

# Trustees handle routine business

The Ruidoso village trustees Tuesday evening, in addition to refusing a request for additional funding for the Lincoln County Mule-O-Rama Association from president Bill Ward of Lincoln, considered routine agenda items including:

- Report from Tom Mann of Mann Engineering, Roswell, that the Soil Conservation Service report on Eagle Creek Dam is expected "next week" after which finalizing of plans can be started. Mann said the dam composition, materials and location "are approved and everything looks good as far as I'm concerned. It's moving."
- Took no action on annexation of 10.25 acres of land owned by Robert Welch, adjacent to the Municipal Airport on the west, pending approval by the Planning and Zoning Commission.
- Postponed, until the March 28 meeting, action on manhole repairs and sewer extension in the Navajo subdivision. The estimated project cost is pegged at \$2,000.

- Approved a request from Tom Loudon and Jim George for sewer service in Pine Tree Park subdivision, at a cost to the village of approximately \$400. Requested that village manager Jim Hine investigate adding other possible users in the subdivision and report his findings at the next trustees' meeting.
- Were advised there is \$3,225 remaining in Lodger's Tax funds after approval of a \$3,836.03 advertising bill from Sanders' Advertising Agency, El Paso, Texas, for Chamber of Commerce promotions.
- Adopted Resolution 78-4 on a cooperative agreement with the State Highway Department to resurface 6.3 miles of road including 1.2 miles on White Mountain Drive, .6 miles on Carrizo Road, 1.2 miles on Hull Road, 2.4 miles on Cedar Creek Drive and .7 miles on Country Club Drive. The project cost, with 50 percent to be paid locally, is \$133,639.49.
- Following a request from Chief of Police Paul Lukens for a new ambulance, instructed Hine to "check on budgeting for it for the next fiscal year."
- Were advised that bids for improvements at the Municipal Airport will be opened March 23 at 2 p.m., in village hall.
- Approved transfer of a Senior Citizens of Lincoln County van from Ruidoso to Carrizozo, for use of senior citizens.
- Approve hiring of temporary laborers from the Sierra Blanca Honor Farm, Ft. Stanton, as needed during the summer.
- Authorized Hine to notify officials of state departments concerned of a sewage problem in Ponderosa Heights, ask for an inspection and request remedial action.

## Correction:

In the Monday, March 13 issue of the Ruidoso News it was reported that Tim Collins, representing Devon Development, had met opposition from residents of the Golf Course Estates in his efforts to secure a zoning change for the area.

Though Collins has, in the past represented Devon Development, and Devon Development was mentioned in connection with discussion of the requested rezoning action, Collins represented El Paso-based Winton Enterprises in the matter.

# School principals' contracts renewed

Renewal of principals' contracts, a change in mileage and per diem rates and the 1978-79 budget were items of discussion at the brief Tuesday evening meeting of the Ruidoso Board of Education.

Contracts for principals Donny Weems, Mike Gladden, Sid Miller and Tom Hansen were renewed for the 1978-79 school year by the board with "appreciation for their diligence and long hard hours."

The board also voted to change mileage and per diem allowances to \$32 per diem in-state and \$44 per diem out-of-state with 17 cents per mile allowed in compliance with levels set by HB 209.

Formerly rates in the school system were \$24 in-state, \$36 out-of-state and 12 cents per mile.

The budget for 1978-79 will be publicly reviewed at 2 p.m., April 24, in the high school library by the school board and the director of Public School Finance.

Superintendent of Schools Pat Vaillant told the board preparation of the budget is underway and the system is anticipating an increase in enrollment, thereby increasing revenue.

Vaillant, who returned recently from a budget workshop, said the system's increase in enrollment was contrary to statewide trends of declining enrollment and that controversy arose in the

legislature over the increase in number of teachers hired throughout the state and an increase in salaries, despite the declining enrollment figures.

Projected 1978-79 enrollment figures for the Ruidoso Municipal School System are 666 students in grades 7-12 and almost 600 in grades 1-6.

"The bulk of our students are in the upper grades and when they graduate we may face the declining enrollment problem other school districts in the state are facing now," Vaillant said.

