ELECTION MAY BE UNIQUE IN STATE'S ANNALS

Downs filling all offices

The Ruidoso Downs municipal election March 7 may be, according to local political observers, unique in New Mexico as the first election to name a mayor and four trustees after a village has been incorporated for many years.

Candidates this year, listed in order of appearance on the ballot, include:

MAYOR, FOUR YEARS — Harrold Mansell, Jake Harris and Norman Wheeler, incumbent.

TRUSTEE, FOUR YEARS — Emilia Maes, Lois Beavers, Ray Reed and Ray Parnell.

TRUSTEE, TWO YEARS — Juanita Burke, Vada Leighton, 'Dee' Dennis, Sandra Currens and Don Clark.

MUNICIPAL JUDGE — Ray Walker and Briscoe West.

Only one trustee, Albert Richardson, is presently serving due to being elected. He is not a candidate for reelection.

Background developments leading to the present situation include:

— J. J. DiPaolo was elected mayor and Albert Richardson and Noel Mullins as trustees March 5, 1974. DiPaolo defeated Norman Wheeler by a nine vote margin. Holdover trustees

were George Hancock and Nell Smith.

— In the March 2, 1976, election, with DiPaolo and Richardson as holdovers, Norman Wheeler was elected to a four year term as trustees with two year terms to Don Clark and 'Boots' Nelson. This was the election in which Clark and LaVerne Cole each polled 54 votes, with Clark being named the winner on a registration technicality.

— DiPaolo, charging "prejudice" on the part of the trustees serving with him, resigned as mayor June 25, 1976.

— Norman Wheeler, by a two to one vote of the trustees, was named mayor June 28, 1976.

After DiPaolo's resignation, 'Pappy' Johnson was appointed as a trustee to bring the board to full strength.

Subsequently, Johnson, Clark and Nelson resigned, leading to naming Harrold Mansell and Rose Bernard as trustees to serve with trustee Richardson and mayor Wheeler. The fourth position on the board was not filled.

Ruidoso delegation pursues area road plans at Santa Fe meeting

The Ruidoso delegation to the second annual Business Leaders Legislative Clinic held last week in Santa Fe returned with "a feeling of accomplishment," John Hobbs, a spokesman for the group, said Thursday.

"Monday afternoon, Alden Deyo, Lloyd Davis and I each had an opportunity to talk specifics with members of the State Highway Commission," he said.

"From commissioner Jim Chaney and chairman Jim Dennison, we got a tentative commitment that the Highway Commission will hold their regular October meeting in Ruidoso."

Hobbs, who is executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, said. "The Ruidoso delegation also discussed plans to pave the Nogal cutoff on Highway 37."

"In this regard, Senator John Conway talked with chief highway engineer James Bird and was told that plans were for that part of Highway 37 to go to contract in early 1979."

"Conway expressed his disappointment and dissatisfaction with that projected date."

Hobbs said, "As a result of this information, the Chamber, the village and our representatives in the legislature will continue to work with commissioners Chaney and Dennison and chief engineer Bird."

While in Santa Fe for the clinic, the delegation "deferred discussion of some issues because of the continuing dispute between the House and Senate in the legislature and because 1978's session is a short one," Hobbs said.

Hobbs felt the recent Chamber activity in the area of governmental affairs had "established an excellent rapport between the legislators and the village."

"Both Conway and Representative John Bigbee are anxious to return to Ruidoso and hold a session similar to the town hall meeting to give a legislative wrap-up to summarize the outcome of the session."

He said the date and time of the session, which will be sponsored by the Chamber, will be announced at a later date.

While at the clinic, the Ruidoso delegation of Deyo, Davis, Hobbs, Jim French, Jim Hine, Ab Gunter and Marchand MacDougal, also attended several lectures and panel discussions including one by Senators I.M. "Ike" Smalley and Aubrey L. Dunn and Representatives Tom Brown and Hoyt Pattison on taxation for municipal and county funding, moderated by Hobbs.

Although the subject was municipal and county funding from taxation, Hobbs "challenged the audience, as business leaders in the state, and the legislative leaders on the program to begin to address the larger and more complex issue of home rule and local autonomy for the state's villages, towns, cities and counties."

Hobbs said, "There is perhaps no other state in the Union where municipalities are as beholden to the legislature or as dependent on state government as they are in New Mexico."

