VILLAGE TRUSTEES PRESCRIBE ACTION PATTERN

Teen Center concept wins acceptance

Not one word of opposition to the proposed Teen Center, sponsored by the Ruidoso Noon Lions Club, was voiced Tuesday night at a special meeting of the village trustees convened to consider the subject.

The point of contention, which was not resolved, concerned the aesthetics of the 60x120-foot steel building and the fact that the Lions Club did not follow the prescribed procedures prior to submitting a request for a building permit.

Opposition to the Lions' plan of using feather rock strips on the sides of the building exposed to public view was based on the premise that the Teen Center's decor should be harmonious with the Ruidoso Public Library and Lincoln County Senior Citizens Center.

Objections to the steel building were voiced by members of the Architectural Plans Review Committee (APRC), members of the audience including contractors and Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) representatives, who expressed concern that problems in meeting all of the building code requirements would be encountered.

The major objection, however, was centered around the physical appearance of the steel building.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., in stating that the exterior appearance should be in conformity with standards set by APRC and P&Z, and approved by the trustees, could not be "relinquished for the Lions," as it would mean the standards would have to be "relinquished for everyone else."

APRC member Rex Skellett said "indigenous materials" are specified in the ordinance for building facing though nothing "specific" in the way of materials for the outside of structures is mentioned. "The biggest problem is we do not have enforcement capabilities."

To help resolve the problem of the steel building, architect Jim French offered to work on the design during the next two weeks. Suggestions for the outside of the building included the use of stucco.

Encouragement to the Lions, to develop new plans for the building, was received when contractor George Lore and mayor Davis each pledged \$500 toward offsetting the additional expense involved.

Noon Lions president Bill Morrison reiterated his previous statement that, "Once we have the actual shell of a building up, I have the promise of additional sizeable contributions," that would enable the Lions to complete the

structure in conformance with all codes.

Ed Roberts, who presented the Lions' plans to the trustees, said that the total cost of the project is a limiting factor on what can be accomplished at the onset of the building program. Another problem, he said, in scrapping present plans to use steel in the structure, is that the "Lions have contracted" for the proposed building.

After about two and one half hours of discussion, trustee George White moved to have the Lions Club committee "go back and have their meeting" and then to "meet with both APRC and P&Z, the environmentalist and other agencies" and "then go ahead" to develop plans to be presented to APRC, P&Z and the trustees when completed. Trustee Ab Gunter seconded the motion. On the vote trustee Sherman Atwood, Gunter and White voted "yes" with mayor Davis recording an "in favor" vote.

Lions continue project

The Noon Lions, president Bill Morrison said to The News Wednesday, "will turn the preparation and plans for our Teen Center over to architect Jim French and engineer Harley Parnell.

"French and Parnell will draw up the building's plans and specifications to meet the requirements of the Architectural Plans Review Committee.

"The completed plans will then be submitted to the Lions, along with cost estimates, and we'll take it from there."

The Ruidoso High School girls' district championship basketball team will compete Friday in the regional semifinals in Jal, coach Sergio Castanon said Wednesday.

The team, which won the district title in play last weekend, will meet Dexter at 5 p.m., Friday with the winner of that game to play the winner of the Jal/Animas game for regional honors Saturday.

The winner of this competition will play at the state tournament to be held March 2-4 in Ruidoso.

"The girls played Dexter once before and were beaten by one point in overtime," Castanon said.

"If they play as they've shown they can play, then there's a good chance they'll win."

In district play last weekend, the team defeated Lordsburg 38-34, thumped Hatch 62-42 and nipped Animas 52-51.

Thoroughbred colts, 1-in-10,000 chance, were foaled Sunday

Two healthy, living twin thoroughbred colts were born Sunday morning to a mare owned by Harold and Armelda Mansell of Ruidoso Downs about a one in 10,000 chance.

The colts, a 35-pound grey and 50-pound roan at birth, are "in good shape and may live to maturity," veterinarian Carol McLeod of Hondo Valley Ranch, where the colts were born, said Tuesday.

"This first week is critical, but they made it through these crucial first three days."

Born at 12:45 a.m., the colts were sired by Willie Float, holder of the 4 1/2 furlong track record at Santa Anita, and delivered by Vera Lira, winner of races in California and New Mexico.

