

## Medley Glass wins All-American Derby

Medley Glass held heavily-favored Town Policy eye-to-eye in the final yards of Sunday's \$866,330 All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs and pounded out a tingling nose victory.

The filly got a paycheck for \$288,847, one of the fattest bonanzas in racing history.

Medley Glass is owned by a group headed by Dewitt Logue of Houston, Texas. The group carries the odd name of Lo-Pa, Inc. Jerry Nicodemus does the riding. Gene Tefertiller is the trainer.

The fans made Medley Glass a 3-1 shot in the 440 yard thriller, and the filly returned \$3.60 to win, \$3.20 to place, \$2.80 to show. The winning time on a fast track was 21.78 seconds.

Town Policy, the star property of Ivan Ashment of Apple Valley, California had to be content with a paycheck of \$120,419. The tote returns were \$3 and \$2.40. Ken Hart was up.

Seco Mia, off at nearly 10-1, closed with a brisk late bid to take an upset third, earning \$56,311. Jackie Martin was in the saddle. Seco Mia is owned by the Cryan Ranch of Sealy, Texas. The show price was \$3.

Seco Mia never managed to intrude on

the private war being waged by Medley Glass and Town Policy and was a length behind the two when she reached the wire.

Here's how the rest of the field checked in, with money earned: 4th — Miss Thermolark, \$39,851; 5th — Top Pass, \$32,054; 6th — Easy Saint, \$30,326; 7th — Ina Gates Gal, \$28,588; 8th — Madam President, \$27,722; 9th — Stoa Mings, \$25,989; 10th — Luck's Image Girl, \$24,257.

Town Policy came out of the gate like a tiger lunging for raw meat and quickly established a strong toehold. Miss Thermolark, who usually breaks on top, was unable to keep up with Town Policy's fire-snorting get-away.

After about a half dozen strides, it was apparent Town Policy had shown up to do some racing. But Medley Glass didn't let the people's choice get out of range. The filly got off to a hustling start from the rail post, found herself about a half length off the pace, then gained quickly to reach a side-by-side position with Town Policy at the mid-way point.

Top Pass, who had some early lick, quickly dropped back, and there was no one to bother the two leaders.

From that point on, it was clearly a test of will and stamina between Medley Glass and Town Policy.

Medley Glass snared the lead with about 100 yards to go, but Town Policy dug in and tried to come roaring back. The two remained on even terms the rest of the way as Medley Glass courageously refused to concede her inch or two margin.

It was a touch and go battle over the last furious strides, but Medley Glass got the win by keeping her nose in front as she bulleted under the wire. Town Policy recovered some precious terrain at the end but just couldn't catch the filly.

In winning the Derby, Medley Glass boosted her career earnings up to \$375,851.

BRADLEY'S KUNUMERA galloped to an easy four length win in Saturday's Ruidoso Sprint Championship at Ruidoso Downs.