In other business, the board:

- Approved a request for use of the gymnasium by Bill Elliot of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department June 22, for a program of gospel music and discussion of law enforcement.
- Admission will be charged and proceeds will be used by the Junior Deputies.
- Approved a request for use of the gymnasium by the Lincoln County Community Association of Performing Arts, April 17, for a performance of the Albuquerque Dance Theatre.
- Discussed charging groups requesting to use municipal school system facilities for expenses incurred including utilities and custodial fees.
- Regretfully accepted the resignation of Mrs. Grey Mason, teacher-aide at White

Mountain Middle School, who is moving with her husband to another locale.

- Heard a report from Vaillant \$564,485 was on hand in the principal fund, which is accumulated investments and interest.
- Approved checks for the recent months.
- Approved budget transfers of \$2,000 from teachers' salaries to substitute teachers' leave; \$3,000 from teachers' salaries to instructional supplies and materials; \$4,000 from custodial salaries to electricity; \$2,000 from custodial salaries to purchased services; \$2,000 from custodial supplies to telephone; \$1,000 from student support, activities, to student support, athletics, and \$475 from building, improvement of land, to building, equipment.

The committee also discussed ideas for future special events and the "overwhelming response" to the March special event, a premiere showing of "Casey's Shadow" for Chamber members at 4 p.m., Friday in Roswell.

The feature-length motion picture, which was filmed in Ruidoso in the summer months of 1976, will be shown through a cooperative effort by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Roswell Chamber of Commerce.

The special events committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce voted Tuesday to begin organizing a "get ready for summer" breakfast featuring a speaker from the state Department of Development, tourism division.

"The breakfast will be organized to benefit area businessmen and Chamber of Commerce members," Bill Hirschfeld, committee chairman, said.

"The speaker will explain state assistance available to businessmen and discuss how to deal with tourists."

## Mike Taylor's statement

In a telephone interview with Taylor, association accountant, now of Hobbs, he said, in explaining how Mule-O-Rama funds were handled in the first Mule-O-Rama in 1976 and again during the 1977 Mule-O-Rama:

"The money was handled (in 1977) in precisely the same manner as last year's (1976) Mule-O-Rama. Simply speaking, all cash that came in was used on the operation of the original Mule-O-Rama; then, after all bills were settled, the balance was put in certificate of deposit (C.D.) and was left (there) for the 1977 Mule-O-Rama.

"The same procedure was basically followed this year (during the 1977 Mule-O-Rama), but due to lack of income and expected funds, as yet there is no overage to be deposited back in certificate of deposit.

"Cashing the \$4,000 C.D. required six signatures by members of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce.

"Mule-O-Rama has obligations, whether to the mule owners or to whomever. They are obligated to pay it, regardless of where the money comes from.

"At no time prior to the signing (of the C.D.) for disbursement of those funds, was I informed that that money could not specifically be used for payment (of bills) by anyone.

"Had the Lodger's Tax come through with \$12,500 and private donors with approximately \$2,500 - \$3,000, which did not materialize in full, but had it done so, we'd have been in fairly good shape.

"The misconception (on fund misuse allegations) is rooted in the fact that all funds were handled the same way as the year before."

## Bonito vehicle restrictions set

Parking and camping restrictions presently are being enforced at Bonito Lake, Smokey Bear District recreation and land use forester Joe Spehar said.

The restrictions which were brought on by heavy congestion in the area will be enforced from "the dam up the road to just before the Southfork Campground turnout," he said.

"Signs were posted last autumn during a low use period specifying parking only in designated turnouts. No camping will be allowed in those signed areas."

Spehar added camping will be allowed elsewhere on the forest including further up Bonito Canyon and in Southfork Campground.

"Our concern (in revising the parking and camping regulations) was the safety aspect."

"Citations have been issued in the past, but there is a great disparity between the number who do it and the number who get caught," he said.

Other reasons camping will not be allowed in the parking areas include "campers use space which could be used by the day fisherman or picnicker and campers leave their recreation vehicles in the parking areas and go off to do other things in a second vehicle."

