# Eagle Creek Dam killed

The village trustees Tuesday evening, acting on the advice of Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) officials that the proposed Eagle Creek Dam was financially unfeasible, unanimously voted to cancel the project and pursue available options to obtain additional raw water.

The death knell for the project was sounded Thursday and Friday when mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., and village manager Jim Hine met with FmHA and Soil Conservation Service (SCS) representatives in Santa Fe and Albuquerque.

Davis reported: "FmHA and SCS said the present cost of the proposed dam on Eagle Creek is totally unfeasible and that neither office has financing available."

"They asked us to consider alternate locations to build raw water storage dams and to investigate pumping rights. Their alternate dam sites include Phillips, Crouse and Flume Canyons."

Hine reported: "One problem with financing resulted from the low estimate of the original cost of the proposal."

"FmHA said that a loan, for 40 years, would put the total cost, based on present estimates, at \$18 million and suggested we wouldn't want to obligate your people to that." They also said that some of the planning work and testing done at the Eagle Creek site would apply to off

channel locations.

"Our immediate problem is that we need stored water to funnel into existing treatment plants and we need additional storage tanks."

"Also, we must use our \$1 million FmHA grant by June 29, 1979 to improve our water system, or lose it."

IMMEDIATE SOLUTIONS to the problem of raw water storage to be pursued by the village include:

— Design and construct a raw water storage reservoir in the Upper Canyon area to smooth out the operation of Water Plant No. 1 during peaks, both in operation and in the Rio Ruidoso.

— Design and construct a raw water storage reservoir in the Eagle Creek Area, above Alto Lake, to give additional storage capacity and enable the village to operate the water system during a longer drought period.

Hine said that the nearly-completed Alto Treatment Plant will have a daily capacity of three million gallons and is "designed so that the capacity can be increased to treat five million gallons of water daily at minimal cost."

OTHER SOLUTIONS include:

— Design and construct the Kingswood Area Reservoir and piping to give additional storage and system capability to an area that has pressure problems during peak demand periods.

— Construct the Noisy Waters Reser-

voir inlet piping and modify valving at the existing pipe in Main Road per plans and specifications.

— Test for, design and construct wells to give an additional water source in the

Eagle Creek area during low flow periods in Eagle Creek.

— Design and construct a new reservoir at the five million Alto Crest Tank to give

## Public hearing on new airport opens Friday

A public hearing on the use of public lands near Fort Stanton for the proposed Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, to serve Lincoln County and the surrounding business and recreational areas, will be conducted by Bureau of Land Management (BLM) personnel in the All American Room of the Chaparral Motor Hotel in Ruidoso Downs on this schedule: Friday 7 to 10 p.m., and Saturday, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The BLM is eliciting testimony from the general public at the two hearings, with each person to have a maximum of 10 minutes to make oral presentations.

Also desired by the BLM are written comments from Congressmen, interest groups, state and federal agencies and private individuals, that will be accepted through October 1, to be made a part of the hearing record.

## School enrollment reaches 1,355

Enrollment in the Ruidoso-Municipal Schools has exceeded estimates, superintendent of schools Pat Valliant told the Ruidoso Board of Education at their Tuesday evening meeting.

Enrollment for kindergarten through twelfth grade is 1,355 students, which includes 96 kindergarten students for a Full Time Equivalency of 48 students and 14 special education students.

"Our estimate was 1,330, which we've exceeded by 25 students," Valliant said. "And we hope to pick up some more."

"It takes two or three weeks to get a full

complement for the first 40 day (reporting period)."

During the meeting the board received notice of final approval of the 1978-79 budget from the Public School Finance Division.

The \$2.83 million budget had been given tentative approval at the April 24 budget hearing.

Funds appropriated for the school system are determined by the number of students enrolled.

In other business Tuesday, the board:

— Received a reply from the Mesalero

Apache Tribe superintendent for the Bureau of Indian Affairs to their request for a school bus turn around.

The superintendent wrote, "We will look into it with the agency road superintendent (and investigate getting) tribal landholders' permission."

— Approved budget increases of \$22,307.27 from the Johnson O'Malley Act and \$9,902 from the Title IV, A. Act.

Both acts provide federal funding for Native American education.

— Approved checks.

— Approved and signed a correction to the 1977-78 inventory which was approved

and signed at the August meeting.

— Approved hiring of Bruce Daniels, high school English; Andrew Miller, custodian; and Harriet Aguilar, Johnson O'Malley aide.

— Awarded the Power Mechanics II project Jeep to Bob Elder, who bid \$2,600.

After the meeting, Valliant introduced the board members to the audience and then Tom Hansen, principal, introduced the high school staff to the school board.

The next meeting will be at 8 p.m., October 10 in the White Mountain Middle School media center.

## Careage obtains nursing home building permit

The Careage Corporation of Bellevue, Washington, has obtained a building permit to begin construction of an 80 bed Care Center in Ruidoso.

The building permit pegged the estimated cost of the structure at \$253,300, according to records on file in the office of village building inspector Chuck Brown.

