Jim Goodman honored as water operator

Village of Ruidoso water superintendent Jim Goodman was named this week as outstanding water operator of the year by the southwest section of the New Mexico Water Supply and Pollution Control Association.

One of four such honors given in the state, the award was "primarily based on the condition of the water plants, how well they are monitored and operated and water quality from the plants, as well as progress made on the distribution system," Goodman said.

Additional criteria listed by the association included interest, incentive and a willingness to accept additional

responsibility other than job demands.

"I have never been associated with any one person who has shown as much interest and incentive in his work and dedication of self to service as Jim Goodman," village manager Jim Hine said Friday.

Goodman, who has been with the village for three years as a lab technician in the wastewater department and then as water department superintendent, has a BS in biology from the University of Texas at El Paso and a level 4 certificate from the Environmental Improvement Agency and Environmental Protection Agency, the highest level which can be achieved.

Two burglary suspects arrested, free on bond

Two Ruidoso Downs men, following a cooperative investigation by Ruidoso policeman Ray Garner and Ruidoso Downs Chief of Police Lynn Martin, are at liberty under \$5,000 appearance bonds set by Magistrate Jim Wheeler last week on filed charges of burglary and larceny.

John W. Keel, 18 and Dean Rue, 21, allegedly burgled the Phillips 66, Gateway Texaco and Gateway Exxon stations and the Sonic Drive In in the Ruidoso; and the Cortez Gas Company, Chaparral 66 station and Lincoln County Feed in Ruidoso Downs.

Taken in the burglaries were small amounts of change, cigarettes, tools and tool boxes, horse tack and a chain saw. A large portion of the reported missing items have been recovered.

The men are scheduled to appear before Magistrate Wheeler for preliminary hearing at a date to be set.

The burglaries occurred January 24, with Keel being arrested January 25, at home and Rue arrested January 25, at home. Both were released in the custody of their parents or guardian.

"We would like to hold these Coffee Carts every Wednesday through the winter, discontinue them during the racing season and then reorganize in the fall," he said.

When Paxon skis . . . he's on the job . . . rugged, huh?

Perhaps one of the most enviable occupations in the area is that of Jim Paxon, Smokey Bear District snow ranger, who spends several hours each week skiing as part of his job.

"Sierra Blanca Ski Area is almost entirely on Lincoln National Forest," he said. "The Mescalero Apache tribe owns the improvements and operates under a special use permit or contract with the forest service."

"As snow ranger, I administer the

permit, regularly visiting the area to make sure they are upholding their portion of the contract, to see the public is served and about two thirds of my job is checking safety."

On his regular patrols of the area, Paxon rides each lift "to see they are operating safely and meeting state and federal requirements for public protection."

He also "sees that all the runs (from beginner to expert) are safe with the closed areas and hazards clearly marked."

In addition to these aspects of his job as snow ranger, Paxon monitors the ski patrol and ski school instructors to see if they are performing adequately.

Paxon said his job is aided by the "exceptionally good air of cooperation from the ski area management."

"It's a cooperative effort between Roy Parker, area manager, and us. We're not a watch dog."

He has found the "ski management exemplary in their safety."

"Their profit is in safety. If someone is injured, sued and the area is found neglectful, then there goes the profit."

Paxon, who learned to ski when he took the job in January 1976, is also kept busy as snow ranger in the other seasons.

"It's a year long job," he said. "For example, work on the Lincoln Chair which was completed for this season, began a year ago when they submitted a proposal."

"It had to be appraised then the timber cruised to assess the volume and grade of trees to be removed."

"After that we charged them the minimum rate as set in Washington, D.C."

During the project, Paxon had to be on hand for the burning of the timber and for the pouring of the tower bases by helicopter.

"Anything done to national forest land has to be approved and monitored."

Another duty Paxon has as snow ranger is annual inspection of the lifts before the first snow.

"Every fall, before the snow falls and the lifts begin operation, they have to be inspected by a qualified professional engineer and we have to participate also."

"Then, we do a follow up to make sure items needing correction were corrected."

Paxon said he has enjoyed his job as "there are only 175 ski areas on or partially on national forest lands in the nation."

"So there are not many persons who have the snow ranger job."

"It's a special job, I feel fortunate and I enjoy it."

Paxon also serves as a recreation forester under the direction of Joe Spehar, recreation and lands staff officer at Smokey Bear Ranger District.

In the summertime, under this aspect of his job, he administers recreation facilities including White Mountain Wilderness, overnight campgrounds of South Fork, Three Rivers, Cedar Creek and Oak Grove and concentrated use campgrounds of Baca and Argentine canyons.

Paxon also works with the recreation crews.


tractors Incorporated, which was incorporated 18 months ago, after four years of operation as Service Contractors.