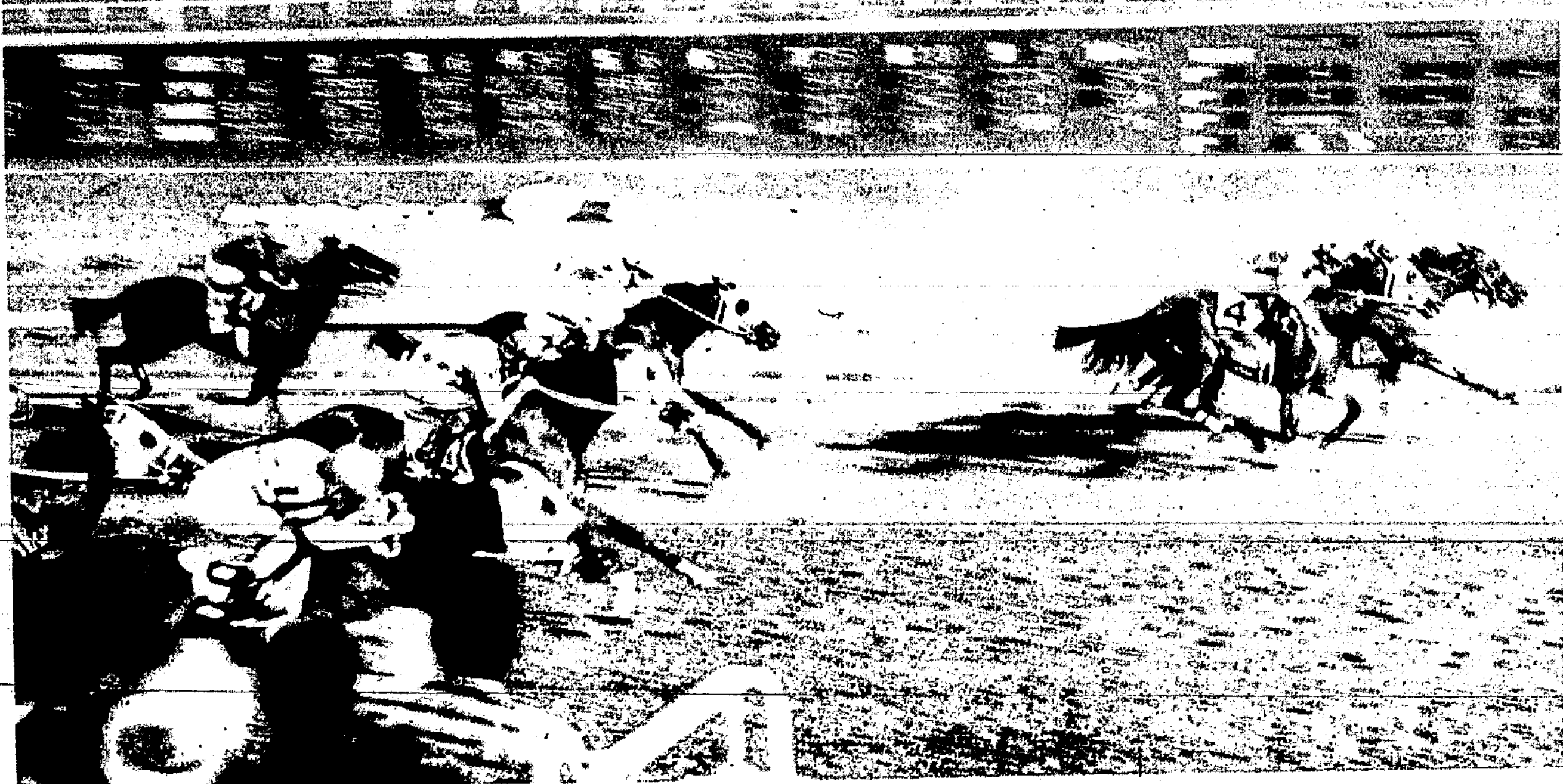
The gelding, ridden by Richard Bickel in the second high load of 122 pounds, stalked the front running Credit Reference in the first half of the six furlong dash, then moved out rapidly at the turn for home to win as he pleased.

Bradley's Kunumera earned \$8,220, clocked the off track distance in 1:15 flat, and returned tote payoffs of \$8.50, \$3.40 and \$2.60. The winning owner is James H. Bradley of Hereford, Texas.

Barrister Sib came in second, refunding \$4 and \$3.40. Ute took third and returned \$3.80.

Saturday's program also included the \$65,841 second consolation of the All-American Quarter Horse Derby. The winner was Little Bug, who held a 1 1/2 length gap at the finish in a clocking of 22.47 seconds. Roy Brooks was up.

Little Bug earned \$9,058 and handed her mutual backers \$11 to win. The chestnut filly is owned by H.M. and Kendall Adudell

of Piedmont, Oklahoma.

OSAGE JUANA, a bay filly owned by Thomas Ballenger of Thousand Oaks, California is the top qualifier for the upcoming \$1,280,000 All-American Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The field for the world's richest race was set during Friday's program as 25 elimination trials were run. Qualifiers were determined strictly on time.

The distance of the trials, and the All-American grand finale Labor Day, is 440 yards.

Osage Juana went into the 17th trial as a 6-1 shot, and was relegated to a back seat due to the presence of the Rainbow Futurity winner, Vespero. The latter carried skimpy odds of 1-9 and shot into the early lead. But when Keith Asmusen applied some leather to keep Vespero going at full throttle, the gelding suddenly veered inward. He never really got back into high gear, and the maneuver played right into Osage Juana's hands. The filly swept by the people's choice for a half length win and stopped the clock in 22.16 seconds. The track was sloppy from recent rains.

## New wastewater sewer line opposition minimal

Three Ruidoso Downs citizens voiced opposition to the construction of the main sewer line to feed the proposed Regional Waste Water Treatment Plant Wednesday night during a public hearing called to explain the issue of right of way to effected land owners.

Project engineer Quinton Daniel heard Mr. and Mrs. C.L. "Bone" Wright say they were opposed to the sewer line traversing their irrigated fields because to do so would involve the destruction of a 50 foot grass strip across land used for grazing.

"Do you know how hard it is to get grass to grow?" Mrs. Wright asked. "It's going to take at least three years to get it going."

Daniel responded by saying he had been

a rancher at one time and knew the problems involved in growing grass.

"When we get through, we'll replant the grass," Daniel said. He emphasized that cooperation of land owners was being sought because the longer the project is put off the higher the construction cost will be.

Daniel informed the Wrights that his company, Daniel Engineering, Alamogordo, assumed a one year warranty on the sewer line after completion. He said the engineering firm or the construction company would repair any damages caused land owners by construction of the sewer line.

