Special trustees meeting set on Teen Center plans

Ruidoso mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., has called a special meeting of the village trustees for 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, in the multipurpose room of the Ruidoso Public Library on Sud-deth.

The trustees will meet with the Architectural Plans Review Committee (APRC) and representatives of the Noon Lions Club's building committee to review plans for the proposed Teen Center, sponsored by the Noon Lions.

At the regular APRC meeting Wednesday, the committee refused to accept the plans for the steel structure, submitted by the Lions for approval.

"We considered the plans," APRC chairman Alden Deyo said, "and denied them as submitted. Several alternatives were suggested regarding the outside of the building to make it acceptable by APRC.

"At Wednesday's meeting the Lions representatives advised us their building committee would meet, to see which way to go with it."

The Lions' proposal to APRC included some rock facing and dark brown trim on the front of the steel building, with the exposed area to be of a color compatible with the Public Library.

The contract for the 60x120-foot building, with 14 foot walls, was awarded January 25 to Ace Building and Supply of Hobbs.

In announcing that the Teen Center would be built, Noon Lions president Bill Morrison said, "The Noon Lions, with the financial assistance of the other community organizations, as well as individuals, decided to go ahead with the \$75,000 building to serve our youth, without applying for grants or any other outside funding. This building is primarily intended to serve the youth of the Ruidoso area and the Noon Lions will see that the building is put to use this summer."

The APRC's involvement in the Teen Center building is, The News has been advised by APRC members, due to a request from the village trustees that the committee study the plans and submit their recommendation to the trustees on the appearance of the proposed steel building.

Skiing pair survive night in mountains

Two El Paso skiers survived an all night Saturday cross country skiing junket resulting in an official mission assignment to the White Mountain Search and Rescue (WMSR) called early Sunday morning by New Mexico State Policeman Kent Waller. Mike Young and his son, Brad, 10, of El Paso, Texas, left Sierra Blanca Ski Area about 2 p.m., Saturday, bound cross country, through a dangerous avalanche area, for the South Fork of the Bonito. A WMSR spokesman said the two reached a road near their goal about 3 a.m., Sunday and "walked continually up and down the road" until they were picked up by a car about 10 a.m., unharmed. A sidelight of the event, a WMSR spokesman said, concerned a car that

stopped the two skiers shortly after reaching the road, offering assistance. On being advised the pair's skis were next to a tree, up the road, the car departed to pick up the skis and did not return, taking the skis. After Waller issued the mission call, WMSR, Forest Service, Mounted Patrol and ski resort officials organized the search party, reaching the South Fork area about 10 a.m., Sunday. A road block was set up and, a WMSR spokesman said, "The second car through had the two missing skiers." The searchers were equipped with snow shoes and other special rescue equipment due to the fear the missing duo had been trapped in the avalanche area.

Ruidoso Aviation, of which Jerry Cady was the principal owner, was purchased February 15 by a group of local residents.

Richard Hall was elected president of the firm, with Ben Hall as vice president, Marie Williams, secretary and Frank Sayner, treasurer. Other members of the board of directors include Virgil Hemphill, L. R. Nunley, Michael Waldron and Dan and Cherie McCowen.

"We will offer a bonafide pilot training program," Hall said, "making ground and flight instruction available in Ruidoso for the first time."

"The air charter and air ambulance service is being continued."

"At the present we have a six-place twin engine Skymaster to service passengers and a two-place Skyhawk trainer for lessons. We intend to have additional aircraft in operation this summer."