Mansell said statistically one mare of every 500 is capable of conceiving twins, but "only one in 5,000 carries it a full 11-month term, and only one in 10,000 delivers a live set as most usually are stillborn or die shortly after birth.

"If these two make it to the race track, it'll be a one in infinity record."

Mansell said the larger first born colt seemed to be the weakest, having to be force fed. The smaller of the two is most active and was the first to stand.

Mansell said the Hondo Valley Ranch night watchman noticed the mare about to give birth Sunday and awakened Dr. McLeod.

"She went to Vera Lira's stall and saw two front feet and a little nose and then another front foot. Carol thought it was a

"We accepted his resignation," Chamber president Roy L. "Pinky" Jones said, "and wish him well in whatever his new endeavor is."


Hobbs said, "I resigned to take advantage of an employment opportunity in the Midwest."

Village has \$100,000 water grant

Theatre safe, cash stolen

Gallegos and Martin, in investigating the incident, located the bullet on the back rest of the seat of the pickup.

 deformed colt or an awkward birth until she saw another front foot and another nose," Mansell said.
 "It was the first time I'd delivered live twins," Dr. McLeod, who originally is from Alabama and practiced veterinary medicine in Texas and Oklahoma, said. "Although I've seen several born before term."
 Mrs. Mansell said "The mare didn't seem to know what to do at first, now she seems to think having two colts is normal."

"At first she wasn't very careful of them, now she is very cautious."
 Mansell said if the colts lived to maturity, he would submit names Vanilla Float for the grey and Strawberry Float for the roan to Bloodhorse, the registrar of thoroughbred horses.
 A horse breeder since 1971, Mansell said he has sporadically raced horses since 1967.
 He presently owns three horses in addition to Vera Lira and the twins, one racing at Sunland Park, one recovering

from knee chip surgery and one in training for summer races.
 Mansell and his wife originally are from Omaha, Nebraska, where he was a regional tire manufacturing representative.
 They moved to Ruidoso two years ago and Mansell, a Certified Public Accountant, was associated with Dean and Mound Accounting, before purchasing the Hollywood Food Mart about a year and a half ago.

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

THE HIGH WIN PAYOFF (\$126.20) of the season was returned on Adobe Road in Sunday's fourth race. The gelding, completely overlooked by the fans at 62-1, sailed to an easy victory with apprentice Jaimi Maxwell handling the reins. He cleared the finish line eight lengths to the good, after taking the lead at the first jump. The favorite, Master Brian, ran a dismal seventh.

MAIDEN TWO-YEAR-OLDS took their first four-furlong spin in Sunday's second race. Royal Wood, a first-starter trained by J. B. Montgomery, took command from the outset and held off a late challenge by Trippy Dip in the stretch for an \$8.20 return. The margin of victory was 2 1/2 lengths. The youngster was guided by Darrell Blevins and coursed the four furlongs in a good time of 46 4/5 seconds.

THE EXPERTISE OF Newcomer Steve Valdez was again apparent when Misty

Sands (\$55.20) took a half-length win in Sunday's seventh race at a mile. The young jockey kept the mare well off the pace during the early going. She then responded quickly to urging in the stretch turn and overtook the leader Count Pierre. Count Pierre made an effort to hold her off, but failed and settled for second.

THE MUTUEL MACHINES were really steaming Sunday as 4,500 patrons wagered \$301,336 — highest so far in the '77-'78 meeting. The previous mark was set at \$290,870. Sunday's attendance was also a record for the combined fall-spring meeting.

CHALK PLAYERS HAD a rough go of it over the weekend. The favorites stood in good stead Friday, coming through six times on the 10-race card. But the number dwindled to five Saturday for 12 races. Sunday, the ax fell when only two held on for victory — Golden Form (\$7.40) in the ninth and I Rate III (\$7.60) in the 12th.

CENTER ATTRACTION, a four-year-old gelding had an easy time defeating maidens in the first race Saturday at 6 1/2 furlongs. He opened up a strong lead in the first turn and eagerly pulled away in the stretch for 7 3/4 lengths of daylight. The payoff was \$8.80.

