underway a half hour earlier Sunday at 1 p.m.

Friday's program highlights trials for the upcoming \$35,000 (estimated) Kindergarten Futurity at four furlongs. Sunday, the spotlight focuses on the \$6,500 Aspen Stakes, a six-furlong sprint for three-year-olds.

## Curing wall-to-wall blahs

If your living room is starting to look lifeless, the problem could be right under your feet, says Suzi Holder, Extension housing specialist at New Mexico State University. "A soiled or stained carpet can give your whole room the blahs," Ms. Holder says.

To keep your rooms lively, regular carpet care is required. In particular, spots need prompt and correct attention to prevent permanent staining.

Blot spills immediately. Use a clean, white and absorbent material such as a paper towel.

Always pretest the spot remover in an inconspicuous area. Apply spot remover, then hold a white tissue against the area. If the rug dye blends, or if area color is changed, leave the stain alone and get advice from your carpet dealer.

Never over-wet an area, Ms. Holder cautions. Always work from the outer edge of the stain toward the center.

Vacuum the entire carpet once a week. This helps keep dirt from getting embedded in the pile, causing it to cut the carpet fiber.

The prescribed cure for carpet blahs is regular shampooing, or home dry cleaning. It should be done two to three times a year, Ms. Holder says, before the fabric appears heavily soiled.

Vacuuming removes surface dirt, dust and litter, but only shampooing can dissolve the grease that attracts and binds damaging, gritty dirt to carpet fibers. You can rent easy-to-use home cleaning products and equipment.

Few home furnishings can take abuse and wear like carpeting, and still bounce back for more. But frequent vacuuming and occasional shampooing are necessary to keep its attractive appearance.

## Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

**HOT IDEA** got plenty of backing from the fans as she took her first spin since winning last year's All-American Futurity in Sunday's sixth race. And the filly didn't disappoint anyone. She took off like a shot as the 1-2 favorite and ended the 350 yard allowance test with a half length margin. Still undefeated in four career outings, she spots a bankroll of \$334,140.

**BRADLEY'S KUNUMERA**, Sunland Park's Fall Horse-of-the-Meet, was back in top form Saturday. The gelding, owned by James Bradley of Hereford, Texas, battled neck and neck with stakes star Countess Blade throughout the \$8,000 Mescalero Apache Handicap and finally prevailed with a head margin to set the fastest seasonal time for 6 1/2 furlongs at a blistering 1:20.4/5 seconds.

**THE NUMBER TWO SLOT** hit a sharp winning streak Sunday when it lit the top spot on the board for the first four races. Arrivin Easy and Clairbelle C. cleared the winner's circle in the first and second races after leaving the deuce spot. Then Au Vin took a 5 1/2-furlong spin and won the third race from the No. 2 post. And Cindi Seem won the No. 2 colors for the fourth race and won by a head.

**THE \$72,124 first consolation** of the Kansas Futurity ended up with two winners for the record books. Oh Shilney (No. 1), ridden by Bryan Brock, and Tarlo (No. 3), ridden by Larry Byers, put on a final burst of speed in the 350 yard bout to clear the wire simultaneously. Each walked away with a winner's share of \$10,243.

**SHE IS MY NATIVE**, a three-year-old who's put together career earnings of nearly \$100,000, exhibited her prowess against top performers in a 400 yard allowance test Saturday. The sophomore filly took command from the outset as the heavy favorite and won by 1 3/4 lengths. Her top credential is a triumph in last year's West Texas Derby at Sunland Park.

**AMERICAN CRAFTSMAN** took a spin in a Kansas Futurity trial two weeks ago and finished second by over a length in a time too slow to qualify. But the colt had no problem making a comeback in Friday's fifth race, a 350 yard allowance venture.

He jettied to the lead from the No. 3 post and cleared the distance in 18.12 seconds, the second fastest time of the season. The time was only 1/100th of a second slower than that of Six Te who set the fastest qualifying time for the Futurity finale.

**FRIDAY'S \$37,544 second consolation** for the Kansas Futurity was full of surprises. The winner, Rocket Wrangler, Jr. (No. 4), went off at odds of 28-1 and returned \$58.40 when he won by 3/4 lengths. But the rur erup, Miss Power Point (No. 1), proved even more surprising. The filly went off at 50-1 odds and paid the highest place (\$58.40) and show returns (\$15.20) of the season.

**THE FIRST DEAD HEAT** for win turned up in Friday's third race between the favorite, Real Ease (No. 8), and a 3-2 shot, Miss Don Meyers (No. 3). The judges really took their time in deciding the outcome since the next three finishers were less than a neck behind. Real Ease, owned by Walter Merrick of Sayre, Oklahoma, is a full brother to famed Real Easy Jet and was making his racing debut in the 350 yard test. Real Ease returned \$3.00 to win while Miss Don Meyers supplied \$5.20 to backers.

**JOCKEY CARLOS RIVAS** was suspended three racing days, June 2 through June 4, for careless riding and causing interference to the inside horse while aboard Sutcliffe in the 11th race May 28.

**OTHER STEWARDS' RULINGS:** Trainer William Howard took a \$50 bite for mistreatment of the horse, Bold Jon Rulla, prior to bringing him to the paddock for the 8th race May 29. Jockey Steve Valdez was fined \$25 for failure to make his assigned weight May 28.

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
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


