Texas radio station boosting skiing here

Skiing in Ruidoso is being touted by radio station KITZ, Seminole, Texas, Ralph Copeland, president of RRR Broadcasting, said to The News Wednesday.

"On Valentine's Day," Copeland said, "KITZ will award one couple a skiing weekend in Ruidoso. It's a promotion that is attracting widespread attention in our coverage area."

"Included in the prize will be accommodations at the Swiss Chalet, with steam baths, with dinners at Cousins' and the Miner's Camp."

"KITZ is proud to be giving skiing in Ruidoso a plug, as we feel the facilities here are second to none."

Copeland also said, "Just this morning I took out an associate membership in the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. I'm very much interested in Ruidoso and decided to help, though it's in a small way, in its growth and business development."

Teen Center will be built

The Ruidoso Noon Lions Wednesday awarded the contract for the Teen Center and community building to Ace Building and Supply of Hobbs.

Scheduling calls for construction of the 60x120-foot building, with 14 foot walls, to begin in May.

"Actual erection time," Charlie Wilson of Ace Building said, "will require about 10 days. After the building is up, the Lions can decide on partitioning, the number of rooms and furnishings."

Noon Lions president Bill Morrison, in announcing the awarding of the bid, said, "The Noon Lions, with the financial assistance of the other community organizations, as well as individuals, decided to go ahead with the \$75,000 building to serve our youth, without applying for grants or any other outside funding. This building is primarily intended to serve the youth of the Ruidoso area and the Noon Lions will see that the building is put to use this summer."

New fire management officer assigned here

Steve Makowski, formerly of Clifton Ranger District in Arizona, began duties as Smokey Bear Ranger District fire management officer Monday.


A 10-year veteran of the United States Department of Agriculture forest service, Makowski began as a junior forester on the Smokey Bear District of Lincoln National forest.

He also has worked in timber at Springerville and Alpine ranger districts of Apache National Forest in Arizona and as a fire officer at this most recent post in Clifton.

"As fire management officer, I hope to carry on with the present efforts to coordinate and cooperate with the various volunteer organizations and political subdivisions," he said.

Makowski, who replaces Bob Wagenfehr, who took a position in September as assistant director of cooperative forest protection in the Albuquerque forest service offices, received a BS in forest management from Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff in 1967.

He and his wife, Marcia, have two children, Candice, 8, who is attending Nob Hill School, and Cicelee, 3.

GRANT SOURCES BEING PURSUED

County seeks ambulances

The Lincoln County Commissioners agreed Monday to contact two funding sources for possible grants for acquisition of two ambulances.

"Federal funding is available from the Emergency Medical Services Act for developing regional medical service," county manager Les Olsen said.

"They have requested we send a need proposal which we will submit for planning purposes only."

On the proposal for Lincoln County, Olsen said he would indicate a need for two more ambulances and equipment for the present ambulances.

"We would have to match 40 percent of the cost of the ambulances and 25 percent of the other equipment, but the maximum amount the county would have to provide would be \$23,700 and we would receive \$75,000 to \$80,000 in equipment."

The other agency the county will contact for possible funding for acquisition of another ambulance is the State Highway

Department traffic safety division, which is providing funds for ambulances to serve highway accidents.

"The traffic safety division will provide 100 percent funding of an ambulance as part of a program to provide ambulances on the highway system to serve areas where there is a high incidence of accidents," Olsen said.

Representative of the traffic safety division Milton Matson, who attended the meeting, gave Olsen an application for funding.

The commissioners also agreed a new ambulance would be put in use in Ruidoso and one Ruidoso ambulance would be transferred to the jurisdiction of the Bonito Fire Department in Alto.

In other business, the commissioners:

— Agreed to settle out of court with the Jockey Club and Ira Miller, owner of the land where Ruidoso Downs Race Track is situated, on two separate tax protests which have been under litigation for

several years.

— Approved a request by the Sheriff's Department for sanction to seek a Law Enforcement Assistance Act (LEAA) grant for purchase of complete photographic darkroom equipment and 35 mm cameras for the deputies.

If the \$8,000 grant request is approved by the LEAA, the county will provide 10 percent of the funds or \$874.

— Postponed opening of bids on fleet vehicle insurance until the February 13 meeting as no bids have been received.

"We have had several calls and I expect we will have a sufficient number of bids by February 13," Olsen said.

The present insurance, which expires next week, will be extended one month.

— Awarded a county fuel supply contract to the apparent low bidder of Dean Oil Company of Capitan, whose bids were 48.5 cents per gallon of gasoline and 40.3 cents per gallon for diesel.