SATURDAY'S FEATURE honored the Ruidoso Jockey Club as members of the organization made their annual visit to Sunland Park. Officials representing the group included Jess Burner, president; Monty Santaford, vice president; Lloyd Davis, manager; and Carl Joren, assistant manager.

APPRENTICE DON HOWARD had a successful day Saturday, scoring three wins, one second and one third from seven trips to the gate. The victories came on Center Attraction in the 1st (\$8.80), Mal Jester in the 5th (\$6.60) and Sak A Spirit (\$5.60) in the 8th.

TARLO GOT OFF at 6-1 in Saturday's third race, the season's first quarter horse event for two-year-olds. But jockey Darrell Blevins had the colt out of the gate with the first jump in the 330-yard sprint. The winning margin was 1 1/4 lengths for a \$14.60 return. Tarlo carried the same name as his papa (a thoroughbred). The heavy favorite, The Great Pharaoh, by Easy Jet, broke slowly on the outside, but came on to grab second.

ROCKET TE, the 2-1 favorite, seized his third victory of the spring in Friday's first race, winning by 3/4 lengths. The versatile gelding scored each triumph at a different distance. The first, at 350 yards for a length margin, was followed by a 440-yard dash in which he edged opponents by a neck. Friday's spin was at 400 yards. Regular jockey Stephen Rodriguez had the ride.

THE NO. 4 POST POSITION produced six winners over the weekend to lead in that category. Here are the seasonal totals: No. 1 — 63 wins, No. 2 — 79, No. 3 — 60, No. 4 — 69, No. 5 — 74, No. 6 — 76, No. 7 — 56, No. 8 — 44, No. 9 — 30, No. 10 — 29, No. 11 — 0, No. 12 — 1.

Going Strong

Combining Work and Art

At 82, Rufus Reed of Lovely, Kentucky is busy six days a week trying to keep up with the demand for his services as a surveyor, a profession he took up over 50 years ago.

"I've got the biggest private practice in eastern Kentucky," Reed told a writer from The National Council on the Aging. "Outside of the surveyors working for the coal companies, I'm the only licensed surveyor in these parts."

The eldest of 10 children, Reed grew up in a small Kentucky town. His father was a farmer, and as a boy, Reed would follow his father through the fields planting seeds in the furrows plowed by a mule.

As a child, Reed spent most of his time outside, a factor that may have brought about his strong love of nature. His feelings about the out-of-doors were so strong, in fact, that as a young man he quit a teaching job and took up surveying so he could spend most of his time outdoors.

Not only is Rufus Reed in great demand as a surveyor, but he is well known in eastern Kentucky for his poetry. He also writes a weekly nature column for

several area newspapers and is currently working on a book about nature.

"I started writing when I was 16," Reed said. "I write on Sundays, which some church-going folks think is wrong. To me, writing is a form of meditation, and nature is the work of the Lord."

Reed keeps track of his corner of God's creation as he walks the woods doing his surveyor's work. For over half a century now, Reed has tramped the woods, keeping track of familiar landmarks such as a half-buried stone or a certain tree and charting the changing seasons. All these elements of nature, and more, have an influence on Reed's writing.

Over the years, Reed and his wife, Frankie, have raised five children.

"I'm proud of all of them," he said. "The oldest boy is the commander of an Air Force base down at Myrtle Beach in South Carolina. That's doing pretty good for a country boy."

While Reed is proud of his son and others like him who leave the hills in search of a better living, he also admires the ones who remain and scratch out a living

"People always write books about people leaving this place for the outside world," Reed said. "I'd like to write one about the people that stayed and refused to quit."

Does Reed have any regrets about not leaving himself?

"Not me," he said. "I've got more work than I can handle and more ideas for stories and poems about nature than I'll ever be able to write. I don't know where else I could have so much, do you?"

USDA proposes changes in meat grading, labeling

The USDA has proposed changes in its meat grading and labeling procedures. These changes should stop the quality exaggeration which occurs in some supermarkets, says Bill Ljungdahl, Extension livestock specialist at New Mexico State University. However, these changes should not affect meat prices or grade standards.

Under the proposals, all beef sold at the retail level would have to be marked with either the quality grade or with a new "U.S. Ungraded" designation. The meat would carry the label all the way through the marketing chain. Imported meats would be handled in much the same way.