Sketches of some of the nominees follow: JOHN WINNIFORD has been in business in town and a member of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce for about five years. He is a member of the Extraterritorial Planning and Zoning Committee, past president of the Board of Realtors and on the board of directors for the state Board of Realtors. In 1976 and 1977, John was honored as "Hustler of the Year" for the most transactions, selected as Realtor of the Year in 1977 and a member of the Million Dollar Club in 1976, with over a \$1 million in real estate sales. He and his wife, Billie, are the qualifying brokers for Lela Easter Real Estate. John served in the navy during World War II and the Korean Conflict as a radarman. He and his wife have three sons, Romie Bowers, 24, Austin; Rickey Bowers, 27, Houston, and Charlie Winniford, 27, Houston. John felt the Chamber's board of directors should be a more congenial group and should elicit more response from the Chamber membership. "We need a more cohesive and cooperative Chamber," he said.

JOAN BAILEY is a relative newcomer to Ruidoso, moving here a year ago with her husband, Bob, to manage Storybook Cabins, owned by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Al Junge. She attended the University of Houston, Texas, where she was involved with community activities. "One thing I would like to see done by the board of directors is promotion of more effective contact between themselves and the Chamber membership," Joan said. "Members of the Chamber have been cheated. They have a right to know what is happening and a right to participate in Chamber activities, especially now when we are in deep financial trouble. We need a one-to-one contact with the attitude of

'what can we do for you' not 'what can you do for us.'" Joan also suggested the board of directors should meet weekly instead of monthly. She and her husband have two children, Matthew, 7, and Jill, 22 months.

KEN MOORE moved to Ruidoso in November to become administrator of Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital. During the few months he has been here, Ken has brought new doctors into the area, upgraded the services at the hospital and reworked systems within the hospital's administration. He received a degree in Business Administration from the University of Texas at El Paso and a MS from Trinity University in San Antonio, Texas. Before taking his present position, Ken was assistant administrator at Gerald Champion Memorial Hospital in Alamogordo. In addition to being a member of the Rotary Club and on the finance committee of the Chamber, Ken is a nominee to the American College of Hospital Administration and a member of the American Hospital Association and the New Mexico Hospital Financial Management association. Ken said the board of directors should "pay due respect to the Chamber membership, also keeping in mind the factors that have made Ruidoso what it is today. The board should try to maintain a balance between the feeling among some people that Ruidoso should remain a small town and the need for growth."

WAYNE WHITLOCK of Whitlock and Lyle Real Estate has been a member of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce since 1970. A 1967 graduate of Ruidoso High School, he moved back to the area in 1970 from Cape Kennedy where he was an electrical engineer. Wayne is president of the Multiple Listing Service and the Board of Realtors and he is a member of the Warrior Booster Club. Wayne and his wife, Jeannie, have three children, John, who attends Ruidoso High School; Wade, who attends the mid school, and Micah, 4.

JOHN HALL moved to Ruidoso in May,

1970, from Las Cruces where he was studying political science at New Mexico State University. Before starting Sierra Development Company (SDC), incorporated in June 1971, John was associated with his father's company Mohaco, Incorporated, in Capitan. He is vice president of the Board of Realtors, and a member of the Rotary Club, Multiple Listing Service and the Episcopal Church. John, who is president of SDC, vice president of Greater Southwestern Development Corporation of Lincoln County and on the board of directors for Mohaco, was recently elected to Who's Who in the West. He and his wife, Tina, have been members of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce since 1971.

STANLEY "JIM" FRENCH first came to Ruidoso in May, 1975, as project architect for Boyle Engineering to assist with construction of the Inn of the Mountain Gods. Feet cold? Buy air conditioner

Feet cold? Consider buying an air conditioner! Many stores are offering price reductions on air conditioners because it's off season, says Suzi Holder, Extension housing specialist at New Mexico State University.

When shopping for room air conditioners, consider capacity and efficiency. Evaluate your cooling needs to determine the energy requirements of the room you want to cool. This depends on the size of the room, direction the room faces and the windows.

Efficiency is easy to determine by checking labels on the units. The EER —

energy efficiency ratio — helps consumers decide which units use less electricity and cost less to operate.

Remember, a higher EER costs less to operate. While the high EER units sometimes cost more to buy, over several years they will generally pay for themselves in lower utility bills and decreased maintenance costs.

