C-C held awards banquet; motorcycle convention ok'd

Presentation of awards and sanction of the Aspencade Motorcycle Convention highlighted the Ruidoso Valley Chamber Commerce general membership meeting Wednesday evening.

Emma Redmann, who will retire from the Chamber January 8 after 22 years of service, was presented with a plaque and gift of a microwave oven.

Redmann received a standing ovation from the crowd as she walked to the front, where she stood while Dave Wilson, Chamber president, Ken Cole, former board member, Richard Cothrun, former manager, and Ed Jungbluth, Chamber

executive secretary, each spoke briefly.

Community awards were presented to Herb Brunell, Brunell's, retail merchant; John and Dottle Hall, High Country Lodge, motel service, accepting the award for the Halls was Marty Michaels; Jerry Bigham, Cousins', food service, accepting the award was Marilyn Mericle; Katherine Finley, community service; and Ray Held, promotion.

"The annual membership meeting is not only to honor persons for outstanding service but also a means of communication," Wilson said.

In an effort to assess the opinions of the members, forms requesting comments on various issues were distributed.

The chief item of discussion was the Aspencade Motorcycle Convention which brought "35,000 people to Ruidoso in four days ... who spent over \$1 million, and probably closer to \$2 million," Wilson said. Cothrun endorsed the convention stating, "It's the only event which brings people in during one of the slowest periods of the year." Junior McManus and Cuddy

also spoke in support.

Dick Shaw said, "I'm ashamed to have to mark on a ballot to show support of what Til (Thompson, Aspencade coordinator) has done for our community."

After the general membership meeting, Wilson called a special board meeting of members attending — Alden Deyo, Mac McDougal, Benny Coulston, Ken Cole, Sunny Hirschfeld, Don King, Jim French and Bill Wilson — to discuss the issue.

The group reviewed the questionnaires turned in, finding 53 in favor and 8 in opposition on the motorcycle issue.

The board voted unanimously to "Thank Til, endorse and support the project and request Jungbluth to work with him (Thompson) to show Chamber support of the motorcycle convention."

Also during the general membership meeting, Wilson gave a brief summary of the Chamber's progress in the last year and future plans.

"The Chamber is out of debt and in the black," he said. "We also have a new organizational structure we hope will be more responsive to the membership because members will serve on the committees.

"We hope to initiate new benefits for members possibly including group health insurance. We have improved communications with a monthly newsletter. publishing our agenda before board meetings and resuming the Wednesday morning Coffee Carts.

"We also have special interest groups to represent segments of the membership in the planning process."

Wilson mentioned meetings will be held November 15 for motel and lodging owners and November 16 for retail merchants.

Both meetings will be held at 7:30 p.m., in deadlines well in advance and scheduling the Ruidoso Public Library.

Fort Stanton airport site refused by BLM

Bureau of Land Management (BLM) officials in Santa Fe this morning advised The News that "BLM decided 'no' on the proposed Sierra Blanca Regional Airport for Fort Stanton Mesa, based on the 1976 Federal Land Policy and Land Management Act and the established policy of retention of public land when in the national interest."

"BLM felt," John Gumert, Public Affairs Officer, said, "the wildlife research by New Mexico State University and the New Mexico Game and Fish to be more important. The BLM received more than 200 comments on the issue, from all over the state, with the majority being against the airport."

Gumert said the Regional Airport Commission, of which Richard C. Hall is chairman, has until December 29, 1978 to protest BLM's decision to the Secretary of the Interior, Washington, D.C.

All documents pertaining to the decision are on file at the BLM offices, United States Post Office and Federal **Building, Santa Fe.**

agent for a federal "off-systems" road local governments in \$15,000-maximum improvement program, for which \$4 billion has been appropriated to be used over the next four years, Olson said. "Offsystems" roads are any roads not on the federal highway network built with federal trust funds, he said.