The proposals would require that only whole carcasses or sides be graded and that the grading occur only at the point of slaughter. The heart, fat and kidneys would be removed before grading and the rib-eye would be exposed at least 30 minutes before grading.

Yield grade marks could be removed from carcasses or cuts which have had the fat layer trimmed to one-half inch or less. The proposals call for a more specific definition of a beef carcass.

The USDA is seeking comment on the mandatory waiting period and temperature requirements before carcass grading. They may also require yield grades on retail cut packages. Hearings are slated during March.

SANTA FE — Even though the Senate achieved most of its goals in its session-long power struggle with the House, some House leaders were maintaining strongly that they had made some gains themselves.

Or at least, they said, the contest amounted to a virtual draw and a waste of public money.

On both sides, those willing to talk about how the power struggle came out didn't want their names to be used. And some said it will take some time, as the interim committees operate during the year between annual sessions, before it becomes apparent how the post-session balance of power works.

Here's what the Senate gained:

— Equal membership on two important interim committees. They are the Legislative Council, which sets overall policy, operates a bill drafting service and names House and Senate members to some interim committees.

— Rotation of the chairmanship of the interim committees. It was when the House went "out of turn" last year and named Rep. Eddie Lopez, D-Santa Fe, as the second House member of the LFC in a row that prompted this latest installment in the House-Senate battle that has been going on for years.

— The right of either House or Senate members to "veto" a proposal from the interim committees, even if there is not a majority of the whole committee against the proposal.

In addition, the Senate had teamed with House GOP members to make sure Republicans in that chamber had more voice in naming their members to interim committees. House Speaker Walter Martinez, D-Grants, had excluded House Republican Leader Hoyt Pattison and his number two GOP whip, Maurice Hobson,

from the Legislative Council.

On this basis, it seemed clearly that the House had lost on virtually every front. And some House members loyal to Speaker Martinez, as well as clearly dissident members, felt that to be the case — although again, none would say so publicly.

"How do you think we did?" asked one Democratic committee chairman to a newer colleague hours after the regular session adjourned.

"I think we got shafted," was the response.

Yet, there were some members of Martinez' ruling faction of Democrats known as the "Mama Lucy" group who argued that their coalition was not damaged as seriously as it might first appear.

"I don't think there'll be that much change," said a senior House member. "I think there's enough dissension in the Senate that C.B. (Trujillo) and Aubrey (Dunn) aren't going to be able to run that thing like a monolith."

He referred to the top Senate strategists in the contest with the House, Senate Majority Leader Trujillo of Taos, and Dunn, the chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, of Alamogordo.

He and other House leaders contended the inclusion of the provision that either chamber's delegation to the interim committees can have a veto leaves both on an equal footing — with either able to block proposals from the other chamber.

"It could slow down some of the activities in the interim," said one.

And top House members also contended the very battle itself — which reached almost seige-like proportions when House employees agreed to work with no agreement they would be paid — had united the House behind Martinez.

"I think it helped him very much," said one of the speaker's top lieutenants.

Dear Editor:

In the spring of 1976 several mule men got together with Richard Cothrun, then Manager of the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Chamber of Commerce, and formed the Lincoln County Mule-O-Rama Association. The purpose was to hold mule races in the slack season between the horse races and the ski season, and help the economy of the area.

Our first meet was in October 1976. Since we already had the world's richest horse race, we decided to have the world's richest mule races. To do this we added \$10,000.00 purse money; \$5,000.00 funded by the Department of Development and matched by \$5,000.00 from the Lodgers' Tax Funds of the Village of Ruidoso, plus some donations from individuals and companies interested in this unique event. We had mule races, mule show events, cutting mules, team tying, steer stopping, barrel racing, bole bending, a mule sale and fiddler's contest, and it was quite successful. It made no money, but brought quite a lot of people to the Ruidoso area.

We also started a mule futurity to be run in 1979, which could possibly be worth \$50,000.00. In the spring of 1977, it looked doubtful that we would receive any state funds and we wanted to increase the purses to be sure of getting quality mules from throughout the U.S. About this time, Richard Cothrun resigned from the Chamber of Commerce and did not want to be active in the Mule-O-Rama. Ray Reed, one of the Limited Partners of the Mule-O-Rama, was hired by the Village of Ruidoso to take care of the ever-increasing flow of Mule-O-Rama mail. He also started our condition book for 1977 races.

