# Commercial development control sought in Ruidoso

Conformance to the provisions of Ordinance Number 77-7, pertaining to future commercial and industrial development in Ruidoso, is now being required by the Architectural Plans Review Committee (APRC), chairman Alden Deyo announced today.

The newly adopted ordinance is directed to "C-1, commercial, and M-1, industrial, zoning, established by the Planning and Zoning Commission," Deyo said.

APRC's aims, under ordinance

provisions, include:  
— Insuring the development of attractive business complexes through erecting buildings compatible with the surroundings.  
— Utilization of western style architecture, featuring indigenous materials and colors that will enhance the structure's beauty.  
— Encouraging appropriate external decor, regardless of the basic building materials employed.

— Provisions for adequate parking.  
— Landscaping to preserve as many trees as possible and to insure adequate, non-erosion, drainage.  
Deyo recommends that owners of property to be developed in the C-1 and M-1 classification:

Norman Wheeler announced his candidacy Tuesday for the office of mayor in the municipal election in Ruidoso Downs Tuesday, March 7.

Wheeler was serving on the council when the mayor's seat was vacated in June, 1976. He was appointed by the council at that time to fill the position and has since served in the office of mayor.

He said, "I'm seeking the office of mayor because it's important to me to see that the citizens of Ruidoso Downs are truly and actively represented. I sincerely feel I'm in a position to do this. I take pride in my family, my home, and my business; so, naturally, I want to take pride in the

— Deliver initial plans and ideas to village inspector Chuck Brown at village hall.

— Obtain regulations on village restrictions applicable in different commercial areas.

— Discuss, with APRC, as soon as tentative building plans are developed, the proposed final product, from design to landscaping to parking.

"Compliance with these provisions," APRC member Mike Mulholland said, "to aid architectural planning, can very well cut building expenses through having an agreement on the planned development before proceeding with any work."

"By meeting with the APRC ahead of time, before issuance of a building permit by the village inspector, many problems that might arise, if this procedure isn't followed, can be avoided."

APRC's main goal is to examine and discuss building plans at the time the decision to start C-1 or M-1 construction is made.

"In the past," Deyo said, "builders of businesses have started tree removal and land excavation prior to even applying for a building permit."

"Under the provisions of Ordinance 77-7, no soil excavation or tree cutting may begin until a building permit is issued and APRC approval of all building plans is required before the permit can be issued."

Another APRC objective is the control of vacant land use, to obtain compliance with state laws.

"What APRC needs," Mulholland said, "is to have violations of landscaping regulations, or any site work that is started before issuance of a building permit, reported to us. If this is done, we can exercise greater control over commercial and industrial building."

APRC meetings are scheduled the first Wednesday of each month, in the Ruidoso Public Library, immediately following the Planning and Zoning Commission meeting at 7:30 p.m. Special APRC meetings can be called, Deyo said, "if the time element involved warrants it."

# Fire prevention program planned for Ruidoso area

A pilot fire prevention program for the Ruidoso area, designed to become a model for other heavily forested areas in the nation, will be launched here Friday as a cooperative effort involving the United States Forest Service, New Mexico State Forestry, Lincoln County and the Village of Ruidoso.

A steering committee of five to seven residents, not directly involved with the forest services or county or municipal government, are to be selected Friday in the office of village manager Jim Hine by officials and forestry personnel.

Larry Bandy, Capitan, State Forestry Fire Prevention Specialist, Tuesday said to The News, "This steering committee will be charged with developing fire prevention, reforestation and related programs for the immediate Ruidoso area."

"Persons desiring to be considered to serve on this committee should contact Hine, or Smokey Bear District Ranger Ray Page, not later than 9 a.m., Friday," Bandy noted that part time residents, those owning second homes in heavily forested areas, are being encouraged to seek committee membership.

Bandy also said that plans are underway to secure funding for the committee, that approved projects may be inaugurated "and carried out."

Specifically the committee will be charged with developing guideline programs to prevent forest fires.

Of nearly equal importance will be instituting programs teaching residents in high fire potential areas how to cope with periods of high or extreme fire danger.