The five projects accepted by the SHD as programs they are going to try to implement through 1980 are the Capitan-Nogal short cut, at an estimated cost of \$140,000; Carrizo Creek Road, at a cost of \$23,000; Ft. Stanton paving for \$106,399; Ft. Stanton sub-base preparation for

Olson said the county will continue to push for a sixth project, the \$257,797 Transwestern Road, which has not yet received state approval.

The cost of the off-systems improvements is borne primarily by the federal government, with the county paying only 17 percent, Olson said. Another application to the SHD for five

state-county cooperative road improvements was approved by the commission Monday.

The county is requesting state aid for improvements to be made by the SHD and the county road department on 8.2 miles of road. The total estimated cost of the requested improvements is \$153,963, 55. percent of which would be contributed by the county and 45 percent by the state.

The five proposed projects would bring improvements to 2 miles of Nogal Canyon owner. Road for \$46,334, to a half mile on Country Club Road for \$8,185, to 2.2 miles on Bonito Lake Road for \$40,797, to 2 miles on Cedar Creek Road at a cost of \$38,797 and to 1.5 miles on Sun Valley Road for an estimated \$19,850.

John Sudderth, commission chairman. said he discussed the projects with the state highway commissioners when they met at the Inn of the Mountain Gods last Thursday.

"We agreed to do the grade and drain and the state agreed to do the double penetration oiling," Sudderth said.

Following the meeting, Olson told The News: "The state legislature appropriates so many million dollars a year to help the county fix up roads that are important to the state, such as feeder roads. The state puts in the more sophisticated labor and machines, such as oiling equipment and ship spreaders. We usually do the more rough type of work."

The five-project request was submitted to the SHD within its November 1 deadline. Sudderth added that the widening and resurfacing project planned for Carrizo







Scant shot at playoffs keeps Warriors fighting

. Whenever there is a ray of sunshine in a cloudy sky, grab it. That's what Ruidoso head coach Darrel Stierwalt did - and he hopes it will begin to pay dividends when the Warriors meet Lordsburg and

"There's an outside chance if we win both these ball games, we could get in the playoffs," Stierwalt said. It's not a very good chance but it's better than none."

Of course, it's going to take more than talking to beat the next two opponents. Tomorrow the Warriors battle the state's AA third ranked team, Lordsburg. The following week they play number one ranked and undefeated Estancia. For now, Stierwalt is concentrating on the game with Lordsburg.

To compensate for the size advantage Lordsburg carries into the ball game. Stierwalt has made some changes in the defense. On the whole, however, the defense that takes the field against Lordsburg will be the same that took the field against Tularosa,

"We've made some adjustments in the 5-3 defense to compensate for Lordsburg's passing game," Stierwalt said. "When they're in certain sets they'll throw the

free safety so we can take care of the flats on the two receiver side.

"We'll put some new people on defense. Tim Riley, who just became eligible, will play some. We've moved John Whitlock to the linebacker position. Basically, it's going to be about the same as last Friday."

Stierwalt is more concerned about Lordsburg's defense than his own, Lordsburg does the one thing that has given the Warrior offensive line fits most of the season. They stunt on almost every play.

"Lordsburg has five defensive sets. All five are stunting defenses," Stierwalt said, "which really puts pressure on the offensive line. The problem that I can see is if we don't block it correctly, they'll kill us. They'll get into the backfield before we can even hand the ball off. We've got to shut down that stunt defensively. We'll have to concentrate on getting outside on sweeps and convoys and our passing game will really have to click. It'll be tough to run against them."

Making it even tougher is the fact that the Warriors were forced to miss a day of practice Monday because of the snow. But, Stierwalt said, the Warriors made up for of Lordsburg. that with a good workout Tuesday.

"Yesterday was a pretty fair practice,"

Hopefully, we're over the sickness bug that has been hurting us."

Besides the Lordsburg defense, there are two other aspects of the contest Stierwalt fears. One is Lordsburg's size. the other is driving to Lordsburg to face an unruly crowd.