After the Chamber of Commerce hired a new manager, it seemed that things just did not work out for the best for the Mule-O-Rama with the Chamber involved. We knew we would have the mule events, but did not know how. We started asking for purse sponsors and donations from mule people and friends and things started shaping up. I went to New Mexico State Fair to work, and while there, I received a call from the chairman of the Lodgers' Tax Committee and was assured we would receive \$12,500.00 from Lodgers' Tax funds to help finance the Mule-O-Rama. With this commitment, I called Ray Reed and told him to send out the entry blanks and the Condition Book, as we had only 30 days left for organization.

Our Mule-O-Rama went fairly well considering the short time we had to plan. We had an increase of over 200% in mules and entries and spectators over 1976. We had a \$20,000.00 matched race, winner take all; fiddler's contest, and two dances. A team roping futurity was added, and all in all it looked real successful. Now somewhere down the line we inherited the Village of Ruidoso accountant, perhaps through the Chamber. I did not worry too much, as he assured me he was bonded, and handled both Village and Lodgers' Tax funds. We approved a \$3,000.00 labor budget which seemed ample, but ended up being \$11,000.00 plus. This same man also ordered a tower for the Village of Ruidoso that was to be set up at the Mule-O-Rama and then taken to the Municipal Airport for an observation tower, and we were assured that this would be of no cost whatsoever to the Mule-O-Rama. We ended up paying over \$3,000.00 of badly needed Mule-O-Rama funds on this unnecessary project. Then there was a matter of \$3,500.00 worth of unauthorized T-shirts paid for with Mule-O-Rama funds.

In trying to get all this settled and paid, we were advised by the Lodgers' Tax Committee that the Chairman had no authority to commit the \$12,500.00, but they would work with us. After several meetings, the Lodgers' Tax Committee came up with a figure that would have helped quite a lot with our problems, but it had to be approved by Ruidoso Village Council. It seems the Village Attorney is like the Chamber of Commerce Manager and does not want to see the Mule-O-Rama continue and therefore interpreted the advertising and promotion angle to almost leave the Mule-O-Rama without funding.

Now, the future of the Lincoln County Mule-O-Rama: We will not make these mistakes again. We no longer have the Village accountant. We are not out of debt, but we will have the Mule-O-Rama and the Mule-O-Rama Futurity and it will be bigger and better. We can see that we can expect very little support and lots of opposition to an event that would have brought Nation-wide advertising to the Ruidoso Area. So an event that could have really helped the Ruidoso Area at the right time now has to look for a new home where it is wanted and supported.

BROTHERLY LOVE



SPACE SUPPLY SHIPS

It has become apparent that the Russians are aiming at a new record for time spent in orbit by a space crew. Their way of going at this is of particular interest as a departure from anything that has been done before.

The new system was foreshadowed when a second team of Soyuz cosmonauts docked with the Salyut 6 space station which already had been occupied for some time by Yuri Romanenko and Georgy Grechko. Supplies and mail were brought to them by Vladimir Janibekov and Oleg Makarov, who returned to Earth after a week in space, leaving Romanenko and Grechko to carry on.

More significant, in some respects, is the use of an unmanned robot cargo space

transport to haul various items to the space station. According to Tass this craft, dubbed the Progress 1, was to deliver "fuel for power units and different cargoes, equipment, apparatus and materials for life support of the crew and for scientific exploration and experiments."

Such a system, involving periodic visits by unmanned transports, presumably would enable a crew to remain in the space station for a long time — perhaps even much longer than the present record of 84 days spent in Skylab 4 by three American astronauts about four years ago. The difference is that the U.S. mission was, as it were, self-contained, while the Russians are sending additional supplies from time to time.

This does not mean that the American space effort has fallen behind in this regard. On the contrary, the space shuttle system now being tested is a distinct advance because it envisions using the shuttle many times to ferry people, supplies and equipment to the orbital station. Both this and the present Soviet "shuttle," which, however, seems confined to expendable one-use-only supply craft, represent important developments in practical uses of space. — Alamogordo Daily News

Social Security information

"Under the 1977 amendments to the Social Security Act, and because of new regulations, a person can earn more money and still be considered disabled," Dan Mathis, social security field representative, said.