The main sewer line will begin on a 12 acre tract set aside for construction of the

regional sewer plant near Biscuit Hill and will closely parallel the Ruidoso River and United States Highway 70 through the Downs. It will extend between the barn area and the horse race track into Ruidoso where it will tie into existing lines near the present Ruidoso waste water treatment plant.

Daniel said the line will be buried about 10 feet and will include manholes, at surface level, spaced every 200-600 feet. Lateral feeder lines will extend from the main line where needed to serve the communities' sewer needs.

Daniel placed a tentative starting date for construction somewhere in April. He

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## Successful season will wrap up with five straight days of racing

The final week of the most successful season in Ruidoso Downs history kicks off Thursday.

Five straight race days are on tap, extending through Monday (Labor Day). The wrapup week is loaded with stakes events.

Here's how the stakes picture looks: Thursday — the \$8,675 Roadrunner Stakes at seven furlongs for New Mexico-bred three-year-olds; Friday — the \$10,000-added Brigand Handicap for three-year-olds and up at 870 yards, plus the 440 yard third consolation (\$32,500) of the All-American Futurity; Saturday — the \$127,250 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity at six furlongs, plus the All-American Futurity second consolation (\$72,500); Sunday — the \$17,500-added Ruidoso Mile

for three-year-olds and up, plus the All-American Futurity First Consolation (\$145,000); Monday — the \$8,500 Thad Sandstrom Handicap for three-year-olds and up at 550 yards, and, as the final race of the day, the world's richest horse race, the grand finale of the \$1,280,000 All-

American Futurity at 440 yards.

The All-American, which will be televised live to a coast-to-coast audience of some 30 million, will offer the 10 grand finalists \$1 million in purse money. In addition, \$30,000 will be split up in breeding and nominating awards.

The post times are 1:30 p.m., for Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Sunday, activities will come alive at 1 p.m. Monday, due to the national telecast of the All-American, actions revs up at an early

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## Hospital seeks support for intensive care unit

If the community will support the project, Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital plans to update the intensive care unit (ICU), Ken Moore, hospital administrator, said Friday.

"In our continuing effort to provide the highest quality care possible to the community, the medical staff and hospital administration feel a fully equipped ICU is a necessary complement to our service," he said.

"It's not for the doctor's benefit, but for the patient's," Liam Doell, D.O., said. "Since we treat big city problems (major trauma cases) the hospital should be capable of handling (those types of problems)."

Paul Whitman, M.D., said in the case of a heart attack victim or a child hit by a car, for example, an updated ICU could make a difference "between a person living or dying; or living (a relatively normal) life or (sustaining) permanent disabilities."

With the improvements, the hospital and medical staff could treat many severe cases now being sent to other towns.

"With an updated ICU, we still would have some evacuations," Dr. Dowell said. "Some cases, such as severe head or spinal injuries, we won't be equipped or staffed to handle."

In order to update the ICU, "we'll need community support to gain funding," Moore said.

Dr. Doell suggested funding could come from the hospital auxiliary, service clubs, the village and county governments or "you could put up a toll gate on the road from Texas!"

"It should be a community project." The present ICU is in a semi-private room with two beds and no space in the room for a nursing station.

The monitor system is at the nurses' desk and "it's not practical for the nurses to sit and look at the monitor at all times."

The present ICU is full about 80 percent of the time, Dr. Doell said.

"Recently we even had two patients out of the medical floor with heart monitors because of the overrun."

Moore said about \$100,000 is needed to update the ICU, most of it for purchase of equipment.

Suggestions have been made on where the ICU should be located in the hospital and a team of architects and engineers from Presbyterian Hospital in Albuquerque will study the blue prints and "determine which location is most feasible," Moore said.