The nursing home will be located on a 5.2 acre tract, at the intersection of D Street and Fifth Street, just south of the Ruidoso Pine Lodge Subdivision. The area, in Kingswood II Subdivision, was replatted to enable Careage to build the nursing facility.

"Careage will," Brown said, "continue D Street into their property and install all utilities as well as blacktopping drive and parking areas."

Careage announced their interest in locating a nursing home here in January of

1977, with planning consultant B. W. Ross stating at that time:

"Our company will build the nursing home through private funds, and we will not require the community to provide any financial support."

"The nursing home we plan to build will include Medicare Skilled Nursing beds as well as Medicaid beds with the possibility of sheltered care services. The facility will be certified for both Medicare and Medicaid services. The rates for our services will be similar to those proposed by other nursing homes in the past with only adjustments made for inflationary effects."

"It is emphasized that we are not asking the community to provide any type of financial assistance as our company is fully financed and capable of building the facility."

The News was unable to contact Careage's representative, now in Ruidoso, to determine when construction work at the site will begin.

## Sheriff Elliott well within budget

Lincoln County Sheriff Bill Elliott is living within the budget for his division of county government, according to county manager Les Olsen and a computer generated printout documenting sheriff's department spending up to September 1.

Olsen's analysis of the printout indicates that in the first two months of spending for the current fiscal year, the sheriff has enjoyed an underage of about \$5,510 from the computer projection of the amount of spending which could occur by the first of September.

"This doesn't indicate some outstanding warrants," Olsen said, "but I'm sure they won't come anywhere near that figure."

The sheriff's budget for the current fiscal year is \$181,377, not counting \$50,348 budgeted for the county detention and correction facilities.

Olsen said that detention expenses are effectively fixed and not prone to over extension.

Broken down to a monthly basis, the sheriff's department has funds totaling \$15,114.75 for each month. Under this formula, Olsen said the sheriff's department has had the potential of spending

about \$30,229.50 since the beginning of the fiscal year, July 1 through the first of September. Expenditures, according to the computer, have totaled \$6,653, salaries excluded.

Sheriff's department salaries for the fiscal year total \$92,680, or \$7,723 per month; \$15,446.66 for a two-month period. The salary figure added to the two month expense figure yields total expenditures of \$22,299.66. This figure subtracted from the total potential expenditure rate for a two month period yields an in-the-black figure of \$7,930.

The total underage of \$5,510 is found by

subtracting two months worth of salary for "elected official" from \$7,930. The computer lists a salary of \$14,520 under the elected official salary category.

Olsen added that if the current spending trend in the department remains the same, Elliott should finish his current term in November well ahead of his fiscal schedule. Under New Mexico law an elected official must maintain a proportionate share of the budget if the official's term in office does not extend to the close of the fiscal year.

## County employing new computer system

What used to take one Lincoln County department four months to perform now takes about 10 days thanks to the county's new computer system which, according to county officials, is well on its way toward being fully operational.

The Burroughs-700 computer system is described by county manager Les Olsen as one of the most up-to-date systems employed by any county in the state.

According to Olsen, the system now contains the complete county budget for each department and subdivision including payables, purchase orders and an up-to-the-minute account of how each

department stands. It can offer projections of how a certain department will finish the fiscal year, he said.

Magnetic discs, the computer's "memory" also contain voter registration information, Olsen said, and provide a basis for jury selection.

The county's inventory and payroll are kept in the machine. Olsen said the computer prepares the payroll including printing employees checks.

Probably the computer's single greatest effect on Lincoln County residents is its ability to store property files for each of the about 27,000 tracts in the county. Olsen said the system is able to prepare the tax roll, draft tax bills and print tax notices.

He added the entire tax bill generating portion of the computer's function takes about 10 to 11 days, a feat that used to require about four months for county assessor Marion Schlarb's office to complete.

"Before you had five people in the assessor's office, working full time, weekends," Olsen said, "each one (tax notice) had to be manually handled twice. Now the computer kicks it all out in about a week."

"The system can run all night," he added, "we just have to check it every three or four hours to make sure something hasn't hung up."

What this means, he explained, is the first-half tax notices for the current fiscal year will be mailed out on or before the November 1, deadline. He added this will allow county property owners plenty of time to pay their property taxes before the December 1, delinquent date.

Tuesday, the machine had totally

processed the 23,000 piece tax roll and was more than half way toward completion of the resulting tax bills. Olsen said the bills would be in the office of county treasurer Michael A. Kimbrell by October 1.

Kimbrell assured The News that if the bills are received in his office by the legal deadline of October 1 there would be no problem.

"If we have them by October 1," he said, "they will be out on time."

Olsen explained, of course, no machine is fool proof. He said it was possible for a memory disc to be lost or demagnetized in which case thousands of bits of information would be lost.

"We have everything duplicated on other discs," Olsen said, "we have two copies of everything."

A Texas man was killed in a one vehicle accident at about 10:30 p.m., Saturday on Highway 37 near Alto.