Spehar foresaw problems with enforcing the regulations as "we are trying to change use habits of several years duration."

"There probably was no problem when the road was constructed but with the increase in popularity of the Ruidoso area and the increase in use, problems have developed."

"Vehicles were occupying all available space, both in the turnouts and along the shoulders and sometimes only a single lane would be open, causing blind corners."

Other problems caused by congestion included the danger of a vehicle hitting a pedestrian stepping out from between parked cars and vehicles blindly pulling out into traffic.

"Another reason for enforcing the rules is the resultant overuse of the reservoir contributing to water degradation," Spehar said.

"Garbage has been found in and along the lake and self-contained units have been dumping holding tanks of raw sewage into the reservoir."

**Stolen van recovered**

A 1966 Chevrolet van, stolen in Ruidoso March 11, was recovered at 7 p.m., March 12 on Interstate 10 about 70 miles east of El Paso, Texas.

## Downs may profit from race tax law

The coffers of the Village of Ruidoso Downs could be enriched by more than \$10,000 per year as the result of a new bill signed into law Friday by Governor Jerry Apodaca.

Senate Bill 14, sponsored by Lincoln County State Senator John Conway will allow the State Racing Commission to remit half of the currently assessed license fee to a municipality located within a ten-mile radius of a race track.

Previously, \$150 of the \$300-per-day total was retained in the state's general fund with the remainder going to the county in which the race track is located. Under the new law, the state's share will revert to the municipality.

With 71 racing days currently scheduled in Ruidoso Downs for the 1978 racing season, Conway said Tuesday that the village could stand to make as much as \$10,650 this year as a result of the new law.

"This could mean the addition of a new policeman, or two, for Ruidoso Downs,"

Conway said, a village which does not have around-the-clock protection.

"If you've ever lived there in the summer," he added, "you know what an addition that would be."

According to Virginia Spall, village clerk, the money has yet to be earmarked. She said it couldn't be committed until it was received.

Conway said he effectively was co-sponsor of the bill, explaining that State Representative John Bigbee, Lincoln County, sponsored the same bill in the state House of Representatives.

Conway added that his bill had gone before the Senate before Bigbee's bill was given House consideration.

He said he believed the bill was signed without an emergency clause which would allow for immediate implementation. Barring existence of an emergency clause the bill, under state law, will become effective 90 days after it is signed by the governor.

Under terms of the act, a racing license applicant must file for a license 60 days before the first day of scheduled racing. The \$300-per-racing-day fee is to be paid at that time.

The act defines the money remitted as an "occupation tax", to go to the credit of the county general fund and the municipal general fund.

The act further states that if the track is not located within ten miles of a municipality, "the remaining one-half of the licensing fee shall be credited to the state general fund."

"In the discretion of the commission," the law states, "State Fair associations may be licensed without payment of any fees."

A licensing fee for State Fair races is provided for, under the law, but it "shall not exceed ten dollars per day for each racing day authorized." The law further states that the county and municipality are not entitled to any part of the license fees paid by the state fair association.

The Ruidoso Downs trustees Monday, in a meeting lasting less than thirty minutes, voted for a one-grade retroactive pay raise for seven village office employees and issued 16 occupational licenses.

The grade increases, which will tap the village's general fund for \$1,264, will be in effect for the remainder of the fiscal year, retroactive to March 1.

The increase in salaries is viewed as an attempt on the part of the trustees to "draw good help and keep it."

Trustee Harold Mansell said he didn't know how "people (could) live on this kind of money."

In other action the board issued occupational licenses for the following businesses: White Mountain Enterprises, R & R Fence, Wood Welding Service, Western Security Services, Paddock Trailer Park, Roy's Auto Service, J. C. 




## Delayed sprays start pest control plan

With warm weather coming, plants and pests alike will soon be active. Before the leaves unfold on deciduous trees, you can start this year's pest control program with a delayed dormant spray. John J. Durkin, Extension entomologist at New Mexico State University, suggests that you use oil mixed with either Spectracide (Diazinon) or lime-sulfur (calcium polysulfide).