"Believe it or not, they're bigger than Tularosa," he said. "Driving five and a half hours makes it tough. They have a real rowdy crowd. They'll call you every name in the book."

Nevertheless, Stierwalt thinks the Warriors have finally put it all together and he confidently predicts that the Warriors will pull one of the upsets of the

"I do expect to win the ball game," he said. "It's not going to be easy. We've finally put it all together."

Whenever Williams feels very down, which doesn't happen often, he confesses that there are many people he can turn to for a morale boost.


"My Mom and Dad are an inspiration,"





The possession limit on trout will be doubled to 16 next year as the result of State Game Commission action Friday, according to Fisheries Division Chief R.L.

#### BRAKES ON SMUGGLING

No one needs to be told that the Immigration and Naturalization Service should have all the help it can get in combatting the flood of undocumented aliens into the United States.

The immediate problem, of course, is to see that life is tougher for the smugglers who make a business of sneaking aliens across the border. One way would be toseize the vehicles they use.


Unfortunately, the 1952 federal statute covering illegal entry does not permit U.S. border officials to impound the trucks. vans and cars that have become important tools in the organized importation of aliens.

This loophole has created an absurd situation. Leonel J. Castillo, INS commissioner, told a Senate judiciary subcommittee recently that 828 of 3,600 vehicles intercepted carrying illegal aliens in the Chula Vista, California border section during fiscal year 1977 had been involved in at least one prior case of smuggling. A vehicle stopped at the border one day may be transporting more aliens across the line 24 hours later.

Fortunately, Congress seems ready to correct this oversight. Legislation sponsored by Sen. Walter Huddleston, D-Ky, would give the Immigration and Naturalization Service the authority to seize vehicles used in alien smuggling.

Vehicle owners would have the usual due process rights of appeal and impounded vehicles could not be sold without judicial

Huddleston's measure ought to be approved by Congress as a necessary part of a larger strategy to reduce undocumented immigration. —News-Bulletin, Belen

# New law makes fathers pay child support

"Since earliest recorded history, women have usually been left to bear the burden of children conceived out of wedlock. Now, the law makes the male, regardless of his age, financially responsible as well," said Leo Yates, Extension family life specialist at New Mexico State University.

The passage of Public Law 93-647 began legal guardian. a new era of a nationwide, cooperative effort between states to enforce payment of child support. For the first time in military history, the wages of a member of the armed forces may be garnished for child support.

The federal courts, Social Security records and Internal Revenue records may now be used to trace, document ability to pay, and enforce payment of child support. Even wages earned in foreign employment with American firms are subject to garnishment for child support.

"The plain fact is that it is rapidly becoming almost impossible to escape the legal responsibility for supporting one's

offspring," Yates said. "Where the threat making regular child support payments education in the public schools may automatically reacts to late payments."

The law has created regional offices all over the nation which cooperate in locating parents — mostly fathers — who have refused to support their children. The law applies equally to all, whether the couple was married or not when the child was conceived.

In New Mexico there are six regional offices that help initiate legal procedures to collect past and future child support. In some cases where paternity has not been established, the Child Support Enforcement Division will help to do so. Then it initiates legal action in the interest of the conceivable that a court might require

It could be for the remainder of life for offspring who for any reason cannot become an independent person, such as birth defect,

disabling accident or illness. "You might correctly guess that most of the enforced child support cases in New Mexico currently involve broken marriages of rather decent people who lead respectable lives," Yates said. "On the other hand you can be rather certain that there are a few grossly, willfully negligent individuals who are creating financial responsibilities far beyond their ability to support. Yates said there is a real need to identify the number of people who are multiple parents of two, three, four or more children who are the subject of enforced

child support. "Once this is done, public policy can be formulated on how to deal with the relatively few individuals guilty of willful, wanton, heedless, reckless disregard for the number and well-being of the children

they produce." Yates concluded.