Edward Wilson Coffin, III, 38, Big Lake, Texas was killed when his north-bound vehicle ran off the east side of the road.

State Police officer Kent Waller said Coffin apparently was thrown from the vehicle which then rolled on him.

Passenger Pam Seymour, 38, Las Cruces, was treated at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital for lacerations and released.

Her son, Robb, who also was a passenger, apparently was not injured.


## Local woman found dead in pool at Inn

## REACT operating here

REACT, an international emergency communications system conducted by Citizens Band (CB) radio licensees, is now operating in the Ruidoso area and monitors Channel 9 24 hours a day.

Rosemary McGarvey, Ruidoso's REACT president, said team members observe the following priorities in using Channel 9 (27.065 MHz):

- Communications relating to an existing situation dangerous to life or property, i.e., fire or automobile accident.
- Communications relating to a potentially hazardous situation, i.e., car stalled in a dangerous place or lost child.
- Road assistance to a disabled vehicle on the highway or street.
- Road and street directions.

"Ruidoso's REACT team," McGarvey said, "will sign on with the team number 4223, give the member's unit number and

then their call letters, which is their Federal Communications Commission (FCC) license number. This is a FCC regulation that is strictly enforced."

A regular meeting of Ruidoso's REACT is scheduled for 7 tonight in the Cotton Room of the Chaparral Motor Hotel, Ruidoso Downs, with persons interested in joining the team invited to attend.

"We'll show a special REACT film," McGarvey said, "and will have as guest speakers representatives from Holloman Air Force Base and White Mountain Search and Rescue."

"REACT is authorized by the FCC to operate during emergencies," McGarvey said, "and it enables our members to be of service to our fellow man during an emergency situation."



## Mayor Wheeler questions police car expenditures

Mayor Norman Wheeler, during Monday evening's meeting of the Ruidoso Downs trustees, questioned Chief of Police Lynn Martin on two recent bills incurred by the police department.

Wheeler said a more than \$500 radio placed in a "2200 police car" didn't seem quite right.

Martin replied the radio was a less expensive model.

"The other radios run anywhere from \$1,200 to \$2,200," Martin said, adding that the old police cruiser was worth much more to the police department. "There're times when we have to use our private cars for patrolling," Martin said.

Wheeler also questioned a \$259.91 bill from Denny's Tire for a brake job for one of the police cruisers.

"The front disc had crystallized and had to be replaced," Martin said. He and Wheeler agreed the disc brake must have gotten "pretty hot."

Mayor Wheeler and trustee Lois Beavers then reported that the three day Municipal League Conference this year "was nice and interesting," but it "didn't have much that applied to small municipalities like Ruidoso Downs."

"It was nice to get out of town and see a few people and some of the country side," Wheeler said during Monday's regular trustee's meeting, "but outside of that, that's about it."

"It was very interesting I would say," Beavers said, "it was mostly political; not much applied to a small community like Ruidoso Downs."

Other Monday night business included: — Passage of a picnic license approval for Wheeler to serve beer and canned cocktails at Western Highlands during Mule-O-Rama.

— Reception of a report from Wheeler saying Step-II-of-the-proposed-regional waste water treatment plant project was near initiation and required financing. "We have our share of the money in the bank," Wheeler said. He added that Ruidoso Downs would be tabbed for about \$16,884.92 of the \$50,564.75 cost of Step II, which includes land acquisition.

additional treated water storage for heavy peak periods and during power or system failures.

Deepening the Hollywood Well, now capable of providing 604,800 gallons of water daily, in the hope of improving the quality of the water from the well.

— Determine if the Mescalero Apache Tribe would agree to the village building a reservoir on tribal land and if United States Forest Service land would be available for a dam to store water pumped into it.

Davis said, "None of the alternate dam sites will require relocation of road or power lines and no purchase of property, which will make them much cheaper to build."

PROJECTS TO ALLEVIATE water pressure and supply problems in two areas within the village, that have been authorized, are:

— Design and construct the Ponderosa Heights Reservoir and piping necessary to give added storage and to eliminate two pumping stations in the Ponderosa Heights area.

— Construct the Poor Drive pressure reducing station in accordance with prepared plans and specifications.

The trustees instructed Hine to "investigate alternate dam sites and to try to obtain cost factors," and to report his findings "as soon as possible."

In other business, the trustees: — Advised the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) that the trustees would meet with them during the regularly scheduled P&Z work session at 7:30 p.m., September 20 in the Ruidoso Public Library. The joint session will discuss development problems existing within the village to determine possible solutions.

— Were advised of a special meeting of the Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Supply Association at 6 p.m., September 19 at K-Bobs in Ruidoso.

— Approved a Joint Powers Agreement with Lincoln County providing \$1,500 in county funds to defray expenses of operating the municipal swimming pools in Ruidoso and Carrizozo.

— Recommended the purchase of a new ambulance, at an approximate cost of \$22,000, with Hine instructed to determine financing methods.

