# El Paso man shot here

An El Paso, Texas, man was shot in an incident at 5:45 p.m., Wednesday on Highway 70 near the Elks Lodge.

Juan Carbajal, 29, received a gunshot wound in his right leg and was transported from Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital to Hotel Dieu Hospital in El Paso by MAST helicopter last night.

Arrested in connection with the incident were Jose I. Martinez. 34. Armando Montoya, 22, and a 16-year-old juvenile, all from Alamogordo. The police did not announce who shot Carbajal.

Martinez and Montoya, who were incarcerated in the Ruidoso jail, appeared before Magistrate Jim Wheeler this morning on charges of aggravated battery with firearm enhancement. The juvenile, who is being held in Carrizozo, will have a detention hearing at 1 p.m., today.

# Downs increases garbage rates

The Ruidoso Downs trustees Monday evening gave formal approval to raise garbage collection rates charged by the sanitation department to subscribers in and around the village. The rates will go into effect August 1, with the first billing September 1.

Action on the proposal was initiated at a June 16 meeting of the trustees in which Juanita Burke, sanitation commissioner, outlined the need for a new garbage collection truck for the village. She said the present truck is rapidly deteriorating and would not be fit to make trips to the new Fort Stanton sanitary landfill.

Her recommendation to increase sanitation rates included four alternative rate schedules. She was aacked in her endeavor by the full board of trustees, which selected one of the schedules to go into effect in the village.

In passing the new rates mayor Norman Wheeler said, "If we don't get our rates up, we're going to be out of the garbage collection business."

The new rate schedule is as follows: - In-village residential collection will be \$4.50 per month; residential collection outside the village limits will be \$5,50 per

- In-village commercial collection will be \$11.50 while collection for commercial establishments located outside the village limits will be \$12.50 per month.

- Restaurant collection will be \$25 per

# School seeks state approval of bus routes

The Ruldoso Board of Education voted Tuesday to request all bus routes in the Ruidoso School District be approved by the state under a revised State Board of Education hazardous walking condition

With the state's approval of the request, children in the district will continue to be eligible for bus transportation to school district.

Without the request approval the regulation calls for children attending kindergarten through sixth grade and living within a mile of their school, to walk to school; students attending seventh

mile and a half to walk and students in high school living within two miles to walk. The request was prompted by a memo from Bill Loshbough, director of school

transportation division, the state Department of Education, detailing the criteria of the new regulation, which updates a former version. The Ruidoso Public Schools had been

designated as a hazardous walking area and funding will be allocated to the under the former regulation and Superintendent of Schools Pat Valliant said he believe d the state would grant the request because of existing conditions in

"All roads except Sudderth Drive, Mechem Drive and Flighway 70 qualify (as hazardous under a regulation stating hazards exist) on mountainous roads when through ninth grade and living within a little or no off road walking space is

# Cattle diets determine grazing management

Ranchers who know exactly what forbes and grasses their range cattle select can develop optimal grazing and supplementing programs.

According to animal scientists with New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station, range cattle don't eat just what is growing on the range. They eat what they like. Knowing exactly what forbes and grasses cattle prefer to eat will allow ranchers to change their management programs to favor these

To find out exactly what cattle like to eat, range scientists Rex Pieper and Jorge Rodriquez analyzed the diets of grazing cattle. Their objective was to determine the seasonal changes in the dietary composition and selectivity of cattle grazing on desert grassland range.

The researchers conducted their study at the College Ranch in Dona Ana County, Vegetation on the pasture is dominated by black grama, mesa dropseed and red three-awn.

The researchers found that grass species constituted the major part of the diets, 64.2 percent in July, 51.0 percent in August, and 73.3 percent in November. The remainder of the diet was made up of annual broad leaf plants.

Specifically, the researchers found that mesa dropseed comprised more than 40 percent of the diet in July and August, but less than eight percent in November.

On the other hand, they found that black grama comprised less than eight percent of the summer diet, but nearly 64 percent of the November diet.