If possible, place the air conditioner in the most shaded window. Care for a refrigerated unit by vacuuming the cooling fins (from the room side) and the condenser fins (from the outside) a couple of times a year. An evaporative unit is more efficient when pads are undamaged.

Social Security information

"Several local residents have again reported getting telephone calls from an anonymous source, asking them questions about Medicare, and implying that major changes had just taken place in the Medicare provisions. Most of the people who have contacted us have indicated that they didn't know who was calling. One lady thought that it was the social security office, "Dan Mathis, social security field representative, said. "All were quite disturbed about the calls.

"These calls have not originated in the social security office. Also, names and telephone numbers or addresses of social security beneficiaries are never given to anyone outside the office. This information is strictly confidential.

"If you receive such a call, try to find out who is making the call and then telephone the nearest social security representative or office — you may call collect."

Farmer's assets increase while cash income drops

In general, the financial position of farmers is generally strong, says Gene Ott, Extension farm management specialist at New Mexico State University. In spite of a record increase of \$16 billion worth of debts assumed in 1977, farmers' assets increased more, with debts now averaging only 16 percent of assets.

However, there are some clouds in the financial picture. The overall cash flow position of some farmers has deteriorated, resulting in significantly different income and financial situations on different type farm operations, Ott says.

Net cash income for 1977 on most farms is expected to be at the lowest level since the late 1960's and early 1970's. This year, there is \$8 of farm debt for every \$1 of net cash income. This compares to a previous high of \$8.50 in 1957.

Wheat, feed grain and livestock farmers have been the hardest hit with unfavorable prices. Poultry and swine producers experienced a relatively good year in 1977 but could experience a more difficult year in 1978. Dairy farmers maintained a good cash flow in 1977 which should continue into 1978, Ott says.

In addition to the unfavorable farm cash flow situation, the living costs and value of capital items for farming continue to increase.

The combination of these situations will probably result in an increased number of loan renewals, loan extensions and refinancing, explains Ott. Some short term loans will be converted to long term loans to ease the cash payment on interest and principal.

The farmers who have been buying machinery and livestock from current income will need to borrow to finance these items as cash flow decreases. There will also be more borrowing for current operating expenses on enterprises with seasonal income flow. This situation will undoubtedly have an effect on the machinery industry as farmers postpone purchases until cash incomes improve.

1 teaspoon vanilla


NO-BAKE CHEESE CAKE

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

SANTA FE — Bits and pieces of information from around the roundhouse:

One official directly involved in the complex maneuverings among state legislators of both parties, the state highway commissioners and the Apodaca administration says of Highway Engineer James Bird's planned March 31 resignation, "I have a feeling he was a sacrificial lamb."

The official added he believed the commissioners "threw him to the wolves so there wouldn't be any effort (by the governor) to remove them."

Bruce King and Jerry Apodaca have been leaders of competing factions within the Democratic party for years. Among other things, each tried to keep the other from being able to serve a second consecutive term as governor, and King, upon ending his term in 1974, supported Tibo Chavez rather than Apodaca to replace him.

Now, a prominent Democrat who was Apodaca's 1974 state campaign chairman, has signed on with the 1978 King gubernatorial organization.

He is Bill O'Donnell, a veteran state representative from Las Cruces, Apodaca's home town.

O'Donnell will serve on the executive committee of King's Dona Ana County campaign committee.

"What do you call this, the Starsky and Hutch bill?" asked Rep. Bob Moran, R-Lea, during an early-morning hearing on Appropriations Committee chairman Tom Brown's bill to finance a "tactical squad" within the State Police.

Brown explained: "I prefer to use the term 'tactical' rather than SWAT, which has connotations of meanness..."

"And TV," added another committee member.

"And TV," agreed Brown. Rep. James Martin, R-Socorro, sponsor of an identical bill, added, "I believe the crooks are better equipped than the police are now."

