# Davis, Wheeler, elected mayors

Ruidoso voters Tuesday reelected Lloyd L. Davis Jr., to a second term as mayor by a comfortable margin as Ruidoso Downs voters elected incumbent Norman Wheeler to his first four year term by a slim four vote edge provided by absentee ballots.

At Ruidoso Downs challenger Jake Harris polled 81 votes through the machines to 80 for Wheeler. Five absentee ballots were cast for Wheeler, giving him a four point margin of 85. Challenger Harrold Mansell received 60 votes. A total of 229 votes were cast.

Dennis polled 85 votes, Don Clark, 78 and Sandra Currans, 48. Incumbent Briscoe West, 171 votes, defeated Ray Walker, 41, for a four year term as Municipal Judge in Ruidoso Downs.

— Incumbent Sam Nunnally polled 786 votes for a second four year term as Municipal Judge, against the 134 votes polled by Molly Jarvis.

"On behalf of the Village of Ruidoso," village manager Jim Hine said Wednesday, "I want to express our appreciation to every candidate who ran for office and to the record number of voters turning out for this election. It is a privilege for us, as village employees, to work for a citizenry that is definitely interested in the community and in its future."

In the Ruidoso race incumbent mayor Davis defeated challenger John Cupp by a 577 to 393 tally out of a total of 953 votes cast. The total included 24 absentee ballots and set a record for voter turnout in a municipal election.

With Downs electing all four trustees, in the four year race Ray Parnell with 131 and Lois D. Beavers with 123 won the positions. In this race, Ray Reed polled 77 votes and Emelia Maes, 66. In the two year race, Juanita L. Burke had 95 votes with 91 for Vada Leighton; and "Dee"

In the other Ruidoso races:

— Frank Sayner, 550 votes, and incumbent Sherman Atwood, 441, were elected to four year terms as trustees. The defeated candidates were Jim Wooldridge, 411, Wayne Dacy, 275 and Tom Loudon, 118.

## Travel representatives to inspect Ruidoso area

Representatives of thirty travel agencies, on a Continental Airlines familiarization tour, will visit the Ruidoso area March 16-18.

The first travel representatives' schedule includes:

March 16 — Arrive in El Paso and travel by bus to the Inn of the Mountain Gods. Dinner will be at Kings Supper Club.

March 17 — Tour Sierra Blanca Ski Resort with dinner at the Sierra Swim and

Racquet Club. March 18 — Day long tours of Ruidoso and area with a 12 noon lunch at Cousins' and dinner at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

"The lunch, at \$3.50 per person, at Cousins' is open to the public and our committee is encouraging all interested persons to make their reservations to meet these travel representatives," Cuddy said.

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission Tuesday received the approved Joint Powers Agreement from the office of the Attorney General and now has full authority to act on plans for the proposed regional airport, near Ft. Stanton.

## Sudderth sues Lincoln County on tax valuation

Acting as a private citizen, John Sudderth, chairman of the Lincoln County commissioners, has filed suit against the county on the taxable valuation assessed against an unimproved lot in Golf Course Estates Subdivision, Ruidoso.

Sudderth's attorney, Bill Payne of Carrizozo, said to The News Tuesday, "It is alleged that the taxable valuation is in excess of the purchase price of the lot."

The suit, filed against Lincoln County treasurer Michael Kimbrell, alleges that the lot was valued, for tax purposes, at \$215 last year and that, for the same unimproved lot, the current valuation is \$8,499.

"The suit," Payne said, "is being filed to demand a refund of excess tax paid. It is also, in a sense, a test case."

# County commissioners air two health proposals

Two proposals involving areas within county health services were aired at Monday's meeting of the Lincoln County commissioners:

— A plan that may see the addition of two new ambulances to the existing county emergency-medical services (EMS) fleet.

— A plan for possible control transference over the Carrizozo Hospital to Alamogordo's Zia Therapy Center.

Contingent upon county reception of a federal grant to cover part of the expense of the ambulances, the project may cost the county \$23,000, according to Les Olsen, Lincoln County manager.

Total cost of the new equipment will be about \$80,000, according to EMS county coordinator Bud Payne who said the grant has been applied for and is pending agency approval.