"In order for a person to receive disability benefits from the Social Security Administration he must prove, by medical and other evidence, that he is unable to engage in a substantially gainful activity (SGA)."

"If the disabled individual is statutorily blind, the new law states that he is not engaged in SGA if he earns no more than \$333.33 per month. Earnings over that amount would affect his eligibility benefits."

"Under new regulations, disabled people who are not blind are considered to be in a SGA if they earn over \$230. Earnings between \$150 and \$230 may be considered SGA, depending on the nature of the person's work activities. Earnings of less than \$150 per month will be assumed not to reflect SGA in the absence of evidence to the contrary."

"Although the above dollar amounts are guidelines, the circumstances in each individual case must be considered in determining whether or not a person meets the definition of disability in the social security law."





Grow a forest in seven years

Fifteen years ago Fred Widmoyer, head of New Mexico State University's Horticulture Department, planted two seedling Afghanistan pines in his backyard.

Although his actions were deliberate, the result of careful study and planning, he didn't know that he had just planted the beginnings of what has become a 25 million dollar a year industry. That industry centers on the commercial production of Afghanistan pine for use in landscaping and for Christmas trees.

Widmoyer discovered that there are several reasons for the Afghanistan pine's economic value. One of those reasons is its growth rate. In just 24 months, seeds grow into trees 36 inches high, while a seedling only 18 inches high will grow as much as three feet during its first year.

Once the Afghanistan pine is two years old, it averages four feet of new growth for the next three years, and during the next ten years, the tree will grow at least another 30 feet.

By way of comparison, during those same 10 years, an Aleppo pine averages only eight feet of new growth, and the Southwest's familiar Japanese black pine will grow only four feet. Those two trees Widmoyer planted 15 years ago are now waving among the powerlines some 50 to 60 feet above the ground.

Given that accelerated growth rate, in just seven years, four million Afghanistan

pinus could cover an area the size of Dallas with 25 foot tall trees. Two years later that forest will produce a billion seed cones, and the cycle of growth will begin again. In only ten years, the original trees would be ready for the first selective harvesting, providing valuable lumber for pulp and fuel.

Widmoyer also found that the pine is economically valuable to New Mexico because of its ability to adapt to both the semi-arid climate and the alkaline soil. While the pine does well in all soil types, its best performance is obtained with well-drained soil containing some organic matter. Once it is established, the pine will tolerate alkaline and salty soil. It will also withstand considerable drought and temperatures going as high as 130 degrees Fahrenheit.

Widmoyer did find that the trees will freeze in prolonged sub-zero temperatures. They will also die if burned, but apparently there is nothing else that will kill them.

For example, the pine is resistant to air pollution. Tests conducted by Russian foresters in 1973 on the highly industrialized and smog ridden Asphron Peninsula of the Caspian Sea indicated a high degree of air pollution resistance, while in the Los Angeles basin, plantings have shown no damage from smog.

If all this isn't enough, the Afghanistan

pine is not attacked by any of the insects or diseases prevalent among most ornamental conifers.

The pine's adaptability and fast growing rate means that in arid areas such as ours, the landscape architect will no longer be limited to slow growing cypress or cacti or other high water requiring plants. It also means that in a few short years, public buildings and office complexes in the Southwest may enjoy park-like settings similar to those in the North.

In addition to their ornamental value and beauty, the Afghanistan pine can also be used as windbreaks and as screens for privacy. Its fragrant, rich green foliage can transform the desert into a shade-filled oasis.

The history of Afghanistan pine goes back 25 centuries to its origins in between the Caspian and Aral seas where it was the only planted-by-nature pine forest. There on the rocky outcropping called Eller Oukhi, the trees survived hundreds of thousands of years of high desert winds

and scorching temperatures.

In 500 B.C., when armies of King Darius of Persia swept north across Asia Minor into what is now South Russia, they were amazed to find the Christmas tree shaped Afghanistan pine in an area where other pines were sparse and stunted.