High preferences were shown for plains bristlegrass, wooly paperflower, silverleaf nightshade, dates, and bladderpod.

# Five common insects invade tropical plants

Americans spend billions of dollars on complished in the kitchen sink or shower. tropical foliage plants. Unfortunately, these houseplants are popular with insects, too.

necessary for plant growth, insect pests multiply and feed the year around, says John Durkin, extension entomologist at New Mexico State University.

These plants are very delicate and susceptible to injury. Therefore, plant owners need to keep a constant check on the condition of their plants.

Almost any insects may be troublesome. The most commonly encountered pests are mites, mealybugs, aphids, whiteflies and scales, Durkin says.

Mites (red spiders) are quite small but often very abundant. A magnifying glass will help you to see them. Mite feeding causes spotting and russeting of the foliage. Small amounts of silken webbing on the underside of the leaves indicate the presence of mites.

To control mite infestation, wash the plants with a strong spray of water to dislodge the mites. This can be ac-

Serious infestations should be controlled with a chemical. Use Kelthane or Orthene In the warm and humid atmosphere sprays according to label directions, or a pressurized spray can labeled for use on houseplants. Two treatments five to seven days apart are usually needed.

> Mealybugs are soft-bodied insects coated with a white cottony covering. They resemble bits of cotton clustered under the leaves and in crevices.

They are commonly found on African violets, coleuses, chrysanthemums, ferns, palms and scheffleras, Durkin says. They suck the plant sap and may eventually kill the plant.

To control mealybugs, dab them with a swab dipped in rubbing alcolol. It may be necessary to continue this treatment every four or five days for several weeks. Severely infested plants should be taken out-of-doors and sprayed with a solution of malathion or Orthene.

Aphids are small, soft-bodied insects about the size of a pinhead. They may be green, pink, yellow or black. Aphids cluster on the underside of leaves, tender shoots and flower buds.

They suck sap out of the plant, causing leaves to curl and discolor. They may eventually kill the host. They cause spots of sticky honeydew in which a black, sooty mold often grows. This gives the plant an unsightly appearance.

Infested plants may be syringed with a steam of warm water, or washed with warm, soapy water. A pressurized spray can labeled for houseplant insect control can also be used. Heavily infested plants should be taken out-of-doors and sprayed with malathion or Orthene.

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Whiteflies are tiny, white, four-winged insects that cluster on the underside of the leaves. They fly up in clouds when a heavily infested plant is disturbed. The nymphal stages are on the underside of the leaves, too, but are small and difficult to detect without magnification.

Like aphids, they suck plant sap and secrete honeydew. They are difficult to control because they are resistant to many insecticides commonly used by the homeowner.

Severely infested plants should be taken outside and sprayed three to five times at three-day intervals with Orthene. Add a teaspoon of liquid dishwashing detergent per gallon of water-insecticide mixture and apply as a fine mist spray. Plants that cannot be taken outside should be treated with a pressurized spray can containing SBP-1382 (Resmethrin) or nicotine. Use exactly as directed on the label, Durkin

Scale insects live on the stems and underside of the leaves. They are tiny and difficult to spot until the infestation is severe. They may resemble flakes of dandruff or small blisters on the plant. They, too, suck sap, secrete honeydew and can kill the host plant.

To control scales, gently scrub the leaves with warm, soapy water. Heavy infestations should be treated outdoors with spray mixtures of either malathion or Orthene. Infested plants can be dipped, pot and all, into a bucket of diluted insecticide. Larger plants should be sprayed until completely covered. If the pests persist, you should destroy the plant to prevent spreading of the insects to neighboring plants.

As always, when using any pesticide, follow the instructions on the label.

I do not know if Necah Stewart Furman was familiar with Bentley's little verse, but if so, it is fortunate that in writing the academic last and incidentally." biography of Walter Prescott Webb she ignored the lesson. It was Geography that Webb saw as the determining factor in the development of the West, and it was a major theme in his writings.