Note: Although Brown informed the committee that neither he nor Martin had "pride of authorship," it was Martin's bill which was tabled and the chairman's which was given the "do pass" recommendation.

The political power of Senate Finance Committee Chairman Aubrey Dunn, D-Otero, is a reality in the legislature but it also provokes some light-hearted moments.

When one Senate committee of which Dunn was not a member took up a bill, its chairman noted that if there was no objection, it would be amended in accordance with a request from Dunn.

"Why is this being done?" asked a committee member.

"Well, let's just say I saw the light," replied the chairman.

"Was that when he (Sen. Dunn) came by your desk this morning?"

"I can't recall exactly," said the chairman, "but that may have something to do with it."

Senators who have seen their bills disappear into the Finance Committee with little chance of re-emerging sometimes try to obscure the fact if their proposal involves any expenditure of state funds.

Their most dreaded scene: Aubrey Dunn, rising from his back-row seat on the Senate floor and saying, "Mr. President, I think this bill has financial implications."

YELLING AT COURT

On the fifth anniversary of the Supreme Court's 1973 abortion decision, anti-abortion forces mounted a protest in front of the court building. That was the second time within the past few months that demonstrators have made the court itself the target of protests. On the first occasion, the Bakke case involving so-called reverse discrimination was the focal point.

Before commenting, we enter the caveat that we do not think the high court should be wholly insulated from the hue and cry in the world outside its chambers. Its deliberations and its rulings have to do with people, not with abstractions. The court, like every other institution of

government, functions in a climate of public opinion.

Yet its overriding concern must be to interpret fundamental law, not to trim the law for the benefit of this or that interest group. Overt attempts to influence the court in its decision-making process by staging demonstrations strike us as inappropriate, and potentially dangerous. Rulings should be based on carefully presented arguments, not on who yells the loudest. — Alamogordo Daily News

JUDICIARY TOO POWERFUL

There is growing concern, and rightfully so, that the judicial branch of government is getting too powerful.

A constitutional crisis may be ahead as the federal judiciary intervenes in such ticklish issues as schools, hospitals and prisons, once considered the exclusive preserve of legislators and public administrators.

And there is no slowing down by the judiciary.

Courts have entered the classrooms to second-guess teachers and school officials with decisions overturning the suspension of students.

Judges' rulings, rather than acts by lawmakers or government officials, are promoting racial integration in schools.

Judges have attacked the Navy's rule of automatically discharging homosexuals, set school-tax rates, struck down a bar association ban on lawyer advertising and rewritten Social Security laws. They have overruled local officials on where to build highways or locate power plants.

What will happen when the courts someday hand down a decision so unpopular that it will not be enforced; where both the Congress and President simply refuse to enforce it? That could so undermine public respect for the courts that their authority to interpret the laws of the land would be lost.

This country was built on the theory that the three branches of government — executive, legislative and judicial — would counterbalance each other. Whether or not this is true today, as federal judges seek to legislate and administer, is a big unanswered question. — News-Bulletin, Belen

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Con-Tel's local construction to top \$1.3 million this year

Continental Telephone will spend approximately \$1,393,000 in 1978 on construction in the Ruidoso area including Alto, Capitan, Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Mesalero.

Included in the funding will be buried phone lines at a cost of \$500,000, new switching equipment installed at a cost of \$375,000, and electronic transmission equipment installed at an estimated cost of \$119,500.

Also new power equipment emergency generators and battery chargers will be added in the area at a cost of \$42,000, land and building improvements are planned at a cost of \$250,000 and approximately \$109,000 will be expended on new telephone installations for both small and large business systems.

The \$1,393,000 to be spent in the Ruidoso area is part of the \$290 million budget to be spent in 1978 by Continental Telephone on telephone operations.

"The construction budget is designed to

meet the needs of increased growth and service requirements in each of the 41 states in which Continental operates," president of the company James V. Napier said.