The other bidder, LaMay Distributing

Company, offered gasoline at 50 cents per gallon and diesel at 41.5 cents per gallon.

— Heard a report from county ambulance coordinator Bud Payne there were 40 applicants for the Hondo emergency medical technician (EMT) course to be taught by Devil Bill Adams. Only 20 could take the course and priority was given to ambulance personnel, law enforcement officers, hospital personnel and members of the schools.

— Approved a resolution combining absentee voting in Carrizozo and Angus.

— Heard a report from Olsen that an extraterritorial planning commission has been organized in Capitan; deputy sheriff Daniel Watson is now certified and been promoted, and that the county is negotiating with the State Department of Hospitals and Institutions and Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center for use of the vacant Carrizozo Hospital.

The next commissioners meeting will be at 10 a.m., February 13.

Atwood seeks second term as trustee

W. S. (Sherman) Atwood announced today he is a candidate for a second term as village trustee in the March 7 municipal election.

"During these past four years I've been a trustee," Atwood said, "the village has made good strides toward permanent expansion and improvements in the water and sewer system and we're now making solid progress toward having construction begin on Eagle Creek Dam this year."

"I want to continue on the council so I can do everything possible to see these

Ticket fielded for Downs council

Five candidates — one for mayor and four for trustees — announced Wednesday they are running for office in the March 7 village election in Ruidoso Downs.

Heading the ticket is Jake Harris, for mayor, with Ray Parnell, 'Dee' Dennis, Don Clark and Ray Reed for trustees.

"We're running as a ticket," Harris said, "as 'Concerned Citizens for Better Government in Ruidoso Downs' and, as a group, we favor:

"Expediting the development of the Regional Wastewater Facility to serve

Ruidoso Downs and Ruidoso; "Expansion of the village's present water system; "Street improvement; and, "Developing better communications between village hall and the citizens."

HARRIS, a Lincoln County resident since 1917, came to Ruidoso Downs, then Palo Verde, in 1940. He is a charter member of the Volunteer Fire Department and served six years as chief. His previous service to the village includes four years as trustee and two years as mayor, 1972-73.

"During my term as mayor," Harris said, "we passed the sewer bond and I want to continue to improve the system."

He owned and operated the Harris Lumber Company in Ruidoso Downs for about 25 years and the past six years has owned and operated Jake's Sand and Gravel.

RAY PARNELL, a Ruidoso Downs native, is owner of Chaparral Well Drilling and Service. He lived there from 1944-1950 and returned from Albuquerque in December of 1974.

His wife, Lorna, owned and operated Lorna's Restaurant from May 1975 to December 1977. His father, H. A. Parnell, was Ruidoso Downs' first mayor and his mother, Dorothy Parnell, was Ruidoso Downs' first postmaster, serving from 1947 to 1975.

He is a member of the Ruidoso Elks.

'DEE' DENNIS, retired from the United States Navy since 1968, came to Ruidoso Downs in 1973, after owning and operating the San Patricio Bar.

DON CLARK, a Ruidoso resident since 1973 and salesman with Sierra Blanca

Motor Company, moved here from Yates Center, Kansas. He has been associated with the local garage almost three years. He was elected a Ruidoso Downs trustee in 1974, resigning after 18 months "for personal reasons."

RAY REED, permanent resident of Ruidoso Downs since 1946, owns and operates the Arco Service Station. Reed is well known as an entertainer, for his public relations work with Ruidoso Downs Race Track for many years and as a director of Lincoln County Mule-O-Rama Association.



Ruidosoans pushing local development at Santa Fe

A delegation of seven Ruidoso businessmen will attend the second annual Business Leaders Legislative Clinic scheduled for Monday and Tuesday in Santa Fe.

"The purpose of the conference is to acquaint business persons throughout the state with the legislative process," executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce John Hobbs said, but while in Santa Fe, the delegation also hopes to meet with legislators and discuss bills which might have an impact on Ruidoso.

Those attending, Lloyd Davis Jr., Jim Hine, Ab Gunter, Hobbs, Jim French,

Alden Deyo and Marchand MacDougal, met Tuesday to discuss issues and identify those of importance to the area.

Issues identified by the delegation to be discussed with legislators include status of present and future projects affecting Ruidoso by the State Highway Department, property tax and assessment appeals reform, endorsement of additional funding for the State Department of Development, endorsement of the proposed measure that the state relinquish one quarter of a percent of the state sales tax for municipalities to impose for their use and opposition to a proposal which would eliminate the possibility of any

nuclear waste sites in the state.