Webb was a product of the Southwest. Born on a farm in Texas in 1888, he began life at the edge of the frontier where he participated in and observed a civilization in transition from the horse and wagon to even reverent. missiles and polluted skies. From his own observations and experience he saw how the arid plains impacted on the first sethow these settlers adapted to the land.

Webb's writings frequently involved him in controversy. His ideas often stirred up some juices in those unwilling to have their comfortable assumptions challenged. His article, "The American West: Perpetual Mirage" which appeared in a 1957 issue of Harpers, brought forth an outcry from Western Congressmen and Chamber of Commerce. He was accused of defaming the West.

Webb had argued that the development of the West was a result of its deficiencies and that the West had developed a special talent "for making the most of little." He pointed out how cowboys were invariably portrayed as golden knights and western Webb, who genulnely loved the desert, found it necessary to express his regrets how we got where we are.

# I-n-s-i-d-e the Outdoors

As campers, picknickers, and sportsmen utilize their leisure time to take to the outdoors and enjoy the beauty of nature they are aware of, but have a tendency to ignore, the presence of lowly pests.

Unfortunately, these pests, collectively referred to as bugs, cannot be controlled with pest strips, fly-swatters, insect

repellents or bug sprays. Truth of the matter is, there is just no simple solution to controlling these bugs.

Perhaps you have guessed by now that the term "bug" in this case refers to those pests that scatter litter across the face of our earth. That is, these bugs are litterbugs.

Perhaps out of laziness, or simple disrespect for beauty, the litterbug deposits billions of tons of litter every year along roadsides, lakesides, streamsides and campgrounds across the United

New Mexico is no exception to the litterbug's devastation. In fact, recent figures released by the state reveal that at any given moment more than 19 million pieces of garbage are scattered around New Mexico. Of course, this is just a fraction of the 500,000 tons of refuse New difficult. Mexicans produce each year.

Most of New Mexico's garbage is neatly disposed of in the dozens of landfills throughout the state. But, when you are dealing with a billion pounds of trash a year, it is obvious that the chances of all of

it getting to a landfill are slim. The state's litter problem is becoming a outdoor related activities such as hunting,

very serious matter, and state, county, and city clean-up efforts are costly ones with practically negligible results.

An experiment conducted by the state last summer consisted of workers collecting all the litter along a mile of I-40. On July 27, these workers picked up 10,000 pleces of trash. One week later on the same mile stretch, 8,500 pieces of litter were gathered by workers.

In trying to come up with the real cause of the state's litter problem, it might be of interest to note the constituents found by Mexico's Environmental Improvement Division's litter study.

Sixty nine percent of all litter was found to be beverage related, that is, bottles, cans, plastic containers, cartons and "pop top" tabs. In some areas these items accounted for 98 percent of the total litter.

Paper products contributed about 10 percent of the trash, while other bottles and cans made up about 4 percent. The remaining 14 percent was classified in the miscellaneous category.

Recognizing that a litter problem exists in the "Land of Enchantment" is easy, but finding a solution to such a problem is Littering is against the law. However, as

it is difficult to relate any logic to the littering demonstrated by the earth's most intelligent creatures, it is just as difficult to enforce the littering law.

New Mexico Game and Fish officers have the authority to enforce litter laws in

Nevertheless, just as litter cleanup is no solution to the problem, neither is law enforcement. Instead, it is going to take individual pride to defeat the litter problem.

Until the public is informed and educated in litter control, litter cleanup and law enforcement efforts will have to continue their small roles in the solution to New Mexico's litter problem.





Then there was Henry Watterson, editor of the Louisville Courier-Journal for 50 years . . . that's a newspaper in Kentucky ... who, it is claimed, spoke thusly of the julep: "Pluck the mint gently from its bed, just as the dew of evening is about to form on it. Select the choicest sprigs only, but do not rinse them. Prepare the simple syrup and measure out a half-tumbler of whiskey - then throw away the rest of the stuff and drink the whiskey straight."