Using an oil-insecticide spray on ornamental and fruit trees will control many troublesome pests, such as scales, spider mites and some aphids. Oil and lime-sulfur should be used if blister mites, bud mites or gall mites have been a problem. This combination will also protect new growth from powdery mildew, Durkin says.

You can apply a delayed dormant spray

from the time leaf buds swell until some green tips start showing. On broad-leaved evergreens, such as euonymus, the spray should be applied just as new growth begins.

Check weather forecasts before applying oil. Don't spray if the temperature is predicted to drop below freezing within 48 hours after the application. Choose a warm, calm day to do your spraying, Durkin says.

Oil kills by smothering the eggs or immature pests. Therefore, lay a continuous film over the bark and in cracks and crevices. Use a fine mist to achieve the best coverage.

To improve the effectiveness of an oil spray against scale insects, add Spre-

tricide, ethion or malathion. This is also a must for control of euonymus scale and European elm scale.

Before buying a dormant spray material, read the label completely. Oil-lime-sulfur combinations should not be applied to evergreens and lime-sulfur should not be applied to apricots. Blue spruce are discolored by oil sprays for two or more weeks after application, the specialist concludes.



The Ruidoso CB Club is pleased and thrilled to announce its support of a most worthy and interesting cause: Sierra Blanca Handicapped Skiers Association (SBHSA). At Monday evening's meeting, Ray Bishop, spokesman for SBHSA, explained the activities, goals and needs of the organization. This all-volunteer, non-profit group of instructors has taught 30 handicapped persons to ski this season, dealing successfully with victims of blindness, paralysis, amputation, cerebral palsy, mental retardation and other disadvantages.

At the National Disabled Ski Meet two weeks ago in Winter Park, our local participants brought home ten medals and three trophies. Because these skiers and their instructors did so well in competition, they should definitely go on to the International Meet in Canada next month.

CB Club members voted unanimously to adopt SBHSA as a permanent project, and to help meet the immediate need of raising \$6,500.00 by April 1, to help finance the Canadian trip.

Not being a group to let grass grow under their feet, within an hour after the meeting adjourned, an all-night "Coffee Break" had been organized and set up in the lobby of the Chaparral (complete with installation of a base station). An appeal went out and soon those phenomenal folk known as truckers were coming through the door to meet the club members, drink coffee and drop generous donations in the bucket. When this reporter dragged home at 4 a.m., the campaign was well under way.

The Coffee Breaks will continue every night from 10 to 6 a.m., until April 1. Please come by the Chaparral or mail

your tax deductible contribution to Box 3171 H. S. . . and if possible, go up to the ski run any Wednesday morning and see these terrific handicapped skiers work out with their instructors.

Last Tuesday morning, the skip was measuring a solid nine pounds when a weak call for the CB Club was heard from the mountain. After much broken transmission and several 10-9's, it was determined that a Trailways bus, driven by the Dallas Silver Streak, had lost one snow chain and broken the other. A land line to the Whitewall, local tire dealer, sent him rolling with another set of chains.

Only when he returned, did we know the full circumstances and how narrowly a tragedy had been averted. That day chains were definitely required on the ski run road, but as too often happens, someone had decided they were above the law; they almost got away with it . . . until Axle Bend. There, on the curve, the car slid and stuck. Unable to see it ahead, the big bus came around the turn and was forced to swerve. Sliding precariously near the edge of the drop, Silver Streak down shifted and accelerated. One chain broke and flew over the cliff. The other broke, but managed to maintain enough traction to prevent that bus, with 38 passengers on board, from going over the edge. We thank the Silver Streak for his excellent driving ability and Whitewall for getting replacement chains up to the bus . . .

Sunday's snow brought problems for the ski mountain traffic; several fender benders and cars without chains slowed things to a standstill on the way down, but it gave us a chance to modulate with Hillbilly, Ragman, Brandywine and other regulars. They kept local bases posted on conditions and Brandy even rescued a couple of skiers with car trouble, took them to town and delivered them to the Wrecker Man. Speaking of whom, between the mountain problems and the accident on Apache Summit that same night, he was one busy fellow . . .