The delegation also decided to approach legislators regarding restructuring of the county government as an item to be discussed during the 1979 legislative session.

Hobbs also suggested members of the Ruidoso delegation solicit comment from Ruidosoans on issues not discussed at the prelegislative session held last week in the library.

"The more persons who go to Santa Fe from here and the more legislators we can talk to while there will benefit the area," one delegation member said Tuesday.

Downs corrects audit

At their regular Monday evening meeting, the Ruidoso Downs village council passed a resolution to correct a revenue sharing violation in the 1976-77 budget audit.

"In the budget audit for 1976-77, there was a violation of a regulation which said we couldn't pay a lease purchase contract under revenue sharing," village clerk Virginia Spall said Tuesday.

Under the resolution, \$6,000 which had been earmarked for a lease purchase contract was transferred back into revenue sharing to comply with the regulation and ultimately avoid a penalty.

The council then passed another resolution because "any time a budget change is made, we have to notify the New

Mexico State Department of Finance and Administration for approval."

In other business, the council: — Selected election judges, clerks and alternates. Names of those requested to serve will be released pending acceptance.

— Approved 14 occupation licenses with the stipulation by Mansell "a letter be sent advising them to check with their bookkeepers to make sure money received from Ruidoso Downs (is recorded) on the back of the Bureau of Revenue sales tax form correctly."

— Tabled action on a request by barn owner Johnny Burke that his sanitation fee be lowered in winter from \$7 to \$2.

Meeting Monday evening were councilmen Rose Bernard and Harold Mansell with Albert Richardson as mayor protem in the absence of mayor Norman Wheeler, who was out of town.







Rabies problem in state

Rabies remains a problem in New Mexico because of the state's vast reservoir of wild life, according to Dr. O. J. Rollag, veterinarian with the Health and Social Services Department.

Occurrence of the disease among animals has changed during the last 30 years, he said, in that it now is found more often in wild animals than in domestic pets. In 1943, there were more than 8000 cases in dogs and 106 in cats during 1976. But there were more than 3000 positive cases reported in wild animals in 1976, more than 80 percent of them in skunks and bats.

There were 22 rabid animals found in New Mexico in 1976 — one cow and 21 wild animals. In 1977 there were more than 20 cases in wild animals reported, one in a bobcat.

"Because of the prevalence of the disease among the state's wild animals, there is always the chance of a domestic pet being bitten and infected by a wild animal," Dr. Rollag said. "Because of this, it is necessary for owners to make sure their pets are vaccinated against the disease at yearly intervals."

"State law requires such annual vaccinations. But it is up to the pet owner to see that his or her animal receives the shots at the prescribed times."

To make it easier for pet owners to do so, he said, the New Mexico Veterinarian Association plans a statewide series of rabies vaccination clinics beginning the last week in January. Those in northern counties may be delayed until spring, to insure good weather.

The fact that rabies may suddenly occur as an outbreak among unvaccinated pets is borne out by the occurrence of the disease among dogs and six rabid cats were found before the disease was brought under control.

"We don't know whether the first case occurred because a wild animal or bat bit a dog, or whether the disease was brought from Mexico by a stray, rabid dog," he said. "But an outbreak among unvaccinated pets could be from either source, particularly in New Mexico's southern counties, and at any time."

Rabies, according to Dr. Jonathan Mann, chief medical officer of HSSD, has been one of the most feared diseases since earliest history. Descriptions of the disease have been found in Middle-East records dating from about 2000 B. C. The disease was rampant at times in Europe since then. It was first noted on this continent in Virginia in 1753. It spread westward, reaching California in 1899.

In past centuries, before Louis Pasteur produced the first anti-rabies vaccine, a bite by a rabid animal meant certain death to a human, Dr. Mann said. This threat has largely been eliminated by vaccination of pets and the development and improvement of anti-rabies treatments of humans. The threat is still present, however: In 1976, there were two human deaths in this country from rabies. One

was a Maryland woman bitten by a rabid bat and the other a Texas boy bitten by a dog while he was visiting in Mexico.

Referring to the fact there were 20 identified cases of rabies in wild animals in New Mexico in 1977, Dr. Rollag said: "Any one of these could have bitten a person — and in fact, two rabid bats did so.

Any one of the wild animals could have bitten and infected an unvaccinated pet, and it could have spread the disease among other unvaccinated pet, and it could have spread the disease among other unvaccinated pets. So it continues to be necessary for owners to keep their pets vaccinated.