— Approved replats of Lots 4 and 5, Block 4, First Addition to Cree Meadows Heights, moving a lot line to include a road; Lot 60 in Singing Pines Addition, taken from a larger plot of ground; Aspen Run, Phase 5, Condominiums, Lot 12, Block 9 and Units 30 through 24, Aspen Run, Phase 4, both on Golf Course Estates; and Del Norte Addition, subject to completion of the project or the posting of a cash completion bond.

— Approved, subject to revision, a lease/maintenance agreement with Lincoln Communications, Ruidoso, at a monthly cost of \$1,943.68, to replace outmoded village radio equipment and to service it.

— Approved a request by Wayne Bradley to install, at his own cost, sewer lines to serve Lots 1 through 5, Block 8, Cree Meadows Country Club Subdivision, pending the outcome of a case to be heard in District Court.

## Commissioners seek approval on road project

The Lincoln County Commission Monday voted to request state and federal approval for paving the Fort Stanton Road from New Mexico 380 to New Mexico 37 and the Capitan-Nogal cut off joining New Mexico 37 and New Mexico 48.

The commission resolution states the Safer Off-Systems Road Program, through which the county is applying for the road upgrading, requires local matching share commitment of the local government either by cash match or force account.

Under the terms of the Safer Off-Systems Road Program, the county must provide 22 percent of the total cost of the projects to match the federal/state share of 78 percent.

According to figures provided by the State Highway Department, the total cost of the twin projects will be about \$404,266; \$324,188 for Fort Stanton Road improvements and \$140,078 for the Nogal-Capitan short cut.

The figures are tentative, according to commission chairman John Sudderth. "They don't mean much," he said.

The Fort Stanton Road upgrading would provide paved access to the new land fill and the proposed Sierra Blanca Airport site.

In other business Monday, B&B Servicing Company, Capitan resident Tommy Quail, president, submitted the apparent high bid of \$13,501.99 for the purchase of a 1965 Cessna-210 E airplane. The single-engine airplane was impounded by the county when it was discovered west of

Carrizozo containing a small quantity of marijuana.

B&B Servicing Company's bid topped nine others ranging as low as \$5,500. The next low bid for the plane was submitted by Sierra Blanca Motor Company in the amount of \$12,850.

Other business Monday included: — Approval of a plat for Little Creek Hills Subdivision, Unit 2.

— Acceptance of the Sun Valley sanitation district levy.

— Approval of the subdivision road levy amounting to one cent per frontage foot for maintenance of roads in subdivisions accepted by the county.

— Passage of a Safer Off-Systems Road Program application for the installation of 2,000 feet of guardrail on the Carrizo Canyon Road between the Ruidoso village limits and the Mescalero Apache Tribe's reservation boundary.

— Approval of a voting machine technician contract with Mrs. J.N. McDaniel and Morris Redman. The contract sets a fee of \$40 per day worked in maintaining the county's voting machines.

— Approval of payment of several prior year bills.

— Approval of the treasurer's report.

— Approval of the payroll register.

— Directed the county staff to draft a letter to New Mexico State Police Chief Martin Vigil thanking him for his cooperation and the cooperation of the state police in Ruidoso over the Labor Day weekend.

The computer projection indicates two areas which could go over the budget if current spending practices are continued. The areas are capital-outlay-and-office supplies. Olsen said these two line items reflect one time expenditures and do not continue on a monthly basis. In these cases, he said the projection is inaccurate.

Sheriff's department spending initially came under fire at a special budget session of the Lincoln County Commission. The commission tentatively approved a record high budget for the sheriff's department of \$245,273, including detention expenses.

The commission placed several spending stipulations on the sheriff's department while approving the budget, which was cut from Elliott's request of \$268,968. The commission later said that bills continued to "come into" the county manager's office for items purchased by the sheriff's department contrary to the stipulations.

A closed unannounced meeting of the county commission, District Attorney Robert Doughty, the sheriff and Al Romero, chief of the local Government Division of the state's Department of Finance and Administration (DFA), followed on June 22.

In the meeting the commission asked the DFA to take fiscal control of the management of the sheriff's department.

According to figures supplied by the commission, the sheriff's department had overspent its budget by as much as \$46,000 in Elliott's first 18 months in office.

## Warriors gird for Animas in first district grid tilt

Fresh on the heels of a heartbreaking last-minute defeat to the Carrizozo Grizzlies, the Ruidoso Warriors don't plan to roll over for Friday's opponent the Animas Panthers, in a district game at Warrior Stadium.

"We'll cut out the mistakes this week and we'll win," senior co-captain Steve Cox vowed.

Warrior head coach Darrel Stierwalt thinks a win is within his Warrior's grasp if

the offensive line can improve.

Against Carrizozo, the inexperienced Warrior line had a hard time picking up the stunting linebackers. Since Stierwalt expects the Panthers to blitz their linebackers, the offensive line could be the key to the game.

"We had problems with our guards shutting off their linebackers," Stierwalt said. "Animas will probably stunt after watching us (last week). We'll try to teach our guards how to recognize a stunt this week. We're going to really work hard on

that. If we let Animas into our backfield we'll be in trouble."