Federally-funded program information available now

Community leaders wanting the latest information on federally-funded programs can get it now, thanks to an update to the Federal Assistance Program Retrieval System (FAPRS).

New Mexico State University has a computer terminal direct-line hookup with FAPRS. The terminal retrieves and prints a list of programs according to the needs listed by the community.

We're providing this service free to local governments, explains Robert Coppedge, Extension economist at New Mexico State University. We believe smaller communities need access to information and funds that have been available only to larger cities.

The service provides an index of more than 1,000 federal programs including health facilities, sewage treatment, water

supplies, public housing, business and industrial development, elderly housing and rent supplements.

The quick retrieval system saves time consuming research to find programs available to the communities. Detailed information on each program and the address and telephone number of the agency contact person are included in the Federal Catalog of Domestic Assistance.

FAPRS has added new categories on employment, education, and health and social services. This should make the program even more valuable to New Mexico community leaders, says Coppedge.

These new categories double the available list and make the one-year-old service twice as useful, Coppedge says. He adds that the mere listing of a category of funding doesn't guarantee funds will be forthcoming for a community.

In addition, new sub-categories have been added for community facilities, business and industrial development, planning and technical assistance, and housing.

Researcher finds storm water pollution answers

The yearly storm water runoff from a city the size of Albuquerque contains between 100,000 and 250,000 pounds of lead and between 6,000 and 30,000 pounds of mercury.

Those figures wouldn't mean much except for one thing: that lead and mercury laden water eventually finds its way back into our supply of drinking water.

According to Dr. Peter Wierenga, professor of agronomy at New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station, almost 90 percent of the water New Mexicans drink comes from ground water sources and, in many communities, 100 percent of the drinking water supplies come from ground water. Because those water sources are located at varying depths beneath the surface, they could become contaminated with such things as, dissolved solids, toxic metals, pesticides, boron, sodium and nitrates. The list is long and dangerous.

That's why Wierenga, in cooperation with the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Agency, has begun a comprehensive water research study.

"In the past we have worried about pollution coming from a definite source such as, a factory," Wierenga said. "But today we know that 50 percent or more of New Mexico's water pollution comes from diffused sources."

Also called non-point sources, diffused sources of water pollution come from urban areas, from construction sites, agriculture, forestry, mining, and from residual disposal which includes sewage systems and even nuclear waste disposal.

"The problem with diffused pollution is that it is very difficult to quantify," Wierenga said. "Generally it occurs over large land areas, and its magnitude varies greatly."

For example, Wierenga said "there are over 400 million acres of cropland in the United States that deliver two billion tons

of sediment annually into lakes and streams."

That sediment obviously contributes to water pollution. The question is, just how much of the sediment runoff is part of the natural aquatic ecosystem and how much of it is pollution. Wierenga's research will answer that question as it relates to irrigated agriculture in New Mexico.

Another question the research will focus on is how much pollution comes from commercial fertilizers. According to Wierenga, 10 to 15 percent of the nitrogen entering the agricultural system via fertilizers may be lost to water runoff. These are estimated values which need to be verified in New Mexico.

Again the problem of quantifying pesticide pollution is complicated.

"We have to know how long it has been since the last storm. Were the chemicals applied to the soil prior to the storm. We even need to know what kind of soil the farm has. Each of these things affects the amount of pollution."

How will Wierenga measure the amount of pollution coming from diffused sources? In one project currently underway, Wierenga is studying the impact of irrigated agriculture on water quality in the Rio Grande below Albuquerque.

"There we are concentrating on dissolved solids chloride, nitrogen, and phosphorus," he said.

To check the levels of these concentrations, Wierenga is working on a San Acacia farm.

"We have installed monitoring equipment in 15 surface wells and four monitors on surface drains," Wierenga said.

Once a week samples are taken from the wells, drains and irrigation water. These samples are taken to Las Cruces where they are analyzed at NMSU's soil and water testing laboratory.

Similar procedures are used statewide to test water coming other diffused sources.