"We of the Veterinarian Association and the Health and Social Services Department hope owners of all pets which have not been vaccinated within the year will have them immunized either by their private veterinarians or during the clinics," he added.

Operation Game Thief again seeking donations

Operation Game Thief's reward fund needs donations, says program coordinator Dan Pursley of the Department of Game and Fish.

"This is good news, in a way," Pursley said, "because it means we're paying out rewards and solving cases; but we're paying out more than we're bringing in. The cases have kept coming — we've got charges pending against five people right now — and that means the reward money keeps going out."

"A successful, ongoing program such as this is going to have to have sustained financial aid, though. If we've proved one thing with Operation Game Thief, it's that the poaching goes on all year round. The poachers aren't taking any breaks," he said.

Operation Game Thief is a cooperative citizen-department effort to combat illegal killing of game and other protected wildlife. It pays minimum \$250 rewards for information leading to arrests in big game cases and minimum \$50 rewards in other wildlife law violations. Callers to its toll-free number — 1-800-432-4263 — do not have to identify themselves or testify in court.

Pursley said the reward fund is sustained entirely by donations from private citizens, clubs and businesses. Donations have ranged from individual contributions of a few dollars to club contributions of more than \$1,000 earned through raffles.

"We've had more than \$16,000 donated, but we've paid out almost half that," Pursley said. "The reward fund is down to about \$9,200, with some payments pending delivery arrangements. The 'y' sound like quite a bit, but it's really just a good buffer — another 20 cases would really knock it down."

Tips on violations dropped during the

Christmas and New Year holidays, he said, but quickly picked up again in early January.

"Just since the first of the year, we've issued citations to five persons and seized four deer," Pursley said. "The poachers didn't waste any time getting back to work after the holidays."

Calls are coming in now at a steady rate, Pursley indicated. "We're receiving anywhere from a couple to five or six calls a day on busy days, and almost all the tips are on big game violations. Obviously, some of the callers can't give us enough information in every case, but some of

them — probably around 25 to 30 percent — have enough that we can seize the illegal game and pay out the reward."

The program, officially began June 1, 1977, when the toll-free number became operative. Since then, 58 individuals have received citations or been arrested for wildlife law violations.

"We should stress that although most of the cases solved so far have involved big game, we're interested in any type wildlife law violation, whether it involves fish, game birds, endangered species, raptors, or any other protected animal, Pursley said.

Social Security information

"Many people make needless visits to their social security office or representative in order to file for reimbursement of their doctor bills," Dan Mathis, social security field representative, said today. "With the help of a little leaflet called 'How to Complete The Request for Medicare Payment' most people could take care of this in their own homes and mail their request to the appropriate Medicare office."

"A telephone call to the nearest social security office will enable you to get a copy of this leaflet, as well as copies of the 'Request for Medicare Payment' form — Form 1490."

"The leaflet referred to above shows a diagram of the payment claim form with

detailed instructions on how to answer each question. By following this diagram carefully the claim form can be quickly and accurately filled out. Then just attach your itemized bills from your doctors to the claim form and mail.

"If the bills are from doctors in New Mexico, the claim form should be mailed to Medicare, the Equitable Life Assurance Society, P. O. Box 3070, Station D, Albuquerque, New Mexico 87110. If the bills are from Texas doctors, the form should be mailed to Medicare, Group Medical and Surgical Service, P. O. Box 22147, Dallas, Texas 75222."





News from the Home Economist

Your most recent gas and electric bills might have been a shock. The cost of energy will continue to be an important part of your budget. While costs go up and the supply of energy goes down, families need to learn to conserve. It doesn't mean just the homemaker, but all family members.

Hot water heating, stoves and refrigerators use up to one dollar out of every five dollars that you spend for energy. Use this list of conservation measures to cut your utility bills:

Don't overheat your water. Don't use the highest temperature setting. Turn down the thermostat on your water heater. The dial for doing this is usually near the pilot light.

Clean the sediment from your tank each year. The sediment can insulate the water from the heating element and therefore use more gas or electricity.

If the hot water heater is a long way from point of use, insulate the pipes. Pipe insulation or wrap-around insulation is good for this.

Use as little hot water as you can for washing dishes. Fill the basin or a small tub with hot soapy water once. Rinse dishes in a basin of water. Never under running water.

Fix leaky faucets. They waste both hot and cold water.

Make sure the gasket on the refrigerator door closes tightly. To test for this, close the door on a dollar bill, if the bill pulls out easily you need a new gasket. Check the freezer door also.

