Cox spent some of the time calling relatives to inform them of the news. Although they all were pleased, Cox's uncle was more so than the others.


"He wanted me to go," Cox said. "He tried talking me into it a few years ago. Now that I made the decision on my own, he was real happy."

# Water tank needs repairs

Tuesday evening that extensive repairs are needed on the Upper Canyon Water Treatment Plant, known as "Tank Number One", by water superintendent Jim Goodman.

Goodman estimated the cost of repairs "at about \$25,000" and said "they may be needed this fiscal year" ending June 30.

# New fire truck in service

The Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department Tuesday took delivery of a new fire truck capable of delivering in excess of 750 gallons of water per minute through its pumping system.

"In Tuesday afternoon's tests, conducted at the Municipal Swimming Pool," Fire Chief Bill Seelbach said, "with three hoses attached to the system the unit pumped just over 800 gallons of water per minute. This is exceptional performance for an altitude of 7,000 feet and, I might add, in excess of our expectations."

The new truck features, Seelbach said, single stage pumps providing "a simplified means of putting water on a fire."

The unit is equipped with an automatic transmission, both for driving the truck and for pumping water, "that simplifies both operations tremendously."

Two one-and-a-half-inch hoses are preconnected to the back of the truck. Seelbach said, "meaning that we can immediately start fighting the fire with the 600 gallons of 'wet' water the truck carries. This will enable us to put water on the fire at once, while the firemen are connecting the standard hoses to fire hydrants, or hooking up the pump lines to reservoirs or the river."

the exhaust system heats the pumps, Seelbach said, "to prevent freezing up and also to make for easier operation of all equipment that normally is more difficult to operate in extreme low temperatures." Village manager Jim Hine said to The



the amount of \$54,584, was awarded Thunderbird Equipment Company, Albuquerque, January 31, 1978.

This figure compares, Hine said, with the 600 gallon per minute pumper truck delivered in Ruidoso in 1968 at a bid price of \$28,128.10. "The new unit," Hine said, "cost the village almost double of what we paid for the old pumper."

The village acquired the new truck under a lease/purchase agreement through funds provided by the additional one-fourth cent Gross Receipts Tax levied by the trustees.

Upon receipt of the new truck, Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., said, "This is another village effort to maintain our Class 6 fire insurance rating, which is an excellent rating for a forested area.

"According to the last rating by the Insurance Service Offices (ISO) of New Mexico, Albuquerque, our Class 6 insurance rating is the same as Roswell and Alamogordo. And I might note that Albuquerque, with a Class 3 rating, is the lowest in the state.

"I also, on behalf of the village, want to compliment our volunteer firemen for the excellent job they are doing, resulting in our most favorable insurance rating. 1 think that Ruidoso has the finest Volunteer Fire Department in the state."

ISO's rating report notes that Ruidoso's Class 6 ranking results in a decrease in fire insurance premiums of about 16 percent for a frame dwelling or 30 percent for a masonry home. The premiuns for commercial buildings are lowered by up to six percent, as a Class 6 village, depending upon construction and occupancy.









# Nelson reevaluates team's style of play

BY JOHN NEYLAND

Sports Writer Ruldoso basketball coach Barry Nelson began the season with visions of a fast breaking offensive team. After enjoying only minute success with it, he has decided to slow down the pace, if not a lot, a little.

"We'll stay with the fast game," Nelson said. "We're not scrapping our running power," he said. "We'll try to use that to game, but if we come up against a team

that we can't outrun, we'll slow it down.'' So far this season, that has been one of the Warriors' pitfalls. Nelson conceded his squad doesn't recognize when a fast break opportunity is available and when it is not. Too many times, Ruidoso forces a fast break when it isn't there. The result is

"Our turnovers are killing us," he said. "We don't always recognize when the fast break isn't there. We're forcing it whether it is there or not."

As a result, the Warriors are turning the ball over an average of 24 times a game. That gives the opposition an opportunity of 48 points a game. Another concern of Nelson's is the fouling problem the Warriors have been getting into. Ruidoso is averaging 28 fouls per game. Add the scoring opportunities that gives opponents to the turnover opportunities and Nelson figures Ruido: o is spotting its opponents 48 points per game.

"We're fouling too much," he said. "We're spotting everybody 48 points per game. We're fouling a lot with the press and the man to man defense. The press is

hurting us more than it is helping us." The press in also hurting the Warriors because they give up too many easy lay

"We still don't know where to go on the press," Nelson said. "We're getting burned a lot on our press. We're not picking up the open man. By the time we do, it's too late."

Despite this, Nelson plans to continue the press, but he'll try to hold the fouling down by slipping into a zone defense once the press is broken.