The committee will also be charged with educational programs, such as field trips into old burns to "instruct and inform the people" about fire damage, Bandy said.

steering committee, acting as a pilot planning group, is to be named Friday, with organization to follow at an early date, Bandy told The News. Funding for the committee is anticipated.

The Moon Mountain Fire area, Bandy said, "would be ideal for instructional purposes, due to the number of trees that were growing in the burned section."

The committee's work, Hine said, "is of

vital importance to Ruidoso because it is a rapidly developing area, and the greater the growth, the greater the fire danger."

One major concern of the committee, Bandy said, "is the problem of over-

crowding of trees. The program will promote removal of excess trees to promote healthier stands through wider

# Home service grant ends

Home Health Services of Lincoln County, which was begun in August 1976 under a Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) grant which has since expired, needs "community support to stay viable," director Verna Stoltzfus Adams, R.N., said Tuesday.

The nonprofit service which offers skilled nursing care in the home to

qualifying patients of all ages was begun "to get health care initiated in rural areas under the HEW seed grant," she said.

Under the proposal, once the grant has expired "the community will pick up the deficit."

At present, Verna said most of her work is "reimbursed by Medicare and Medicare, but not all, as not all persons

who need service qualify for Medicare/Medicaid."

To aid Home Health Services, Rotary and Altrusa clubs have each given donations of \$500 and the Service Club Council will approach State Senate Minority Leader John Conway of Alamogordo on the possibility of state funding.

## C-C finances brighter

Again in December disbursements at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce exceeded income, but accountant Donald Dorman told the board of directors at their noon luncheon meeting Wednesday he is optimistic about the Chamber's financial outlook.

In a comparison of finances at the Chamber for the previous two fiscal years with the present eight months of the fiscal year, Dorman said the Chamber has "effected a turnaround of sorts . . . and reduced the downhill trend into a holding pattern."

Dorman said during the previous two fiscal years, the Chamber operated at a deficit which totaled \$46,800 by May 1, 1977, and that during this period of deficit spending the Chamber undertook remodeling of the office, purchase of new office equipment and the WATS line project increasing the total deficit to \$52,000.

During the two years, revenue generating projects brought an income of \$25,000 and Lodgers' Tax funds brought \$15,000.

This left a total operating deficit for the two years of \$12,500.

The Chamber had some funds at the start of the fiscal year in 1978 but spent all of that and were still in debt \$4,500 at the start of the current fiscal year May 1, 1977. Dorman said "as a result of the eight-

month period of activity this fiscal year," the Chamber has generated \$2,000 in revenue, over their operating expenses, reducing the \$4,500 debt to \$1,700.

One method the Chamber has employed to increase revenue is to cut down on operating expenses.

On the average the monthly operating expenses at the Chamber for the previous two fiscal years was \$4,900. This fiscal year it has been cut to \$4,400.

Executive director of the Chamber John Hobbs said he felt the monthly operating expenses could be cut to \$3,800, thus further increasing revenue and lowering the debt.

Recent cuts made at the Chamber include extending the lease on the Chamber vehicle to reduce payments, canceled lease on the postage meter (a reduction of about \$100), turned in the copying machine (a monthly expense of \$26) and canceled the \$55 monthly janitorial service.

"We are making every effort to eliminate expenses and I'm confident we can reduce our monthly operating expenses to \$3,800," Hobbs said.

In other business, the board: — Heard a report from Forest Service representatives Ray Page, Smokey Bear District Ranger, Joe Spehar, recreation and land use forester, and Jim Paxon, snow ranger, on the possibility of improving and expanding the Cedar Creek recreation area.

— Heard a report from chairman of the nominating committee Dave Wilson that five names have been selected for the board to choose from to fill positions

vacated by Larry Scarborough and Dave Brown.

Nominated to the board of directors were Bill Fugate, Ronnie Taylor, Betty Montero, John Hall and Dema Scott.

Board members present cast ballots and those not present will be requested to come by the Chamber offices to cast their votes.