The task of assessing New Mexico's diffused water pollution is enormous and vital, especially if you remember that New Mexico is classified as an arid to semiarid state. The Department of the Interior

describes three-fifths of New Mexico as, "in all probability the most water-short major region in the United States."

Wierenga's research is also vital if you consider the fact that New Mexico's future demand for domestic water alone is predicted to increase from 75 million acre feet in 1970 to between 150 and 350 million acre feet in the year 2000.

What all this means is complicated, yet simple; New Mexico needs and will continue to need unpolluted water sources.

Wierenga's research aims at helping meet this need.

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LABOR DAY PURSE NOW \$1,280,000

Record total of 1,583 yearlings nominated to 1979 All-American

Horsemen from throughout the nation have nominated 1,583 yearlings to the 1979 All-American Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

That total, according to nominations secretary Dorothy Dillard, establishes a record for the All-American.

The world's richest race carries a stunning gross purse of \$1,280,000, with \$437,500 going to the winner. Nominations for the '79 All-American closed January 15.

The previous record for All-American original nominees was set a year ago when the names of 1,380 head were thrown into the hopper for the upcoming '78 All-American. Of this starting number, 781 are still eligible, and the kitty now stands at \$806,850.

The latter figure, in turn, compares very favorably with the previous year when 673 head were eligible at that point, and the cash generated at that juncture was \$696,125.

Under the All-American format, a span of nearly 20 months is involved between the time a horse (as a yearling) is nominated to the All-American and when he runs in the trials (about a week before Labor Day the following year).

The original nominating fee is a modest \$50, but seven other payments, each progressively more expensive, are spaced out along the way. All the payments total \$2,500. Horsemen may elect to go the much more costly route of waiting until June 1, (about three months before the All-American trials), and coughing up a supplemental fee of \$6,250. One can also wait until August 15, but the bite at that point is \$14,250, plus \$750 to get into the trials.

Those 1,583 original nominees for the '79 All-American represent one of the biggest one-year gains in the history of the race.

The leading nominator, in terms of number of head, is Walter Merrick of

Sayre, Oklahoma. Merrick, a two-time winner of the All-American (Easy Jet in '69, Easy Date in '74), nominated 20 head this time. Many of his hopefuls are by Easy Jet. One is by Easy Jet out of Spot Cash, which makes that youngster a full brother to Easy Date.

The second-leading nominator is Clifton Thronberry Jr., of Pryor, Oklahoma. He named 18 head. Joe McDermott of Madisonville, Texas, checked in with 16 hopefuls.

The Burnett Estates of Ft. Worth is next with 15, followed by Gordon Howell of Sunland Park, with a 14-head crew. Valton Cox of Lubbock nominated 13. Roy Browning of Ft. Worth has a dozen on the list.

Four nominators are tied with 11 each. They are Anne and B. F. Phillips of Frisco, Texas; Hugh Preston Jr., of Burkburnett, Texas; Sam Van Ness of Alvin, Texas; and Bill Walker, of Mansfield, Texas.

Ruth Crosbie Bunn of Sherman, Illinois, and Mary Urschel of Canadian, Texas, are next in line with 10 apiece.

A couple of highly colorful chapters in recent All-American history are also

represented on the list of original nominees for '79. Ted Bruce of Estelline, Texas, has a lone hopeful in Kinda Perfect. Bruce is co-owner of Hot Idea, the \$4,000 yearling purchase who went on to win last year's All-American in stunning fashion and raked in \$330,000.

J. D. and Elsie Kitchens, the retired school teachers from Ft. Sumner, are represented by Miss Deck Dolly and Mr. Arrow Deck. The couple won the All-American in '76 with their brilliant filly, Real Wind.

The 1978 season at Ruidoso Downs will cover 71 days kicking off on Saturday, May 13, and extending through Labor Day (Sept. 4). The basic pattern will be Thursday-through-Sunday racing, but action will also be staged on the four Wednesdays in August.