"Try to imagine what Los Angeles' mayor Tom Bradley would say if you suggested that he should send his city's budget to Sacramento for review, comment and approval. Or think what the late Mayor Daley's response would have been if the Illinois legislature had tried to impose oversight authority over the Chicago budget."

Several speakers had "asserted that there is a need to delegate more authority and provide more autonomy to the state's local units of government," Hobbs said, adding that he felt "the time has come to quit treating the symptoms and start treating the disease."

"The ball is clearly in the legislature's court and it must either relinquish some authority and control over those units of government closest to the people or it must bear the responsibility of perpetuating an archaic 'Big Brother' system destined to failure."

Regional airport commission met

The Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) commission met here Thursday and, due to not receiving the approved Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) from the office of New Mexico Attorney General

Toney Anaya, the commission was unable to take official action on business matters.

SBRA chairman Col. Richard Hall, Ruidoso, said that the JPA had been approved by the state Department of Finance and Administration and forwarded to the attorney general for final approval.

"We expect to receive the JPA shortly," Hall said, "at which time a special meeting of the commission will be called. The first order of business will be preparation of a letter of application for conveyance of title" regarding land for the airport site.

While awaiting the JPA, the commission will:

— Obtain resolutions from the governing bodies comprising the JPA, Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Lincoln County and the Mescalero Apache Tribe, accepting the JPA.

— Proceed with the drafting of letters to the New Mexico congressional delegation, advising them of the status of SBRA and requesting support of the project, to be mailed upon receipt of the approved JPA from the attorney general.

Attending Thursday's meeting were Hall, Wyndham Runningwater, vice chairman, Mescalero and Terry Strickland, commissioner, Capitan.

Oralia Britton sentenced in death of child

Oralia Britton, Ruidoso, was sentenced Friday to 10 to 50 years in the State Prison by Judge Thomas Sandenaw in Alamogordo.

Britton was convicted of child abuse resulting in death January 10 by an Otero County District Court jury.

The conviction stems from the August 12, 1977, incident in which Raquel, 18 months, daughter of Ron Britton and step

daughter of Oralia Britton was pronounced dead at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

Results of a polygraph test given in Roswell cleared Ron Britton of complicity in his daughter's death and charges against him were dropped.

Under the terms of Friday's sentence, Britton will be eligible for parole in 40 months.

ORDINANCE NO 78 1
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE RUIDOSO CODE, CHAPTER IX, ARTICLE 9 5 3
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, THAT Chapter IX, Article 9 5 3 of the Code of Ordinances of the Village of Ruidoso is hereby amended to read as follows:
9 5 3 FEES
The fee for such permits shall be:
(1) Excavation in asphalt or cement, concrete, pavement, or oil treated surface \$5.00 per square foot.
(2) Excavation in untreated or unimproved street or surface \$3.00 per square foot.
No permit shall be issued unless the applicant herefor has first deposited with the Village Clerk a cash deposit in the full amount of the fee based on the square footage of the cut to be made. In the event that the square footage of the actual cut made is less than the square footage set out in the permit, the Village shall refund to applicant the excess fee paid, or in the event that the square footage of the actual cut made is more than the square footage set out in the permit, applicant shall pay to the Village Clerk the difference between the fee paid and the amount of fee required. It is the intention of the Governing Body that the fee for such permits shall be for the purpose of reimbursing the Village for costs incurred by the Village in retilling and the repairing the cut made, and not for the purpose of making a profit. Therefore, if necessary, the Governing Body from time to time may, by resolution, raise or lower the fee for such permits.
This ordinance having come before the governing body at a duly announced public meeting is hereby adopted and approved this 31st day of January, 1978.

Federal laws cover credit, loans, wages

The 1977 Congress enacted a number of federal laws and regulations that affect consumers. These laws cover credit, mortgages, air and bus travel, labeling, hearing aids, wages and credit unions. Jackie Pinson, Extension family finance specialist at New Mexico State University, explains the major change made by each law.

The fair debt collection bill makes it a Federal offense for debt collectors to threaten consumers with violence, use obscene language or contact consumers by telephone at inconvenient times or places. Miss Pinson says the new law also prohibits debt collectors from publishing "shame" lists, impersonating government officials or attorneys, obtaining information under false pretenses, or collecting more than is legally owed.

Debt collectors who violate the new law will be liable for any actual damages plus civil damages up to \$1,000. In case of class action, the fee could be \$500,000 or one percent of the new worth.