Should you now have worked up a thirst ... relax ... you, too, can whomp up a mint julep. Pour two jiggers of bourbon, two teaspoons of water, one teaspoon of powdered sugar, 4 sprigs of mint into a frosted glass and muddle . . . There's no danger of you becoming muddled at this juncture ... Next, fill the glass with shaved ice . . . stir gently . . . add a mint sprig or two . . . nothing like a bit of garnish...get two straws and sip.

And . . . after two or three refills, you'll understand why so many thousands of

Dear Editor:

The article in last Thursday's paper concerning the flood in Glencoe on July 3 is excellent. The pictures really show the unbelievable amount of mud and debris that were deposited there by the water that raged down the highway.

However, there are two other chapters to the story that I would like for the public and the State Highway Department to be aware of.

The Texaco service station that is next to the church and owned by Alma Ellis was not left untouched by the flood. This lady has complained several times to the Highway Department about the water that ran into her business front every time it rained. She knew, along with many others, that the drainage system off the highway was inadequate. The water that ran down and off the highway came two inches from going into her store. It ruined her air

compressor, filled her septic tank, ran into her water well, and did some damage to the under skirting on her home. This doesn't even take into account the silt and debris left behind in her driveway and yard. Also I must mention the emotional trauma she is going through after going through the flood in 1965 also. It will take months for her place to be back to normal.

The third chapter concerns myself and my children who live behind the service station and church. Not knowing where the water was coming from, and never dreaming it was being funneled into my yard from the highway, our only thought was to get away from the canyon behind us. In doing so, my car that I've had about two months was flooded by the water. We abandoned it in hip deep, muddy, swirling water and tried to save a few other possessions, because we thought our home was going to be washed away. When we got past the church, we encountered water that was so swift and deep that it knocked my sixteen year old son and myself off our feet, causing us to drop and lose what we were trying to save.

The things were baby books and family picture albums that can never be replaced. My insurance adjuster says my car is a total loss. Cars can always be replaced, but the keepsakes, winter clothes, books, and Christmas decorations we had saved over the years and stored in the building behind the church cannot be replaced so easily. The water level reached as high as 4 feet in that building. Another eight or ten inches and it would have been in my home.

It will be a long, long while before my children and I will be able to forget the horrible nightmare and panle we went through that day. And we will never be able to relax when it rains until that faulty drain is repaired satisfactorily enough to carry rain water through and into Eagle Creek as it is supposed to do. It is a shame that people have to suffer before something is done to correct a situation that should have been corrected years ago. Patsy Racher



## Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

GENTLEMENS FEATURE, recent winner of the Kansas Futurity kept alive her chances for the Triple Crown in the initial trials for the upcoming \$440,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity. The filly, owned by Gerold and Darlene Blue of Amarillo, Texas, coursed to an easy 21/2 length win Thursday with (J. C. Wiley aboard) to claim a berth in this Friday's final elimination trials.

H. C. Werner Jr., the trainer of Gentlemens Feature, sent out the most qualifiers, since eight of his charges finished either first or second. H. Don Farris was next in line with seven qualifiers.

JOCKEY JACKIE MARTIN had a busy time during the trials with 29 mounts. But his chores paid off handsomely since 10 of his mounts qualified (more than any other rider), including Flying Passem who's earned over \$60,000 so far. Martin turned In six third place finishes as well.

SIX TE, who set the top qualifying time in the 350 yard Kansas Futurity trials at 18.11½ seconds looked in top form once again in Friday's 12th race. Although the gelding qualified simply by winning his

trial, he also turned in the fastest time of the 38 heats in 20.12 seconds for the 400 yards. Moon Lark was right behind with a brisk time of 20.13 in Thursday's 10th race.