— Also selected a committee of Jane Deyo, chairman, Rod Adamson, Tuffy Wilson, Rex Baffey and Mary Parsons to present a list of 15 nominees for the seven board positions which will be vacated in March.

President of the board Roy "Pinky" Jones will serve as an ex-officio member of the committee and board member Bob Finley will be an alternate.

— Authorized the special events committee to continue with plans discussed at a recent meeting.

Member of the committee Dave Wilson told the board the committee would like to conduct monthly dinners and programs. Proposals include a dinner/auktion February 27, a talent revue in March and a gridiron roast in April.

— Requested Hobbs write a letter to the commander of Holloman Air Force Base in protest of the sonic booms blasting Ruidoso in recent days.

Hobbs received board sanction to send a carbon copy to New Mexico congressman Harold Runnels.

— Heard a report from Hobbs that \$2,000 of Lodgers' Tax funds has been spent in radio spots in Abeline, Lubbock, Houston and Austin to promote Sierra Blanca Ski Area.

## Parking, camping restrictions to be enforced at Bonito Lake

With congestion and resultant problems, parking restrictions and camping regulations at Bonito Lake will be enforced, Joe Spehar, recreation and land use forester of Smokey Bear Ranger District, said Monday.

"From the dam up the road to just before the Southfork campground turnout, signs were posted last autumn during a low use period which specify parking only in signed areas," he said.

"Parking only will be allowed in the designated turnouts. There will be no camping in those turnouts."

Spehar said camping will be allowed elsewhere on the forest including further up Bonito Canyon and in Southfork campground.

"Our first concern (in enforcing the parking and camping rules) was the safety aspect."

"Vehicles were occupying all available space, both in the turnouts and along the shoulders and sometimes only a single lane would be open causing blind corners."

Other problems caused by congestion included the danger of a vehicle hitting a pedestrian stepping out from between parked cars and vehicles blindly pulling

out into traffic.

"Another reason for enforcing the rules is the resultant overuse of the reservoir contributing to water degradation," Spehar said.

"Garbage has been found in and along the lake and self-contained units have been dumping their holding tanks into the reservoir."

"Citations have been issued in the past, but there is a great disparity between the number who do it and the number who get caught."

Other reasons camping will not be

allowed in the parking only areas include "campers use space which could be used by the day fisherman or picnicker and campers leave their recreation vehicles in the parking areas and go off to do other things in a second vehicle."

Spehar foresaw problems with enforcing the regulations and restrictions as "we are trying to change use habits of several years duration."

"There probably was no problem when the road was constructed but with the increase in popularity of the Ruidoso area and the increase in use, problems have developed."

spacing to help prevent disease, to reduce combustible ground cover and help in reducing fire danger."

Bandy said that there'd be "no wholesale" cutting of trees, but that this portion of the pilot program would be carefully studied to achieve "maximum fire protection, the highest possible quality of trees and to control the spread of disease."

Reforestation of burned areas will be a committee concern, Bandy said. "In these sections of the Ruidoso area it may, due to their rapid growth rate as compared to pines, be prudent to plant aspens and cedars, which would also be a colorful addition to the countryside, as well as providing stands of healthy trees."

This pilot program is designed to be expanded into the Bonito area. "It is to develop a process for fire prevention planning for the county, especially a solid plan for immediate adoption in and near Ruidoso," Bandy said.

Government agencies involved will work closely with the committee in offering technical assistance coordination.

The committee, once formed and functional, will meet at regular intervals to develop this pilot program. "If this fire prevention plan develops successfully here," Bandy said, "and projects prove worthy, the forest services will implement the plan in other areas of the nation where forest fires are a major problem."

At Friday's meeting the names selected

for initial committee membership will be submitted to State Forestry officials for approval.

"Once the committee is organized," Bandy said, "the regular planning meetings will be scheduled, with the primary intent being to educate the public on fire prevention measures."

"From simple promotions, like children with matches cause forest fires, to dumping hot ashes on the forest floor, to developing controlled stands of healthy trees, the committee's function will be to perfect solid, easy to understand, fire prevention programs."