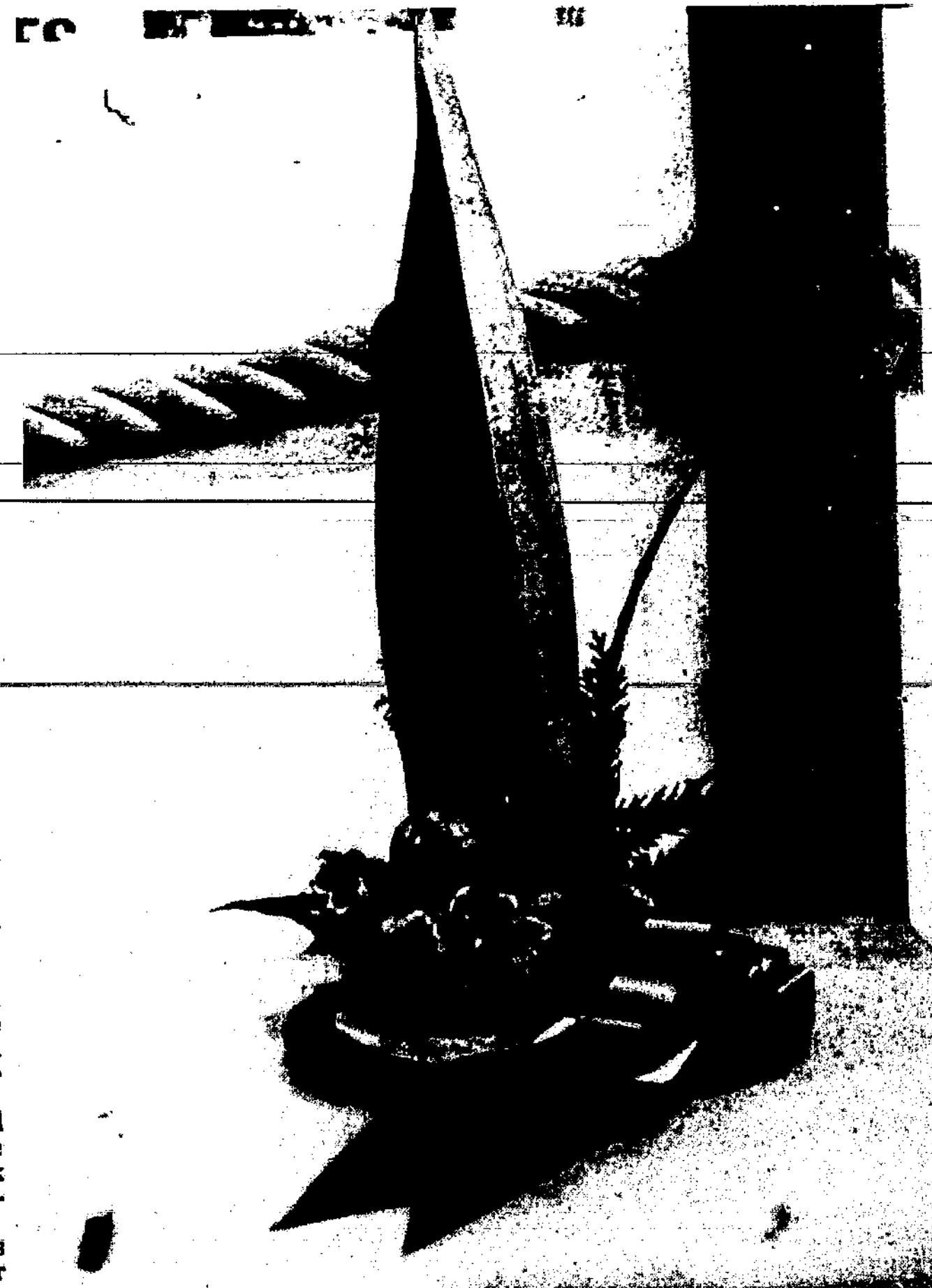
"We'd probably need very little structural change. We will need to include lines for electricity, oxygen and suction."

In addition to costs of remodeling and purchase of new monitor systems, Moore said nurses would be sent to training and refresher courses in intensive care nursing.

"We have some nurses who have had intensive care training, but we would like to send them and others to a two week course followed by a one week preceptorship," Moore said.

When the nurses return they will act as teachers explaining procedures to other nurses.

In the future, after updating of the ICU, community support also will be needed in supplying a walking blood bank, as many patients in intensive care need blood transfusions, Moore said.

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said the entire project will take about one year for completion.

He said the sewer main was located in such a way as to take advantage of a total gravity feed situation and that the treatment plant and the feeder lines were being located to serve the maximum number of people at the least expense.

Daniel explained that land owners whose land is bisected by the line would have the right of access to the line.

He also said the law requires written notification to effected land owners 90 days prior to initiation of construction.

Daniel said the sewer line and plant should handle the maximum projected growth for the Ruidoso/Ruidoso Downs area for the next 25 years.

## Emergency farm loans available from FmHA

An economic emergency loan service for farmers is now available through the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

Roy Finley Jr., county supervisor for Lincoln and Otero counties, has announced loan applications are being received at Ruidoso and Alamogordo FmHA offices.

Under the new Economic Emergency program, Finley said, any established farm operator — individual, partnership, corporation or cooperative — experiencing scarce credit or an overload of debt coming due, may apply for up to \$400,000 of credit through FmHA "in order to survive in farming and continue their normal level of operation." Loans are not available for expansion.