## Wisdom

Dear Wayne — Last summer I drove to the West for vacation. While driving through Wyoming I saw several groups of antelope grazing or congregated around waterholes very near the road. I even saw one standing by a speed limit sign just outside a small town. I know antelope are widely hunted but do they really offer any challenge? They would appear to be no match for a high powered rifle. Glen K., New Jersey

Dear Glen - Don't be fooled by the apparent nonchalantness of the antelope during the summer months. They apparently know as well as you that it isn't hunting season. But with the coming fall season and the first crack of a rifle they become wary, high speed ghosts. They aren't known for superior intelligence but pushover they are not.

Dear Wayne — Which boat is capable of navigating rougher water conditions, the canoe or kayak? Chris W., Georgia

Dear Chris - The kayak, without question. Because the paddler sits nearly on the kayak floor, the center of gravity is lower than that of a cance, meaning greater stability. In addition, the deck and aft sections of a kayak are covered. leaving an open area only where the paddler, or paddlers, sit. This, of course, renders the craft much less susceptible to swamping. They are also capable of being paddled at faster speeds than canoes because of their needlenose hull design.

Dear Wayne — Although I'm not active -in either event, I would like to know the difference between trap and skeet shooting. Philip I., Illinois

Dear Philip — There are several significant differences between trap and skeet that may not be apparent at first glance. Trap shooters use five stations from which to fire, while the skeet field has eight stations. Trap uses one trap house from which clay pigeons are thrown, located in the center of the field; whereas the skeet field employs two trap houses, a high one and a low one, located to the right and left of the shooter.

In trap, the target is thrown away from the shooter at an angle unknown to him beforehand. Skeet targets are thrown from right or left across the shooter and at a slight angle away. This angle is constant and requires no guesswork on the part of the shooter, but each station presents a slightly different approach of the targets. Twenty-five shots constitutes a round on either field.

Since skeet targets are presented at a closer range than trap, a more open bore shotgun is required.

Dear Wayne - In my home state, wildlife poaching is a serious problem. I have been told there aren't enough game wardens to effectively police this crime. I'd like to know if poaching is widespread in other areas, and if there aren't some effective methods of curbing it. Lenny R., South Carolina

Dear Lenny — Wildlife poaching is a multi-million dollar plague, and it happens in every state. States with large rural areas and good populations of big game are easiest targets. For some of our game species, the poaching toll is substantially higher than the legal take during hunting

The job of wildlife protection is simply too big for the meager force of wardens without help from the public. And therein lies the problem. The majority of the public will not report a poacher. Not even when he shoots down an animal in broad daylight. Perhaps the seeming indifference is really a reluctance to get

The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish has implimented a system of reporting poaching that seems to be successful. The informant remains anonymous through the use of an identification number. When an actual arrest is made, the informant is given a substantial reward. Sometimes several hundreds of dollars. Funds for rewards are through private donations, and so far, donations are running ahead of reward requirements.

Dear Wayne - I'm a new bird watcher. In my area there are numerous blue fays. I've heard the jay is a real villain because of his nest robbing and egg eating traits. He's such a beautiful bird it's hard to believe. Doesn't he have any good characteristics? Gloria J., Virginia

Dear Gloria - Sure. The bluejay is a noisy bully among birds, but he is beautiful and interesting to watch. And if he provides pleasure to people who study him, he can't be all bad.

Dear Wayne - A couple of years ago I began turkey hunting. I'm not very good at it and my luck has been nil, but it's great fun. I'd like to learn as much about the sport as possible. Is there a national organization for turkey hunters? Ritchle W., Missouri

Dear Ritchie — Yes, there is a very fine one. And you need not be a hunter to derive benefit from its programs.

The National Wild Turkey Federation is a non-profit organization dedicated to the preservation and management of the wild turkey. Its programs are supplemented financially through the sale of annual wild turkey stamps and prints.