Don't use the burners or the oven to heat the kitchen. This wastes a lot of heat because the stove is less efficient than a furnace. It's also dangerous! A draft could blow out the oven pilot light on a gas stove.

And on both gas and electric stoves, too high a temperature for long periods of time could ignite grease in the oven. Never leave the kitchen stove on when you are out of the kitchen for long periods or asleep!

When you use the burners, choose pans that have wide, flat bottoms that just cover the burner and absorb all the heat. When water is used in cooking, such as for vegetables, use just enough water to steam them and prevent sticking — and cover the pot with a lid. Don't overcook. This wastes energy and also food value.

Although pressure cookers cost more to begin with, they cook food quicker than ordinary pots and use much less gas or electricity. The food will have a nicer appearance and flavor. Cheaper cuts of meat can be made tender by pressure cooking.

Except for baking cakes and other delicate baked goods place the food to be oven cooked in the oven as soon as you turn it on. Most foods do not require a preheated oven.

Plan what you want from the refrigerator before you open it. Too many people stand and plan meals with the refrigerator door open.

SANTA FE — State School Superintendent Leonard DeLayo has come from a meeting in the White House with President Carter with a belief the President is serious about cutting educational red tape and reverting additional power to the state.

DeLayo said in an interview: "I have the feeling that for the first time in the 15 years that I've occupied this position that Washington is listening to the states, specifically about (Federal) paper work and the usurpation of state's prerogatives."

DeLayo was in Washington for a meeting of the Council of Chief State School Officers. He is a former president of the organization and also is second-ranking in seniority among the nation's school superintendents.

The group met with Joseph Callfano, secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and with U.S. Commissioner of Education Ernest Boyer.

Carter requested the meeting with the school chiefs, DeLayo said.

He said he was encouraged by the President's comments on several issues, and also the fact that he spent longer with the group — an hour and a half — than any previous President. DeLayo has been going to the White House meetings since the administration of John F. Kennedy.

"We talked a great deal about returning authority to the states in the Title I (educational program funding) area," DeLayo said. "And he assured us that he is interested in cutting down on the number of forms (to fill out)."

One of Gov. Jerry Apodaca's top appointees says the governor's budget proposal for 1978-79 has a strong emphasis on social programs for humanitarian reasons and because Federal courts have

been mandating that the states do more than they have been for disadvantaged people.

He cited the need for special education programs at the Los Lunas Hospital and Training School, which provides services for children with handicaps and learning disabilities.

"The courts have ruled in several states that 'you'd better do it,'" he said. "They're humans. You can't just put them in these institutions and let them die on the vine."

He criticized the Legislative Finance Committee's proposal for a 7 percent increase in state government spending, a figure he said would barely keep up with inflation.

"They're talking about government remaining stagnant," he said. "How would they provide for all these services?"

Apodaca's proposal to revert one-fourth of one cent of the state gross receipts tax to the state's municipalities may face rough sledding in the Senate.

Chairman Aubrey Dunn, D-Otero, of the powerful Senate Finance Committee opposes the idea.

He would like for cities to be able to raise the money themselves, based on a referendum vote by local citizens.

"I think the cities may be receptive, too, when you get to thinking about it," said Dunn in an interview.

He said locally-raised revenues, through a vote, would increase local autonomy. But, he added, "If you just have a handout (from the state), that can be changed real quick."

Dunn also voiced objections to Apodaca's proposed \$655 million budget for state government.

"I don't think the Legislature will appropriate as much ongoing expenditures as the governor proposes," said Dunn, who is second-ranking in Senate seniority.

Reports from Santa Fe

Sen. John Conway

The Second Session of the 33rd Legislature opened at noon January 17. The first item is the organization of both houses and when that is completed the business of the legislature begins. We met in joint session to hear Governor Apodaca deliver his State of the State message. Most of the items he covered had been mentioned in the press before and there were no real surprises in his message.

that municipalities be allowed to impose this one-quarter percent. Both programs with some modifications appear at this time to have a good chance of passing the Legislature.

There are numerous tax reduction bills already introduced this session. One that I introduced gives credit for what you must pay on your federal income tax against your state income tax. Another takes the gross receipts off of groceries and a bill by Representative Hobson removes the gross receipts from prescription drugs. These three measures have been introduced in past sessions of the Legislature but would appear to have a better chance of passing this year due to the surplus revenues. It would be very doubtful that more than one of the three would pass.