Highlighting the '78 season is the fact this year the All-American purse expands from \$1,030,000 to \$1,280,000. From now on, \$1 million (plus \$30,000 in breeding and nominating awards) will ride on the nationally-televised All-American grand finale. A total of \$250,000 will go into the three All-American consolation races.

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Garden disease control should be started now

How's this idea for passing a chilly winter's day? Take your new seed catalog, curl up by a crackling fire and think "spring." This "dreaming by the fire" can mean the difference between success and failure in next summer's garden, says New Mexico State University's Extension plant pathologist, Emroy Shannon.

With all the varieties to choose from, a gardener — especially a novice — can feel quite lost when it comes to making a choice. You'll find the job much easier if you limit your selection to those fruits and vegetables that are well adapted to this area.

Another way to narrow your choice is to look for disease resistance. This feature is one of the most important advancements in plant breeding and is a real benefit to home gardeners. Selecting resistant plants can save you the expense and discouragement of watching crops die just as they're about to produce the bounty you expected.

Many varieties of tomato, potato, cantaloupe, cucumber, bean and sweet corn are now bred for resistance to specific plant diseases; points out Shannon. Again, catalogs or the seed packet itself are your best sources for this information. Seed companies readily advertise this feature, since it's a main selling point.

Perhaps the most beneficial resistance that has been bred into today's vegetables is resistance to wilt diseases. Many varieties of tomato and cantaloupe are now resistant to either Fusarium or Verticillium wilt fungi. Some are resistant to both. Tomato varieties resistant to curly top virus and root knot nematodes are also available.

Maize dwarf mosaic virus which has cut sweet corn yields drastically can be controlled by using resistant varieties. Peach trees grafted to nematode resistant root stock is also available.

If you are in the habit of planting your tomatoes or beans in the same spot, someday it's going to catch up with you. A high percentage of vegetable diseases — particularly root diseases — can be prevented in the home garden by a simple process called rotation.

Changing the location of a vegetable from year to year in your garden prevents the build-up of plant pathogens in the soil, explains Shannon. This is especially true for peppers, tomatoes, beans, eggplant, potatoes, strawberries and watermelons.

Even resistant plants can be attacked under severe pressure from wilt pathogens when susceptible kinds of vegetables have been grown in the same soil over a long period of time.

Rotation doesn't cost a thing. But dead plants and fungicides do. Practice some of the basic principles that farmers have used for years. Plan smart and you'll certainly reap the benefits, Shannon says.

Agricultural supply to be forum topic



CONFIDENTIAL REPORT Why is CBS, a sad number three in the TV ratings, sitting on 13 segments of a potentially blockbusting show that seems just right for our new romantic age? The series, "Another Day," was originally scheduled to replace "The Betty White Show" on Monday but has been postponed indefinitely. According to co-star David Groh, who's known to many viewers as the ex-husband of Rhoda, "CBS has been frightened from the start because this show has quality but they ought to understand we are their last ace in the hole. Our audiences sometimes stand up and cheer during taping and when we ask why, someone always says, 'That's me up there, that's my family.' The show is about a young married couple with two children. That sounds rather straight and normal but perhaps that's what audiences want. Perhaps it could be a 'romantic' reaction to shows such as ABC's 'Soap.' Groh denies all this and says, "I have never even had words with Joan. I think she's one of the best actresses in the country, as funny as Chaplin, I'm just in awe of her. She's such an unusual woman, as sensitive as a precision instrument. Acting with her is like playing tennis with Pancho Gonzales." And what does Miss Hackett say to such compliments? "No comment."

The actor surprised Dinah as she was taping a TV segment about the making of Connery's latest film "Meteor." In the midst of shooting, Connery ran off the film set, grabbed the star of "Dinah" and gave her a bear hug and a kiss—which seems to have annoyed her only slightly. Henry Winkler and his live-in sweetheart Stacey Weitzman want to get married.