Eagle Creek seeking new water rates

The Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Users Association appeared at a Public Service Commission (PSC) hearing in Santa Fe Thursday morning, seeking an increase in raw water rates from 20 cents per 1,000 gallons to 30 cents.

The increase would apply to Eagle Creek water sold to Ruidoso and Capitan and is being sought to offset the increased costs of electricity as well as legal and administrative costs of operation.

The PSC decision on the rate request will be announced.

"It hurts when they cry." Children are so easy to hurt. Many times they do it to themselves. It is our duty as parents and adults to keep them as safe as possible.

Every year over 100,000 children poison themselves accidentally by drinking cleaning fluid, eating fistful of aspirin, or swallowing any of a host of other potentially dangerous substances found around the house. Parents can prevent many of these accidents by anticipating such possibilities and taking steps to keep children from poisoning themselves.

Here are some ways to prevent accidental poisoning of children, according to the Health Insurance Institute:

- Keep all potentially poisonous substances locked up. If your medicine chest or the cabinet where you keep your cleaning compounds will not lock, keep your drugs and cleaners in any other place under lock and key.

- Never transfer hazardous substances from their original containers to a glass, cup or soda bottle, or anything else that might indicate to a child that it contains something to eat or drink.

- Get rid of unused medicines and household products by emptying them down the toilet or drain. Rinse the container before discarding it.

- Dispose of prescription medicines as soon as the illness for which they were prescribed is over.

- Do not take medication in any form in front of a youngster. The child may try to imitate you sometime when you are not there.

- Never tell a youngster that medicine is candy or is like candy.

- Make it a point to buy potentially dangerous products in child-resistant packaging. Remember to close them properly after each use.

One of the first things a parent can do when a child swallows something that may be poisonous is to call the doctor. Be sure to keep the remaining contents of the bottle or box which the child sampled to identify the poison and estimate how much was swallowed. Without this vital information a doctor's course of action could be delayed. If you cannot reach your doctor readily, call your local Poison Control Center. The number is 1-800-432-6865 in Albuquerque. This should be on your phone for quick reference.

A good precautionary move, according to poison control experts, is to keep handy an ounce bottle of ipecac syrup — to induce vomiting, if that is what the doctor advises.



Diets require special care for success

One diet is as good as another if it makes you feel better, is closely scrutinized by a physician and contains some protein, said Lester Salans, M.D. from the National Institutes of health in Bethesda, Maryland.

One of the most difficult unanswered questions, Salans said, is what is it that regulates food intake and energy expenditure. Once that is answered, he added, we may know more about what causes obesity.

With 40% of the population overweight or obese, there is an increased interest in what can be done to combat it. Recent controversy over the protein liquid diet may have raised some eyebrows, but according to Salans, he has no personal objections to it if it's followed with the same precautions mentioned earlier. There is no evidence that it is beneficial either, he added.

But the obese individual may be opening himself up for future problems, Salans listed other disorders that are more common to the overweight person, such as heart disease, hypertension or lung disease.

Painting Tips

WALLS OR TRIM... WHICH FIRST?

When the ceiling is finished, the natural impulse is to continue with the walls. However, there is much to be said for painting the trim before tackling the walls.

Consider the following points:

- [1] Edges of door and window moldings can be painted faster and less carefully. Any trim paint getting on the wall will be covered by the wall paint.
- [2] It is much easier to cut the wall paint in against the finished trim than to cut a precise line on the trim so as not to mar the wall.
- [3] Drips and smears of enamel on a newly painted wall are nearly impossible to remove completely, whereas latex wall paint is easily removed from an enameled surface with a damp cloth.

Naturally, none of the above applies to kitchens or bathrooms, where enamel is used throughout.

Study indicates young children luckiest who are whirled, twirled

Children with parents who rock and jiggle them are lucky. But the luckiest babies of all are those whose parents whirl and twirl while holding their babies in their arms. Leo Yates, Extension family life specialist at New Mexico State University, says new research shows that spinning healthy infants can be very good for them.

Yates cites research conducted at Ohio State University. The findings show that spinning babies between 3 and 13 months will significantly improve their motor abilities and reflexes. However, Yates warns that babies must never be swung by the hands. This places too much stress on the wrist, elbows and shoulder joints.

During the four weeks of research, the 13 babies in the experiment were individually held cozily in the researcher's lap. The researcher sat in a rotatable chair in a darkened room and the pair received 20, 60-second spins. The "trips" had sudden starts and stops. Between whirrs the direction of the spin was reversed and the baby was moved from a sitting to lying position.

The babies loved the rides. Some fell asleep during the 60-seconds of steady spinning, but most laughed. A few fussed impatiently during the short intervals between spins.