Two issues that will receive major attention from the Legislature are the governor's plan to reorganize the Highway Commission and the use of the state money through HSSD for the funding of abortions. The Highway Commission legislation is a result of the problem the governor has had with the State Highway Commission and Highway Engineer. His bill would give him absolute control over the Highway Commission and the Engineer whereas now the members of the commission can only be removed by the Supreme Court prior to expiration of their terms. One Senator from Albuquerque has indicated that he will introduce legislation to appropriate funds to the Health and Social Services Department for the payment of abortions for women who cannot afford them. Both of these areas will be highly controversial and I would appreciate hearing your views on them and on any other matters which come before this session. My address in Santa Fe is Senator John E. Conway, Room 103, State Capitol, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87501.

This session should be concluded by approximately the 15th of February. I would urge all of you to visit the Legislature and if you have children that would like to be pages I would be glad to make arrangements for this. I have found that youngsters between the ages of 9 through 15 enjoy paging and get the most out of it. We can also arrange tours of the capital and seating in the gallery during the time the Legislature is in session. If you would like to talk to me about any of these matters please call my office in Alamogordo, 437-1840 or in Ruidoso 257-4678 and they will relay the message on to me and I will call you from Santa Fe.



Sunland Park Hoofbeats

DECEMBER 3, EASTER PICTURE jumped the inside rail and sent apprentice jockey Pedro Benitez to the canvas. Benitez suffered a slight fracture of the left wrist, and was out of action until Friday night's third race. But the youngster was again plagued by ill fortune. He was aboard Pata Blanca in the six-furlong spin and was tossed when his mount stumbled over a fallen horse. The mishap was triggered when Sandtoken, with Darrell Blevins, broke a leg and went down. Blevins escaped injury, but Sandtoken had to be put away. Benitez came through in good shape, suffering a sprained back. He was taken to Providence Memorial Hospital for X-rays and was to be released after a two-day stay.

LOCKRIDGE, a 15-1 shot, outgunned favored Crazy Frills right on the wire and pulled out a tissue-thin score in Saturday's co-feature at 870 yards. The winning time of 44.96 seconds compares well with the world mark of 44 flat, set by Ragtime Chick at Sunland in '70. Bradley's Kunumera, the fall Horse-of-the-Meet, made his spring bow in the duel as a 3-1 shot but couldn't handle that kind of burning speed.

CROW'S REQUEST romped to nearly a three-length win in Saturday's opener at 5 1/2 furlongs, and chalked up an 88 speed rating — which is pretty nifty for a maiden. The win payoff was also an eye-opener: \$46.60. Jaimi Maxwell was up.

NEKE NOD made a shambles of Saturday's third race at a mile. The filly, handled by Angel Jacobo, outlegged her \$7,500 claiming foe by nearly seven lengths. She paid \$34.40 as a 16-1 shot.

KINDA SORREL came within 47 hundredths of the track mark for 350 yards while booming to a neck win Saturday. The filly paid \$4 even. Darrell Blevins was up.

THE 2-10 COMBINATION was the right one in Friday's first Big Q. Those two numbers accounted for both ends and produced a payoff of \$53. Fleet Princess (8-5) and Copy Gal (7-5) took care of the first end, while Lynn Ellen (6-5) and Why Baby Why (10-1) ran one-two in the second half.

PENTIMENTO, a 3-2 favorite, had to churn up the dust to nose out Onemoreyard (8-5) in Friday's third race at 400 yards. The two yielded a quinella payoff of \$2.80. It wasn't an all-time Sunland low, however. The record was set as \$2.20 in 1972.

ALEROSO lost all chances in Friday's feature when he took a dismally wide turn into the stretch and dropped off the lead. But when Joe Garren straightened the gelding out, he came flying down to the wire and nearly got second.

NATIVE SCAMP charged to a hard-fighting second in Saturday's eighth race, and maintained his record of always getting in the money. Out of eight career starts, he held a 2-5-1 record.

NIGHT LATCHER, with Carlos Rivas up, looked like a winner as he stormed into the turn for home in Sunday's 2nd race at 870 yards. But the gelding blew his chances by going extremely wide. Still, he managed to get third, coming on at the end.

BE IN A GARDEN went into Sunday's mile-long third race with a thoroughly dismal recent record, and was rightfully turned loose at 49-1. But the mare came flying down the stretch and got up in the final jumps for a slim win. The payoff on a \$2 win ticket was \$100.80. Apprentice Don Howard was up. The payoff was tops for the spring season, but was not a '77-78 record. That honor belongs to Nu And Crafty, who won November 12 and refunded \$124.