In another area, the Housing and Urban Development Department has increased the maximum FHA insured mortgage guarantee from \$45,000 to \$60,000 for a one-family residence. New rule also allows smaller down payments.

The Civil Aeronautics Board amended its regulations to require certificated airlines to publish and distribute easy-to-understand summaries of all their available fares on major domestic and international routes. This was effective June 1.

The Interstate Commerce Commission issued new regulations related to bus baggage handling. If a carrier does not make checked baggage available within 30 minutes of arrival, it must be delivered to the passenger's local address at the carriers expense.

If the bags are not found within one hour, the passenger must be notified and provided with claim forms. After 15 days the claim must be processed and a settlement or denial made within 60 days of the claim.

The Food and Drug Administration's mandatory ingredient labeling rules for cosmetics took effect April 15. This means that all new products going into distribution channels after that date must list ingredients in descending order of predominance.

Another action in 1977, the Food and Drug Administration issued final regulations on labeling requirements and sales conditions for hearing aids. The rules became effective Aug. 15, they specify that hearing aids may be sold only

to people who have had a medical examination to determine their hearing loss. However, anyone over 17 years old may waive the examination requirement.

An Act amending the Federal Credit Union Act increases the maximum period of mortgage loans from 10 to 30 years.

Finally, under the Minimum Wage Act the minimum hourly wage was raised from \$2.30 to \$2.65 on Jan. 1, 1978. It will go to at least \$2.90 on Jan. 1, 1979, to at least \$3.10 on Jan. 1, 1980 and to at least \$3.35 on Jan. 1, 1981.

I-N-S-I-D-E the Outdoors

Possum Cop. Doc Sheriff. Rabbit Ranger. Jungle Fuzz. Game Warden. Conservation Officer. These are just a few of the men and women in blue, officers of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish.

Conservation officers, the correct terminology for the commissioned personnel of this department, are the integral working parts of one of the oldest state agencies. Probably best known for their enforcement of game and fish laws, the scope of these officers' job far surpasses that one responsibility.

First, in clarification, a conservation officer should not be confused with personnel of the State Parks and Recreation Commission, or the State Forest Service. Their employees have their own areas of responsibilities.

Nor should a game warden be confused with employees of national wildlife refuges, of national fish hatcheries and of the Bureau of Land Management. Even the special agents of the federal government are game wardens in a different sense, as they have jurisdiction over federal regulations.

Conservation officer, or if you prefer game warden, is a collective term used to refer to the supervisors, fisheries biologists, game managers, public affairs officers and others of the Department that do carry a state commission. Such an authority enables them to enforce the game and fish laws and certain related laws within this state. However, as the various titles indicate, the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish is a much more complex organization than meets the eye.

Being a state agency, the governor is at the helm of affairs. It is his duty to appoint, by and with the consent of the senate, five persons in such manner as to represent equitably all areas of the state. These five persons, one being designated as chairman, for the State Game Commission. The commission has general control over all activities of the Game and Fish Department.

The state game commission has the responsibility of employing the director of this department. It also has the power to discharge a director at any time for reasons deemed sufficient.

Under the director, are two assistant directors. Each are responsible to the director for various areas of responsibilities. Presently, this department consists of eight divisions. These are Area Operations, Business Management, Special Services, Fish Management, Game Management, Planning and Environmental, Public Affairs and Law Enforcement.

Each of these divisions has a chief and supportive personnel based in the administrative office, located in Santa Fe. They in turn coordinate their divisional activities, through the leadership of the director and assistant directors, on a state-wide basis.

"We are especially appreciative of Lloyd Davis' willingness to help getting the coffee cart kicked off."

The next Wednesday morning coffee cart will be from 9 to 10 a.m., February 8 at High Country Agency with Roy L. "Pinkie" Jones and Frank Sawyer as hosts.

Three injured in auto school bus crash today

Three persons were injured in a schoolbus-automobile accident at Alto Crest on Highway 37 during this morning's heavy snow.

Richard Kenneth Hurley, 26, Temple, Texas, apparently lost control of his automobile "because of the ice and snow and slid into the bus," driven by Robert H. Famello, Capitan, investigating officer Kent Waller, New Mexico State Police, said at the scene.

There were no passengers in the bus which travels the Alto to Capitan route. Hurley sustained injuries of a chin

laceration, his passenger sustained a sprained ankle and Famello complained of shoulder and rib pain.