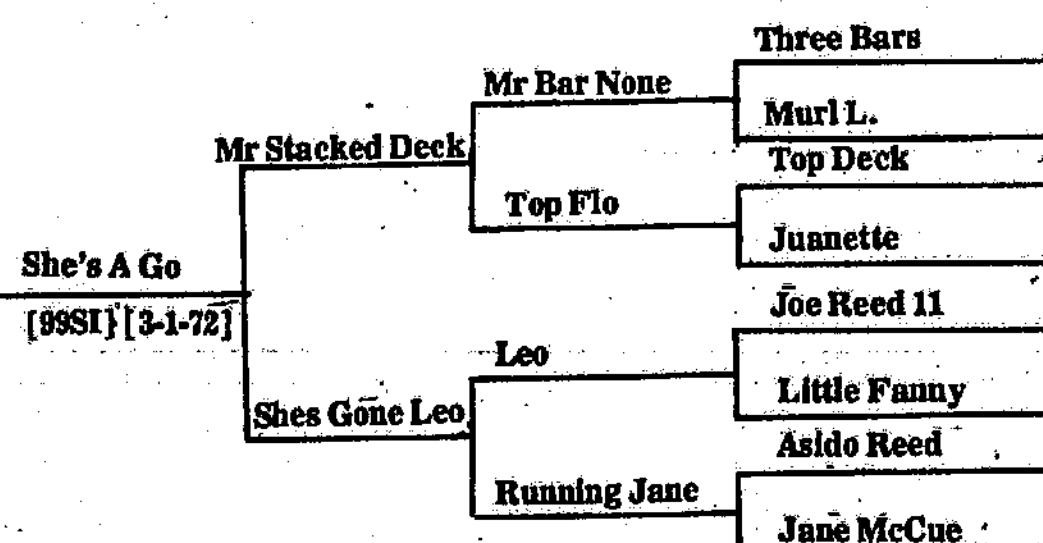
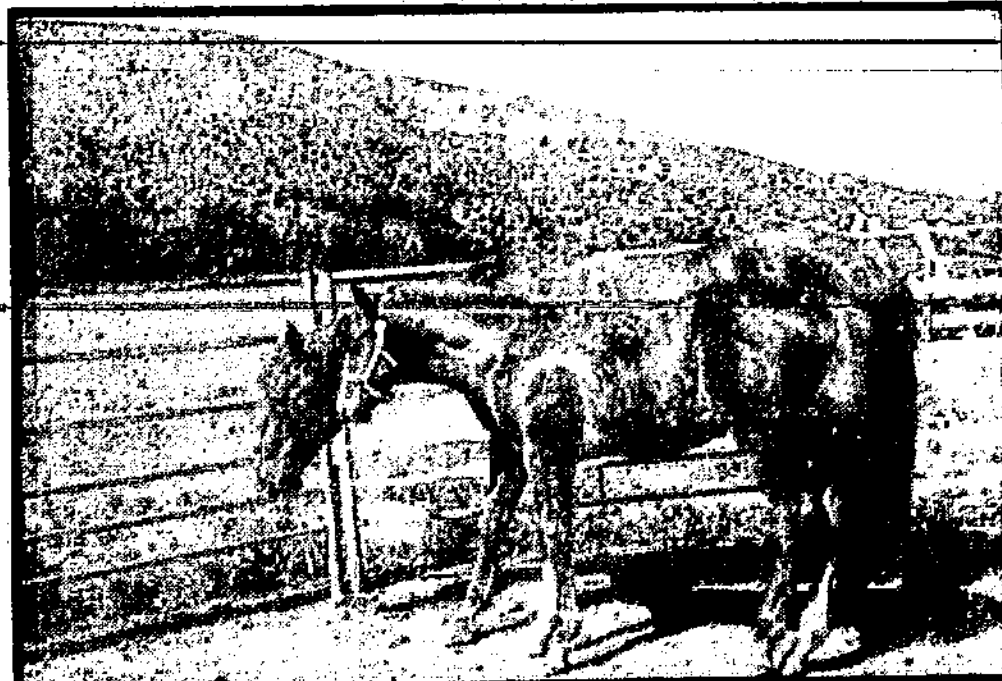

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## Forest Service to issue permits

Christmas tree permits will be available this year by mail on the Lincoln and Gila National Forests, according to Forest Supervisors, Jim Abbott and Bob Williamson. The program will be patterned after a similar program in Arizona, which has been in effect for several years. This will allow persons wishing to cut their own trees more flexibility, but will require some advance planning to get their

applications in for high-use areas. Number of permits will be limited for Douglas fir and White fir, and for all species in some high-use areas. Permits can be obtained by submitting an application for the Forest you wish to cut from. Applications will be made available in November throughout the area and will be processed on a first-come, first-serve basis.