Hine also said, "The news that this pilot program will be developed here is the best news, fire prevention wise, that we've ever had. The governing body will do everything in their power to assist this committee, to the end that the danger of man-caused forest fires will be materially reduced here."

## Registration, voting details are announced





## Students paint world map

High scorers were Wesley Moore, 30 points, and Clay Blank, 18.


The Warriors' next game will be against Hagerman in the first leg of the Dexter Tournament.

ABOUT TO GET THE JUMP on the rebound is Sean Mound, '00





## News from the County Agent

Woolgrowers received some good news recently. The incentive price for wool has been increased from 72c to 89c per pound for 1977. This means that the average woolgrower is likely to receive a wool incentive payment on his 1977 clip.

The Agricultural Statistical Service reports the simple average price for 1977 at 73 cents per pound. This is not an official price figure, but it has been within 2 cents for the past several years. If this is true the incentive payment would be about 30% of the net wool sales during 1977.

Rabbits, mice and deer often cause considerable damage to fruit and shade trees during the winter. You can reduce the damage to your trees by using Thiram as a repellent. It can be sprayed on and will protect trees up to three months. Thiram is also used as a fungicide to treat seed to prevent damping off. Arasan 42-S contains Thiram and is apparently the only animal repellent registered in New Mexico. For more particulars contact the

County Extension Agent in Carrizozo.

Be sure of a water supply before you build a house or even before you purchase the land to build the house. Many new homes are being built in rural areas where it is necessary to provide an on-lot water supply. Builders and potential homeowners should determine the possibility of providing water before purchasing a homesite lot.

Frequently local information relating to the water supply situation or possible success in drilling a well can be obtained from builders, plumbers and well drillers working in the area. Ask families living in the area about their experiences in drilling a well — depth, amount and quality of water and cost. To insure an adequate supply of water, the builder should plan for a minimum of 50 gallons per person per day. This is reasonable when you consider that many new homes are including showers, automatic dishwashers, automatic laundry machines and garbage disposals.

Village of Ruidoso Downs since this is where my family, home, and business are located. I would like all the people in Ruidoso Downs to feel the same way about our village.

"There are numerous projects in the works at city hall that I want very much to see through to completion. Most important, of course, is our sewer system and treatment plant which is now in Step Two (planning, design, property acquisition). Step Three (construction) should begin next year. It should be completed and operational approximately two years after that, in 1981.

"We've just had approved by the Highway Department state funding for one and three fourths miles of paving of some of our streets, which is a fair beginning.

"We are pushing hard to get the bill through this legislature that will mean extra revenue for our village from the state's collection of daily racing fees. We nearly had this through the last legislature, but, unfortunately, it was tabled and on the last day died on adjournment.

"We are beginning the process of purchasing water rights so that, barring drought conditions, we won't be faced with the water shortages we often have during our summer months.

"Airport development is going to be a positive factor in our region's future, and Ruidoso Downs should continue to be actively involved and represented in this important area.

"One of the greatest projects that could happen to Ruidoso Downs, as far as I'm concerned, would be the construction of a

city hall - police department - fire department complex. We apply for federal funding for this through the Public Works Grant each time money is let but thus far we've been passed over.





## Victim Restitution Program meeting in Alamogordo

A public meeting to discuss the Victim Restitution Program that is being implemented in Lincoln and Otero Counties will be held in Alamogordo at 7 p.m., January 24, at the Brazilian Room of the Holiday Inn.

Governor Apodaca recently announced that \$40,000 was awarded by the Governor's Council on Criminal Justice Planning to implement the pilot project. The project designed to increase restitution to victims of crime was developed by the Technical Assistance Division of the Governor's Council and the District Judges, District Attorney, Public Defender and the Adult Probation Office of the Twelfth Judicial District.

John Ramming, director of the Technical Assistance Division, said, "The main reasons for choosing the Twelfth Judicial District for the pilot project was the close working relationship exhibited by the local criminal justice officials and the progressive nature of the communities involved."

A major facet of the program is the providing of job training to carefully selected offenders so that they can pay restitution to the victims. The meeting January 24 is part of an effort to recruit local employers who might be interested and able to provide job training. Details of the training aspect of the pilot project will be discussed at the meeting by a spokesman from the Governor's Council on Criminal Justice Planning.