**SANTA FE** — What are the services of New Mexico's lawmakers worth to the state's residents?

In November, voters will have an opportunity to voice their opinions on the subject. There'll be on the ballot a proposed amendment to the New Mexico Constitution which would allow legislators to draw a \$300-a-month reimbursement for expenses, year-round.

Presently, state representatives and senators get paid \$40 a day only during the actual lawmaking sessions or, in the case of some, during meeting of "interim" committee sessions which operate the rest of the year.

The sessions themselves are for 30 days during even-numbered years and for 60 days in odd-numbered years.  
 The 42 senators and 72 representatives also get mileage to Santa Fe for official trips.

Sens. Raymond Sitta, D-San Juan, and Lawrence Goodell, D-Chaves-Eddy, sponsored the proposed amendment to the constitution, which if approved by voters would go into effect in 1979.

Sitta says the job of the legislator is year-round, rather than simply during the once-a-year sessions in the state capitol.

"Hardly a day goes by that I don't get contacted by somebody about a problem," said the Farmington physician. "During

the interim someone will call me and ask, 'How do I get such-and-such a license?' I don't know so I call Santa Fe. Usually I have to end up calling twice, and I have to pay for them (the calls)."

Sitta says legislators have to pay for official stationery they use over 500 sheets, and that last year he received 1,200 letters on the "right-to-work" labor issue alone. Plus he had to pay for postage.

In addition, Sitta said he goes to many meetings each year that are more-or-less required of him, but are not official meetings of "interim" committees for which he can be reimbursed.

"I don't think the taxpayers expect for us to pay for all this out of our pocket," Sitta said.

An analysis of the proposed constitutional amendment by the Legislative Council Service lists these various "pros and cons" on the subject.

Arguments for:  
 — The out-of-pocket expenditures mentioned by Sen. Sitta are for official business but are not presently compensated for.

— Legislators have to maintain, in effect, two homes during a legislative session.

— Legislators, to do their jobs properly "must either be financially independent or accept favors and gratuities" from those who will hope to sway their judgment or votes in response.

Arguments against:  
 — Payment of expenses for lawmakers "would require a costly and burdensome system of auditing, in order to determine whether the expenses claimed were legitimate legislative business."

— If the job "did not require any sacrifice in time or money, many less qualified and unscrupulous persons would seek the office."

— "The office of legislator is an honor that bears its own compensation in terms of status."





## Carlsbad Caverns a favorite spot

Most visitors to Carlsbad Caverns National Park in southeast New Mexico come with camera at the ready.

A few bring along an array of paint brushes, acrylics, oils, water colors, easels, canvas and similar paraphernalia. The intricate formations in the park's caves and the cactus-studded backcountry landscapes have long been favorite subjects of Southwestern artists.

And since 1972 these artists have been able to display their paintings in the Carlsbad Caverns visitor center during an annual art show.

This year park superintendent Don Dayton scheduled the art show from March 22 through April 4 and artists from throughout the region are again expected to enter and compete for the top prize — a blue ribbon.

So if you are planning a visit to the park during the show and don't have time for a backcountry visit, let the backcountry come to you through the paintings. And you can help determine the winner by casting a vote for your favorite.

Late March and early April is an excellent time to visit Carlsbad and the nearby Guadalupe Mountains National Park in West Texas — the days begin to get warm without being hot.

After enjoying the art show, take a stroll through the Caverns. The walk-in trip begins at the natural entrance near the visitor center and usually takes two and a half to three hours. You can start the trip anytime between 8 a.m. and 3:15 p.m. daily in winter and 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in summer.

The first mile and a half of the trip features an 830-foot descent, then an 80-foot ascent known as Appetite Hill before reaching the Underground Lunchroom where elevators are located. Everybody rides back to the top.

If you don't think you can handle the walk-in, you can go down in the elevator for the shorter Big Room tour.

As you enter the Caverns, you'll be given a radio receiver and along the way you can pick up messages that tell about the features you are near. You may set the receiver on any of three channels — one broadcasting in English, one in Spanish and one with a special script for children.