WITH 19 TRIALS both Thursday and Friday, jockeys with plenty of mounts were well worn by the end of the day, But they were at least spared the lengthy trek from the winner's circle to the jockey room after each race. Rather they rode in two gold carts, furnished by Sonny Edwards to give them a brief respite between mounts.

THREE OH'S was the top sire among the trial qualifiers. Eleven of his offspring made it into this Friday's eliminations. They include Oh Jet Van (with earnings of \$53,795), Oh Shiney (\$14,366), Kepas Oh (\$11,412), Oh Honi Oh (\$19,511), Tiffy Oh (\$8,835), Sure Oh (\$2,506), Dot Dot Dot Dash (\$2,457), Third Act (\$1,264), Oh Three High (\$1,572), Oh Oh Lady Oh (\$2,963) and Copasetti (\$816).

OTHER TRIAL NOTES: The biggest longshot was Easy Capri Lil in the 16th division who returned \$40.80 to backers . . . All but two of the favorites finished in the money during the trial competition and, of course, 24 qualified for next week's trials

... Miss Royal Cynthia and the largest margin of victory, winning by 43/4 lengths in the first division.

THE HIGHEST WIN PAYOFF of the weekend resulted from a 400 yard allowance bout Sunday, Mr. Tiny Dial (No. 6), completely overlooked by the fans at 51-1, competed against stiff caliber veterans Jet Commanche and Jazzy Hank, and breezed by for a 3/4 length margin and a \$104.80 return.

FROM KID TO LUENE brought the sale topping price of \$13,200 at the Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale Saturday. Consigned by Albert Anderson, the son of stakes winner Crazy Kid and Tuluene was sold to the Western Slope Air Drilling Company of Odessa, Texas.

LONGSHOT BETTORS must have skipped a heartbeat after the second race Sunday when Easter Boy (25-1) became of the object of an inquiry. The maiden colt, with Joe Reyes at the helm, poured on the speed in the 51/2 furlong sprint and was well in front at the wire. But the stewards took his number down and placed him second for interfering with No. 10, Crazy Jane (7-2), several times in the stretch. And the longshot ended up with sizeable returns of \$19.40 and \$12.20 to place and show.

TWO ALL-TIME LOWS turned up in the mutuel payoffs during Friday's trials. The combination of Dickey's Fireman and Barnstormer (6/10) in the Daily Double proved to be so popular it returned only \$3.60. Then the overwhelming choice of the The First Edition and Budget Balancer (8/3) in the sixth race brought the exacta payoff down to a slim \$4.40.

THE ONLY DEADHEAT for place in the trials turned up in Thursday's fifth trial, when Flicka Bic and Dot Dot Dash were deadlocked at the wire. A shake was held to decide which horse would get a berth in this week's trials, but the stewards later ruled both horses would compete since the shake procedure was not butlined in the original nomination

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

Letters to editors in various sections of the nation reflect a second look many are now also taking at lesser fundamentalist preachers, many self-appointed and many relatively uneducated.


Though one never criticizes sincere religious beliefs, it must be admitted and should be faced - that many make a living in the preaching business. And all the relatively ignorant, uneducated, self-appointed fire and brimstone artists obviously aren't divinely inspired. Some preach a narrowminded, sitting-injudgment doctrine, with much emotionalism - with fear one of the major ingredients.

It would be desirable if meaningful educational standards, plus other screening, could be required of all claiming to speak for the Lord. But this is an impossibility. As a result, some very primitive thinkers, and some moneymakers, are taking advantage of many good, ignorant people, using religion as their road to power, importance and

Most of the exploiters of provincial ignorance, but not all, are found in rural. so-called backwoods communities. It is

so-called backwoods communities. It is often amazing the hold various religious, faith and cult leaders obtain over good, and otherwise sensible, citizens, just as it's amazing what religion and conversion can sometimes achieve in human beings.