"We'll continue the press," he said. "But we'll play more zone using man to man principles. We'll start utilizing the zone

defense to get rebounds."
Rebounding has been the sole aspect of the Warriors' game that has given Nelson January 6 against Tularosa.

cause for optimism. Ruidoso has averaged 48 rebounds per game. Nelson, instead of trying to operate a fast break offense off of an ineffective press, will try to run off the boards. The zone defense will also allow the Warriors superior position on the defensive boards.

"We'll concentrate on our rebounding our advantage. Hopefully, we'll continue controlling the boards and take advantage of ball possession."

Once the Warriors have gained possesion of the ball, Nelson wants them to start concentrating on taking better shots. "We need to improve our field goal percentage," Nelson said. "We're taking too many bad shots. We need to concentrate on better shots. We're taking a lot of shots. Maybe we'll shoot less but take a higher percentage of shots. If we can limit the opponents to one shot, we feel like we

ought to win that way." The Warriors next opportunity to win is tonight in the Cloudcroft tournament. Their first round opponent is Class A Cliff. Although Nelson acknowledges the tough

opponent, he isn't awed by them. "It'll be tough," he said. "They're a one man team. He scores 30 points per game.

We'll concentrate on shutting him down. I feel like we can win if they (players) do what I tell them to." Besides winning the tournament, Nelson

has a few short term goals he hopes to achieve. Mainly, he wants to evaluate his new approach to the game against his old style, which was more running than this



### **Afghanistan Pine** enduring gift

If you can't find a Christmas present for those people on your list who have everything, consider giving them a living Christmas present. Give them an Afghanistan pine.

According to Dr. Fred Widmoyer, head of New Mexico State University's Horticulture Department, the Afghanistan pine can double as this year's Christmas present and as a living yule tree. Then, after Christmas, it can be transplanted as

an ornamental in the front yard.
Widmoyer, who conducts research on the Afghanistan pine through NMSU's Agricultural Experiment Station, says the pine's most outstanding characteristic is its rapid growth.

"In just 24 months, seeds from the Afghanistan pine grow into trees that are 36 inches high," Widmoyer says. "And a seedling 18 inches tall will grow as much as three feet during the first year.

"Of course, people wanting to use an Afghanistan pine as this year's Christmas tree will want an older tree," Widmoyer adds. "Therefore, they'll want to buy a tree which is two or more years old."

The researcher points out that once the Afghanistan pine is two years old, it averages four feet of new growth for the next three years. During the next ten years, the tree will grow at least another 30 feet.

By way of comparison, during those same 10 years, an Aleppo pine averages only eight feet of new growth, and the Southwest's familiar Japanese black pine will grow only four feet.

Given that accelerated growth rate, in just seven years, four million Afghanistan pines could cover an area the size of Dallas with 25 foot tall trees. Two years later that forest would produce a billion seed cones, and the cycle of growth will begin again. In only ten years, the original trees would be ready for the first selective harvesting, providing valuable lumber for pulp and

Widmoyer says the Afghanistan pine is especially suited for New Mexico's climate and soils.

"While the pine does well in all soil types, its best performance is in welldrained soil containing some organic matter. Once established, the pine will tolerate alkaline and salty soil," Wid-

moyer says. "It will also withstand considerable drought and temperatures going as high as 130 degrees Fahrenheit."

Because of their adaptability to New Mexico, Afghanistan pines can be used as windbreaks and as screens for privacy. In addition, their fragrant, rich green foliage can transform the desert into a shadefilled oasis.

The researcher does point out, however, that the Afghanistan pine will freeze in

that the Afghanistan pine will freeze in prolonged sub-zero temperatures and burn. "But apparently there is nothing else that will kill them," he says.

For example, the pine is resistant to air pollution. Tests conducted by Russian foresters in 1973 on the highly industrialized and smog ridden Aspshron Peninsula of the Caspian Sea indicated a high degree of air pollution resistance. While in the Los Angeles basin, plantings have shown no damage from smog.

"Finally," Widmoyer says, "the Afghanistan pine is not attacked by any of the insects or diseases prevalent among most ornamental conifers."

The history of Afghanistan pine goes back 25 centuries to its origins in between the Caspian and Aral seas where it was the only planted-by-nature pine forest. There on the rocky outcropping called Eller Oukhi, the trees survived hundreds of thousands of years of high desert winds and scorching temperatures. and scorching temperatures.

#### U.S. ARMS SALES RISE

Jimmy Carter arrived in Washington determined to "reduce the (international) commerce in weapons" and seemingly embarrassed by "our nation's role as the world's leading arms salesman." What he discovered on entering the White House is that the real world is not much swayed by simple pleties.