In the years following Darius' invasion, the eastern shores of the Caspian became one of the most important trading areas in the Persian Empire. Assyrian merchants, impressed with the pine's ability to survive in such a desolate area, made gifts of its seeds to the princes and provincial governors along their caravan routes. And the desert nobility in turn demonstrated their wealth and power by creating forested gardens where few other plants could even grow.

Today, throughout the Middle East and Asia Minor there are hundreds of miles of dusty roads shaded by Afghanistan pines.

Who knows, in fifteen or twenty years other Afghanistan pines may shade hot, dusty New Mexico streets.

During my term as Mayor, I helped to start the ground work for our sewer system and would like to continue in this effort.

I am familiar with the building and maintenance of roads and streets — having followed this line of work for a number of years. Also, I understand very well what is required to run an orderly City Hall and Police Department.

My priorities would be: a sewer system for Ruidoso Downs; water storage to insure adequate fire protection for all of our Village; improved streets; restoration of the Community Center building (formerly known as the old city hall); proper care and maintenance of our facilities, i.e. - City Hall, Fire Station and equipment, streets, police, park and sanitation equipment.

I believe that the aforementioned experience qualifies me to be Mayor of Ruidoso Downs, and if elected, I will use everything at my disposal for the betterment of our Village.

'Ten most wanted'



Gary Ronald Warren, a thirty-two-year-old native of San Pedro, California, being sought as an escaped Federal prisoner and bank robber, has been added to the FBI's list of "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives."

Warren, a career criminal who has been convicted of burglary, rape with force, taking a vehicle without the owner's consent, and bank robbery, escaped from the Baker County Jail in MacClenny, Florida, on October 3, 1977, by utilizing a hacksaw to cut his way to freedom. At the time of his escape, he was serving a forty-year prison term following a conviction for armed robbery. Federal warrants were issued on June 22, 1977, and January 5, 1978, at Jacksonville, Florida, charging Warren with bank robbery. He is also being sought in connection with a series of bank robberies.

Warren's criminal activities have taken him from California to Florida.

Warren is a white male, born on March 7, 1945, at San Pedro, California, stands approximately 5 feet 11 inches tall, weighs 180 pounds, and has reddish-brown hair. He has blue eyes, a scar on his forehead, a scar under his left eye, and a scar on the back of his left hand.

He has used Social Security Number 549-60-3578 and has been employed as a brick mason, clerk, construction worker, heavy equipment operator, house painter,

laborer, lumberman, and as a salesman.

Warren has utilized such aliases as John Anthony, Mark Vinson Bradford, Paul Joseph Cocciante, Tom Court, Thomas Edward Quist, Tom Quist, Gary Warren, Gary Ronnie Warren, Ronnie Warren, Michael Wilson, and Mike Wilson.

Warren should be considered armed and dangerous. Anyone with information about him should contact the nearest office of the FBI, the telephone number of which is listed on the inside cover of most telephone directories.

Right Around Home



Visit fascinating Chiricahua National Monument

Erosion, when it is man caused, is often a detrimental force at work on some of America's lands.

But the slow, natural erosion that takes place over eons of time often carves out formations that are so unmatched in scenic grandeur that some have been set aside by your government to be enjoyed forever.

Probably the most famous example is the Grand Canyon, a spectacular gorge in north central Arizona carved out by the erosive force of the Colorado River.

At a less famous area in southeastern Arizona — Chiricahua National Monument — the erosion of volcanic rock has created pinnacles and pedestals that in their own way are as fascinating as the Grand Canyon.

These formations, at once described as grotesque, breathtaking and beautiful, are packed into 17 square miles of ridge and canyon on the flank of the Chiricahua Mountains. Both kids and adults love this place that on the surface seems like a rock fairyland.

The monument, surrounded on three sides by the Coronado National Forest, is located south of Interstate 10 and not too many miles east of the New Mexico state line.

From the visitor center, Massai Point Drive takes the visitor into the monument. This paved mountain road is the jumping off point to several trails, long and short, that will take you to all the principal features of the monument.

At drive's end is an exhibit building which will acquaint you with the volcanic and erosive processes that created the features that surround you. From Massai Point you can get an extensive view of an area that was part of the territory of Geronimo, Cochise and the Chiricahua Apaches.