There are rangers strategically stationed along the way to answer questions or help you in any way.

The visitor center is located seven miles west of Highway 62-180 at the end of State Route 7. 27 miles southwest of Carlsbad, N. M. and 150 miles east of El Paso, Texas.

The park is a Designated Fee Area and the visitor center is the place to pay the daily entrance fee of \$3 for private non-commercial vehicles or \$1 per person for those arriving by commercial carrier. Golden Eagle and Golden Age passports are honored.

Be sure to wear low-heeled, rubber-soled shoes for the Cavern trip and a light sweater.



# Sunland Park Hoofbeats

**TRAINER J. B. MONTGOMERY** unleashed three more flashy youngsters from his fleet of quarter horses over the weekend. In Sunday's second race, Rosie Tarlo took off like a shot with Darrell Blevins at the helm. The filly scored a neck victory in 17 seconds flat to set the fastest seasonal time for 330 yards. In the next race, Oh What Fun missed by only a head to finish second. Saturday, Pleasant Thought got the jump for a neck margin in another fast time of 17.14. Of the season's seven two-year-old events, Montgomery's charges have hit the winner's circle four times. The other victories were Whatta Brisk Bug (17.30) and Tarlo (17.34).

**CARLOS RIVAS** was back in action over the weekend at Sunland Park for a spin on Loom Ruler, a two-year-old thoroughbred making his first start in Saturday's sixth race. Rivas, who was leading rider at both Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs last year, recently recovered from a rough spill at Oaklawn Park. The filly proved well worth the trip, coming from behind for a sharp second. Rivas will return to Oaklawn Park this week.

**THE LARGEST WIN MARGIN** of the weekend was set by Run Little One in Sunday's first race. The chestnut colt, who was making his Sunland debut, lead from wire-to-wire to finish 12 lengths in front. Steve Valdez had the ride on the near 6-1 shot who returned \$13.20.

**GARY SUMPTER** made his first appearance of the spring season aboard Restless St in Friday's 400-yard second race and urged the gelding to a nose victory as the heavy favorite. He came back in the sixth for another victory on Till Bolero at 5 1/2 furlongs. The well-known jockey triumphed on My Easy Credit in the Kansas and All-American Derbys at Ruidoso Downs last summer and guided Real Wind to victory in the All-American Futurity the year before. He's been off the racetrack scene for the past few months,

breaking colts at Walter Merrick's ranch in Oklahoma.

**HEZA REBEL** has really been making a name for himself at the 870-yard distance. In Saturday's fourth race, he charged to the lead and really poured it on in the stretch to win by 1 1/4 lengths. The gelding, owned by Noel Mullins of Ruidoso Downs, now has three victories at that distance this year.

**TRIPPY DIP**, a well-tested two-year-old, took her fourth spin in Saturday's sixth race and put it together for a well-deserved victory. At the end of the four-furlong bout, the filly had nine lengths to spare. In three previous outings, the youngster finished second each time.

**TRACK BENDER**, who made her first out in Friday's ninth race, got off at 4-5 and easily justified the public's interest. The filly, trained by Paul Smith, broke alertly and immediately took a commanding lead. She continued to pull away for a six-length victory and a \$3.90 payoff. Amber Quillo, who took the runnerup slot, was the real surprise. She moved up swiftly from ninth and returned \$40.60 to place.

**THE HIGHEST DAILY** double payoff of the spring season turned up Friday night. The 4-6 combination of Phantom Britches in the fourth race with Sir Speedy in the fifth returned \$1,899.

**NU AND CRAFTY** displayed extraordinary early speed in Saturday's second race and held on for a seven-length triumph. The six-furlong event for \$2,000 claimers marked the gelding's second win at the meet. Backers received \$35.40. The Quinella matching Nu And Crafty with Judy's Bag (No. 3) returned a huge \$256.40.

**PHANTOM BRITCHES**, a 34-1 shot, came from out of nowhere in Friday's fourth race and blazed to a 2 1/2-length victory under the direction of apprentice Phil Uriste. The gelding, making the third start of his career, lay well back in the early going, then put on a powerful stretch charge for a \$71.20 payoff.