During the Monday meeting, John Sudderth, board chairman, congratulated Payne for his work and said, "We'll be very sympathetic to your problems in the budget."

According to Payne, the grant and earmarked county funds will be used to purchase a \$22,000 — \$25,000 ambulance for the Bonito area.

Payne said that "\$17,000 — \$18,000 or \$10,000 — \$11,000, depending on the model," will be used to purchase a replacement unit for the Carrizozo area.

Olsen said approximately \$35,000 will be used to purchase additional emergency equipment and to train emergency-medical technicians (EMT).

FORMAL APPROVAL for the transference of control of the hospital, according to Sudderth, will follow appraisal of a neighboring building which may be used as a health clinic, and is dependent upon board reception of the actual cost of the twin projects.

"We can't just give blanket approval," Sudderth said. "We have to have all those figures before we can proceed."

George Cordell, Zia director, told the board that his board of directors had given approval for the control transfer.

Cordell said the hospital would be used as a training center for developmentally-

handicapped persons. He added that school participants would learn job and living skills and would be given a chance to gain job experience.

Cordell said that major funding for the project had been secured through the state's department of hospitals and institutions. Cordell contended that legislation enabling the funding had recently passed in Santa Fe.

The project is being spearheaded by Mary Rich who said the operation of the existing hospital as a medical center would be economically unfeasible.

She added that the existing X-ray and emergency facilities within the hospital would remain under control of the medical center.

AN OUTLINE FOR A possible county desalinization project was also voiced by Rich for the commissioners.

She said that plans for such a project were progressing and stressed that Lincoln County would incur no additional bills for such an undertaking.

Described as a "demonstration

project," the possible program will be funded by the United States Department of the Interior with a one-third share to come from the state, according to Rich.

Rich said that she felt that such an undertaking (on a full-scale basis) might draw "some industry" into the area.

In other action the commissioners:

— Decided by a vote of 2-1 with commissioner Lee Straley voting "no", to order four police cars through an existing New Mexico State Police contract for the Lincoln County Sheriff's office. Straley said he "would go along with three" but felt "four are too many."

— Voted to support the implementation of a 911-emergency-telephone-number system. Such a system is currently being considered by Continental Telephone Company and is being employed elsewhere by the Mountain States Telephone Company.

— Voted to appropriate more than \$3,167 to cover printing costs for a Lincoln County recreation guide.

— Voted to approve the county payroll and warrant registers.

### Bigbee talks to Rotarians

State Representative John Bigbee Tuesday advised Ruidoso Rotarians that the \$50 million cut in state taxes will be affected by the rate of inflation.

"Under the present rate of inflation," Bigbee said, "the state will collect more from you next year, even with the \$50 million tax cut."

In discussing legislative action, Bigbee said, "Some of the delays were caused by the conservatives taking a stand against the Mama Lucys."

In noting that Albuquerque voters must approve the Community College, he said that legislative action will put the proposed institution on a tuition basis for all students.

**SANTA FE** — The creation of a new cabinet-level department of state government dealing with educational finance is having an effect not only in Santa Fe but in communities throughout New Mexico.

For years, Harry Wugalter, state government's school finance chief, was a fixture on the scene in every local school district as each year's school budget hearings were held.

Wugalter became chief of the Public School Finance Division of the State Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) in January 1963. And in his words:

"For 12 consecutive years I conducted every (school) budget hearing in the state of New Mexico. In 12 years I never missed a hearing. I calculate I spent over 3,500 hours at actual meetings, not counting transportation.

"I calculate that for every three years of state service I was away from home for one year."

One veteran capitol education expert says Wugalter was a powerful influence on local school boards during those years and occasionally would, in an unofficial way, persuade school board members to allocate a larger share of the budget to teacher salaries than they originally had planned.

Wugalter concedes he may have had such unofficial accomplishments.

And he thinks his years in the 88 school districts (107 when he first started) helped give him invaluable experience in local school operations. As school finance chief during that time, he said he preferred to "be on-site, rather than sit in Santa Fe and dream up solutions for problems you're really not familiar with."