Specifics of the proposed program, of interest to potential employers, is outlined in the following paragraphs. The Twelfth Judicial District is participating in a unique program to provide restitution to victims of crime. The pilot project is the first of its kind in the nation and was developed through the combined efforts of your District Judges, District Attorney, Public Defender and local Adult Probation Office. The Governor's Council on Criminal Justice Planning through its Technical Assistance Division is providing support and assistance in implementing the pilot program.

**PURPOSE OF THE PROGRAM:** To increase the use of restitution to victims of crime and to involve the victim more in the criminal justice process.

**Secondary purpose:** Since restitution is as good as the offender's ability to pay, certain offenders selected by the judge after careful screening are to be placed in on-the-job training if such training is needed. This training will provide the offender with marketable job skills so he can pay restitution to the victim, support himself and his family, and become a taxpayer instead of a tax burden.

**HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS:** We are inviting private employers from the area to participate in this unique approach to victim restitution. These employers will be asked to provide selected offenders with on-the-job training for a period of up to six months. Through an L.E.A.A. grant from the Governor's Council on Criminal Justice Planning to the Adult Probation Department, the offender will be paid a \$3.00 per hour stipend during the training period. The offenders will be on probation and will be required to pay restitution to the victim. A contract between the Probation Department and the employer will create the employer/employee relationship necessary for supervision of the trainee. The employer providing the training will have full rights of job supervision including the right of suspension or discharge. The employer will keep a bi-weekly time sheet which will be forwarded to the Adult Probation Office so that stipend payments can be made to the trainee. The Adult Probation Department will take care of necessary deductions for social security, federal withholding and workmen's compensation. If the employer desires, he may pay the trainee a salary in addition to the stipend as training progresses, but this is entirely up to the employer. The employer will be asked to participate with the Probation Office in evaluating the progress of the trainee. While the employer is under no obligation to do so, he will be asked to make a good faith effort to retain the offender after the training period.

**HOW CAN YOU HELP:** If you are an employer in Lincoln or Otero Counties and you think you might be able to provide training to a selected offender required to make restitution, please let us know. Either contact your local Adult Probation Office (437-2285) or write Mark Colvin, Governor's Council on Criminal Justice Planning, 425 Old Santa Fe Trail, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87503. We will put your name in a training resource pool and contact you for specific information on the type of training you might offer. You are under no obligation if you are placed in the resource pool. You have the final say on any individual offender.

## Youth corps is readied


Federal and state agencies are again sponsoring a summer Youth Conservation Corps program, to provide more than 700 eight-week jobs for New Mexico youths 15 to 17 years old.

Locally the United States Forest Service will operate camps near Cloudcroft and Ruidoso with a Fish Wildlife Service camp at the Mesalero fish hatchery.

From 10 to 50 enrollees will be at each camp with most workers commuting to and from their homes, though a few camps will be residential. The pay will be \$2.65 per hour.

Recruiting workers begins January 20 and ends March 17. Employment Security Commission offices have application forms. Participants will be selected at random by computer and may be stationed anywhere in the state.

### DAM INSPECTIONS

**THE FEELING** that it's about time is pervasive as the federal dams inspection ordered by Congress five years ago finally gets underway. That feeling is well justified. There had been unconscionable delay since Congress, in 1972, directed the Corps of Engineers to carry out a nationwide dam safety inspection program "as soon as possible." Not until the recent disaster at Toccoa, Georgia, which took 39 lives did this undertaking get off dead center. It seems less important to try to allocate the blame now that it is to get on with the program. Still, the in-fighting that caused the delay should not go unnoted.

That phrase in the law, "as soon as practicable," boiled down to: when the money is there to do the job. After the law was passed the executive branch in effect passed the buck; it did not seek funds for the inspection program, on the grounds that this was a state responsibility. Then Congress took the initiative last summer, voting \$15 million to get the program started — but the administration did not release the money. The fatal collapse of the dam at Toccoa jarred things loose.