FAST GAS, a brilliant stakes-winning sprinter in his heyday, raced under a \$1,500 claiming price in Sunday's 11th race and pulled up lame after trying to deliver a stretch move. The gelding is now 11 years old.

THE NO. 2, NO. 4 AND NO. 6 post positions turned in six winners each over the three-day racing weekend to lead in that category. Here's the complete breakdown: 1 — 56; 2 — 64; 3 — 53; 4 — 59; 5 — 62; 6 — 60; 7 — 46; 8 — 34; 9 — 23; 10 — 21; 11 — 0; 12 — 1.

I-N-S-I-D-E the Outdoors

 Time is growing short for New Mexico's hunters and fisherfolks to take advantage of their 1977-78 licenses before they expire on March 31.

The last of the general hunting seasons are coming to a close as the quail and waterfowl seasons end at sundown on Sunday, January 22, and the crane season ends on January 29. The close of these seasons marks the end of hunting protected game until the spring turkey hunt opens, usually some time in April.

Fisherfolks still have a full 2 1/2 months to utilize their current fishing licenses for New Mexico's waters. Winter trout stockings will continue in area waters on a scheduled basis of about every two weeks until April.

In addition to the winter trout waters, several year-round waters offer the angler ample opportunities. Quemado Lake, Lake Roberts, Alto Lake, Ruidoso River, and the Penasco River produce fine catches of rainbows for the persistent fishermen. Ute Lake, Conchas Lake, and Lake Sumner each have a wide variety of species of warm-water fish, particularly crappie, that can be caught in the winter months.

Everyone, hunters and fishermen or not, is encouraged to help enforce game and fish laws by way of "Operation Game Thief." If a violation is observed, call the toll free number 1-800-432-4283 and report the violation and all the pertinent details. Callers will not have to appear to testify in court. In fact, your name does not have to be given at any time. Instead, a code number is given to you, and, if your information leads to an arrest or issuance of a citation to the violator, you are eligible for a reward.

The reward is a minimum of \$50.00 on fish and small game cases, and a minimum of \$250.00 on big game cases. This reward will be paid in any manner you request to help conceal your identity. Enjoy the closing days of this license year, and if you put a quarter in your cookie jar every day, starting right now, you will have the money on hand April 1 to buy that new general hunting and fishing license for next year's seasons.

Wilderness Wisdom

with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne — A few years ago it was reported that the lamprey eel was destroying the lake trout population in the Great Lakes. What is the situation today and where did the lamprey eel come from? Joe T. in Florida

Dear Joe — Through selective poisoning, the lampreys are being contained to tolerable numbers. The lake trout's recovery in numbers is much improved and should continue to do so.

For many years the lake trout of the Great Lakes were protected from the sea lamprey by the obstruction formed by Niagara Falls. When the Welland Canal was built around Niagara the lampreys then had direct access from the sea to the Great Lakes.

The lampreys attach themselves to their prey with their sucker mouth and drain the blood from their victim. Once attached they will not let go until it or its victim dies.

Dear Wayne — I am considering buying a new rifle for hunting mule deer. I may sometimes hunt antelope with it. I am leaning toward a .243 caliber but am not sure if it is adequate. What do you say? Joe, Colorado

Dear Joe — I consider the .243 has the necessary muscle for the game you specified.

It is an excellent antelope cartridge in that it is accurate over extended ranges and it has a very flat trajectory. The lighter bullet of the .243 is, of course, affected more by wind than its heavier brothers.

If most of your muley hunting is done in heavy brush perhaps you should consider a heavier caliber as the lighter .243 is easier thrown off course and disintegrates quicker when hitting brush or tree limbs. The heavier, slower moving bullets will play through brush with less off course movement.

If most of your mule deer hunting is in the open or in lightly wooded areas, the .243 is a good choice. I would recommend the 100 grain bullet for both animals.

Dear Wayne — I have an old shotgun with twist made barrels. Is it safe to shoot? Bobby B., Idaho

Dear Bobby — I assume you are referring to a shotgun with "damascus" twist barrels. In this process the strips of barrel metal were wound around a mandrel or rod and welded together.

Many damascus barrels are exceptionally strong, but because of the variances in metal, workmanship and care such taken of guns it is not safe for modern state of the art.

I suggest you take the gun to a competent gunsmith for inspection. It should cost you little and his decision should ease your mind considerably.