But when Gov. Jerry Apodaca came into office in 1975, Wugalter began assuming even more responsibilities.

On March 31, Wugalter will officially become secretary of the new cabinet-level Department of Educational Finance and Cultural Affairs. Unofficially, he already has been serving in such a capacity for the past couple of years.

Wugalter says his assistants now do "most of the field work" in attending hearings in the local districts, "although I will make periodic visits to keep myself acquainted."

As secretary of the department, Wugalter will be the main spokesman on educational policy in the governor's cabinet.

This will be the case even though the State Department of Education, under a board of education, will continue to be involved in curricula and program offerings in the schools.

Wugalter will continue to be the main policy-maker on the other segment of school issues — finance.

But he also will, as one observer said, be "spread even thinner."

He will have under his jurisdiction state government museums, historic preservation programs and other cultural matters.

He's chairman of the Governor's Commission on Public Broadcasting, and on the board of the Rocky Mountain Corporation on Public Broadcasting. He dealt with Apodaca's proposal for a new community college in Bernalillo County.

And for extras he teaches one semester a year at the University of New Mexico, on Saturdays, on educational administration and school business management. He says he doesn't want to "lose the appreciation of what it's like in the classroom."

### SECRECY OF VOTE

The Michigan Supreme Court's ruling in the case of Susan R. Van Hattum is a welcome reaffirmation of the right to vote in secret. The sanctity of the ballot box would have been eroded to some extent had the court acted otherwise.

The case arose from an Ann Arbor mayoral election. The losing candidate challenged the legality of ballots cast by the defendant and others. Ordered by a circuit court judge to disclose how she voted, Miss Van Hattum refused and was then held in contempt of court.

As often happens, conflicting interests were involved — in this case, the secrecy of the vote as against the importance of fairly determining the election's outcome. We believe the arguments for preserving the inviolate nature of the ballot are the more compelling.

The principle that a citizen can vote without fearing that his vote may be disclosed is an essential pillar of the American democratic system. It is good that the state Supreme Court in Michigan has upheld this principle. — Alamogordo Daily News

### The Bicentennial Kid Turns 76

Around Lee County, a farming area in eastern Illinois, Pearl Garland is known as the "Bicentennial Kid." On the 4th of July, Mrs. Garland turned 76.

Mrs. Garland is a lifelong resident of Lee County. She was raised on a farm along with her 11 brothers and sisters. All of them were assigned regular chores and Pearl helped out with the gardening as well as baking and cooking.

In 1920, she married a young local man and they began farming near where she'd grown up. In those days farmers didn't have all the specialized equipment of today's agri-businessmen and Mrs. Garland remembers her husband leaving early in the morning and hand-picking two rows of corn before returning for lunch.

With five children to raise, the Garlands experienced some difficult times during the Depression.

"Corn was selling for about eight cents a bushel and eggs for six cents a dozen," Mrs. Garland recalled during a recent interview with a writer from The National Council on the Aging.

"We used kerosene lamps on the place until the 40s," Mrs. Garland went on. "Why I didn't get my first refrigerator until my birthday in 1940."

Yet, despite the hardships, the Garlands and their children made it through the Depression unscathed.

When her husband died three years ago, Mrs. Garland went to work as a cook in a local restaurant. Her girlhood training in the kitchen was first-class, because in 1975 she was named "Employee of the Year."

She also clings to a lifetime of growing things, often

bringing vegetables from her own garden to garnish plates she serves at the restaurant.

Because people in small, rural communities tend to have close ties to their relatives and friends, the town of Harmon has been celebrating Pearl's birthday for a number of years.

Three years ago when the town got a new fire engine, she was honored as its first woman passenger. Last year a party was held at the community building.

But the number of people who consider Pearl Garland a friend reaches beyond the boundaries of Lee County. Last May, she began receiving best wishes for her 76th birthday from as far away as the Vatican, as well as from her children, 15 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren, who are scattered all over the United States.

Although 1976 was truly a special year for the "Bicentennial Kid," the town of Harmon, Illinois will be celebrating Pearl Garland's birthday for many years to come.

ble, convenient and easily deliverable meals for people who have trouble preparing their own food.