That is a disquieting sequence of events. This is all the more true because the federal government knew long ago that there are thousands of dams in "high hazard" locations, and that a great many of them never have been inspected by either state or federal authorities.

The idea that such inspection is a state responsibility may have merit. As a practical matter, however, this stricture should have been weighed against the likelihood that this responsibility would be met. Fewer than half of the states have adequate dam inspection programs. Under these circumstances it was the federal government's responsibility, given its overriding concern for the safety and welfare of the public, to step in.

This was the sense of the congressional directive of 1972. It is gratifying that the directive is now being carried out. But in our judgment the five-year postponement of the program was inexcusable. —The Valley Courier, Alamosa, Colorado

### GOOD DAY'S PAY

Ordinary wage slaves — ordinary tycoons, even, with their stock options and all — may find it discomfiting to learn that Johnny Carson's new contract will pay him more than \$2 million a year. Their minds may be further boggled by the tidings that for this munificent sum he will be required to put in only 25 weeks of toil, and a three-day week at that. There's no use being glum about it, certainly no use fulminating on the theme of disproportionate rewards. Our society pays top entertainers far more than it pays senators, professors, plumbers, Supreme Court judges, or even presidents. Carson will pull down a fortune a year because he pulls 'em in for The Message. As that fellow on the news says, that's the way it is. —Alamogordo Daily News

**SANTA FE** — A veteran and influential House Democrat denounces a proposal by State Senate leaders to cut payroll and general patronage costs during the legislative session as a "smokescreen." The leader, who did not want his name used, said Senate elders publicly suggested that both houses curtail "excessive" session-oriented payrolls as a way of detracting attention from a more basic power struggle.

He said public attention would be focused on the issue of payrolls while the Senate would in a quieter way be trying to accomplish the second half of the proposals offered by its powerful Committee on Committees — to place the two houses on an equal basis in the operation of so-called "interim committees."

The interim committees are made up of both House and Senate members, who meet between the annual lawmaking sessions to hear testimony and prepare key legislation on major subjects for the full sessions.

But traditionally, House members always have outnumbered senators on interim committees, based on their relative numbers — there are 70 representatives and 42 senators.

Now the Senate Committee on Committees, launching what has become an annual clash between the two chambers, says there should be equal representation from both bodies and that no bill could be reported as a committee recommendation unless both House and Senate committee members give it a majority vote.

Meanwhile, a highly-placed aide to Gov. Jerry Apodaca took exception to the possibility the governor's own legislative proposals might suffer as a result of the House-Senate scuffle.

"We can and will work with both houses," he said. "If anything, the

governor's position might be strengthened. What if they were united, and in opposition to us?"

All participants in the backroom political maneuvering associated with one of New Mexico's top federal positions have gained a little time.

A panel of the State Bar Association changed from January 6 to January 20, the deadline date for applications for U.S. Attorney.

It's a presidential appointment, but it requires U.S. Senate approval. Democrat Nick Franklin, top aide to Gov. Jerry Apodaca, was said to be the Carter Administration's original choice.

But since both the state's U.S. senators are Republicans, they sought strong participation in the selection process — and got the Washington Administration's okay for the Bar Association selection panel.

Robert Poole, Albuquerque lawyer who served as the panel's temporary chairman, now has been replaced by J. R. Crouch of Las Cruces, former head of the State Bar Association, although Poole will remain a committee member.

Other members are attorneys Ernest Valdez of Santa Fe and Charles Malone of Roswell.

Women's groups are predicting victory this legislative session for a measure which would strengthen enforcement and prosecution of rape cases.

This will be the third session a sexual crimes bill has been introduced, but the first two times it would have applied only to three counties, on a pilot basis.

This measure is statewide in nature. It's chief Senate sponsor will be Sen. Gladys Hansen, D-Donna Ana, and it will be introduced in the House by Rep. Fred Mondragon, D-Bernalillo.


### GOURMET ARMY COOKS





**FIKO PETE** [88] scrambled to a half-length win in Saturday's ninth race and was clocked in a spring seasonal record of 1:17 flat for 6 1/2 furlongs. Gilbert Villescias was aboard. Jockey Ramon Apodaca, who finished second aboard Indi's Pluff, lodged a claim of foul against the winner, but the stewards tossed out the plea.