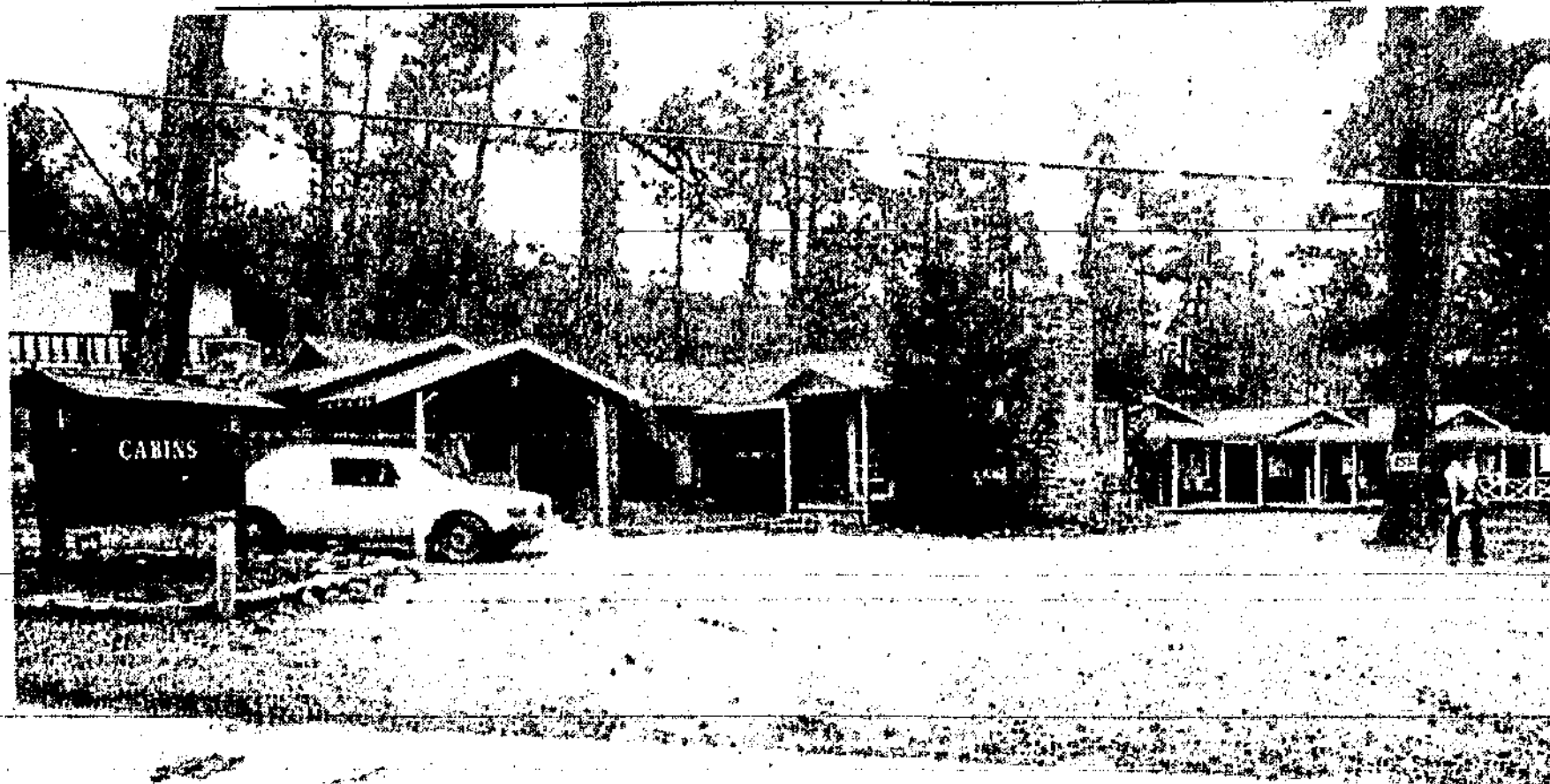

# Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE — A little-noticed legal document called "Original No. 80" indicates the scramble for precious water rights in the Western states may be growing more intense.

Specifically, New Mexico could lose the right to some of its already-scarce water rights if it loses out in the final disposition of "Original No. 80." And a precedent could be set which would affect other states throughout the western region where legal water rights are growing more and more valuable.

These potential outcomes are a long ways off, and there's the prospect that New Mexico could win the legal skirmish, too. But either way, the case — obscure until now — is likely to gain an increasing amount of regional and national attention.

"Original Number 80" is the name of a document filed by the State of Colorado on July 21 with the U.S. Supreme Court. It gets its name from the fact that the high court has "original jurisdiction" over disputes between the states.

Involved in this case is the Vermejo River in northern New Mexico.

In its motion, Colorado asked the Supreme Court to take on the case and to provide what it called "equitable apportionment" of the Vermejo River waters.

Colorado is basing its request on the fact that the Vermejo headwaters are located in extreme southern Colorado, even though actual usage of water from the stream has been almost totally in northern New Mexico. No doubt New Mexico will put reliance on the legal doctrine of "prior appropriation" if the case ever gets heard on its merits.

The southern area of Colorado affected by the case has never been a booming one, economically, and utilization of Vermejo

waters fits in with that state's wishes to improve the economy.

Specifically involved is a plant in the area owned by CF&I, which makes steel products and is one of the nation's biggest manufacturers of baling wire. CF&I wants to use water from the Vermejo, and won a "conditional" decree from Colorado state courts in the early 1970s.

There's some background to the current motion by Colorado within the Federal court system as well.