Perhaps today, at last, more and more are beginning to look hard and ask some questions about religious showmen, and the qualifications of many know-all-the answers, home-made fundamentalists—and their finances. Sente Rose News and their finances. Santa Rosa News

# Catching fish a matter of timing

While it's not true that 10 percent of the fishermen catch 90 percent of the fish, it's obvious that some anglers catch far more fish than do most others.

Interviewing expert anglers within and outside the Department of Game and Fish to find out why, the agency found that following a few simple rules will help almost anybody catch more fish.

Keying fishing activity and technique to the fishes' habits is probably the single most important secret the experts revealed and, because basic fish activity patterns are predictable, can quickly be

applied by beginner and experts alike, the agency said.

Also important are bait and its presentation, weather and even phases of the moon, but timing is the most important

During the hot days of summer, mid-day fishing is almost fruitless for most people - yet convenience brings many people out then, leaving them sunburned but fishless. Why is being on the water at first light and

# Off-road vehicle use regulations proposed

Proposed regulations which will set the ground rules for operators of off-road vehicles (ORV) on public lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management were published in the Federal Register, Friday, July 7,,1978. ORV's include dune buggles, motorcycles, snowmobiles and other cross-country vehicles.

The proposed rules would designate the public lands as one of three categories for ORV use - open, limited or closed. About 13 million acres are managed by the BLM in New Mexico and all of this acreage would be designated in one of the three categories.

Open areas would provide for ORV operation subject only to regulations and vehicle standards for that particular area.

A limited designation would indicate an area where the use of ORV's would be subject to limitations such as numbers or types of vehicles allowed, times of use or

other restrictions. The closed category would prohibit ORV use in that particular area.

The public has 60 days in which to submit comments on the proposal. Comments received will be considered in the final regulations.

The type of designation for a specific area will depend on the character of the land, protection of resources, safety to the public and conflicting uses of the area. Wilderness or primitive areas managed by the BLM would be closed to ORV use.

Off-road vehicle use related to commercial activities such as geophysical exploration, mineral prospecting or livestock management would be allowed in closed or limited areas through provisions in leases or permits. For example authorization to use an ORV by a grazing

temperatures on trout streams, for instance, are usually in the low to mid 50s at dawn, shoot up into the mid 70s in the heat of the day, and fall again when shadows cross the water. Trout are more active at the lower temperatures and, because hatches of many of the insects they feed upon occur in late afternoon, are much more likely to be feeding during those

times of day.

Lakes stratify during the summertime - form into layers of varying temperature and other conditions — somewhat like a three-layer cake, the biologists have found. In this case, the frosting is in the middle layer. Most fish will be found in the so-called temperature transition zone, the center layer. In most of the smaller trout lakes, the layer most fish will be in starts about eight feet below surface and ends at about 15 to 18 feet in depth. Examples are Fenton, Jackson, Snow, Maloya and Quemado lakes. Larger trout lakes -Santa Cruz, Abiquiu, Heron, El Vado, Cochiti — have temperature transition

Here again, say the experts, early morning and late afternoon fishing will find the fish spread through the mid and

by lantern light is extremely productive, and many have found that casting large, dark wooly worms or streamers over the lakes at night brings hard strikes.

The warm water lakes also stratify, and warm water fish will seek the temperature transition zone's preferred oxygen levels during mid day - and will also have sought shelter around rocks, under docks, submerged trees, and the like, avoiding the bright sunlight that penetrates these lakes to considerable depths. These fish respond much the same as trout do. feeding early in the morning and late in the evening. Fishing for bass and walleye after dark, with a trotline set out in a cove for catfish, can put protein on the table.

Generally, fishing is better right after a rainstorm and during the dark phase of the moon, whether compared to night or daytime fishing in the full moon.

Using natural baits - worms. grasshoppers, crickets, crayfish, minnows, nymphs, hellgrammites - or flies and lures simulating them is almost always going to produce more fish than using prepared baits. Clear plastic casting bubbles, fished off a spinning rod and baited with wet flies or wooly worms, can make a fly fisherman out of almost