For the fiscal year that ended September 30, American arms exports totalled \$13.7 billion, up from \$11.4 billion in fiscal 1977. These figures exclude unregistered private sales by American entrepreneurs to foreigners. The administration's disingenuous claim that arms exports were actually reduced was based on bookkeeping fakery. The White House conveniently ordered sales to Japan, Australia, New Zealand and all NATO nations deleted from the total.

created when Washington turns down potential customers.

Thus the chief effect of this country's unilateral restraint is to export jobs and the political influence arms sales frequently generate.

None of this means that Washington should give up altogether on the laudable objectives the President had in mind when he urged a reduction in the flow of American arms overseas. Africa, Asia and Latin America in particular need to spend more for economic development and less for sophisticated weaponry.

Experience, however, demonstrates that a decline in the international arms trade is unlikely unless the major exporting nations mutually agree to mandatory restraints. The Carter Administration has discussed the subject with the Soviet Union and several Western European countries, but without results so far. It should keep trying.

In the meantime, the administration might consider dropping the arbitrary dollar-volume vardstick as a measure of an acceptable export level. More relevant would be exports based on American security interests, desirable regional balances of power, and assessments of the legitimate defensive security needs of potential arms customers. Judging proposed sales on these criteria while working for effective multilateral restraints would yield a constructive export program that could pass any reasonable moral test. - News-Bulletin, Belen



# Prevent carbon monoxide deaths

Every winter people die, usually in theirsleep, from inhaling the fumes of an improperly vented or malfunctioning stove or

"Combustion furnes leaking into the house or backing up into a heating unit kill people and cause fires every heating season," Charles Hohn, Extension agricultural engineer at New Mexico State University, said.

Carbon monoxide fumes from any fuelburning range, space heater or furnace are poisonous. That's why you shouldn't use a gas range to take the chill off your kitchen and why you must always safely vent any type of fuel-burning heater or

furnace to the outdoors, Hohn said.

Fireplaces also need a good vent, so keep your chimney clean, Hohn said. Remove soot, broken bricks, bird nests and anything else that might hinder the escape of gas.

Test the chimney to see if it draws well. Hold a lighted match or piece of burning newspaper near the clean-out. If smoke goes right up the chimney, it's drawing properly.

If the chimney isn't drawing properly, check the outdoor height of your chimney or stovepipe. If chimney is not at the roof peak, it should extend at least 2 1/2 feet above the highest point.

On a flat roof, the chimney top or stovetop twently. should extend at least 3 feet above the rooftop.

Ideally, each stove or furnace should vent into a separate flue. Every time you add another pipe to a flue, it reduces the sucking action on the other pipes. If you have a part-time stove sharing a flue with the furnace, be sure to plug the chimney hole or close the damper tightly when the stove is not in use. Hohn said.

If you must vent two stoves into the same flue, run them in at different levels, at least 2 feet apart. If you remove the

The chimney top at the roof's peak stove, plug the chimney hole so the regular should come at least 2 feet above the peak. heating system can do its job more ef-

Check vent pipes routinely to make sure there are no holes or loose connections that would let gas fumes escape back into the house, Hohn said.

Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning are drowsiness, headaches, dizziness, confusion, nausea, muscular weakness and unconsciousness. If someone is overcome by carbon monoxide gas, get him to fresh air, start mouth-tomouth rescue breathing right away and call a doctor, Hohn said.

## Urethane insulation can be a fire hazard

During these chilly winter months, many New Mexicans consider installing more insulation in their farm buildings or homes. Urethane foam is an exceptionally effective insulation, but can also be a fire hazard if used improperly, Charles Hohn, Extension agricultural engineer at New Mexico State University, said.

Urethane has many advantages and is a popular insulation material. Rigid urethane foam is light weight, versatile, easy to work with and structurally strong. Its high thermal resistance makes it an efficient energy conserver.

characteristics of urethane foams vary providing a fire rating of 15 minutes or widely, depending on the formulation. Exposed plastic foam insulation can "flash-over" when ignited from an external heat source, such as an open flame, a cutting torch, a heater, or a hot drop of metal from an electric arc welder.

Because of these fire hazards, a thermal flame barrier should cover all surfaces of the foam insulation, Hohn said.

Urethane foam used in interior or ceiling construction should not be left exposed. Cover it with at least one-half inch of cement plaster, fire-rated gypsum high points of the ceiling help release heat wallboard or an equivalent barrier and vapors before the dangerous build-up

Exposed foam installed above a suspended ceiling requires a thermal barrier on both sides of the foam.