Waller speculated the Hurley vehicle was a total loss and that the schoolbus would be "out of commission for a while as it cannot be driven from the scene."





Social Security

"The date you file your claim has much more significance than it did before the Social Security Act was amended last month," Dan Mathis, social security field representative, said today.

"Before the amendments, an individual could file an application and make it effective as far back as twelve months before the month of application, assuming of course he was eligible that far back. This is still true for some applicants, but is not true for widows between the ages of 60 and 65, and individuals between ages 62 and 65 who are applying for wife's or retirement benefits. Although a few exceptions exist in the law, the benefits for most of these will begin only with the month of application," Mathis said.

"Here is an example of how this could effect an individual. Suppose a man died in December, 1977, but his widow didn't file her claim for widow's benefits until January. Her first benefit would be for the month of January. Had she filed in December we could have paid her for one additional month. If a widow can't get into a social security office before the end of the month in which her husband dies, she should telephone the nearest office before the end of the month."

A Good-Bye Present From January

While most of our nation has had one of the most severe winters in memory, our winter here in the land of the Pinon and Pine has been one of the mildest I have seen.

And January has been one of the most pleasant I have seen here in the vale, or anywhere. It seems that Jack Frost maybe thought he had gone too much toward the mild side, and then just at the last minute decided to bring in some snow.

On the next to the last day in the evening there came a gentle rain, causing Mother Earth to smile happily. Then during the night the rain began to turn into snow so that in the morning of the thirty-first we were in a winter wonderland.

The limbs of the cedars were weighted down like numberless hands proudly holding tufts of snow of sparkling pure white.

Clouds, near and distant, still came flying out of the East sprinkling the finishing touches on the white world in the form of tiny glistening snow flakes.

Then out of the north came clouds of mist flying rapidly. These misty clouds came down out of the sky and went drifting along blending with the white mountain landscape of snow. The mist and snow clouds and the snow on the trees and ground, all made up a changing picture you see only once in a great while.

As the clouds, and the veils of mist drifted, they were made into gentle shadows and silver and golden light by the sun shining through. The mist, catching the rays of the sun, flew over the earth like golden smoke. I wondered why the snow on the ground did not rise up and blend in the silver-gold clouds of mist, flying in the wind.

Through most of the morning the temperature did not rise much above freezing, and the swaying branches of the evergreens held on to their large clusters of snow. The rain, falling first, and then freezing along with the flying snow flakes, gave the snow a good strong hold on the branches.

Then just at high noon, the temperature began turning warmer with a wind from the west. In every direction, the limbs began dropping their great clusters of snow, which fell heavily to the ground. world the trees had all dropped their crests of snow, but the fields were still white with a blanket four and six inches deep. Under this white blanket was another clear blanket of thin ice partly frozen into the ground.

All night the thirty-first the warm west wind blew staying up around forty degrees.

February Enters Beautiful As Always

Now today (this is being written on the first of February) it is a world of sunshine and snow. The river has a smokey color from the snow melt on the sunny side, —

just enough to bring the pulse of the river running strong.

Now, just after high noon, a few patches of soft gold are showing through the blankets of snow on the fields. The snow melts slowly, soaking into the grateful earth. There is hardly any running water on the shady side of the vale. Little pools of snow water next to the snow fields reflect the blue of the sky — little lakes among the amber grass and white sparkling snow.

Clean white clouds are all in the sky shining in the silken February blue. The last mountain in sight up the vale is very light purple — a color lent by the patches of snow amongst the pinon and cedar.

The patches of snow glisten among the trees on the hillsides nearby. The snow is trying hard to do its work well, staying long enough to soak slowly into the ground, staying in the shady places ready to receive snow flakes from the next snow, so there will be snow banks to melt into the ground in the spring.

So we came through January with the temperature no lower than ten above here in the vale. And now with this wet and heavy snow, Mother Earth will replenish her springs, creeks, and underground lakes of water, with plenty to spare for the growing things large and small.

February has made a good beginning. Now we can look forward to a beautiful February and a green and flowery Spring. Let us thank God for all his blessings.

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

SANTA FE — Gov. Jerry Apodaca, in a political tradeoff with a top-ranking state senator, has agreed to give up some of the authority he sought to gain over the prestigious Museum of New Mexico in order to get more power over the State Highway Department.