Stierwalt's other area of concern is the Animas quarterback.

"Their quarterback has a real fine arm," he said. "We can't let him get outside on us. That's what we have to worry about. I think he is a real good scrambling quarterback. If we let him get out of the pocket he'll hurt us."

Other than that, Stierwalt doesn't expect to alter the game plan from the previous week.

"We're going to stay with our basic game plan. We'll stay in our multiple offense. We're not going to change anything for them. We think we can run on them. The way they set up their defense takes away from our passing game. We'll run more than we'll pass," Stierwalt said.

Animas can be expected to pass more than Ruidoso, especially when they are in the pro set. When they aren't in that offense they are in the wishbone.

"Their passing game is more effective than ours," Stierwalt said. "When they get in that pro set they like to pass."

Although the win would only even the Warrior's record at 1-1, it would give them an early jump in district play. Animas is 1-1 for the year, including a 26-0 win over Kirby and a 36-6 defeat at the hands of Truth or Consequences Kickoff is at 7:30 p.m.

The Braves opened their season with a less than spectacular 0-0 tie against Captain. Despite the score, head COACH Terry Wharton expressed pleasure with his troops.

Because of the opening game tie, one would expect first-year coach Wharton to hunger for that first win. Not necessarily so, Wharton said.

"We try to win, of course," he said. "But we try to teach the kids the fundamentals."

Wharton also said he teaches the same system the Ruidoso Warriors use. Teaching them a different system would make the adjustment to high school ball that much tougher.

"We only had eight kids suit out for the Captain game and they were able to wear us down near the end. Carrizozo has a large squad. We have to be in shape. Substituting is the key."







Attendance regulations are slightly different at the high school this year. Students are still allowed to miss only 10 days but NO withdrawals will be made for vacations or out of town trips with parents. Every absence except school sponsored trips is counted toward the 10 days. A note or phone call from a parent is necessary for every absence and the record of these is kept for reference at reinstatement conferences. Parents will be notified after the students fifth and tenth absence and students are given one week to apply for reinstatement after the tenth absence. If no application is made for reinstatement within one week the student is permanently withdrawn from school.

The Wednesday schedule is the most confusing as fourth period is before noon instead of after, and the lunch period is 15 minutes late and shorter than other days.


School spirit has increased since our team is now sporting new uniforms. The boys look very sharp and it would be great to have more students and townspeople out to support them.



# Inside the Capitol

By CARROL W. CAGLE

1979 Legislature.

**SANTA FE** — Bits and pieces of information about people and events in the capitol:

The race for governor is just about the only major campaign that's got political insiders still wondering about the outcome. Capitol types can't agree on whether Republican Joe Skeen or Democrat Bruce King will control the statehouse for the next four years.

Right or wrong, the consensus on other races is that Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., is far ahead of Democratic challenger Toney Anaya, that Republican U.S. Rep. Manuel Lujan has an edge over Democrat Robert Hawk, and that Jeff Bingaman will top a generally victorious Democratic slate of candidates for statewide, legislative, county and judicial offices.

Sen. Harrison Schmitt, a Republican who's not up for election this year, thinks the West is replacing the South as the region most resistant to increasing power in Washington.

Schmitt says there's a "community of interest" in the western states "relating to land and water problems and resistance to Federal regulations."

He added: "The states' rights issues are being carried by the West now, much more than in the South."

The former astronaut also praised the famous technique of talking a bill to death which southern senators perfected. "You can call it a filibuster if you want to," Schmitt said, "but I think it's a very useful tool" for giving the public time to get involved in decision-making.

Hoyt Pattison of Clovis, leader of Republicans in the State House of Representatives, thinks "we'll be looking at a little more conservative trend" in the

He says California's vote on the property tax-limiting Proposition 13 may be a factor in that trend, adding: "I've heard there are bills being drafted to get the state out of the property tax."

But the GOP floor leader says he doubts the more conservative trend will cause his fellow Republicans to join forces with conservative Democrats in an attempt to oust Democratic House Speaker Walter Martinez of Grants.

"I don't think that's too likely," Pattison said.

Republican gubernatorial candidate Joe Skeen says he is avidly courting votes in populous Bernalillo County, which provides some one-third of the state's total ballots. Albuquerque is the "center and focus" of his race against Democrat Bruce King, Skeen says.

He says New Mexico, as illustrated by Albuquerque, is becoming "vastly more urbanized" as part of the "Sunbelt syndrome."

King says if he's elected he can help resolve conflicts over scarce water supplies by personally dealing with the governors of neighboring states.

"I have a reputation of working well with people in solving problems of that type," King said.

The state's organization of teachers, the National Education Association-New Mexico, has joined organized labor in attacking proposals for "right-to-work." NEA-NM director Edmund Gaussoin says right-to-work is "gaining momentum," but adds: "It is difficult to understand how anyone who has taken the time to analyze this issue can support the philosophy, the rationale or anything other than the title itself."