In case of a fire, the high insulating value of urethane foam on a ceiling can cause rapid heat build-up under the high points of the building. When temperatures reach 600 to 800 degrees, the foam may ignite, releasing dense smoke, carbon monoxide and flammable gases which can create a flash fire. Automatic heat vents at

Provide fire stops in large warehouse ceiling areas, between floors in multi-story buildings and at openings into pipe chases and ventilation shafts. Hohn said.

Urethane foam should not come in contact with chimneys, heater vents, steam pipes or other areas which could get hotter than the recommended tolerances. When urethane foam is used to fill cavities within masonry walls or in floors under concrete, no additional protection is needed, Hohn said.

## National Science Foundation interested in NMSU research

Representatives of the National Science Foundation visiting New Mexico State University (NMSU) this weekend expressed a keen interest in research into alternative biological materials which could substitute for petroleum and other products of critical national concern.

The Foundation invited NMSU's Agricultural Experiment Station and the Water Resources Research Institute to submit a preliminary research proposal to examine native and exotic plants which could be genetically engineered to produce in the Southwest. Ideally the plants could also be engineered to grow on the states's 15 billion acre/feet of underground brackish water.

Plant species under immediate, consideration for the project include Crambe

 a source of specialized oil and quality protein meal, Guayule - a natural rubber source, and Kochia and Russian Thistle potential cattle feeds. Limited research with these crops is already underway by the NMSU Agricultural Experiment Station.

"After 15 years of research experience with Crambe. I believe it has promise as a renewable resource for New Mexico and the Southwest," said Koert Lessman, associate director of the Experiment Station. "However, to strengthen its potential for this region, it will necessary to redesign the plant's genetic structure to thrive on brackish water."

Jojoba, salt grass, buffalo gourd, sun-flowers and devil's claws were other native plants mentioned as possible candidates for long term research.

"The nation's semi-arld and arid lands have never had their natural resources fully explored. But we are now ready to look into these areas," said Dr. Marvin Stephenson, acting director of the Foundation's division for research into alternative biological materials. "Eventually we would be interested in a systematic consideration of all native plants in this area as possible new sources of oil, food or fiber."

NMSU researchers also mentioned the possibility of developing varieties and production methods which would allow for the production of traditional crops, such as alfalfa, on brackish water or limited supplies of 'good' water.

"The proposed research would examine the reaction of the soil to long term applications of brackish water," Dr.



Dear Wayne - I would like to begin handloading ammunition for my .30-06 rifle. I have no equipment, very little know how, and my budget is rather limited. What would be the bare minimum equipment I need to get started? Ernie B.,

Dear Ernie — An excellent beginning is a Lee Loader kit. These kits are complete reloading outfits furnished with one set of dies for the caliber of your choice. The least expensive kit is about twelve dollars. Of course you have to provide the powder, primers and bullets.

These hand-held kits are precise and reliable. But they are designed for the occasional reloader. Those wishing to load a large number of cartridges at a sitting, in the least amount of time, would likely make a better choice with a larger, bench mounted model.

Considering that the Lee kits are much less expensive than the cheapest bench outfits, they provide an excellent opportunity to learn the basics of handloading at a bargain price. Most catalogs offering reloading equipment will include

Dear Wayne - A few months ago you ran a column concerning the controversial issues of gun control. In it you mentioned the "Saturday Night Special." There is much uncertainty in my mind about which handguns fit into this category. Could you clarify this? Bill C., North Carolina

Dear Bill - In its original context, it was thought to indicate handguns which were cheaply made and easily concealable. But if you think about it, criminals don't have a preference for cheaply made handguns. They can buy or steal what they need, and it's just as apt to be an expensive, well made model. Then too, what handgun isn't easily concealable?

Since its origin the term has been modified by anti-gun lobbyists and proposed legislation to a point where it is so indefinite its meaning is practically obscure. More than 75 percent of all

handguns, including expensive, well made models, would be defined as "Saturday Night Specials" under some of the legislative proposals. And that's ridiculous. The phrase is now so distorted and inflated it can be considered useless.

Dear Wayne - For some crazy reason, I have gotten the notion that I would like to take a hunting trip for caribou. While I am not wealthy, I can afford to travel anywhere in the country in search of them. Where would I go to find the largest caribou which might provide the best trophy? Walt S., Florida

Dear Walt - There are three species of caribou. They are: Mountain Caribou, Barren Ground Caribou and Woodland Caribou. Of these, the Mountain Caribou is the largest in size. Of the two sub-species of the Mountain clan, the Rocky Mountain group is the largest. Rocky Mountain Caribou are found in Alberta and British Columbia, Canada.

This makes the second such big money stakes to be announced by general manager R. Wood Erwin in less than a month.

The first announcement concerned the All-American Gold Cup, a 440 yard dash which is scheduled to debut in 1982 and is expected to pack a gross purse of about \$250,000 in its initial running.