Both the experimental and control group of 13 babies were pre-tested. Four days after the spinning experiments they were all post-tested.

Skills like holding up the head, creeping, sitting and standing improved significantly among the babies who were spun. One three-month fraternal twin dramatically outshone his unspun-sibling

in head control and ability to sit alone, even though their pre-test scores were identical.

This vestibular (inner ear) stimulation improved the sense of balance and body control. By moving their heads, most babies provide themselves with a certain amount of vestibular stimulation. However, parents who rock, jiggle or even spin their children can give them an extra push in their development.



Stop wildlife's tree nibbling

If you're fed up with rabbits and deer nibbling on your pecan, apple or shade trees, now you can fight back without hurting the wildlife. Many growers have not been fully satisfied with old methods, like trapping, wrapping and fencing.
 Repellents have also been used in the past with some success. One repellent called Arasan 42-S has been used extensively in previous years. It has done a satisfactory job when used according to label directions, says Emroy Shannon, Extension plant pathologist at New Mexico State University. Arasan 42-S is the trade name of a chemical called thiram and has been used to protect vegetable and crop seed from fungi that cause seed rot. Arasan 42-S has a very pungent odor and probably tastes disagreeable.
 Arasan 42-S can be brushed or sprayed onto tree trunks. One application will protect the treated area from one to three months. A latex type sticker added to the repellent will help the chemical stay on the tree longer.
 Trees should be treated with the repellent at the first sign of injury or applied in late fall before injury occurs. The repellent can be used after fruit begins to form on fruit trees.
 Be sure to check the chemical label for other information and limitations, Shannon says.

SANTA FE — Although the 1978 legislative session is still far from over, there's already talk around the roundhouse about a possible challenge next year for the powerful post of Speaker of the House.

Rep. Walter Martinez, a Grants attorney, has held the job since 1971. Since then, as is the norm in the political realm, he has had to maneuver adroitly to keep his political coalition together and last year beat back a challenge from Rep. Joe Kloepple, D-Sandoval, who had previously been a member of the Martinez faction.

Latest potential challenger, various sources say, is Rep. Fred Mondragon, an Albuquerque Democrat and brother of former I.A. Gov. Robert Mondragon. Assuming the re-election of the various players involved, the challenge could come in January 1979.

Mondragon himself says he doubts he will take on the speaker. "For various reasons I've backed off on it," he said. "But it's still a possibility."

The pro- and anti-abortion forces in the capitol engaged in an impromptu altercation the other day.

Along with a couple of bystanders, proponents of both sides of the abortion issue crowded onto an elevator in the roundhouse — the anti-abortion folks carrying "right-to-life" balloons aloft.

But an opponent removed a pro-abortion lapel pin and began jabbing at the balloons. The elevator was filled with loud popping sounds, a mild scuffle developed. Someone tried to grab the lapel pin.

Since there are only four levels in the capitol, there wasn't time for anything else to develop before the elevator doors opened and the diverse factions dispersed. Rep. Bill O'Donnell, a veteran House

Democrat from Las Cruces, was state campaign chairman of Jerry Apodaca's drive for the governorship four years ago.

But in this legislative session devoted primarily to taxation and budgetary matters, O'Donnell says he was not asked by the Administration to "carry" any of its bills in the House. And in fact, O'Donnell has two tax measures of his own which he acknowledges do not fit into the governor's budgetary plans.

"On this tax thing, he looks at it one way and I look at it another," O'Donnell said in an interview.

Rather than increasing the low-income tax credit and reverting one-fourth cent of the four-cent gross receipts tax to municipalities, O'Donnell says he favors a flat one percent reduction in the four percent tax.

He says his proposal would help all state residents, many of whom are being hurt financially by inflation and rapidly climbing utility bills.

O'Donnell also proposes that 2 mills of the property tax be reverted to counties which have reappraised the property on their books. "In certain counties," he said, "it could mean a reduction in property taxes."

One of the highest-ranking House Republicans says he is concerned that the Bernalillo County community college proposal may have been drawn up too hastily by the Administration without rounding up adequate political support from the area's educational factions.

If the measure is not enacted as a result of disagreements among Albuquerqueans themselves, says Rep. Bob Grant, "it may be five years" before such an institution can be approved legislatively.

He says there is a need this session "to explore all the alternatives and come up with something everybody in Bernalillo County can support — although that may be impossible."

Today, the dust bowl belongs to the past and once-ravaged land, aided by advanced conservation programs, has been transformed into beautiful countryside and clear skies.

True, the population crush has added another dimension to the problems of the conservationist. But to the optimist, this merely makes a difficult job all the more challenging. —News-Bulletin, Belen