**APPRENTICE JAIMI MAXWELL**, the most recent Jockey-of-the-Week, continues to attract attention. One of his best jobs over the weekend was the tissue-thin nose win he engineered with Wooded Imp (\$7.80) in Saturday's third race at a mile. Wooded Imp was on the pace the whole way.

Wooded Imp was on the pace the whole way. **THREE CONTENTERS** in Saturday's eighth race had a hard-fought duel at the wire. It looked like a battle between Peaceful Master, the 8-5 favorite on the rail, and Honor Scout, a 3-1 shot on the outside. But Bins Hit at 12-1 wasn't far off. He squeezed through at the last moment for a nose victory and a \$26 payoff.

**CHRIS O'DELL** brought in his second winner as an apprentice in Friday's tenth race. His mount, Flying Troy, was well back in the early stages of the mile route, but came on with a rush in the stretch to take the lead from Prove Me Game. The winning margin was a head. Chris is the son of Trainer James O'Dell.

## Social Security information

The 1978 Medicare general enrollment period is January through March, giving those persons eligible, but who do not have this health insurance, an opportunity to gain this valuable protection," Dan Mathis, social security field representative, has announced.

Those eligible to sign up for Medicare's medical insurance, which helps pay doctor bills and other covered services and supplies, include people who failed to sign up during their earlier opportunities and those who once had this insurance but dropped it.

Also, people 65 and over who are not otherwise eligible for the hospital insurance part of Medicare can sign up to buy this protection from January through March, but only if they also sign up for medical insurance.

Protection for people who sign up for either or both parts of Medicare will begin July 1.

The basic premium is increased by 10 percent for each 12 months a person could have had this protection but did not elect to take it. The hospital insurance premium is \$4 a month through June. The basic monthly premiums for both types of insurance which will be effective in July will be announced later this year, according to Mathis.

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

**Federal Workers  
Must Be Protected  
From  
Political Pressures**



by John W. Gardner

If you're a federal worker, none of your superiors has a right to come around and ask you for a political contribution. Nor can they ask that you get out and help re-elect the President or behave in any way as a partisan. The Hatch Act protects our civil servants from that kind of partisan political pressure.

A bill now before Congress will, if passed, change all this. It will result in fierce political pressure on our millions of federal workers. And it will place at the disposal of future administrations a powerful weapon to perpetuate the continuance of their own party in office. The bill in question would repeal the Hatch Act, which now prohibits federal employees from engaging in certain partisan political activities.

This is a crucial matter because if any future administration could enlist the huge federal work force in the service of its political aims, it would enormously enhance the capacity of that administration to stay in power. And a heavily politicized federal service could intimidate citizens whose political persuasion didn't fit the mold of the moment.

Will we ever learn? Thomas Jefferson warned us. He said if we wanted an impartial government and wanted to protect the rights of federal employees to impartial treatment we should work toward the ideal of the politically neutral civil servant. He said for a federal employee to try to influence the votes of others was "inconsistent with the spirit of the Con-

stitution and his duties to it."

At first we ignored Jefferson's advice, and evils multiplied, evils that had to be corrected over and over—by the Civil Service Act in 1883, by an Executive Order of Theodore Roosevelt's in 1907, and most conclusively by the Hatch Act in 1939.

Now there are those who would reverse more than a century and a half of hard-earned experience and throw the principle out the window. They say the Hatch Act deprives federal workers of their political rights.

But that simply isn't true. Under the Hatch Act federal workers can still register, vote, express their political views freely, join political groups and vote at meetings, attend conventions and rallies, sign petitions, and lobby members of Congress or state or local officials.

The only things they can't do are run for partisan office, be active in partisan political campaigns or partisan political management, or engage in the solicitation of campaign contributions. If they are allowed to do these things the vast agencies of government will sooner or later become the instrument of some politically aggressive and unscrupulous administration—and it will take an act of God to blast that administration out of office.

Let's keep the Hatch Act.