Sources familiar with the circumstances told us the agreement was worked out between Apodaca and Sen. I.M. Smalley, a Democrat from Deming who has served since 1957.

As we reported earlier, the governor — having tried unsuccessfully through the courts — is pushing strongly on the legislative front to get more control over the big road agency.

He has proposed several bills which would have this effect, including one which would allow gubernatorial appointment of highway commissioners on an at-large basis which would break up the present district setup that allows commissioners influence over road-building priorities in their areas.

Sen. Ted Montoya, D-Sandoval-Bernalillo-Rio Arriba, is a main Senate strategist in the governor's highway effort.

But Montoya also is sponsor of an Administration bill which would change the status of the Museum of New Mexico as part of Apodaca's government reorganization plan.

The museum, located on the Plaza in Santa Fe, is not a big-budget government agency of the type which regularly provoke legislative battles because of large budgets or payrolls or projects. But it is highly important in another way, by serving as state government's showcase in the worlds of art, culture and archaeology.

It has been overseen by a board of regents and has been outside the formal structure of the executive branch of government.

Montoya's Administration-backed bill would change that, leaving the board only as advisory and placing the museum under a new Department of Educational Finance and Cultural Affairs. That department is scheduled to go into effect on March 31 under terms of legislation enacted in the 1977 session and is to be headed by school finance chief Harry Wugalter.

But Smalley, who has long been politically allied with the museum and who didn't want it made merely a division of the cabinet system, introduced his own bill this session. His bill would leave the museum as it is today, basically, with the institution's staff reporting only to Wugalter "for administrative purposes."

It turned out to be a very close question when the two bills came before the Senate Education Committee.

By a one-vote margin, the committee okayed the Administration bill and sent it on to the Senate Finance Committee. But, leaving room for future negotiations, Sen. Tom Rutherford, D-Bernalillo, got agreement that the Smalley bill would be held "in abeyance" in the education committee.

The action came after a hearing in which Santa Fe Sen. Alex Martinez referred to "cliques" in the museum's operations who "have not been responsive to the community and the people of New Mexico" and after former Senate Majority Leader Tibo Chavez of Belen, now a regent, said of the Administration's bill: "As you read the bill, we have been stripped of policy-making authority."

A few days later on the Senate floor, Smalley gained a tactical advantage of his own by managing to get the Administration's highway bills removed from the Senate's Corporations Committee to the Judiciary Committee — of which Ike Smalley is the chairman.

"Sen. Smalley is playing games with the governor's office," said one well-placed source. "Look for a negotiated bill (bet-

ween Smalley and the Administration) on how the museum is going to be handled in (the) reorganization (plan)."

Another capitol source familiar with the political maneuverings on the highways-

museum scenario confirmed the basic details of this account, which shows once again how veteran legislators can secure compromises from a strong active executive branch.




MIDWAY

PRIME TIME SCHOOL TELEVISION

This article was written by an 11th grade student in a Chicago high school in response to our request for students to send us their views of TV police shows for publication in this column. I find myself in the rather awkward position of defending television police shows. While I do not particularly like most of these shows, I cannot sit silently by and watch as they are deluged with criticism. It is difficult these days to pick up a newspaper without reading about a study or a highly regarded sociologist coming out against television violence.

TV police shows are violent but they also reflect part of the real world, a world in which murder, rape and arson occur. Maybe not to the extent depicted on TV but can we put a quota on such acts? In fact, the most valid criticism of such programs comes from the cops themselves, who say the shows are not violent enough! They are right.

Television is too neat and clean in its violence, little blood or agony, no burning bodies. It may sound disgusting but this is also a part of the world that television ought to be reflecting.

Some charge that police shows frequently ignore the law. They allow Kojak to push a suspect against the wall or Baretta to forget his search warrant. These are problems that must be remedied.

But it must be remembered that television has taught more people more about their rights than any other medium. Many public defenders will say that the public has learned about their rights from POLICE WOMAN and DRAGNET.

The critics of police shows claim their viewing should be monitored or supervised. But by whom and to what extent? Do we censor murder but not armed robbery? If we censor STARKY AND HUTCH, why not MACBETH or films about concentration camps? Such decisions can become dangerously arbitrary.

If you, like me, don't like cop shows then don't watch them and explain your reasoning to your friends and family. And in the end, perhaps we are having an effect. Police shows are declining in the ratings. Let's stick to self-control. Regardless of your opinion, you cannot force it on others.