While in the monument, you'll want to keep an eye open for wildlife. Because the mountains form an island in a sea of arid grassland and because of elevation differences (from 5100 to 7300 feet) there are a multitude of plant and animal species, including mule and white tail deer. Shady glens protect many species of birds and make the area a favorite of birdwatchers.

If you plan to spend the night, there is a campground in Bonita Canyon, a half mile from monument headquarters. Drinking water, fireplaces and tables are provided. Restrooms are centrally located. Trailers up to 22 feet can be accommodated, but there is no electricity and burning native wood is not permitted.

Motels and restaurants are available at Willcox, 36 miles from the monument.

It is suggested that you pick trails that do not overtax your stamina. Some, like Heart of Rocks Trail to such features as Punch and Judy and Big Balanced Rock, require up to seven hours, round trip, and it is necessary to carry water.

Others, such as Massai Point Trail, take

a half hour or less. Whatever your choice, wear comfortable shoes, set an easy pace and plan to complete the hike before dark.

Only 25 miles from Chiricahua is another National Park Service area — Fort Bowie National Historic Site — that tells of the early U.S. military presence in the area and its dealings with Cochise and Geronimo.

If you are planning to visit a National Park Service area on your vacation, write the agency at P.O. Box 728, Room 3, Santa Fe, N.M. 87501. You'll be sent a free vacation planning guide that lists NPS areas near you and charts the facilities and services available at each.

Citizen's view



'Us' and 'Them'

by John W. Gardner

"How can we avoid blowing ourselves up?" The short answer is that we can't avoid it if we follow the old ways of doing things. We're going to have to find some new ways to resolve conflict peaceably.

After millennia of bloodshed the goal seems unreachable—but until this century nobody really tried very hard. We've operated for centuries on the principle of self-preservation for the rich and the powerful, but that won't work any more. Now our fates are linked one with another, and if we save ourselves, we will do it together.

Most of us think of peace as something passive and uneventful—a happy vacuum. If we conceive of it in that fashion, we shall never have it. We cannot abolish conflict, nor would we wish to.

The whole history of law and much of the history of government has been an attempt to deal in a civil fashion with human conflict, to hold it within bounds, and to resolve it peaceably within a framework of order. Thus is justice done and the peace preserved.

If we do not blow ourselves up, we shall construct a peaceful world in much the same fashion—by painstakingly putting together the institutional arrangements which permit the ebb and flow of conflict and tension within a framework of order. We must build on a few values shared among nations, leaving to individual nations broad freedom to pursue their own vision of the moral order.

The prime value on which we must build is preservation of the species and the planet. It would sound far more lofty if I were to say we build on the sanctity of life, but what we can perhaps agree on is that we want to save humankind, the endangered species, and Earth, the endangered planet.

The second value we can build on is justice. That may sound like an exceptionally abstract principle to place next to the powerfully moving value of self-preservation. But of all social values that humans have celebrated, none is more ancient and universal than justice. We

know of few societies, ancient or modern, primitive or civilized, that have not had some concept of fair play. The hunger for justice reaches deep into the human psyche.

Next, I would list the worth of the individual, and I would include in that phrase the release of human potentialities, the enhancement of individual dignity, removal of the obstacles to individual growth and fulfillment. None of these are possible in a world of ignorance, hunger, disease, lack of opportunity, nor in a world of tyranny.

Finally, I would list a recognition and respect for our common humanity, a respect for those who are not of my village, tribe, nation, language, race or religion. Our old human habit is to form groups and draw circles around them. If you're inside the circle, you're one of "us," you're innocent until proven guilty, you're human as I am human. If you're outside the group, you're one of "them." You're probably untrustworthy. You have to be watched because you may turn dangerous at any moment.

Every modern nation is a composite of earlier tribalisms and fierce regional loyalties, most of which have given way to national identity. With a new consciousness of our shared responsibility for our small planet—Spaceship Earth—it is not inconceivable that the same process might occur world-wide. But only if we work at it.

Our planet is but a speck of dust in the universe, and our life on it is but an instant in the long stretch of astrophysical time. Still, it is the only planet we have and our life on it holds great possibilities of beauty and dignity and meaning. Yet if it were asked of us how we spend our instant of time on our speck of dust, we would have to say, "We spend a good deal of it fighting one another and laying waste our earth."

Surely we can do better.