**IN STEWARDS' RULINGS**, Jockey Richard Bickel was fined \$50 for failure to fulfill his riding engagements Sunday, March 5.

**IF CURRENT TRENDS** continue, Sunland Park is in for some new mutual records. After 30 race days of the spring meeting, the daily wagering average stands at \$229,280. That's a gain of 15.4 percent over the comparable period last year, when the average was \$198,624. Fans are currently betting \$20,350 per race (338 races), as compared to the \$19,862 (325

races) over a like period last year. Historically, the handle improves steadily during the spring. Should this pattern hold true, the current meeting will easily eclipse Sunland's all-time wagering average of \$234,490, set during the 60-day spring meeting in 1976.

**THE NO. 6 POST POSITION** produced six winners over the weekend to lead in that category. Here are the seasonal totals: No. 1 — 74 wins, No. 2 — 66, No. 3 — 72, No. 4 — 79, No. 5 — 87, No. 6 — 82, No. 7 — 65, No. 8 — 49, No. 9 — 41, No. 10 — 37, No. 11 — 0, No. 12 — 1.

## I-N-S-I-D-E the Outdoors

Most people are familiar with the process of trying to plan ahead. You plan ahead for vacations, job adventures, financial situations, and other important activities. The farther ahead the planning is being done for, the more difficult the process is. Therefore, you can appreciate the fact that it has taken the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish 2 1/2 years to prepare a document that will provide guidelines for their activities for the next ten years.

This document is the New Mexico Comprehensive Wildlife Plan, Part I — the Strategic Section has been completed and sets a direction for the progress of the Department and establishes a framework for decision-making for the Department's day-to-day operations.

A series of meetings to acquaint the public with the document and to provide an opportunity for discussion concerning the plan have been scheduled for later this month and early April. Meeting places and dates are as follows: the Clovis Southwestern Public Service office — March 23; the Roswell Pioneer Savings and Trust office — March 24; the Alamogordo Municipal Building Commissioner's Room — April 12; the New Mexico Junior College, Hobbs, Room 101 of Watson Hall — April 13; the Carlisbad Valley Savings and Loan office — April 14. All meetings will start at 7:00 p.m.

Planning is a process of directing and evaluating programs and projects in order to achieve the effectiveness and efficiency being strived for. In this case, the concern is toward the effective and efficient management of wildlife and their habitats in an environment that is receiving increasing pressures from a rapidly growing human population.

Were the reader to proceed no further than the introduction of the Department's plan, he would get an excellent overview of challenges confronting wildlife managers. It is "must" reading for any who think there are easy solutions to the problems posed to an agency with the dual

responsibilities of responding to the needs of wildlife while trying to accommodate consuming, nonconsuming and purely competitive users of the resource.

While other parts of the plan deal with the nuts and bolts of department functions, it is the philosophy section which is truly absorbing and thought-provoking. This portion provides a rationale for wildlife management, indicates the degree of commitment the Department has toward all forms of wildlife and discusses the process of setting priorities. It deals with the several kinds of values assigned to wildlife by humans.

The philosophy section also identifies the kinds of pressures with which wildlife must contend and states that management decisions must give full consideration to all components of a wildlife community (ecosystem) and treat them equally.

While the Comprehensive Plan primarily represents the thinking of the Game and Fish Department, input from the U. S. Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management was also incorporated. Those who study the plan will come to recognize that decisions made now by all the various habitat management agencies involved are critical to the success of wildlife programs. And it is hoped that as the plan unfolds, any state and federal decisions affecting New Mexico wildlife will conform to the advocated approaches in this document.

Though the plan covers the next ten years, the Department recognizes it may require adjustment and amendment, such as in response to environmental changes. Still, the plan makes a solid statement of purpose and focuses strongly on future wildlife needs. The plan will prove invaluable to the Department as it moves ahead in the interests of both wildlife and man.

Each of you is encouraged to attend and participate in the reviewing of this document at the meeting date and place that best suits you.