New Mexico corporate interests went to Federal district court, seeking an injunction against the CF&I plant in Colorado to prevent it from using Vermejo water. They won in district court in New Mexico but the case was appealed to the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

That court "abated proceedings," that is, put everything on the back burner, when the Colorado state government entered the picture with its filing of "Original No. 80."

If Colorado ends up winning the right to divert Vermejo waters, it could spell trouble for downstream New Mexico users since the stream — which flows into the Canadian River near Maxwell — already is "over appropriated."

Aug. 30-31 will mark the end of the first segment of another Federal water rights case which illustrates the effort by western states to hold on to what they've got.

This one is a trial before a "special master" of the U.S. Supreme Court in which Texas claims New Mexico is behind 1.6 million acre-feet in delivering water down the Pecos River.

Texas claims New Mexico users have been taking more water than they're entitled to under terms of the 1948 Pecos River Compact between the two states.

#### RATON NEEDS A FORUM

It's an election year and there are local, state and national candidates seeking offices in the grand old American way — making speeches, shaking hands, kissing babies.

But not in Raton. Aside from sending a token emissary or two, most candidates for key offices in New Mexico have avoided actively campaigning here. And political discussion here is about as warm as yesterday's leftover soup.

The reasons are unclear. True, Raton is tucked away in the northeast corner of the state, miles away from New Mexico's centers of political power. But there are thousands of voters in Colfax County and their decisions could be crucial in any election year contest.

Why not organize a candidates' forum in Raton? The Chamber of Commerce or some other public-minded group could do the people of this county a service by bringing candidates for major offices to Raton to speak or to debate the issues.

Such political gatherings have been successfully organized in other areas of the state and nation. Costs would be minimal and the benefits would be obvious.

People deserve a chance to hear can-

didates deliver their platforms, to ask questions, to meet their prospective representatives. Such an event would also put the political spotlight on Raton and, hopefully, candidates would go away with a clearer understanding of the problems and concerns of this area.

We think such a forum deserves a try here. —Raton Daily Range

#### RAFSHOON AND PRESS

When President Carter's old image-making friend Gerald Rafshoon was enlisted by the White House he brought a built-in problem with him. Rafshoon's reputation as a slick publicist makes everything he does a trifle suspect. His every manipulation of the President tends to be viewed as one more Madison Avenue ploy to dazzle the folks and jack up the poll results.

Accordingly, Rafshoon's declaration that he wants Mr. Carter to hold more news conferences away from Washington will be greeted with some skepticism. Rafshoon spoke darkly of "media stars" all the time wanting to be on camera at White House news conferences, and said that "if we get out in the country we can do a much broader job." Skeptics might retort that this sounds like Rafshoon wants to get his boss out in the boondocks where he would have to joust with less sophisticated newsmen.

Our impulse is to reserve judgment. Basically, the idea of holding more presidential news conferences outside the capital has great appeal. Besides, Rafshoon may find that the country is full of newsmen who can ask questions just as penetrating as those posed by the "media stars" he finds so discomfiting. —Alamogordo Daily News