### SAN CLEMENTE FUND

Richard Nixon played host to several hundred guests at his California home. They paid \$250 apiece, thus enriching the United Republican Finance Committee of Orange County by about \$100,000, net.

No doubt it was generally agreed that this was a nice thing for the former president to do for the party whose banner he carried to victory in 1968 and 1972. This touches off speculation, though, as to whether Republicans willing to make use of Nixon as bait at a fund-raiser give any thought to how he besmirched the GOP banner, not to mention the American flag. He dragged them through some of the smelliest mud one can imagine, and consequently became the first American president forced to resign in disgrace.

This may make him an even better box office draw for certain audiences than he would be as a mere ex-president untouched by the nation's worst political scandal. The Orange County affair prompts some reflection, though, about short memories, thick skins, and associated topics of interest.

### ANEMIC PRESIDENCY

House Speaker Tip O'Neill's humiliation of the White House is the latest example of Jimmy Carter's anemic presidency.

The essential facts are these: The White House, presumably the President himself, authorized the dismissal of O'Neill's protégé, Robert Griffin, as deputy administrator of the scandal-torn General Services Administration. Outraged over his friend's firing, O'Neill banished the President's congressional liaison aide from the speaker's office and

complained bitterly of Griffin's treatment by the White House.

Within the week, the White House, acting at Carter's direction, created a \$50,000-a-year post for Griffin as senior assistant to Robert S. Strauss, the administration's chief trade negotiator and head inflation-fighter.

Can anyone seriously doubt that the \$50,000-a-year post was created wholly to soothe O'Neill's anger?

When Griffin's new job was announced by the White House, Carter aides admitted they had no description of duties for the post. White House aides were not even sure where Griffin's office would be located. Strauss himself was none too certain what Griffin's responsibilities would be.

The whole world has observed that the President of the United States lacked the clout to dismiss from government service a friend of the Speaker of the House.

The President is, or certainly ought to be, embarrassed by the shoddy ethical standard revealed by this arrangement for Griffin.



### "The Sparrow's Fall"

During the last few days I have recalled one of the most cherished messages of The Bible — how Our Lord watches and cares about even the fall of a sparrow.

"Are not two sparrows sold for a farthing? and not one of them shall fall to the ground without your Father knowing." These words from the Gospel according to Saint Matthew bring us the message that God watches over even the most humble of his creatures.

This passage is one of the most often and widely quoted and remembered of all the words from the Scriptures. It is found in songs, poems, stories, hymns, proverbs, and in the daily talk of people, all through the years.

I remember some lines from the old favorite song, "Rocked in the Cradle of the Deep, in which the sailor says:

"Rocked in the cradle of the Deep,  
I lay me down in peace to sleep;  
Secure I rest upon the wave,  
For thou, Oh Lord, Hast power to save.  
I know that thou wilt heed my call,  
For thou dost mark the sparrow's fall."

### "Spare Ribs" The Sparrow

Down at Bob and Betty Lambert's Canyon Trading Post, in the Ruidoso Valley, the pride and joy of the household is a lady-bird young sparrow named Spare Ribs, the second.

Bob Lambert, "The Arizona Kid", so named because of his life-time as Rancher and Cowboy in Arizona, found the young bird, hardly a day old, where it had fallen on the barn floor out of the nest. There being several nests in the barn, Bob did not know in which one to return the infant sparrow. So he took it into the house; and with patience and care began raising the little orphan. They furnished the bird child a cage complete with bath tub, and Betty began feeding little Spare Ribs boiled eggs.

In order to make the bird open its mouth, Betty said, you have to learn to imitate the mother's voice. The mother utters a certain chirp to make the baby bird open its mouth, and then gives it the food, Betty, after much practice learned to make a little whistled note that became the magic word that caused the bird to open its mouth for its food.


### More Birthdays In September

MR. ANTI-INFLATION?—"I'm a low interest man," announced presidential inflation counselor Robert Strauss recently. "Who isn't?" might be Federal Reserve Chairman Bill Miller's response to Strauss' opposition to the Fed's action in boosting interest rates. For a man charged with the responsibility of dealing with the nation's number one economic problem, inflation, Strauss' understanding of the economy is, shall we say, shaky at best.

Since Strauss is a lawyer, not an economist, herewith are a few facts on interest rates:

- Item: Interest rates rise with inflation; they do not cause it. This is because a lender who will be repaid in inflated dollars will require higher interest rates as an "inflation premium."
  - Item: In spite of certain credit-tightening moves, the Fed is not carrying out a tight money policy. In fact in the last three months, the money supply has grown at a 12.6 per cent annual rate—a rate consistent with runaway inflation, not price stability.
  - Item: Interest rates also rise when the demand for loans increases even faster than the supply of money. At present, the Fed has to finance an estimated \$51.1 billion Federal budget deficit four years into our economic recovery, in competition with private investment requirements which are still considerable.
- Low interest rates are indeed a key to a growing economy. Unfortunately, with high rates of inflation and a budget deficit which gobbles up large portions of available capital, low interest rates are not possible.