Dear Wayne — An acquaintance of mine in another county has asked me to join the bowhunting club to which he belongs. They have a large tract of land leased for their sup-





...ive use. I am very enthused about idea, but the price of memberships are rather stiff to me. What would be a price to pay for privileges in a club has this? George H., Tennessee
 Dear George — There cannot be a standard answer to your question. It may be worth less to you than to another hunter. There are several other factors involved, of which I am sure you are aware.
 How many people are in the club? How much land is involved? Is the tract large enough to accommodate the members without a hunter behind every tree? Is the quality of game scarce, mediocre, or

plentiful? Is the site accessible to you without driving long distances? What are the restrictions or limitations?
 After you have answered the above questions, check around the area to find what the going price is for land rental of hunting rights. In areas where hunting pressure is greater, the price is usually higher.
 Last, but not least, who are the club members? Will you be compatible with them and enjoy their acquaintance?
 Dear Wayne — I am not a bowhunter, but isn't it foolhardy to hunt dangerous game with a bow and arrow? Jeffery H., Arkansas

Dear Jeffery — It would be unwise if the bowhunter did not have a backup in the form of another person armed with a high powered rifle. Most bowhunters use this type of insurance when hunting dangerous game.
 A properly placed arrow is a lethal weapon, even against large animals, but because it has very little shock power backup protection should be considered necessary.
 Dear Wayne — I realize that the copperhead snake is poisonous, but its bite apt to be lethal if left untreated? Keith D., Delaware
 Dear Keith — Don't risk it. If the person

bitten is in very good health, strong and robust, he may be able to survive without treatment. If so, the road to recovery is sure to be filled with considerable pain and suffering.
 The chances of survival without treatment also depend greatly upon the size of the snake and the amount of venom injected into the body.
 Persons of slight build and smaller children will be in for a serious fight for their lives unless treatment is given without undue loss of time.
 If you have occasion to find out the answer to your question firsthand, don't be curious enough to gamble.

Dear Wayne — For the last two years my family and I have vacationed in Maine. I believe both years we were here in August. Each year we camped along lakes that contained landlocked salmon, according to the travel folders.
 I tried endlessly to sucker salmon with flies and lures, but I have yet to catch one. What gives? Terry, Ohio
 Dear Terry — Several lakes in Maine do have good populations of landlocked salmon. In early spring and fall they can often be caught by casting or trolling lures close to the surface. At times they can be lured with dry or wet flies, usually in early morning or evening.

Fair Weather In Mid-Winter

This is being sent to you on January twenty-three, right in the very middle of winter. Two days ago the world here at the place in the vale was the very picture of winter, with the hills and fields all covered with shining white snow, and snow clouds moving in and out in all directions over the mountain horizon.

Now, today on the twenty-third, it seems like a day in March, with a light wind coming down from the west, moving the cedars and pinons so they wave their tops and branches up at the blue sky. The temperature is up to fifty-two here in mid afternoon. And Solo Vino is out lying in the sun.

All the snow is gone from the sunny side of the vale, and the mountain meadows on the shady side of the world. The only sign of winter is the snow that is left in little patches all to the South under the shade of the pinons and Cedars on the hillside.

Now I see a cloud moving down from the mountain, with a soft feathery top all along the horizon. The afternoon sun shines down upon this sky-line of white turning it into shining silver. From this you can imagine how the white mountain may look. Is it shining in the sun? Or is it lit up with moving patches of sunshine where the sun shines through the moving clouds? Or is the sacred white pyramid hidden in falling snow?

Not very often through the years do you see early spring-time weather and north-land winter right almost side by side. Here in the land of the pinon and pine there is very often spring and winter weather all through the mountain land at the beginning and the end of winter, but not right in

the very deep of Winter.

It is good to have little interludes through the winter this way; and this is one of the charms of our home land. In much of our nation the true winter weather stays without any let-up for three, four and five months.

In much of our country all to the north and east and west, they are having an unusually severe winter. (My brother, Mark, tells me that the temperature was down in the low twenties in Houston a few days ago, and said he had never seen it this cold down there.)

Here we are having an unusually mild winter right when it is usually the coldest time of the year. By this time, the temperature has been down around zero, and I have seen it seventeen below.

What does this mild weather in the middle of winter mean?

Dear Friends of Lincoln County,

Later on I will give you a more complete review of our plans for your winter. But right now let me say briefly that it is good to enjoy the warm sunny days, but be sure and have some warm clothes within easy reach. Because this time of year a blizzard can move in any time. Most of the world to the north is full of snow, and with just the right change in the wind this arctic weather can overflow and drift down your way in just an hour or so.

So be careful, and be sure and have warm clothes ready if you are out after night. And get some fireplace wood ready.