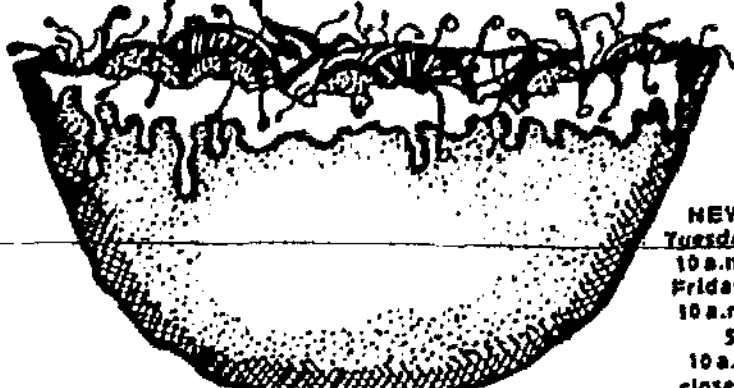

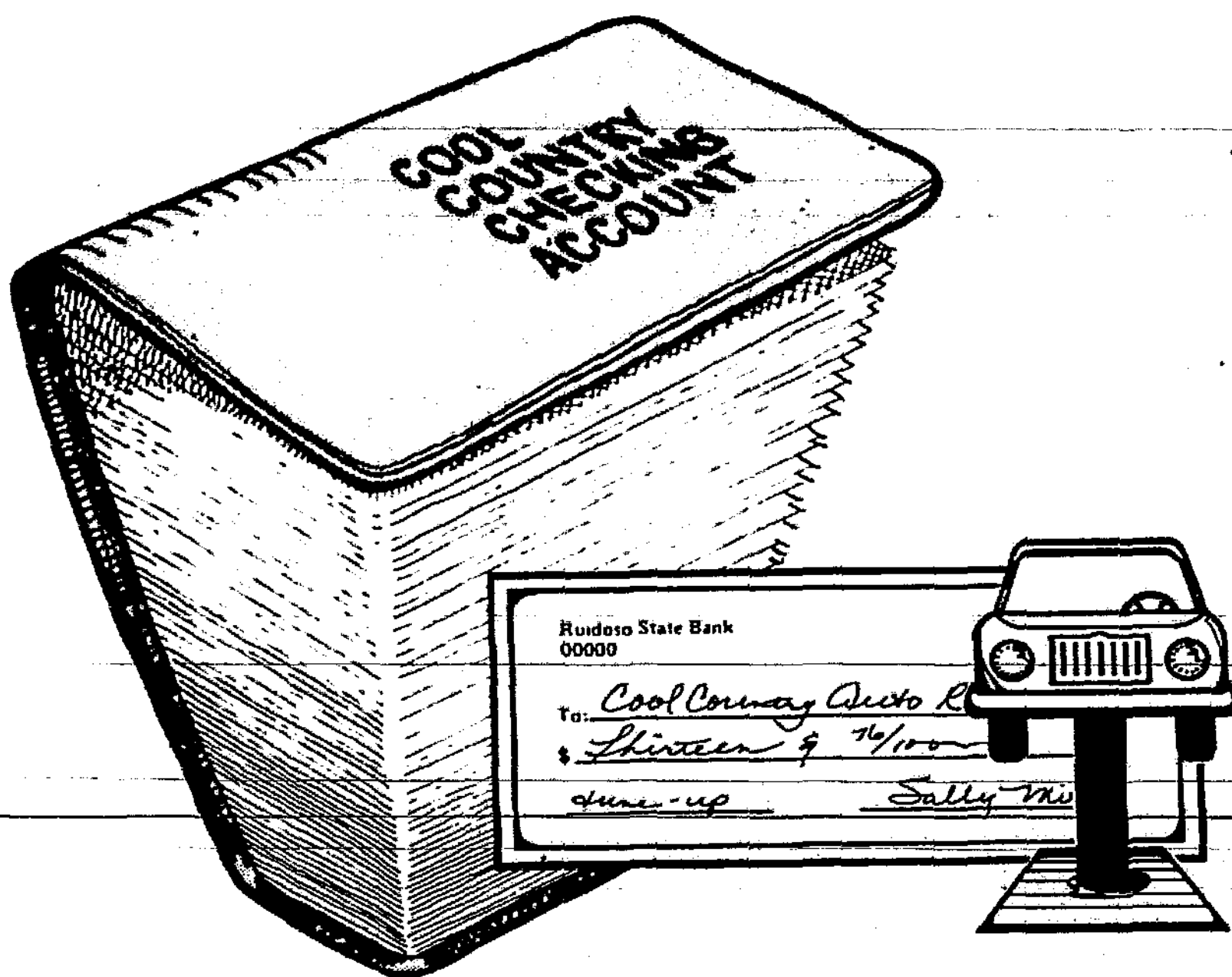

Each week a commentary on the film to be shown will be made by a humanities scholar. With the exception of Katherine Finley, a local scholar, those making presentations are from the Las Cruces campus of the University of New Mexico.

One of the main themes of the series is the examination of American values of the past 100 years. The following stories are those depicted in film:

"The Jolly Corner" by Henry James on September 18. In this film featuring Fritz Weaver and Salome Jens, "an expatriate American who fled from the Civil War returns to New York thirty five years later. He is at once repelled and lured by what he encounters — the lust for profit and power."

"Blue Hotel" by Stephen Crane on September 25. Academy Award winning director Jan Kadar directs this film of a young Swede arriving "at the hotel of a moody, frontier Nebraska town. He anticipates the wild west of the dime novels" and is unable to "relate positively" to his new environment.

"Displaced Person" by Flannery O'Connor on October 2. "The 'displaced person' is a conscientious but driven Polish refugee" who is brought to Georgia by an "elderly priest who means well but fails in his efforts to integrate the Pole" with the farm people. The cast includes actress Irene Worth and Academy Award winner John Houseman.

"Almost-A-Man" by Richard Wright on October 9. "Le Var Burton, star of 'Roots' plays David, a black teenage farm worker in the Deep South during the 1930's. Like many teenagers today, David is struggling for a new identity — as a man."

"Parker Adderson, Philosopher" by Ambrose Bierce on October 16. "Adventure and strong character development are combined in this gripping story of a Union Army spy."

"I'm a Fool" by Sherwood Anderson on October 23. "In this film, Ron Howard plays Andy, a 'swipe' doing manual labor on the Ohio race track circuit in the 1930's. Andy meets a beautiful young lady at the track and tries to impress her by exaggerating his position in life."

"Soldier's Home" by Ernest Hemingway on October 30. "Harold Krebs, the central figure in this story, is a soldier returned home after the end of World War I — he struggles to make sense of the past and to work out his uncertain future."