Screwworms are being found in ever increasing numbers in Lincoln County. The warm winter, especially in Arizona, let them survive in many areas that normally are frozen out. The adult screwworm fly is killed when the night temperatures remain below freezing for several days.

Ranchers can help prevent the spread of screwworms by doing several things; First put off branding calves and marking lambs until cold weather kills the screwworm flies. Second, spray livestock to control flies. All the screwworm needs is a drop of blood to start. Send worm samples in for identification. This is the only way a level of infestation can be kept.

Rancher cooperation is crucial. The major way of keeping the fertile fly population low is by ranchers inspecting animals frequently for wounds, treating all wounds with approved insecticides and postponing wounding operations such as castrating and dehorning until non-screwworm seasons. Postponing wounding operations is especially important since the female fly lays her eggs on the edges of wounds. If there are no wounds, there won't be places for the female to lay eggs.

The cooperative United States-Mexico program to push screwworms south to the isthmus of Tehuantepec is in operation. When this program succeeds, screwworms will disappear from the United States and most of Mexico. The continued screwworm free status of the southeastern United States (eradicated in 1960) and Puerto Rico (1975) are living proof that this type of program can work. It will take the cooperation of ranchers, farmers and pet owners in both countries, however, to push the fly south.

Remember: Inspect animals, treat all

wounds, collect worm samples, postpone man-made wounds — it adds up to an important combination to prevent screwworm infestations.

October 7-8, Lincoln will have a Harvest Festival. It will feature a Lincoln County Art Show for grades one to six, arts and crafts exhibits, garden and orchard produce, games and contests for everyone.

The arts and crafts exhibits are articles made by the exhibitor. Exhibits are by invitation only with Diane Shreengost in charge. Leola Pfingsten and Dee Dee Miller are in charge of the Lincoln County school art show. There were over 350 art exhibits last year from the schools in Lincoln County. The theme for the art show is "Autumn." The art show will be in the old Lincoln School building.

Full of flavor apples are plentiful in the Ruidoso-Hondo-Bonita valleys. Some of the apples available are Red Delicious, Jonathan and Golden Delicious. The Red Delicious apple is excellent for eating or salads. The Jonathan is semi-tart and is good for cooking as well as eating or salads. The Golden Delicious is an excellent apple with a mild flavor. It can be used for eating, salads or pies. The Rome Beauty and Stamen Weinsap apples will be

harvested in late November. Some of the apples have been "kissed by nature" or have some hail marks. This is only skin deep and does not generally hurt the quality of the apple. A hail damaged apple does not keep as well as the regular apple; so do not plan on keeping them for Christmas.

Apple harvest is in full swing in the Lincoln County area.

## Health office airs liquid protein diets

Much controversy has surfaced in the last year over the safety of liquid protein diets.

According to the Center For Disease Control, there have been 58 reported deaths related to the use of liquid protein diets. One of the first deaths linked to liquid protein was a New Mexican in 1977.

"In a 1978 report, the Center For Disease Control studied 16 of the 58 people who died a liquid protein related death," said Dr. Jonathan Mann, state epidemiologist with the New Mexico Health and Environment Department. "All 16 were women, 23 to 51 years of age. The results of the study showed that all the women had utilized liquid protein as their major food source for more than two months."

None of the women had any previous history of heart disease, according to Mann, yet all died a cardiac death (most often a problem with the rhythm of the heart). "The autopsies showed heart inflammation to be present in all cases," Dr. Mann said.

The Center For Disease Control estimates that 27,000 people in the United States between 25 and 44 years of age are using a liquid protein diet as their major source of caloric intake.

According to Dr. Mann, use of liquid protein for more than two months as the primary source of calories is associated with a 30 times greater chance of a cardiac death in women aged 25 to 44 than in those who do not use it.

"Changes that occur in a person's body

because of starvation are similar to symptoms present in the women who used liquid protein extensively," he said. "Apparently the diversity of fats, carbohydrates and minerals needed to stay healthy are not being consumed."

The Center For Disease Control has two recommendations for liquid protein users: 1) If you are going to use it exclusively for a prolonged time, it should be consumed in a research setting; and 2) since sufficient data is not available to insure the safety of persons on a liquid protein regimen, any use of liquid protein should be done with care.

Presently, the Food and Drug Administration is in the process of developing a warning label for liquid protein diet products emphasizing that liquid protein is a potentially hazardous diet when used as an exclusive source of calories for an extended period of time.

Dr. Mann reminds dieters that any extreme form of dieting is dangerous to your health with or without liquid protein.

"The healthiest way to lose weight is with a balanced program that decreases consumption of certain foods and increases exercise in a graduated manner," he said.

Mann concluded by saying: "Serious dieters ought to talk to their doctors before they engage in any sort of diet program. There is no safe, magical way to lose 10 pounds overnight. It is exercise and sensible caloric reduction that sheds those pounds."

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

# GOING Strong

## Physician Hasn't Raised Fees For 30 Years

For the past 30 years, 69-year old Dr. Lydia Emery has been at the beck-and-call of a great percentage of the 770 populated rural area of Yoncalla, Oregon.

When Dr. Emery and her husband settled in Yoncalla in 1949, after she served two years as a medical officer in the Navy, she established rates and set up practice in their home. Thirty years later she's still practicing in the same office—stretcher and surgery cases to and charging the same for every ailment—whether it's for treatment of an ingrown toenail or a case of the mumps. She charges \$1 for round-trip to a family service office call and \$2 for a clinic in Roseburg where she brings in four children, week.

# Insects bugging farmers

Every farmer dreads a multiple attack from several different insects at the same time. Not only do the additional insects eat more of the crop, but there is a real possibility that the chemicals normally used to control one insect won't control the others.

Well, that's exactly what is happening to alfalfa farmers in southeastern New Mexico. They are finding up to 100 worms after every ten sweeps of the insect net through their fields. The farmers are being hit by a combination of alfalfa caterpillars, armyworms and even a few cotton boll worms.

To further complicate the nightmare, the chemicals farmers usually used to control alfalfa caterpillars did no good against the armyworm. With 16 insecticides registered on alfalfa, farmers were at a real loss as to what they should try next.

The problem started in mid-summer with an alfalfa weevil infestation on 90,000 acres of alfalfa in Eddy, Chaves and Lea counties. Farmers launched a \$250,000 spray program and still lost up to 60 percent of their first cutting.

Then late last month, Larry Gholson, New Mexico State University's Extension pest management specialist based in Artesia at the Southeastern Branch Station, heard reports of heavy caterpillar infestations in the fields near the Pecos River. He investigated and he too discovered 100 caterpillars after only 10 sweeps.

Gholson enacted an emergency program to screen every insecticide registered for use on alfalfa. He tested Guthion, Seven, Furadan, Diazinon, Cygon, Imida, Malathion, Supracide, Lannate, Methoxychlor, Methyl-Parathion, Phosdrin, Methomyl, Ethyl-Parathion, Pennacp-M, Dyllox and Dibrom.

Out of all the chemicals tested, only two lowered the beet armyworm populations to a suitable level, Gholson said. Methomyl was given the most control, cutting larvae counts to one percent in one day and to .5 percent in two days.

Methyl-parathion was far behind in second place. It cut the worms to 30 percent in one day. However, the populations climbed back to 60 percent in two days.

The untreated fields on the experimental plots had 380 percent on the first day and 390 percent on the second day of the test.

Based on the research, Gholson is recommending that farmers use one and one-half to two pints of methomyl per acre to control beet armyworm on alfalfa. He says aerial applicators in the area who are following his recommendations are having

good success.

However, more trouble may be in store for farmers in that corner of the state. Gholson is finding large numbers of eggs and egg hatches of beet armyworm, alfalfa caterpillar and cotton boll worm in the alfalfa. He is also finding armyworms

and cotton boll worms in the cotton.

Gholson reminds farmers that the larvae are much easier to control when they are small than when they reach their later stages of growth. Therefore, he recommends regular and careful scouting of all fields.

# Livestock price outlook affected by inflation

Beef and other livestock prices during the next 12 months will be affected by a lot more than the amount of rainfall and the price of corn. "More wide spread factors, such as inflation and the balance of payments, will enter the picture," said Robert Coppersmith, Extension marketing economist at New Mexico State University.

The current economic situation is characterized by an inflation rate of about eight percent for 1978. The inflation rate was about seven percent for the first quarter, ten percent for the second quarter and will be about seven percent for the last half of 1978.

"There is nothing in the economic picture to indicate a decrease in inflation during the next six months," Coppersmith said.

Money will become tighter during the next 12 months, the specialist said. This will be caused by an attempt to control inflation. Interest rates will increase by about one percent.

"The expectations of more inflation will prevent the interest rate from having much slow-down effect on the rate of inflation," Coppersmith said.

The deficit balance of payments is accelerating and the dollar continues to drop in value in relation to foreign currencies. This situation will continue through most of 1979.

Farm exports are the only sector of the economy to produce a surplus in the balance of payments. In 1978, farm exports will probably reach 28 billion dollars.

Unemployment has dropped from over eight percent during the past recession to slightly under six percent in mid-1978. Further improvement is not likely during the rest of 1978 and through most of 1979. Look for the unemployment to hover around six percent during the next six to eight months.

Taxpayers are disenchanted with high taxes, unemployment, inflation, and what they consider to be excessive government spending. Consequently, government at all levels will be under pressure to cut taxes and government spending.

The present growth rate is running about

7.4 percent. "Do not expect much increase for the rest of 1978," Coppersmith said.

Late 1979 or early 1980 could see a wage-price freeze, the onset of a recession, and import controls on foreign oil. All of these could, but probably won't occur at one time, Coppersmith said.

"The economy is more likely to see the onset of a recession. Import controls of oil and wage-price controls are politically unpalatable particularly as the country nears the 1980 general election," Coppersmith said.

As all of these forces affect the rest of the economy, they will also affect beef prices and the producer's feed and equipment costs, Coppersmith said.
